Perhaps we can even get together sometime in the future to compare notes.

Dear Mrs. Pearlman:

I'm so glad you wrote me. And I hope we can exchange information helpful to our studies. I am sorry however, that I cannot help you on your specific question concerning a Thomas Christian.

My own work concerns the descendants of the Thomas Christian whose family group records I send you. The proven ancestor of my children is Charles Christian, Jr. through his son Doctor George. I have considerable information developed myself on the descendants of Charles Christian, Jr.

That Charles Christian, Jr. ($\frac{6}{7}$ $\frac{1}{5}$ $\frac{5}{7}$ $\frac{3}{2}$) was indeed the grandson of Thomas Christian, Sr. the progenitor ($\frac{6}{7}$ $\frac{1}{5}$ $\frac{5}{7}$ $\frac{3}{2}$) is not completely secure. However, I am taking Thomas Christian, Sr. as the somewhat-more-thantentative ancestor and thus I study all his descendants. I have about 500 or so of these down to the present generation, but most of the 500 have come simply from the studies of Lamb in the "Christian Family" series of articles in WMQ around the turn of the century. You are undoubtedly familiar with this extensive work. This work is heavy in the descendants of the son Thomas, Jr. and the son James. About John I know practically nothing and about Charles, Sr. only that I am presuming him to be the father of Charles, Jr. our proven ancestor.

Among all these records I have nothing which indicates any bearing on your Thomas Christian and son James P. Christian. I recognize that there are several separate Christian families contemporaneous with Thomas Sr., one for example in Augusta County, whose descendants are easily confused with those of Thomas Christian, Sr. I am trying to make this distinction and stay away from those families. And I am guessing that it is from one of these that your Thomas descends.

I come to Los Angeles occasionally on business and on the next trip I will try to arrange to visit you bringing my Christian records.

Now I throw in a couple of specific questions for you. That Charles Christian. Sr. was a son of Thomas Christian, Sr. is based in my records solely on the judgment of Lamb who adduces the four indicated sons of Thomas Christian, Sr. almost entirely because all five of them were patenting adjoining lands in Goochland County at about the same time in the early 1700's. Has anyone since Lamb come up with more definitive proof of this descent?

Second Question. The identity of the wife or wives of Charles Christian, Ir. and the mother or mothers of his children is unsettled. The wife in his will is Mary and from other rather indefinite statements that "Mary Leake married Mr. Charles Christian" some people have taken it that this Mary was Mary Leake. On the other hand some records have it that Judith Woodson was the wife of Charles Christian, Jr. and the mother of his children. Both the Woodson name and the Leake name appear in the names of the descendants. Some of these conjectures come from the little-old-lady type of genealogist and I have not been able to get to any solid evidence on which to base a decision. Has anyone straightened out this question?

I will keep your Thomas Christian and James P. Christian in mind in my searches. When I search basic records such as censuses and indexes I extract in detail only that information bearing on persons known to be in my line. However, I also make brief notations on every entry of the name, whether in my line or not. I don't have these notations indexed and I did not pore over them for your request, but as I do go over them from time to time I will look for your Thomas and James.

I look forward to our further correspondence. You don't have to bother with stamped self addressed envelopes for me. I usually misplace them before I get around to answering anyway.

Dear Dr. Koenig:

Thank you so much for your Letter of December 3, 1969, and for the completed Family Group Records.

As you surmised, I am acquainted with Lamb's work (and as a matter of fact, have prepared a master chart from it to serve as a frame of reference). You are undoubtedly aware that it contains some errors as well as tremendous gaps even for a few of the early generations.

Like you, I study all Thomas' descendants. In addition, I am gathering material on all pre-1800 (hristians in the attempt to make definitive identification of each family group. To aid in this, I am compiling the names of all (hristians listed in the 1850 census records as well as indexing those articles and books which have been written about the family. It will be summer before the indexing is complete on Bailey's book and McClanahan's manuscript.

Although some (perhaps many) of his speculations are incorrect, Mc(lanahan's unpublished manuscript, Thomas (hristian of (harles (ity (ounty, Virginia, and Some of His Descendants, contains abstracts of more primary source materials than any other work on the family. Annie Walker Burns, who published a few of her (hristian family notes, gathered material for him for over twenty years before her death.

McClanahan surmises that the (harles who married (1) Judith Woodson and (2) Mary Leake was the son of John (hristian, son of Thomas. Frankly, It is just as likely that the Lineage you have deduced is correct. A careful study of some of

the early wills (which I am now cataloging) opens several additional possibilities. When all my notes are completely organized, I hope to have the answers to at least some heretofore unknowns.

The situation with "my" Thomas is similar to that with (harles. It was such a common name and there are so many conflicting reports that much care and study are required for positive identification. I have circumstantial evidence which would like Thomas to at least fifteen different fathers. One of the most promising possibilities is through Thomas (pristian III. Lamb carries this particular line only to his children: Anthony, Nathaniel, Thomas, Jesse, David, Luis, Archen, Mary, Susannah, and Elizabeth. Bailey's book follows Luis [Levis], and Wayne O'Neal has prepared a manuscript on the descendants of Anthony. I believe many of those who moved westvand to Tennessee, Kentucky, and western Virginia at an early date and loosely attributed to descent from Gilbert (hristian are actually from the above-mentioned group. In fact, I have proof that such is the case for some.

Finally, to get to your specific questions: Apparently there is no published material which effectively examines Lamb's conclusions on the supposed sons of Thomas (hristian, immigrant. I have evidence that a William (hristian also immigrated at about the same time as Thomas to the same area. There is also some evidence that they were closely related to several other early (hristian immigrants.

I can add nothing definitive to your identification of the wives of Charles Christian, In. You can be sure as I prepare the Family Group Records from my notes I will send you any information which might be significant. This part of my research will resume after the holiday season.

I should certainly be pleased to have you visit with me so that we can compare our (hristian records. It is so difficult to evaluate discrepancies and explore possibilities in a letter. (ornespondence seems to be effective only when one has specific, factual data to offer.

I really had not intended to write such a long letter with so few of the facts but wished to acquaint you with some of my projects. You seem to have amassed considerable data also, and I am particularly pleased to receive material from a systematic researcher. In fact, I was most interested in your numbering system. (ould you clarify for me?

Do Let me know when you are next in the Los Angeles area so that I can arrange to be available for a visit.

Here's my numbering system.

The numbers are the birth order in each family. Underlines mean female. First number is my childrens' parent, six underlined being my wife. Next number is her parent and so on back through the generations to the person being numbered. The slash mark denotes descent forward through the generations in the collateral lines. Thus the last number before the slash mark is the common ancestor. There are several other details of the system, such as handling cousin marriages, which I will tell you about when I see you. These numbers can be used like library classification numbers to numerically arrange any genealogical file.

It has been some time since we corresponded in 1969 about Christian genealogy, and I am wondering how you are coming with your "Index Christianus". I would like to hear about it.

I have not been to California since I wrote you and that rather than any diminution of interest is why I have not been to visit you. I hope to get there this summer on one of my projects. Meanwhile I am continuing my Christian studies...with dismay over the number of Christian descendants just of progenitor Thomas not to mention all the others who may be or might have been or in any case keep getting in the way.

I have at least partly resolved the question about the wives of Charles Christian jr. that I addressed to you in 1969. As you may know there are a number of heresay and vague statements concerning alledgedly two wives Judith Woodson and Mary Leake. As far as I had been able to discover none of these statements carried any proof of the relations. In fact some of them are puzzlingly ambiguous and indefinite. But just a few weeks ago in the National Archives I found an acceptable proof in the pension papers of Martha Patsey Walton Christian widow of Walter Christian son of Charles Christian Jr. (His brother, Dr. George, my wife's ancestor also married a Martha Walton, from the same Cumberland county but not the same gal.) Among the papers is a title page from a Bible the reverse of which details the marriage of Walter Christian son of Charles Christian and Mary Christian born 23 Sept. 1760, and the bride with her parents similarly. Down at the bottom of the page are four names written in a column: Charles Christian, Thomas Walton, Mary Leake, Phebe Murry. Not until I was on the plane on the way home did I realize that these had been written there as the ancestors of the bridal pair. In view of all the suggestions, hints and half-statements that Mary Leake was the wife of Charles Christian, this evidence has finally convinced me that she really was that, and that she was the mother of Walter. I still must prove that she was the mother of Dr. George, born two years later. And I still must find where Judith Woodson fits into the scheme and if she really does, whether before or after Mary.

By the way in one of my letters to you I stated that Mary occurred in his will. That is not correct. I have since obtained the will itself. Mary does not occur in it and the will has been misquoted so much by others that I hasten (after 3 years) to retract mine.

Do let me know how you are coming along.

Dear Dr. Koenig:

I was delighted to receive your recent letter and still hope that you will stop by for a visit in Santa Ana one of these days.

Little did I realize when I started the CHRISTIAN family projects that so many years would elapse before the first one even would be completed; however, such seems to be the nature of genealogy. Considerable progress has been made on several of them, and I hope to compile one volume for publication by the end of the year--finally!

Although many of the connections remain as elusive as ever, I have obtained additional documentation on a number of individuals. I am inclined to believe that Mary Leake was the mother of "your" Dr. George Christian since he was younger than Walter. Unfortunately, the will of Walter Leake (Will Book 7, page 279, Goochland County, Virginia) was written a few years too early for your purposes. He does mention his daughter Mary Christian, though. The will was written 31 October 1757 and probated 16 May 1758, according to one of my correspondents. Walter Leake was apparently the son of Josiah Leake and his third wife Anne Foster. Josiah's will is also in Goochland County.


I am virtually certain that the father of "my" Thomas Christian, born 1776-1780, was Allen Christian, born 22 May 1754 in Cumberland County, Virginia. At least, an increasing array of circumstantial evidence would so indicate. Allen's wife was Juda S. . As you know, Walter Christian married Martha "Patsey" Walton in Cumberland County, Virginia. When you were looking at Walter's Revolutionary War records at the National Archives, you might have seen those for Allen. I have photocopies. Although Allen's records reveal much about his migratory patterns, there is nothing in them to identify his wife's maiden name, his parents, or his children. Because of his birth in Cumberland County, I am inclined to believe that he is closely related to your line. As you know, it is difficult to find much material in that area since so many of the records of Cumberland County were destroyed.

After I return from a trip East (scheduled for later this month), I plan to concentrate my efforts on Cumberland and Goochland Counties as well as Prince Edward County, where Allen's son, Allen Christian, Ir., was born, and Bedford County, where Allen, Sr., was known to have lived following the Revolutionary War. for a period of about ten to fifteen years. In passing, you might be interested in knowing that there was a Walter Christian in Bedford County who could have been Allen's son. I hate to have so many "probably" and "perhaps" but have no alternative until proof is found.

Speaking of proof, do you have anything more on "your" Charles' parents?

I do not have any other evidences for Va. but I do for Wilcox, and have not thoroughly searched Madison Co., Ala. But I am sure there were no other residencies for Dr. George than the Goochland, Franklin, maybe Madison Ga., Madison Ala., and Wilcox.

Interesting to note a pattern: that when his wives died he would quickly grab up another from among the local girls and immediately head for another county. Among my remote Teutonic ancestors they called that marriage by capture.

Dear Agnes,

Congratulations on your "Christian Family Chronicles"!

It shows genealogical brilliance - e.g. deduction of a

Crockett tie, as well as editorial brilliance, e.g. achieving publication 4 months ahead of the publication date instead of 8 (or is it 20?) months after, by the brilliant device of simply changing the issue date on the cover!

I do hope that it will become a permanent periodical rather than an ephemeral as so many genealogical publications are, and I repeat my statement that you cannot accomplish that, at this level, for \$6...unless you have an angel.

When you disclose the deadline date for closing copy for the next issue I will send you some substantive material you may want to include. Meanwhile here; s a few maybe presumptious comments on some things I'd like to see you do.

- 1. I wish you had used $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ format. Off sizes like this one get lost on shelves, tucked in behind bigger volumes. Also if you went to $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$, and prescribed a decent left margin you could accept camera copy from contributors and not have to retype or reduce. I don't buy the ecology bit. If you think you'le Thave tensough sales so that the difference between large and small is going to affect the ecology.... then you are a dreamer. Of course I know you're from California.. and we have to make allowances for that.
- 2. Could you prescribe, for your On the Bookshelf section more bibliographic information appropriate to rare books and manuscripts, which is mostly what you will be listing, even for published works. Researchers seeking this rare material would like to see: manuscript, typescript, offset, printed?,,,, page size? number of pages?,,,,date of issuance?,,,,, publisher and address, or holder of the material and address (except for widely available published works),,,, availability of work for inspection, excerpting, copying?

3. I hate to see you get into the volume and number system for a periodical that only issues twice a year. For a monthly with say 600 pages per volume that's ok, but you're only going to have 150 pages per volume (unless, perish forbid, you're not making volumes coterminous with calendar years). Bibliographically it would be a lot simpler to just have serial numbers, #1, #2, #3..etc., with the date... extending indefinitely. Much easier to reference, and less chance for error in citation.

I have a couple of questions....

I look forward to your promised printing of the 1743 Thomas Christian will. I do not have my own copy, but this thing is getting a bit messed up in repatition and I'd like to see it straight. Lamb (WMQ 5,262) has it dated 230ct 1743, recd. 20 Mar 1743/4. You, p.38, have it 20 Oct 1743 and 20 Mar. 1743/4. Bailey, p. 46 has it 23 Oct 1742 and 20 Mar 1743/4.. and on p. 50 "copied from the original" 23 Oct 1742/3 (sic) and 20 Mar 1743.

On p. 51 you have a helpful note on 7mo, 11 mo, etc. If you count back from Feb. as 11mo, you get April as 1mo, and thus March as 12mo. My question what "mo" do you, or did they attach to the 7 days from Mar 25 -Mar 31? It cant be 12mo because it's in the next year. It cant be 1mo because that's April. Maybe they just took a vacation from writing anything down between Mar 25 and Mar 31. You've got 10mo to come up with the answer.

NUMBERING AND ARRANGING SYSTEM FOR GENEALOGICAL RECORDS by Louis Koenig, Amateur Genealogist

Route 10 Box 108, San Antonio, Texas, 78216

In #1, January 1979, of these Christian Family Chronicles readers will have noticed a set of numbers associated with the descent of Archie H. Christian, p. 18. Archie Christian is a valued collaborator of mine in the work, "The Descendants of Charlou's Ancestors", described in the On the Bookshelf section of this issue, and the numbers are the "DCA Numbers" which are used for arranging genealogical records in that work which comprise a sheet or sheets for each individual and each marriage. It seems worthwhile to explain this system so that it may be used by others in their own work.

In doing so I recognize that I may be impinging on the activities of others who may offer numbering systems on a commercial basis. I have not investigated other systems since I have been using this one, as my collaborators and correspondents know, for over 25 years.

Since "The Descendants..." studies both the ascending and the descending lines the numbering and arranging system provides for both these directions, numbering ancestors back to the common ancestor and ten numbering collateral lines down to the particular descendant, and providing for the orderly arrangement and retrieval of all of them. However, lest this article become too long only the descending line system is described here. If there is enough interest the ascending line portion can be described in a later issue.

The basic single- or double- digit number assignment of each individual is the birth order number in the family, ("family" with some modifications as described beyond.) If the birth order number for an individual is known he is assigned that single- or double-digit number. If it is unknown he is assigned an alphabetic letter at the guessed or arbitrary position, i.e. a = 1, b = 2, etc.

If the information is available the alphabetic and the numeric can be intermixed. For example, 1,b,c,4 represents a child known to be the first child, a child known to be the fourth child, and second and third children whose order is not known.

Illustrating up to this point: the John Christian,
#4 in the Archie descent, is the second child of a fifth
child of a third child James Christian, and is numbered 352.
(Note: this is to be read as "three, five, two", not
"three hundred and fifty two".)

If the birth order is not known and if the compiler has given up on ever determining the correct order then the alphabetics called for by the rule may be replaced by numbers assigned arbitrarily. For example, the actual birth order sequence for the four sons of Thomas Christian is not known and probably never will be known, but they are assigned numbers in an arbitrary sequence, or by the order listed in a will, or the like. The purpose of the alphabetics in place of the numbers is to signify an uncertainty which may later be removed, i.e. changed to a number, without too much changing of the other numbers and the arrangement.

Females are designated by an underline. For example: Mary, the fifth child of John Christian (352), is designated 3525.

When the birth order number comprises two digits it is distinguished from successive single-digit numbers by extending the underline under both digits. For males the same is accomplished by a tie over the digits. Example: 35212 would be a female 12th child of a second child.

3521 2 would be a spend child of a first child pf a second child.

So much for the simple application of the system.

The arrangement of individual sheets in a file follows that well known from the Dewey Decimal System arrangement in libraries. (For those not familiar with that system it should be noted that this is NOT in the order of the magnitude of the numbers considered as quantities.) It is best explained by an (arbitrary) example:

is that the second is the first cousin once removed of the That is, the count (minus one) from the common ancestor to equal positions indicates the degree of cousinship, and the count beyond the equal point indicates the degree of removal.

Descent Numbering from In-Line Cousin Marriages

The complication in this so-far straightforward system comes from in-line cousin marriages, which in Christian genealogy abound, layers of them, even unto the fourth generation. When 212 marries 226 the problem is how to number their children. The system is designed to group parents and children closely together in a family pattern.

But when mother and father occupy separated locations in the arrangement, clearly something has to give. If the system outlined were strictly followed, children of in-line cousin marriages would be found following either the mother or the father depending on which had the earlier position in the number heirarchy, a random occurrence. In a society that is quondam patriarchal and still patronymic this would cause confusion, so the rule is adopted that children of in-line cousin marriages are always numbered as descended from the father.

In the full extension of this system special symbols attached to the numbers designate the mothers and children involved in such in-line cousin marriages. (In DCA the individual sheets contain notations as to such cousin marriages, and also to not-in-line cousin marriages if known.)

Illustrating f, the arrangement around a 212 = 226 in-line cousin marriage would be as follows:

The 2261, 2262, etc., are the children of the marriage 212 = 226, but numbered under the father.

Descent Humbering with Plural Marriages

Plural marriages further complicate the cousin complication. Not-in-line plural marriages simply follow the rule for sequential numbering of children.

Illustrating: 'jin Archie Christian's lineage, #1 p. 18, (35) the children of William Christian's second marriage to Susanna Brown do not there bear the proper birth order numbers. They should be: 3, 4, 5, etc. representing the sequence of William Christian's children, regardless of the mothers. (For those working on the Susanna Brown lineage, they would be numbered 1,2,3 etc. William Christian's first two children not being part of that line.)

If the husband in a plural in-line cousin marriage has prior or subsequent marriages there is no complication, since his children are numbered sequentially by the rule. It is when the wife in such an in-line cousin marriage has children by prior or subsequent marriages that the complication arises. Again, for consistency, we take it that it is the female who pays. The children of the wife in such a case are numbered, by the rule, in the sequence of their birth to her in all marriages... but those children from the in-line marriage comprise a gap in her number set and are numbered, by the rule, as children of the in-line father. - Illustrating: Emily Christian, 212, marries (1) John Notinline and has 2 children. marries (2) Mark Christian (1), 226, and has 3 children. Finally she marries (3) William Notinline and has 2 children.... a total of 7 children of Emily, 212. ADDENDUM TO THE FOREGOING

At the request of your Editor, a lineage chart using the DCA system is included in this issue for convenient reference. Unfortunately it is the chart she has asked for on numerous occasions and this is the chart of Charlou's ancestors in the <u>ascending</u> line, the similar numbering system for which was to be deferred to a later article if there was sufficient interest. However if the chart is to be included some rudimentary explanation, of the ascending line system is demanded.

The numbers at the left are the DCA numbers for Charlou's ancestors. Reading from left to right they show the birth order numbers of his ancestors in successive gemerations. Thus his mother was a 6th child, her father a 7th child, and his mother, her grandmother, a 1st child, thus Charlou's great grandmother is 671.

The handling of in-line cousin marriages in the ascending line is even more complicated than in the descending line, and this is one of the reasons for deferral of the ascending line description. For the same reason we go back to 671 57, George Asbury Christian, to illustrate how the ascending line is tied to correlative descending lines, as follows.

The 671 57 represents the line of ancestors of Charlou back to George Asbury Christian. If the digits are reversed: 75 1 76 they represent the descent of Charlou (implied following the 6) from George Asbury Christian. In the same way the digits 72112 represent Enrice V. Ohristian (Stady), as accomplished

72153 represent another descendant of George Asbury Christian, actually Christian (Stady), as shown by the positions a third cousin to Charlou's mother, 6. To relate these two in an arrangement system they are combined with a slash (/) after the common ancestor. or for visual impact around the common ancestor: 671 5/7/2153. In the arrangement heirarchy the slash (following) serves the same function as the decimal point in the Dewey Decimal Classification. Illustrating, with fewer digits for convenience, the arrangement would be

Note that there is a gap where the 1st child of the 4th generation ancestor; would appear... because that 1st child is himself and ancestor and appears in place farther up the line. 5217/1 is equal to 521, that is, is the 1st child of 5217.

Note also that as each ancestor is added to the line all of his correlative descendants are grouped together following him before the next higher ancestor appears.

Dear Mr. Bradley,

I am pleased to have your letter of July 20 and to learn of your interest in Christian genealogy. Your inquiry has spurred me to yet another attack on the problem of the family of Charles Christian, jr., him of the 1784 Goochland will. a puzzle for me over the past 25 years or so. My recalcitrance against the rather casual conception of other genealogists, including some of the little old grey-haired ladies variety, came from my reluctance to accept Lucy Constitute was a Woodson and Judith Woodson Daniel as children of Charles Christian jr. However as a result of my most recent expolrations and deductions I now, with still a bit of reluctance, accept that construction. I am preparing some articles that Mrs. Pearlman may wish to publish on the matter addressed in your letter, namely, (1) Jud ith Woodson as the first wife of Charles Christian jr, (2) Mary Leake as the second wife, (3) a reasonable assignment of the 13 children between these two wives, (4) Charles Christian jr of the 1784 Goochland will as the son of Charles Christian sr. of Westover Parish, Charles City County.

Pending that I answer your questions as follows.

The documents I have show almost without doubt that Jr. was indeed the son of Sr., that is the Charles of the 1784 will was the son of the Charles City Charles. Only lacking for full proof is an inquiry, which I am making, as to whether there was another Charles in Goochland between 1754 and 1784... I have not found any yet.

That Mary Leake was the wife of Jr. by 1757 is definitely proven. Uncertain is just when, before that, the marriage occurred and therefore just where the children of Judith end and those of Mary begin.

That there was a prior marriage to Judith Woodson is what I have just convinced myself of and now accept, and will present the evidence for.

That your Lucy Christian and Judith (Chrostian) Daniel were children of Judith Woodson is highly likely, and I will present evidence therefore. You can help me on that if you have the birth date of Lucy. Indeed I ask you, for a starter, to fill out for me the enclosed form of mine for your Lucy, giving your references for the facts presented, if you can, on the reverse.

Finally as for the "family" of Mary Leake and Judith Woodson I have the former way back into England, &s. alas, they are descendants of my childrens' ancestors which is what I am studying. Of Judith Woodson I have, as part of diping all this out, back to the emigrant ancestor four generations removed from her.

I am glad to share anything I have with you and will ask that you reciprocate that.

Did I ever mention to you that I believe the order generally given for the sons of Charles Christian of the 1783 Goochland County, Virginia, will should be revised to the following: 1. Charles, 2. John, 3. Elijah, 4. Turner, 5. William, 6. Walter, and 7. George. Although Charles first mentions William, Walter, and George in his will, I believe that he was there providing for his youngest three sons. Later on in the will he lists them all in the order I have shown above. If this proves to be the case, then William was younger than sometimes supposed. I recently mentioned this to Coy K. Johnston, and he agrees that analysis of the will would seem to bear this out. Have you any opinion on this theory?

Now for the next question: Which John Christian was the son of Charles of above will? Can you identify parents of the following men named John Christian?

John Christian, born about 1750, married 1770 Mary Harvey.

John Christian, born probably before 1750, married 3 February 1768 Mary Maynard.

John Christian, born about 1752, married 9 May 1771 Judith Leake.

Do you know which of the first two left heirs in Franklin County, Georgia, after his death about 1805?

I hope work is progressing satisfactorily on your article about Charles Christian and that you can spare a few moments to comment on the above. Thanks a million!

Dear Agnes,

My apologies for not sooner replying to your quick questions of Nov. 19th. My excuse: I don't have anything to give you anyway.

Re the birth order of the sons of Charles of the 1783 will. I am still working on it and do not have a complete opinion. I have not perused as many wills as you have but I do not believe the order in a will can be taken for the birth order... it may be that and it may not be, and my impression is that one cannot make probability statements such as e.g. in 90% of the wills it is, and in 10% it isn't, so if you don't know anything else accept that it is. I believe it's more like a 50/50 chance and therefore you just can't make a statement one way or the other.

We have definitive birth dates only for Walter and George and from the marriage dates of some of the siblings we know that there were a number older than these two. I have for the present accepted them as among the youngest sons, if not the youngest, and indeed among the youngest children though I'm less secure about the latter.

Your thought that he first mentions William, Walter and George because he was providing for his youngest sons is a reasonable one and I do not dispute As for William, we have Lamb who has him m. Martha Evans, and Douglas Register who has their son John, b. 28 Aug 1783. We have another son Turner who m. Mary Ann Utley in 1820. If this Turner preceded John he would have been more than 38 when he married. This being unlikely (my present dictum is that 20 is the most likely age at first marriage of men in those days) I conclude that Turner was not older than John, and probably considerably younger. This judgement is confirmed by the fact that he died in 1872, making a birth about 1800 about right for him. OK, so now we have no known child of William before 1783, so if we take a guess that there were none, we have William marrying in 1782 (another dictum: they didn't waste no time having the first child). So a marriage in 1782 implies a birth about 1762. Also, though about this I'm not secure, William inherited or rather was willed land in the 1783 will and if it is true (that's what I'm not secure about) that they didn't will land outright to minors this would also have William of age by 1783 and thus b. 1762 or before. There's room for William between Walter 9/23/1760 and George 9/26/1762 but that's pushing it. Since as late as 1763 is out I place William a little before 1760.

All this evidence has been available for some time and somebody besides me must have put it together before. So I ask for the source of your statement that William was "younger than sometimes supposed".... or rather where do you get the "sometimes supposed".

Incidentally Lamb has the William land in Amelia County and a number of succeeding genealogists including professionals have parrotted this fact. If you look at the will itself it clearly says Amherst, or specifically, Amhers.

It's stuff like this that makes genealogy so damn irritating.

Dear Agnes,

Hodidays or no holidays I am delighted that you challenge me on William Christian, as challenge is the way that research progresses. Even more delighted that you challenge me CORRECTLY for if you show me wrong you advance my knowledge and understanding of the matter. I confine this letter to the one subject of William Christian.

You are correct, and I apologize for sending you on a wild goose chase through Lamb. Lamb does NOT say that William son of Charles was the one who m. Martha Evans, and I was mistaken to say so.

I send you my sheet(s) on William whence you can see my sources, and that, though not very clear, my source for the son of Charles marrying Martha Evans(?) was John Tyler Christian in Virkus, vol 2, p. 284. My practice: for the very first chronologically of my sources I do not place a reference number on the record; additional information beyond this first is referenced. You will see that Tyler Christian is my source that William, his almostor, m. Martha, maybe Evans indicated in the ref. 1 by Martha (Evans?). When this marriage of a William to a Martha Evans was confirmed by Ref 7, Douglas Register I erased the question mark. That he moved to Ky and his will was recorded in 1828 also comes from John Tyler Christian, though he does not exactly say that the will was recorded in Ky., but I take that to be so.

That there was a William, son of Charles, inheriting land in Amherst comes from Ref. 3 Charles will, superceding the second hand info, partially incorrect in Lamb.

That William son of Charles was he who m. Martha Evans I take again from John Tyler Christian Ref. 1

Now from Ref. 4 you will see that Ihonored the statements of John Tyler Christian because he was a famous historian and archaeologist and since he gives his ancestry I assumed he was as trustworthy as a family genealogist, of himself no less, as he was as a professional inquiring into things that happened 17 to 30 centuries prior to the Virginia events in his family history.

Alas, you see from Ref. 6 that I had to retract that judgement, on the basis there stated. Now you give me some more reason to distrust the professional level of John Tyler Christian as a genealogist. I guess this is not too surprising. Being a renowned scholar in the mid 1800's, especially renowned among church people for church histroy, does not mean that his performance would stand up judged by mid 1900's standards for historical accuracy. In addition you have 7 Oct 1821 for the marriage of Turner and Mary Ann Utley which contradicts John Tyler Christian's date of

1820.... another black mark for John Tyler.

Finally if the Martha Evans William Christian was the son of Charles we have some explaining, though not impossible, to do over the fact that Charles' will dated 18 Sept. 1783 in Goochland says of William: "if he die without issue", whereas we know that the Martha Evans William already at that date had issue, a son John, born 28 Aug. 1783, 21 days before, in Goochland. The rationale to explain that might be (a) the old man didn't know of the existence of his grandson born 21 days ago in the same county, (b) he was writing in the same "if my 21 day old grandson dies before my son William, or (c) in the sense 'my grandson born 21 days ago having laready died an infant and I do not know that my son William will have any more children."... all very far fetched, and not knowing anything to the contrary I rule out as least probable.... i.e. least probable over the contender theory that the Martha Evans William Christian was not the son of Charles.

OK, so I wipe out the proposition that William husband of Martha Evans, father of John was the son of Charles, but I accept the proposition, from John Tyler Christian, that Willam husband of Martha Evans was also the father of Turner and thus John Tyler Christian's ancestor.

You know, even at the standards of 100 years ago (and John Tyler didn't die till 1925) I just can't feel happy about Johnn Tyler not knowing the immediate ancestry of his own grgrfather, only 3 kgenerations removed, who dies only 26 years before John Tyler was born, and coming out with erromeous information in a biographical dictionary.

I have some second hand info that there is a will, Charles City, 8/21/1805 of a William B. Christian who had a brother Turner, a wife Elizabeth, and 3 youngest children William, John, Turner., Note that William son of Charles had a brother Turner, and William m. Martha Evans had children JOhn and Turner. So this guy is an unwelcome confusion.. a hybrid of the two Williams. However I don't equate him with either of them, and seek another ancestry for him, since neither of the two Williams were associated with Charles City, both associated with Goochland and maybe Amherst... and of course certainly not the fellow who d. 1828 no matter what.

Thanks for straightening me out. I'll drop the Martha Evans William from my records for now, until I can have proof that he is a dca. (I know his ancestor Andrew as you give it is not yet demonstrated to be a dca despite the efforts in that direction of Doshier and others.)

Finally in father Caps. jr's will 1783 William is given certain land (in Amherst Co. by the way and not in Amelia Co. which is stated by Lamb and parrotted by practically everybody including professional genealogists ever since) which if" he die without lawful issue of his body" is to be divided between Walter and George. But Col, William already had such issue, Priscilla b. 1770, and possibly others by 1783 when Chas. jr. wrote the will. Therefore will cannot refer to Col. William and Col. William is not son of Charles jr.
- 5. Demonstration that this William is not a William Christian who according to L.C. Christian WMQ15, 198, 1907 (in DOCS) "was captured by the British and starved to death on a British vessel". If that Wm. starved to death on a British vessel it must have been before Yorktown in Oct. 1781 and this leaves only the unlikely possibility that father Chas. jrwas still uncertain of his death or whereabouts when he write his will in Sep. 1783. Also of course starvation is contrary to all the evidence in 1 above.

Re trustworthiness of John Tyler Christian on the basis that he was scholar, historian, archaeologist: I retract it, ca. 1979; In that boigraphy he has the 1657 Thomas patent in Charles City Co., when actually it was in James City; and be equates the 1657 patent Thomas with the 1687 patent Thomas (whom I now beloeve to be a next generation).

8. Ltr from Agnes Pearlman 12/13/79 and my reply 12/20/79 indicates (q.v.) evidence contradictory to John Tyler Christian's that William m. Martha Evans was not the son of Charles but was the son of Andrew identified by Doshier as father of the John m. Judith Pate, and other siblings.

My evidence for this William as son of Charles comes only from John Tyler (1) and as I have less and less faith in the accuracy of John Tyler I drop the William m. Martha Evans from proven dca for now.

The question now is: what DID happen to William son of Charles? The demonstration of (5) that "he starved to death on a British vessel" as contrary to the evidence in (1) from John Tyler now loses validity since I now no longer equate the William who d. 1828 with the William son of Charles. It is therefore possible that he did starve to death on a British vessel during the Revolution and his father dodn't know about it when he wrote his will just about 6 months after first news of the peace treaty reached the U.S. (in March 1783). Some propose that the British vessel was in the War of 1812. Though we now no longer have any date evidence for William's birth around 1760, if we-take the will conjunction with Walter and George to signify a younger son, then Wm would have been over 50 about 1812.... which seems mighty old for service. There are 3 Wm's from Va. in the 1812 Service Records, one of them from Augusta Co and probably from the Gil bert et al line. The other two in 68th Va Militia when it was stationed around York... may be ours.. neees further study.

So much for my opinion "on this theory" that you ask for presuming the "rheory" being that William, Walter and George were among the youngest sons. If you are asking my opinion on the revised birth order 1 to 7 in your letter... except for 5, 6, 7 I don't have any. I do have a current listing of the present status of my knowlegige of the birth dates of all the children, but it consusts mostly of "before this", "before that". You will understand that this is something I am working on in the attempt to allocate the children among Judith Woodson and Mary Leake. That is a whole other story not appropriate in a "quick reply".

Now as for the Johns. I am lost. I do not know which of your Johns or of any other Johns was the son of Charles. I used to be very suspicious of Lamb's statement that John, son of Charles (1783 Charles) m. Judith Leake, because at that time I thought if Charles had had any children by Judith Woodson it was only the two, Judith and Lucy. Therefore the John must have been the son of Mary Leake and Lamb would then have him marrying his own blood aunt. NOW I have admitted the possibility that John, son of Charles, was not the son of Mary but of Judith... in which case it's not too bad to have him marrying the sister of his stepmother. So it's all up in the air with me and I do not know which of the many Johns was in Franklin Co. Ga.

Back to birth orders and Coy Johnston. In his article he is honoring listing order, in McClanahan especially, as birth orders. I put very little trust in listing orders in wills or biographies as being authentic birth orders unless specifically so stated.

And finally just for your information as to where I stand nowadays: I finally, after 20 years of resistance, have admitted McClanahan, bless him, among my sources for DCA and have started including some of his information therein. However my position is this: Anything in Lamb I accept as true unless there is some evidence to the contrary. Nothing in McClanahan do I accept as true unless it has been proven by other direct evidence. I use McClanaham simply as a clue that such other evidence may exist. And we all should much appreciate (though not laud) the efforts of both of them.

Post-finally: I thought I was about to sew it up that the Charles of the 1783 will was the loving son Charles of Charles of Westover Parish of 1754 both of Goochland. I have since found, to my suprise, that there were so many other Charles' floating around that I can't be definitive yet.

No worth doing anything about unless somebody complains but you ahve juggled one of my numbers in vol 2, p. 102. When I say George AsburyChristian m (1) Elizabeth Applewhite Jordan it means (a) that was his first marriage and (b) there were subsequent ones. When I say Amanda Mizabeth Jane Christian m. Martin Shofner (1) it means she married him as his first wife and he had subsequent wives. The way you've got it makes it that she married him as her first husband.... and while that's strictly true it doesn't gibe with my usage for she had no subsequent husbands.

Coy Johnston says, p. 104 McIntosh citing the Bible record of Ira Christian named the seven sons of Charles Christian... etc, re birth order. I have seen the McIntosh work, in a later edition than Johnston cites, but apparently unchanged in the essential we are considering since on the same page as Johnston cites, 388 et. seq. there is indeed mention and excerpts from the Ira Christian bible. But nothing on these pages says that this Bible names the seven sons of Charles Christian. McIntosh Does have the seven sons but there is no indication in McINtosh that these came from the Ira Christian bible. What gives? Or did I miss something buried elsewhere in McIntosh that 1 inks the seven son listing with the Bible?

Dean Louis:

Thank you for your response to my various questions concerning Charles Christian and his children. You did not mention, however, when you expected to submit your article about this group. If you have any idea when it will be, I would appreciate your letting me know so that I will be in a position to schedule publication along with other articles which will allow a balanced issue of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES.

One other question arises as a result of your comments about Charles' son William. You say, "As for William, we have Lamb who has him m. Martha Evans, and Douglas Register who has their son John, b. 28 Aug 1783. We have another son Turner who m. Mary Ann Utley in 1820. If this Turner preceded John he would have been more than 38 when he married. . . ." My question: Where does Lamb identify Charles' son William as the one who married Martha Evans? I reviewed my copy of Lamb's article (which is the reprint, however) and do not find anything which would identify which William was Charles' son. Where does Lamb give that information?

Before leaving the subject of William Christian, son of Charles Christian, I am beginning to wonder if L. C. Christian might not have been correct in his statement that William was "captured by the British and starved to death on a British vessel." He does not say when, but the likelihood would have been the War of 1812 since Charles included William in his will. William would have been L. C. Christian great-great uncle.

Now to try to answer a few of your questions: My statement that William was "younger than sometimes supposed" is simply based on his placement in the family by most of the correspondents who have mentioned him. It is my impression that they relied on the order within Charles Christian's will. There were so many individuals named William who participated in the Revolutionary War that I believe the services attributed by descendants to their ancestors often confuse the various men with the same name.

I have never seen the McIntosh reference used by Coy Johnston. I did recheck the manuscript sent by Johnston to see if I might have made an editorial change which could have changed the sense of his original (something I try to avoid); however, this particular quotation is exactly as he sent it. I therefore do not have the answer if the sons were not mentioned by McIntosh. My speculation is that the confusion arises as a result of the inferences which can be made about the antecedents. The section seems to imply that Ira Christian's Bible contained information about the seven sons of Charles Christian whereas it is McIntosh only who lists them. I will let you know if such is not the case if I receive information to the contrary from Coy Johnston.

My apologies for juggling the placement of the number beside name of Martin Shofner. I should have known that its location after his name was not accidental but quite intentional. Since I believe that genealogical journals particularly should be as accurate as possible, I will include your explanation and correction in the next issue. The distinction is quite important. Had I been familiar with your usage, the error obviously would not have been made.

Regarding the parentage of the Charles Christian of the 1783 will: I believe that a careful reading of the deeds of Goochland County, Virginia, would establish whether whether he was, in fact, the son of Charles Christian, Sr. Just as with the numerous individuals named Thomas Christian or William Christian, etc., so it is with Charles Christian; and I agree that it is often difficult to determine with certitude which is which.

That's about enough for one day. Best wishes for a happy holiday season.

I am pleased to hear from you for two reasons (1) I can give some unequivocal answers to some of your queries, and (2) you may be a descendant of my children ancestors and thus may add to my compilation of the history of this family.

As to (2), if you are indeed a descendant of one of the ancestors on the lineage chart you saw I wonder if you would give me an indication of the line back to that ancestor and also, as a start, fill in for me one of my reword sheets, enclosed. Believe they are self-explanatory. I have one for every Christian descendant, and am quite willing to share the information with others.

As to (1). There were two Martha, Patty or Patsey Waltons, both from Cumberland County, probably related though not yet demonstrated demonstrated by me, and each married a Christian brother. The Martha Walton on my chart was the daughter of Edward Walton of Cumberland Co. and Nancy Murray, Murrey, Murry, even Mursey, most likely Murray, born 21 Apr. 1768 or maybe 1769 Cumberland Co., married George Christian 27 Aug. 1782 maybe in Cumberland Co. sold George's inherited land in St. James Northam Parish, Goochland, 6 Aug. 1785 and presumably soon thereafter left for Wilkes later Franklin Co., Ga, where she died 14 Feb. 1811.

The other Martha, the one whose pension application you have, was the daughter of Thomas Walton and Phoebe Murry (maybe Murray) of Cumberland, boen 1(?) Dec. 1766 Cumberland, married Walter brother of George, 31 July 1783 in Cumberland, went immediately thereafter back to Goochland with husband, removed eventually to Amherst where she made the pension application you have in 1840... from pension papers W6669 in the National Archives.

It is very likely that eventually I will demonstrate the common ancestor of Edward and Thomas Walton above, but I've not done so yet. Only a little less likely that there is a common ancestor of Nancy and Phoebe Murray. But there is absolutely no questioning the fact that the two Martha Waltons were different women and as I have described above, even though each was known as Martha, Patty and Patsey.

The Judith Woodson who witnessed the marriage of Walter and Martha was NOT the half sister of George and Walter. That girl, Judith Woodson Christian, was already by 1790 in Granville Co., N.C., the wife of Chesley Daniel. The judith Woodson of the pension application was Judith Leake, daughter of Josiah Leake and Ann Fenton of Rocky Spring, Goochland. She married Charles Woodson, son of Drury Woodson and Lucy Christian (who WAS a half sister of Walter and George) 23 Sep. 1780 and was still living in Cumberland in 1850.

I have never found any evidence for an Asbury family name amongst the Christians and am convinced that they all came via Bishop Asbury.

Dear Agnes,

When I wrote you that note dated March 21, I had not yet come upon your detective work in the Elüsive Connections Department on Thomas and Rebecca. Congratulations on that too. You are a careful and ingenious investigator. Salute.

I want to send you something on the Edmund New business, but first I need some clarification from you. On page 184, 7th line from the bottom you suddenly throw in a marriage between John Prior and Mary New. Did they skip a few lines in your manuscript? I don't find anything in your article that indicates this marriage. Please straighten me out.

Do you know that there are $\underline{\text{two}}$ Edmund New wills? That's what I want to write up for you.

I would like to suggest that if the CFC is to be a scholarly publication you adhere to the practice of giving the documentary references to the mention of documents, as in other historical research presentations. For example, when you say "Shortly before the inventory of his estate was recorded in August 1744, Rebecca Christian, Executrix, filed suit ... etc.".... if you would insert or footnote the volume and page(s) and date it would make it a lot easier for researchers like me and others to find the suit or other documentation... as well as assuring those who don't go to the trouble of looking it up for themselves that you really do have a bona fide source.

Dear Louis:

Thank you for your letters of March 21 and 22 and for your congratulatory remarks. They are appreciated!

I am pleased, too, to have your response to Frank Asbury Christian regarding the two women named Martha Walton who married different Christian men. My records confirm what you told him.

Regarding the Murray/Murry/Maury/Murrey surname: As soon as I have more time for research again, I will be pursuing information on individuals with that name since it is likely that I have a Murray line on my paternal side. Considerable circumstantial evidence would seem to indicate that "my" David M. Lewis, born about 1782-3 in North Carolina, died 16 May 1867 in Franklin County, North Carolina, married 13 February 1815 Mary N. Yarborough, was the son of a George Lewis and his first wife Sarah Murray, daughter of James and ?Frances (_____) Murray. I realize that this is probably not one of the lines on which you have anything but mention it on the chance that you might have something to offer.

Since you indicate that there might be a delay in sending your Charles Christian paper, I hope that you will take the time to answer one or two questions in the interim. Who, at present, seem to you to be his children? Whom do you believe they married? If you think that Mikk Judith Woodson Paniel and Judy Lacy are both daughters, could you send a few words of explanation? You have no idea how contradictory and confusing my notes have become on these women named Judith. Unfortunately, I have not had the time to check a sufficient number of original records to confirm or refute correspondents' observations. I would value your opinion on this matter and would not quote you on anything which you consider speculation.

I also value your suggestions regarding documentation in the pages of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES and will probably resolve my ambivalent feelings about the matter along the lines you suggest; that is, by including pertinent documentation in each issue. The problems and disadvantages to such an approach might not be readily apparent to you, so a few words of explanation might be in order.

Foremost among considerations is to cover as many branches of the family as possible in each issue and to make even installment articles as complete as possible within the

limits of each installment. I try to meet this within a 12-page issue and have managed to succeed in holding to 12 pages once-with the first issue. Something obviously has to give, and, as explained in that first issue, one of the choices was to furnish references to installment articles following the last installment of a series. For the average article, adding truly complete footnotes and references in every issue would add about a page (more or less) per article-more than could be added without limiting the number of articles more than subscribers would find acceptable (too many would have to wait too long to see something on their branches of the family).

In a feature such as "Migrations" of the length in Volume No. III, an additional four to six pages would have been required to furnish specific references. It was my belief that a reader interested in anyone of the individuals mentioned could readily verify the data since name, place, and time were listed in each case. Types of sources were given in the introduction. In retrospect, perhaps it might have been better to have limited the number of entries by shortening the time-span and given the sources following each entry.

As for the missing references in "Elusive Connections--Thomas and Rebecca Christian Identities," these I had planned to include in a Footnote in the next issue since I literally ran out of space with that article. That article had not been scheduled until the next issue. At the last minute when I needed a "filler" to have page sizes of the masters come out right, I decided that it might be a good one to follow the wills themselves--wills referred to in the article. A later publication date would have allowed me time to do a little more research on the New connection.

Enclosed is copy of the sheet of references from the Goochland County, Virginia, Court Order and Minutes Books abstracted last year and used to prepare the Volume III "Elusive Connections." As mentioned, these references will be appearing as Footnotes.

You were quite astute to pick up the fact that a line of type was missing on page 184. Like so much of "Elusive Connections," it was a line of qualifiers but did make the information presented make more sense. The lines should have read:

and a John Prior were engaged in a joint land transaction as early as 1714, indicating that there could have been a relationship such as that of brothers-in-law. If so, their marriages to the New sisters probably preceded that date. . . .

I am not certain that it was this John Prior who was the husband of Mary New, only that it was possible. Have you anything to add to this?

This letter is somewhat long-winded, but I hope that it answers your questions. I expect to be in Salt Lake City for a week of research in May so would appreciate any suggestions you might have regarding records which could be checked. Of course, I already have a lengthy list but would not want to return home and find that I had missed a significant and readily available discovery.

I forgot to mention earlier that I have never visited the court house in Goochland County, Virginia, but believe that the original documents to which the court minutes refer might contain valuable data. I know of no packets which have yet been placed on microfilm but do know that an amazing number of details can be found therein. At least, I have found it so in those counties where I have had the opportunity personally to inspect such records (usually housed in the basement or attic). Have you any idea whether they have been kept in Goockland County?

By the way, do let me know if there are any references not yet given or scheduled for CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES that you believe should definitely appear in a footnote, and I will oblige.

Again, regarding Goochland County, Virginia, records: I abstracted all Christian references between 1728 and 1765 which were indexed under the name Christian in the Court Order and Minute Books so have much more than the ones used for "Elusive Connections." I did not, however, read all the minutes so am sure that there are many more references to the surname contained within the minutes themselves. I also abstracted all references to any Joseph and/or Rebecca Smith between 1728 and 1765 as well as all references to Smith between 1743 and 1755.

Slowly but surely, I hope to publish everything in the pages of the CHRONICLES. I have so much that I can't begin to guess how long it will take. When I say "everything," I mean what I have in my voluminous files.

Herewith the "sooner the better" draft of my article on the strange wills of Edmund New, as requested. Note that I still have some research to do on it. Just hang on to this draft and if I do not have a lot of other changes I will simply send you the missing portion (about Charleston Parish) when I finish my research and you can use the whole for your insertion. If there is anything I have said that you can add to or correct before publication just let me know.

Note that these documents do not shed any light on the identity of the husband of Mary (New) Rim Prior that you ask about. I do not have any other information on that matter. I would not dispute your theory, on your basis, that it was John.

One additional correction to your Thomas and Rebecca

One additional correction to your Thomas and Rebecca paper, not connected with the Edmund New wills. The 1657 patent was in James City county, not Charles City. Land west ofthe Chickahominy was at one time in James City County but no land east of the Chickahominy was ever in Charles City Gounty or in its predecessor Charles City Corporation.

It is quite likely that the Murray family is among the descendants of Charlou's ancestors and is to be included in my researches. Just have not got to it yet, and hope you do first. I believe the orthodox form of the name must be Murray, since many of the descendants have that in their names for several generations.

I have never been in a Virginia courthouse and know nothing about the condition of the records.

The children of Charkes Christian of the 1783 will I take to be those mentioned in the will and no others. I used to think that Judith Woodson Daniel and Lucy Woodson must be stepdaughters, nieces of what not. Now that I am accepting Judith Woodson as the first wife of Charles I believe that they are children of this first wife. It was to establish how many other of the choldren were from her that I undertook my Charles search that has resulted in my now not even being sure that the 1783 Charles was the son of the Westover Parish Charles.
...And indeed whether some of the people I have followed down into Georgia, Elijah for example, were really the people in the will. Just recently, you recall, you knocked the William m. Martha Evans out of that category for me.

The statement of Miss A. Josephine Cox (WMQ, 13,209,1905) unequivovally establishes for me that Judith Woodson Christian Daniel, the Judith Woodson Daniel of the will, and Judith Christian Lacy were half-sisters. I struggled with the Judith Woodson Daniel and the Lucy Woodson of the will treated so anomalously therein, as being daughters of a sister of Charles and even daughters of Charles wife by a former husband named Woodson. But the simplest theory is that they were

the daughters of Charles by a first wife and I finally admit that that was Judith Woodson m. about 1730. (There is only one primary "contemporary" source for that marriage and that is some 60 years after the event... the subject of one of my articles for you.)

Judith Woodson Christian, the daughter, and her full sister Lucy Christian were married to Chesley Daniel and Drury Woodson resp. long before the 1783 will. And that's why they appear that way in the will.

I awcept that names might be repeated in children of those days.. as I mention in my Edmund New article. I look for some middle name that can distinguish them. But normally one would expect the distinguishing middle name to be given to the second of the two. Thus one might expect that having a Judith Christian already in the family the selochd one might have been named Judith Leake Christian. Otherwise you have Charles naming the first one Judith Woodson Christian having in the back of his mind that there was going to be another Judith Christian later! And finally a mere Judith Daniel would have been enough to distinguish her in the will from the Judith Lacy. So there are some itchy points in my theory but I take it as the best I can do and do not search for any further resolution.

Note: a further indication of the parentage of Judith Woodson Christian Daniel is the occurence in her descendants of buth the Woodson and the Christian names, one of them, if I recall correctly away from my records, even being Judith Christian Daniel.

I believe that answers all of your questions insidiously buried in your letter except "who did they marry?" Well, Judith-Baniel, Lucy-Woodson, as above. Judith-Benjamin Lacy; Elizabeth-John Humber; Mary- James Gresham, Grayson; George-Martha Walton; Walter- Martha Walton; Charles - not sure; William-don't know now that you've demolished Martha Evans. Elijah-Elizabeth Britt; John-I know who some Johns married but I don't know which of them was mine.

I recognize your problems with Judith Woodsons. The woods were full of Judith Woodsons over there for a whole century and a half. I have a few of them weeded out.

THE STRANCE TILLS OF EDMUND NET by Louis Koenig

Agnes Pearlman, in her ingenious exploration of the Thomas Christians of the 1736 and 1743 wills (CFC. III 183-186, 1980) uses the Edmund & New will of July 4, 1726 in hypothesizing on the identity of the 1743 Thomas. There are actually TWO Edmund New wills, the second of which, dated 8 August 1726, allows a clarification of some of the points left uncertain in her analysis. Some of the matters discussed here concern New genealogy rather than Christian genealogy and are only peripheral to Christian genealogy, but possibly some attacent of researcher in the former may be able to add to, clarify or correct them.

First to clear up an error in the Pearlman excerpt from the 4 July 1 1726 New will, which she quotes from a secondary spurce. I have the facsimile of both recordings.

passage
The excerpted item does not read "son to my son Edmund New now deceased". It reads "son to my son Edmund New, deceased." without the "now" The transcriber misread the script e for an o, since the two letters are easily confused, thus making a New become a now. A similar error occurs in the excerpt where "full Dow of Dowery" is actually written "full Dew of Dowery"... and means "full due of dow ry". One speculates that the transcriber first read the New as New and wrote it down, and then looked at the same word and read it as Now

and put it down again. The matter is of some importance since the "now" implies some recency to the death event while the correct passage does not. This is a good illustration of the prudence in not trusting secondary sources when important decisions are to be made.

The 4 July New will is found in Henrico County
Wills and Deeds, Volume 1725-1737, pp. 50,51. The
second, 8 August, will is in the same volume pp. 107,108.
The heirs and the property bequeathed are almost identical
in the two wills, so there is no question but that these are

the genealogy. They are John New, Thomas Christian and
John Tuley, and the will was recorded in Henrico 5 June 1727,

The explanation of why the witnesses Thomas Christian, John New, and John Tuley did not interpose the recording of the July 4th will when later it was presented on Sept. 1726, with the August 8th will that they had witnessed less than a month before must remain a mystery for deeper research.

The July 4th will does not designate the relationship of the heirs other than the executors, wife Mary, son Edmund and Daughter Priscilla. The August 8th will designates all the heirs as wife, son, or daughter, these being wife Mary, children Edmund, Priscilla, Mary Kircher Prior, Rebecca Christian, Sarah Tully, Elizabeth Patteson, William,

It is not necessary that they know the contents of the document. 1668800 Whether this was the case with wills in 1726 Virginia will have to be explored by legal-historical specialists interested in the New ganealogy.

So far as Christian genealogy is concerned these two wills are the evidence that a Thomas Christian married Rebecca New daughter of Edmund New before 1726 and was close to the New amily before and after that date. And they demolish the "perkaps" 80-V ear old suggestion that the Rebecca who married Thomas Christian was a Rebecca Stith.

The foregoing is presented as the best construction that I can make out of the two strange wills of Edmund New, and with the hope that readers having additional information expanding confirmerory or confirming or refuting may bring it forward.

Dear Agnes,

I have information on some of the names in your "Migration", CFC III. Wree Here are the discrepancies I find between your versions and mine.

Archibald Hunt Christian. The last sentence would be correct if xxxxxx you leave out the "greensboro, &xxxxx Hale County" He moved to G reensboro, Greene Co. in xxxxxxxxx Feb. 1847. (Sorry for the typing blobs..it's early morning.) In the early 1830's he moved from Va. to Sumter Co., Ala, then to Eutaw Greene Co, before finally settling in Greesboro. Hale County was not created, from Greene, till 1867.

Charles Woodson Christian was not married in Richmond Co. His 6 Jun 1807 marriage is found in Elbert Marriages, Book "H" rebound into "L-F", p.39. (I am unsure that this was the Charles Woodson Christian who married Mary Walton Maxwell, but I'm waiting for somebody to straighten me out on that.)

I take Elijah W. Christian's mother to be Susmanna Lovejoy not Sarah.. via Lynn Archer, whose lineage you published, I,17.

George Asbury Christian's wife was Elizabeth Applewhite Jordan, not Applewhaite. Her father Henry Applewhite, her grandfather Henry Applewhite. Her marriage certificate as that is in Madison Co., Ga. Marriages, Book 1812-43, p. 56

Joseph Daniel Christian actual birth date is known:
19 or 20 Nov. 1820. This comes from the work of Leonora
Ellen Jones of Albany, Ga., who I believe must have had the
George Christian (father of Joseph) Bible... and I'm still
trying to track that down.. and will send you a query to that end
someday.

It is correct that Samuel W. Christian's wife is named Laura in the 1850 Union Co., Ark. census. But I take this to be an enumerator error. The marriage record of him to Louisa J.P. George is found in Union Co. Ark. Marriages, Book A, p. 76 ... according to my secondary source: Spencer, Marriage Bonds and Ministers Returns Union Co., Ark. 1829-1870, (1962) p. 23... the date Dec. 7, 1848. Also he did move to Ark. before 1850 but not with his wife. He greabbed her up after he got there.

The marriage of William Murray Christian to Mary Massengale is found in Madison Co. Ala. Record 1, p.272, dated not 1817 but 16 Sep. 1816. (I have this from a secondary source, my colleague Eunie V. Christian Stacy who is very reliable and very accurate.)

I did get some new information from your listing and I thank you for publishing it all.

Here are the wills of Edmund New that you asked for, including my reading of them in typescript. Don't want to preempt the editorial privilege, but I can't see that these are worth publishing in CFC since they are only peripheral to Christian genealogy and I believe I've covered all such applications in my article. Indeed, I even thought it quite possible that you would make that same judgement about my article since it has so much about New and so little about Christian. My only hope was that some New descendant might get to work and straighten us Christians out on the matter.

Here a'so the insert about the Charleston Parish matter in my article, as promised, an insert for ms. page 6.

On ms. page 7 there is a correction. Eighth line should say first wife, not second wife.

will orders, in this case the almost identical listing in two wills (which show some other signs of not knowing that each other existed) suggests that it does approximate the birth orders for those listed, William's position being uncertain. The construction that Ann New was a married daughter is the strengthened by the assignment of the three witnesses of the August 8th will as sons-in-law, Thomas Christian John New married Ann, Thomas Christian married Rebecca, and John Tully married Garah. And the construction that Thomas Christian was a son-in-law is also strengthened by the fact that he with his mother-in-law Mary New traveled to Goochland to record the will and the inventory on the same day, June 5, 1727 ... one visualizes in the same carriage.

The July 4th will has the Wy parish as St. James;

the August 8th as Charlesten." A thorough search of the literature including correspondence with some of the authorities on irginia names finds no Charleston Parish ever existing in Henrico County or anywhere else in Virginia. The closest approach to that name is Charles or Charles River Parish in York County. Possibly the "in" me and that he was writing the will in Charleston Parish, e.g. while on a visit or a convalescence there. But this is a very unusual statement in a will and compounded with the non-expistence of a Charleston Parish leaves the matter a mystery.

Now that you've got me thinking abput those cussed Thomas Christians: do your files have anything on the following?

In the Lamb WMQ 5, 262, 1897 there is a sæntence that has been bugging me for years: "Thomas, will dated Oct. 23, 1743... etc... had issue: 14 Anthony boæn June 9, 1724(St. Ptere's Parish Register), not mentioned in will, but in a deed, as "spn and heir", and as residing in Cumberland County in 1753 (Goochland County Records); ... end of quote.

In the first place Anthony IS mentioned in the will, but we'll put that down as another lesson that we should not trust ANYBODY no matter how authoritative... don't trust anybody except yourself reading the original records... and sometimes not even that.

But the real bug is in that deed. The sentence might have a number of intentions... another common failing in geneaological literature. I interpret it to say: (1) There is a Goochland County Deed, date not certain, signatories not stated. (2) Deed states that this Anthony resided in Gumberland County in 1753. (3) Deed calls Anthony "son and heir".... of somebody.

At first reading you think his sentence says that Thomas made a deed in Goochland County in 1753 in which he calls Anthony "son and Heir". More careful reading makes you realize that it might not say that at all. It does not say that that Thomas or any Thomas made the deed. It does not say the deed was made in 1753 or recorded in 1753 or had any connection with 1753 except to describe an Anthonyas residing in Cumberland County in 1753.

Question: among your files do you have this deed? You recognize the import of course: Thomas who died in 1743,4 couldn't be making a deed in 1753, so either it was another Thomas with a son Anthony who made the deed, or some other guy made the deed mentioning an Anthony, son and heir of somebody. ETC, etc, etc. Or maybe the 1743 is a mistake for 1743 or even, more likely in handwriting, for 1733.

Do you have the deed?



Dear Louis:

Please excuse the delay in responding to your most recent letters, which arrived in mid-July just before I left for a trip to the East Coast. I returned home last week and have been trying to complete the July issue of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES. It seems that I will never get "on schedule."

Now for your questions: First, regarding Anthony Christian—as you so aptly point out, Anthony is mentioned in the will of Thomas Christian. As for the "deed" referred to in Lamb's William and Mary Quarterly article in which Anthony is identified as "son and heir" and as residing in Cumberland County in 1753 per Goochland County Records, it is my guess that the following document may so identify him:

Goochland County, Virginia, Court Order and Minute Book VII, July 1753, page 224.

The index to above gives Anthony Christian, granton, to David Murry, grantee, deed proved by John Fleming, Jun't, John Ford, and William Lewis. I should have said that the deed mentioned probably is the one that identifies Anthony as "son and heir" and as residing in Cumberland County. The Court Order and Minute Book gives only the information I have shown here. For sometime I have instended to order microbilm of the Goochland County deeds themselves, but time has not allowed me to do so as yet.

A few years after the above, it is of interest that David Christian "of Albemarle County, and Tillotson Parish" deeded to John Coche "of same" 200 acres lying on both sides of Buffalo Creek of Willises River "Land left me by my Father Reference to his Will..."

This document recorded in Deed Book 2, pages 114 & 115, of Albemarle County, Virginia, on 10 October 1758. I abstracted this information from microfilm of the Deed Book.

Re Thomas Christian and John Prior in 1714: My information on their joint activities was obtained from Annie Walker Burns' abstracts and McClanahan's manuscript—the latter source undoubtedly repeating information provided by Burns. As a result of your questions, I have reviewed my other data (as it turns out, taken from Lamb and des Cognets, as wase yours) and find that John Prior is nowhere listed as a joint grantee with Thomas Christian. The question trises as to where Burns obtained her information, and your guess is as good as mine. I have decided from now on in my published works not to use Burns as a source unless I am able to verify her notes independently ahead of time. It's a pity she was so careless since she did abstract so much Christian family material. When I next have the opportunity, I might check to see if John Prior had a separate patent in 1714—des Cognets might reveal that. In passing, I might add that I am sure there were several men named John Prior just as there were several named Thomas Christian.

Did you notice on page 82 of des Cognets' English Duplicates of Lost Virginia Records that 1324 acres was engranted in Charles City County to Tho. Christian and Edm'd. New, Ir., 27 November 1705? I added a footnote regarding this to your article.

I'm now curious as to whether or not Terrence mentions the Henrico County, Virginia, wills of Edmund New. If so, that means copies of the originals from which the recorded copies were made would still be on file in the Virginia State Archives at Richmond.

Using your analysis and inferences from the Edmund New wills, his family can be reconstructed as follows--even with only one wife, Mary, born before 1668: Edmund New, born before 1685, died before 1706; married before 1705 and had

one son John, born about 1705.

Mary New, born before 1686; married Prior, probably John Prior. Rebecca New, born before 1688; married Thomas Christian.

Sarah New, born before 1691 or thereabouts; married John Tully. Elizabeth New, born before 1694 or thereabouts; married Patterson William New, born before 1697.

Anne New, born before 1700; probably married John New.

Henry New, born before 1703. Edmund New, born before 1706, second son named Edmund Priscilla New, born before 1708; ma unmarried in 1726.

Have you anuting which you could add?

I never did get to Salt Lake City as planned-a great disappointment since I had looked forward to the opportunity to engage in intensive research. That's something I have had all too little time for during the past year.

Here I am in the last rush of trying to reduce the number of pages of the current issue of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES. To do so, your article and several others had to be shortened at the eleventh hour. I have tried to accomplish the objective and still retain as much of your original as possible since I found it interesting and well-written. Because I have made more than simple editorial changes, I am enclosing a draft essentially as the article will appear in the July issue. You can review the changes and still have time to rush any corrections to me before the copy goes into the hands of the printer late next week.

Before explaining my reasons and the nature of the revisions, let me mention one correction you might wish to make on your original draft: Page 6, line 12, I believe you might want to change "Goochland" to "Henrico."

On your article: I rearranged the sequence somewhat and reluctantly eliminated a few paragraphs which related least to the Christian family or did not pertain directly to New family relationships:

1. Although interesting, the explanation on page 4 regarding the branches of Lickinghole Creek was deemed not essential for purposes of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES (particularly since I was trying to limit the article to no more than three pages).

2. The same seemed true regarding the page 6 speculation on St. James and Charleston Parishes.

3. In terms of balance, I considered it advisable to shorten the section devoted to the two Edmund sons—pages 7 and 8 in your draft. Incidentally, I think the simplest explanation for the omission of "grandson John New son to my son Edmund New Deceased" in the second will is that John may have died within the month between the wills and therefore no longer needed to be mentioned. I took the liberty of adding one line about such a possibility in the revised manuscript.

4. There was simply no room for comment on the testator's state of mind without eliminating copies of the wills. From my correspondence I am sure subscribers want to see copies of as many original documents as possible, and a surprising number are interested in the New-Christian connection. Again, a simple explanation for Edmund New's writing the second will was that the first was misplaced and thought lost or destroyed.

5. I really regretted not being able to keep page 9 and think that the information given there probably would fit the circumstances in other family lines and that it could be used in a future article through the device of changing pertinent names and dates and conditions.

The minor changes made in arrangement and phrasing were primarily to emphasize Christian data and to give the article a little more of a Christian "slant." In effort was also made to consolidate data by eliminating occasional repetition, the easiest way to shorten the article.

If I have deleted any of your favorite lines or if you have any additional suggestions, please let me know. In spite of the changes, I believe the article is still interesting and complete-except that I'm trying to figure out how to squeeze in one final, "ending" sentence. You had seneral good ones, but it the moment there is no room.

Ah, how I wish that the CHRONICLES could have more pages so that such decisions would not be necessitated!

Returning your galley, with changes.

When I wrote the article I had no concept that you would want to publish the wills.... but you have explained the desireability of that for CFC in general. OK. Indeed I thought you might not even want to publish the article, as I said in my transmittal letter, since it was so much New and so Little Christian.

But of course you have done the right thing to reduce the article now that the wills will be published.

I have only two changes I would like. I see no evidence in the article to support a proposition that Rebecca New was born before 1688. If you as editor want to make such a deduction, from the article or from anywhere, then put in an editor's footnote if you want, but please don't put it in an article under my name. I.e. I don't want credit for it if it's right, or blame for it if it's wrong.

You leave the article on a "so what?" note in the ending. The business about when the two Edmunds would have had to be born only has any significance or intent if you go on to show why, if that were the case, there's something fishy... i.e. that #2 does NOT apply here. To make room for it I suggest you drop out the least essential part of the article, that about the birth orders, which I have scratched out in red.

In her ingenious exploration of he connections of the Thomas Christians f the 1736 and 1743 Goochland County, irginia, wills (Christian Family hronicles, No. III, pages 183-186), gnes Pearlman uses the Edmund New will f 4 July 1726 in hypothesizing on the dentity of Rebecca (New) Christian's usband. There were, however, actually wo wills of Edmund New recorded—the econd of which, dated 8 August 1726, llows a clarification of some of the oints left uncertain in her analysis.

Although stating he was "of Henrico ounty and Saint James's Parrish" in uly and "of Henrico County in Charlesen Parrish" in August, the same Edmund ew is unquestionably the testator of oth wills. The heirs listed and roperty bequeathed are almost identical n the two documents. Both wills are ecorded in Henrico County, Virginia, ills and Deeds, Volume 1725-1737, the irst on pages 50-51, proved 5 Septemer 1726, and the second on pages 107-08, proved 5 June 1727 by Thomas hristian. Witnesses to the August ill differ from those of a month arlier but offer leads for the enealogy. Most similarities and even he differences between the wills rove significant.

The August will does not mention the forty-pound bond of Thomas Christian referred to in the July will as being the "full right" of Edmund New. Possibly the bond had been released between 4 July and 8 August.

Just as with the July bequests, those in August give to son Edmund land including the nursery of apple trees, to daughter Priscilla the remaining land with the plantation, and to Edmund, Priscilla, and wife Mary the personal estate. While the second will describes each child's land apportionment as "half," the first will is more specific about the precise location of the land, Edmund getting all that "on ye lower side of ye uper bransh cawld ye litle Kreeke of Lickinghole," Priscilla getting the remainder being "on ye uper side of ye little Creek of Lickinghole."

In both wills each of the other set of children get "one shilling," but in the August testament it is "one shilling and no more," repeated for each except Elizabeth Patterson, presumably an unintentional omission.

The August will does not mention a "grandson John New, son to my son Edmund New Deceased" nor does it make any mention of a deceased son, Edmund, as does the will* written in July.

^{*}To clear up an error in the Pearlman excerpt from the 4 July 1726 Edmund New will, which she quotes (CFC, p. 184) from a secondary source: The excerpted passage does not read "son to my son Edmund New now deceased." It reads as quoted above without the "now"—a matter of relative importance since the "now" implies some recency to the death event while the correct passage does not. Apparently transcriber entered the same word twice, the second time misreading the script e for an o. A similar error occurs in the excerpt where "full Dow of Dowery" actually appears on recorded copy as "full Dew of Dower" and means "full due of dowry." This is a good illustration of the prudence in not trusting secondary sources for making important decisions.

As nearly as can be determined, the vitnesses to the July will (Paul Green, John Lain, and Hugh Morris) are not as genealogically relevant as the August vitnesses (John New, Thomas Christian, and John Tuley), who could have been Edmund New's sons-in-law.

Analysis and Conclusions
Being specifically identified in the last will as one of Edmund New's children establishes beyond question that Rebecca (New) Christian was his laughter. The construction that Thomas Christian was her husband is strengthened by the fact that he with his nother-in-law Mary New traveled to Henrico Court House to record the August will and the estate's inventory on the same day—one visualizes in the same

carriage.

An explanation for the appearance and recording of the second will on June 1727 is that it was discovered during taking of the New estate inven-tory by Richard Ogelsby, Richard Haynesworth, Sr., and Thomas Dawson and that it was presented by Mary New, the executrix, at the same time. (According to Benj. B. Weisiger III in Colonial Wills of Henrico County, Virginia, Part One 1654-1737, published 1976, page 116, the inventory can be found on page 113 of Henrico's Wills and Deeds in the same volume as the wills.) The explanation of why witnesses New, Christian, and Tuley did not interpose the recording of the July will when it was presented 5 September 1726 with the presented 5 September 1726 with the later August will that they had vitnessed less than a month before must

remain a mystery for deeper research.

The marital status of daughter Anne
New can only be surmised. She received one shilling and no more as did daughters Mary Prior, Rebecca Christian,
Sarah Tully, and Elizabeth Patterson.
On the other hand, Priscilla New received half the land. The likely
inference (following that made by Mrs.
Pearlman for a daughter mentioned in the Thomas Christian 1736 will (CFC, No. III, p. 185) is that Anne New was already married just as the other daughters called by their married surnames and who came into only a nominal inheritance at their father's death. reservation to this construction is that in the August will the order is Mary, Rebecca, Sarah, Elizabeth, William, Anne, and Henry, which might

signify that Anne had a different status than Mary and the others. However, in the July will the order is William, Mary, Rebecca, Sarah, Elizabeth, Ann, and Henry, so the Anne is not anomalous. The construction that Anne New was a married daughter is strengthened by my assignment of the three witnesses of the August will as sons-in-law: John New married Anne, Thomas Christian married Rebecca, and John Tully married Sarah.

While one should beware of ascribe

While one should beware of ascribing birth orders to will orders, in this case the almost identical listing in two wills (which show other signs of "not knowing that each other existed") suggests that it does approximate the birth orders for those listed together, William's position

being uncertain.

Probably the most glaring discrepancy between the two wills is the omission in August of references to a deceased son Edmund New, father of the testator's grandson John to whom one shilling was willed in July. Absence of such references in the second will could simply be attributed to John's death between 4 July and 8 August, but questions still remain. Both documents designate a son Edmund New, certainly living since named as an executor and heir in each. Mrs. Pearlman has suggested (personal communication, 29 March 1980) that Edmund New, Senior, did have two sons named Edmund-one deceased, one living, the former possibly by a first wife. do know that sons of the same name have appeared in families, especially two-wife families, but only under the circumstances that (1) the one or the other son has a distinguishing middle name or that (2) the first son is dead when the second is named—the purpose in both instances, of course, being to assure that two sons with precisely the same name do not live simultaneously. If there were not live simultaneously. If there we such an older and younger Edmund, one looks for a distinguishing second name in the will to accord with No. 1 above but does not find it. If No. 2 applies here, then several conditions seem likely: That the deceased Edmund had lived long enough (to about age 20) to have had a son John; that the living Edmund, to be named an executor, must have been of age (i.e., 21 or older); and that if he were born after the deceased Edmund died, then the first must have been born at least 40 years prior to the wills and the second at least 21 years prior to the wills—full copies of which follow.



So far as Christian genealogy is concerned, these two wills of Edmund New are evidence that a Thomas Christian married Rebecca New, daughter of Edmund New before 1726 and was close to the New family before* and after that date. If one accepts the various hypotheses for-mulated on the preceding pages, then her probable birth date was before 1688 and the marriage date accordingly much earlier than the will dates.

Back around 1965 I had correspondence with Julia Durham (Mrs. Hubert D. Williams), 44 Wonneman Circle, Mexico, Mo. Her husband died in 1968 and the correspondence tapered off thereafter. Prompted by Coleman's query I tried to reestablish it in 1979 but found she had died, about 1977 I believe. She had no children and she had not given me any of her siblings or collateral lines. numerous phone calls to Mexico, Mo and inquiries through friends of mine who happened to be navives of there, to acquaintances of hers, to the local (Aurdrian Co.) and state historical xxxxixixex societies (of the latter there are two)... in the effort to track down her papers on Coleman-Christian genealogy. (The Christian and Leake lines are in my wife's ancestry that I'm studying.)

No luck. Pieced together from some vague statements is the following: She died elsewhere while visiting relatives. Is buried in Elmwood Cemetery, Mexico. Mr. Williams worked on the railroad. They belonged to a 'World War I Auxiliary".. probably American Legion? Hre papers not in any of the three historical societies. There are 58 Williams in the Mexico phone book. Mrs. Russell Kaiser, sr. answers all genealogicall queations at Audrain Hist. Soc. and will search the courthouse max and the local paper, the Ledger, for \$3/hr, \$25 minimum.

The reason I tell you all this stuff is that maybe one of you might want to follow up on her papers which included material for a projected book: The Christian Coleman, XX Leake, Durham Family and Some Decsendants".

I enclose a lineage for Julia which Agnes may wish to publish. I also send my sheet for Ann Mourning Christian from which you will see that Mr. Williams had contact, direct or inderect, with Mrs. Sue B. Chritian of Richmond a (semi-pro) genealogist, descendant of James' brother Samuel Coleman, jr, whose construction a is that the parents of Samuel sr were John Coleman and wife Ann of Gloucester Co. (I have not followed up with either Sue B. or Mrs. Kaiser because it's against my "amateur standing to call for help from professional genealogists.)

Dear Agnes -

Congratulations on the CFC, late or not. And especially congratulations to you and your colleagues on your deductions on John m. Judith Leek and John (B). Neat stuff! It allows me to drag these out of my limbo file and nudge them (i.e him) toward being the son John of the 1784 will.. where I've had them for 30 years.

But I have a few questions I wish you'd clear up for me.

- 1. On p. 263 you have "Judith Leak, known from 19th century family sources to have been the former Judith Mask, whose birth.. etc" What are these 19th century family sources? I have reasonable indirect evidence that this is indeed true, but do you have any hard evidence, published?, manuscript?, word of mouth?
- 2. In resolving the questions about the numerous John's floating around in Va. and Ga back there it is necessary to see them all at one time, so they can be compared and checked for completeness. I have been wanting to do that but have barely made a start. Now you tell me, p. 265, that you have identified the parents of "most" John Christians and that you're going to publish them !'from time to time" in CFC. Great! But could I persuade you to publish them all at once, and not from time to time but next time?
- 3. On p. 353 you have the names Peter Ford, Daniel Ford, John Ford, and Judith Ford passed down "in just that form" to 4 of the John and Judith children. The James L. Christian articles do not confirm that, except for Judith Ford. They contain only Daniel F., Peter F., John F. Where do you get the ord? Maybe theyare that way in the K.W. Parish Register?
- 4. P. 353 about Mrs. Russell's "a Ford" and "cousin" referring to the wife of John F. Christian. If she was a 1st cousin her maiden name would have to be Leake or Christian. Could "a Ford" mean merely that she was a descendant of Fords? If her maiden name was indeed Ford she would have to be a second cousin or a once removed first cousin, the common ancestor being Peter (1). Could "cousin" be used in the general sense of "kin"? Or maybe the whole statement is beyond clarification.

Dear Mr. Christian -

My congratulations to you for your good luck in falling heir to all that Christian data, your penetration in analysing it, and your sharing of it all with others via your CFC articles. These, together with Agnes Pearlman's and colleagues' additions and deductions, have allowed me to bring out of limbo where they have been in my researches for 25 years or so the John Christian married Judith Leake 1771 and the John Christian (B) and move them toward a firm assignment as the son of Charles of the 1784 will.

I have some additional clues (indirect) in that direction and am considering an article for CFC as a contribution to the subject. Before doing that I'd like to ask your help in clarifying a point or two in your articles.

I note that you make no statement about the parentage of John m. Judith 1771, that being added from Mrs. Pearlman.... I attach a copy of my letter to her on that matter. However some of my questions to you do bear on that connection.

- 1. On page 256-7 you'make the statement about the marriage in 1771, and then you follow it with the statement that the couple settled on the Buffalo River, Amherst. My question: do you have hard evidence that connects these two Johns? Mrs. Pearlman makes the deduction from the children's names, and I can add something to that, but do you have evidence other than that?
- 2. On p. 259 you mention an obituary in The Lynchburg Virginian for Mrs. Judith Christian. Do you have a more complete reference, i.e. date, page and column, for that? and does p. 259 give the entire obituary verbatim or is that your abstract of it?
- 3. On p. 261 you mention a copy of a "family Bible register". Well, make that "there is mention of ...". Are these your words or the editor's insertion? In either case do you know of the existence of such a family Bible register copy, and if so can you identify for me the owner, date, author of the entries and such bibliographical identification as well as present whereabouts?
- 4. Other than the Judith Ford Christian, presumably the Bible entry, is there any other evidence that the F's in John F., Peter F., and Daniel F. are indeed Ford? (there is no such indication in your articles).

5. Finally, on p. 256 the footnote states 'the current article has been abstracted from his writings.." Are these articles then by you or should the authorship be correctly given as 'by Agnes Pearlman as abstracted from the writings of James L. Christian'? If the latter, just what do your original writings consist of?.. a book?, a manuscript?, a set of notes? an article submitted to CFC?

I note that you are a statistician. It is gratifying to encounter so many fellow scientists engaged in genealogy these days. I am something of a statistician myself. I attach some poop about my career. I am advocating a law that prohibits students from taking a single course in statistics. They should take two or three, and if not then cease and desist from making statistical judgements and pronouncements as amateurs and turn that over to the pros.

I send a copy of this letter to Agnes and enclose a copy of my letter to her on the subject.

Dear Louis:

As always, I enjoyed hearing from you and am pleased that the CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES articles have stimulated you to reactivate some of your files. Knowing that your careful reading of the material will result in more penetrating questions should certainly keep me on my toes. I just hope my answers will prove satisfactory. Now, to take your questions in order:

1. (page 263) The nineteenth century family sources are primarily those quoted by William Curry Harllee in KINFOLKS, published in 1934, and really include earlier and later

sources .. Page 276 has the following:

Dr. Leonard Wilson's sketch of the Leake family states: "Walter Leake, born about 1704 married Judith Mask and died at the old homestead in Goochland." The sketch in the Richmond (Va.) Times-Dispatch of 14 Feb 1904 which is probably based in part upon Dr. Wilson's sketch states substantially the same . . .

Although informed that the Woodson Genealogy and William and Mary Quarterly, Vol. 6, pp. 349-350, and also Mr. John Marion Leake, after his chart was prepared, gave the date as about 1689, circumstances hereinbefore mentioned indicate that he was born earlier, and about and probably before 1687.

The following from Register of St. Peter's Parish shows date of birth and name of parents of father and data of relatives of his wife, Judith Mask: (p. 23) "Judith Daughter of John Mask born ye 14th April and baptized

the 10th July, 1698" . . . Page 252 of KINFOLKS reads:

Mr. John Marion Leake (1111013234) personally informed this writer that William (1111) and Mary (Bostick) Leake and Walter (111101) and Judith (Mask) Leake were buried in the Leake Family Cemetery at "Rocky Spring" and that he knew the locations of their graves. He was then too infoirm to go to the cemetery to point out the locations.

At the moment I am working on another installment of "On the Bookshelf" in which I will list a number of the books having substantial information about the Christians and their connections. Send any entries you believe may be suitable. Books such as KINFOLRS will

be listed with a few words about the families covered.

2. (page 265) I hope I won't have to eat my words regarding identification of parents of "most" John Christians. In a quick review, I believe I was correct—insofar as those on whom I have gathered records are concerned. I hope I haven't left out too many. Even some of those I have, however, have not yet been added to my crass-reference file. I had hoped to complete that job before presenting the material in the CHRONICLES. I'll try to follow your suggestion and publish them all at once. The January issue would

be the first opportunity since I'm already having trouble cutting length of articles for the overdue July issue. It seems I simply have so much material to be published that it's increasingly difficult to pick and choose.

- 3. (page 353) In writing about the names Peter Ford, DAniel Ford, John Ford, and Judith Ford being passed down, I was using information supplied by Mrs. June G. Putnam. In rereading the data she sent, I believe I may have misinterpreted her remarks when she referred to the thirteen children, "most of whom had the middle initial of either L. (Leake) or F. (Ford)."
- 4. (page 353) Until and unless Mrs. Russell finds new information which would identify the wife of John F. Christian, born 20 May 1776, there is no way to know to multiwhat degree of cousinship he was related to the wife or what her maiden surname was. She/ is still hoping to make a breakthrough on this, but it's difficult to know in which county the answer might lie.

I do hope you will submit the article you are considering and offer the following comments regarding the questions you asked Mr. James L. Christian:

- ILC 1. (pages 256-7) There is nothing I can add to what I have already entered in my articles.
- JLC 2. (page 259) The quotation from THE LYNCHBURG VIRGINIAN was provided to me by Mr. Ted O. Brooke, another subscriber to the CHRONICLES and a thorough researcher and publisher-editor of UPSHAW FAMILY JOURNAL. He had obtained the quotation last year from a newly-published book:

MARRIAGES AND DEATHS FROM LYNCHBURG, VIRGINIA, NEWSPAPERS, 1794-1836, compiled by Lucy H. M. Baber, Louise A. Blunt, Marion A. L. Collins, published by Genealogical Publishing Company, Baltimore, Maryland, 1980. The quotation on page 259 of the CHRONICLES is in full as he gave it to me. Source was THE LYNCHBURG VIRGINIAN, July 19, 1830, page 3, column 4. I do not know whether more information appeared in the newspaper originally.

- ILC 3. The family Bible register copy was provided by Mrs. Edna Mae Russell. All I know about it is given on the bottom of page 261. Mr. Christian may be able to answer the questions about its present whereabouts in more detail.
 - JLC 4. See my comments above.
- ILC 5. Mr. Christian's original writings consist of several manuscripts about his Christian family and their connections as well as "Ancestor-Hunt trips" he has taken to learn more about his forebears. In addition, he sent several pages of miscellaneous writings to me along with transcriptions of the letters, wills, and other documents—and family group records—so valuable to those related to the same line. The manuscripts alone total about thirty—five pages. When added to the documents, there obviously was not enough space in the pages of the CHRONICLES to publish everything intact, much as I would have liked to do so. That is why I added the note "abstracted from the writings" of the author. Whenever something is added to his work (such as the family Bible reference), there is always a footnote to so indicate. His articles were originally written to share with members of his family and were written at different times. I, along with readers of the CHRONICLES, am so pleased that he has been willing to share the results of his remeatch with us.

Speaking of sharing: Mr. Christian has also provided me with many pages of photocopies of published material from which to draw-the KINFOLKS references previously quoted being some of them.

To return to the subject of the various John Christians--could you send me any data you may have which could help to clarify the relationship of the John Christian who married Mary Harvey and the one who married Mary Maynard. Much of what I have on them is contradictory, and I would appreciate your comments.

Also, knowing of your Georgia Christian connection, I would be interested in anything you might have regarding the early migrations of the family from Virginia--I refer to those vesides George Christian and his family. Do you have anything to offer? Follow-up material is needed since there are so many searching for Georgia Christian ancestors.

Thanks for your continued help.

Your mess in the John's:

I can put you to rest on one of them. The John of CFC I, 18 is John son of William Christian and Mikired Collier, the John of New Kent of Lamb. He lived his whole life in New Kent, at one time at "Roxbury". I guess his birth about 1734 and his marriage to Mildred Collier about 1764. His children born 1765-1774 and one maybe as late as 1784, one and probably all in New Kent, and his will in New Kent names them all, proved 10 Sep. 1801. After Mildred died he married (2) a Mrs, Meaux who died after 1825 or so. Someone told me that the suit in Chancery mentioned by Lamb was over this Mrs. Meaux, but I don't give that much credence and I have not seen the suit papers. I know, Betsey, that you're looking at all sorts of John's in the search for your John, but I seem to gather from your letter that what you are driving at is the identity of the Georgia John. If that's the case it's clear that this ain't him.

Agnes is going to come out with a whole batch of John's in an early issue... that is if Agnes EVER comes out with an early issue... so I am awaiting that before making any more decisions... other than that I too accept the CFC identification of John Buffalo, and as that has his will in Amherst 1823 that rules him out of Georgia also, taking care of John (b) and also John son of Charles.

You say "Lamb implies John was son of James...". It's not just an implication, he says he is son of James, and you have James will mentioning son John. By the way did you ever get a clearer copy of that will which is filed both in Albemarle and in Goochland so I can get a reading on those missing words? Lamb has this John living in Buckingham in 1805, unattested, so that rules this John out of dying in Georgia in 1805 also. That's three that bite the dust for Georgia.

Well, that's all I know for reasonably sure. I'll await Agnes' presentation for any more deductions.

The foregoing 4 John's also, I deduce, cannot be the John of Charles City m. Mary Maynard... or any other John of Charles City. I agree with you that it is very inlikely to have a man or his descendant move back to Charles City once established in the newer more western counties. However I do remind you that there is one instance of it. In the Norvell vs. Camm case, 1811, mentioned inter alia by McClanahan, p. 15 of my McClanahan manuscript, James Loudon

of Amherst, 1811, deposed that the last one of the Christians involved in the case moved to Charles City by 1763"... the case involving by the way the John Christian of the 1755 patent for 3986 acres. This indicates that some Christians moved from Amherst back to Charles City. It would be just our luck that our Christians did the unusual.

You don't need an attestation from Dorothy Herring that John Christian married Mary Mathard. That's a well known event that is documented in several places and (I presume) appears in an original record.

I haven't figured out either the Henry Christian guardian of William Browne Christian orphan business. The text of the papers have William Browne the son of John, but some other fellow, in print, swears that William Browne was the son of William... and that's the way I have him. I should explore the possibility that there were two William Browne Christians, one the brother of Henry, one the nephew.


And fonally I hope Agnes' forthcoming paper will address the question of whether there were two John Christians in Franklin Co both dying 18001 1810.

Dear Betsy:

I was just ready to respond to your letter of October 2 when the one of October 10 arrived. In this case, I will take last things first.

There is nothing I can add about the Ford family so I am forwarding your letter to ins. Jane Putnam, whose address is: 649 Ponus Ridge Road

New Canaan, Connecticut 06840

I also enclosed for her use your stamped, self-addressed, return envelope. She may be able to offer some additional information about the Ford family.

As for the men named John Christian: What a job to distinguish between all of them! At the suggestion of Louis Koenig, I am now trying to summarize the data on various John Christians listed in my files—with the intent of publishing the results as one article instead of "from time to time." What with the amount of work involved, 1 m tempted to return to my original plan.

The enclosed photocopy of a work sheet I recently prepared will be used as a frame of reference with abstracts from the wills, deeds, and vital records I have in my possession. Obviously, several of the men listed appear more than once, especially where the sources do not agree. I believe that there were more John Christians living in the same period. I wish that I had time to prepare my comments regarding that all this time; however, I must complete the July issue of the CHRONICLES. The John Christian project will just have to wait.

In the meantime, just a few comments on the information you sent:

1. Charles City Deeds and Wills--Since John Christian was appointed guardian for the two Maynard orphans, I wonder if he married a widow of Nathaniel Maynard and, if so, what her maiden name might have been. The 1710 date for guardianship was only two years after John Christian married Mary Maynard.

 Henrico County Miscellaneous Records--I already had this abstract and can only conclude that one of the men named John Christian died about 1773, leaving a widow named Mary. I have not identified which one this is.

3. I guess that the deed from Henry Christian of Amherst County to John Christian of Charles City County in 1777 would have been from the younger Henry to his half-brother John. As you speculated, see page 18 of Volume I of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES. This is the John Christian shown on my work sheet as having married Mildred Collier and of New Kent County, Virginia.

4. Dorothy Herring draws so many erroneous conclusions regarding relationships that I use her pamphlet only for leads. I believe she simply accepted the assumption of many descendants of John Christian who died 1803 in Franklin County, Georgia, was the one who married Mary Maynard. He did leave a widow named Mary.

5. My records show a John Christian who died Leaving a minor son William Brown Christian—no dates. I should point out, however, that there were at least five contemporaries named William Brown Christian; so there is no need for

a "fit" to page 18 of Volume I CFC.

As for my comments on your comments: McClanahan may have said that John who died 1805 Franklin County, Georgia, was son of Robert and Lucy (Bradley) Christian, but he also said that the John Christian who was their son married Mary Harvey. I don't have time at the moment to recheck, but I believe McClanahan's data and conclusions are rather contradictory on this particular generation's connections.

You will notice that Lamb identified the wife of John Christian, son of Sames and Susannah Christian, as being named Joyce. McClanahan had speculated that her surname was Diguid.

C. K. Johnston had documented that William, the brother of Elijah, had also moved to Georgia and believed that the John Christian there was another brother. Since this information was provided to me in followupp material to be added to his original manuscript before publication, I should have inserted a qualifier such as "possibly," "perhaps," etc. I try to be conscientious in this regard but have slipped several times. I can see that I must proofread even more carefully than ever.

I look forward to receiving your comments on the various John Christians.

The 1805 Lottery data is published in Wood, Virginia S. and Ralph V. 1805 Georgia Land Lottery (1964). The listing therein shows Abda Christian of Franklin with one draw (not 2) and has M. David Christian of Camden (not Davis M.) Also contrary to the CFC Note those with one draw are either bachelors over 20 or orphans less than 21 with father dead and mother dead or remarried. And those with two draws are married with wife or child, or widow with minor child, both of any age. The over or under 21 criterion is not the basis. The condition indicated by the draws was under the law as of the date of the Act, 11 According to the law the registration was to have been completed by 1 Mar. 1804 and therefore it is uncertain as to the actual date of registration of any individual within those dates and it is likely that the conditions for some registrants were as of the date of registration rather than as of 11 May 1803. Correspondence with the Surveyor-General Department (Apr. 1980) reveals that the Department cannot establish the exact date of registration and suggests that some registrations may even have occurred after the 1 May, 1804 cut-off. The foregoing information may help to The actual drawing was held in 1805. correstly place the age or marital status of the drawers. Of the draws of the Christians there were only two fortunate draws, one of the orphan (so designated) M. David and one of George.

Dear Mr. Hemperley -

It was good of you to answer my questions about the 1805 Lottery in your letter of 29 Apr. 1980. I am still having troubles with the interpretation of the Lottery and ask your help .

In the 4" x 9" pamphlet describing the Lotteries, undated but issued under Ben W. Fortson, jr there is a listing of (the qualifications of) "persons entitled to draw" for the 1805 Lottery:

> Bachelor, 21 or over, 1 year (priorto 11 May 1803) in Ca or paid tax thereto, U.S. cirizen

1 draw

Married man with wife or child, I year in Ga., U.S. citizen

2 draws

Widow with child under 21 (minor), 1 year in Ga

2 draws

Orphan(s) under 21 with father dead and mother dead or remarried

1 draw

These qualifications are restated with inconsequential modifications in wording by Virginia S. & Ralph V. Wood in their book "1805 Georgia Land Lottery" (1964)

Read as written there the meaning is that bachelor's had to be 21 or over but married men could be of any age..... unless the "U.S. citizen" is meant an age of 21 or over.... but this seems to be contraindicated since if "U.S. citizen" is supposed to mean over 21 there is no need to have the "21 or over" for bachelors.

However the Wood's also give the text of the Act which in Section 8 has the bachelor qualifications as written above but for the married men it says: "Every free white male of like description, having a wife... etc". The "like description" refers to the qualifications for bachelors which is given in the phrase immediately preceding. This strictly then means that the "21 or over" also applies to the married men. That interpretation (and I don't see that there can be any other short of an amendment to the Act or a court ruling) has it not married men of any age by married men of 21 or over. And that would mean that no ried men under ! were not entitled to draw.

My question; what is actually the case? I would appreciate your clarification.

The extensive data provided by James L. Christian and the researches and deductions of Jane G. Putnam, Edna M. Russell and Agnes Pearlman (CFC IV, 256-265; V, 346-353) have at long last solved the awkward problem that has puzzled Christian genealogists for decades, the relationships of "John Christian" and his bride of 9 May 1771, "Judith Leake". This note expresses admiration for their work and adds a minor confirmation as to the parentage of "John Christian"

Mrs. Pearlman notes the similarity, indeed the exactitude, of the names of the children of John Christian (B) and Judith Leake with those of Judith's mother Judith Ford and uncles Ford; and also the numerous Leake family names among them. This points to the parents of Judith Leake as Judith Ford and John Leake. We do not yet know the ancestry of John Leake but I note that many of the Leake names of the children are also Christian names derivable from Charles Christian and Mary Leake and that most of the "Leake" names in the children of John Christian (B) and Judith Leake are those that could have come via Mary Leake and her parents Walter Leake and Judith Mask.

They are listed as follows, all of them, to show the interesting fact that every name can be traced to one of the ancestral families. (For brevity John = John Christian (B); Judith = Judith Leake, his wife.)

That so many of the names can be traced to the Charles Christian-Mary Leake family I consider strong confirmatory evidence that John Christian (B), married Judi th Leake 9 May 1771, was indeed the son of Charles Christian and Mary Leake. This brings to three the children of Charles Christian who can be definitely assigned as the children of Mary Leake, Walter, George and now John (B).

A remaining flaw in this argument lies in the uncertainty as to the ancestry of John Leake and the names of Judith Leake's siblings. It may be that the names I ascribe to the Mary Leake family actually come from the John Leake family.

THE 1805 GEORGIA LAND LOTTERY

The 1805 Georgia Land Lottery seems especially prone to being misquoted. For instance, a book authored by Lucien Lamar Knight, *** State Historian of Georgia, has Revolutionary War soldiers entitled to 2 draws. In truth Revolutionary War soldiers were given no special status in the 1805 or the 1807 lottery. The present Georgia Surveyor General's Office reports: "Knight is suspect in many of the things he wrote even though he was the State Historian".

The authoratative 1805 Mor lottery, both the statute and the listing is published in: Wood, Virginia S. and Ralph P.V. Wood: 1805 Georgia Land Lottery (1964). Some of the data there differ from those given for Christian's in CFC III, 212, Jan. 1980. Abda Christian had one draw (not 2) and the entry for CFC's Davis M. Christian is: Christian, Raxia M. David (orphan). Incidentally of the Christian draws two were fortunate, one of M. David and one of George. Most important however: the criterion of one or two draws is not the "over or under 21" of CFC.

In the language of the statute as amended there is considerable ambiguity and laxity in logic. I have made a special study of the 1805 Lottery with the assistance of Coy. K Johnston, Attorney and genealogist known to CFC readers from his comprehensive articles. I will be glad to send a copy of the deliberations to any who supply a SASE. I am solely responsible for any errors that appear in the abstract presented here. The conclusions are based on both the legal and the practical factors, which are in some ways in contradiction to each other.

The information as to personal status that can be drawn from from the listing is shown in the following table.

The status (widow, married, etc) must be as of a particular date for each entrant. That date is indefinite. The date most likely to be correct inxmestresses for most entrants lies between about July 1803 and March 1804. **The.

Having found my Volume VI....

Try this on your readers or yourself and see if anyone can correct it or add to it:

The bachelor John W. Christian of the 26 Feb 1829 will Madison Co., Ala, CFC, VI, 431, July 1981, may well be John Warren Christian son of John Christian "of Charles City" and Elizabeth Warren, whom Lamb leave with a "no issue". Elizabeth Warren, dau. of Robert Clemons Warren and Jane had a brother Edward Warren who married Jane Christian dau. of William Christian and 2nd wife Sally Atkins. Thus Jane (Christian) Warren was the aunt of John Warren Christian and since she lived in Charles City County very possibly the "old Aunt June Warren of Charles City County". And indeed since this Jane (Christian) Warren was the half-sister of John Christian "of Charles City", son of William Christian and 1st wife Elizabeth Collier she was also the blood half-aunt of John Warren Christian. As for the Richmond T. Lacy of New Kent County: Jane Christian's brother and John Christian's half-brother Thomas Christian (son of William and Sally) married Nancy Lacy, so Nancy (Lacy) Christian was also John Warren Christian's aunt. And her brother was Richmond T. Lacy a prominent attorney of New Kent County.

Pending seeing the actual will (which maybe you might send to me?) my only reservation to all this is that Lamb left John Warren Christian with a "no issue" which seems to imply that Lamb didn't know he had died 70 years prior to Lamb's 1899 writings.

I just throw this out as a (likely) speculation that somebody ought to follow up on and tie down.

Arch, your letter sending Berry's letter to you galvanizes me into action after a long layoff. I have been laid up for many weeks with one of my historical sciatica attacks, brought about this time by jamming down too hard on the tractor brake pedal. I have a letter from Berry in which he inquires about the Hunt connection, and not the Collier.

Michael, you say you descend from Elijah, son of Charles Christian jr. (of the 1784 will). Arch and I, who collaborate quite closely (he digs up the living ones and I dig up the dead ones) are interested in all the descendants of Charles Christian, jr. I particularly try to get all the descendants for a work I intend to get published in microfilm in a few years. We would like to have your line and records in that. I enclose a few of my individual record sheets. Would you mind filling some of them out for me, starting with yourself and going back in the Christian line? If you do not get to fill them out back to Elijah, would you let me know what your line is from Elijah to wherever you do get to. We have many Elijah descendants. living and dead, but no Berry so your information will be a welcome addition.

I will first tackle your Hunt question...and that may be all I can get to before I conck out writing this today.

We recognize that the name Hunt appears frequently in the Christian descendants, and in different branches of it so that it is likely that somewhere there was a Hunt ancestor, i.e. presumably a Hunt woman married a Christian man. I have not been able to put my finger on the right one. If you have deeds that prove that Elizabeth Hunt married our Charles Christian, sr and thus was the mother of our Charles Christian jr of the 1784 will, that is the jr. who married Judith Woodson and Mary Leake, I would very much wish to know of them, by the references or by copies if you'll send them (I'll pay). (Or indeed those that show any Charles or any Christian was the child of a Charles Christian, "ours' or not, and an Elizabeth Hunt.)

My first knowledge of the claim that the Elizabeth Hunt you mention was the mother of our Charkes Christian jr was a statement to that effect from Lynn Archer (Elijah, William, Elijah W., William Augustus, William Paul, Lynn m. Archer) in Christian Family Chronicles, I, 68, Jan 1979, which says that the Charles Christian who received the Va. Land Grant in 1705 married this Elizabeth Hunt. One of my other Christian correspondents learned that the proof Archer mentioned was the John Hunt 1731 will which you mention.

Incidentally, in searching for the Archer reference I came upon your query in CFC, III, 230. Jan 1980.

I have this will and my deduction from it as my sole source is that Elizabeth Hunt the daughter and a Charles Christian the son-in-law were not the parents of our Charles Christian, jr. And therefore our Charles Christian jr was not a descendant of Hunts through the Elizabeth Hunt... although he may have been such through some other female ancestor.

Incidentally this will has an interesting history.

Some damn-Yankee pilfered the record book containing it from Richmond during the Civil war and took it off with him to New England as a souvenir. A few years ago one of this damn-Yankee's descendants, having become more civilized in the intervening century, returned the book to the Virginia Archives.

I give you the reasoning behind my deduction.

The will of Joseph Woodson. dated Jan 23, 1733 leaves to wife Joan (=Jane).. etc. and to son Tucker and Daus. Judith and Martha. Furthermore there is a proviso "if Tucker, Judith or Martha should die before they become of full age or marriage".. etc. This means that Tucker, Judith and Marha were not married by 23 Jan 1733, and were born after 1712 (presuming "of age" means 21). Make with me the assumption that the odder in the will is the birth order (an assumption I ordinarily shrink from making). That would have Tucker b. 1712, Judith 1714, Markha 1716... I meant to say not before those dates. If "of age" for fema les meant 18 then we'd have Judith born after 1715.. and inappreciable difference.

I and (mostly) others have recently clinched to my satisfaction the proposition that John Christian (B) was the son of Charles Christian ir. and his second wife Mary Leake. I am told, but have not seen it myself, of an obituary for John (B) of 1822 which states that he was 80 years old, which would have him born 1742.

The daughter Elizabeth, m. Humber, in 1757 and witnessed a will in 1757. If her majority was at 21 her birth would have been 1736, if 18, 1739. If she married at 18 her birth would be 1739, if at 16, 1741. Let us place her birth at 1738 ± 2. We do not have any direct proof that Elizabeth was the daughter of Mary Leake. However on the fact that the two faughters of Charles Christian jr, Judith and Luny, were treated differently from the rest of the brood in Charles' 1781. will I base my deduction that Judith and Lucy were the daughters of the first wife Judith Woodson, and all the others were children of the second wife, Mary Leake.

We now have two births in the second marriage occurring in the period 1738 to 1742. That means the second marriage, to Mary Leake, must have occurred observe in 1737-1741.

But the first marriage of Charles Christian jr, to Judith Woodson, could not have occurred before 1733, and since two daughters (and who knows what more) were born before 1737-1741, it follows that Judith Woodson mugt have married Charles Christian jr 1733-1737.

All this to deduce the best date for the first marriage of Charles, so that we can approximate his birth date from that.

There are other mentions in the literature of birth dates for Charles and Judith, but you are never able to find any objective evidence to support them.

Assume with me that Charles was 20 at marriage. Then his birth would be 1713-17. If he was older than 20 the argument I am about to make becomes even stronger. Note that the date deduced derived from both Elizabeth and John (B), but Elizabeth almost certainly was born before John. If we base the deduction solely on Elizabeth, 1736-40, the Mary Leake marriage would be 1735-1739, and the Judith marriage allowing for the two Judith daughters would be 1731-35. But we know it could hot have been before 1733, so that leaves us with 1733-35 as the possible range for Charles first marriage. And that gives us 1713-1715 as the range for his birth... that is not later than those dates.

Now for the will of John Hunt, dated 30 Jan 1727/8. / From it I deduce as follows. He had a son, not mentioned in the will, probably therefore died before 1728. The son's two daughters are named, Lucy Hunt and Elizabeth Hunt, inheritance to be given when they shall come to 18 or be married. This places the birth of Lucy and Elizabeth as after 1709.

He had a daughter Elizabeth, and a son-in-law Charles Christian her spouse. Charles Christian and his son, the grandson John were executors of the will. This places the birth of Carrles' son John at before 1706, since he had to be of age to be an executor. (I am practicing 18th Century Virginia law without a license.)

Another grandson, George, the son of Charles is given land. I deduce from this that George was at least 18 and probably at least 21 by 1728. And since he is the first heir memtioned in the will I take a guess that he was the eldest of Charles' children, i.e. born before John, say before 1704.

A granddaughter, Elizabeth Christian, Dau. of Charles at a to-be-born slave baby. I deduce that she was older than the other granddaughters, i.e. old enough to have charge of of slave... say at least 14. The other three grandaughters get each a silver spoon. I judge that they were infants, i.e. legally less than 14, and probably just young children. Still relying on the will order as possibly the birth order that places: Illizabeth, b. before 1714; Lucy before 1723; Susanna before 1725; Mary before 1727. These last three are constructed from the will date... but of course it is likely that they followed at the more-or-less two year interval after Elizabeth i.e. 1716, 1718, 1720, making them 12, 10 and 8 at the time the will was written.

As for the son-in-law Charles Christian: if he was the father of the George born before 1706 he himself must have been born before about 1686, and married before 1705 1703.

As to the daughter (of John) Elizabeth, it is not possible to tell from the will whether she was akive at the time of writing or not. At least the wording of the will allows either construction so far as I can see. However for my argument it does not matter.

Now if you will list these children of Charles Christian and Elizabeth Hunt you will se that six children of heirs are named, born between before 1704 and before 1727 and probably before 1720 or so.

BUT OUR CHARLES CHRISTIAN JR. BORN 1713-1715, RIGHT IN THE MIDST OF THESE CHILDREN IS NOT MENTIONED AS A GRANDSON AND HEIR OF JOHN HUNT. It is just untenable to hold that John Hunt bequeathed to eight grandchildren ranging in age from 8 to 24, and did not bequeath anything, even a silver spoon, to a 9th grandchild an alleged Charles Christian jr allegedly son of Charles Christian sr and Elizabeth Hunt, who was about 14 at the time of writing the will.

That is my basis, despite the Hunt name in the descendants, for concluding that our Charles Christian jr of the 1784 will was not the son of a Charles Christian and Elizabeth Hunt. I (A minor point, subject to rebuttal, that supports my argument is that in the Hunt will the son-in-law Charkes Chröstian is not named as Charles Christian \underline{sr} .)

So you can see why I am most anxious to have those deeds of yours that prove our Charles Christian jr. as a son of Elizabeth Hunt.

As I see it now, subject to further demostrations to the contrary, this Charles Christian, son-in-law to John Hunt was another Charles Christian, contemporary with our Charles Christian Sr.

(I keep referring to it as the 1784 will. Actually it is a 1783 will, predate probated in 1784.) Who he was is beyond me at present. There were all sorts of Christians floating around in Charles City and adjacent counties. And when I think of all the female Christians we don't know anything about. I shudder.

One other obvious procatalepsis. (That's a great word I just learned about that I've been practicing all my life. It meams anticipating your opponent's arguments and rebutting them before he gets a chance to propound them!) Someone will say that our Charkes Chritian jr. was a son of Chrales Christian and Elizabeth Hunt, born after the 1728 will was written and not included in any codicil. Of course that can't be, not for our Charles Christian jr anyway, who was getting married about 1734.

Well, you can see that I'm not going on to your Turner and Collier questions. If anyone has any information bearing on the foregoing reasoning and construction, pro or con, I would be most analous to learn of it.

Your query as to my source for Elizabeth as the given name of the Warren who m. John Christian "of Charles City". Enclosed my sheet for him showing what I know about him and where I got it from. As to "The Pomeroy Papers" I enclose the preface page in my compilation of that title. The "Marren" signifies the Warren section therein which Jackie Pomeroy got from Prof. William A. Christian as shown in her letter 6/25/80 to my volleague Archie Christian, enclosed. This Warren section contains 8 pages ending with the name and address of Prof. William A. (1905 libing in 1980). I am not sure that the entire 8 pages came from him because I'm not sure what Jackie means by "the early Warren", but I suspect that it did all come from him. He has done extensive work on his branch (which is the Mobile Christians). If you want I'll send you also the 8 pages (annotated with my DCA numbers) and you can decide for yourself whether the Elizabeth came from Wm. A. or from some other unidentified source. It was so nice to hear from you again--even if only to correct a mistake.

I know exactly how you feel! If you recall, I made a similar error in Volume No. III when I identified Letitia (Christian) Tyler's father as the son of William Christian and second wife Elizabeth Ann Collier when I knew all along that Elizabeth Ann was the first wife. It's difficult to explain such mental lapses, but they obviously occur. Your identification of Jane (Christian) Warren as daughter of the second wife, Sally Adkins, undoubtedly falls into the same category.

I'm sorry I did not catch the error before it appeared in your query but must confess that with the work load I had at the time I was handling the queries almost by rote. You may be sure, however, that a correction will appear as a "Footnote" in the next issue of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES, which will probably be ready as soon as if I were still operating "on schedule," my schedule being what it was.

I am planning a limited "correction" section for the index being prepared. That should alert readers to actual errors in original text. The section, of course, will not include the many additions found in the "Footnotes" since they will be adequately covered by the index itself.

As for the information you just sent: It prompted me to check my notes and still incomplete cross-reference file. I notice that I did not have the given name of John Christian's wife, Elizabeth (Varren. (Vhere did you learn her name? I believe the answer to your query is that your speculation is correct. All the known facts fit. I think that the reference to an "Aunt June" is simply a matter of transcriber's misreading Jane for June-perhaps based on careless script in the original will or in the recorded copy.

By the way, have you ever identified the spouses of all the children of William Christian and Sally Adkins/Atkins? My records are quite inadequate on that score. Not having had time for research, my notes continue to leave many gaps unfilled. So far, extra time for research has not been found.

Christian of the will may well be John Warren Christian son of John Christian "of Charles City" and Elizabeth Warren. Since John and Jane were siblings, Jane who married Edward Warren, was the blood aunt of John Warren and since they lived in Charles City County may well be the "old Aunt June (sic) Warren of Charles City County" mentioned in the will. Here I am writing letters when every moment should be spent in finishing the copy for the CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRONICLES now underway and, as usual, overdue. However, I am especially interested in your comments regarding a few questions which have emerged following reading of Eunie V. Stacy's CHRISTIAN OF CHARLES CITY.

1. Have you revised your evaluation as to exactly which Charles Christian married Elizabeth Hunt? At the time of your "Pear Colleagues" letter of February 26, 1983, you thought he was not the father of the Charles Christian, Ir., who married 1) Judith Woodson and 2) Mary Leake. At the time your arguments seemed convincing, but the deed mentioned in Stacy's book seems to support the conclusion that they were father and son.

As for why Charles Christian, Ir., was not mentioned in the will of John Hunt, I offer the following two possibilities: 1) that John Hunt had already given to the two oldest grandsons—John and Charles Christian—and mentioned John in the will only because he had made him executor. Notice that nothing was bequeathed to John. 2) Not as likely, but Charles' name could have been inadvertently omitted when the will was copied.

My proposed order of birth for the children of Charles and Elizabeth (Hunt) Christian would be as follows with estimated birth dates:

John Christian, born about 1703
Charles Christian, born about 1705 (making him older than wife Judith)
George Christian, born about 1707
Elizabeth Christian, born post 1709
Lucy Christian, born post 1709
Susanna Christian, born about 1718
Mary Christian, born about 1721
Twrner Hunt Christian, born about 1729

There may have been other older or younger children.

2) I have entered into a dialogue with Mrs. Stacy regarding her placement of the William Christian who married Martha Evans as a son of Charles and Mary (Leake) Christian. I question that this is correct but am keeping an open mind on the subject. I believe it far more likely that this William was the brother of the Andrew Christian who lived near him in Fayette County, Kentucky. Furthermore, Mrs. Stacy is not correct in some of her assumptions regarding the descendants of John Christian started on page 118 of her book, which I assume you have. Let me know if you are interested, and I will provide you with details and conclusions.

Thank you for sending the Warren-Christian references I requested. Surprisingly, Joy Pomeroy and I have never correesponded; but I will write to her on the chance that we may have material to exchange that will prove mutually helpful.

Like your notes on the children of Sally (Atkins) Christian, my information came primarily from Lamo's article. However, one of my correspondents, Mrs. W. J. Fletcher, infers from William Christian's 1806 will, proved 31 July 1808 in Charles City County, Virginia, that Thomas and Frances were born after 1785. I have not seen a copy of the will so cannot vouch for the accuracy of the information. There was, however, a Thomas Christian born between 1790 and 1800 listed as head of household in the 1830 census, probably the same as the 26 to 44-year old Thomas of the 1820 census, judging by the number of slaves in household: 27 in 1820 and 26 in 1830.

I can appreciate your efforts to compose a computer program that will index your records by your numbers! My own efforts have been much slower than I ever anticipated, but progress is gradually being made. Most of my computer work has been volunteer for a non-profit organization in which I am particularly interested.

1 agree with your suggestions concerning juture editions of CHRISTIAN FAMILY CHRON-101 ES and had wondered how to solve the determa. Use of the word "serial" is a good ama. I only wish that in the past I had used the volume number on each page linstead of the date), but that doesn't pose any real problems. I have more than enough material for several more volumes using the old format. I just wish I had more time for research to comment intelligently on discrepancies, etc.

Speaking of such matters as evaluation, there is little doubt that John Hunt had a sonin-law, Charles Christian; but there certainly is doubt as to exactly which Charles that was. We don't even know how many contemporaries named Charles Christian lived at that time.

1 am inclined to believe that your Chamles was the son and that his name

may have been omitted in the recorded copy of John Hunt's will. Have you ever seen copy of the original to compare with the copy in the Register? It seems to me that John Hunt would have named Charles as a grandchild if he were one. I also know how easy it is to skip a line when copying a document and have found a number of cases where this proved to be the case when the clerk copied one of the wills.

Be all that as it may, did I ever mention that on the basis of data in my files, I have different birth date estimates for the children of Charles and Elizabeth (Hunt) Christian than those given by Eunie V. Stacy. My tentative estimates follow:

John Christian, about 1703
Charles Christian, about 1705
George Christian, about 1707
Elizabeth Christian, post 1709
Lucy Christian, post 1709
Susanna Christian, about 1718
Mary Christian, about 1721
Turner Hunt Christian, about 1729

There may have been others who died young. By the way, have I ever mentioned to you that I believe Mary Christian named above (who married Stephen Watkins) was probably the same person as the Mary Watkins who married Anthony Christian 7 November 1755 in Amelia County, Virginia.

That's about enough speculation for one day.

Dear Louis:

Why do I think that the Mary Watkins, widow, who married Anthony Christian 7 November 1755 in Amelia County, Virginia, was the former Mary Christian, widow of Stephen Watkins?

The reasons are strictly circumstantial, even somewhat flimsy, but sufficiently compelling to me that I keep the possibility as a working hypothesis. Certainly, I do not have proof. I have not had sufficient time to follow Watkins family research to eliminate the possibility. Perhaps "possibility" is the key word.

Mary Christian, daughter of Charles and presumably Elizabeth (Hunt) Christian, was probably born after 1720. I believe her marriage to Stephen Watkins took place only a few years before her father Charles deeded him land on Wild Bore Creek 7 May 1750. Stephen Watkins' will was written 25 April 1754 and proved 24 April 1755 in Amelia County, Virginia. Thus, Mary Watkins would have been widowed seven to nineteen months at the time a widow, Mary Watkins, married Anthony Christian in Amelia County. Six to twelve months was the usual time for widows with small children to remarry, and the second marriage was to her own or her husband's relative in a high percentage of cases. If this is not the same woman, then whatever happened to Stephen Watkins' widow? Also, how many widows named Mary Watkins would one find in Amelia in the right age group?

The enclosed review of documentation on the life of Anthony Christian (1724-1794) shows that he elose enough to the right place at the right time to have been the Anthony Christian who married the widow. As you are aware, even today Amelia, Cumberland, and Powhatan Counties adjoin. I have found no evidence of a contemporary Anthony Christian. The others fall into the next generation—that of this man's son, also named Anthony. I have also enclosed a summary on the son. These summaries were preparedby me for a descendant of the Cocke County, Tinnessee, family who has accepted without question a D.A.R. lineage purporting to be from these men. Impossible, based on the known and proven facts.

Of course, as mentioned, I do not have proof that Anthony's wife Mary was the widow of Stephen Watkins and hope no one turns this possibility into "fact," which it is not! Naturally, I would be interested in your comments.

Thanks for including me on the list and thereby terminating my state of blissful ignorance about the people you are researching. I am not just now able to respond in the way you want because you have a huge wad of information there, because it is my practice to work on only a few things at a time, and especially because I'm afraid I have more questions than answers and would deluge you with them. For these raasons I do not return a marked copy as you want but I will hang on to it for further exploration.

My one positive contribution now is about the mother of your Robert (3) Christian, page 6, or more cautiously about the wife of his father your Thomas(2) Christian. I am satisfied that Agnes and I have definitely established her as Rebecca New, daughter of Edmund New. See our articles on the subject in CFC III, 183-186, and IV, 249-251, Jah 1980 and July 1980, resp. Does your omission of her name on page 6 indicate that you have a contrary opinion?

Not knowing if you care to work in this manner I restrict my questions to three.

- 1. The evidence that your Robert(3),s 1000 acres was divided among only three sons and not with a possible unborn fourth? I note that you assign the three 333 1/3 rd acres each thus indicating that you believe a fourth son was not born. I note that you have John(4) selling 200 acres on 2 Oct 1765 and 132 acres 4 Nov 1799, the two adding up to 332 acres, close to your 333 1/3, and that the description you give of the 132 acres ties it in with the inherited land. You don't quite tell us that the 200 acres was also indentifiable with the inherited land. Yes, you do Is it on this basis that you infer that each of the sons received about 332 acres out of the 1000 and therefore there were only three son heits? A good inference I would say, but is there other evidence that would move it from inderence more toward proof?
- 2. What is your demonstration that the Drury(4), son of Robert(3) was the Drury who had the liason with Elizabeth Upshaw?
- 3. What is your evidence that the John Christian who married Mary Maynard was your John (4)?

Best wishes for your work. I'm sure we all appreciate it.

1 still have seen no real evidence that Thomas Christian (3) married a Rebecca Price. See my Note #26.

I consider the distribution of the 1000 acres left by Robert Christian (3) as convincing evidence that he had only the three sons receiving the property live to maturity. If the wife were indeed pregnant at death of Robert, I have seen nothing that would identify the child.

Like you, I am interested in the chain of proof that Robert's Drury and John were the Drury Christian who had liason with Elizabeth (Hunt) Upshaw and the John who married Mary (?____) Maynard.

Much of my attention has been toward identifying and placing the children of Thomas Christian (3). . . . Slow and tedious! Progress, too, is being made on the index to Christian Family Chronicles and to the next issue.

Do let me know if and when you make any significant discoveries.

More congratulations are in order! I must say that I am impressed with your follow-through in obtaining copy of James Bryant's will and reviewing the material already at hand. To think that John Christian was identified as "son-in-law" all the time!

Speaking of review, I wish I had time to make a step-by-step analysis to find the answers to the following questions:

How many contemporaries named John Christian are we dealing with in Georgia? Did the same John Christian marry first Mary (____) Maynard and then Mary Bryant and then perhaps a Mary Harvey?

Or was Mary Maynard actually Mary (Bryant) Maynard?

Was there perhaps another Christian-Bryant connection, possibly through the Bradley line?

The last question above is prompted by appearance of the name Isaac Bryant among the sons of James Bryant; also Isaac Street, probably a son-in-law if husband of James Bryant's daughter Judith Street. I have often been intrigued about how the given name of Isaac came into the Christian line!

1 also wonder about the correct given name of James Bryant's wife. Was it really Clark? Could it have been Clara or Cloah? If, indeed, Clark, then she undoubtedly carried a family surname; and the marriage of Reuben Christian to Mary Ann Clark would not have been the first Christian connection to the Clarks.

Did you notice near the top of page 390 that William Cornelius Christian was a twin? Incidentally, the Charles Woodson Christian—son of Turner Hunt and Anna (Payne) Christian—who married 2) Mary Walton Maxwell had a son (C.W.C., Jr.) who married Sarah White, and they in turn named a son John Milton Christian. The senior and junior Christian are found in that list on page 390.

I have never studied McIntosh's History of Elbert County, Georgia but believe I should. You will notice that several interpretations are possible from the Bible abstracts. For example, the Althea (Vernon) Christian born December 8, 1845, is there identified as third wife--an impossibility since he married fourth before Althea was three years of age. D. A. R. records identify the third wife as Anna Woods. Perhaps Althea was their child. Also, it seems likely that Shelby and Robert E. were children of James C. and Sulenea M. (Smith) Christian although their placement in the list seems to show them as children of Ira and Elizabeth H. (Marbrey) Christian. Any clarification would be appreciated.

When you get to read McIntosh be prapared for errors. For example the Charles Woodson Christian labelled 6 on p. 390 is not the son of William Payne Christian labelled 5 on p. 388, but is the same Charles Woodson Christian labelled 5 on p. 388 in his second matriage to Mary Walton Maxwell (who by the way was 16 and he 49 at marriage). And these two did have a son Charles Woodson Christian jr as you say and as McIntosh says.

BUT WHENCE YOUR SATEMENT THAT THIS JR MARRIED SARAH WHITE?

I have no further data on the foregoing C.W.C jr.
But I do have on a Charles W. G... Christian, the 10th child of Jesse George Christian (II) and Ann Maxwell, born 1 Aug 1860. (William Coonelius, the twin was the 8th child.) McIntosh has him p. 390 marrying Nealie Johnson and akso under the Maxwell family on p. 494 marrying Sarah White in what I take to be a second marriage. But neither of these two marriages produced a John Milton Christian. (And by the way what is the significance of yokur mentioning the John Milton?) (Note I have no evidence for the marriage being 1st or 2nd -just my arbitrary assignent.)

A minor point: I did not take the Isaac Street the witness of James Bryant's will to be the husband of Judith Bryant. Reason: I didn't think that heirs could witness and Judith's husband would be the heir in the days when the husband owned everything. Am I wrong in this? I took the witness Isaac Street to be the father-in-law of Judith.

Your suggestion that maybe John Christian married a Mary Maynard, a Mary Bryant, a Mary Harveym ----- OH NO, I don't even want to think about that! He would have been Mary-ing crazy. Or else he justhated the genealogists of the future.

I have not done anything with the Ira#Robert Bryant business kexage because I have not made any connection with my line.

WHENCE YOU HUNT IN TURNER HUNT? Nowhere in the Turner Christian documents and reference is he termed HUNT except in a letter from Zelma Allen Tabor to Ethel (Asa Kyrus) Christian 7/14/1926 and in McClanahan (and you know what I think of McC.). I'm guessing that Zelma marely tacked that on because she knew of a (nother) Turner Hunt Christian. How I wish we had that Turner Christian Bible!

The questions in your letter of June 24--just received--remind me anew of why I have postponed publishing much information on some of the Georgia lines. Overwhelming:

The comment about a Charles Woodson Christian, Jr., marrying a Sarah White was simply in passing (apparently based on something in the notes Betsy sent. In checking my files, I notice that some years ago I received data from John D. Christian, quoting Candler and Evans Cyclopedia of Georgians, Vol. I, page 381, showing Sarah White as the wife of Charles Woodson, Jr., son of Charles Woodson Christian and second wife, Mary Walton Maxwell. I do not have the date or source for the Cyclopedia entry, however. Apparently, the Cyclopedia of Georgians is also one source for identification of Dr. John Milton Christian as a son of Charles Woodson and Sarah (White) Christian, Jr. I made special note of the "Milton" because of the earlier use of the given name "Milton" in the family of Isaac and Mildred (White) Christian. As you may be aware, the name "Milton" or "Melton" appears among the Whites during the eighteenth century.

I must make a correction: because of the <u>possible</u> use of the name "Milton" among the children of Isaac and Mildred (White) Christian. There is, of course, the possibility that Milton Christian was not their son, rather Isaac's brother, nephew, or another relationship.

I accept your speculation about relationship of Isaac Street to Judith Street (that is, probably father-in-law) and should have been more careful and thoughtful when previously mentioning him as a possible husband for her. It would, indeed, have been inappropriate for an heir to be a witness.

As for the "Hunt" in the name of Turner Hunt Christian: I really can't say how I came to use the middle name for this particular man. It's always difficult to determine whether an error is being repeated from one researcher to another to another, and I certainly hope I am not contributing to the perpetuation of an error here. I have now marked my files with a question mark on his middle name.

By the way, in Powhatan County, Virginia, Deed Book, Vol. III, page 65, 30 October 1799, John Christian and Mary, his wife, of the county of Amherst, to James Bryant of the County of Powhatan . . . The original deed enclosed to James Bryant Aug. 6th 1805. I found the foregoing while in Salt Lake City recently.



For two or three years I have been wrestling with the Berry apostasy regarding the immediate descendants of Lamb's "57 William" reported by Lamb as m. (1) "it is thought a Miss Collier", and (2) Susan "undoubtedly Browne". Lamb reports the children of the 1st wife as:

William, m. (1) Elizabeth or Ann Collier

(2) Sally Atkins

John "of New Kent" m. Mildred Collier, sister of Ann.

Lamb reports the children of Susan "Browne" as:

Anne, 21 Feb 1735 , St Peter's Register
William Browne
(Capt.) Henry
Elizabeth
Mary
Susanna, 29 May 1757, St. Peter's Register
Turner

The Berry apostasy demolishes this ancestry for John "of New Kent", and also that of the children of Susan "Browne". In connection with the former he also demolishes the conventional theories on the ancestry of the Charles Christian of the 1783 Goochland will. This last I have not yet thoroughly studied but probably will ultimately accept.

Right now I send this communication to let you all know that (thanks to a slight stroke I had in June) I have been able to concentrate on the John "of New Kent" and Susan "Browne" arguments of Michael Berry, AND I ACCEPT THEM, and have even I believe amplified them a bit, subject to his concurrence.

His arguments rely on information in several suits and related documents reported in 2nd Randolph's Reports and Chalkley I have both of these and have excerpted and put in chronological or other order the contents. There are a flock of earlier suits incorporated in these including one multiple suit that goes by the name of Norvell vs. Camm that I haven't actually seen because the print of it would cost me \$58 !

Berry's deductions out of these, which I concur in and expand a bit are as follows.

The father of Susan Browne Christian's children was not a William but a John in a 2nd marriage:

Capt. Henry, c 1746 Turner, after 1747 Elizabeth, after 1747 Susan, after 1747 Edmund, after 1749 William Browne, after 1757, d. 1805

In his 1st marriage John married a Sarah:

Mary, 8 Oct 1735, St. Peter's Register John Charles

This John (sr) was he who with James Christian and William Brown got the 1755 patent for 3926 acres on Rocky Run in Albemarle, which for non payment of quit rents was forfeited to John & Charles of the 1st marriage in 1774. John had died c. 1767 and his widow Susan starting in 1768 was "returning the profits" of the estate to the minors Turner through William Browne above, Capt. Henry being of age and married by 1768.

It is John. the son of the 1st marriage, who married Mildred Collier $\begin{tabular}{ll} $\mu_{\rm Z}/5\ell_{\rm L}$ \\ \end{tabular}$

Lamb has a Mary among the children of Susan Browne. There is no evidence that Mary was Susan's child, but the St. Peter's Register has a Mary 1735 as daughter of a John and a Sarah. For that reason I append her as a child of John's 1st wife.

Lamb has his Mary marrying William Douglas sr.with the only child mentioned being William Douglas jr. So far I can't find any evidence among the descendants of this William Douglas jr. that would specify the ancestry of Mary. But for the moment, lacking anything else, I'm taking the Mary who married William Douglas as the 1735 Mary daughter of John.

Now there remain unresolved from Lamb the identity of the two children Anne,1735, and Susanna,1757, of the St. Peter's Register daughters of a William and a Susan. Since their parents were a William and a Susan I suppose it was natural that Lamb took them to be Susan Browne's children . by William. However since all the other children are proven to be those of John these two are left hanging as children of some William and some Susan.

I had long been suspicious of the way Lamb had it because between 1735 and 1757, 22 years, only 4 children were ascribed to William and Susan Browne. That's not the way things went in the 18th century. NOW I am left with the 22 years and NO intervening children! How's about that?

I am now not even sure that the William and Susan parents of Anne 1735 are the same as the William and Susan parents of Susannah 1757. Nor do I at present offer any deductions as to the parents of either William. It is certain however that the 1757 Susannah is not the Susan dau. of Susan for whom "the profits were reported" in 1768.

There is another suit reported in 6th Munford's that I have also excerpted. It concerns James Christian (sr.) of the 1752 will, d. 1758. He had children, the sons at least:

Charles d. um. 1761
James (jr) will 1772, d. 1781
John d 1781-1801, m. Joyce, probably
no children
George, d. 1784/5 wife l. in 1820
his children:
James
Elizabeth
Charles
Sally.

This James Christian (sr) is the same one who with John Christian and William Brown patented the 3926 acres in 1755. The lands in question in 6th Munford's were patented 1747 and after, on the Fluvanna near Buffalo Island.

You have noticed that I make no effort to assign the parents of the James or the John. That is where the rest of the Berry apostasy comes in which I probably will accept as I wade though the morass. I will say that I look with a very suspicious eye on the assignment of Charles Christian of the 1783 will (uncontested as the ancestor of my Janie) as the loving son of Charles Christian (sr) of Westover Parish of the 1754 gift. There are just too many Charles Christians floating around in Goochland and elsewhere.

You will be interested to know that I now have a computer which will, when I get around to it, finally allow me to make a deep index to my records, one of the things holding up publication (in microfiche). My son Charlou, a Mormon, is putting my records on the computer in a LDS program Personal Ancestral file, PAF. He has entered some 300ϕ names so far and estimates I have some 10,000 total to When completed the whole shootin' match will be sent directly to the SLC computers by telephone "modem". I am still collecting new data and correcting old data but most of my time must be devoted to getting my records in less clean shape before my own obituary has to more or appear among them. Nothing morbid.... just a recognition that maybe I won't be living to age 95 after all, and I have a lot of other things to sew up in addition to genealogy.

I'll be glad to have your comments and if possible corrections and amplifications of the foregoing.

One little piece of unfinished business-

A long time ago I promised to get the will of James Christian dated 18 May 1752 from Goochland. Reciting the story for the information of the others receiving copies of this letter: His will is in Albemarle WB 2 p. 48 and is from there given by Chapellear as best he could read it. You, as I recall, also read the will in Richmond and found it no more legible than Chapellear had.

But Lamb says that the will is probated in <u>Goochland</u> 15 June 1759. I have finally gotten around to asking for that recording from Goochland.

Result: No such will in Goochland. There are deeds, and I enclose the page 154 of their Index where I presume they would have found such a will, which shows the deeds mentioned. [The logic of the indexing escapes me ... evidently the CH's where given names beginning with J are to be found... don't know how the Churchill's crept in.]

So we have now only two sources: you and Chapellear. I therefore ask you to go over your reading with a very careful eye or recollection: Is there anything in your reading beyond what is in Chapellear? Especially fascinating is the possibility that some of the ellipsis in Chapellear might say "the 3926 acres patented by me and John Christian and William Brown". I am shortly sending you and several others a big batch of "deep thinking" regarding those 3926 acres and the Berry apostacy and Berry and I are just aching to know what is in thosedots...; in Chapellear.

The enclosed typescript was sent me by Virginia Koos. Rlease direct you attention to the part outlined re Gregory. The pencil annotations on the sheet are those of Virginia's sister who dug these up for her.

The problem is to indentify the Christians involved. Can you offer any suggestions?

There are two possibilities, outlined on my pencil sheet.

1. A female, name unknown, married 1st Capt. Wm Gregory and had his only child William H. Gregory. Then the Gregory widow married a Christian and had Edmund and Nancy.

2. The unknown female married 1st a Christian and had Edmund and Nancy, and, Christyian having died, married Cpt. Wm. Gregory and had the one child William H.

In 1830 New Kent census there is an Edmund, born 1790-1800, with wife, son and daughter. If that Edmund is the Edmund of the Gregory business then the correct pattern is my # 1. Reservation: that would leave a gap between the two broods from before 1776 for William H. Gregory to 1790-1800 for Edmund.

If my # 2 is correct then the 1830 Edmund is not that one, half brother of William H. Gregory:

I have a vague recollection of a Hilliard somewhere in my records, or maybe correspondence, but I can't dredge it up and my computerized retrieval system is not yet in operation.

Can you help ?

A request for any information you have that allows a better birth date for your Elijah than I can come up with.

- I know L.C. Christian's date of "about 1758". But I distrust that because of two deeds:
- 1. 20 Aug 1770 Goochland Charles sr to John (presume his son) 200 acres out of a tract Charles then lived on. Witnessed by Elijah Christian. A 1758 birth would have the witness only 12 years old.
- 2. 13 Oct 1775 Goochland from Charles for love to Elijah 400 acres where Elijah lives adjoining Charles land. A 1758 birth would have Elijah the recipient only 17 years old... and "living" on his own pad.

Legal age, for witnessing,in Colonial VA was 21 for both male and female. So either there's a to-me-unknown Elijah Christian party to these deeds, or this Elijah was born 1749 or before, or they just didn't give a damn about legality.

Very odd to be giving 400 acres to a 17-year-old living on his own on it. So again either another Elijah Christian or Elijah mature, born before 1754, and maybe even married.

I have thoroughly gone over the Col. Albert Sidney Britt papers you sent me in connection with Elizabeth Britt's parentage. I follow his arguments for the birth date of Elizabeth Britt from which I can't tie her down better than 1750-1757. The Col. was trying to use her inferred date to establish Elijah's.

This all comes up in connection with my present efforts to establish the best rationale I can for the birth order and dates of Charles' children, and facts of his marriages. I enclose my first paper in that effort.

If you have newer data on the date of Elijah's birth, of her birth, of their marriage or of the births of their children please shoot it to me.

I learn from the Col. that Thomas Francis Christian Allgood your great grandfather is the author of the turn of the century paper on the Britt family. If it contains information on Elijah's descendants not already supplied me by you a few years ago, and if you have the work can you lend it to me? Or send me xeroxes of the pertinent passages re Christians?

Will send you the paper on Charles' marriages and children when I complete it. But need to tie down Elijah before I go much further with it.

"CHARLES CHRISTIAN MARRIED JUDITH WOODSON"

This is part of an attempt to trace the origin, documentation, and authenticity of that statement.

In the Richmond Standard for 17 Jan 1880 there appeared an article on the Woodson Family prepared by R.A. Brock of Richmond from data furnished him by various correspondents. I have the print of that article. It contains the statement that "Charles Christian married Judith Woodson".

In WMQ 9,254-6,1902;10,44-,1902; 10,185-191,1902; 11,50-58,190(2?) the then Editor published a new account from county records and "other contemporaneous authorities" (contemporaneous with the events not with 1902), stating that Brock's account was so trustworthy that where no conflict was found the Editor printed Brock's statement just as he found it, indicating the same by quotation marks.

The Editor finally published 11,54-58, the paper on which Brock drew for most of his Standard account. The Editor states that the paper and the notes attached, as their reading indicates, were compiled between 1790 and 1800. Its history is given by a Mrs. Bates mother of C.W. Bates of St. Louis, MO. [This was Ellen Wilson Woodson who married Richard Bates.]:

----[]'ed material inserted by LK -----

"The "Woodson Pedigree" was written by Charles Woodson [6,m. Ann Trotter, Charles 5, m (1) Mary Pleasants. Tarleton 4, John 3, Robert 2, John Woodson 1] the son of Charles by Mary Pleasants. Sarah Bates [7] the daughter of Thomas Fleming Bates and Caroline Matilda Woodson[6, Charles 5 by Agnes Parsons widow of Samuel Richardson] was visiting her uncle Charles [6] and while she was there he wrote it and gave it to her. She gave it to Charles[7, George 6, Charles 5, by Agnes Parsons] Charles [7] thinks Charles [5] wrote at least part if it." ...end of quote from Mrs. Bates.

In the WMQ printing 11,56, it is writen that Joseph Woodson [3,Richard 2 corrected to Robert2,John 1] and his wife Jane Woodson [4,John 3, John 2,John 1] "had many sons and daughters but left.....2, Judith, married Charles Christian."

The question now is whether that last"Judith Woodson married Charles Christian" comes from the WMQ Editor or from Brock.. that is from Mrs. Bates' paper and the Brock account or from independent subsequent research by the WMQ Editor.

WMQ 10, 185 ff comprises additions and corrections to the preceding two installments of the Woodson account of the Editor, one of which, p. 186, is a correction and note to 10,47, relating to the children named in the will of Joseph above, proved Goochland 15 Oct 1734 Goochland, as follows verbation:

- 55 Mary (who married "Stephen Woodson")
- 56 Judith (who married "Charles Christian")
- 57 Martha (who married "John Cannon")

In accordance with the Editor's statement the quotation marks signify that these are Brock's statements to which the Editor has found no conflicts (as we have found in the Brock paper itself) . And the Editor provides no additional corroborative evidence.

CONCLUSION FROM THESE DOCUMENTS:

The sole origin of the statement "Judith Woodson married Charles Christian" is the 1790-1800 document written by Charles Woodson [6] and possibly by Charles [5]. It discusses events occuring about 60 years prior to its composition. It is not an independent statement by the WMQ Editor of 1902.

have not searched for the original paper If it still exists it may well be among the descendants of the quite prominent Bates family of St. Louis.

I welcome any comments pro or con the foregoing.



Identities are as follows: The L. Christian is Edward Leake Christian, son of Dr. George Christian and first wife, Martha Walton, whose family Bible gives his birth as 12 January 1786 and death as 10 August 1825. Rebachay Christian was his first wife (Edward Leake Christian's first wife), who, according to family Bible was born 2 October 1784 or 1789. A "4" and "9" are often confused in script as are certain "4's" and "6's." I believe that the JHC was their son James H. Christian, born 20 April 1811. At the moment, I don't have time to locate identity of CLC and PXC.

Still almost hopelessly behind! More later.

.Questions for the anonymous author of the Drury Christian article, CFC III, 169-170, Jan 1980:

P. 169 says he wrote his will July 1785. P. 170 cites the will dated 25 Apr 1780.

Douglas Register has only the year 1751 for marriage of Drury and Lucretia. What is the source for the 25 Feb 1751?

The MacJones Douglas Register as I read it has James baptized 23 Apr 1753. P. 170 has born 23 Apr 1758. Lamb by the way has it 30 Apr 1758. I know I didn't read the baptized wrong. Did I or MacJones read the 53 wrong? A 53 can look like a 58.

Douglas has Gideon born 16 Aug 1760, bapt. 26 Sep 1760. Article has bapt. 16 Aug 1760.

Douglas has Ann born 3 Mar 1764, bapt. 8 Apr 1764. Article has bapt. 3 Mar 1764.

Will mentions 7 children. 8 are listed and James listed as died before 1785. I gather that the author took James as dead by the time of the will, thus only 7 mentioned. However death of James, if that's the explanation, must be before date of writing the will 25 Apr 1780, not before date of proving July 1785.

I note that the author has reservations about Drury Christian & Lucy Bradley as the parents of this Drury. I do too. I have 3 Drury's tangled up here:

- 1. "Drury the heir" mentioned in Drury sr's will.
- "Drury the liason" who had the liason with 2. Elizabeth Upshaw.

3. This Drury who married Lucy Williams.

If any of these are to collapsed into one I don't know if it is 1 & 2, or 1 & 3. I'm sure it's not 2 & 3 since "Drury the liason" left another will in VA. HELP!

THE MARRIAGES AND CHILDREN OF CHARLES CHRISTIAN

This is an attempt to arrive from original documents at a rational structure for the marriages and order of birth of the children of Charles Christian of the 1783 Goochland will. This man is regularly called Charles Christian \underline{jr} but I refrain from that because there are so many Charles Christians \underline{jr} and \underline{sr} in that period and place. In fact the same man may appear in the records as both \underline{sr} and \underline{jr} . I use only the unequivocal term Charles Christian of the 1783 will.

In another paper I have explored the original statement that "Charles Christian married Judith Woodson". The Judith Woodson (among the many Judith Woodsons of that era) is the daughter of Joseph Woodson and his first cousin once removed Jane Woodson. However the statement and the several secondary versions of it do not reveal which Charles Christian is the groom. That can be explored by means of the 1783 will itself, [Goochland Book 13 p. 359-361, dated 18 Sep 1783, proved 16 Feb 1784].

The heirs as written are:

son William -land

son Walter -land

son George -land "whereon I now live"

dau Morning Christian -1/2 land whereon

The first significant observation is the treatment of Lucy Woodson and Judith Woodson Danniell, so different from the treatment of the others. The conclusion is that these two bear a different relationship to Charles than the other children. The inference is that they are children of a first wife, the others children of a second wife.

The daughter, Lucy Christian, is called Lucy Woodson in the will because she was married to Drury Woodson. She named her first daughter Judith presumably in memory of her mother.

"Judith Woodson Danneill" had married by 1761 Chesley Daniel. In secondary works [Worth S. Ray: Colonial Granville and Its People, 1973 reprint of 1945, page 267. Hayden: Virginia Genealogies, 1966 reprint of 1891, page 321] she is called Judith Christian. The inference is that her full name is Judith Woodson Christian and therefore that she is the child of Charles Christian and Judith Woodson. However except in the will her name nowhere appears as that and it may be that Charles in composing his will added the name Woodson in order to distinguish her, after the fact, from the daughter also Judith of his second wife. At any rate her parentage is supported by the names of two of her children: Judith Christian Daniel (her first daughter) and Woodson Daniel.

Her position in the birth order is insecure. On the premise that the will order repeats the birth order one would want to place the Lucy Woodson as the first child, but on the premise that first children are likely to be the ones named after the parents one wants go place Judith Woodson Christian as first.

However another circumstance enters. As will be shown Judith Woodson the wife of Charles Christian died wihin a few years of her marriage. It may be that Judith Woodson died in childbirth or soon thereafter and Charles named the new baby in memory of his wife. My own choice is for this last explanation, maintaining thus the will order-birth order parallel.

Clinching the parentage of Judith Woodson Christian is a 1905 letter from Miss A. Josephine Cox [WMQ, 13,209,1905] of Charlottesville, VA. Josephine (5) was the greatgrandaughter of John Humber and Elizabeth Christian daughter of Charles [male Cox(4), Judith Humber(3), Elizabeth Christian(2), Charles(1)]. She was also the greatgrandaughter of Judith Christian daughter of Charles [Josephine's mother(4), Josephine's grandmother or grandfather(3), Judith Christian(2), Charles(1)].

She states:" I always used to hear my mother speak of "Aunt Daniel" who lived in Granville County, NC. She was called "Aunt Judith Daniel" and was a half-sister of my great grandparents. I remember that I could not understand how it was that she and her sister, my greatgrandmother Lacy, had the same name and my mother explained that she was only half-sister, and that it was not at that time at all an uncommon thing to give sisters or brothers of the half-blood the same names. ... My mother was born in 1808 and died in her 85th year was [sic] raised by her grandmother Lacy and thus learned at first hand from her a great deal of the history of the Christian family. She

remembered many of the older members of her grandmother's generation."

The differential treatment of Lucy and Judih Woodson in the will is deeper than it appears at first reading. They did not participate in the remainder of the estate and they were given only one shilling because Charles had provided for them before. However Charles had also provided for some of the other children "before", viz: to John 200 acres, 20 Aug 1779, to Elizabeth Humber [I have no date], to Elijah 13 Oct 1775. Yet these all participated in the remainder along with the four children who received land in the will itself. In Charles' mind Lucy and Judith Woodson were definitely in a different category from the others. They were children of the first wife.

The will of Joseph Woodson, father of Judith Woodson, is dated 23 Jan 1733. [Goochland Deed Book 2 1734-1736]. It leaves to wife Joan [=Jane], to grandchildren Elizabeth and Mary Woodson presumably daughters of daughter Mary by then married to Stephen Woodson, and to son Tucker and daughters Judith and Martha, and provides that "if Tucker, Judith or Martha should die before they become of full age or marry".

This indicates that Tucker, Judith and Martha were not of age and not married on 23 Jan 1733. The age of majority for both males and females being 21 all three must have been born after 1712. Taking the birth order to be the order in the will this gives Mary, Tucker, Judith, Martha. But if Tucker was born after 1712 then allowing 2 years means Judith born after 1714, Martha after 1716.

Judith was still unmarried in January 1733, meaning her marriage to Charles Christian occurred after January 1733. And her first child, here taken as Lucy Christian, was then born 1734 or after, and Judith Woodson Christian 1735 or after.

The remainder clause of Charles Christian's will of 1783 names the sons in a group first, then the daughters in a group. This is quite common in wills of that period. With the assumption that the will order parallels the birth order the will gives the sequence of the sons and the sequence of the daughters but does not place the order of the daughters among the sons. The first decision to be made then is the birth order of Elizabeth as first among the daughters versus Charles as first among the sons. Incidentally Charles as the first son fittingly is given his father's name.

We have only two fixes on a birth date for Charles, neither very strong. There is a 1765 deed where Charles Christian Senr., of Goochland gives to Charles Christian jr for love 286 acres on the east side of Deep Creek Branch of the Lickinghole. Granting my uncertainty



about Charles Christians of and jr in Goochland I do take the grantor here to be the Charles of the 1783 will and the grantee Charles jr, and not that Charles of the 1783 will is the grantee. Clouding an already cloudy picture is the fact that a Charles Christian of sometimes of Westover Parish, held land on the Deep Creek Branch of the Lickinghole and even deeded some of it to a Charles Christian jr. of Goochland back in 1750 and 1754. However, on that cloudy basis, if Charles Christian of Goochland of the 1783 will deeded land to Charles Christian jr in 1765, then Charles Christian jr must have been at least 21 at the time thus born before 1744.

The second shaky fix arises from the marriage data of Charles, the son, with Sarah Duke evidenced by the birth of their only known son Charles Hunt Christian sr, 18 Nov 1770 [Douglas Register]. If this is the first son the marriage occurred before February 1770, giving a birth for Charles before 1749 assuming age at least 21 at marriage. Indeed it is quite possible that the gift of love was in connection with the marriage in which case the marriage would occur about 1765. Countering this is a 5 year gap between such a marriage and the birth of Charles Hunt Christian, not likely in those days.

The best we can do for Charles then is a birth before 1744 or before 1749.

For Elizabeth we can do better. Elizabeth married John Humber in St. Peters' Parish, Goochland, 31 Mar 1757 [Douglas Register]. But on 31 Oct 1757 John Humber, Elizabeth Humber, and a Charles Christian jr witnessed the will of Walter Leake [Goochland Will Book 7 p. 279 via Chappelear, The Leake Family p. 9,10]. A minor could not be a legal witness for a will and the age of majority for females as well as males was 21 so Elizabeth must have been born before 1737 In any case Elizabeth the first daughter was also the first child of the second marriage.

With the first child of the second marriage born before 1737 and two children born of the first marriage which took place 1733 or after this leaves only short duration for the first marriage. The best we can do is place the birth of Lucy Christian at 1733/1734, and the birth of Judith Woodson Christian at 1734/1735 simultaneous with or shortly before the death of Judith Woodson the first wife... and the second marriage date 1736. Widowers with tiny babies did not wait long in those days to take another helpmate.

Next: who was the second wife?

The will of Walter Leake 31 Oct 1757 names wife Judith and among the children a Mary Christian.[Goochland Deed Book 7 1755-1759]. The witnesses were John Humber,

his wife Elizabeth Christian Humber and a Charles Christian jr whom I take to be the father of Elizabeth thus Charles of the 1783 will. (Charles, Elizabeth's brother, although he was truly the Charles jr at the time, was not of age for witnessing in 1757). The wife was Judith Mask, born 14 Apr 1698 [St.Peter's]. Chappelear, who prints this will, skirts the issue by the statement "...Mary Leake who is said to have married a Mr. Christian ...". However the identity of the husband of Mary Leake Christian as Charles of the 1783 will is strongly supported by the names given to the descendants of this couple.

- A. The mother of Mary Leake was Judith Mask. The son Elijah Christian had a son Elijah Willis Christian who named his son Obed Mask Christian.
- B. The son Dr. George Christian named one of his sons Edward Leake Christian.
- C. Her father was Walter Leake. She named a son Walter Christian... incidentally the first appearance of a Walter in the Christian line up to that point.
- D. The will of Walter Leake was, as shown, witnessed by Charles Christian jr, his son-in-law and one of the latter's children Elizabeth.
- E. The 1783 will itself was witnessed by Josiah Leake [age 58 a brother-in-law] and the latter's daughter Lucy Leake.

But uneqivocal confirmation of the identity of Mary Leake as the wife of Charles of the 1783 will is found in the pension papers of the son Walter [W6669] which contain [Frames 390, 391] the family Bible as follows:

"Walter Christian the son of Charles Christian and Mary Christian was borned September 23 1760. Patty Christian the wife of Walter Christian and daughter of Thomas and Pebab Walton was borned December the 1 [?] 1766. Walter Christian and Pattey Walton was married the last day of July 1783."

AND BELOW THIS IN A DIFFERENT HAND ON THE BIBLE PAGE ITSELF:

Charles Christian Thomas Walton Mary Leak Phebe Murry

These are clearly a notation giving the identity, in the Bible, of the parents of the bridal pair, the parents of Pattey (Martha) Walton known to be Thomas Walton and Phoebe Murr[a,e?]y, and the parents of Walter known to be Charles Christian and Mary

CONCLUSION: The second wife was definitely Mary Leake.

To accomodate the birth of Elizabeth 1736/1737 the marriage to Mary Leake must have occurred 1735/1736. Mary Leake's birth then can be placed before 1718. She is not mentioned in the 1783 will so was dead by 1783. Her last definitely certifiable child ,George, was born in 1762 so her death can be dated between 1763 and 1783. However a judgement call made later herein assigns the birth of Mourning about 1765 or later and on that basis Mary Leake must have died between 1765 and 1783.

The next son, John, is he who in adulthood took middle name "Buffalo" to distinguish himself from one the or more contemporary Johns. Would that all had been so future Christian genealogists! thoughtful o f elucidation of the decades-long puzzle of the identity of his wife Judith Leake we owe to James L. Christian. Jane G. Putnam, Edna M. Russell and Agnes Pearlman [CFC IV, 1 256-265, Jul 1980, V,346-353, Jan 1981]. A supplementary article [CFC VI, 510. Jul 1981] establishes his parentage as Charles Christian of the 1783 will by showing that the names of every one of his children are drawn from either his wife's Leake family. Mary Leake's family or Charles Christian's family.

His obituary [The Virginian, Lynchburg, Vol II, No. 10, Oct 10, 1823, page 3 l recites his death 26 Sep 1823 in his 80th year. This places his birth in the year ending 26 Sep 1743.

This leaves a 7 year gap between the birth of the first daughter Elizabeth 1736/1737 and the second son John 1742/1743 with so far only the first son Charles between, and that birth only shakily established as before 1744. This matter is addressed later herein.

The next daughter in the will, Mary, married James Gresham 19 Dec 1770 [Douglas Register]. James and Mary Gresham witnessed the marriage bond of Turner Christian 3 Jan 1778 when she was undoubtedly well of age. The marriage date, assuming marriage at no younger than 18 or 20 would place her birth at before 1750/1752. Her sister Elizabeth in our construction was 21 at marriage.

The next daughter Judith married Benjamin Lacy 25 Oct 1774. Assuming the same construction as for her sister Mary this would place her birth at before 1754/1756.

Bearing on the birth of the next son, Elijah, we have only two deeds. He witnessed a deed by which his father Charles sr Goochland conveyed 200 acres out of a tract that Charles then lived on to his son John, 20 Aug 1770 [I do not have the original deed]. This would place his birth at before 1749. On 13 Oct 1775 Charles Christian sr, Goochland, for love conveyed to Elijah 400

acres where Elijah lived adjoining the lands of Charles Christian sr. If he was born before 1749 this occurred at age greater than 26. One wishes to make this a marriage grant. Indeed the first established child of Elijah and his wife Elizabeth Britt, William, is age 60-70 in the 1840 census [Troup, GA, p. 323] thus making his birth 1770/1780, which fits in with a marriage about 1775. This would make Elijah more than 25 at marriage. The birth of his wife Elizabeth Britt can be placed at 1750-1757 making her appropriately a few years younger than Elijah [Construction of the children of Elizabeth's parents William Britt and Hannah Conoly, paper by Col. Albert Sidney Britt, a descendant, c. 1979].

The birth date "about 1758" given by L.C. Christian, great grandson of Elijah [WMQ,15, 198-201,1907] is certainly in error.

This is certainly in It is recorded in Turner Christian's "very small I have related my fruitless search for this Bible Bible". in another paper in this series "The Search for the Turner Christian Bible". Turner's marriage to Anna Payne occurred 1778 and required the consent of his father Charles 3 Jan Twenty eight year old grooms do not require a Christian. father's consent. Turner must have been less than 21 thus born after 3 Jan 1757. His bride Anna Payne was born 25 May 1762, thus was only fifteen at marriage. I cannot explain why she then did not require the consent of her father. It is even stretching it a bit to envision a groom nearly 21 and a bride only 15. One would feel better about it if the groom were 17 or 18, thus born after 1760.

We have no basis for the birth of the next son in the will, William, other than the will order itself. Some genealogists assign this William as he who married Martha Evans and died in Kentucky in 1828. That cannot be. For in the will of 18 Sep 1783 William is given 400 acres in Amherst County "but if he die without issue then to his brothers Walter and George". However the William who married Martha Evans did have issue, a son John, born 3 weeks prior, on 28 Aug 1783 [Douglas Register]. It cannot be that Charles writing his will in Goochland did not know of the birth of a grandson in the same county 3 weeks previous.

A descendant of Elijah, L.C. Christian [WMQ, 15,198,1907], has him "captured by the British and starved to death on a British vessel". Since he could have been captured by the British anywhere between 1776 and 1783, or even in 1812 !, this even if true is of no help in establishing his birth date with the desired accuracy.

Coming between Turner and Walter he must have been born 1757/1759.

Finally with Walter we come to a son whose birth date is totally established, 23 Sep 1760 [Pension papers Pattey Christian, # W6669, cited previously].

the last known son, George, was born 26 Sep 1762.

> [Mrs. Leonora Ellen Jones Jones of Albany GA did extensive researches on George and his ancestors and urged DAR membership on many of her relatives, his descendants. She must have possessed a family Bible containing the data she presented on births, detailed deaths, and marriages. I have advertised for her relatives said to have her genealogical papers but without success. 1

Mourning Christian, the next and last daughter married Drury Christian 14 Mar 1785 [Sweeny, Marriage Bonds Amherst: Drury Christian consent of father Robert, consent of Mornin J. In the 1810 census [Amherst, p.14 Via CFC] Drury Christian and his wife are over 45, thus born before 1765. In the 1820 census [Amherst, p. 21] Morning Christian is born before 1775. In the 1830 census [Amherst.p.527 via CFC I.56. Jan 1979 1 Mourning is listed as age 70-80, thus born 1750-1760. (But with Walter, as shown beyond, born 23 Sep 1760 Morning could not have been born <u>in</u> 1760√ If the 1830 figure is correct she must then have been 26 to 35 years old at marriage, which is unusual in But Drury must have been less than 21 ! those days. Possibly she misstated her age in the 1830 census. A groom younger than 21 would seem to require a bride still younger, which then would place her as a child born about 1765 and therefore the final child of Charles and Mary.

A judgement call is necessary and for the present I take it that Drury was born about 1765, was not 21 by March 1785, and Morning was a bit younger thus born a little after 1765. This makes her the last child of Charles and Mary.

Summing up the foregoing a preliminary chronology is:

> Charles Christian born about 1710 (before

Judith)

Judith Woodson born 1714/1716 Judith married 1733/1734 Lucy born 1733/1734 Judith Woodson born 1734/1735 Judith Woodson, wife, died 1735/1736

Mary Leake born 1715/1717 Mary Leake married 1735/1736 Elizabeth born 1736/1737 Charles born before 1744, i.e.1737/1741 John born year ending 26 Sep 1743 Elijah born before 1749 Mary born before 1750/1752

Judith born 1754/1756
Turner born after 3 Jan 1757
William born 1757/1759
Walter born 23 Sep 1760
George born 26 Sep 1762
Mourning born 1765/1766

Mary Leake died 1765/1783 Charles Christian died 1784

Since several of the daughters' birth dates are predicated on an age 18/20 at marriage some of them may truly lie in earlier years than here inferred.

Also it is unusual to have 11 children born in a family with \underline{all} living to adulthood to appear in the will. Some of these gaps may contain children who died before marriage and before the 1783 will.

For a deeper exploration of this I list the Leake children with their "marriage year", that is the year of the Leake marriage in which they were born, taking, with our rough data, the year of the event as the average of the span given above for the event:

Now it is normal that in a family with as many as 11 births these will come spaced closer together in the early years of the marriage and more widely spaced in the later years. On this basis consider the pattern in this Leake marriage:

Between mg and John	7 yrs/3 ch = 2.3
John and Judith	12 yrs/3 ch =4.0
or	
John and Turner	15 yrs/4ch = 3.8
Turner and Morning	8 yrs/4 ch = 2.0

The spacing in the middle years is wider than in the beginning or the ending years. In fact they were still at 2 years per child in the third decade of the marriage. With this record it seems unlikely that they would have

tapered down in the 7th to 15th year. The explanation must be children born in those middle years and died before the 1783 will and before any other documentary evidence of their existence was created.

We can estimate the number of these died-young children. In the first 7 years and the last 8 years 7 children were born, an average of 2.17 years per child. If this rate applies to the middle 12 years between John and Judith there would have been 12/2.17 = 5.5 children instead of the 3 that we have record for. If the rate applies to the 15 middle years there would have been 15/2.17 = 6.9 children instead of the recorded 4. The inference is that between John and Turner there were 3 children who "died young".

If in the future more data should turn up on the children and their birth dates the likelihood of these 3 died-young children in the middle years should be taken into consideration in establishing birth dates and birth order.

As stated in the introduction this has been an attempt to infer as best the original data available to me will allow. If any readers of this have additional or contradictory data I and all other Christian genealogists will be pleased to learn of it and to make the appropriate changes in the inferences here reached.

I have not yet seen all of the deeds and other documents known to be extant bearing on the subject. If any reader can contribute documents not cited here or cited only sketchily I will be pleased to learn of them and to change the inferences accordingly.

When I'm up and about again, I'll try to see whose abstracts were involved.

1 appreciate having the proper birth and christening records for children of Trury and Lucretia. The ones given in the Chronicles were from a correspondent who sent much of the information. At the time I didn't have a copy of the Douglas Register to verify the dates but regret not having done so. At least, I'll have them now for anyone who inquires.

You'll be hearing from me again after Volume XI of Christian Family Chronicles is on its way.
