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

Your letter to the Probate Office of Chambers County, Alabama, was received and we appreciate you writing, and your interest in the records on file here.

Four years ago I was Appointed the Court House County Historian and Custodian of the Original Records of Chambers County, Alabama, by our Judge of Probate and County Commission. I am the first Appointed in the State of Alabama, and we are glad that other counties are in the process of Appointing a Court House County Historian for their County.

Interest in family research has increased greatly in the past four years and it has become almost more than one person can do to handle the records PRIOR TO 1900.

All records after 1900 are checked by the clerk in the Probate Office, but with the addition of the new license renewal, with photo, for drivers, and other "happenings" in our county, there just are not enough PAID workers to do personal research.

My work is done on a volunteer basis, however, since I am not on a salary, I must ask for the expense of making copies you may, or may not, request in your letter, plus postage and handling.

The Court House charges .50 per sheet for xerox copies and some of the deed books are large and it will take 3 pages to copy one page from deeds, mortgages, Wills, and many other of the Probate Office.books.

The reason for sending this amount to me is because I will have your request in my files, or I may have additional information from my own library which I can help you with. If you prefer, please make your cheek payable to the PROBATE OFFICE, CHAMBERS COUNTY, ALABAMA, as this will be where your money will go. WILLIAM W. PARHAM, EARLY SETTLER IN TUSCUMBIA CHRISTIAN CEMETERY ADDITIONS

"This is the humble tribute of a friend who knew him well and valued him highly, and who must ever deplore his death as a misfortune which no future disadvantage (sic) can compensate."

The obituary could possibly have been written by his friend, Claiborne SAUNDERS - I just wish he had mentioned survivors.

From a 1981 issue of the Alabama Genealogical Quarterly, in an article entitled "Miscellaneous Newspaper Notices from the North Alabamian (Tuscumbia) 1833-1839" came the only record thus far showing the names of the children of William W. and Louisa M. PARHAM. Circuit Court, April Term, 1833 - Claiborne SAUNDERS, Louisa PARHAM and the minor heirs of Wm. W. PARHAM, deceased, to wit: Curtis PARHAM, Katharine PARHAM, William PARHAM, Martin PARHAM and James PARHAM. Earlier court records, in 1829, had named Curtis HOOKS and James DAVIS as Administrators of Wm. W. PARHAM's estate.

The 1830 census for Franklin Co, AL, lists "L. K. PARHAM, age 20/30, female head of household with 1 male under 5, 1 male 5/10, 1 male 10/15 and two females between 5/10." The census for the same county in 1840 shows "Louisa PARHAM, 30-40 head of household with 1 male between 10/15, 1 15/20, and one female 10/15."

Katharine (Cathryn) PARHAM married Francis Smith EARLY on 4 Oct 1839 in Marshall Co, MS. He was the son of Gov. Peter EARLY (1813-17) of Georgia and Ann Adams SMITH. Francis came to Alabama with his sister Lucy Wilkinson EARLY and her husband Richard JONES who settled in Lawrence Co, AL, in 1822 and purchased a cotton plantation west of Town Creek. He sold this plantantion in 1829 and purchased a larger one east of Courtland. Francis Smith EARLY and his brother, Thomas, were both members of the "Red Rovers", a voluntary military company which participated in the Texas Revolution, organized by Captain (Dr.) Jack SHACKELFORD at Courtland in November 1835. [See the Traveler, Vol. 6, pp. 33 and 34, Feb 1986] Francis and Cathryn (PARHAM) EARLY settled in Washington Co, TX, where their two children were born in 1842 and 1844. Francis served as a captain in General TAYLOR's Army in 1846 and "surviving both camp and battle, died of illness at the Tremont Hotel in Galveston on his return from the mouth of the Rio Grande in October 1846." Cathryn married, 1 May 1856, James R. HINES in Texas; she died in Abilene, TX, and was buried there 9 April 1889.

Of Louisa M. LOVE, nothing is known about her parents and no record has been found about her after 1840, at least not in Alabama. Of Cathryn's siblings, nothing is known except the 1833 court records quoted above.

Cathryn (PARHAM) (EARLY) HINES' daughter, Frances L. EARLY, married James Thomas NORRIS (b 30 Jul 1829, Princess Ann Co, VA; d 5 Oct 1883, Brenham, Washington Co, TX). Their son, James Thomas NORRIS (b 10 Feb 1872 in Texas, d 1 Oct 1953, Tampa, Hillsborough Co, FL) was my father.

## CHRISTIAN CEMETERY

Eleanor HOLDER, writing in the 28 Oqt 1971 issue of the Colbert County Reporter, described for readers one of Tuscumbia's historic homes and the adjacent family cemetery. In the early 1830's, two young brothers from Virginia migrated to Franklin Co, AL, to raise cotton. Archibald CHRISTIAN married Paulina LEWIS in Virginia but brother John was married in Tuscumbia to Anna COOPER. They built a two-story home that is now located on the grounds of the Tennessee Valley Country Club; members of the club have preserved the house. The Christian Family Chronicles, published by Agnes Branch PEARLMAN, 2001 N Westwood Ave. Santa Ana, CA 92706, however, reported in 1980 that A. S. [Archibald] CHRISTIAN hauled goods by wagon from Baltimore, MD, to Tuscumbia in 1819. Land records for the county do not show the CHRISTIANs as original land purchasers; rather, they bought the land from the University of Alabama after 1825. Regardless, John CHRISTIAN and his family were living temporarily in New Orleans in the 1850's. They contracted yellow fever and both parents died. Anna (COOPER) CHRISTIAN's father, Charles COOPER, went to New Orleans and returned with the children; their names were Rush, Edmund, Anna, and Elizabeth Langston CHRISTIAN. They later were sent to Virginia to live with their grandfather Arthur CHRISTIAN and to obtain their education. Elizabeth later returned to this area and married James Allen MADDING of Leighton; some of their descendants still reside here. Archibald and his wife eventually moved into Tuscumbia and lived at Violet Hall. One of their sons, Lewis W., moved west to Wetherford, TX.

The cemetery was described by Mrs. HOLDER as uncared for and overgrown with weeds. Mr. BENTLEY, who surveyed the cemetery in November 1988 reported the cemetery was in a pasture that had been bulldozed. He later reported, in December 1989, that the cemetery had been restored and two new markers had been erected. Mrs. HOLDER reported several gravestones in 1971 that were no longer present in 1988; in addition, she reported many graves without markers. To locate the cemetery (in the west part of Sec 9, Township 4S, Range 11W) start at the intersection of Woodmont Drive and US 72; go west on US 72 for about 1 mile and turn right on South Indian Street; go north for 2 blocks and the cemetery is on the right just before the entrance to the Tennessee Valley Country Club.

## Notes by Mrs. HOLDER:

Rush CHRISTIAN was bitten by a mad dog and died of hydrophobia. One of the brothers was gored to death by his pet deer. The two JOHNSTON stones had toppled over at the time she visited the cemetery.

## Notes by Mr. BENTLEY:

E. Rush CHRISTIAN was born in Augusta County on 23 Sept 1810 and died 9 May 1842. Archie Douglass CHRISTIAN instead of Arthur Douglass. Charley Lewis CHRISTIAN instead of Charles Lewis. Some of the differences in names could be due to weathering of the stones. The two JOHNSTON stones were not present.



## from the Editor . . .

This issue of the Quarterly is devoted to the Withers-Chapman-Johnson House in honor of the publication by Historic Huntsville Foundation of the book Changing Huntsville, 1890-1899 by Elizabeth Humes Chapman (1884-1967). Miss Chapman lived in the house during the 1890's and early 1900's. She was a school teacher in the Alabama public schools for nearly fifty years, and the manuscript that became her book was written in 1932 as her thesis for her Master of Arts in History from Columbia University.

The Withers-Chapman-Johnson house and acreage, called Gladstone Place since the 1890's, was purchased by Governor Reuben Chapman in 1873 and was owned by the Chapman family for nearly a hundred years. The property has had only seven owners since 1809, all contributing in their own ways to the history of ever-changing Huntsville and Madison County. Mr. and Mrs. Walter Johnson are the present owners.

Special thanks are offered to Mrs. Johnson, who is a professional genealogist, for making available her many research materials concerning the property and people connected with it.



## COVER:

## The Withers-Chapman-Johnson House

## A Plantation Cottage

by Micky Maroney

[NOTE: Research materials for this article were provided by Dorothy Scott Johnson, who spent a number of years researching the history of the house, the land, and the owners.]

"Sir, if I can put up with her for thirty-seven years, you surely can tolerate her a little while longer," said the former governor of Alabama to the Union Army captain.

The Union Army was in the process of evicting the Reuben Chapman family from their stately plantation mansion two miles north of Huntsville. It was January 1864, and in confiscating the property for Union Army use, the captain had allowed the family only enough time to pack a few personal belongings into a wagon.

Mrs. Chapman, whose disposition left a lot to be desired, incessantly berated the officer until he could endure her tirade no longer. He had threatened to have her arrested when Governor Chapman intervened.

Soon after his property was confiscated, the former governor, himself, was arrested and sent to prison in Boston Harbor in Massachusetts. When the Union troops left Huntsville on the last day of the Civil War in 1865, they burned many buildings, including the Chapman home.

Several years after the war was over. Reuben Chapman. back home again, bought the farm adjacent to his plantation but never lived in the house there, known at that time as the Withers House. Nevertheless. he surely must have been the most prominent of all the owners of the property. The house was occupied in later years by his granddaughter Elizabeth Humes Chapman, author of the book Changing Huntsville, 1890-1899.

The property remained in the Chapman family for nearly

a century, although much of the acreage was sold for subdivision development in the 1950's and 1960's. Since 1971 the house and two acres have been owned by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Johnson.

Tracing Madison County property owners back to the government land sales of 1809 can be a complicated and confusing procedure. Determining the date of construction of an old house can be equally difficult. Sometimes the researcher must be content with an approximate date of construction, as is the case with the Withers-Chapman-Johnson house in northeast Huntsville.

### The House and Grounds

According to information written about the property for its nomination to the National Register of Historic Places (1978), the Withers-Chapman-Johnson House is a good example of the smaller homes constructed in North Alabama in the first half of the nineteenth century. Probably constructed by Allen Christian during the early 1830's, it is one of the few known intact Madison County examples of a one-and-onehalf story frame cottage of the period. Although the house type was fairly common in rural parts of the county, few such dwellings have survived.

MODEST PLANTATION HOME. A somewhat modest structure, it has restrained but well-crafted Federal period and Greek Revival details and is one of the few houses in the area to have corner fire-places in the two upstairs

rooms. Constructed as the center of a moderately prosperous plantation, later one of the major dairy farms serving the city of Huntsville, the house has retained a semi-attached kitchen and two nineteenth century outbuildings.

The house, according to Chapman family history, was the first home outside the Huntsville city limits to have electricity installed. In February 1926 the wedding of Josephine Chapman's sister Adelia Gaboury was held at the Chapman home. Adelia was engaged to Otto K. Seyforth, manager of the Huntsville Utilities at that time. Adelia scorned candlelight for the ceremony, preferring modern electric lights instead. To please her, the Chapmans installed electric light fixtures and paid for utility poles and wiring to be run from Huntsville to their home. The utility company paid for the labor. And Adelia had her wedding ceremony illuminated by electric lights.

The home, now within the city limits of Huntsville, is situated on a two-acre tract landscaped with old English boxwood, hardwood trees, magnolias, and many daffodils, irises and day lilies. Although subdivision development has claimed most of the surrounding acreage, the place retains its rural character due to its landscaping and its location on a hill-side.

IN EXCELLENT CONDITION. The house, rectangular in shape and measuring approximately 48' x 37', is in ex-





cellent condition with only minor changes having been made over the years. The gabled-roof frame structure is sheathed with clapboard and rests on a low limestone foundation. A small unfinished cellar is located under the southeast corner of the house.

Facing south, the three-bay front facade has single 12/12 windows (12 panes of glass in the upper sash over 12 panes of glass in the lower sash) on each side of a central pedimented portico with four slender Tuscan columns. The portico rests on a brick foundation with lattice infill. The original balustrade is in place, but all of the simple rectangular

balusters have been removed. The front entrance has a double-leaf door with glass upper panels and carved wood panels below. This door dates from around 1893 when several small changes were made to the structure.

On the east side of the house, beginning at the back corner, is an enclosed shedroof area twenty-four feet long, formerly thought to have been a porch. However, renovation in that vicinity has shown that the rear part of the area, adjacent to the back bedroom and now containing a bathroom, closet, and small hall, was probably a dressing room or maybe a "birthing room." The front part of the area, adjacent to

the front bedroom, was a screened sleeping porch at one time. It was was enclosed in 1966 to provide space for another bathroom, closet, and small hall.

The east and west elevations of the house each have two exterior chimneys which pierce the tapered vergeboards at the gable ends. All four chimneys have stepped shoulders with two-brick projections. Two 9/9 windows are located between the chimneys on the ground floor of the west elevation, while at the half-story level, both the east and west sides have 12/12 windows between the chimneys.

Originally, there was a small portico at the rear door on the north side of the house, and a herringbone pattern brick walk led to the nearby kitchen. The present shed-roof porch crossing the entire rear of the house was added in the 1930's. The east end of this porch has been enclosed to provide sheltered access to the kitchen, located at the northeast corner behind the house. The present kitchen is a rectangular frame structure with a gabled roof and probably dates from the 1870's.


Over the rear door of the house there is a rectangular transom which is concealed on the inside by the stair landing. This could indicate a possible change of plans during or after construction of the house. Giving light to the stair landing is a 6/6 window located in a central wall-dormer. Its gabled roof also has tapered vergeboards.

CENTER HALL PLAN. The interior consists of a central hall with a parlor and dining room to the left and two connecting bedrooms to the right. All downstairs rooms measure 18' x 18' and the ceilings are 11'2" high.


A stair with a full landing and return is located at the rear of the hall along the east wall. The stair has decorated tred ends, two rectangular tapered balusters per tred, and a round handrail.

Interior door and window trim is simple with plain corner blocks, and the doors have two vertical raised panels in the Greek Revival style. All of the doors were originally painted, but were later grained (painted to look like expensive natural wood). Folding doors between the parlor and dining room have been removed and stored.

The original mantels are simple with flat pilasters, typical of the Greek Revival period in the area, but the mantel in the dining room has had decorative carved wood

pieces applied in the Victorian manner. Originally, the mantels were painted black, a custom of the Federal period.

Victorian baseboards, approximately 8" high, were added throughout the downstairs, although the standard 6" beaded baseboards of the Federal period are intact in the upstairs rooms.

The half-story above, which has not yet undergone restoration, consists of a central hallway with an 18' x 16' room on either side. The ceilings measure approximately 7'4" at the highest point and slope to 5'7" at the lowest. Both rooms have corner fireplaces. The house

also has three original closets, two on the upper floor and one in the southeast bedroom downstairs.

Several outbuildings remain on the property. Located a short distance northwest of the house is the cabin that was the servants' quarters. It is clapboarded and has a central limestone chimney between two rooms, an apron porch with chamfered posts, four-panel doors, and Greek Revival mantels. To the northeast of the house is a tall, one-story frame smokehouse with a notable nailstudded batten door. Additionally, a small playhouse built circa 1930 is located on the west lawn.

## The Early Owners


The Withers-Chapman-Johnson House is now well within the Huntsville city limits. Situated on the southern slope of Chapman Mountain, the property is located on Dairy Lane (formerly Gaboury Lane) north of Oakwood Road and east of Maysville Road, being in Section 19, Township 3 South, Range 1 East of the Basis Meridian (see a Madison County map with these designations).

TENANTS IN COMMON. As stated earlier, the house, in all probability, was built by Allen Christian, who held government-issued Certificates for the purchase of land in Madison County when the 1809 Government Land

Sales were held. He is listed in the 1809 Squatter Census of Madison County as living in the northeast quarter of Section 30, T3S, R1E, which adjoins the southeast boundary of Section 19, for which he also held a Certificate. He owned both tracts of land until his death in 1836.

In May 1810, documents attest to the fact that a George Kaiser had assigned his Certificate to Lemuel Mead for 159.70 acres, being the southeast quarter of Section 19; therefore Lemuel Mead and Allen Christian each held Certificates for that same quarter section of land.

A patent was granted on October 3, 1820 to "Allen Christian in his own right and Lemuel Mead as assignee

of George Kaiser ... as Tenants in Common and not as joint tenants." The patent mentions "appurtenances" but not "tenements," indicating that no permanent dwelling was built on the property at that time.

(The wording of a certificate, land patent or deed often included the terms "appurtenances" and "tenements," the former nearly always referring to farm structures and outbuildings, in some cases possibly including a crude, temporary dwelling; the term "tenements" almost always referred to a well-built permanent dwelling.)

The 1820 patent, issued and signed by President James Monroe, was finally registered in the County Court of Madison County on April 7, 1835. The wheels of government ground slowly then, too.

On March 11, 1835 Mead and Christian had the southeast quarter of Section 19 surveyed and divided diagonally into two equal parts. On April 7 of that year, they each deeded one-half of their commonly-owned land to each other. The Christians took the land lying south and west in the quarter, and the Meads took the north and east portion of the quarter. Both deeds mention tenements, indicating both portions of land had homes on them and that the families did not live together.

On the dividing line was a stone spring house with a spring nearby, called Christian's Spring, which is the headwaters of Spring Branch. The spring remained in common between the Christian and Mead families for the use of both. The stone walls of the spring house are still intact today.


WILLS, BEQUESTS, AND GRAVEYARDS. Unfortunately, Allen Christian and Lemuel Mead both died the following year. Mead, who had been a delegate to the Alabama Constitutional Convention in 1819 and had been a member of the Legislature, among his many accomplishments, died on June 11, 1836. He is buried at his nearby plantation, the present Harris Hill Farm on Highway 72 East. In his will. which was probated on September 10 of that year, Mead left the land whereon he lived to his wife Martha, with the priviledge of using water from his "old place, Christian's Spring." He had no children of his own but made bequests to many relatives, including his four stepchildren, among them, Augustus H. Ford.

Allen Christian died that summer also. His will was probated on September 10 1836, the same day as Lemuel Mead's. Christian left his plantation whereon he then lived to his wife Margaret and made bequests to five of six children mentioned in the will. He stated, "No part of my estate is given to my son Jesse, but the share to which he should be entitled is to go to his children James and William." In his will Allen Christian directed his other son Allen, Jr., who was then living on and managing his father's Jackson County plantation, to live on the home plantation in Madison County with the remaining family. He directed Allen, Jr. to manage both plantations and to hire an overseer for the one in Jackson County. He further directed that there was to be no division of his home plantation while any of his daughters remained unmarried.

The family continued to live on the plantation for several years. Margaret Christian died in 1842, stating in her will that her Executor should have the family burial ground enclosed with "a brick wall in a neat and substantial manner." The last two owners of the property have not been able to locate the Christian's family graveyard, although an affidavit dated April 19, 1845 states that a \$55.00 payment was made "to William Brandon for walling in six graves and caping [capping] the wall with Sand Stone ... as per contract with Allen Christian, Junr."

By December 1843, all the Christian daughters were married and a petition was made to the Orphans Court to have the land sold for division among the heirs. A public auction was held on January 17, 1844. Daniel B. Turner was the high bidder for the 240 acre Christian plantation in Madison County. Allen Christian, Jr. and Archibald Mitchell each bought half of the Jackson County plantation.

By August 20, 1844 Daniel B. Turner had sold the property to Augustus H. Ford, a stepson of Lemuel Mead. Ford kept the land only a few

years, selling it in October 1849 to Phillip Woodson.

THE WITHERS HOUSE. The property remained in the Woodson family for the next twenty-four years. During that time the house was known locally as the Withers House, being occupied by Phillip Woodson's daughter and sonin-law, Mary and Augustine Withers. They called their plantation home Woodgreen.

When Phillip Woodson died without a will, his daughter Mary was appointed Administratrix of his estate. As such, she was ordered by the Court of Probate to sell the property "for the payment of the debts of the Said Phillip Woodson."

Accordingly, in January 1873 Reuben Chapman became the purchaser of Woodgreen, the 342 acre plantation from the Woodson Estate, including the Withers' home.

### The Chapman Family

Governor Reuben Chapman was "a man of splendid figure and proportions, erect in his carriage, handsome in feature and frank in expression," according to T. M. Owen's History of Alabama and Dictionary of Alabama Biography. He was born in 1799 in Caroline County, Virginia, the son of Revolutionary War Colonel Reuben (I) and Ann (Reynolds) Chapman, both also native Virginians. Colonel Chapman was the son of a Scotsman.


Reuben (II), the future governor of Alabama, came on horseback to Huntsville in 1824 to read law in the office of Judge Samuel Chapman, a relative (brother or uncle). In 1832 Reuben was elected to the State Senate, and in 1835 he was elected to the U.S. Congress, a post he held for six terms.

On October 17, 1838 Reuben (II) married Felicia Pickett of Limestone County. Alabama. They had six children who lived to be grown. Two daughters died in infancy. Steptoe Pickett, their eldest child, was killed in battle at the age of twentythree while serving in the Confederate Army. Four daughters were born after Steptoe: Juliette, who married Turner Clanton; Felicia Corbin, who married Bolling Hubbard; Ellelee, who married Milton

Humes; and Alberta Pickett, who married John G. Taylor. Reuben (III), their youngest child, married Rosalie Sheffey.

THE THIRTEENTH GOVERNOR (1847-1849). In 1847, while a member of the U. S. Congress, Reuben Chapman (II) received the nomination, without solicitation, for governor of Alabama. He was elected and served for two years, being the thirteenth governor of the state.

When he took office, the state was financially embar-rassed because of mismanagement of the state bank. He was able to remedy the problem through sound business practices and set the state on a more sound financial footing. His term was characterized by wisdom and devotion to duty.

When the State Capital was moved from Tuscaloosa to Montgomery in 1847, Joshua Martin was governor; however, Chapman was the first governor to serve a full term in the Montgomery location. Eight days before the end of his administration, the new capitol building burned.

In 1855 he was elected to the state legislature, and he was also a delegate to the national Democratic Conventions in 1856, 1860, and 1868.

THE CIVIL WAR. In January 1864 during the War Between the States when the Federal troops evicted Reuben and Felicia Chapman from their stately mansion, the Union Army billeted a Negro regiment on the plantation, with the officers occupying the house. A Freedman's Bureau, the first refugee camp for Negroes, was established there, and it also served as a prison camp for captured Negroes.

In order to provide shelter for so many people, officers ordered the troops to build barracks on the property. From that time until well into the twentieth century, the plantation was called Barracks Place.

When the Civil War ended in 1865, the Union troops were jubilant about their victory. As they left Hunts-ville on the last day of the war, they celebrated by burning numerous buildings in and near the town, including the Chapman home and furnishings.


When Governor Chapman, who had been arrested and

sent to a Union prison in Boston Harbor, returned home after the war, he and his family lived in Huntsville. He never rebuilt the mansion on the plantation, although he continued his farming operations there.

PLANTATION NEIGHBORING BOUGHT. In 1873 the governor bought the neighboring plantation with the one-and-onehalf story cottage built by Allen Christian. Governor Chapman, who died May 17, 1882, never lived there himself, but the family of his son Reuben (III) lived there, possibly during the 1880's and certainly during the 1890's. The history of the house's occupants during the 1870's and 1880's is not clear.

Reuben (III), who was born in 1858, married Rosalie Floyd Sheffey of Huntsville on November 16,1882. Three children were born to them - Ellelee, who married Erle Pettus; Elizabeth Humes, who never married, author of Changing Huntsville; and the youngest, Reuben (IV), who married Josephine Gaboury.

MONTE SANO DAIRY. In 1889 the Monte Sano Dairy was established by William E. Matthews and Milton Humes, who was the brother-in-law of Reuben (III). The dairy was located on the part of the Chapman plantation that had originally belonged to Allen Christian. It was actually situated across a valley from Monte Sano Mountain, For many years Monte Sano Dairy supplied much of the milk and other dairy products consumed by Huntsvillians.

That year, 1889, William Matthews and his family moved into the Christian cottage, which they named Monte Sano Cottage, and he managed the dairy with its herd of registered Jerseys.

Remnants of some of the dairy buildings, all built of limestone, are still standing a short distance northeast of the Christian cottage. Allen Christian's spring house, mentioned earlier, was used to collect the ice-cold springwater into a pool. It was then piped down to the cooling house at the bottom of a fifteen-foot cliff where it was used to cool the fresh, warm milk. The thick stone walls of the cooling house and the bottling house nearby are still standing. The barn where the cows were

milked twice a day was across a lane from the bottling house. A modern home has been built on the site of the old dairy barn.

A COW WORTH KISSING. Soon after Monte Sano Dairy was established, it became the home of Signal's Lily Flag, an extraordinary Jersey cow. She was "a cow worth kissing," according to Elizabeth Humes Chapman in her account of the dairy. Lily Flag was owned by General Samuel H. Moore of Huntsville and William Matthews, the dairy co-owner and manager.

An unofficial butterfat test for Lily Flag's milk was conducted in 1891. In seven days she produced 23 pounds, 11 ounces of butter. Her one-year production of butter for 1892 was 1,029 pounds, 13 & 1/4 ounces, which surpassed the then current world champion's record.

Her astonishing achievement made Lily Flag the talk of the town. Many parties were held in her honor, the most notable of which was an elegant reception and ball given by General Moore at his home on Adams Avenue (603 Adams). Fifteen hundred guests were invited to meet his record-breaking cow Lily Flag. Her admiring public met her in the huge double parlors where she "was standing on a silver platform under a flower-decked mantel ... not even dazzled by her elegance" - to quote Miss Chapman.

Unquestionably, she was a thoroughbred and had been valued at \$10,000 in 1891. That was more than the price of many a farm in Alabama at that time.

When the World's Fair opened in Chicago in 1893, Lily Flag was shipped there to compete for the butterfat world's championship. General Moore, the story goes, would not allow her to be milked for twenty-four hours before the start of the competition. It ruined one side of her udder.

The unfortunate results of Lily Flag's trial for the championship were reported in the Book of the Fair, Columbian Exposition, 1893:

For several weeks before the cheese test in May, animals of each class were placed in the sheds south of the Dairy build-

ing, and from their milking records the contestants were selected. Thus it was that the Jersey milch cow, Signal's Lily Flag, valued at \$15,000, and considered the queen of her race, was not permitted to enter the lists, for though with a record of more than 1,000 pounds of butter a year, at her preliminary trial she failed to meet the expectations of her admirers.

Nevertheless, another dairy paid \$10,000 for her.

Although William Matthews knew farming and dairying thoroughly, he had quite a few financial reverses during his life. In 1894 he relinquished his interest in the dairy, and he and his family left Monte Sano Cottage and moved back to Huntsville.

GLADSTONE PLACE. Chapman relates in her book that the dairy changed owners in 1894 but maintained its high standards and continued to serve Huntsville throughout the decade. By that time, Miss Chapman's mother Rosalie had been widowed for several vears. Reuben (III) had died April 24, 1891, six weeks before his thirty-third birthday. Rosalie and her three young children had moved into the Christian cottage after the Matthews family moved out.

According to Chapman family lore, Rosalie was involved in the operation (and perhaps ownership?) of the dairy. One hot summer day when Rosalie was taking a

wagon-load of milk to Huntsville, she came upon a number of soldiers marching in the oppressive heat. Taking pity upon them in their discomfort, she gave them some of her cool, refreshing milk to drink. They were troops from the Spanish American War who were stationed in Huntsville during the late 1890's.

During the time that Rosalie and her family lived in the Christian cottage, they named it Gladstone Place in honor of Gladstone Nursery on Pulaski Pike. The nursery, which belonged to a dear family friend of the Chapmans, was named in honor of William Ewart Gladstone, the great English statesman who served four different terms as prime minister. Rosalie lived at Gladstone Place until her death in 1917.

Her daughter Elizabeth (1884-1967), who grew from a thin little girl with bright red hair into a graceful teenager during the 1890's, was a teacher in the public schools of Alabama for over fifty years. Well educated and widely travelled, in 1932 she wrote the manuscript that became Changing Huntsville as her thesis for her Master of Arts in History at Columbia University.

The last Chapman family to live in the house was that of Reuben (IV), Elizabeth's younger brother. Born in 1889, he married Josephine Gaboury who was born in 1896. Four children were born to them, two of whom died in infancy. Their daughter Caroline (Mrs. James Philpot) lives in Mobile, and their son Reuben (V) (Buddy) lives

in a neighborhood near his old childhood home.

Reuben (IV) and Josephine lived at Gladstone Place for nearly half a century. Josephine remained there for several years after Reuben died in 1965, later moving to Mobile to live with her daughter and family because of failing health. Josephine Chapman died in 1980.

### The Johnson Era

In 1971 Mr. and Mrs. Walter Johnson bought the house and two acres from the Reuben Chapman Estate. When the Johnsons acquired the house it was in sound structural condition, although some cosmetic restoration was required. A new roof was needed and the front porch floor and steps had to be replaced, as well as the fascia boards and all the gutters. One chimney had to be rebuilt and the other three still must be repaired before they can be used.

The bathrooms were modernized and the old plaster walls were patched and repaired before new wallpaper could be hung. The rooms upstairs still need some work, although the corner fireplace in the east room has been restored.

A HOLE IN THE WALL. The Johnsons made a remarkable discovery during the process of removing old wallpaper, which made them wonder why the house had not burned down years ago. When the bottom layer of old wallpaper was removed from the chimney in

the dining room, they found an open stovepipe hole that had never been filled in. Through the years, layers of wallpaper had been pasted right over the hole, the bottom third of which was filled with soot.

It seems that one of the earlier residents had installed a stove which was later removed. The fireplace was then converted to burn coal instead of wood, but for some reason the stovepipe hole was never plugged up.

While relating the account of finding the hole in the chimney, Mrs. Johnson was amazed to recall that they, too, forgot to plug the hole and papered right over thin air! Since the entire chimney must be repaired before being used, perhaps some day the hole will be filled in.

The Johnsons, who came to Huntsville from Denver, Colorado, have done most of the restoration work themselves, as time has permitted. Thus it has been a slow process, one that has been ongoing, off and on, ever since they have lived there. However, they did hire professionals to rebuild the chimney and to reroof the house. They hope to finish restoration on the upstairs eventually.

Walter Johnson is an aerospace engineer who is quite a handyman. Not only is he adept at patching plaster and hanging wallpaper, among other talents, he has beautifully upholstered several family antique chairs and sofas.

The Empire style buffet and mirror, originally belonging to the Chapman family, are once again in their traditional place in the dining room.



Dorothy Scott Johnson is a professional genealogist who has published several genealogical source books on Madison County. She is a former editor of Valley Leaves, a periodical published by the Tennessee Valley Genealogical Society. She, too, is adept at hanging wallpaper, painting, and refinishing woodwork.

HEIRLOOMS RETURN HOME. Several years after the Johnsons had bought the house. they had the opportunity to buy an heirloom buffet and matching mirror from Josephine Chapman. When illness had forced Mrs. Chapman to move to Mobile to live with her daughter, much of the family furniture had to be put into storage, including the buffet and mirror. Neither of her children had been able to use the stored furniture.

According to family history, the Empire style buffet and mirror belonged to Governor Chapman, and it is believed that they were among the few personal belongings that were saved when the Union Army confiscated the Chapman plantation home.

Having graced the Chapman dining room at Gladstone Place for so long, at least since the 1890's and perhaps earlier, the buffet and mirror are once again in their traditional location in the house.

And the Johnsons will continue to preserve and cherish the Chapman house, not only for themselves but for future generations of its owners and others who appreciate nineteenth century architecture, craftsmanship, and history.



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

## DR. WILLIAM PLEASENT HARDWICK

WILLIAM PLEASENT HARDWICK was born in Henry County, Alabama January 25, 1860. He was a son of John C. and Mary Whittle Hardwick, and attended the local Henry county schools of the day, which left much to be desired. But he managed by special study to acquire adequate background for entering the Medical School at Mobile. This was a branch of the University of Alabama which was set up especially for the training of doctors in Alabama.

When Dr. Hardwick finished his studies in Mobile, he set up practice in Headland, and soon married Anna Belle Price. She was a daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Jon Edward Price of Headland, Alabama. His practice followed the pattern of so many doctors of his day. The practice was general, using the medicines at hand, and traveling by horse and buggy to visit his patients both day and night. Pay was sometimes received and sometimes given in commodities.

Dr. and Mrs. Hardwick were the parents of four children. They were: Max Irwin Hardwick of Enterprise, Clarke Price Hardwick, who died when quite young, Dr. Charles Fredrick Hardwick of Headland, Alabama, and Leta Hardwick Daley who lived in Macon, Georgia. There were a number of grandchildren; George William Hardwick of Enterprise, Reverend Jon Hardwick of Daleville, Joe Daly Hardwick of Slocomb, Robert Videmer Hardwick of Dothan--sons of Max I. Hardwick. There there were; Mike Secher and Charles F. Hardwick, Jr., sons of Dr. Charles Fredrick Hardwick. These latter grandchildren lived in Dothan, Alabama.

Dr. William Pleasant Hardwick continued to serve the people in the Headland area from the first days of his practice until his death October 8, 1923. He was widely known and respected in Henry county, and was sought by many clients over the years which he served in his native county. Hardwick is a very familiar name in Henry county, and one which was given a more permanent place in the minds of Henry countians because of Dr. William P. Hardwick's service in Headland, Alabama.

## DR. HOPE HULL CHRISTIAN

DR. HOPE HULL CHRISTIAN was born in Lumpkin, Georgia December 10, 1820. Young Christian attended the Philadelphia College of Medicine in Pennsylvania, and was graduated with a certificate in Medicines and Surgeons in 1850. Dr. Hope Hull Christian practiced for a short time in Blakley, Georgia before he came to Columbia across the Chattahoochee. Some

say he was one of the first to practice medicine in Henry County. Without doubt he was among the first to gain a formal education in his field and practice in the county.

Dr. Hope Hull Christian was the son of Reverend Gabriel and Harrison Blair Gilmer Christian. Dr. Christian married Angerona Marie Greene of Wilkes County, Georgia, and they had two children Tallilah Christian was married February 5, 1875 to Joel Porter. Julia Christian was married December 3, 1867 to William J. Porter.

Dr. Christian was married a second time to Susan Frances Stamper who was born December 29, 1839 in Texas. They were married December 1, 1858, and three children were born to this marriage. Manning Nicholas Christian was the first son who married Florrie Mullin April 13, 1887. This son had one child which was named Hope Hull Christian, but he died around 30 years later.

Walter Hope Hull Christian was a second child, born December 29, 1860, who lived until November 4, 1938. The third child was Mary Abda Christian who married Frank Koerber March 14, 1885. This couple had five children.

Frankie Otto Koerber married Atticus Mullin. Older people in the area will remember that Atticus Mullin wrote for THE MONTGOMERY ADVERTISER for years and years. In fact he was with them so long that he virtually became an institution within himself. He was a staff member who covered the capitol and politics in the state, and was known far and wide for his writing and the people whom he had written about and—in fact had a real acquaintance with and an established friendship with famous people of the state.

Atticus Mullin and Frankie had three daughters. Lucy Mullin married Charles Burrows. The latter marriage produced James Christian Burrows who married DeAnne Beach. Monica Hope Burrows was born to this couple.

Atticus Mullin's second child was Francis Mullin, who married Jack Jarred. His third daughter was Mary Mullin who never married.

The second child of Mary Abda Christian and Frank Koerber was named John who married Lou Craig the first time, but later was married to Myrtle Lefler. Olive Ruth Koerber married Bartow Bullard. This couple's child was Bartow Bullard Jr. who married, and had one child named Pamela Ruth Bullard.

The fourth child of Mary Abda Christian and Frank Koerber was Mary Hope, who married Frank Bryan. They had two sons; Walter Hope Bryan who married Catherine Sanders. They named their children

Frank Bryan III, William Kenneth Bryan, and Hope Christian Bryan. One may see how the name of old Dr. Christian was handed down through the family for several generations.

The last child of Mary Abda Christian and Frank Koerber was Carrie Loeb who married Bill Singletary. No children are listed for this couple.

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Dr. Hope Hull Christian made medical history in Henry county by being one of the first--if indeed not the first--to come to the county to establish a permanent practice. He also had an unusual name which was handed down from one generation to the next--Hope Hull. This makes us wonder if there might be some connection between the small village in Montgomery, which is named Hope Hull, and this early doctor who came to Henry County. Could one of his children have moved into this area--or the Mullin family--and given the place in Montgomery the unusual name of Hope Hull? An interesting speculation until we know more on the subject.

## DR. A. L. MARTIN

The REVEREND DR. A. L. MARTIN had a very unique and unusual professional experience, and meant much to the citizens of Henry County. He has been written about in many articles and in books containing information about Missionary Baptist activities, but very little attention has been devoted to the man and his family life.

Historians write that A. L. Martin was born in Oglethorpe County, Georgia which is near the town of Athens. He came into this world December 24, 1824 and was named for General Lafayette, who was on a tour of the United States about that time. He was the son of Williford and Melissa Dowden Martin. Williford Martin was from Scotland origin, but grew up in Oglethorpe County and died there in 1826. Melissa Dowden Martin was also a native of Oglethorpe County, GA, and had the best of school advantages, but she lived and died within about three miles of her place of birth.

A. L. Martin's mother probably had a very strong influence upon him as a lad for two very important reasons. First his father died when A. L. was young, and his mother was a very strong and determined person with excellent background in training and religious orientation. She was a devout Missionary Baptist and very active in the church until her death in 1880. She started her son on the road that she wished him to follow, but A. L. Martin left home at the age of seventeen to attempt the support of himself, and to get the education he desired. He was one of five children, and his mother had much to do to support the others.

A. L. Martin's first job was as an overseer of a plantation near Columbus, Georgia which began at a rather low level but increased as he gained experience. At the age of twenty-one he had saved enough money to devote some of his time to formal education. This was followed for two years, as he combined study with work, but he completed the required course work needed to enter medical school. This he did at Augusta, Georgia in 1846, and there he remained for two years before he was able to pass the medical examination required for granting the license to practice.

Dr. A. L. Martin opened his first medical office near where he had worked in the Columbus, Georgia area, but moved to Dale County, Alabama in 1850. In a very short time he made the transfer to his future home in Henry County, where he combined farming and medical practice, and by 1856 he had a good medical practice and a sound farming operation going some eight miles south of Abbeville.

For reasons known only to himself, Dr. Albert Lafayette Martin gave up his medical practice and entered the ministry of the Missionary Baptist Church, and continued in that profession for the remainder of his life. He did keep some farming interest, but did little or no further practice of medicine. He did turn his attention to merchandising by establishing a small store in 1865 which was located on his plantation, but later was moved to Abbeville. He continued in the mercantile business in Abbeville until 1883, and had a rather large and successful operation there when he retired from that line of business.

Rev. Dr. A. L. Martin was married to Elizabeth Mullin in 1848. She was the daughter of John and Parmelia Biggers Mullin. John came to America from Cork, Ireland with his parents when quite young. They settled in South Carolina, but later moved to Georgia where John became quite a successful farmer. John Mullin, the father of A. L. Martin's wife died in 1853, but in addition to his success as a farmer, he had been a very active Missionary Baptist member in his community. This influence may have had its effect upon Dr. A L. Martin to begin his work with the church. A strong feeling gained from his mother, combined with that of his wife and her father may have caused the decision.

Mrs. A. L. Martin grew up near Columbus, Georgia and was educated there. She and her husband had eight children. There was James H. Martin, Mary E. who married Dr. W. J. Lee who lived and practiced in Abbeville, Martha who died rather young, William J. Martin who lived in Abbeville. Then there was Elizabeth who married E. Saunders of Henry County; H. L. Martin

The Last Will and Testament of Allen Christian - made 18 July 1836. In the name of God Amen I Allen Christian, Senior, of Madison County Alabama, being of sound mind but feeble in body - conscious of the uncertainty of life, and not wishing to die intestate, do make and publish this as my last will and Testament to wit - I first give my body to the dust whence it came, and commend my soul to God who gave me existence, and as to my worldly effects, it is my Will that my debts be paid by my Executor herein after named. 1st I will and devise to my beloved wife Margaret the plantation on which I now live containing two hundred and forty acres, more or less - to hold possess and enjoy the same during her life time if she shall remain single after my death - Should she marry however then her interest insaid land to cease, and said land disposed of as herein after directed -In the same manner I give to my said wife all the farming utensils on this farm with all house hold and kitchen furniture and stock of every description and it is my will and desire that this farm shall be cultivated and my family remain together on it as heretofore for their comfortable support and maint nance, this provision however to cease as to any of my daughters as they may marry 2nd I give and bequeath to my said wife Margaret the seven bales of Cotton now on hand, and also the crop of corn, cotton, oats& now on hand and growing to be by her applied in her discretion to the support of her self and family remaining with her-- 3rd I give and bequeath unto my said wife during her widowhood or lifetime as the case may be the following negroes to wit James, Arch, Peter, Lige, Alfred, Westley, Judy Heannah, Josiah, and Sucy the younger: Said negroes to remain with my said wife for her own use and benefit as above mentioned. 4. I give to my son Allen one negro man named Harry - 5. I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth a negro girl named Mary about fifteen years old, and a negro child named said 6. I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah negro girl Eliza about sixteen years old and and a negro child named Ermine about a year old 7. 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# **GRANTS OF LAND BY PURCHASE**

The second "Act for Opening the Land Office," passed February 17, 1783, prescribed a method by which land in the nine original counties could be purchased. A free, white, married man, who was a master or head of a family could purchase up to 800 acres of land, on the basis of 50 acres for each member of his family or slave. His purchase was based on the number of heads in his family, including slaves, together with his own head-right of 200 acres, and could not exceed 1,000 acres, which was fixed as the maximum grant to any man. A bachelor owning as many as 16 slaves could purchase as much as 800 acres, upon their heads at 50 acres each. Between the date of the survey and the date of the grant he was required to cultivate and clear three out of each hundred acres.

The purchase price was fixed at one shilling per acre for the first 100 acres, one shilling six-pence per acre for the second 100 acres, two shillings per acre for the third hundred acres, and so on in the same progression. These prices shanged in later years under variously amended acts.

A man desiring a grant of land would apply for a WARRANT OF EURVEY to the Land Court composed of the Justices in the County. After such a warrant was issued, the County Surveyor would mark off the tract, record the plat of survey in his office, and return the warrant to the Land Court. If and when the Land Court was satisfied that all requirements of the law had been complied with, it would then forward the Warrant and the plat to the Surveyor-General and the Executive Offices of the state of Georgia, from which the grant would be issued, upon the payment of office fees. Caveats by dissatisfied claimants of the same land were provided for, as also were appeals from the decisions of the Land Courts.

When Franklin and Washington Counties were created by the Act of February 25, 1784, it was provided that any citizen of the United States could purchase land in those counties, at the rate of three shillings per acre, with a maximum holding of 1,000 acres by any one person. The technical procedure for granting this land was unchanged.

No information as to the county of the applicant's residence, or names of any members of his family appear on either the warrant for survey, the recorded plat of survey, or the recorded grant. Only the grantee's name appears in these records.

#### THE FIRST LAND LOTTERY - 1805

The first land lottery to be held in Georgia was authorized by an act of the Legislature dated May 11, 1803. Its aim was to distribute newly ceded lands to settlers on an equitable basis. The year of drawing was set up for 1805 and the State Surveyor General was authorized to divide the new lands into counties of Baldwin, Wayne, and Wilkinson. Sizes of the prize lots varied from 202½ acres in Baldwin and Wilkinson Counties, to 490 acres in Wayne. Grant fee for the smaller lots was \$8.10 per 202½ acre lot, and \$19.60 for the 490 acre lot.

The original enrollment was made through the Inferior Court of each county and the following stipulations were made on eligibility.

# PERSONS ENTITLED TO DRAW:

1 draw Bachelor, 21 years or over, one year resident in Georgia, citizen of U.S.

2 draws Married man with wife and/or child, one year resident in Georgia, citizen of U.S.

2 draws Widow with minor child, one year resident in Georgia

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1 draw

Minor orphan, or family of minor orphans with father dead and mother either dead or remarried.

The entire list of persons from every Georgia county whose names were entered on the eligibles roll now preserved in the Georgia Department of Archives and History, Atlanta, Georgia, was transcribed and alphabetized by Mrs. Virginia S. Wood, 230 Payson Road, Belmont, Mass. 02178. Her compilation of more than 25,000 names was published in 1964, and is for sale by the author for \$8.95 per copy, hardbound.

#### THE SECOND LAND LOTTERY - 1807

The second land lottery to be held in Georgia was authorized by an act of the Legislature of June 26, 1806, in which the officials of each county were to enroll all persons meeting the qualifications listed below and return the lists to the state for drawing which commenced in 1807. The object was to award land by lottery in the newly created counties of Baldwin and Wilkinson; size of the granted lots was 202½ acres each, with a grant fee of \$12.15 per lot.

In some cases copies of these original enrollments can be found in the records of the Clerk of Court of the particular county, for the Inferior Court of the county was empowered to draw up the list of names and draws to which the person was entitled.

ANY PERSON WHO HAD WON LAND IN THE PREVIOUS LAND LOTTERY (1805) WAS EXCLUDED FROM DRAWING.

The Surveyor General Department, Georgia Department of Archives and History, Atlanta, Ga. 30334 maintains the only known list of those persons who were WINNERS in this land lottery. They do NOT have the list of all those persons who were entitled to draw in the lottery. Where the county copies of lists of all those persons entitled to draw in the lottery have been microfilmed, these documents can be found in the microfilm collection of the Georgia Archives. By no means all the surviving lists of those persons eligible to draw in the 1807 Lottery have been microfilmed.

The two lists being published for Burke and Washington Counties were found as transcripts among the research papers of the late Mrs. Sarah Quinn Smith. She noted that they were copied "at the Office of the Secretary of State - Georgia" with no date given. The existence or location of these original manuscripts are today unknown.

# THE THIRD LAND LOTTERY - 1820

The Third Land Lottery of Georgia was authorized by two legislative acts of December 15, 1818 and December 21, 1819, respectively. Land in the following counties was to be awarded to fortunate drawers: Appling, Early, Gwinnett, Habersham, Hall, Irwin, Rabun, and Walton. Sizes of the prize lots varied with 490 acres awarded in Appling, part of Habersham, Irwin and part of Rabun Counties; and 250 acre lots in the remaining regions. Grant fee for either size was set at \$18.00 per land lot.

ANY PERSON WHO HAD BEEN A FORTUNATE DRAWER IN EITHER OF TWO PREVIOUS LAND LOTTERIES WAS EXCLUDED FROM ELIGIBILITY.

# **FOURTH LAND LOTTERY - 1821**

Authorized by an act of the Legislaturé passed May 15, 1821, to distribute lands in the counties of Dooly, Fayette, Henry, Houston, and Monroe. Grant fee set at \$19.00 for each land lot of 202½ acres.

ANY FORTUNATE DRAWER IN ANY PREVIOUS LAND LOTTERY WAS EXCLUDED FROM REGISTRATION.

#### THE FIFTH LAND LOTTERY 1827

Authorized by an act of the Legislature June 9, 1825, this lottery distributed land in the counties of Carroll, Coweta, Lee, Muscogee, and Troup. Land Lot Sizes in all these counties was set at 202½ acres, with a grant fee of \$18.00 per lot.

ANY PERSON WHO HAD BEEN A FORTUNATE DRAWER IN ANY PREVIOUS LAND LOTTERY WAS EXCLUDED FROM THE DRAWING.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Drawing for this land lottery was interrupted when the surveyors fell behind in lining off the properties disposed of by lottery. Results of the first half of this lottery have been reprinted by Martha Lou Houston in 1827 Land Lottery Reprint. Miss Houston abstracted names of

Revolutionary soldiers, widows and orphans who were fortunate drawers from the second half of the 1827 lottery and published this under the title 600 Revolutionary Soldiers Living in Georgia 1827-1828.

Exhaustive search by your editor has failed to discover a copy of names of those persons who were fortunate drawers in the second half of the 1827 Land Lottery. These lists were privately printed by the State Printer, Grantland and Orme, Milledgeville, Ga., and sold by subscription (\$3.00 the set). No copy of this compilation can be found in major Georgia libraries or the State Archives. The discovery of lists of fortunate drawers in the second half of the 1827 Land Lottery would be a major Georgia genealogical find!

# THE SIXTH LOTTERY 1832

Cherokee Land Lottery
Cherokee Gold Lottery

Authorized by acts of the Legislature Dec. 21, 1830, and Dec. 24, 1831, with the year for drawing set as 1832. Lands in Cass (Bartow), Cherokee, Cobb, Floyd, Forsyth, Gilmer, Lumpkin, Murray, Paulding, and Union Counties were awarded in this lottery under the then name of (original) Cherokee County. An act of Dec. 3, 1832 set up the 10 named counties out of this original county. Winners were awarded either 40 acre Gold Lots, or 160 acre Land Lots, and payed a fee of \$18.00 per lot for either.

PERSONS EXCLUDED FROM DRAWING: Any fortunate drawer in any previous land lottery who has taken out a grant of land; any person who mined, or caused to be mined gold or other metal in the Cherokee (Indian) Territory; any person who has taken up residence in said Cherokee Territory; any person who is a member of or concerned with "a horde of thieves known as the Pony Club."

LAND LOTTERY RECORDS — Several have asked why names which appear in the Burke and Washington County list of eligibles to draw in the 1807 Land Lottery are not found in the list of Fortunate Drawers for this lottery at the Georgia Archives.

The ONLY land lottery for which the State of Georgia retained copies of names of ALL PERSONS REGISTERED was that of 1805, and published by Virginia Wood.

All lotteries thereafter the state retained only a copy of the names of WINNERS, not all registrants. List of all registrants for a particular county, if they have survived, are generally found in the county's own records.

Published lists of WINNERS of the later land lotteries have been available, but they obviously do not include the names of most of the population who registered to be drawn.

The importance of the Eligibles lists is this — it forms an excellent substitute for a census record, in that it lists women, and orphan children. If you carefully study the rules for each lottery you can then interpret the meaning of notations following some names, filling in your genealogical gaps. The list of eligibles is more complete than a county's tax digest for the same year and furnishes family information not found in a tax digest.

THE 1805 GEORGIA LAND LOTTERY

from Louis Koenig

The 1805 Georgia Land Lottery seems especially prone to being misquoted. For instance, a book authored by Lucien Lamar Knight, Mtk State Historian of Georgia, has Revolutionary War soldiers entitled to 2 draws. In truth Revolutionary War soldiers were given no special status in the 1805 or the 1807 lottery. The present Georgia Surveyor General's Office reports: "Knight is suspect in many of the things he wrote even though he was the State Historian".

The author tative 1805 16 lottery, both the statute and the listing is published in: Wood, Virginia S. and Ralph P.V. Wood: 1805 Georgia Land Lottery (1964). Some of the data there differ from those given for Christian's in CFC III. 212, Jan. 1980. Abda Christian had one draw (not 2) and the entry for CFC's Davis M. Christian is: Christian, Barra M. David (orphan). Incidentally of the Christian draws two were fortunate, one of M. David and one of George. Mest important however: the criterion of one or two draws is not the "over or under 21" of CFC.

In the language of the statute as amended there is considerable ambiguity and laxity in logic. I have made a special study of the 1805 Lottery with the assistance of Coy. K Johnston. Attorney and genealogist known to CFC readers from his comprehensive articles. I will be glad to send a copy of the deliberations to any who supply a SASE. I am solely responsible for any errors that appear in the abstract presented here. The conclusions are based on both the legal and the practical factors, which are in some ways in contradiction to each other.

The information as to personal status that can be drawn

from from the listing is shown in the following table.

The status (widow, married, etc) must be as of a particular date for each entrant. That date is indefinite. The date most likely to be correct inxemetxemen for most entrants lies between about July 1803 and March 1804. IThe.

#### **INHERITANCE LAWS**

When a man dieD intestate, what rights would his children by a previous wife have to his estate, asks Mrs. S. Philip Cammack, 1424 E. Third St., Mesa, AZ 85203.

JOHN CHRISTIAN, SR., moved from Amherst Co., VA, to Franklin Co., GA, where he d. 1805. In 1810, ten receipts were signed saying legacies had been received by these heirs:

James Christian John Christian Robert B. Christian Reuben Christian Drury Christian Rufus Christian Gabriel Christian Abda Christian George Stovall William Oglesby.

In 1808, the legatees agreed that Abda, the administrator, should travel to Buckingham Co., VA, to sell land which John Christian, Sr., still owned there. The signers of this agreement were the same as above, except for James and John Christian and William Oglesby (he had not yet married John's dau.). Why didn't James and John sign the agreement?

"I think, but haven't proven, that John, Jr., may not have come to GA with his father, since he appears in Buckingham Co., VA, in censuses for 1810-30. He may have traveled to Elbert Co. specifically for the purpose of settling the estate."

Cannot find any evidence that there were two JAMES CHRISTIANs in the Franklin-Elbert-Madison Cos., GA, area 1804-25. One James Christian m. LUCY BRADLEY ca. 1780, probably in Buckingham Co., VA, and was executor of Lucy's father WILLIAM BRADLEY's will 1805 in Elbert Co., GA. This James, a Justice of the Peace, lived on Dove's Creek in Elbert Co., GA, as early as 1794, as did Reuben,

Robert B., and Rufus Christian, andd William Oglesby. If he were their brother, why didn't he sign the 1808 agreement?

Were James (b. ca. 1760-3) and John, Jr. (b. ca. 1765-70), sons of John Christian by an earlier wife? James seems to have been a little old to have been a son of John's widow MARY BRYANT, who was b. 1746. In 1808 the widow Mary petitioned the court for her dower right to 328 acres in Elbert Co. When she died in 1820, another legatees' agreement appointed Reuben Christian to make the division of the property. Abda had died in 1815. Again, neither James nor John, Jr., signed this agreement.

"One of my correspondents pointed out that eight of the ten receipts signed in 1810 contain the clause "the widow's part excepted in this receipt." The two which do not were those of James and John! Is this conclusive proof that Mary was not their mother? Or were they illegitimate sons?

Only a few receipts exist after 1820, but they are obviously incomplete as the distribution shown is ridiculously uneven. Also neither William Oglesby nor James Christian appear in these later receipts. So far, cannot find the final settlement of John, Sr.'s estate. Help!"

EDITOR'S NOTE: The eight children (or children's spouses) who signed the agreement excepting the widow's part were those who would later be entitled to inherit her dower portion after her death. The two who did not were not her children, though they had to have been the children of the decedent.

As was mentioned in the last issue of 1990, children of a common father all shared alike as long as they were legitimate! That they had different mothers was inconsequential. Not so children of a common mother with different fathers.

Mary's "thirds" would have been set off for her use and support. Her children shared that third after her death, but since the land was coming to them later, they received less than their half brothers in the initial distribution. Ultimately all children should have been equal recipients unless a child died in the interim leaving no offspring.

DAR Patriot Index, pages 130 & 196,

show Turner Christian born 13 July 1750 in VR and died 7 April 1832

in GA. Buried in Elbert County, near Dewy Rose, GA. Grave marked by DAR. He married 1st Anna Payne, dtr of George Payne, Jr. and Agatha George, on 3 Jan 1778. His second wife was reported to be Elizabeth Leak, md. 6 Oct 1788. (Ref: L.C.Christian, Atty of Houston, TX who referred to W&M Qtrly.) (Mrs. Grace Baccus of Slidell, LA also sent info indicating that Turner had a 2nd wife, and from our joint research by letter we have agreed he did. The 1820 census of Elbert Co. shows only one male in the household aged 45 and up. Then there are 5 females under 10, 2 from 10-15, and one from 26 to 44. Whether these are her children from a former marriage is not known. In any case Anna (b. 1753 or 1763) would have been over 45 in 1820.)

DAR papers of Mrs. Dora Allen Seymour (#245527) shows Turner Christian marrying Anna Payne in Goochland Co., VA in 1778. Their children were: Charles Woodson, b.1778 (married Nancy Ruff); William Payne, b. 1781(married Sarah or Mary Maxwell); Jesse George, b.1782. Her full line is shown as Wm. Payne Christian (1/17/1781-1861), md. 1807 to Sarah Maxwell (1/4/1786-1850); Turner Christian, son of Charles Christian, Jr. (died 1784 and will proved in Goochland Co., VA); Charles Christian, Sr.; and to Thomas Christian who patented land in Charles City County, VA abt 1687.

William Payne Christian named a son b. ca 1811 - Jesse George Christian. Jesse George Christian was the father of Mary Frances "Polly" Christian. ( This is my great grandmoths.)

The Jesse George Christian shown as rova 239 acres in 1813 in Elbert County in "Index to Headrights & Bounty Grants of GA" was obviously not the Jesse George born 1811.

For more info on the PAYNE family see VA Magazine of History & Biography for Jan 1899.

The CHRISTIAN family is covered in the W&M Qtrly IW5, et al.

Turner Christian is a certified REV War soldier. His father Charles (1715-ca.1784) is credited with Patriotic Service during the REV War also. And it is stated that his seven brothers all served in the REV War - William, Walter, George, Charles, John, Elijah, and Drury.(Ref:L.C.Christian of Houston -Pedigree chart + others.)

DAC Lineage Book, Vol.8 - Mrs. Alline Christian Graves Hill (#7270) shows Thomas Christian (b. 1650) patented 1080 acres of land in Charles City County, VA in 1687.

After the REV War British citizens were allowed to make claims for indebtedness of American citizens incurred before the war and never

paid. Charles Christian, Jr., Amherst Co., owed Henderson, McCall & Co. 66 pounds 10 1/2 shillings. They stated "His circumstances have of late been considered somewhat doubtful, but long since the peace he was very able to pay his debts." He also was reported to owe George Keppen & Co. the sum of 169 pounds 12 shillings.

The Index to Headrights & Bounty Grants in GA shows Turner Christian roys 653 acres in 1799. Book CCCCC, p.175..

Turner Christian mentioned in VA Rev. Soldiers, Vol 8.; Joseph Habersham Chap. DAR, Vol.2, p.360; W&M Qtrly Vol.15, p.122; Rev. Roster of VA; and Knight's GA Roster of the Rev.

His name also appears in certified list of REV War soldiers compiled by B.F.Johnson, Chief Clerk in office of GA Sec of State. Published as Appendix B in 57th Congress, 2nd Session, pages 326-350. List also published as Appendix E to 3rd report to National Society DAR.

It is therefore ordered by the Court that Marian M Christian the Administrator be and he is hereby authorized to sell all the lands belonging to the Estate of Turner H Christian Deceased.

This 9th day of August 1858.

NOTE: As written in the book it appeared to be 1838, however every 3 had a little (-) after it. If Marian M Christian was the son of our Turner by his 2nd wife then he would have been born between 1820 and 1825 according to the 1830 census which lists one male between the ages of 5 - 10 and one between 70 - 80. If this is Marian then he would not have been of age in 1838 to act as Administrator of an estate. But in 1858 he would have been between 33 and 38.

Estates were notoriously long in being settled so it is feasible that this estate was still active in 1858 - some 26 years after the reported death of Turner Christian in 1832.

The other question is: Is Turner Christian the same person as Turner H. Christian?

"William Steward of Monroe Co., Ga., aged 69 years and 10 months, was drafted in Amherst Co., Va. in the fall of 1778, at which time he had just reached 16 years of age. He entered the militia under Capt. Pamplin, Col. David Saines at Amherst C. H. was appointed issueing Commissary of Shirts and provisions; then Sergt. for six months; then was again drafted into CAPT. JOHN CHRISTIAN'S CO. OF MILITIA, COL VANCE'S , REGT. and later made Sergt in same Co..... (He lived several years in Amherst County after the Rev., then moved to Oglethorpe Co., Ga where he lived many years, then went to Monroe Co., Ga. and he proves his service by his neighbor GABRIEL CHRISTIAN, AS HE WAS UNDER HIS FATHER COL. JOHN CHRIS-TIAN."

The title of Col. may have been acquired in the war of 1812, as he was called 'Capt. John Christian' of Amherst Co. in 1783. (see Virginia Census, heads of Families. 1783, page 48, near bottom of last row.) A history of Amherst Co. will probably give his complete record.

After the Rev. John moved to Georgia and died 1820, (here the date is not crossed out) in Franklin County, Ga. intestate. In the division of his estate, 6 Jan. 1821—WILL BOOK DD—his wife is named Marvand his sons ABDA; RUFUS; GABRIEL; ROBERT B.; DRURY AND REUBEN AND SONS—IN—LAW, GEO. STOVALL (Nancy's husband) and WIŁLIAM OGLESBY (Mary's husband).

Drury died 1825, leaving Frances with her own two little ones plus small step children. In 1827 she married James Ramsey and about the time of the 1832 Cherokee land lottery they hed moved to Murray Co., Ga., as did most of the other children and their families. Murray County was created from part of Cherokee County and Cherokee County was created 21 Dec. 1830. It was about 16 times the size of the County of Cherokee today. So they could have been in Cherokee County also, depending upon the time they actually moved into that area.

Studying several times on Christians and allied families, I do believe those in Elbert descend from the Goochland Co., Va. family. Wife unknown.

McIntosh lists 7 sons; some reference on every name mentioned has been found in this area, if not in Elbert.

Somehow, I believe you descend from a brother of Turner -- not from him.

I list the other sons of Charles of Goochland in case you do not have them:

William, Walter, George, John, Elijah

All names except Walter occur often.

I have not found the name of Leak in this area.

A 1795 voter list on Elbert has been made. Turner Christian was not om it, making me feel that he probably did come A alone, went back and got that big family which could have included relatives as well as wife and children. The last Land Court entry 1798, but he had asked land in 1796.

Your Elizabeth of marriageable age in 1811, you say. Consider dates carefully when doing further research.

DAR Vol. III Has abstracts of wills through to 1830. Then indexes those in book covering 1829-1860. R No Crastian wills found.

A widow Mary is No. 160 in 1830 census Elbert -- My index: Also Turner is No. 142. Index has no further information, however. Can be supplied for fee from Washington.

Remember the John who was Rev. S. wife's name was Mary.

Neither appears in 1840 census of Elbert.

Remember censuses of Georgia for 1790, 1800 and 1810 were burned in the War of 1812 in Washington, D. C.

By 1820 there were a number of Christians in Elbert, but the index gives only head of family--no ages, etc. Films would have to be read for such and it is usually not much help.

Some listed in this census might be sons of others than Turner as he had older brothers.

No research has been done on these lines as you specified Turner.

I find no evidnece from census indexes available that would be of any help to you.

I have studied all carefully.

### THICKNET

Turner is listed in 1820 and so is William P, his son. Ira is not.

Ira is not. Ira is listed in 1830, along with others never identified in anyway with Turner; Turner and William P. are also in 1830 index.

1840 index has only Ira. Ira was really Ira Jackson Christian and had a son Ira J. Christian. I have run up on deeds of land he had bought in doing research on some properties in Elberton.

In large libraries you may find films to read, but they are not here. I wish I could help you more.

By 1850, when members of families are given, none could be sons of Turner because of ages listed.

There is just one old enough: Charles W. Christian

He is easily identified as born in Goochland Co., Va., 3rd generation according to McIntosh.

He is brother of Turner-not son.

No other facts can I find that would help you in the least.

This 1,200-acre plantation, or at least PART of it, is still owned by members of the Christian family.

My line of descent is as follows: 1, Thomas Christian; 2, Charles Christian; 5, Charles Christian; 4, Elijah Christian; 5, Elijah Willis Christian; 6, Obed Mast Christian.

I learned of you from Mrs. Linnie Mae Archer, of Houston, who recently called on me in an effort to straighten out her ancestry. I know, during their latter years, both Captain William and Captain Pat Christian and their wives. We were of the same family, and so are the Hutcheson and Taliaferro families also.

In the Land Lottery of 1806, Capt. Thomas Oliver's District, I find that William P. Christian has 2 draws. No mention is made of any Military Service.

In the Land Lottery 1821 Major Chas. W. Christian's Batt. 152 Capt. Rufus Christian's District No. 202 I find Ira Christian's 1 draw; Same Batt. Capt. Benjamin's District I find 1 draw for Elijah D. Christian and 2 draws for William P. Christian.

In the book of Land Court Records 1791-1822, I find Oct 1, 1810 Wm. Christian, self and five children of his family.

In the Gold Lottery of 1832 Capt. Rowland's District I find George W. Christian I draw and Jesse G. Christian I draw. This indicates that they were both single. Matried men were entitled to two draws.

Thomas Maxwell Sr. left a will dated Dec. 27, 1833, probated January Term, 1838, in which he named Sarah Christian as one of his children.

Pearlman and Brooke, CFC XII, 1105, Jul 1988 list the children of John and Mary, a list including 3 children not legatees of 6 Jan 1821.. i.e. of Mary. These are Abda, Elizabeth and John Harvey Christian.

Betsy claims, and I concur, that John Harvey Christian was not a son of John and Mary since his appearance on the VA tax lists of 1783 and 1785 require a birth before 1762 while none of the other listed children were born before 1770, all being in the 1770-1790 period. I can't accept an 8 year childless gap.

I have no evidence for or against Elizabeth as a child except the absence from the legatees of 1821.

As for Abda I have only 5 documentations for his existence in Franklin as will be shown in the following chronological listing of my data bearing on the guestion. None of them have him as a child or legatee of John & Mary.

17 Dec 1796 Barnabas Pace and Agnes his wife to John Christian of Amherst County VA, 287 1/2 acres on Gorham's Fork of Broad River in Franklin granted to John Gorham 15 Nov 1785.

19 Nov 1801 A wife relinquished her dower for lands on Neal's Creek before John Christian, J. P.

Fall 1803 [probably] John Christian appraised estate of Elijah.

1805 lottery Abda Christian. [bachelor 21 or over] resident of Franklin drew blank. [Registration was in 1804.]

1805 lottery John Christian, resident of Franklin, married with wife or child, at least 1 year in GA..drew blank. [Registration was in 1804]

12 Feb 1805 Abda appointed admnr of the estate of John Christian, dec'd.

- 12 Feb 1805 Nancy of lawful age chose Robert Christian as her guardian.
- 12 Feb 1805 Rufus, a minor older than 14 chose Reuben Christian as his guardian.
- 25 Feb 1805 Estate of John Christian appraised by William Spears, Wm.Christian, Charles Connally. Much property and 19 slaves. [I do not have the appraisal itself.]
- 5 Apr 1805 John Christian purchaser at Elijah estate sale.
- 2 May 1808 William Christian appointed admnr of estate of John Christian.
- 3 May 1808 Abda Christian was paid for publishing nine? monthly notices in the Washington Gazette to sell part of the real estate of John Christian, dec'd.
- 14 May 1808 John Christian estate appraised by Silas NcGrady, Burnett Ware, Bartholomew Lawrence. [I do not have the appraisal itself.]
- 18 May 1808 Report by William Christian, admnr, of the sale thereof a small amount of miscellaneous items totaling \$145.45.
- 5 Mar 1810 Return on estate of John Christian made and originals and receipts returned to Abda.
- March term 1812 Bill by William Christian, admnr of John Christian, for expenses including appraisal and sale and "going to Jackson [County] to the property and measuring of corn".
- 10 Jun 1812 A deed for land on Hunter's Creek witnessed by John Christian.
- 22 Oct 1812 Madison County, recorded in Franklin 30 May 1821. Edmon Taylor sells Charles H. Christian 300 acres in Franklin on Broad River being part of 2000 acres granted John Henson and Deeded to said Taylor.
- 14 Oct 1815 "The widow Christian" cited as an adjoiner for lands on Nail's Creek.
- 22 Jun 1820 Joseph \_\_\_\_ paid for making coffin for Mary
- Sep term 1820 Reuben Christian, admnr, estate of Mary Christian.
- 14 Oct 1820 Inventory of estate of Mary Christian. \$1673.75 and 7 slaves. Land not appraised.

- 6 Jan 1821 Agreement of legatees of John and Mary Christian , Franklin. Legatees: Reuben, Drewery, Gabriel, Rufus, R.B. Christian, William Oglesby and George Stovall. Wit: John Includes the 140 acres Elbert (went to Rufus) and the 109 and 31 acres Franklin (went to George Stovall)..
- 5 Mar 1821 John C. Christian, admnr estate of Mary Christian
- Charles Louis Gecurd? given leave to sell the negroes no date. belonging to the estate of Mary Christian, minor.
- Susanah Taylor of Jackson County sells to John 5 Mar 1821 Connely of Franklin 300 acres in Franklin adjoining John Connely dec'd.
- There was recorded they 22,0ct 1812 sale q.v. by 30 May 1821 Edmon Taylor to Charles H. Christian of land on Broad River.
- 16 Sep 1821 Robert Kennedy paid by Reuben Christian administrator for surveying for the estate of Mary Christian, Christian decid.
- I assume that the 1796 purchaser of Amherst County VA the John of "John and Mary" or possibly "the other John"..allowing for the possibility of 2 Johns.

One of the hypothetical Johns was a J. P. by 19 Nov This J. P.-ship fits well enough with a John who was a resident since 1796, but I am uneasy that it can be a John Christian who with his wife Mary Bryant was selling their lands in Amherst and Powhattan in 1799. This assumes that they were selling lands that they lived on or worked in Amherst possibly in preparation for a move to Franklin. If that were so they would have been in Franklin for less than 2 years and that seems rather short to be appointed as a J. P. Maybe they had already moved to Franklin and were merely selling the lands they left behind in Amherst.

A John was well enough established to be an appraiser for the estate of Elijah in the fall of 1803.

Only one of the hypothetical two Johns entered the 1805 lottery for which the registration occurred in 1804. We have no evidence that any other John registered. The John who registered was married, with wife or child, and resident of GA at least one year.

On 12 Feb 1805 Abda was appointed as admnr of the estate of John Christian dec'd, and on the same day clearly part of the same action Nancy chose Robert Christian as her guardian, and Rufus chose Reuben Christian as his guardian. These four fit with the legatee list of Mary in  $182\bar{1}$  and clearly are the children of John and Mary. Conclusion: John of John and Mary had died about Jan. 1805. Nancy and Reuben were between 14 and

20 years old, that is born 1785-1791. Robert and Reuben were 21 or older that is born before 1785.

Thirteen days later on 25 Feb 1805 the estate of a John Christian was appraised showing much property and 19 slaves, a quite substantial estate, clearly the John of John and Mary.

But on 5 Apr 1805 a John Christian was a purchaser at the estate sale for Elijah Christian. This was certainly not the John dec'd of John and Mary. It must have been <u>another</u> John old enough to purchase.

Three years later on 2 May 1808 William Christian was appointed admnr of the estate of a John Christian. The estate was appraised 14 May 1808 and was quite small: a small amount of miscellaneous items totaling \$145.45, and the sale was reported by the admnr William 18 May 1808 four days later.

It is possible that this John dec'd about Apr 1808 was the purchaser of 5 Apr 1805. But not necessarily for there are still other John Christians to come-

The next day, 3 May 1808 Abda Christian was paid for publishing nine? monthly notices in the Washington Gazette to sell part of the real estate of John Christian, dec'd.

5 May 1810 Abda Christian, admnr of the estate of John Christian (of the John and Mary) made return on the estate and the original and receipts were returned to Abda. That was 5 years after Abda had been appointed admnr on 12 Feb 1805. Puzzling and significant for this inquiry is this 5 year delay. I do not have the actual return itself and maybe that the original and receipts were returned to Abda precludes finding them in the record books.

DESPITE THIS PUZZLEMENT I DO NOT BELIEVE THESE TWO ESTATES WERE FOR THE SAME JOHN. The 1808 John William admnr had only a small estate \$145.45, while the 1805 John Abda admnr had much property and 19 slaves. [I did not record the full inventories in either case.] Furthermore as will be seen the estate of John and Mary at Mary's death was still substantial, \$1673.75 and 7 slaves plus 140, 109, and 31 acres of land. The John and Mary estate was apparently not distributed on the death of John but retained intact for the legatees of Mary.

March term 1812 William Christian, admnr of the estate of the John-not-Mary, presented a bill for expenses including "going to Jackson [County] to the property and measuring corn." This indicates that the John-not-Mary had a going plantation in Jackson County.

10 Jun 1812 a deed for land on Hunter's Creek was witnessed by a John Christian, certainly neither of the two dec'd Johns.

There was a "widow Christian" owning property on Nail's Creek cited as an adjoiner 14 Oct 1815. This could be Mary widow of John or the widow of the John-not-Mary pair.

Mary the known widow died about June 1820 as her coffin was paid for on 22 June 1820 and Reuben Christian her son was appointed admnr Sep term 1820. Her inventory was taken 14 Oct 1820 \$1673.75 and 7 slaves, legatees being Reuben, Drewery, Gabriel, Rufus, R.B. Christian and William Oglesby and George Stovall [both sons-in-law].

Reuben Christian MAY have withdrawn as admnr, for John C. Christian was appoint admnr of the estate of Mary Christian, dec'd. 5 Mar 1821. However it is more likely that John C. Christian was admnr for the estate of the Mary Christian — minor from which Charles Louis Gecurd? sold negroes. THIS IS ANOTHER JOHN, HERE JOHN C. CHRISTIAN WHO MUST BE ACCOUNTED FOR IN THE MESS. It is likely that he is not a son since he does not appear as a legatee.

On the same day, 5 Mar 1821, Susannah Taylor of <u>Jackson County</u> sold John Connely of Franklin 300 acres in Franklin adjoining John Connely dec'd. And on 30 May 1821 there was recorded in Franklin a deed dated 22 Oct 1812 by Edmon Taylor to Charles H. Christian for 300 acres in Franklin on Broad River. I include this because here in the spring of 1821 the estate of Mary Christian was being closed out... and on the same day Susannah Taylor of Jackson sold land in Franklin and 3 months later Edmund Taylor saw fit to record an 1812 transaction. This looks as if Susannah and Edmund were involved in the John-and Mary estate settlement.

My deduction:

THIS JACKSON CONNECTION TIES IN WITH THE PLANTATION IN JACKSON IN THE ESTATE OF JOHN-NOT-MARY BILLED BY THE ADMNR WILLIAM CHRISTIAN as follows:

Pearlman & Brooke have a supposed daughter of John-and Mary, an Elizabeth "thought to have married and Edmund Taylor." The foregoing reasoning would have a Susannah, m. Edmund Taylor, as a dau. of the John-not-Mary, living in Jackson County, possibly on the plantation of her father's. On the other hand Edmund Taylor was a distributee of the estate of John-and-Mary so possibly there was a dau. of John-and-Mary who m. Edmund Taylor. UNSETTLED and confusing as hell!

I now propose for your consideration two Johns in Franklin, the John-and Mary, dec'd 1805, Mary dec'd 1820, Reuber admnr and the John-not-Mary dec'd 1808, William admnr. The John-and-Mary had children listed as legatees.

These did not include an Abda which makes me uneasy about assigning him as a son.

The John-not-Mary may have had a son William who was his admnr, but William the admnr may have been another William who is well represented in the data as a Franklin J.P. He may also have had a daw. Elizabeth who m. Edmund Taylor and lived in Jackson County.

In addition to these there remain one or two unidentified John Christians and one John C. Christian who I presume was the admnr of the Mary Christian — minor. John C. is unlikely to be a son of John-and-Mary since he is not a legatee, but he might be a grandson... I haven't researched that. Or, more likely John C. Christian was a brother of the dec'd minor Mary and maybe both children of the John-not-Mary. WHAT A MESS!

My hopes ran high today when I saw the will of Reuben Christian mentiond Elijah W. I was surprised to see him named as his "son-in-law" so asked to see the original will, and it made the same statement.

After making a study of the deeds, I did not feel so optimistic. This Elijah W. is making deeds too young for yours who was born 1813.

The first hristian deed recorded in Newton County is that of Reuben in 1824. He states that he is "of "lbert Co." He witnesses the first deed which Elijah W. makes in 1827. Elijah appears in 1827 and

disappears in 1841. I think I shall search the 1840 census just to be doubly sure. What is your reaction? Could there possibly be a mistake about the birth date of your Elijah W.

Fee: Search of Newton Co.

The Ordinary, of Newton County read the original will of Reuben Christian and he thought that Elijah W. must have been a son, rather than a sonin-law of Reuben.

I hope you don't think that I am sending a lot of brrevelant data, but I just want you to know howhard I TRIED.

#### CHRISTIAN

This is a family of Scandinavian origin and had attained great eminence at a very early date. They were deemsters or judges in the Isle of Man as early as 1408 and as such succeeded one another several centuries embracing many generations. The name was formerly Mac Cristen then Cristen, and finally about the year 1600 it was changed to its present form by Eman Mac Cristen, who died in 1605 when only 26 years old, was made deemster and held the office 51 years. He was also Deputy Governor of Peel Castle and the most influential man in the island. Early in the 17th century some of the descendants of

this ancient family immigrated to Va., acquired large bodies of land, and entered vigorously into the development of the new country.

Gen. 1. In 1694 Thomas Christian, Sr., obtained a patent for 1,000 acres south of Chickihominy Swamp. As "Mr. Thomas Christian, Sr.," he patented 1,080 acres in Charles City Co., Va., on Oct. 21, 1687. The term "Mr." accorded to an immigrant is indicative of social standing.

1891. Her residence is given as Tugalo, Georgia. In this application she states her husband enlisted in Company C. Phillips Legion on April 28, 1863. "On or about the 1st of June 1864, he was captured at the 'Cold Harbor,' 'Gaines Mill' or the Frazier's Farm battles, don't know which one, and taken to prison by the Federals at Point Lookout, Maryland, and from there he was on or about the 1st of July 1864, removed to Elmira, New York, and while being removed was killed by a collision of the trains while on his way from one prison to another, and a prisoner." She became his wife on December 22, 1848.

Witnesses on the 1891 widow's application, S. BOBO,
THOMAS COLLINS and J. R. BROCK, give this description of G.
T. SMALLEY's death: "While begin removed as a prisoner from
Point Lookout, Maryland, to Elmira, New York, by the Federals,
was killed by a collision of 2 trains between New York City
and Elmira, New York. A piece or fragment of timber passing
through his bowels from one side entirely through to the
other." All the above witnesses were fellow prisoners with him
at the time "and know that he was killed in the above described way and manner, and being prisoners did not know the name
of the exact place except as to the state."

The 1902 widow's application states LAURA A. SMALLEY "has resided in the State continuously since 1834," and gives her address as Toccoa, Georgia. In 1906, she moved to Stephens County, Georgia.

A memorial marker in the Woodlawn Cemetery, Elmira, New York, has the following inscription:

"Erected by the United States to mark the burial place of forty-nine Confederate soldiers who, while prisoners of war, were killed in a railroad accident near Shohola, Pennsylvania, and whose remains were there buried, but subsequently removed to this Cemetery, where the individual graves can not now be identified." Among those names listed on this marker is:

"G. C. SMATLEY, Company C, Georgia Legion"

ENOCH S. STRICKLAND was a private in Company E (sometimes designated as Company F), 1st Regiment, Georgia Cavalry. He enlisted at Carrollton, Georgia, on March 21, 1862. He was paid "40¢ per day for use of horse, arms, etc.," and is listed as "present" on Company Muster Rolls from March, 1862, to November and December, 1863, when he is listed as "On Detached Duty." The last available Company Muster Roll, dated November and

December 1864, lists him as "Detached in Government Shop."

The personal paper in E. S. STRICKLAND's file is a petition signed by 22 residents of Fairburn, Georgia, dated June to 29, 1863. The petition is as follows:

"We the undersigned do hereby certify that B. S. STRICK-LAND, a private in Co. E 1st Georgia Cavalry, is a Blacksmith by trade and a very fair workman. We would therefore recom- and mend him to the proper authorities as such, and would be pleased for said authorities to transfer him from the regular service, and let him have the priviledge of following his trade in some one of the Government Shops, believing that he will be able to render general satisfaction to the Government and be (Signed) better satisfied himself.

The Ballengers enter this Bible record through the marriage of John Martin White, son of Jeremiah, Sr. and Mary Martin White, to Milly Ballenger b.2-14-1758, dau. of Joseph and Sarah Ballenger.

Eppy White, son of John Martin, married neighbor Catherine Herndon in 1815.

The Bible places the death of Jeremiah White, Sr., father of John Martin White as Oct. 25, 1776 "being 81 years olde." Mary Martin White died Sept. 23, 1796, "being 91 years olde." Jeremiah White, Jr., brother of John Martin, died May 1st, 1788, "being 60 years old"

Albert Crayton White who owned the White Bible was buried in the John Martin White cemetery near Eagle Grove School, Hart Co., GA, on land belonging to Mr. Vandiver Gaines. Crayton died 6-16-1941 according to his tombstone.

This Bible record does NOT follow the marriage or descent from Jeremiah White, Jr. and only his death date was included with no location given.








of precinct No. 3, McLennan county, was born in January 18, 1828, the second of five children of John and Sarah (Bishop) Christian. The father, a farmer by occupation, was of Irish origin, and died about the year 1732. The mother was married in 1842, to James Hughes; but the union proved to be an unhappy one, and she found a comfortable home with her son, John Christian, until the time of her death, which occurred in the spring of 1890, in Florida

Our subject was thus deprived of his parents' early training, and was put under the care of his uncle, Louis Bishop, and grew to manhood as a farmer boy, working on his uncle's farm in the summer, and attending school in the winter. in the autumn of 1862, he enlisted in the Confederate service, in Company F., Eighteenth Louisiana Infantry, and served until the surrender, after which he came to Texas, arriving in the village of Waco in the fall of 1867. A short time afterward Mr. Christian moved to what is known as the Jim Waller farm, next to the Miller farm, and later to where his comfortable house now stands. He first bought 150 acres of land, to which he has since added until he now owns 388 acres, a good story-and-a-half house, 16 x 37 feet, with a large brick chimney. He now owns and operates about 400 acres of fertile agricultural land.

Mr. Christian married Miss Emily S. Daniels, a native of Alabama, and the third of eight children born to Ephraim and Mariah Daniels. The father came to Texas in 1866, and lived an unsettled life until the time of his death in 1868. Mrs. Christian died in the fall of 1873, leaving seven children, viz.: Sarah M., at home; Stephen, a resident of West; John E., who

married Miss Gross, and lives at the home place; Tranquilla, wife of J. D. Long, of Geneva; Mackinns T., at home; Mathew C., who married Miss Amelia Millet; and Isisa, at home. Mr. Christian was again married in 1876, to Miss Mary Holland, and they have had no children. Mr. Christian is a Democrat in his political views, has been a member of the School Board of Trustees two terms, is well and favorably known throughout the county, and is regarded as a good neighbor and Christian gentleman. He has reared a large and intelligent family, has given each a fair education, is a lover of good laws, and is a man whose word is as good as his bond. Both he and his wife are members of the First Buptist Church of Geneva.



OBERT A. OAKES.—This gentleman is one of the well-to-do and influential farmers of Falls county, Texas. That a sketch of his life and ancestry should be given a place in this volume is eminently fitting.

Charles Oakes, his father, was born in Virginia, in 1795, and died in Texas, in 1847. When a young man he moved from Virginia to Tennessee, and was there married. In 1845, he came to this State and located in Robertson county; thence to that part of Robertson county which afterward became Falls county. He was a man of good education, and was financially self-made, being one of the successful farmers of his day. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity and of the Baptist Church. He was married, in 1822, to Susan Neal, who was born in Tennessee, in 1801. To them were born nine children, namely: Elizabeth, widow of Samuel Barnes, is a resident of Bosque county, Texas. Mr. Barnes was a prominent and wealthy stockman. Fredonia and her husband, D. Barton, are both deceased. Mr. Barton was engaged in the stock business in Limestone county. William E., the third born, is deceased. He was a farmer in Falls county. He enlisted in the Union army, in 1863, and raised a comside, and fell within five steps of the works. He remained on the battle-field twenty-four hours, and was then captured and taken to Camp Chase, Ohio, and in February, 1865, was paroled and sent to Richmond. Near the close of the war a party of militia attacked his father's house and attempted to take his life, the daughter seized a corn knife, killed one of the band and wounded another. After this the father and daughter removed to Jerseyville, Illinois, and after his discharge our subject went to that city and engaged in teaching. After his marriage Mr. Bedichek taught school in Jersey county, Illinois, but later returned to Johnson county, Missouri, where he engaged in the furniture business and in teaching school. He afterward taught four years in Wauzeka, Wisconsin, a number of years in Monona, Clermont and Postville, Iowa, and in 1884 he came to Falls county, Texas, locating at Blevins, where he taught school four years. In 1885 he erected a story and a half school building at that place; in 1888 he removed to Mooresville, Falls county. In 1890 Mr. Bedichek purchased the Eddy Literary and Scientific Institute, where Mrs. Bedichek is engaged as Principal, and their daughter is also a teacher in this school. He was appointed County Superintendent of Schools of Falls county September 1, 1890, having filled an unexpired term until November 12, same year, when he was elected to that office.

Mr. Bedichek was married at Newmansville, Cass county, Illinois, March 11, 1872, to Lucretia Craven, a native of Maryland, but who was reared in Illinois, and educated at the State Normal School of that State. She is a daughter of Samuel and Harriet (Trundle) Craven, the father a native of Virginia, and the mother of Maryland. In 1849 the parents removed to Cass county, Illinois, where the father died in 1885, and the mother in 1868. Mr. and Mrs. Bedichek have four children: Ena, a graduate of the Huntsville (Texas) institute, and is now teaching in the college at Eddy; Ina, Roy and Una, attending school at Eddy. Our subject has taken an active interest in politics, voting

with the Democratic party. He was instrumental in securing the mail route at Blevins, and has taken part in everything for the good of Falls county. He is a member of the Baptist Church, and his wife affiliatas with the Christian Church.

He has developed a system of teaching, combining the educational and commercial idea, serving as a natural stimulus to study, which has received high commendation from Hon. William T. Harris, United States Commissioner of Education, the Minister of Education in Switzerland and others. In connection with this system he has invented a psychological chart, which has attracted much attention among psychologists and others.



RESTON R. CHRISTIAN, one of the representative farmers of McLennan county, is a son of Thomas E. and Mary A. (Doughty) Christian. The father, a farmer by occupation, was born in Cocke county, Tennessee, in 1799, and was a member of the Baptist Church. The paternal grandfather, Anthony Christian, was a native of Virginia, and his father a native of England, was killed by the Indians while attending to his stock. The maternal grandfather, Benjamin Doughty, was a native of Tennessee. The mother of our subject was born in 1802. The parents were married in 1819, in Tennessee, and had twelve children, namely: Preston R., our subject; Anthony, of Nishnabotna, Missouri; Thomas, who was killed during the war; Elizabeth, widow of Samson Doughty, of Colorado; Phinas, deceased; James II., of Tokio, Missouri; Ephraim, deceased; Louis, of Rockport, Missouri; Robert E., a resident of Nishnabotna; Julia, wife of James Tate, of Rockport, Missouri; William H., of Bartlesville, Indian Territory; and Percilla, deceased in infancy. In 1851 the family removed to Atchison county, Missouri, where the father died in 1875, and the mother in 1878.

Preston R. Christian was born in Cocke

county, Tennessee, August 27, 1820, and at the age of twenty-three years went to Buchanan county, Missouri, where he farmed three years. He then removed to Atchison county, Missouri, where he remained until the breaking out of the late war, and then purchased a farm in Nebraska, joining the city limits of Nebraska city. He afterward returned to his farm in Missouri, and three years later came to McLennan county, Texas, and bought his present farm of 364 acres. sixteen miles east of Waco. Mr. Christian enlisted in the Mexican war, and went to Fort Leavenworth, but was soon discharged. Politically he is a Democrat, and socially, a member of the 1. O. O. F.

He was married in 1845 to Pereilla Boydston, and they had two children: Mary A. and Elizabeth, both now deceased. The wife and mother died in 1849, and in 1851 the father married Mrs. Jane Stone, and they had three children: Thomas W.; Julia, now Mrs. James Walden; and Emma, wife of John Walden. Mrs. Christian died in 1871, and in 1875 he married Maggie Hill, and they are the parents of seven children, viz.: Joseph P., Lillie F., Lorena, Robert E., Maggie, Allie Myrtle and a babe. Mrs. Christian is a member of the Baptist Church.



S. CONOLY, planter, one of the prominent and enterprising citizens of Marlin, Falls county, is a native of Gile county, Tennessee, born August 2, 1847, the third son and sixth child of the thirteen children of Archibald and Mary (Price) Conoly. The parents were natives of Tennessee, where they were reared and married. Mr. Conoly was a shoemaker and farmer by trade, and followed both pursuits until his health failed him, and in the winter of 1859 came to Texas and located in Marlin, where his son, J. S. Conoly, had located in 1856. Here, in 1860, he selected a tract of land, opened a farm, and here resided the remainder of his days, dying in 1863 at the age of about sixty-eight years. The mother died in 1867 at the age of nearly fifty years. Of the children, ten lived to be grown, and three are still living: C. C., a resident of San Antonio; Lilian is the wife of A. C. Prendergast, of Waco. The parents were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was a member of the A. F. & A. M.

Our subject was twelve years old when he came with his parents to Falls county, where he was reared to agricultural pursuits and received a school education. After the death of his father he resided with his mother until her death, at the age of about sixteen years he went to work as clerk for his brother, J. S., until his marriage, which occurred October 26, 1870, to Miss Mary J. Keesee, a native of Arkansas, a daughter of William and Mary (Bennett) Keesee, who came to Texas in 1550, and located in Robinson county until 1856, when he came to Falls county. Mr. Keesee followed farming until his death, which occurred June 27, 1861. They were the parents of four children: Mary J., born July 11, 1849, the wife of our subject; Milton, born September 7, 1853, and died November 12, 1878; Lucy E., born September 20, 1855, the widow of John R. Dickenson; and Henry B., born March 3, 1858, of Corsicana Mrs. Keesee died October 24, 1867. They were members of the Presbyterian Church, and Mr. Keesee was a member of the A. F. & A. M.

After his marriage Mr. Conoly superintended his brother's farm for one year, then settled on a farm in the Brazos bottom, given his wife by her grandfather, Col. Henry Bennett, which he opened up and put in a high state of cultivation. The tract contained 640 acres. He has since followed planting and the stock-business. He now has a farm of 1,400 acres, 700 in a high state of cultivation.

In 1875 he was elected to the office of Sheriff of Falls county on the Democratic ticket, serving two and a half years. He was elected to the office of County Commissioner in 1881 for two years; he is also serving as School Trustee. He is a member of the A. F. & A. M., Reagan Lodge, No. 452, a member of the Knights of

OCKANDER, a prominent street-railway and street-paving contractor of Waco, Texas, and a progressive and publicspirited citizen, was born in Sweden, in 1839, and is the oldest of three living children. He was educated in Germany, completing a prescribed course. He served in the Swedish army two years. He was afterward engaged in merchandising in Lubeck, Germany, for eight years, from which business he reaped a good profit. Being, however, of an adventurous and ambitions disposition, he decided to try his fortunes in the United States, the Mecca at that time of all dissatisfied people. Accordingly, in 1877, he emigrated to this country, settling in Fort Worth, Texas. He there engaged in street railway construction on contract, building twentyfive miles of track in that city. From there Mr. Ockander removed to Waco, in 1888, where he has taken large contracts for street paving, having already built eight miles of paved streets. For the paving material, Mr. Ockander has opened a large quarry in Waco, which supply is supplemented by large shipments of material from west Texas. In the prosecution of his business he employs about fifty men and owns the teams with which they are kept busy. is comfortably off in this world's goods, owning besides his residence, property in Waco, desirable real-estate in Fort Worth, all of which he has gained by his own unaided industry and perseverance.

Mr. Ockander was married in Sweden, in 1867, to Catherine Lingston, daughter of a prosperous farmer. They have three children: Larz, who married Lizzie Peak; Hilda, a graduate of Burns Institute, Fort Worth; and Carl, foreman for his father, the older brother being the superintendent. Both sons were also educated at Burns' College. They are capable and worthy business men of their city.

In all his various relations in domestic and business life, Mr. Ockander has always been the same able, conscientious and genial man, winning both financial success and the regard of all worthy people.

A. CHRISTIAN, County Commissioner of McLennan county, Texas, was born in Georgia, in 1834.

His parents, Thomas O. and Martha A. (Harman) Christian, were also natives of Georgia, the Christian family having moved from Virginia to that State. Grandfather Rufus Christian, a soldier of the War of 1812, was a man of considerable wealth. He reared a family of ten children, namely: Mary, deceased, wife of Thomas Christian; Thomas O., father of F. A.; Mrs. Andrews; Pollie, deceased, wife of Thomas Phelps; Lucinda, deceased, wife of James Hill; Elizabeth, wife of Jasper Smith; Lindsa, deceased; Drew, deceased; Rufus, a resident of Newton county, Georgia; and Manerva, wife of Daniel Hickinsbothan. The maternal grandfather, John Harman, lived to the ripe old age of ninety-five. He was a Pennsylvania Dutchman and a man of much wealth. Following are the names of his children: Frederick, Elizabeth, Washington, Mary, Sarah, John, Martha and Caroline. Thomas O. Christian was born in Wilkes county, Georgia, and died September 21, 1851, in Gordon county, aged forty-three. He was a farmer and slave-holder, and was largely interested in raising grain and stock. His wife was born March 10, 1810, and died in Texas, January 21, 1887, at the age of seventysix. Following is the issue from their union: F. A., the subject of our sketch; Ella L., wife of Dickson Connerly; Amelia A., wife of Alford Waddell; J. M. W., deceased; George T., deceased; William, who was killed at the second battle of Manassas; Mary I., wife of Thomas Connerly; Ophelia, wife of J. A. Moate; and Cordelia, wife of Jackson Estell. Ophelia and Cordelia are twins.

F. A. Christian was educated in the common schools of his native county. His father dying when he was a boy, the business of the farm and care of the family early developed upon him, so his opportunities for an education were limited. After reaching his majority he went to Port Gibson, Mississippi, and was employed as an overseer until the breaking out of the

Civil war. He then entered the Confederate service and fought bravely for a cause he believed to be just and right. He was with the forces that operated in the East, and took part in many of the important engagements of the war, continuing in the service till it closed. He was twice wounded. In May, 1864, he received a slight wound in the arm, and for gallant action on the field at that time, was promoted to a command. At Hatche's Run he was severely wounded in the left leg below the knee, after which he was confined in the hospital at Richmond from January to April.

Returning to his home in Georgia after the surrender, Mr. Christian engaged in agricultural pursuits. In 1869 he disposed of his interests there and came to Texas. For five years he made his home in Henderson, Rusk county, from there went to Bell county, and a year later took up his abode in McLennan county, settling at Comanche Springs. In 1879 he purchased a farm of 100 acres, unimproved land, located six miles from Moody, for which he paid \$3 per This property be improved, and in 1890 sold for \$22.25 per acre. His residence is now in the town of Moody. In 1884 Mr. Christian was elected Justice of the Peace, and served in 1885-'86, and in 1888 was elected to the same office. In 1890 he was elected a County Commissioner, which office he is now most acceptably filling.

Mr. Christian was married in 1866, to Mrs. L. R. Holmes, (nee Pophem) of Georgia. Both he and his wife are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and are highly esteemed citizens of Moody.

ONATHAN HARRIS, a farmer and stockraiser of McLennan county, was born in 1828, the tenth of twelve children born to Jonathan and Ann (Thompson) Harris. Of this large family of children only three survive: our subject, a brother who resides at Kinmundy, Illinois, and a sister at Oneida, Canada. The father was descended from an old Quaker Irish family, whose ancestors date back to the Cromwell times. Mr. Harris emigrated to Canada in an early day, where he died, in April, 1866, at the advanced age of ninety-eight years; the mother survived him until July 12, 1869.

The subject of this sketch began life for himself as a farmer, and after his marriage he began work as a machinist and sawyer, in a sawmill on Grande river, Canada. Eight years later he bought a farm near Lake Huron, but subsequently sold out and came to Waco, in 1874. After prospecting for a time Mr. Harris located at West Station, but three years later he bought his present farm of 360 acres of fine agricultural land. He has his place well improved, with a good barn and dwelling, and also abundance of water, having a never failing artificial reservoir.

Mr. Harris was married at the age of nineteen years, to Miss Eleanor Kernighan, a daughter of Samuel and Mary (McKnight) Kernighan. The father was a linen merchant of Belfast, Ireland, and owned and operated a line of vessels, which did business with Spain, Portugal and Morocco, and also plied on the Mediterranean and Baltic seas. Mr. and Mrs. Harris have had eleven children, namely: Annett, wife of Robert Kett, of Canada; Sarah J., deceased, was the wife of W. D. Austin; William T., who married Emma J. Carmichael and now resides at West Station; Samuel B., who married Miss Rebecca Eyrley, and resides at Waco; Adeline, wife of Thomas Foss, of Waco; Ezra A., who married Miss Josie Morgan, and resides near the homestead; Eleanor V., at home; Evena M., wife of W. E. Phillips, who resides near the home place; Jonathan, of Waco; Frederick, at home; Herbert C., attending the high school at West Station. Mr. Harris is a member of the Church of England, and his wife of the Scotish Presbyterian Church.

D. LEWIS, of the firm of Lewis Brothers, hardware merchants, Gatesville, Texas, is a native of Ohio. He was born in 1855, the third in the family of four children of D.
