The name of the father and the list of children is given on the authority of Miss Emily Virginia Goodwin, of Louisville, Ky., (granddaughter of Micajah and of John). Children: i. Micajah, married Elizabeth Buford; ii. John, married Mary Johnston; iii. Richard (see Appendix X); iv. George, see Appendix I; v. Nelson.

Micajah Goodwin (John) was born in Virginia; was married in Amherst County, Va., to Elizabeth Buford, who was born in Amherst County. Micajah and Richard Goodwin, of Nelson, now Amherst County, were ordered into service in 1781, under John Pope, to join the army commanded by General LaFayette. (Cited from an old muster roll in Hardesty's Encyclopaedia.) Children: i. Cornelius, married Hannah Patton; ii. Thomas, born 1795, married Martha Reed; iii. James, probably died unmarried*; iv. Virginia, died unmarried; v. Daughter, married Mitchell; vi. John Lipscomb Lynck, born 1793, married Mary E. Goodwin; vii. Daughter, married White.

GOODWYN OF SURRY AND SUSSEX COUNTIES, VIRGINIA

Thomas Goodwyn of Surry County, Virginia, mariner, was residing there prior to August 1717, in the parish of Southwark. Of his ancestry, there is no positive knowledge, though it seems probable he was of the family of Cambridge in England, a member of which family, Thomas by name, is said to have emigrated to Virginia. On August 8th, 1717, Thomas Goodwyn executed a power of attorney to Henry Harrison, gentleman, of Surry County. In 1720 he made a deed to John Scott, jun., who had married his daughter, Amy Goodwyn. These two documents are perhaps all that remains of the records of his activities excepting his will, which is dated 7 February 1730 and was proved 20 October 1731, and is recorded in Surry County Court. This will, though much torn and obliterated, shows that his wife's name was Mary, and that he had at least three sons, John, Francis and William, and a daughter, Penelope, who had married a Taylor. He also mentioned a grandson, Thomas Goodwyn, though whether the son of John, Francis or William Goodwyn or of still another son whose name is lost through the destruction of parts of the will, he did not say. The name of his daughter, Amy Scott, is also not mentioned—or is obliterated—yet from the deed to John Scott, jun., we know of her. This fragmentary will has been published in the WILLIAM AND MARY COLLEGE QUARTERLY HISTORICAL MAGAZINE, Vol. VIII, No. 2, Supplement, pp. 148-9. We are able to say, therefore, that:

Thomas Goodwyn, of Surry County, gentleman, died in the parish of Southwark in 1730 or 1731. By Mary, his wife, he left at least five children, perhaps others whose names are lost to us through the obliteration by time of portions of his recorded will. His known issue were:

I. John Goodwyn (or Goodwynne as it is sometimes written) of Surry County; later, on the formation of Sussex County he resided within the new county, in the parish of Albemarle, the Register of which parish, now in the Virginia Historical Society at Richmond, furnishes us with the names of nearly all of John Goodwyn's children. He seems to have been a man of prominence in Sussex, in his day and time, and was living there as late as 1754. He married Winifred, daughter of ——— Tucker, by whom he had:

1. Francis Goodwyn, born 7 Nov., 1747.
2. Patty [Martha?] Goodwyn, born 15 Jan., 1752.
3. Robert Goodwyn, born 15 March 1739.
4. William Goodwyn, born 24 Jan. 1745/6.
5. James Goodwyn, born 16 Aug. 1741.
6. Amy Goodwin, born 31 Aug. 1732; died ———; m. Thomas Mitchell, the elder, of Sussex County. He dying in 1761 or 1762 she

m. secondly, in 1762, Capt. John Raines, of Prince George County. While the birth of Amy Goodwyn is not recorded on the pages of Albemarle parish register, it was found recorded in the family Bible of Thomas Mitchell, the younger, her son (who married Ann Raines, daughter of Captain Nathaniel Raines of Prince George County), who removed to Georgia and who died in Thomas County, 27 July 1826. The writer is descended from Amy Goodwyn through both of her marriages.

II. Francis Goodwyn, of Prince George County. (Untraced.)

III. Penelope Goodwyn, m. ——— Taylor.

IV. Amy Goodwyn, m. John Scott, Jr., of Prince George, in 1720.

V. William Goodwyn (untraced). Can he possibly be identified with the William Goodwyn mentioned on page 27 of the WILLIAM AND MARY QUARTERLY SUPPLEMENT for October, 1899. The appearance of the names Francis, Amy, John and William among his family would seem to lend some weight to the hypothesis.

Let us now return to the children of John Goodwyn, of Sussex, and Winifred Tucker Goodwyn, his wife. This is surely debatable ground. Of the descendants of John Goodwyn's sons, Francis, Robert and William, we know nothing. Can we say more of the descendants of his son, James Goodwyn? Judge John S. Goodwin, in the Supplement to WILLIAM AND MARY QUARTERLY for October, 1899, page 135, seems to have chanced upon this line, though the name is there spelled with an "i" instead of "y." In this line the appearance of the name *Winnie Tucker Goodwin* is very strong evidence. Up to the present time, these facts relating to the Goodwyns of Surry and Sussex have not appeared in print, so far as I am aware. I give them, therefore, to stimulate research and criticism and to set at rest the persistent attempt of impatient genealogists to foster a connection between the Goodwyns of Surry and Sussex and the family in Dinwiddie of which Colonel Peterson Goodwyn was a member. There seems no shadow of a cause to connect these two families this side of England. Can Doctor Tyler, Mr. Torrence or any of the readers of WILLIAM AND MARY COLLEGE QUARTERLY throw further light upon the vexed question of the tidewater Goodwyns? And who can settle the question of the ancestry of Thomas Goodwyn of Surry who made his will in 1730?

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The Goodwins were among the first of the English-speaking people to come to America. As the late Mr. Chas. Francis Goodwin of Brookville, Indiana, expressed it, "The Goodwins have always been here." It is still an open question whether the Indians or the Goodwins were the original inhabitants! The earliest ones were in Virginia. 1607-14 Samuel Goodwin was massacred at Jamestown. 1620 - Sir Francis Goodwyn was a member of the Virginia Company. He died in England.

In 1648 Major James Goodwin settled in York County, Virginia. He was the youngest son of Peter Goodwin of Tower Street Ward, London. Peter Goodwin was a salter and a "gentleman". He recorded his pedigree and arms with the Heralds' College in 1633. His will was dated October 28, 1660 and proved December 17, 1660 by the oath of James Goodwin, his son, one of the executors, power being reserved for Mathew and Peter, the other executors.

In the early records of York County, Virginia, preserved at Yorktown (a copy of which down to the year 1700, is in the State Library), the name of James Goodwin, Peter's son, appears as an early justice from 1657 to 1662 and in 1658 he represented he-represented his county in the House of Burgesses. He lived on Back Creek. The identity of this James with the James of the English pedigree is shown by two things: First, by the names of his children, which repeat the family names of the English people. Second, by the fact that this York County book or books show that Major James Goodwin was present in York County on November 13, 1660 and that he reached England before April 30, 1661. (In the York County records is the following:-

"30th April 1661. Capt. Henry Gooch and Mr. Robert Baldry are added to the Commission of York County and to be sworn to y^e next court, in the places of Coll. Xtopher Calthorpe and Maj^r. James Goodwin, who are removed, one to y^e s^oward, y^e other for England.

(Signed) Wm. Berkeley."

This would indicate that he returned to England after hearing of his father's death and was present to swear to his father's will December 17, 1660. There was between the date of the will and its proof in court, an interval of fifty days which would have given time for the transmission of the news of Peter Goodwin's death to Virginia and for Major Goodwin's return and appearance in England. At the same time, the margin is not wide enough for us to suppose that his being in England about this time was the result of an accident.

Major James Goodwin's ancestry can be traced with reasonable certainty still further.

The History of Buckingham County, England, states that William Goodwin of Bucks and London, born about 1470, had two children, John and Blase. John married Katherine and had eighteen children. The eldest was Sir John Goodwin, the father of Sir Francis Goodwyn, who was in Virginia in 1620, dying in England in 1634. Sir Francis' son, Arthur, had a daughter Jane, baptized in 1618. It seems safe to assume that Henry Goodwin of Bucks and London, ancestor of Major James, was one of the eighteen children of John Goodwin, and a grandson of William Goodwin, as that was the only Goodwin family in Bucks and as Henry's son Robert, was of the same age as Sir Francis and Robert's son, Peter, of the same age as Arthur, and Peter's son, Major James, was about the age of Jane, baptized 1618.

Major James Goodwin married 1st Rachel _____, whose tombstone on Back Creek, York County, Virginia, says she was born in 1630 and died in Virginia May 23, 1666, leaving, as it states, by Major Goodwin, five sons and two daughters. Two sons died before 1692 without issue. The tombstone bears a division of the shield into two equal parts; the right, or dexter, representing the husband, and the left, or sinister, representing the wife. The right side is too much worn to make out, but the left is divided quarterly; one and four, a bend, two and three, three bars. This quartering ought to give the names of the father and mother of Rachel Goodwin. Now, among those for whom Major Goodwin got "head rights" besides Mrs. Blanche Parry, Mrs. Ann Gooch, Robert Goodwin, John Goodwin, and "myself" and "wife" was one John Porter; and "three bars or" are the arms of Porter of County Warwick, England. With great confidence, then, it might be assumed that the mother of Rachel Goodwin was a Porter. (Off the mouth of the creek, near the tombstone, is an island still known as Goodwin's Island, which Samuel Chew deeded to James Goodwin. There is a lighthouse at the extreme point called "Goodwin's Point".)

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After the death of Rachel, Major James Goodwin married, 2ndly, Blanche _____, probably Mrs. Blanche Parry, mentioned above. They had two sons. Major Goodwin died intestate, and his inventory was recorded January 6, 1678/9, showing L.542 Is. 2d. On January 25, 1691/2 John and Peter Goodwin petitioned for their shares of their father's estate in the hands of their (step-mother), Mrs. Blanche Goodwin, and in the following

month settlement was made with "seven children and y^e widow." In 1687 Mrs. Blanche Goodwin had given property to her sons, John and Peter Goodwin, and daughter Susannah. Her will was proved September 22, 1701 and names sons Robert and Martin as executors.

Edward Goodwin, who was a descendant of Major James Goodwin, was born August 1717 and died in Clark County, May 1826, aged one hundred and eight years. He was the husband of Mary Goodwin. Family traditions disagree as to his place of birth, it being stated to be Wales and again in England.

The first information is that Edward resided in Culpepper County, and then removed to Augusta County, Virginia, where he resided a number of years. An Edward Goodwin served as an officer under Colonel George Washington in his campaign on the Monongehala in 1754, and was allotted land under Gov. Dinwiddie's proclamation, and an Edward Goodwin served in the French and Indian Wars of 1771 in Captain Hogg's Company, George Washington Colonel. In 1758 William, Edward's son, was born (very probably in Augusta County as Edward was living in Virginia at that time.)

An "English Colony" of which Joseph Goodwin was a member, settled in Augusta County about this time. It is not known, however, that Joseph was one of the sons of Edward, although it is thought probable as he was of an age to have been an elder son and as it was at this time Edward was known to be living in Virginia. Judge Willis Wallace Goodwin, a grandson of Edward, was convinced that there was an English estate belonging to the family and collected many papers bearing on the matter, but they were all destroyed in the burning of his house.

Three of the sons of Edward; William, Amos and Edward, Jr., were members of one or the other of George Rogers Clark's expeditions. William is supposed to have been the William Goodwin of the expedition of 1778, and his brothers served later.

The family of Edward, Sr., must have removed very shortly thereafter to Jefferson County, Ky., as an Anna Goodwin, supposed to be his daughter, was married in Louisville in 1788.

Mr. Goodwin Speed, a descendant of Edw. Goodwin and a lawyer of Seattle, Washington, said that Edw. Sr., and Mary, his wife, moved to Indiana in 1800. For a number of years before his death Edward was blind.

William, a son of Edward, was born, probably in Virginia, May 1758 and died in Clark County, Ind., July or August 1826. He served in Gen'l George Rogers Clark's expedition against the British and Indians in the northwest in 1778. He was probably first in Captain John Montgomery's company. Afterward he was a member of Captain Rogers' company which appears to have been organized out of a part of Captain Montgomery's company. He was allotted 108 acres of land for services under Clark, 100 acres being in Section 262 and 8 acres in Section 196 of the Illinois grant, chiefly lying in what is now Clark County, Indiana. The records show that William had disposed of his claim before the land had been set apart. Doubtless he had returned to Virginia and he may have been a member of the military escort under Captain Robers which conveyed the British General Hamilton and other distinguished prisoners to Virginia... after their capture at Vincennes in 1779. He was probably married soon after his return, and his oldest son, John, was born 1784 or 1785. He returned to Kentucky from Virginia with his family and with his father and mother about 1789 or 1790. He settled near Louisville in the "Pond Settlement", his brothers Amos and Edward also living near or in that locality.

In 1800 or 1801 William was appointed by Gen'l William Henry Harrison, then Governor of Indiana Territory, one of eight associate judges or justices of the Court of General Quarter Sessions for the Territory. The first court was held at Springville, near the site of what is now Charleston, Indiana, April 7, 1801. He held his position as judge, though the area of jurisdiction was much varied, until the 28th day of November 1823 when his name was appended to the record for the last time, a service of 23 years. The following year his son, Willis Wallace, succeeded him as judge. William lived in Clark County, Ind., on a tract of land (430 A.) on Pleasant Run, purchased in 1800 from Lieutenant James Meriweather. This land is now owned by Mr. Columbus C. Goodwin, his grandson.

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William's son, John, who lived in Clark County, Indiana, was a soldier in the Tippecanoe War.

Dr. John M. Goodwin, son of John Goodwin and great-grandson of Edward, was a physician and surgeon. He resided in Clark County and was a graduate of Louisville Medical School. He sometimes acted as minister of the Gospel. Dr. Albert Lee Goodwin, son of John, grandson of William and great-grandson of Edward, was a veteran of the Mexican War. He was wounded at the Battle of Buena Vista, and as a result was disabled for life.

Dr. Willis Wallace Goodwin, son of Willis Wallace, grandson of William and great-grandson of Edward, was born in Clark Co., Ind., May 21, 1814. He married, October 8, 1838, Miss Martha James, daughter of Beverly W. and Matilda (Day) James of Mason County, Ky. Beverly James claimed to be a Cousin of General Robert E. Lee.

Amos Goodwin, son of Edward, was born in Virginia, probably in

Culpepper or Augusta County, in 1765 or 1766. He served two years in the Virginia Continental Line, Revolutionary War, having enlisted from Culpepper Co., under Captain Thomas and Colonel Stoughton. He served with his brother Edward in some of the later campaigns of Gen'l Geo. Rogers Clark, probably in 1785. Amos received a county of 200 acres of land for his services in the Revolutionary War.

Joseph Goodwin, to whom reference has been made as being a descendant of Edward and Major James Goodwin, was married to Margaret Thomas. By occupation he was a farmer and in religion a Methodist. They resided in Augusta County but in their old age removed to near Columbus, Ohio, where some of their children had settled and died. Margaret's name is also given as Catherine. She died November 8, 1820. Joseph died October 10, 1824. At the time Joseph removed from Augusta County his children Enos, Joseph, Jr., and Jesse removed to Roanoke County, Virginia. The children are not given in order of their birth. They are as follows: 1. Levi, went West; untraced. 2. Joseph, married Mary (Polly) Jenkins. 3. Septamus, removed to Missouri in 1823, untraced. 4. Jane, born 1780 married Lewis Runkle. 5. John, married Susan Daugherty. 6. Melton (A Malen Goodwin is mentioned by a grand-daughter as having lived in Missouri. Don't know whether or not it was same person.) 7. Jesse, married Mary (Polly) Deaton. 8. Enos, born Feb. 3, 1789 married, first Elizabeth Early; second, Martha Mitchell. 9. Kate, married John Lefler. 10. Davis, born October 17, 1783, married Elizabeth Teaford.

Joseph Goodwin (Joseph) was born in Augusta County, Virginia, was married to Polly Jenkins, who was born in 1800 in Roanoke County. By occupation Joseph was a farmer and in religion a Methodist. They resided in Roanoke, County. Joseph was a pensioner of the War of 1812. Children: 1. Martha, born 1823, married John Coleman. 2. Priscilla, born 1825, married David Trout. 3. Jesse, married Jane Hawkins. 4. John T. born 1827, married Elizabeth Gaines. 5. Mary, married Wm. Yingling. 6. William born 1830 married Jane Martin. 7. Eliza, born 1833, married, first Chas. Batt; second J. W. Chinquepeel. 8. Elizabeth born 1836 married G. A. Beemer.

Early History of the Goodwins of England.

During the war between the Danes and Saxons and during the reign of Canute, a Danish King, a Danish Nobleman was separated from his companions and lost his way. He was afraid that if he tried to find his way back alone he would run into the camp of the Saxons and would be killed. So he came upon a Saxon hut. The Saxons were very kind hearted and hospitable people and they took him in, gave him food and drink and promised that their young son should direct him back to his people, if he would promise to keep him in his service. This request was made because of the fact that if the youth should return home and the Saxons found he had led a Dane back to his people he would have been put to death.

Thus, this Danish Nobleman was led to his people by the Saxon youth named Godwin. Godwin was a very energetic and ambitious youth and became one of the highest officers of the Danish King. He also, it is told, married one of the King's daughters.

When the Danish King died he left his kingdom to be divided among his three sons. It seems, however, that Harold, one of his sons, got possession of the greater part of England. For a while Harold and Godwin did not get along and were sometimes fighting among themselves. Later things changed and they became friendly and Harold married one of Godwin's daughters.

In the meantime some of the Saxons heard that war was going on in England so they came over thinking perhaps they could recover the throne of England, as their father had once been the king, but they were overthrown by the Danes and Alfred, one of the old Saxon King's sons was killed. Godwin was accused of this murder but it couldn't be proved so he was acquitted.

Later King Harold died. The English were tired of having a Danish King so they made Edward, who was a Saxon and brother of Alfred, whom Godwin had been accused of killing, king. Edward was very friendly towards the Normans and would have made them his sole advisers but dared not do it as long as Godwin lived. This Saxon Noble, Godwin, was the most important man at court, and it seems that King Edward married one of his daughters.

Godwin and the Norman friends of King Edward were always quarrelling. Edward got tired of it and again accused Godwin of killing Alfred, his brother. Some historians say that Alfred was eating when the King accused him of the murder and that he denied it, saying if he was speaking an untruth he hoped the next bite he ate would choke him to death, which it did. Others say he was driven from the country by his enemies and killed at the place called "Goodwin Sands."

After Edward died there were several who claimed the Throne of England. One of these was Harold, the Son of Godwin, whom Edward had chosen to succeed him; and another was William, the Duke of Normandy.

William had no right to the throne but said that Harold, when shipwrecked at Normandy, promised to help him secure the Throne of England. Whether he did or not we do not know. However, Harold accepted the crown and was made king. This caused war between Harold and William, Duke of Normandy. King Harold was victorious but shortly after winning the victory a herald came in great haste announcing the Normans were coming across the channel in many boats. Harold immediately sent his men to the shore of Hastings, to find only that the Normans had already landed.

As William, Duke of Normandy was leaving the ship he fell. The Normans being very superstitious thought this was an evil omen. William, however, was quick witted and jumping up grabbed a handful of sand exclaiming that he held England fast. This gave his men more courage and they renewed the fight. In this battle, which is called the Battle of Hastings, Harold and his men were killed. Thus the rule of the Saxon Kings was at an end.

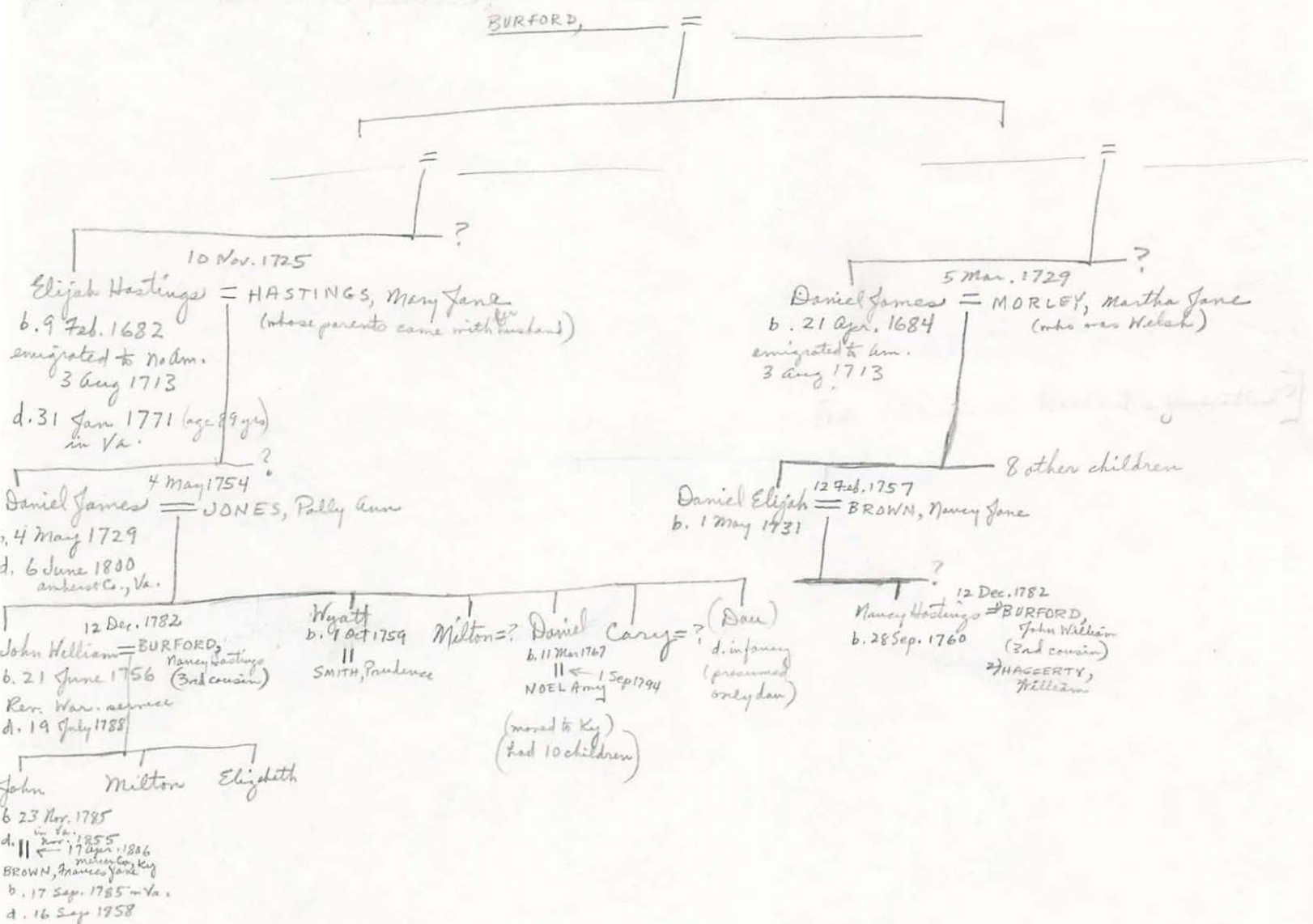


