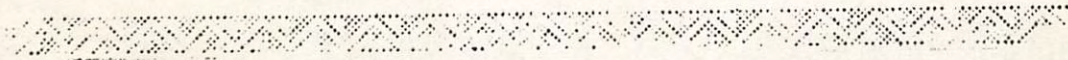
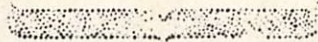

## HUGH MCKENZIE

The earliest known ancestor of the McKenzie family is one Hugh McKenzie, who was born in Scotland in the early part of the Eighteenth Century. The record also discloses that a Mary McKenzie lived there, but the facts concerning her are vague. The McKenzies must have been very numerous in Scotland at that time, as it is estimated that the clan could have raised an Army of twenty-five hundred men. All that is known of Hugh McKenzie's immediate family is that he had an older brother, Alexandria, who, in accordance with the ancient Scottish Laws would, upon the death of his father, inherit the entire family estate, thus leaving Hugh without any inheritance at all.

As there was a mass immigration of the Scotch farmers to America in the middle Eighteenth Century, Hugh McKenzie immigrated to this country sometime between 1745 and 1750. Where he landed is not known exactly, but the site was very probably the harbor of Wilmington, since this port was a favorite landing place for all Scotch immigrants. He settled in what is now Moore County on Mill Creek, near where Knollwood Airport stands today.

Hugh McKenzie married a Miss Nicholson, who was from the territory later incorporated into Richmond County. To this union was born a son, John, and at least two daughters, Polly and Nancy. It is probable that there were other daughters.

During the Revolutionary War, Hugh McKenzie joined the Continental Army and became a valiant soldier. He was attached to the Army of General Nathaniel Green during his famous campaign in the South, and he later was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. While in Military Service he became sick and shortly thereafter died. His tomb is located in Greenville, South Carolina.

Out of grateful appreciation for his service to the Colonies, the Colonial Government awarded his family two parcels of land situated on Duck River in the State of Tennessee. However, as land was of very little monetary value at that time, his family never took possession of the gift.

## JOHN MCKENZIE AND DESCENDANTS

John McKenzie, the only son of Hugh McKenzie, married Nancy McNeill in the early part of the Nineteenth Century. They had twelve children, namely: Katherine, Alexandria, Hugh, Margaret, Jeanette, Polly, Belle, Christian, Lovely, Daniel, John and Nancy.

(A) KATHERINE MCKENZIE married Daniel McKinnon. To this union were four sons and four daughters - John, Will, Alex, Daniel C., Nancy, Kate, Lydia, and one other whose name is forgotten. John and Will McKinnon, the oldest of the family, were twins, and both were killed in the Civil War. Alex McKinnon married a Miss Moore and moved to Charlotte. Daniel C. McKinnon, a school teacher by profession, was married to Josephine McDuffie and had two children, Blanch and Hall. He taught school until he was an old man and also represented Moore County in the North Carolina Legislature for the terms 1886-1887. Nancy McKinnon married a Cole. Born to this union were John, Evander, George and Daniel Cole. Evander and George Cole were school teachers, while Daniel was a rural mail carrier. The latter married a Miss Wicker and lived and died in Sanford. Kate McKinnon also married a Cole and resided in Charlotte. One of her sons was killed while on the Charlotte police force. Lydia McKinnon married Ben Stutts and had three sons, Woody, Henry Clay, Will, and two daughters. One daughter married Tom Burns; the other married a Mr. Bean from Randolph County. The fourth daughter of Katherine McKenzie McKinnon married Neil McDuffie. She had one son, Daniel, and three daughters: Sarah, Effie and Kate McKinnon.

(B) ALEXANDRIA (SANDY) MCKENZIE married Betsy Seawell. Their children were John, Will, Robert L., Margaret Jane and Betty. John McKenzie married a Davis and lived in the western part of Moore County near the Randolph line. He left numerous descendants. Will McKenzie married Ida Clark and made his home at Jackson Springs. To this union were born three daughters: Mary, Eula, and Lily. Mary married John McInnis and left one daughter. Eula died single. Lily was a deaf mute, and her husband also was. Several intelligent children blessed this union. Robert L. McKenzie married a Miss McNair and left several descendants.



Among others were Fannie, Myrtle, Robert and Walter. Margaret Jane married a Martin and left a large family. Alexandria McKenzie's other daughter, Betty, married John McLeod, popularly known as "Lucky John."

(C) HUGH MCKENZIE married Belle Black, daughter of Hugh and Polly Johnson Black. Polly Johnson came to America from Scotland at the age of sixteen, but the exact date is not known. A half-gallon jug containing brandy used for medical purposes was brought over the Atlantic Ocean with her, and this ancient piece of crockery is still in the possession of the McKenzie family. To this union of Hugh and Belle Black were born six sons and five daughters, namely. Flora Black, John Kenneth, Catherine, Mary, Archibald Hugh, Nancy, Malcolm, Daniel W., Neil Fierce, Margaret and Calvin A., Flora never married. John K. married Flora Margaret Blue, daughter of Daniel and Annie Blue. To this union were born six sons and three daughters: Duncan J., William, John J., Hugh M., Daniel Kenneth, Arthur B., Louisa, Anna B., and Margaret J.

Duncan J. McKenzie married Mary Eliza McDonald. To this union were born three sons and four daughters: D. Kenneth, James Harrison, Hugh Holt, Edna A., Margaret L., Mollie F., and Delia. William R. McKenzie married Carrie Hancock. Three sons were born -- John W., Alton, and Charles R., also seven daughters: Doshia A., Loula, Cora M., Ollie, Martha, Mary, who died in infancy, and Bortie Margaret. John J. McKenzie married Ellen McCallum. Born to this union were five sons and four daughters: Eugene, John K., Pate A., Daniel J., G. Hobert, Maggie, Ina, Bethel and Annabelle. Hugh M. McKenzie married Agnes Short. Blessing this union were four sons and six daughters. Addison, Walter, Burton, Bradford, Mamie, Devona Mae, Annie M., Nettie, Loula and Jesse. Daniel K. McKenzie married Eva Mae Sapp and lives in Georgia. To this union were born four sons and one daughter. Linton, Thatcher, George, Daniel Jr., and Cleo. Arthur B. McKenzie married Nannie C. Williams. To this union were born four sons and six daughters: John L., Coy, Martin, C. Elwood, Grace L., Cattie A., Alice, Lillian Frances, Ella Bell and Mary Josephine. Louisa McKenzie married Charles Hannon. Fourteen children were born to this union: Wayland, William, Mack B., Martin, Fred, Lacy, Maggie, Kate, Loula and Lena (twins), Mary, Lizzie, Nina, and one child, who died in infancy. Anna B. McKenzie married John Horner. Born to this union were six sons and four daughters: Floyd, Dan, John, Bill, Jim, Cary, Florino, Ethel, Alma and a

daughter who died in infancy. Margaret J. McKenzie married M. J. Blue. Two sons, Kenneth and Duncan were born to this union.

Catherine McKenzie married Parks Scott, leaving no descendants.

Archibald H. McKenzie married Flora Jane Hannon. Seven sons and three daughters were born to this union: John M., Frank, D. P., Jesse B., Malcolm J., Colon, Hugh, Mary Anne, Margaret and Lucy Jane. John M. McKenzie married Lydia Frye, left no descendants. Frank married Bertie Short. The following children were born to this union: Curtis, Myrtle, Catherine, Archibald, Lillian, Layland, Madeline, Franklin, Bertie Mae and Coolidge. Two sons died in infancy. D.P. McKenzie married Jenny Ray: One son and two daughters were born to this union: Thomas, Estelle and Idell. Jesse B. McKenzie married Ada Wilhoit - one son, Ellis; four daughters: Nannie, Elsie, Thelma and Shirley. Malcolm J. McKenzie married Rosa Black. Two sons and one daughter; Jack, Joe, and Gladys. Hugh McKenzie married Georgia Crutchfield. They had three children; Warren, Wellons and Wilton. Mary Anne McKenzie married Joel Ritter. The following children were born to this union: Charles, A.H., Frank, Loula Catherine, Mary Lee, Ida, Jane and Ethel. Margaret McKenzie married James Huffstyle, left no descendants. Lucy J. McKenzie married J. B. Richardson and one son Joe J., and four daughters, Mildred, Ester, Martha, Jane and Juanita were born to this union. One child died in infancy. Colon McKenzie married Ellen Cagle. Born to this union were Colon Jr., Flora Mae and Margaret.

Mary McKenzie married John McCaskill. To this union were born five children: Kenneth W., Hugh M., Angus A., Annie and Betty Jane.

Kenneth McCaskill married a Miss Stewart. Hugh McCaskill married Alice Blue. The following children were born to them: John, Walter, Bill, Clinton, Bessie, Ed, Myrtle. (Bessie now Register of Deeds of Moore County). Angus C. McCaskill married Mary Patterson. Annie McCaskill never married. Betty J. McCaskill married Alexander Currie. The following children were born: Vernon, Lena, Grace Florence, Bernice and Charles.

Jancy McKenzie married Thomas J. Jackson. Two sons and three daughters were born to this union: Samuel, Andrew, Margaret, Catherine, and Ida. Samuel Jackson married Zora Dowd, left a large family. Andrew Jackson married Ethel Hancock, and had one son and two daughters. Margaret Jackson married Osborne Seawell. Born to this union were Lucy, Tenny, Delia, Minnie, Nina Margaret, Tracy, Teddy, Lindo and Archie. Catherine Jackson married Alfred Cole, left no descendants.

Ida Jackson never married.

Malcolm McKenzie married Kitty Short. Walter B., Ralph H., Rosa F. Blanch, Ada M., Daisy B. and Beulah V. were born to this union. Ralph McKenzie married Minnie Cole. Born to this union were Ed, Leon, and Sarah Catherine. Walter B. died in childhood. Daisy B. McKenzie married Oscar Cole. The following children were born to this union: Carlton, Malcolm, Lessie, Loula Belle, Ola, Margaret, Louise and Mable. One daughter died in infancy. Rosa M. McKenzie married James Copeland. Born to this union were two sons and two daughters: Kermit, Oren, Letha and Alpha. One son died in childhood. Blanch McKenzie married Charles Vick, had two daughters, Mary and one who died in infancy. Ada M. McKenzie married Rev. S. Ellis Hannon. Beulah McKenzie married Evander Cole.

Daniel W. McKenzie was twice married. First to Elizabeth Wicker, and to this union were born three children. Neil Gaston, Hugh Charles, and a daughter, who died in infancy. He was later married to Christian C. McDonald, and to this union were born, John B., Bella F., and Evelyn and Anne (twins). Neil Gaston left this country in 1899, while yet a young man, and has not been heard from in many years. N. Charles McKenzie is married and lives in Charlotte; has two sons and two daughters. John B. McKenzie married Josie Easterlin of Rockingham. Born to this union were Ray, Carla and Dorothy. Bella and Anne are unmarried. Evelyn McKenzie married Vick Chisholm. Nine were born to this union: Fairley, Charles, Frank Joan, Mary Alice and four who died in infancy.

Neil Pierce McKenzie married Margaret McCrummon. Ten children were born to this union: Mary Lee, Martin, Clyde, Flora and Nina. Five others died in childhood. Mary Lee McKenzie died unmarried. Martin McKenzie married Ethel Tyson. Two sons, Robert and Nash, were born to this union. Clyde McKenzie married Ruth Thomas, has one daughter Frances Myrtle. Flora McKenzie married Jesse Thomas and died leaving four children: Earl, Harold, Lester and Lois. Nina McKenzie married Jesse Thomas, and they have two children.

Margaret McKenzie married John Wicker. Three sons and three daughters were born to this union: Martin, Willie C., Dalton, Mary Kate, Annabelle and Mattie. Martin Wicker married Annie Maude Kelly. They had one son and two daughters: Travis, Myrtrice, and Melba. Willie C. Wicker married Onnie Frye, Winfred, William and Marguarite were born to this union. Dalton Wicker married Mary Carpenter, and they have two sons, Stanley and Davis. Mary Kate Wicker married Thomas Stutts. Born to this union were Fred, Albert, Carl and Maggie.

Annabelle Wicker married Carlos Frye, three sons. John Carlos, Jr., Bascom and Perry. Mattie Wicker married Angus Frye, one son Lewis, and two daughters, Kitty Margaret and Ethel.

Calvin A. McKenzie married Malissa Mannor. Six sons were born to this union: Luther M., Alexandria, McNeil, Edgar, Hughie and Floyd Calvin who died in infancy. Luther M. McKenzie married Edna Goodnight of Kannapolis. Alexandria McKenzie married Callie Hudson of Rockingham. McNeil, Edgar and Hughie McKenzie married in Rockingham and have families.

(D) MARGARET MCKENZIE was a school teacher and married William Von Cannon, a blacksmith. She died, leaving no descendants.

(E) JEANETTE MCKENZIE was never married. She left a daughter Jane, who married W. A. McDonald of Rockingham.

(F) POLLY MCKENZIE died single.

(G) BELLE MCKENZIE married John Caddell. She died at the birth of her first child, which also died.

(H) CHRISTIAN MCKENZIE married Wesley Seawell. To this union were born three sons and three daughters: John Gaston, Simon, William, Betty, Lydia, and Mandy.

(I) LOVEDY MCKENZIE married Simon Seawell. She left two sons and two daughters: Daniel A., Calvin, Nancy and Mary Anne.

(J) DANIEL MCKENZIE married Margaret Anne Black, Daughter of John M. Black. To this union were born six sons and four daughters: John Calvin, Archibald, William N., James Robert, Kenneth Black, Daniel Benjamin, Nancy, Catherine, Laura Jane and Cornelia.

John Calvin McKenzie married Emaline Muse. Three children were born to this union: James Oscar, Mary Jane, and Callie Lee. Archibald died in childhood. William M. married Betty Short, thence migrated to Florida and reared a large family. Robert McKenzie never married and was murdered at a sawmill camp in the swamps of Louisiana. Kenneth B. married Nannie Frye. One child died in infancy, leaving two sons and two daughters: Roy, Carlton, Eula and Florence. Daniel B. McKenzie married Louise Bailey. Ten children were born to this union: Stafford Patrick, Woodrow, Bailim, Ed, Inez, Margaret, Arabella and Dannie. Nancy McKenzie married John McKeithen. One son, Daniel, and a daughter, Margaret, were born to this union, Laura McKenzie married Jim McKeithen. Four children were born to this union. Lovedy, Maude, Verdie and Daniel Curtis, who died in childhood. Cornelia McKenzie married Calvin Black, left no descendants.



(K) JOHN MCKENZIE was married twice. First to Margaret McNair, and to this union were born four children: Sarah Ann, Mary, Elizabeth and Charles. His second marriage was to Mandy Clark. Two sons and three daughters were born to this union: Martin, Daniel, Margaret, Loula and Jeanette.

Sarah Anne McKenzie married Archie McNair. Mary McKenzie married a Mr. Cash. Elizabeth McKenzie married Calvin Seawell. Charles McKenzie moved to Mississippi, where he married and made his home. Martin McKenzie left North Carolina, and after marrying he lived in both Mississippi and Texas. Daniel McKenzie married a Miss Brown from Moore County and reared a family. Margaret McKenzie married Elias Stutts. Loula McKenzie married Daniel McDuffie. To this union were born four sons and two daughters: A. Grady, Neil, Sam, Daniel, Monnie, and Margaret. Jeanette McKenzie was twice married, first to Thomas Langly; later to a Mr. McLean.

(L) NANCY MCKENZIE married William Seawell. Two daughters, Isabelle and Margaret Anne, blessed this union.

Isabelle Seawell married John Allen; thence moved to Missouri.

Margaret Anne Seawell married Captain William M. Black. Four sons and two daughters were born to this union: John M., Alexandria, Archibald, William, Nannie and Mary.

John M. Black married Rhoda Gilchrist Barrett. One son, Everett, and a daughter Annie, were born to this union. Alexandria Black married Monnie Monroe. Eight sons and two daughters were born to this union: Clyde, Curtis, Masker, Hilton, Charles, Leon McNeil, Arthur Gilman, Leta and Rossie. Neither Archibald nor William Black ever married. Nannie Black married John Wilhoit. Four girls, Ada, Alma, Katie, and Mario were born to this union. Mary Black married her brother-in-law John Wilhoit, and died, leaving no descendants.

POLLY MCKENZIE married Allen McDonald, a Scotch immigrant. He had been married in Scotland before coming to America and was the father of seventeen sons. While his oldest son remained in Scotland, the others immigrated to Canada and the northern part of the United States, where they made their homes. Out of this group came several Presbyterian ministers.

Allen and Polly McKenzie McDonald settled on Mill Creek, near Knollwood Airport, at what is known as the D. P. Ketty place. To this union were born four sons and five daughters: Hugh, John, Randolph, Daniel, Peggy and Sarah. The eldest son, Hugh, was born in 1782.

(A) HUGH McDONALD married Catherine Ray, daughter of Archibald Ray. This couple settled at New Gilead, situated four miles west of Pinehurst on Deep Creek. Their children were: Josephus Randolph, Allen Calvin, Daniel Washington, Malcolm Alexandria, Archie Ray, Mary Elizabeth, Marian Emaline, Betsy Anne, Margaret Evaline, and Flora Anne, who was named for her famous cousin, the heroine of the Revolutionary War - Flora McDonald. Little Flora Anne died in infancy.

In the War of 1812 Hugh McDonald volunteered and served with the United States Army until the signing of the treaty of Peace. He was a school master from the old school and carried on his profession of teaching till an old man. As printed books were exceedingly scarce in his time, he himself had to write spelling books and compile multiplication tables for the use of his pupils.

Randolph McDonald was a tailor by trade. During our great Civil War he joined the Confederate Army and was wounded at the Battle of Sharpsburg, September 17, 1862. He died October 4, 1862 at Winchester Virginia and was there buried.

Archie Ray McDonald was a graduate of the University of North Carolina. He resided in Carthage, where he practiced law. He married Martha Kennedy. To this union were born two sons, Archie Lee and Hugh Alexandria. Both died while young men.

Allen Calvin McDonald married Mary Anne Montgomery. Five children were born to this union: Mary Jane, Kitty Union, Margaret, William Sherman, and Hugh Martin. Mary Jane died single.

Kitty Union married John W. McCaskill. Four children were born to this union: Belle, Margaret, Catherine, and a son, who died in infancy.

Margaret McDonald married John A. McLeod. To them were born six sons and three daughters: Rev. R. A. Martin, John, Cary, Lacy (died in childhood), Carl Bertha, Margaret and Mary.

Hugh Martin served in the American Army during the Spanish-American War. He never married.

Mary Elizabeth McDonald married James Stewart. One son was born, who died at the age of five years.

Betsy Ann McDonald died single from the effect of cancer.

Margaret Evaline McDonald married Sylvester Cooper. She died, leaving no descendants.

Miriam Emily McDonald married James Currie. To this union were born three children. Jemina, Laura Jane, and Jerome. Jerome Currie married Jenny Bostic; died leaving no descendants. He was brutally murdered in his field by a farm hand, Ben Bostic (colored), who was hung for the crime at Carthage by Sheriff J. L. Currie. Laura Jane Currie married John M. Graham. To this union were born Neil A., Tony B., Lonnie, Edgar, Lily Catherine, Annie Maude, Agnes, Blanch, and Emma Jane, who died in infancy.

Daniel Washington McDonald married Lucinda McCrummen, daughter of Malcolm and Christian McNeill McCrummen. To them were born two sons: Hugh Malcolm and Charles Randolph, and three daughters: Christian Catherine, Mary Eliza and Lucinda Anne. Hugh Malcolm McDonald died single. Charles R. married Sarah Anne Blue. Six children were born to this union: Charles J. (present Sheriff of Moore County), Frank, Lee, Earl, Florence and Louanna. Christian McDonald married D. W. McKenzie. Mary Eliza married D. J. McKenzie, Lucinda Anne married J. F. Patterson.

Malcolm Alexandria McDonald married Harriett Cameron. Seven children were born to this union: Calvin (fatally burned in infancy), Columbus Josephus, John Washington, Kenneth, Marshall, Murphy and Minerva Jane. Columbus J. married Mary Anne Seawell. Six children were born to this union. John Washington never married. Kenneth and Marshall married and made their homes in the State of Florida. Murphy married and was the father of two children. Minerva Jane married Wade Jones and reared a large family.

(B) DANIEL McDONALD married a Miss Clark from near Jackson Springs. It was there he made his home and died without leaving descendants.



(C) RANDOLPH McDONALD married Mary Blue. Born to this union were two sons and two daughters: Archibald, John Allen, Mary and Lovedy.

Mary McDonald married Bill Dockens. Lovedy married a McPherson. Both reared families.

(D) JOHN McDONALD married Christian Black, daughter of Dougald Black. Three sons and nine daughters were born to them: Malcolm A., Jimmy, Allen, Jane, Mary Nancy, Christian, Effie, Lovedy, Betsy, Kate and Emily (twins). Malcolm A. McDonald married Eliza Jane McDonald. They had two children, Mary Christian and Dr. A.A. McDonald, Jimmy McDonald married Catherine Ray. Born to this union were Malcolm, Samuel, Annie Jane and Catherine. Allen McDonald was never married. He died in the Civil War. Both Jane and Mary McDonald died single. Nancy McDonald married Duncan Black. Four sons and one daughter were born to this union: Martin, William, Sherman, John and Mary (Sissy). Christian McDonald married Noah Kelly. They had a son and a daughter. Kate McDonald married John Williams. To this union were born Kennie, Lydia and Christian. Emily McDonald married Nathan Frye. Born to them were: George, Zeb, Jarvis, and Emma Jane. Effie McDonald married William Hollyfield Frye. To this union were born: Johnnie, Willie Martin, Henry Ben, Matt and Victoria. Lovedy McDonald were never married. She left two sons and one daughter: Calvin, Ben, and Margaret Jane. Betsy McDonald married Louis Ward. Born to this union were: Willie, Johnnie, Sallie and Mary.

The names of only two of the daughters of Allen and Polly McKenzie McDonald can be remembered. They are Peggy and Sarah. However, it is known that another can be remembered. They are Peggy and Sarah. However, it is known that another married a Black and left one daughter, Mary, who died single.

(E) PEGGY McDONALD never married.

(F) SARAH McDONALD married Edward Patterson. To this union were born five sons and five daughters: John, Duncan, Allen, Archie, Daniel Evander, Mary, Amanda, Millie, Margaret, and Emaline.

John Patterson married a Currie and had one daughter Minnie, who married a Mr. Covington, Duncan Patterson married Sarah Blue. Born to this union were one son and six daughters: John E., Christian Anne, Ellen, Florence, Auguste, Mary, and Annie Jane, who died in childhood. John E. Patterson married Fera Auman. Duncan Furman, Clarence, Ernest Blanche, Ruth and Laland were born to this union, Christian Patterson

married John Cole and had one son, W. Stencil. Ellen Patterson married William Pools. Four children were born: Ellis, Alton, Lona, and Mary, who died in childhood. Florence Patterson married Alexandria Currie. Had one son, Frank. Augusta Patterson married Jim Currie. Born to this union were a daughter, Lucile, and two sons: Charles and June, both of whom died in youth. Mary Patterson married Kenneth McLeod. Six sons and two daughters were born to this union.

Allen Patterson, son of Edward and Sarah McDonald Patterson, was never married. Archie Patterson married Margaret McInnis. Five sons and seven daughters were born to this union: Allen, Billie, Ed, Rob, John Duncan, Claricy, Alice, Olive; Etta, Vida, Inda, and Florence.

Daniel E. Patterson married Flora Jane Currie, daughter of Angus and Christian Leach Currie. Five sons and three daughters were born to this union: John F., Alexandria, Dannie, Angus, Lacy, Cornelia, Sarah Christian and Mary Edith. John F. Patterson married Anne McDonald. Four sons and five daughters were born to this union: D. Frank, Lee, John A. James A., Carrie, Florence, Mary, Janie and Alice. Angus Patterson married Lelia Sykes. Born to this union were Marcus, Abbot, Dwight, Grace, and Evelyn. All the members of this family reside in Florida. Alexandria Patterson never married. Daniel Patterson was twice married; first to Sallie Currie, who died leaving no descendants; afterwards to Pearl Mentor. A son, Daniel Jr., and a daughter Dorothy Louise, were born to this union. Lacy Patterson married Laura Campbell. Cornelia Patterson married E. E. Edge. They thence moved to the State of Florida. Two children died in childhood. A son, Day, and two daughters Katie and Bertha survive. They have families and also live in Florida. Sarah Patterson married Lynn Henson. Four sons and two daughters were born to this union: Bernard, Everette, Thomas, L.J., Florine, and Mary. Mary Patterson married Angus A. McCaskill. To them were born Thurman, Thomas, James, June, Charles, Creola, Flora, Edith and Catherine.

Mary Patterson married Dougald B. Caddell. One son, Leondas and a daughter, Sarah Catherine, were born to this union. Leondas Caddell married Mary Enne King; left no descendants. Sarah Catherine Caddell married W.F. Wicker. Three sons and three daughters were born to this union: Charles (Presbyterian minister at Gulf, N.C.) Will, Dan, Etta, Ellen and Loula, who died single.

Amanda Matterson married Daniel C. Clark. To this union were born a son and two daughters: J.M., Ida, and Sallie. J. M. Clark, popularly known as "Mack", became a Presbyterian minister. He was married twice: First to Tannie Tolk, and later to Lucy Miner, leaving no descendants. Ida Clark married Wm. McKenzie; left three daughters. Sallie Clark married Dan Seawell. To this union were born two sons and five daughters: William, Raymond, Naomie, Nottie, Lena, Glenn and Lucy. Amanda Patterson Clark's second marriage was to John McKenzie. Martin, Dan, Margaret, Loula and Jeanette were born to this union.

Willie Patterson married Duncan McInnis. Six sons and three daughters were born to this union: Daniel, John, Robert, James, Ed, Duncan, Margaret, Sallie and Jane.

Margaret Patterson married Neill McKinnon. During our tragic Civil War, she lost everyone of her five children in a diphtheria epidemic. Tenderly she alone watched over her loved ones during their illness and deaths and even wove the cloth on her old-fashioned loom to make shrouds for her children. Deserters from the Army would steal to her window by night with caskets, which they had hastily constructed, and carry the corpses to the family burying ground near the Neill McKinnon home. Later a son Dan, and a daughter, Almenia, were born to this union. Dan McKinnon was twice married. First to Minnie Ates, and afterwards to a Miss Collier. A daughter was born to the first marriage. Almenia McKinnon married Bob McNair. Two children were born.

Emaline Patterson married John S. Blue. To this union were born Washington, Archie, Dan, Duncan, Sallie, Mary, Florence, Gustie and Emaline. Only two of this family married. Sallie married James O'Quinn, had two sons, James and John. Emaline married Alex Monroe. Five children blessed this union.
