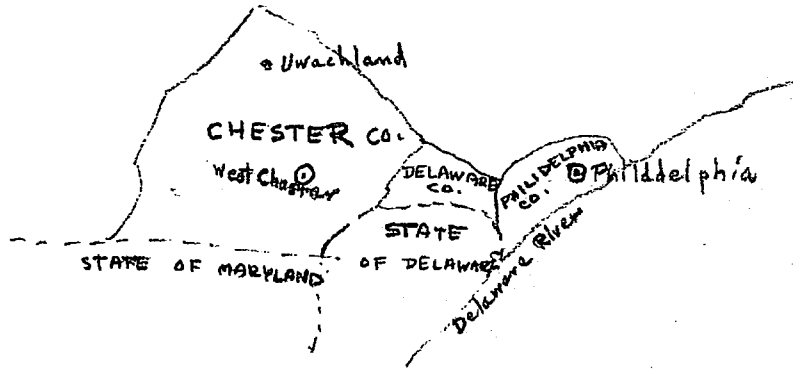

Captain Charles Gatliff was born in the State of Virginia on the 28th day of May, 1745, and died in Whitley County, Kentucky on the 30th day of June, 1838. Charles Gatliff was the son of Lieutenant James Gatliff of the Augusta County, Virginia, militia, who was killed in Braddock's defeat. He is buried near Roanoke, Virginia. James Gatliff came from Brinkworth Hall, Yorkshire, England. The date of his coming to America has not been established. Charles Gatliff was the only son in the family. James Gatliff's wife was Martha FARRIS. There were several daughters, Hannah, Happy, Leah, Rebecca, Martha, Nancy, Mary. The inventory of the estate of James Gatliff and the bond of the administrators of his estate are on record in the Augusta County, Virginia, files in 1762.

Captain Chas. Gatliff was conspicuous in the border warfare of the American Revolution and with Daniel Doone and Simon Kenton was one of the noted Pioneer Frontiersmen of Kentucky. Charles Gatliff m. Augusta Co. Va.--1772 to Christiana McGuire.

In the Indian wars of Greenbrier County, Virginia, he served under Col. Samuel Lewis. In the historical collections of Virginia by Henry Howell, published at Charleston, S. C., and found in Cassette Library in Memphis, Tenn., it is said: "In 1778 an attack was made by 200 Indians on Donleys Fort. There were about 60 persons assistance. They discovered Indians in a Rye field looking earnestly at the houses. Mr. Stewart in his Memors says: 'Captain Gatliff and I fired upon them and we saw others running in the Rye from where we stood. This ended our war in Greenbrier County with the Indians.'"

In the year 1780 Chas. Gatliff came to Kentucky and it was in this same year that Col. Bird led the army of British and Indians in Kentucky and destroyed the stations of Ruddles and Martins. Captain Gatliff was very active in this campaign.

We find in the life of Simon Kenton by Edna Kenton the following:

"Kentucky turned as one man from Bowman to Clark when Bird and his Indians came down from Detroit in June and took Martin's and Ruddles' stations. All the Girtys were with him and McKee joined him on the Miami with six hundred Indians. Bird's first intention was to attack Clark at Louisville, but when McKee's savages learned that the British General carried two cannons with him, they persuaded him to go instead against the Kentucky stations.

"One cannon shot disposed of Ruddles, which surrendered immediately on condition that the three hundred inhabitants should be British, not Indian prisoners. But the Indians had their way with them and Bird admitted to Ruddell that he was powerless to control his savage allies. Martin's Station was taken, with fifty prisoners surrendered; then the Indians were for going against Bryan's Station and Lexington. But already their success had defeated them; they had three hundred and fifty more mouths to feed; they had taken the horses but slaughtered the cattle; they had not enough meat, and Bird finally prevailed on them to leave. A little more of British wisdom or British control and all of the Kentucky settlements could have been wiped out with one shot each from Bird's cannon. Hinkston was among the captives--he made his escape on the second night and got to Lexington where he gave the first alarm."

"In the Spring (it was in June) of 1780", says Kenton's Manuscript Statement, "the Indians with Captain Bird, a British Officer and his men, came into Kentucky, and took Riddles' and Martin's Stations. The Kentuckians then sent on a request to George Rogers Clark desiring him to command us against the Indians. He sent an answer that he would. Charles Gatliff, and myself went on to Riddles's and Martin's

...ore, and then found them both taken, and a number of people lying about killed and ... We then took Captain Bird's trail from there on to the South Fork of Licking, where Falmouth now stands; and when we got there, we found that Captain Bird had built a block-house, and made a stockade fort--and Bird and the Indians had both left there. We returned back to Harrodsburg."

"But not without accomplishing something not set down in the records. Clark took a brass cannon with him on this summer's campaign, and Kenton's son William told Dr. Draper that his father once pointed out a white oak in Boston on Mad River, in which a ball from this cannon had lodged, and said it was fired from a brass six-pounder that had been "captured" from Bird's repleating force on Bird's Trace - 'thinks Kenton (and Gatliff) stole the cannon in the night.' As these two were the entire pursuing party after Bird and his eight hundred and fifty warriors, it is a fairly drawn conclusion that they did."

Later in the same year Capt. Gatliff led the pursuit of the Indians that had killed Daniel Boone's brother Edward as his party was returning from the Salt Lick. This pursuit was made from Harrodsburg, Kentucky, to the mouth of the Licking.

On page 108 D. F. Smith's History of Kentucky it is said, "In October 1780 from Bryan, Lexington and Strodes he (Boone) summoned a party of 60 under Captain Gatliff and Joseph Ray who went in pursuit of the Indians. It is also stated in the above mentioned History that Chas. Gatliff's wife was captured by the Indians and held prisoner for almost a year. She was recaptured by Gatliff and others at a battle near the present site of Mt. Sterling.

In Collins History of Kentucky, page 537 we find the following:

"Captain Charles Gatliff was an early immigrant to Kentucky and very active in many Indian campaigns and excursions. He was a Captain from Bryan Station in the expedition as far as the Ohio River above Maysville against the Indians who murdered Daniel Boone's brother, Edward, in October 1780. Shortly afterwards, he was appointed Captain at Martin Station, what is now Harrison County. He was a brave man, of fine judgment, and was highly esteemed by Daniel Boone, as appears from the latter's deposition February 27, 1817, and by all that know him for his services and character. He died in Whitley County, Kentucky, June 30th, 1838. Captain Charles Gatliff was buried at the mouth of Maple Creek on the Cumberland River about ten miles from Williamsburg.

The last will and testament of Charles Gatliff Dec'd., was this day produced in open Court in words (writ) and figures as follows: (to-wit)

In the Name of God, Amen:

I, Charles Gatliff, of the State of Kentucky, and County of Whitley, being from home in the County of Munroe and State of Virginia at Jacob Cook's and in bad health, but being of sound mind and disposing memory, and also being desirous to dispose of such of this worlds goods as it has pleased God to bless me with, knowing the uncertainty of human life I proceed to dispose of the same in the manner following, to-wit:

1st, My will is that my funeral expenses be paid out of my personal estate, and that all my just debts be adjusted and paid by my executor judiciously as soon as convenient.

2nd, My will is that my two grandsons, sons of my son, James Gatliff, to-wit: Squire Gatliff and Jefferson Gatliff, shall have all that plantation where they and my son James Gatliff now lives on in the State of Kentucky in the County of Whitley, when and as soon as my above named grandsons does give good personal security that their father, James Gatliff and Molly, his wife, shall be comfortable supported during their natural life upon the said plantation and the plantation is bound for their support and at any time when my two grandsons, Squire and Jefferson, shall think proper, they may devide the said tract of land according to quantity between themselves to be theirs and their heirs forever.

3rd, I will my son, Moses Gatliff, a two hundred and eighty acre tract of land or thereabouts and a hundred acre tract of land that joins the tract of land he now lives on, that I have made him a deed to be his and his heirs forever.

4th, I will my son, Aaron Gatliff, and my son-in-law, John Faris, a two hundred and forty odd acre tract of land or thereabouts that joins the land they now live on that I have made them a deed to and the road called the crossroad that runs up the branch to be the line between them to be theirs and their heirs forever and I also give to the said Aaron Gatliff and John Faris a fifty acre tract of land that lies over the river opposite to Aaron to be theirs and their heirs forever.

5th, I will my son, Reese Gatliff, a hundred acres tract of land that lies up the creek above him where he now lives to be his and his heirs forever.

6th, I will a hundred acre tract of land to my daughter-in-law that lies in Cud Birds gap to Sarrah Gatliff, widow of Cornelius Gatliff to be hers and her heirs forever.

7th, I have a hundred acres of land near the mouth of Watts Creek, that has a Sulpher Spring on it, that I will to my two grandsons, during their natural life and after their decease it is to belong to their children, but I reserve the use of the Spring to the Commonwealth forever.

8th, I have a four hundred and thirty four acres of land on the Clear fork of Cumberland River in two tracts that I will that my executor shall sell on a twelve months credit with approved security and use the money in settling my estate and if any surplus to be divided among my legatees, I have three hundred and fifty acres of joining the same that I will my executor to sell as above, and the money to be used as above only he is not to make sale until there is a necessity to do so on account of having ready money on hand.

9th, I will that a tract of land that I have on Whitstone of two hundred acres joining the land I live on that my executor must sell on a twelve months credit when compelled to use the money as described above.

10th, I will that my home plantation shall be rented by my executor and left in good repair until he shall see that there is a necessity to sell the same on a reasonable credit with approved security and the purchase money to be paid in annual instalments and divide the money amongst my legatees, and that he shall sell a two hundred and eighty acres of land that joins the home place on the north west side of the same, when he sees it necessary and divide the purchase money amongst my legatees with twelve months credit and approved security and I have one hundred acres of land upon Maple Creek that I have sold to Abraham Wills and if he has paid or when he does pay the purchase money I do authorize my executor to make him a conveyance for the same and I have a ninety acre tract of land upon the west end of my home place, that my executor must sell at twelve months credit with approved security and divide the purchase money amongst my legatees and have two tracts of land of one hundred and twenty supposed to be both platted into one tract that my executor must sell as above, and the money to be paid over as above. Said land lies upon the Fall Branch and on the River and I have a fifty acre tract that I will to my son, Reese Getliff, at the mouth of the deep Branch to be his and his heirs forever and I have two other fifty tracts of land joins the same and above that my executor must sell at twelve months credit with approved security and pay over the money to my legatees equally as above.

11th, I have a tract of land the quantity not known upon Cumberland River that my executor must sell at twelve months credit with approved security and divide the money amongst my legatees and I have a tract of two hundred acres of land joining my home place on the west end that my executor must sell with twelve months credit and approved security and

divide the money amongst my legatees, but it is understood that my executor will not proceed to sell any of the above tracts or parcels of land until he discovers it is but to do so and to sell which ever tract or tracts that he thinks will sell best and when he sells and receives the purchase money he is authorized to make deed of conveyance to any and all that he may sell.

12th, I will my negro woman Prank to be free at my death with five acres of good land and put in good order for her to cultivate and to be continually kept in good repair for her with liberty to change her five acres from one part of the farm to the other for her benefit during her natural life and my executor must see to her getting justice and compell the legatees to do the repairing of the ground that is the legatee where she may devise to live.

13th, I will that my female slave (to wit) Lott and Deloe and Coorne and all my female slaves of their issue shall be free at the age of twenty five years of age.

14th, I will that my male slaves (to wit) Add and Benn and Tom, and all my male boy slaves shall be free when they arrive at the age of thirty years.

15th, I will that my negro woman Ealce and my negro man, Jordan and my man Harry shall be sold by my executor at twelve months credit with approved security and pay over the money evenly to my legatees.

16th, I will my son in law William Martin one hundred dollars to be paid by my executor out of any money he may have on hand when he can make it convenient.

17th, I will my son, James Gatliff, small sums of money to be paid by my executor out of any money he may have on hand at any time he may have it and the said James Gatliff may stand in need of the same.

18th, I will that my executor shall carry on the suit that I have in Court respecting the family of negroes that has brought suit for their freedom and do the best he can.

19th, my agent to superintend and rent my land that I have on New River and at the mouth of Bluestone in Mercer County in Virginia and I authorize him to make sale of all that land that I have there and if he can get two thousand dollars in annual payments or two thousand dollars a yearly and if he does to write to my executor Joseph Gatliff of the State of Kentucky, and pay over the same to the said Gatliff.

20th, My will is that a fair construction be made of this my last will and testament and that no part of it be strained.

21st, Lastly I constitute and appoint Joseph Gatliff, my executor of this my last will and testament. Given under my hand seal this twenty fourth day of May one thousand eight hundred and thirty seven.

Captain Charles Gatliff married Christine McGuire, after her death he married second Rachel Curmins, daughter of John and Nancy Curmins. Wives were said to have been cousins. He married his second wife June 19, 1809 at the mouth of Whetstone Creek.

Jacob was very much dissatisfied with Irvin as a son-in-law, but some time after Jacob moved to this country, he returned to Augusta where Irvin lived, and brought them out with him. Irvin lived with Jacob about six months, when he went to Tennessee, where he lived some years, and his wife died. Jacob and Jane moved from Augusta in 1779, to Washington, and they have always lived on the same land. James Campbell, executor of Jacob, was Jacob's son-in-law. Jane and Jacob when they moved from Augusta were about 65 years old. Robert Ferril, Jr., deposes 1st January, 1806, at house of Robert Ferril, Sr., in Cumberland County, Kentucky.

George Smith was son-in-law of William Humphreys, who had lived in Albemarle and moved into Augusta, where he died in June, 1802, leaving a widow, Sally. George Smith had removed into Buckingham County, thence to Amherst, thence to Rockbridge.

Anderson vs. Rhea—O. S. 170; N. S. 60—Bill, 1813. Robert Anderson of Botetourt purchased land in Botetourt from William Rhea of Kentucky, which was originally part of five tracts held by David Mitchell, who died twenty or thirty years ago intestate, leaving heirs, viz: James Mitchell, his brother, representatives of two sisters of whole blood, one named Brownlee and one Tate, and either a sister of the half-blood or her representatives. An informal partition was made and 200 acres were allotted to Mrs. Brownlee's representatives. William Rhea married one of the daughters of Mrs. Brownlee, who had nine children entitled to distribution.

McDaniel vs. Gatlive—O. S. 171; N. S. 60—Martha Gatlive died in Botetourt, intestate, leaving heirs, viz: Charles Gatlive, Hannah Dailey, William Wiley and Hafy, his wife, Wm. Toney and Leah, his wife, Thomas Christian and Rebecca, his wife, Joseph Goar and Martha, his wife, Thomas, Nancy, James, Mary and Alexander Pine.

Robert Patton, Administrator of James Hunter, *c. t. a.*, vs. Hite—O. S.

171; N. S. 60—Bill 11th August, 1804. Before Revolution, Hunter got judgment in General Court against Jacob Hite, but Jacob moved to South Carolina, where he was murdered by Indians. Hunter died shortly after Revolution. A bill was brought by George Hite, administrator *d. b. n.* of Jacob Hite, against the three daughters of John Hite, deceased, eldest son and heir-at-law of Jacob, to set up a will of Jacob that had been discovered which was established about 179— in High Court of Chancery. Defendants are, viz: Edward Gerant and Mary, his wife; Theodrick Lee and ———, his children by his late wife Catherine, Sarah, wife of A. P. Buchanan, which said Mary, Catherine, and Sarah were daughters and heirs of John Hite, deceased, who was son and heir of Jacob Hite, deceased; and James Hite, Carver Willis and Frances, his wife, who are children and heirs of Thomas Hite, deceased, another devisee of Jacob; and William Boushby and Mary, his wife, late Mary Manning, a devisee of Jacob.

Henderson vs. Humphreys—O. S. 171; N. S. 60—From Botetourt. Answer by Uriah Humphreys in Clark County, Georgia.

Jackson vs. Jones—O. S. 171; N. S. 60—Spa. to Bath County, October, 1811. to summon Henry Jones to answer Hannah Jackson, widow of Asabel Jackson, deceased. Jesse, Asabel, Crawford and Hezekiah Jackson, heirs and representatives of said Asabel.

Robert Adams vs. Johnson—O. S. 171; N. S. 60—Bill, 1809. Orator's uncle, ——— Adams, about 177— resided in that part now Washington County and had surveyed to him a lot from the Loyal Company. He sold to Hugh Johnston, who sold to Buchanan, and then died. Orator's uncle moved to Kentucky. Hugh Johnston and Robert Johnston were brothers. Thomas Edmonson married the only daughter and heir of said ——— Buchanan. Robert and Hugh Johnson have no heirs except in Ireland.

Wm. H. Cavendish, Attorney for Silvanus Walker, vs. George Clendennin's Heirs—O. S. 172; N. S. 61—Greenbrier. George Clendennin died intestate, leaving Jemima (widow), children, Parthenia Meggs, wife of John Meggs; Cynthia and Margaret Clendennin.

Strode vs. Wormley—O. S. 172; N. S. 61—Complainants are, viz: Thomas Strode, Hugh Wallace Wormley and Mary, his wife, late Strode. Bill states: By deed 30th August, 1794, between John Wormley, Mary Wormley and Burwell Stork, recorded in District Court at Winchester. Certain lands in Frederick County are conveyed in trust to Burwell Stork for benefit of orator, Hugh, John C. Wormley, two of children of John Wormley and Mary Wormley, then wife of John. At time of the deed John had only children, viz: Orator and John C. Wormley. Mary B. Wormley, his daughter, was born afterwards. Her mother was Mary, also mother of orator and J. C. Wormley. In 1802 John Wormley and Mary his wife, John C. Wormley and orator, Hugh, conveyed 250 acres to James Wormley. Hugh was then 16 years old. James afterwards conveyed this 250 acres to his daughter, Jane B. Wormley, now wife of George H. Norris, by deed dated 1804 and recorded in District Court at Winchester. John Wormley conveyed 100 acres of same tract to said John C. Wormley after marriage of Norris with Jane. John C. W——— and Anna his wife, on 7th December, 1815, conveyed by deed recorded in Frederick the 100 acres to Norris, who on same day conveyed the 250 acres to J. C. W———. John Wormley on 6th December, 1805, by deed recorded in Frederick, confirmed

Citation from The Life of Simon Kenton by Edna Kenton the following:

"Kentucky turned as one man from Bowman to Clark when Bird and his Indians came down from Detroit in June and took Martin's and Ruddles' stations. All the girty's were with him and McKee joined him on the Miami with 600 Indians. Bird's first intention was to attack Clark of Louisville, Kentucky, but when McKee's savages learned that the British General carried two cannons with him, they persuaded him to go instead against the Kentucky stations.

"One cannon shot disposed of Ruddles which surrendered immediately on conditions that the 300 inhabitants should be British and not Indian prisoners. But the Indians had their ways with them and Bird admitted to Ruddles that he was powerless to control his savage allies. Martin's Station was taken with fifty prisoners. Then the Indians were for going against Bryan's Station at Lexington, Kentucky, but already their success had defeated them. They had 350 more mouths to feed, they had taken the horses but slaughtered the cattle, they had not enough meat and Bird finally prevailed on them to leave. A little more of British wisdom or British control and all of the Kentucky settlements could have been wiped out with one shot each from Bird's cannon. Hinkston was among the captives. He made his escape the second night and got to Lexington, where he gave the first alarm.

"In the Spring, (it was in June of 1780, says Kenton's manuscript statement), the Indians with Captain Bird, a British Officer and his men, came into Kentucky, and took Riddles' and Martin's Stations. The Kentuckians then sent on a request to George Rogers Clark desiring him to command us against the Indians. He sent an answer that he would. Charles Gatliff and myself went on to Riddles' and Martin's stations, and then found them both taken, and a number of people lying about killed and scalped. We then took Captain Bird's trail from there on to the South Fork of Licking, where Falmouth now stands, and when we got there we found that Captain Bird had built a block house and made a stockade fort and Bird and the Indians had both left there. We returned back to Harrodsburg, Kentucky.

"But not without accomplishing something not set down in the records. Clark took a brass cannon with him on his summers campaign, and Kenton's son, William told Dr. Draper that his father once pointed out a white oak at Boston on Mad River in which a ball from his cannon had lodged, and said it was fired from a brass 6-pounder that had been "captured" from Bird's retreating force on Bird's Trace - "thinks Kenton (and Gatliff) stole the cannon in the night. As these two were the entire pursuing party after Bird and his 850 warriors, it is a fairly drawn conclusion that they did."

"First Visitors to Whitley County"

Captain Charles Gatliff was an early immigrant to Kentucky, and very active in many Indian campaigns and excursions. He was a Captain from Bryan's Station in the expedition as far as the Ohio River above Maysville, Kentucky, against the Indians who murdered Daniel Boone's brother, Edward, in October 1780, and shortly after was appointed a

Captain at Martin's Station, now in Harrison County. He was a brave man, of fine judgment, and was highly esteemed by Daniel Boone (as appears from the latter's deposition on September 22, 1817, when 84 years of age) and by the people generally, for his services and character. He died in Whitley County, Kentucky, June 30, 1838, age about 90 years.

HISTORY OF THE GATLIFF FAMILY IN AMERICA *

In the early Fall of 1609, Christopher Newport, the nominal head of the Colony of Virginia in Jamestown, requisitioned food from England for the starving Virginians. His request was granted, and three sailing vessels laden with food and other supplies essential to the comfort of the starving Colonists sailed from England under the command of Lord De La Warr (Thomas West) with Masters Thomas Charles Gatliff and William Edward Cooke as second and third in command respectively. This fleet arrived at Jamestown February 1, 1610.

Masters Thomas Charles Gatliff and William Edward Cooke together with their wives remained in the Colony of Virginia as Colonists.

During the Revolutionary War (1775-81) part of the Gatliffs were Whigs, others were Tories and these returned to England. The original home of the Gatliffs was Wales (Glannongwastiro, British Isles).

EARLY PIONEERS OF WHITLEY COUNTY - Captain Charles Gatliff

Captain Charles Gatliff came into Kentucky from Southwestern Virginia in 1760. He first settled in Central Kentucky on land where the City of Paris now stands. Later he migrated to Southeastern Kentucky and settled at the mouth of Maple Creek in Whitley County. There he erected a two-story log house where he lived and died. The house still stands. He was born May 26, 1745, a son of James and Martha Ferris Gatliff of Virginia. James Gatliff was a Lieutenant in the Virginia Militia. He was killed during Braddock's defeat in 1758 and buried near Roanoke, Virginia.

Charles Gatliff, father of James Gatliff, was a retired English Naval Officer, and came into the New World about the time of William Penn's arrival. From existing documents it is certain that the first Gatliffs were Quakers. Captain Charles Gatliff was a noted Indian fighter and is cited for bravery in both Collins and Smith's KENTUCKY HISTORY. In the Indian War in Greenbrier County, Virginia, he served under Col. Samuel Lewis and was an officer in charge during the siege of Bryan's Station, Kentucky. In 1773 he first married Christinia McGuire, a daughter of Col. William McGuire of Virginia and of the French and Indian War. To this union was born six sons and two daughters.

ACCOUNT OF OUR ANCESTORS ON TRIP TO CANADA AS WAR PRISONERS
by Mrs. Adelaide Berry Duncan
Written to her youngest son, George Duncan

September 11, 1893

Dear George: Your papa's grandfather and grandmother, John and Nellie Duncan, and grandfather and grandmother, Frank and Sally Berry moved from Virginia during the Revolutionary War to Kentucky. I don't know just where, but it was somewhere in the best part of the state. There was quite a little colony of them but I do not know the names of any except these families. They took up claims of land and complied with what was necessary to secure their claims. I don't know what it was nor how long they had been there til they were compelled to move for safety to a fort or blockhouse where they were taken by British officers and soldiers who had Indians with them to whom the British gave all their household goods except two suits of clothes and two blankets to each man and the same to each woman.

I remember hearing my grandmother tell how the Indians would toss the pillows in the air after they had ripped the ticking to make the feathers fly in the wind and how they would laugh. They wanted the cloth but not the feathers.

They then started on their march to Detroit, where they stayed awhile and then on to Montreal where they stayed until peace was declared. They were liberated to get back as best they could. There was one family along who had a young woman, a daughter who complained of a toothache for some weeks. When someone examined her mouth, they found a cancer had eaten through her cheek, all but the skin. She died soon after and the officers only allowed them to stop long enough to pile up a few rocks on her body. Charles Gatliffe was the father's name. He came back to Kentucky and I saw him after he was eighty years of age. I also saw two of his daughters, Betsy Martin and Sally Feris. I also saw his sons, Moses, Aaron, Reece, Jim and Cornelius. I suppose Joe remembers having seen one of his grandsons, Charles Gatliffe, who moved to Missouri a short time before we left Iowa for Princeton. His wife was papa's cousin, Polly Early, and your Uncle Harvey Green married their daughter, Lillian.

I heard my grandmother say she saw the Indians kill two children. It was very cold for part of their journey and once when a great fire of logs was burning where they camped, an Indian picked up a child that was standing near and threw it on the fire. No one dared to try to get it out. On another occasion, a woman was carrying a little babe and she was almost exhausted when an Indian jerked it from her arms and thrust his tomahawk in its head and threw the child to one side of the road and drove her on.

While they were in Montreal, the men were made to repair the English ships and the women cooked and washed for the English officers. On one occasion, the men found a case of wine on the ship and drank the wine. The officers put them in prison or the guard house and my grandmother Berry went to the guard house and begged for their release until they

were released. I don't know what their punishment would have been.

I don't know if any of the young men were put on the English ships to make them fight against their own country or not. Your Grandfather Duncan and four other young men were going to be put on a man-of-war in the morning and your grandfather's oldest sister baked bread and fixed some provisions. They stole a canoe and crossed the St. Lawrence to the American side and got away. They traveled through the hostile Indian country til they reached the settlement in Pennsylvania. On the outskirts of the settlement they found a deserted place, an iron pot, and a potato patch. I heard your father tell how they boiled potatoes and ate with such appetites. Your Grandmother Duncan told me that their friends did not know, til after peace and they returned from Montreal whether these young men were drowned in the St. Lawrence, whether they were killed by Indians, whether they were lost in the wilderness and perished, or whether they were safe. She did not know the name of a single one of her husband's companions and I never heard her say who they were. I am sorry I did not ask your Uncle Harve Duncan for he may have known. I do not know whether there was any fighting at the fort or not in Kentucky or whether they surrendered to the greater number without fighting.

All the way, I can approximate the time they moved from Virginia to Kentucky. My Grandfather Berry fought in the battle at King's Mountain and he was also a scout before they moved to Kentucky. After my papa got to practicing law, he got a pension from a Duncan McFarland who was scout with my grandfather. I remember how the hair seemed to stand on my head as I lay in my trundle bed and listened to McFarland tell papa of their exploits. At one time, he and a Charlie Miller ran with the Indians after them thirty miles to a blockhouse.

As the prisoners were leaving Canada, they crossed some lake in a ship which was very crowded and manned by French-Canadian sailors. A storm arose and the sailors got frightened and quit work. They started to pray and cross themselves when an Englishman, perhaps an officer came on them and cursed and swore and ripped and tore around and kicked them and made them get to work. Finally, they got safely to land. I remember hearing grandfather tell of hearing his father laughing about it. Grandmother said there were piles of feathers-floating in the eddies of the lake shore that looked like white houses; the shedding of many waterfowls on the lake.

My Uncle Lewis Berry was born in Montreal. He died in the American Army in the War of 1812. As our ancestors were coming home, they passed the Niagara Falls. All heard its roar and some of the men went to see it but the women and children were too weary to go. They went back to Kentucky to where they had been captured and found men on their claims. Both your great grandfathers, John Duncan and Frank Berry, sued at law for their claims but lost their suit. Berry's long tongue made him say the judge was a perjured scoundrel. The judge sued him for slander and got judgement for eight hundred dollars.

Then, the poor weary souls went back to Virginia where they had lived before they went to Kentucky and raised their families there.

Quite a number of the children afterwards moved to Whitley County, KY where your papa and I were born and raised and married. My Grandmother Berry, in her old age, also came there and died in 1834. I only remember of seeing your Grandfather Duncan twice. Alec Laughlin, your Papa's cousin, married in Whitley Co. and moved to Tennessee where Elinor Litton was born. He came back on a visit and stopped at his Uncle's (your Grandfather Duncan's) and they both came to Watt's Creek where my papa and your papa's Uncle Tommy Laughlin lived.

They stopped at our house and it was a hot day and your Aunt Candice and I had taken off our dresses and were running around in our chemises, which were long and long sleeved. They came on us unaware and we went to the back of the house and sat on a chest while they laughed at us. I remember how your grandfather looked. He was very much the make and size of your papa but his hair was black and I think his eyes were blue. I afterwards saw him riding past our house on a white horse. He wore a high bell crowned hat and a blue jeans frock coat. (I have seen the hat and coat after I was married and ridden the white mare whose name was Ginger.) He was a dear nephew to my grandmother and I know she loved him. I know my papa loved him too. He died from dry salivation caused by taking a dose of calomel measured out on a case knife blade by an old woman who had more confidence in herself then good sense. I remember when word came to us that Johnny Duncan was dying. My papa hurried off and took a handful of nails. Mama asked him what he did that for. He said to put in the coffin. Years afterwards, I learned that was an old country superstition but its meaning I never heard. He got there in time to write his will before he died and moved him after his death. He had been dead six years when your papa and I were married; that would have made his death to have occurred in 1832. Your papa and I lived with your Grandmother Duncan the first year after we were married and she loved to talk about him. She said he was a remarkably strong man for his size. When he was a young man, it was the custom for the neighbors to all unite and help each other cut small grain with sickles and the young women would do the cooking and sometimes they would go to the fields and use the sickles to good purpose. Then, each night they would have a dance. Your grandmother said your grandfather worked all day and danced all night for two days and two nights without sleep. I don't believe his sons or grandsons or great grandson could do that, even if they can ride a bicycle.

I don't know whether the Gatliff family moved from Virginia or Tennessee to Kentucky or not. I only know that they were together in their captivity. I don't know whether the British gave them any money to get home on or not. Grandfather Berry never paid the \$800. He somehow got a farm in Sullivan County, Tennessee where his family was raised, but it was always in the name of Billy King, grandmother sister's husband. My papa said your Grandfather Duncan was so far gone when he got there he was in no condition to make a will, but your Uncle Harvey and Joe Duncan said for your grandmother's sake, to have it done to not add to her distress by breaking up her home by taking two thirds of everything, the farm, the Negroes, and dividing it amongst the children, as they knew Your Uncle Joe Sullivan would insist on doing if there was no will. So, the will was written giving your grandmother everything, the farm, the

Negroes and everything else as long as she lived and at her death all was to be equally divided amongst the children. I guess it was pretty hard for Sullivan not to try and break the will. After I was married, I heard your Aunt Mareissa say "the children ought to have had the little that was coming to them a long time ago." But he knew that your Uncle Harve and Joe would not give him any child's play if he undertook the law with them. They were the executors.

Well, as I am writing in order, seems I will shift the plot and go to Maine on the Kennebec River. One night, Lincoln Ryder was with us at bedtime and he and Lillie got to telling of their ancestors. Lillie started and made me tell of your grandfather's escape from Montreal. He told of one of his grandfather's straying too far from the settlement up the Kennebec and being captured by the Indians and kept about a year. They treated him kindly in their way and got to trusting him to some extent. On a cold day, when the river was frozen over, they were skating with Indian skates and after a while, had him try it. He was very awkward and stumbled and fell and gave them great amusement til he saw his chance. He then bid them good-bye and struck out down the river. I watched when none of them had their skates on and got away but they shot arrows at him and at his feet to entangle them with the arrows but he got away safely home.

At one time, there were four generations living at his father's house; a great-grandfather, his grandparents, his parents, and their children. His grandmother lived to be I think one hundred and four years old. The manager of the county fair had her put on the platform to exhibit herself after she was a hundred years old. I heard my Papa tell of a man getting away from those who had him in custody and by the same kind of skating maneuver, but I think he was a criminal and got away from officers. Lillie wanted to know afterwards why I didn't tell my story. I told her I believed he was telling the truth and if I told my story, I would have thought perhaps that I did not believe him and was capping off one big story with another.

If I were back to ten or twelve years of age and knew more than I did then, how I would ply my grandmother and parents with questions.

I guess I will close my pioneer stories. - Nellie Duncan and Sally Berry were sisters. Sharp was their name before they were married.

2nd Letter

Sunday P.M.
Sept. 17, 1893



Dear George:

In looking over your letter, I find I did not answer all your

questions. I don't know whether your Grandfather Duncan was much of a woodsman or not or whether he was much of a hunter for I think I would have heard talk of it if he had been.

Your grandmother's oldest brother, Tommy Laughlin, was a great hunter. His children used to sit on the woodpile when he went out with his gun and listen to hear a shot and then each would claim separate parts of the deer, such as the milt, the heart, the liver, or the ribs. Isaac King, his son-in-law, told this and he said he neglected his cornfield to hunt, like my papa did. I don't believe your Grandfather Duncan did this.

I don't know how long they were in the wilderness nor whether the family got together in Kentucky or not till after the old folks went back to Virginia.

Decatur Bryden's mother was the first child my Grandmother Berry had after her return from captivity and it may be he has heard her tell things she certainly heard her mother talk of.

Before our ancestors moved to Kentucky, they in Virginia, had to seek safety in a blockhouse. Your Grandmother Duncan told me this after I was married. She was a little girl and was drinking sweet sap, that was dripping from a sugar tree near her father's house. She had left one shoe and stocking in the house and a runner came galloping by calling out, "To the blockade house, the Indians are coming". Her father picked her up and poor lame man that he was, carried in her arms. By the time they got pretty near the blockhouse there was quite a crowd of neighbors. They stopped to drink at a little stream and your grandmother's little tin cup that had in her hand was all they had to drink out of. One woman pulled off her shoe and gave her children a drink out of it.

I do now know whether your Grandfather Duncan's family was in the blockhouse or not. My Grandfather and Grandmother Berry were; also Billy King whose wife was Betty Sharp before she was married.

There were five men killed by the Indians while they stayed in the blockhouse. They would go to their fields to get food and those inside would hear the shooting, and after a while, would go out and bring in their slain friends. They tied their feet together; also their hands and on a pole, then, two men would carry them. Your grandmother told of one poor German woman whose son Fritz was all the family she had. He was brought in that way. Your old grandmother would choke and stop, then with tears running down her cheeks, would tell how this poor woman would wring her hands and say, "Oh, my Fritz, my Fritz."

This Billy King was the one who afterwards held the deed to Grandfather Berry's farm. I heard Mama say he was as faithful as if grandmother's children had been his own, never took advantage of them. Your grandmother told me that one Sunday morning in the blockhouse, he dressed in his clean white flax linen pants and hunting shirt and laid the corner of his hunting shirt across his knee and took Isaac, his baby, on his knee. The baby had bowel complaint and stained his hunting shirt. He jumped up and tore around as if the Indians were after him.

My grandmother and his wife flew at him and got the baby away and the hunting shirt off him for he took out his knife and they had hard work to keep him from cutting off the corner that was so badly soiled. Did any of them ever think that any of their descendents would write this down more than a hundred years after it occurred. Your grandmother said to me, "Your grandmother was a beautiful woman then".

Isaac King moved to Whitley Co., Kentucky before my papa did and lived four miles from where I was raised.

I remember when I was a little girl of riding behind him to Williamsburg on a gib white stable horse. We were going to hear a Presbyterian preacher. I was going to ride behind Mama and Ellen Carr behind Papa when he said, "Put her behind me". I was so much afraid of him and of the horse too that it was anything but a "pleasant" ride to me. We crossed the Cumberland River, which was pretty full too.

Decatur Dryden's Grandmother Dryden was a Berry. I think my father's sister, but perhaps a cousin. Your Grandmother Duncan's mother was Polly Price before she was married to that lame weaver Jack Laughlin. She is the only one of your ancestors whose nationality I do not know. When your grandmother was a little girl, this Polly rode a fine young mare, that was a great favorite in the family, some miles to a neighbors and as she was coming home a bull that was roaming in the woods took after her and she ran the mare and got home safe. She wanted to keep the mare up til the bull left, but no, her husband turned her out, saying sh would keep out of the bulls way. The next day, they found the mare dead -- gored to death by the bull.

On the 21st day of October 1833 personally appeared before the Whitley County Court Charles Gastly a resident of Whitley County in the State of Kentucky aged eighty five years the 28th day of May last who being duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That on the 9th day of June 1778 he commenced as an Indian ^{spy} under an appointment of John Clinchson Commander of Carter's part Battell County Virginia that he was in actual service under said appointment ~~for~~ Months and thirteen days 1st one fair of ten days with James Fehpatuck 2^d one fair of ten days with Joseph Elliot Williams Major 3^d one fair of four months and 23 day with Matthew Coia ^{the} depending the 15th of November of the same year In June 1788 He was appointed an Indian spy by Col^l Benjamin Logan on Clarks expedition in which capacity he served three months He was appointed a spy by said Col^l Logan to repair to Duneston to ascertain as well the Movement of the Indians as British in which he served twenty days The two last years Kentucky Making in all nine Months and 23 he was in actual service as an Indian spy Primarily to the last two fairs and in the year 1779 he served two Campaigns as a Volunteer private under

Command of Capt Riddle in which Campaign
they erected Riddle Station he was in actual
Service Six Months. In the Spring of 1780 He
Volunteered under Capt Haggan and served in
the expedition Commanded by Col. Boman
against the Shawans on the Little Miami One
Month Making in all two Months that served
as a private.

In the Summer or fall of 1780 he was elected
Capt of Martins Station by its inhabitants and con-
tinued in actual Service three Months and
until the Station was taken by the Protestors
of Indians in the fall of the same year and
immediately ^{after} Martins fort was taken as above
he received Orders from Col. Boman to take
Command of Boyant's Station which was likely
to break up. He served under said Appointment
two Months Making in all five Months of
actual Service as Capt.

There is no living evidence that he knows of by
which he can prove the foregoing declaration and
the only document in his possession is herewith filed

Question 4th How were you called into Service

Ans^r I was living in Cooks fort and was called into Service by an Appointment of an Indian Spy by Capt John Henderson

Question 5th State the Name of some of the Regular Officers with the troops

Ans^r There was none at Cooks fort but in Kentucky and in the year 1779 Col^o John Bowman, in 1780 Gen^l Clark and in 1781 Col^o Benjamin Logan

Question 6th State the Circumstances of your Service

Ans^r I was a Spy in 1774 for Fawcetts fort Calibersons bottom on New River the length of Service that I recollect. In 1775 was peace 1776-7 we had war with both British and Indians but I was not called on in either year. In 1778 in the Month of June I commenced as an Indian Spy the 1st Term with different Parties I served upwards of five Months

I assisted in erecting Riddles point on Kentucky
in 1779. I volunteered in Capt Haggans Company and

as an Indian Spy — Nine Months & 13 days

a pension you may see was different from
the one I received — ready when called

On and a discharge (if I thought of it) was a

I never thought any thing about it, consequently

FERRIS

Richard Ferris was living in Charles City County (later Henrico) at the time we find: Robert Woodson, Edward Mosby, Abraham Womack, et al, there. He was born in Scotland et had brothers: John, William et Jacob living near him in Henrico.

His name first appears together with Woodson, et three others, in the White Oak Swamp Pa tent. He was a planter, located North of that Pa tent before it was made.

He was a Grand Juryman of Henrico 1684. The next year finding himself in trouble with the Court which "had summoned him et others to appear et answer charges against them for not making presentations according to law. They appeared now et alleged they had nothing to present et that their non-appearance was occasioned by their ignorance of law et praying to be released they shall pay all officers' fees which have occurred by their omission aforesaid et are this time released of penalty of law imposed on each of them."

Three years later he gave bond to James Hambleton for the Dower Right relinquishment of his wife. She was a Hambleton. Two years later he sold 100 acres of White Oak Swamp to Hambleton, who paid 900 Pounds of tobacco. The next year "for divers good causes me hereunto moving" deed 50 acres of his White Oak Swamp 1 and to his son, William.

At the time his son lived on this acreage. This 50 acres shared boundary lines with; the Grantor; The Port; Richard Cocke at Old Man Creek; Charles City County line; et Richard Basse. Two years later he asked Henrico to record in its records a gift to his eldest son; Richard, of a Pyed Cow called "Py" et which was marked with a swallow fork et a nick in the left ear, with all her female increase.

Two years later he obtained a hunting permit from Henrico to hunt et destroy wolves in Chickahominy Swamp. The permit being granted, he gathered an army of some forty men et boys armed with weapons et with their dogs went hunting.

He was in constant conflict in court with the Hambletons. He last appears in the records in 1711.

If this Bible exists, the present possessor and location are unknown.

Verbal family history states that five Farris brothers came to "America" from Wales.

This is strengthened by McPherson in her "Nation Builders", when she states that Henry, father of Judith Farris Smith, came from Wales.

According to Henry V.M. Richardson, author of "The Lady of Skarra", on page 487, it tells of the "Rampant Lion of Scotland", carried on the men's banners. Most Farris Coat of Arms have the "Rampant Lions" on their banners.

"As soon as my husband was wounded, he said he must die and directed me to take the two surviving children and make my escape, which I did and carried with me our two surviving children herein & above mentioned. Polly and Rebecca now Polly Hudson & Rebecca Johnson."

An affidavit from Elijah Farris of Washington Co. accompanies the above and he names Nathan and Polly's children as Rebecca, Sally and Polly, "one of whom is dead". This affidavit dated 22 Aug. 1835. Notes for John Phares (I):

John Phares (Faris), a brickmaker or brick layer, was apparently the progenitor of the Phares family in this country and was almost certainly of Scotch-Irish descent. He probably came to this country from the British Isles and was known to have been in the Philadelphia area in the early 1700's. He later moved to Burlington Co., NJ where he spent the rest of his life. John's date of birth has not been proved but he died some time before 20 Sep 1736 when the administration of his will was given to his widow, Mary. An inventory was taken on 24 Sep 1736 but no list of heirs is found in the probate records.

Notes for Mary Lawrie:

Mary's Surname is believed to be Lawrie based on tradition and a possible family connection to John Lawrie who, in 1767, along with Mary Phares, was one of the executors of the will of William Phares, grandson of John Phares (Faris) I in Burlington Co., NJ.

Notes for Thomas Phares:

There is no known documentary evidence that Thomas Phares (Phareze) was the son of John Phares (Faris) of Philadelphia. He may have been the son of Sarah Phares who was involved in a land transaction in Talbot Co., MD in 1707.

Notes for William Phares:

William settled in Burlington Co., NJ and is the progenitor of the NJ branch of the family. His date of birth has not been proved.

Notes for Robert Phares:

Robert's date of birth has not been proved.

Notes for Mary Phares:

Mary's date of birth has not been proved.

Notes for Joseph Phares:

Joseph's date of birth has not been proved. There is no known record of Joseph in Philadelphia after 1733 and it is believed that he went into western PA or to the Carolinas.

Notes for John Phares (II):

John is known to have lived in Philadelphia until 1729 and was in Augusta Co., VA in 1750 when he bought 150 acres of land next to Arthur Johnson. His will dated 4 Sep 1785 in Augusta Co., VA. names only his wife, Agnes, and sons-in-law Job Reynolds and William Faris. He was still living and taxed on 1 Jun 1787 but died a few months later since his will was proved in Augusta Co. on 16 Oct 1787. His wife, Agnes, and son-in-law, William Faris were named as executors. John's date of birth has not been proved.
