## EMIGRANTS TO NEW ENGLAND

### INTRODUCTION

Although a great amount of information has been unearthed about the emigration from East Anglia to New England following the voyage of The "Mayflower" in 1620, there is much confusion over the detail of names, original homes, and even in the dates quoted by different authors.

Thus one of the most famous names in American history, Henry Adams, is claimed to have been a native of Braintree, Essex, of Devonshire and of Somerset.

So this list, collected from the works of different authors, could give rise to doubts over the accuracy of some of the facts given.

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Emigrants on 'The Lyon' which sailed in 1632 with the Rev. Thomas Hooker's 'Braintree Company' on board. It is said that the ship carried 350 passengers. However, many names are missing from the list in The Lyon partly due to the fact that several were members when only the head of the house was mentioned, while others omitted went as servants. In 1635 two "servants" worked their passage for a John Brown.

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Other purely local names mentioned in passenger lists of other ships carrying emigrants.

EMIGRANTS ON 'THE LYON' IN 1632

"The Braintree Company"

ADAMS, Henry. Most likely from Somerset although his great, great grandson, John Adams, who became the second president of the United States of America, erected a memorial with the inscription "In memory of Henry Adams who took flight from the Dragon persecution in Devonshire, England, and alighted with eight sons near Mount Wollaston" (later Old Braintree and now Quincy). This would suggest that he sailed on "The Lyon". The claim that Henry Adams came from Bocking, Braintree, Essex, gains some support created by the visit of John Adams to Braintree, when ambassador, in trying to trace his ancestor. The son of John Adams, John Quincy Adams, became the sixth president of the U.S.A. The sons of Henry, including Henry, Joseph, Samuel and Thomas, were probably on "The Lyon".

ALLIS, Richard. Thought to have settled in Roxbury.

BARTLETT, Robert. Went to Newtowne (Cambridge).

BENJAMIN, John and Richard. Both settled in Watertown.

BRAINARD, John. From Braintree, Essex. Family history states that Daniel was the immigrant ancestor. First lived in Hartford, Conn. and then went to Haddam.

BREWER, Daniel and John. From Sussex. Went first to Boston and later lived in Roxbury.

BRIDGE, John. From Rayne Road, Braintree, Essex. His statue in the park opposite Harvard University lists his achievements and good works in establishing Boston in its early days.

BROWNE, John. From Suffolk. After Waterton settled in Plymouth. Died in 1637, aged 36.

CARMAN, John. Probably on "The Lyon". Went to Roxbury.

CARRINGTON, Edward and Thomas (brothers?). Settled in Charleston.

CHURCHMAN, John. From Kent.

CLARK, Nicholas. From Nazeing, Essex. Settled in Newtowne (Cambridge).

COGGESHALL, John. From Castle Hedingham. Lived in Boston and Roxbury but was banished to Rhode Island for his religious beliefs, as many others.

COGSWELL, John. From Halstead. Probably on "The Lyon". Settled in Roxbury.

CURTIS, William. From Nazeing, Essex. Wife a sister of the Rev. John Elliott. Went to Roxbury or Newtowne (Cambridge).

COGGESHALL, Joshua. From Coggeshall, Essex. Now several thousand of that name in U.S.A. including a President.

ELLIOTT, Rev. John. From Nazeing, Essex. Some say he sailed in 1631 also, but whether this is a mistake for 1632 or an earlier sailing is not known. He lived in Roxbury and translated the Bible into the Algonquin language and also organised a settlement where Christian Indians of Mass. could live together; so became known as "The apostle of the Indians". There is a monument to him in Cambridge, Mass. and his portrait hangs in the Library of Congress. His brothers, Francis and Philip were also on "The Lyon".

ELMORE or ELMER. From Braintree, Essex. After Newtowne (Cambridge) he lived in Hartford and Windsor. He was killed by Indians in 1676.

FOXALL or FOXWELL. From Coggeshall: settled in Boston.

GLOVER, Charles. From Dedham. He was constable for Gloucester in 1644 but settled in Salem.

GOODWIN, Ozias and brother William. From Lyons Hall, Bocking, Essex. Played a big part in organisation of the voyage of "The Lyon". After a religious dispute they moved with Hooker's Company from Newtowne (Cambridge) to Hartford, Conn. where the name is still prominent. A descendant visiting Braintree, Essex in 1931 mentioned that his house, overlooking a spot on the Connecticut River called Bocking Bay, was known as High Garrett!

GRANT, Seth. Settled in Newtowne (Cambridge) but later moved to Hartford with Hooker.

HART, Stephen. A deacon from Dedham or Braintree. After living in Newtowne he moved to Hartford, Conn. a town said to have been named after him. He later settled in Farmington where he founded the Church.

HEATH, William. From Hertfordshire. Settled in Roxbury where he was described as "an able, godly and faithful brother". Died 1652.

HOLMAN, Edward. From Surrey. He first sailed in 1623. Later on "The Lyon". He settled in Plymouth.

JAMES, William. From Walthamstow, London.

LEWIS, William. Lived in both Newtowne (Cambridge) and Roxbury.

MORRELL, Isaac. From Hatfield Broad Oak, Essex. A blacksmith who settled in Roxbury where he died in 1661.

MUMFORD or MOUNTFORD, Ann. Said to have followed John Elliott in "The Lyon".

OLMSTEAD, James, Nehemiah and Nicholas. Brothers from Bocking and Fairstead. One writer mentions James from Bocking but a Frederick Olmstead of Boston named his house 'Fairstead'.

RICHARDS, Nathaniel.

ROBERTS, Joseph.

SHELLEY, Robert. From Nazeing, Essex. First lived in Boston then Roxbury.

TALCOTT, John. From Braintree where his father was probably a member of the Four and Twenty in 1630 - a ruling body of the town. He moved to Hartford with Hooker and Company.

TOTMAN, John. Settled in Roxbury.

THROCKMORTON, John.

UFFORD, Thomas. From Suffolk. One of the founders of Springfield where he settled.

WADE, Jonathon. From Northampton. First settled in Charlestown, then in Ipswich.

WADSWORTH, William. From Braintree, Essex. Went to Newtowne (Cambridge) and then in Hartford, Conn.

WATSON, John. He lived in Roxbury.

WHIPPLE, brothers, John and Matthew. From Bradford Street, Bocking, Braintree, where father was a clothier. After some time residence in Dorchester moved to Ipswich.

WILLETT, Thomas. A merchant from Yarmouth. Lived in Plymouth.

WITCHFIELD, John. From Whitechapel, London. After a time in Dorchester he moved to Windsor, Conn.

WINTHROP, John Junior.

EMIGRANTS ON SHIPS OTHER THAN "THE LYON"

- ALLEN, Samuel. A name still represented in Braintree, Mass.
- FITCH, James. Of Bocking, Braintree. A brother, Thomas, prepared for the ministry by Thomas Hooker, is regarded as a founder of Norwalk.
- FOOTE, Joshua. From Shalford, Essex. Moved from Boston to Roxbury.
- ELMORE or ELMER. From Braintree, Essex. He lived in Newtowne, Hartford and Windsor. Killed by Indians in 1676.
- FOXALL or FOXWELL. From Coggeshall, Essex. Settled in Boston.
- HAWKINS, Abraham. Probably from Braintree, Essex. Lived Charlestown. Died 1648.
- HAWKINS, Robert. Probably from Braintree. Sailed 1635 when 25. Lived Charlestown.
- HAYNES, John. From Copford Hall, Colchester. He became the first Governor of Massachusetts.
- HILLS, Joseph. From Maldon, Essex. Settled Charlestown.
- HOOKER, Rev. Thomas. From Chelmsford, Essex. The driving force behind the sailing of "The Lyon" in 1632 and said to have given the name "The Braintree Company" to that group from Braintree. He was evicted from his church, St. Mary's, Chelmsford, and fled to Holland. He sailed in 1633 and went to Newtowne (Cambridge). After religious disputes there he took most of the Braintree Company to Hartford, Conn. He died in 1647.
- KELLOG, Nathaniel. Thought to be from Braintree, Essex.
- LINGWOOD, William. From Braintree, Essex, where the name appears as one of The Four and Twenty in 1619.
- LOOMIS, Edward. From Braintree, Essex where the family was well known.
- MARCH, John. From Braintree, Essex. Living in Charlestown in 1642.
- MARYON or MARION, John. Said to be from Stebbing, Essex although a John Maryon was living in Braintree between 1627 and 1632. Born 1619 and lived in Boston. Died 1705.
- NICHOLLS, Thomas. From Coggeshall. Lived in Newtowne (Cambridge) and Hingham. Died 1696.
- PORTER, John. From Felsted, Essex. Lived in various places including Hartford and Windsor. Died 1676.
- PAYSON, Giles. From Nazeing, Essex. Others of this name include James of Newbury, Jasper of Roxbury, Richard of Boston and Thomas of Boston.
- RUGGLES. A family from Nazeing, Essex. John settled in Roxbury. Died 1658. Thomas also lived in Roxbury. Died 1644.

SANDFORD, Zackery. From Braintree, Essex. Lived in Hartford then Saybrook.

SHEDD, Daniel. From Finchingfield, Essex. Settled in Braintree, Mass.

SKINNER, Richard. From Braintree, Essex. The Skinners were a family of clothiers in Braintree and Bocking between 1558 and 1640. The name also appears amongst members of The Four and Twenty ruling body in Braintree from 1619 onwards.

SPARHAWK, Nathaniel. From Braintree, Essex or Notley. Lived in Newtowne, (later Cambridge). Died 1647.

SPOONER, William. From Colchester, Essex. Settled in Plymouth.

STACEY, Simon and Thomas. Apparently brothers from Bocking, Essex. The former settled in Ipswich 1641 and died 1699. The latter also settled in Ipswich 1648 and died 1690.

STEBBING, Rowland. From Bocking, Essex. Lived in Roxbury but later went to Springfield.

STONE, Rev. Samuel. From Stisted, Essex. Went to Newtowne (Cambridge) as assistant to Mr. Hooker in 1633 and moved to Hartford, Conn. 1637.

STOUGHTON, Israel. From Coggeshall, Essex. He lived in Dorchester but is said to have returned to England in 1644.

SMEAD, John. From Coggeshall, Essex. Arrived in 1630.

SEAR or SAYERS. From Colchester. Several American towns so named.

TROTTER, Thomas. From Braintree, Essex.

WALFORD, Thomas. From Castle Hedingham, Essex. Lived in Charlestown before 1628 and was fined 40/- and ordered to leave the province for incurring the displeasure of the authorities. Died in New Hampshire in 1667.

WALL, Daniel and James or John. Probably brothers from Braintree, Essex. The name appears on the list of members of The Four and Twenty 1619-39.

WELD, Rev. Thomas. The suspended vicar of Terling who "was a leader of discontent and troubled Archbishop Laud greatly". Arrived in 1632 and is described in The Dictionary of Nat. Biography as "contumacious and objectionable". He was sent to England by the government of 1641 and did much for the colony during the Revolution. He became vicar of Gateshead, England, about 1649. He died in 1660. There was in Braintree, Mass., an old property known as "The Weld House" although he was said to live in Cambridge.

WILSON, Thomas. Perhaps from Bocking although there appears to have been a family connection with Lincolnshire. He arrived at Roxbury in 1633.



WOOD, George. From Bocking, Essex. Could have lived in Dorchester.

WORTHAM, Robert. The name appears in the list of members of The Four and Twenty during 1619-20.

RUGGLES, Geoffrey and John. From Sudbury and probably influenced by John Winthrop in their decision to emigrate in 1630. John died in the same year. Probably ancestors of Sir John Ruggles-Brise of Spains Hall.

As all genealogists know, ship passenger lists have always been of prime interest to genealogists, as they represent the first step in tracing ancestors from their country of origin to America. Books containing these passenger lists are very expensive: however, an excellent reference entitled "Lists of Emigrants to America, 1600-1700" by John Camden Hotten, is available from the Genealogical Publishing Company, 521-23 St. Paul Place, Baltimore, Maryland, at a cost of \$10.00.

We will start our list of ship passengers from this book and continue to print it in issues to come until we have covered the complete book. We will then continue with other passenger records.

The exact title of the Hotten book is, "Our Early Immigrant Ancestors, the Original Lists of Persons of Quality, Immigrants, Religious Exiles, Political Rebels, Serving Men Sold for a Term of Years, Apprentices, Children Stolen, Maidens Pressed, and Others Who Went From Great Britain to the American Plantations 1600-1700, with Their Ages, the Localities Where They Formerly Lived in the Mother Country, the Names of the Ships in Which They Embarked, and Other Interesting Particulars. From Manuscripts Preserved in the State Paper Department of Her Majesty's Public Record Office, England," edited by John Camden Hotten.

Undoubtedly the first immigrants to our country had no idea of the impression they would make upon the world's history. Some of them were men of position at home, possessing wealth and all of its conveniences. But by far the greater number were composed of comparatively obscure men — men of little means, but possessed of hearts and consciences of an honest nature and a desire to establish a home in a free country. Many left England because of taxes and enforced loans to which they were obliged to contribute. Many left for political reasons — and some were forced to leave. In these early days of our country, ships left England almost daily for America, but no record of them or their passengers remain. Further, the names of passenger lists include only those who legally left the shores of England. Among the thousands who immigrated to the United States it cannot be doubted that a very large number left to avoid payment of the subsidies, and would not take oaths of allegiance in supremacy. These, in all likelihood, left secretly, and of such no record would exist.

Before printing the ship passengers as listed in this issue, we must include some excerpts of other records. In 1860 Mr. Samuel Gardener Drake of Boston, Massachusetts published his "Result of Some Researches Among the British Archives for Information Relative to the Founders of New England." That work first suggested the desirability of making a systematic collection of authentic documents relating to the early settlers in America. It is impossible to over-estimate the value of these records, and it is a matter of the deepest regret that so few have survived to the present time. Those that we have, therefore, are all the more to be prized, and are of undoubted authenticity. Readers will undoubtedly notice mistakes in spelling of names or other clerical errors. Where such occur, and they are by no means infrequent, they are printed exactly as they are written. To correct them would be to destroy their authenticity, and also would take from them the flavor of the era in which they were written.

Among Mr. Drake's papers is the following:

"A list or register of all such persons as embarked themselves in the Good Ship called The Hercules, of Sandwich, of the burthen of 200 tons, John Witherley, Master, and therein transported from Sandwich to the Plantation called New England in America, with the certificates from the ministers where they last dwelt of their conversation, and conformity to the orders and discipline of the Church, and that they had taken the Oath of Allegiance and Supremacy." (The certificates, all dated February and March, 1634, are here omitted).

Included in the introduction to Mr. Hotten's book is a list of passengers in the Mayflower, including the

names of those who came over first, in the year 1620, and were the founders of New Plymouth, which led to the planting of the other New England Colonies. This list of their names and families was preserved by Governor Bradford at the close of his history, and is here presented in the order in which he placed them. The value of such an accurate list cannot be too highly estimated. The list follows:

Mr. John Carver, who was chosen their first Governor on their arrival at Cape Cod. He died the first spring. Katherine, his wife: she died a few weeks after her husband, in the beginning of summer.

Desire Minter; afterwards returned to her friends, in poor health, and died in England.

John Howland; man servant; afterwards married the daughter of John Tillie, and had ten children

Roger Wilder; man servant, died in the first sickness.

William Latham; a boy; after more than twenty years visited England, and died at the Bahama Islands.

A maid servant; who married, and died one or two years after.

Jasper Moore; who died the first season.

Mr. William Brewster; their Ruling Elder; lived some twenty-three or four years after his arrival. Mary, his wife; died between 1623 and 1627. Love Brewster; a son; married, lived to the year 1650, had four children. Wrestling Brewster: youngest son.

Richard More and Brother; two boys placed with the Elder. Richard afterwards married, and had four or more children. His brother died the first winter.

Mr. Edward Winslow; Mr. W. afterwards chosen Governor, died in 1655, when on a commission to the West Indies. Elizabeth, his wife, died the first winter. Mr. W. left two children by a second marriage.

George Soule and Elias Story; two men in Winslow's family. G. Soule married and had eight children. E. Story died in the first sickness.

Ellen More; a little girl placed in Mr. Winslow's family, sister of Richard More, died soon after their arrival.

Mr. William Bradford; their second Governor, author of the history of the Plymouth Colony, lived to the year 1657. Dorothy, his wife; who died soon after their arrival. Governor Bradford left a son in England to come afterwards; had four children by a second marriage.

Mr. Isaac Allerton; chosen first assistant to the Governor. Mary, his wife, who died in the first sickness. Bartholomew; son, married in England. Remember and Mary; daughters. Remember married in Salem, had three or four children. Mary married in Plymouth, had four children.

John Hook; servant boy, died in the first sickness.

Mr. Samuel Fuller; their physician. His wife and child remained, and came over afterwards; they had two more children.

William Butten; servant; died on the passage.

John Crackston; who died in the first sickness. John Crackston; his son; who died some five or six years after.

Capt. Myles Standish; who lived to the year 1656; chief in military affairs. Rose, his wife; died in the first sickness. Capt. Standish had four sons living in 1650, by a second marriage.

Mr. Christopher Martin and his wife; Solomon Prower and John Langmore, servants; all died soon after their arrival.

Mr. William Mullins, his wife; Joseph, a son; these three died the first winter. Priscilla, a daughter, survived and married John Alden. Robert Carter, servant; died the first winter.

Mr. William White; died soon after landing. Susanna, his wife; afterwards married to Mr. E. Winslow. Resolved, a son; married and had five children. Peregrine, a son; was born after their arrival at Cape Cod; he cannot therefore be numbered among the passengers proper; married and had two children before 1650.

William Holbeck and Edward Thomson, servants; both died soon after landing.

Mr. Stephen Hopkins, and Elizabeth, his wife; both lived over twenty years after their arrival, and had a son and four daughters born in this country. Giles, and Constantia, by a former marriage. Giles married; had four children. Constantia married; had twelve children. Damaris, a son, and Oceanus, born at sea; children by the present marriage.

Edward Doty, and Edward Litster, servants; E. Doty by a second marriage had seven children; after his term of service went to Virginia.

Mr. Richard Warren; his wife and five daughters were left, and came over afterwards. They also had two sons; and the daughters married here.

John Billington; he was not from Leyden, or of the Leyden Company, but from London. Ellen, his wife. John, his son; who died in a few years. Francis, the second son; married and had eight children.

Edward Tillie, and Ann, his wife; both died soon after their arrival. Henry Samson and Humility Cooper, two children, their cousins. Henry lived, married, had seven children. Humility returned to England.

John Tillie, and his wife; both died soon after they came on shore. Elizabeth, their daughter; afterwards married John Howland.

Francis Cooke; who lived until after 1650; his wife and other children came afterwards; they had six or more children. John, his son; afterwards married, had four children.

Thomas Rogers; died in the first sickness. Joseph, his son; was living in 1650, married, and had six children. Mr. Rogers' other children came afterwards, and had families.

Thomas Tinker, wife and son; all died in the first sickness.

John Rigdale, Alice, his wife; both died in the first sickness.

James Chilton, his wife; both died in the first sickness. Mary, their daughter; lived, married, and had nine children. Another married daughter came afterwards.

Edward Fuller, his wife; both died in the first sickness. Samuel, their son; married, had four children.

John Turner; two sons; names not given; all three died in the first sickness. A daughter came some years afterwards to Salem and there married.

Francis Eaton; Sarah, his wife; she died the first winter; by a third marriage he left three children. Samuel, a son; married and had one child.

Moses Fletcher, John Goodman, Thomas Williams, Digerie Priest, Edmond Margeson, Richard Britterige, Richard Clarke; these seven died in the general sickness. The wife of D. Priest, and children, came afterwards, she being the sister of Mr. Allerton.

Peter Brown; lived some fourteen years after, was twice married, and left four children.

Richard Gardiner; became a seaman, and died abroad.

Gilbert Winslow; after living here a number of years, returned to England.

John Alden; "a hopeful young man," hired at Southampton, married Priscilla Mullens, as mentioned, and had eleven children.

William Trevore and . . . Ely; two seamen; are commonly, but incorrectly reckoned in the number of the first company of passengers for the Colony; Bradford himself says: "Two other seamen were hired to stay a year; when their time was out they both returned." Accordingly he says of the Mayflower company; "These being about a hundred souls, came over in the first ship." Afterwards he adds: "Of these one hundred persons who came over in this first ship together, the greatest half died in the general mortality, and most of them in two or three months' time." Omitting those two hired sailors who returned, and counting the person that died and the child that was born while on the passage as one passenger, we have the exact number — one hundred of the Pilgrim Company, "who came over in the first ship." And, as fifty-one died the first season, this enumeration makes good those other words of the historian, that "the greatest half died in the general mortality."

We shall continue with a "List of Passengers That Arrived, after One Year, in the Second Small Ship, 'Fortune,'" being parts of families, with others, left in England or Holland the year before. They arrived at New Plymouth, on the 11th of Nov., 1621.
