Dear Brother Sweet: You have endeared yourself to me on account of coming to see me in my lonely state. All I have or ever had have gone to the other world of my dear Savior. I desire that you should preach my funeral, on the text, I think it is Revelation vii, these words: "These are they that have passed through great tribulations and washed their robes in the blood of the Lamb." I was born in Weisbaden, Nassau, Germany. Mother was left a widow when I was 6 years of age and came to America, was raised in New York to 16, then came to Illinois; was converted in 1858. I enlisted as private in 1861 in company E, Thirty-fifth Illinois volunteers, was promoted in 1862 to Chaplain; was taken prisoner on September 19, 1863, at the battle of Chickamauga and sent to Andersonville and stayed until the war was over. I was appointed consul to Florence, Italy, under Harrison, served until Democratic rule came in. I once served also as Indian agent in White River agency. I lost wife and son within three months. In 1900 came to California with my son, but he died. I am alone and miserable.
