Old Blandford Church

A Confederate Memorial Since 1901

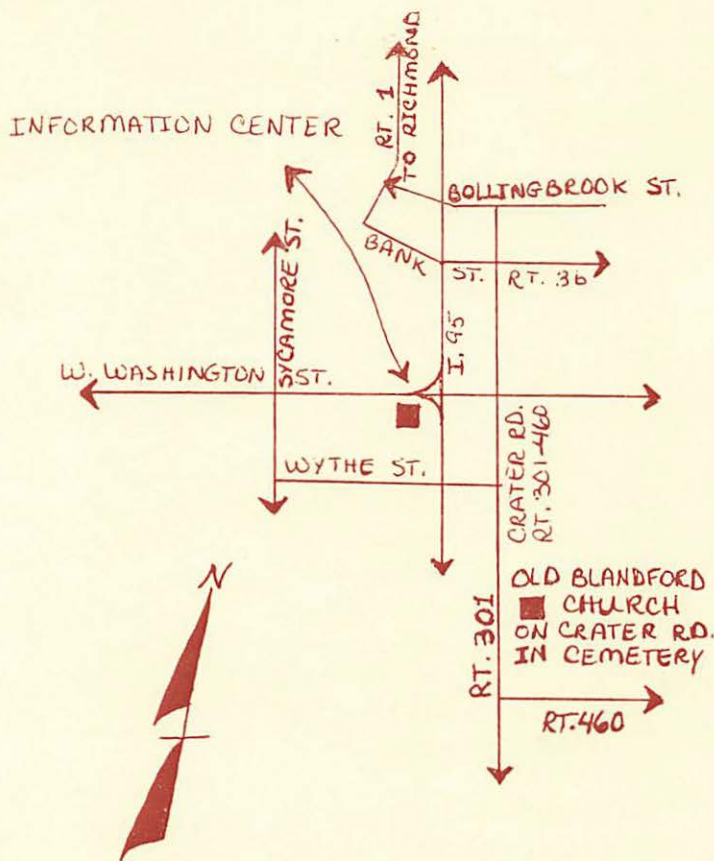
THE Brick Church on Well's Hill, now known as Old Blandford Church of Bristol Parish, was erected in 1735. Rich in Colonial, Revolutionary, War of 1812, and Confederate history, this old church was abandoned after the building of another Episcopal church in Petersburg, when the Town of Blandford had been absorbed by Petersburg. Necessary repairs for its preservation were made by the City of Petersburg in 1882.

In 1901 the city delegated to the Ladies Memorial Association of Petersburg the privilege of developing this church into a memorial chapel and a Confederate shrine in memory of the 30,000 heroes buried in its shadow.

The Confederate States honored their soldiers by placing in the church memorial windows, designed and executed by Louis Comfort Tiffany. There are fifteen of these windows, making this shrine one of the art treasures of our country. Other Confederate memorials have been placed from time to time in this historic building. Memorial services were held here for George Washington, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson at their deaths.

The Cockade City Garden Club beautifies and cares for part of the old cemetery, which is visited annually by thousands.

How to get to Old Blandford Church . . .



- Fifteen Tiffany Windows, considered one of the finest groups in the country.
- Monument to the British General, William Phillips, secretly buried behind the Church
- Monument over grave of Captain McRae, whose company won for Petersburg the title "Cockade City of the Union," in War of 1812.
- Mausoleum of General William Mahone, who led the Crater Charge, and at his request was buried in the midst of the 30,000 Confederates buried in Blandford Cemetery.
- Ninth of June Memorial Day Exercises held here each year.

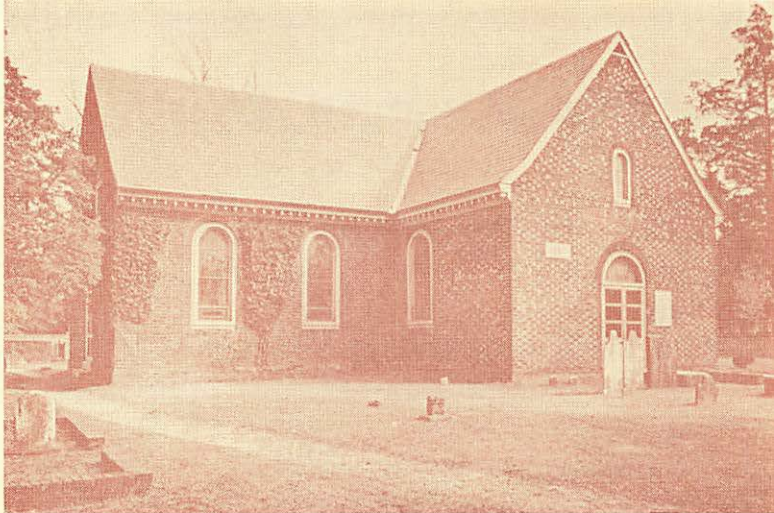
*The following poem, found on the wall in the church,

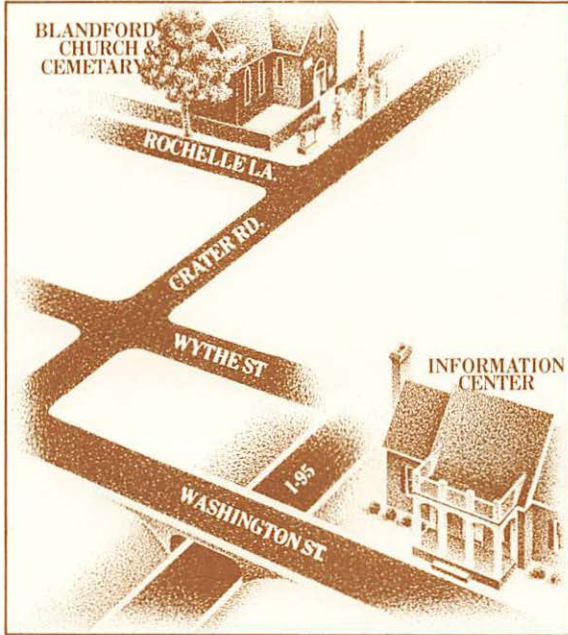

Blandford Church, from 1735

Blandford Church was built in 1735 with bricks imported from England. It was originally called St. Paul's Church or "The Brick Church on Wells Hill," and it served Bristol Parish of the Church of England in the colony of Virginia. After the Revolution, it took its new name from the village that clustered around it.

In 1806, another Episcopal church was built in Petersburg and the Blandford Church was abandoned as a place of worship; with disuse it fell into ruin. During the Siege of Petersburg, it served as a field hospital for wounded soldiers. In 1882, it was partially repaired and in 1901, the Ladies Memorial Association of Petersburg restored the old church as a Confederate shrine.

The Historical Treasures of Blandford Church Cemetery

There are few cemeteries in America that display such a wide assortment of historical markers and funerary art as Blandford Church. The oldest headstone dates back to 1702, many years before the church itself was built. The artwork varies from a modern metal sculpture by the late Jacques Lipchitz to an example of practically every type of mortuary monument created and executed by man over the last 275 years.

Blandford Cemetery is a silent testimonial to the soldiers of six wars, among them 30,000 Confederates. A monument to the Washington Artillery of New Orleans commemorates its members who were killed in the 10-month Siege of Petersburg during the last and longest campaign of the Civil War.

One of the more ornamental monuments, embellished with carved stone and decorative ironwork, honors Captain Richard McRae and the Petersburg volunteers who marched to Ohio and fought in the Battle of Fort Meigs during the War of 1812. A granite marker cites the presence of General William Phillips of the British army, who captured Petersburg in the Revolutionary War. Phillips is the highest ranking British officer of that war resting on American soil.

Many of the earlier gravestones are inscribed to colonists, chiefly from Scotland, England and Ireland. As can be seen from their inscriptions, very few lived past what we consider middle age.

Visitors can walk along the cemetery's paths to discover curious personal histories and enjoy an atmosphere of serenity. A map is available from the Blandford Interpretation Center showing some of the cemetery's points of interest.

The Birth of Memorial Day

Memorial services, begun in 1865, are still held in Blandford Church every June 9th. They are held on this day to honor the 129 old men and young boys who fought to save their city when 1,300 Union cavalymen attacked on June 9th, 1864.

In 1866, the wife of Union General John A. Logan saw schoolgirls placing flowers on Confederate graves. She was so touched by the gesture, she told her husband. As Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, he issued the order that led to the present national observance of Memorial Day.

The Tiffany Treasures of Blandford Church

There are only two or three buildings in the world where every window is an original Tiffany creation and the Blandford Church is one of them. Louis Comfort Tiffany designed all 15 of the stained glass windows here at the height of his brilliant career. They were installed from 1904 to 1915.

Eleven of the windows were donated by former Confederate states and by two borderline states. One was donated by the Ladies Memorial Association and one, the famous "Cross of Jewels", was a gift of Tiffany himself.

Tiffany's process for fusing color into glass gives his creations the quality and texture that sets his work apart from all others. The brilliancy of color, the molded forms and mosaic elements are blended to produce a glass in which the images are so vivid they seem almost real. The jewel-like quality of the windows makes them appear to be illuminated even on the drabest days.

Tiffany made each color by adding different metals to the glass while it was still in a heated state and produced shadings by forcing the molten glass into wrinkles and folds. His brilliant artistic formula for incorporating color and texture into glass was destroyed the morning after his death, as he had requested in his will. The method has never been duplicated.

As you observe each Tiffany window, note the sheen of the Saints' robes. The special effect of St. Peter's robe in the Missouri window (number 5) was achieved by blending crushed 24 karat gold in the glass. Copper was fused into glass to produce the sheen in the window (number 6) of St. James the Less.

The dew-like sheen of St. Paul's purple robe in the Louisiana window (number 3) was no doubt created by the use of cobalt. St. Paul's blue sword is actually one piece of glass even though there are two distinct colors not joined by lead. This window was donated by the Washington Artillery of New Orleans.

Family rumor says DEMPSEY'S father and three brothers were serving with General Jackson and "he ran away down the river to join them, but got there after the battle was over". Another family rumor is "there was a French G'mother"

Sgt Absolom settled Jesse's estate in Maury Co., Tenn, no heirs named, personal property and military pay only; our DEMPSEY named his eldest son JESSE. Maury Co. Probate Recd.

Absolom appears in the sketchy census of 1820 in Fayette Co., Illinois; the others appear in 1830 in Bear Grove TWP, Fayette Co., where they gave land for school, church; they were Baptists, Southern sympathizers in the Civil War, Democrats; held County offices, some were schoolteachers. I have not yet been able to prove their relationship to each other. Court, Cemetery, County Histories, census Recds.

SMITH - #9

No proof has yet been found of Mary (Polly) Smith's parents but early Bond and Fayette Co., Illinois land and probate records link the ADAM SMITH family to the YARBROUGHS. SMITHS are buried in an old YARBROUGH cemetery; DEMPSEY would appear from land records to have bought out MARY's share of ADAM, Sr., land from ADAM, Jr.

RODECKER - #20

Immigrant ancestor is JOHN HENRY RAERTIGER (RATIKER) who came to America on the ship St. Michael, Sep 8, 1753 to Phila; settled in Cumberland Co., Pa; son Frederick Rodecker b ca 1750 Germany was child of 3 when the family came. He saw service with the Lancaster County Pa. Militia in the Revolution, 1776 to 1782. Frederick married ca 1771 in Pa Margaret Sauers (Sowers) dau of Henry Sowers who came in 1733, and Maria Dorothea Englert. Yarboro, Yarborough

This is an English place name derived from the Old English word *eorpburg*, which was the name given to the old Roman earth fortifications in Britain. The Old German element *burg* here represents the older use of this term, "fortified place, fort," and the fact that such places often became hamlets, villages and towns acted to preserve the Anglo-Saxon designation in England.

There are two places in Lincolnshire by this name: Yarborough Camp, which gave its name to Yarborough wapentake (district) was spelled Gereburg in the Domesday Book of 1086; Ierburne in 1115, and Ierdburg in 1254; the other place was spelled the same as the first until 1160 when it became Jedeburch, then Jerdburg in 1212, Yarburi in 1219 and now finally Yarburi.

There were other Roman camps in Cambridgeshire, Hertfordshire, Lancashire (where it was spelled Erthbury in 1154), and Warwickshire (spelled Ordburi and Edburia in 1154-89), and the places where these camps were located are all now spelled Arbury.

The earliest recordings of the surnames were Gilbert de (of) Yerdeburg and Robert de Yerdeburgh, both of Lincolnshire, in 1273. Then came John de Qerbury, Somersetshire, 1323. Richard Yerbergh and Frances Proctor were married in London in 1635; Rowland Hacher and Elizabeth Yerborowe were married in London in 1636; William Gilbert and Katherine Yarborough were married in Canterbury in 1660.

Burke's General Armory describes the four different Yarborough, one Yarburi and two different Yerburi.

In Virginia, Richard Yarbrough held a land grant in King & Queen County prior to 1695 and obtained two 400 acre grants in the same county in 1724-28 in payment of 80 shillings. Edward was granted 200 acres in Caroline in 1728, but held land in King William County prior to 1705. Charles Yarbrough obtained a 400 acre grant in King William County in 1725 and he also held land in King & Queen County prior to 1727. William Yarbrough obtained a 400 acre grant in King William County in 1724 and Henry held land in Caroline County prior to 1728.

Two of the spelling Yarborough were officers in the American Revolutionary Army.

Yantlet Creek K [*laened* 779, *laegnlaed* 789, *Genlad* 808 BCS 228, 257, 326, *la Yenlade* 1277 RH], *Yenlet* K, an alternative name of the northern arm of the Wamsura [*Genladac* (gen.) c 730 Bede]. An OE *gegn-lād* 'backwater' or the like, very likely the source of the word *inlet* 'arm of the sea, creek'. The elements are OE *gegn*, *gagn* 'again' and *lād* 'water-course'. Yantlet may have been an old name of the lower Medway. At present the name Yantlet Creek is applied to the arm that separates the Isle of Grain from the mainland, while South Yantlet Creek is another arm of the river.

Yanwath We [*Euenwit* 1150-62 YCh 1241, *Yafneid* c 1244 Kendale]. A Scandinavianized form of EVENWOOD, the meaning being 'flat wood'. OScaud *iafn* and *viðr* have replaced OE *efn* and *teudu*.

Yanworth Gl [*Teneurde* DB, *Iancorpe* c 1162, *-uurd* c 1201, *-uorth* 1202 Winche, *Yanewrth* 1251 Ch]. 'Geana's worp.' The first el. is an OE pers. n. **Geana* (**Gana*), a short form of names like *Ganhald*, *Geanburh*, *Iaenborht*.

Yapham YE [*Yapum* DB, *Yapum* c 1155 YCh 442, 1230 Ep, *Yapom* 1299 BM]. Apparently the dat. plur. of some OE noun. It may be a substantivized form of OE *gēap* 'steep, lofty', used in the sense 'eminence'. The place is on a hill of irregular shape. Alternatively it might be OE *hēap* 'heap'. Cf. SHAP.

Yapton Sx [*Abinton* 1197 P, *Ebinton* 1235 FF, *Yapeton* 1295 Ch]. 'TŪN of Eabba's people.' **Eabba* is presupposed by *Eabbingewyll* 854 BCS 480 and is a short form of names like *Eadbeald*. *Eabbe* fem. is on record.

Yar R Wt. No early forms have been found. On the stream is Yarbridge. Perhaps the name is a back-formation from the name of a place near St. Helens at the mouth of the Yar, referred to as *Yarneforde* 1324 Misc. This seems to be OE *earnaford* 'eagles' ford'.

Yarborough Camp Li. The place gave its name to Yarborough wap. [*Gereburg* DB, *Ierburc* c 1115 LiS, *Ierdeburg* 1254 Val]. The source is OE *eorþburg* 'earth fortification'; cf. ARBURY. Identical in origin with Yarburgh Li, which is not in Yarborough wap. [*Gereburg* DB, *Ierburc* c 1115 LiS, *Ierdeburc* 12 DC, *Ierdeburgh* Hy 2 BM, *Ierburg* 1212 Fees, *Yardbury* 1209-19 Ep].

Yarcombe D [*Erticoma* DB, *-cumba* 1156 Fr, *Yarte(s)cumbe* 1281 QW, *Yeartecomb* 1332 Misc]. 'Valley of R YARTY.'

Yardley Ess in Thaxted [*Gerdelai* DB, *-leg* 1236 FF], **Y- Gobion Np** [*Gerdeslai*, *Jerdelai* 1167 P, *Yerdele Gobionum* 1353 Ipm], **Y- Hastings Np** [*Gerdelai* DB, *-le* 12 NS, *Ierdele* 1265 Misc, *Yerdele Hastings* 1316 FA], **Y- Wo** [*Gyrdleah* 972 BCS 1282, *Gerlei* DB], **Yarley So** nr Wells [*Gyrdleg* 1065 Wells]. OE *gyrd-lēah* 'wood where yards, i.e. spars &c., were got'. First el. OE *gierd*, *gyrd* 'yard, pole' &c.

Y- Gobion was held by Henry Gubyun in 1228 (Cl). Cf. HIGHAM GOBION.—**Y- Hastings** is mentioned as having belonged to Henry de Hasting' in 1250 (Cl). Cf. BURTON HASTINGS.

Yare R Nf [*Gariēnnos* c 150 Ptol, *Gerne* c 1150 ERN; cf. YARMOUTH]. A Brit river-name derived from the root *ger* in Welsh *gair*, Bret *ger* 'word', Mlr *gairm* 'shout', Welsh *garan* 'crane'. The meaning may be 'babbling river'. From the Yare was derived the Brit name of Burgh Castle [*Garianno* c 425 ND; cf. (equitum) *Garian-nonensium* ib.].

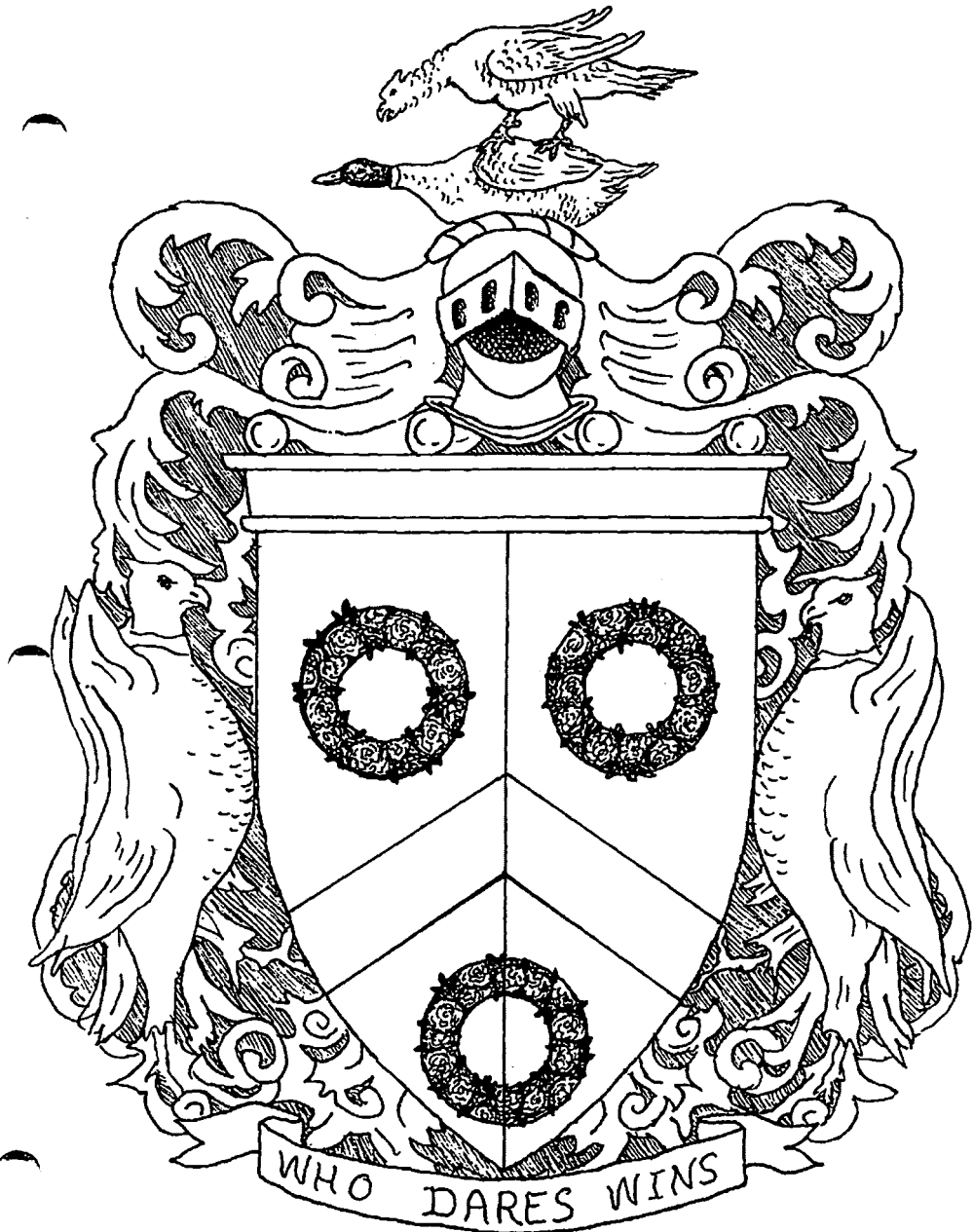

Yarlet St [*Erlide* DB, *Erlida* 1167 f. P]. OE *ear-hlid* 'gravel slope' or *earn-hlid* 'eagle slope'. Cf. ERITH, HILP. The place is at Yarlet Hill.

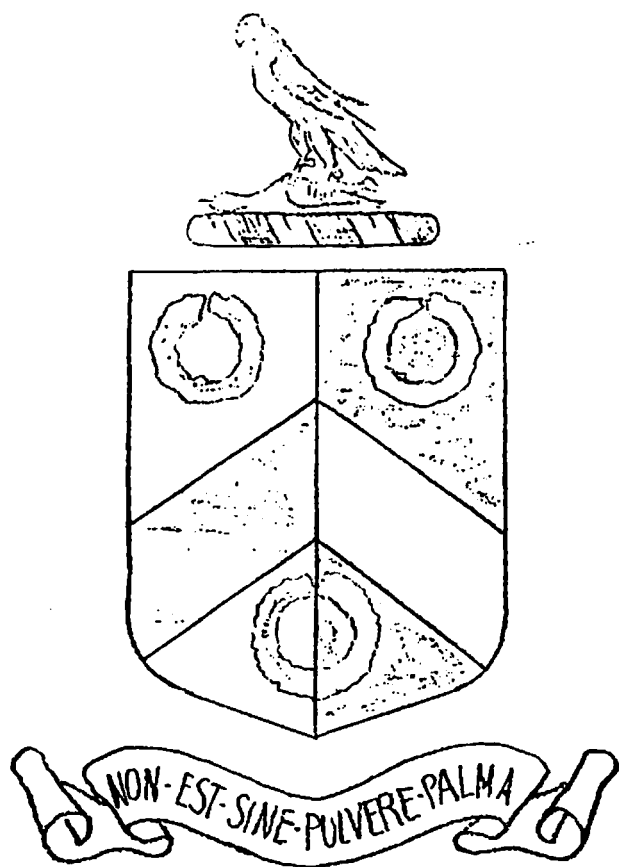

Historiography

The Yarbrough Coat of Arms illustrated left was drawn by an heraldic artist from information officially recorded in ancient heraldic archives. Documentation for the Yarbrough Coat of Arms design can be found in Burke's General Armory. Heraldic artists of old developed their own unique language to describe an individual Coat of Arms. In their language, the Arms (shield) is as follows:

"Per pale ar. and az. a chev. betw. three chaplets all counterchanged."

When translated the Arms description is:

"Divided vertically silver and blue; a chevron between three wreaths, all counterchanged."

Above the shield and helmet is the Crest which is described as:

"A falcon close or, belled of the last, preying on a duck ppr."

A translation of the Crest description is:

"A gold falcon with wings down, gold belled, preying on a duck, natural color."

Family mottos are believed to have originated as battle cries in medieval times.

The Motto recorded with the Yarbrough Coat of Arms is:

"NON EST SINE PULVERE PALMA"

(There Is No Palm Without Wrestling For It)

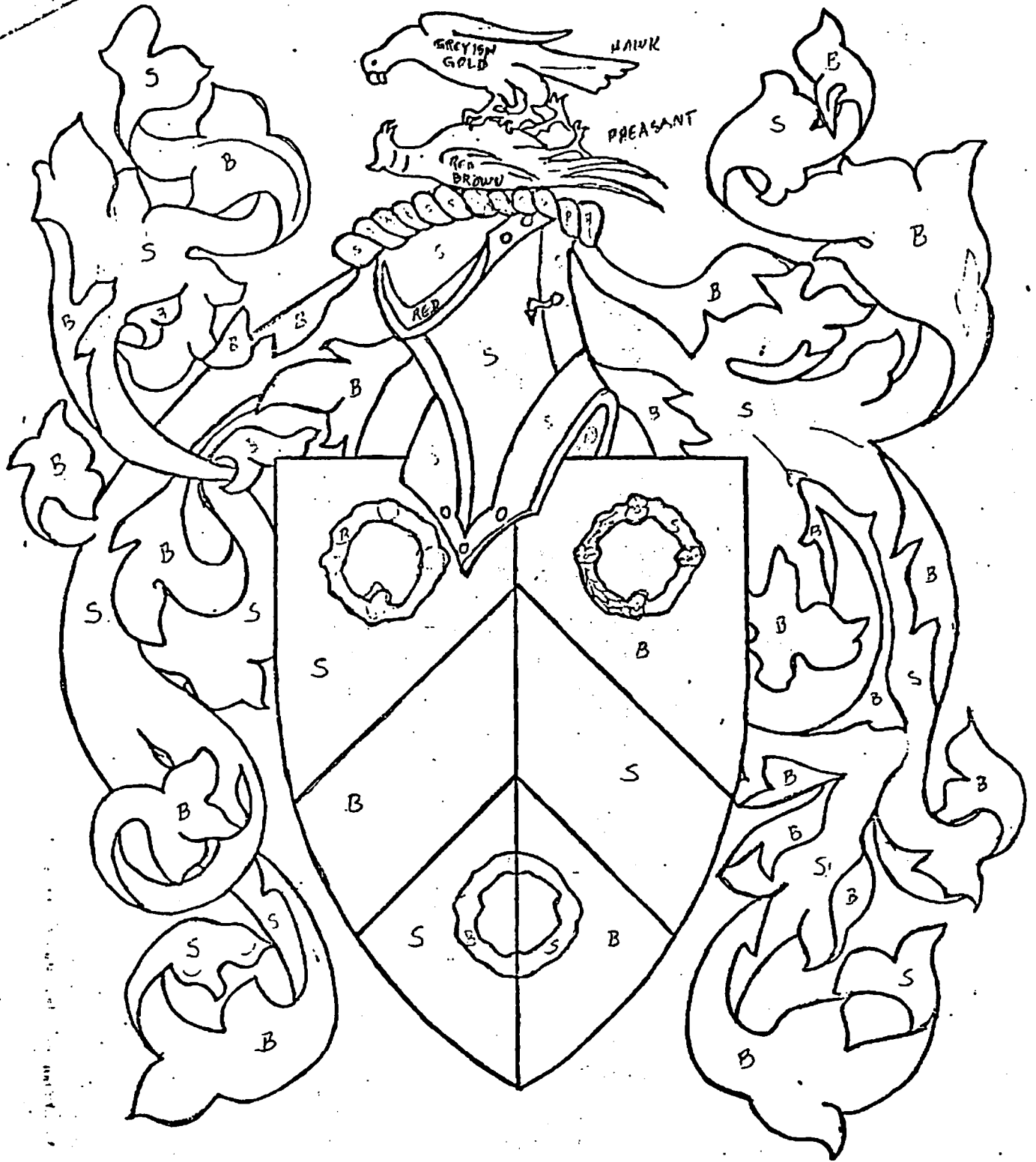
Individual surnames originated for the purpose of more specific identification.

The four primary sources for second names were: occupation, location, father's name and personal characteristics. The surname Yarbrough appears to be locational in origin, and is believed to be associated with the English, meaning, "one who came from, or lived near Yarbrough (earth fortification)." The supplementary sheet included with this report is designed to give you more information to further your understanding of the origin of names. Different spellings of the same original surname are a common occurrence. Dictionaries of surnames indicate probable spelling variations. The most prominent variations of Yarbrough are Yarbroughs, Yarbrough and Yarbroughs.

Information available to us indicates that in 1971 there were approximately 1250 heads of households in the United States with the old and distinguished Yarbrough name. The United States Census Bureau in 1970 estimated that there were approximately 3.1 persons per household in America which yields an approximate total of 3875 people in the United States carrying the Yarbrough name. Although the figure seems relatively low, it does not signify the many important contributions that individuals bearing the Yarbrough name have made to history.

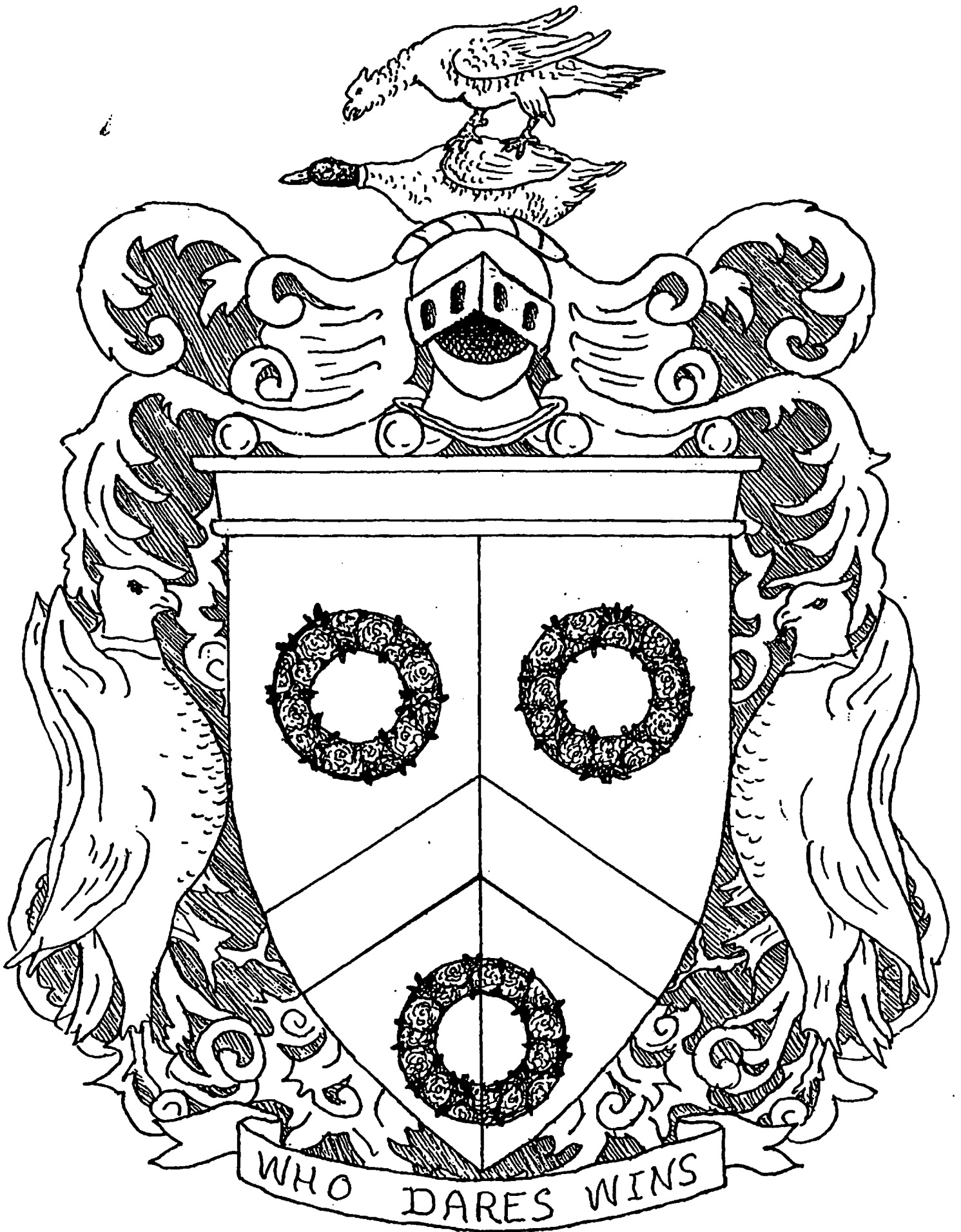

The eagle's head as a charge appears quite as often as does the whole bird; also the legs, usually erased at the thigh, and called 'erazed à la guise'. The whole section below the thigh is included in the word 'claw'.

Next in importance is the falcon, a bird that was once the companion of every sportsman and gentleman. For canting reasons it is known in heraldry by the names of various species—falcon, hawk, goshawk, and hobby, without any reference to anatomical difference. Each of these terms is typically English, but two more, merlion and girfauk, which come into English arms, are borrowed from the French.

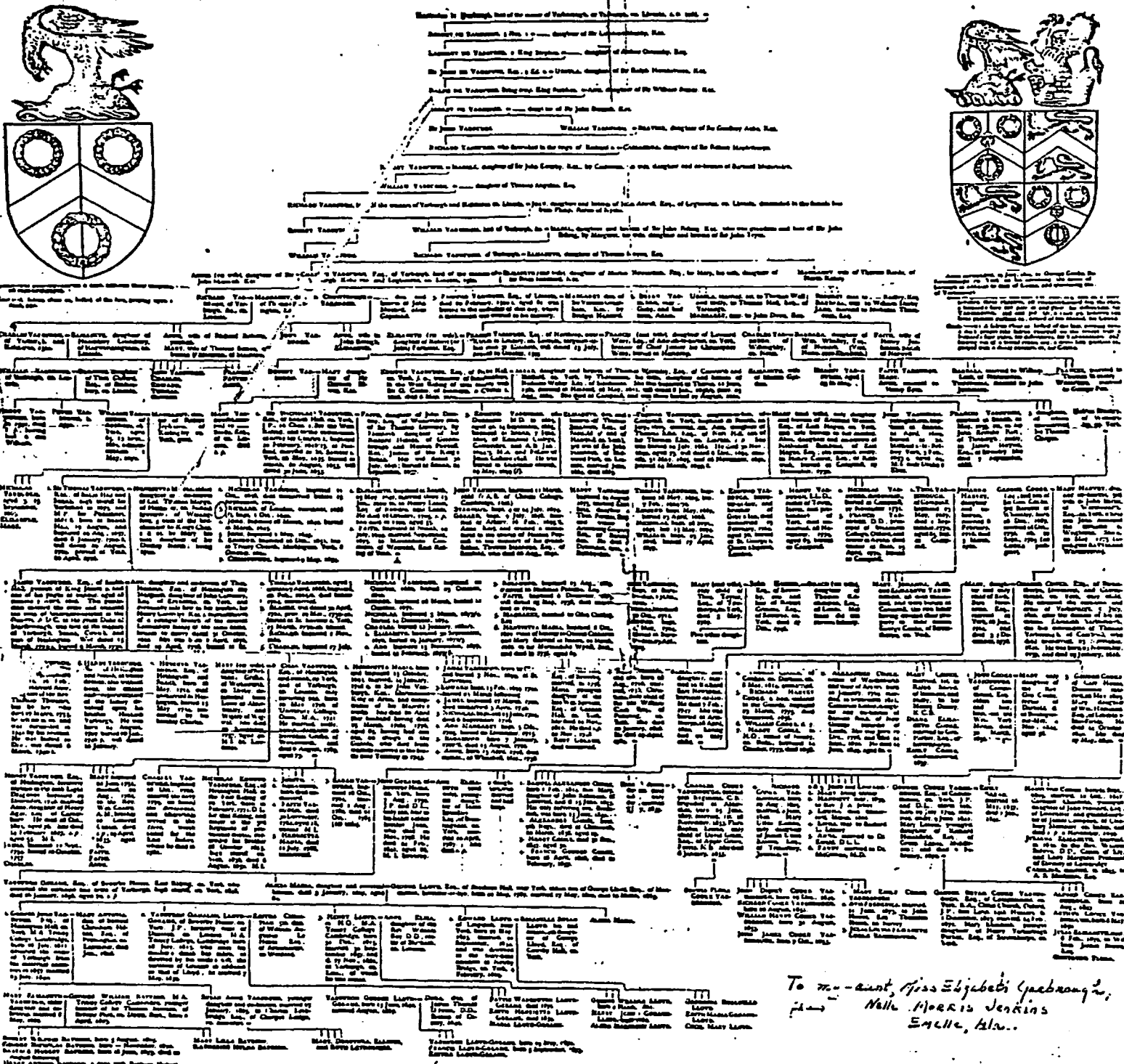
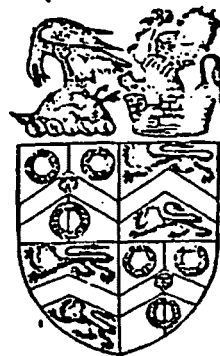
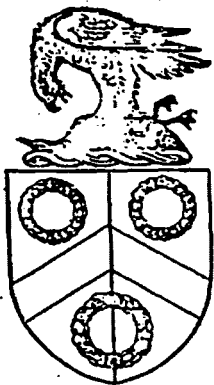
Although the falcon, a bird of prey, should be armed of its beak and talons, it is, strangely enough, very often blazoned beaked and membered (or membered). Its usual attitude is perched and close, but it may also be rising or surgerant.

Falcons are, at times, depicted as standing, sometimes with wings displayed, upon the body of some other bird. This is correctly described as trussing, but may be simplified to preying upon. The system may be referred to as just a bird, or it may be specified: trussing a mallard; . . . preying upon a duck.

The Falconer carried the bird seated upon his wrist and, in order to keep it under control, used a kind of cloth bag to blindfold the creature; thus, a hawk blazoned as hooded is drawn with such a bag over its head.

In addition to the hood, the falconer attached to his bird's leg a bell, and this detail leads to a sharp divergence of opinion

The above chart shows the English line from 1066, as prepared for the late Lord Alvingham, for seating at King George's Coronation. The picture was developed by subjecting a silvered copper plate, made light sensitive by subjecting it to iodine and bromide fumes, then exposing the plate from three to five minutes in a camera. The image was developed by mercury vapor and was fixed by sodium thiosulfate. The highlights of the images were whitish, the shadows were bare mirrorlike areas. The Artist of the day enhanced the portraits by adding color by means of an air brush.

This process was developed between 1821 - 1840 and became popular in America between 1840 - 1850.

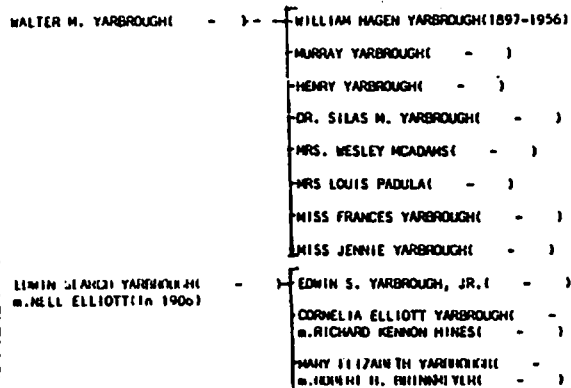

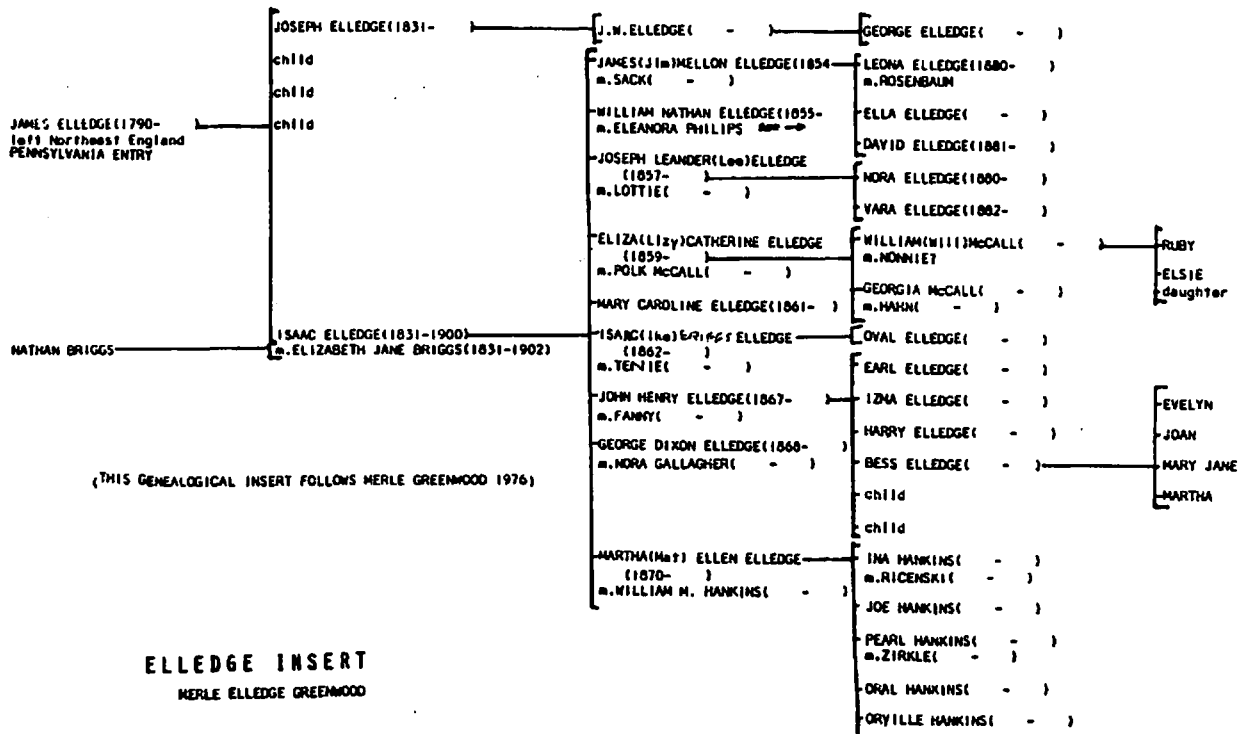

living in Buckingham County.

Henry Yarborough of Virginia, married Martha Robinson of the same State, and afterwards moved to North Carolina. They had ten (10) children - Charles, Clement, Thomas, Archie, James, Edward, Nathaniel, Hattie, Betsy and Henry.

(1) Charles was an old bachelor, and like a father to his nieces and nephews.

(2) Clement was in the Revolutionary war - came home in a very emaciated condition and died soon after of the disease known at that time as bloody flux. His mother died soon after of the same disease. He was of a poetical temperament and devoted to his mother. After his death several original poems were found among his effects, addressed to her.

(3) Thomas was killed during the Revolutionary war by the Tories, who caught him while at home on a furlough and murdered him barbarously, beginning at his feet and disjoints him, in the presence of his wife. After his death his brother Charles went out to Alabama for them, i. e., his wife and their children but her parents wished her to remain with them. His son James visited this state when grandma was a young lady.

This was Henry, Jr.

(4) Archie's children were Emily, Glen, Betty Hunter (?), Rebecca Whittaker, Kate Hicks, James, Henry and Archie. They owned the old Henry Yarborough homestead about five miles from Franklinton.

(5) James married and moved to Arkansas. His children were Henry, Elam, Nathaniel and Nancy. Henry married a Miss Duke and Nancy a Mr. Withers.

(6) Edward died single.

(7) Nathaniel married Mildred Fuller of Franklin - children - Clement, Betsy, Sarah, Richard, Martha and Mary. He moved to a place ten miles this side of Petersburg, Virginia, thinking to do a large commission business, but soon after the move he died from an apoplectic stroke. His brother Charles, knowing that he had been unfortunate in business, insisted, when he went to Virginia that he should make over his property here to him, thinking to save something for the children should his brother fail in Virginia. This was exceeding unfortunate, for Charles died soon after Nathaniel and his legatees required an equal division of everything. Clement, who was a very dutiful son and a father to his younger brothers and sisters died in his 22nd year. Betsy married a Mr. Clements and finally moved to Texas.

(8) Nancy married Charles Parrish of Grange.

(9) Betty, older than Nathaniel, married a Mr. Allen of Georgia. Grandma use to tell some very amusing anecdotes of a visit that Betty Allen's son made to this state when she was a young lady - how he dressed and how he addressed her.

(10) Henry married Betty Murray of Franklin. Children were Thomas, David, Archie, Henry, Fannie, Patty and Nancy. Tom married Mary Green of Warren. David moved to Hillsboro and married Eleanor Dorriby (?), who lived with her half sister Miss Burke, who was old governor Burke's daughter. He afterwards moved to Marion, Alabama, where his only son Henry died a young man. Fannie married Mr. Alston, and Eliza Jimmy House from North Carolina. Fannie married Claiborne Cooke. Patty married John House of Louisburg, who died and left her a widow with eight children - Henry, Issac, Duke, Thomas, Patsy, Mary, Nancy, Francis,

1. Henry House, who married Kekoe Mitchell, was David Yarborough's brother, and managed the Branch house in Louisburg. They had several children - Caroline, who married and went to Florida; Patty who married in Marion and went to New Orleans. She has a son who is now a conspicuous man in Marion, so Mr. McL tells me.

2 and 3. Isaac and Duke died young.

4. Patsy married Lt. Dick Plummer, U. S. A., lived in

Alabama. I had a photo of young Dick Plummer, who was killed in the War, but it was burned up.

5. Francis, for whom my mother was named, married Mr. Tharrington of Hillsboro, afterwards of Alabama.

6. Nancy married John Ligon. You probably know^{all} about this branch. I only copied the part referred to the Yarboroughs and only the main points of that, as I am exceedingly busy.

For his valiancy, William the Conqueror of England, gave him the Earldom of Yorkshire county, England, which earldom still exists. Some of the Yarbrough gentry came from England in the early settlement of Virginia, and located in Amelia county of that state. Prior to 1760 seven Yarbough - Yarborough - Yarbore brothers migrated from Virginia to North Carolina. Three preceded the other four. The three were:

John - Henry & Zachariah

They located in what was then Bute County, N. C. It is now Franklin County with Louisburg the county seat. John and Zachariah left Bute County after 1760. John migrated to Fairfield District, S. C. His son John Jr. died there (testate) about 1816. His descendants are found in Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas. Zachariah migrated to Anson County, N. C. He married Elizabeth Dowd in Anson County. He died in that county and he and his wife are buried on the Dowd farm. His descendants are found in Tennessee, Arkansas and Texas. His grandson (Manoah) migrated to St. Clair County, Alabama about 1820, and the line is still there.

Manoah's son (Littleton) migrated to Tyler, Texas and his descendants married into the Phillips (Oil 66) family, also the Murchison family.

Henry remained in Bute (Franklin Co.) North Carolina. He married Martha Robinson before leaving Virginia. He died about 1795 in Franklin County, N. C. His son, Edward, was a Captain during American Revolution and was a staff officer (George Washington) at the end. He migrated to Salisbury, Rowan County, N. C., and died there. His will is on file at Salisbury and his home (Yarborough House) is on the list of Tourist attractions. Edward was a charter member of the Order of Cincinnati formed at the end of the Revolution. He was, also, a signer of the Mecklenburg

Declaration of Independence. Other descendants of Henry were Fenner, Henry, Jr., Clement, James, Micajah and Archibald.

These descendants are represented by families in Tennessee (Kingsport area), Arkansas (Jonesboro area), Alabama (Tennessee Valley area) - Marshall Co., Madison Co., Lincolnnton Co., and Texas (Tyler and Kilgore areas).

Henry Yarbrough's line is still extant in Virginia in the little ~~Henry~~^{Nottoway} river section of Amelia County.

Henry Yarbrough, Sr. and Martha (Robinson) named their first son Henry Yarbrough, Jr.

Henry Yarbrough, Jr. married Elizabeth Murray (see "Abridged Compendium of Va., Vol. 3, pages 495-6.")

Henry, Jr. died in Franklin County, N. C. after 1793 (same reference). His line is represented in Franklin Co. by Hill Yarborough of the legal firm of Yarbrough & Yarbrough of Louisburg, N. C. A female descendant married a N. C. Governor, and a male descendant (Edwin S.) married a Governor's daughter. Due to migrations, the Henry Yarbrough descendants crossed the lines by a Yarbrough marrying a Yarbrough viz - Ambrose Yarbrough and Beulah Yarbrough, Union County, S. C. and James Yarbrough and wife, Lincolnnton Co., Alabama. The Union County, S. C. line is of no importance to this study. The Limestone County Ala. line is the Padulo line as is evidenced as follows:

1st. Henry Yarbrough, Sr. of Franklin County, N. C. had a grandson named for him and his wife (Elizabeth Murray).

This grandson was born about 1785 and bore the name Henry Murray Yarbrough.

2nd. Henry Yarbrough, Sr. and his wife, Martha Robinson, had a son named Fenner.

3rd. James Yarbrough and wife of Limestone Co., Ala. named a son, William Henry, and another son, Fenner.

4th. A related Limestone family named a son Murray (Decatur, Ala.).

1741 Henry Yarbrough appears on the Tithe list as head of his own household as early as 1741 (2 tithables, Henry and one slave). Reel 55, Tithables 1736-1771, pages not numbered.

Note: As head of a household and landowner, Henry was at least 21 years of age by 1740 making his birth at least by 1718-1719.

1743 8 April. Henry Yarbrough had a survey on the North side of Little Nottoway River between Yarbrough and Beasley - 204 acres. Land Surveys Reel 56, pages unnumbered.

- 1743 Henry is again on the tithe list with 2 tithables, himself and one slave named Jack. Henry appears on the tithe lists through 1756 with these same two tithes.

Note: As males were taxed at age 16, this indicates that none of Henry's sons had reached age 16 by 1756, making the birth of Henry's oldest son, Henry Jr., no earlier than 1740.

Note: Henry Yarbrough, Jr. apparently predeceased his father. Henry Jr.'s will is presented for probate at the June 1794 Court and the estate settlement is recorded in 1807. Henry Yarbrough Sr. was living as late as 30 June 1796 when he made deeds of gift to his son James and daughter Martha. There is no will or estate settlement on file for Henry Yarbrough Sr. It appears that he settled his children's inheritance on them before he died. Henry does not appear in the records after the 1796 deeds of gift.

The estate settlement of Henry Yarbrough Jr. is concluded in December 1807. The Estate sale of Elizabeth Yarbrough was held 22 December 1807. As Henry Jr.'s will left his lands etc. to his wife Elizabeth for her life or widowhood, she apparently died about December 1807 and Henry Jr.'s estate was then settled.

My assumptions from the above:

1. The Henry & Thomas Yarbrough who patented land together in 1740:
 - a. Deposition proves birth year of Thomas is 1685. For Henry to have been the father of Thomas, he would have been born at least 20 years earlier, or 1665. The records prove that Henry was living as late as 1796. Had Henry been b. as early as 1665, would have made him 131 years old in 1796. This Henry is not the father of Thomas.
 - b. From the tithe records, deeds, etc., Henry's approximate birth was 1715 to 1720. Thomas, b. 1685, was at least 30-35 years older than Henry. It is extremely doubtful that they were brothers.
 - c. Again, from the age difference of 30-35 years, Henry and Thomas are not grandfather and grandson.
 - d. While an uncle might have helped a nephew patent land, it is doubtful that an uncle would have conveyed more land to a nephew than he did his own sons. Note that 600 acres of the 800 tract went to Henry while Thomas deeded his proven sons only 200 acres. For this reason, I do not believe that Thomas and Henry were Uncle and Nephew.
 - e. Thomas is 30-35 years older than Henry. They patented land together that was eventually deeded to Henry. Thomas and Henry lived next to each other in Virginia and also in NC. The only possible relationship is that Thomas Yarbrough, Sr. was the father of Henry Yarbrough (Sr.)

The information below was copied from a letter written more than a hundred years ago by the granddaughter of Martha Curtis. It was sent to me by Pauline Gray in February, 1986. Pauline received her copy from V. Nan Yarbrough of Oklahoma. Martha (Yarbrough) Curtis was the daughter of Nathaniel and Mildred (Fuller) Yarbrough, and the granddaughter of Henry and Martha Yarbrough.

While the letter says that Henry and Martha had 10 children, it does not list daughter Martha. The deed of gift from Henry to his daughter Martha proves she was also one of his children.

Henry Yarborough of Virginia married Martha Robinson of the same state, and afterwards moved to North Carolina. They had ten (10) children - Charles, Clement, Thomas, Archie, James, Edward, Nathaniel, Nannie, Betsy, and Henry.

1. Charles was an old bachelor, and like a father to his nieces and nephews.
2. Clement was in the Revolutionary war - came home in a very emaciated condition and died soon after of the disease known at that time as bloody flux. His mother died soon after of the same disease. He was of a poetical temperament and devoted to his mother. After his death several original poems were found among his effects, dedicated to her.
3. Thomas was killed during the Revolutionary War by the Tories, who caught him while at home on a furlough and murdered him barbarously, beginning at his feet and disjointing him, in the presence of his wife. After his death his brother Charles went out to Alabama for them, i.e., his wife and their children, but her parents wished her to remain with them. His son James visited this state when grandma was a young lady.*
4. Archie's children were Emily Glen, Betty Hunter, Rebecca Whittaker, Kate Nicks, James, Henry and Archie. They owned the old Henry Yarborough homestead about five miles from Franklinton.
5. James married and moved to Arkansas. His children were Henry, Elam, Nathaniel and Nancy. Henry married a Miss Duke and Nancy a Mr. Withers.
6. Edward died single.
7. Nathaniel married Mildred Fuller of Franklin - children - Clement, Betsy, Sarah, Richard, Martha and Mary. He moved to a place ten miles this side of Petersburg, Virginia, thinking to do a large commission business, but soon after the move he died from an apoplectic stroke. His brother Charles, knowing that he had been unfortunate in business, insisted, when he went to Virginia that he should make over his property here [NC] to him, thinking to save

something for the children should his brother fail in Virginia. This was exceedingly unfortunate, for Charles died soon after Nathaniel and his legatees required an equal division of everything.** Clement, who was a very dutiful son and a father to his younger brothers and sisters, died in his 22nd year. Betsy married a Mr. Clements and finally moved to Texas.

8. Nancy married Charles Parrish of Orange.
9. Betty, older than Nathaniel, married a Mr. Allen of Georgia. Grandma used to tell some very amusing anecdotes of a visit that Betty Allen's son made to this state when she was a young lady - how he dressed and how he addressed her.
10. Henry married Betty Murray of Franklin. Children were Thomas, David, Archie, Henry, Fannie, Patty and Nancy. Tom married Mary Green*** of Warren. David moved to Hillsboro and married Eleanor Dorriby who lived with her half sister Miss Burke, who was old governor Burke's daughter. He afterwards moved to Marion, Alabama where his only son Henry died a young man. Fannie married Mr. Alston, and Elia [married] Jimmy House from North Carolina. Fannie married Claiborne Cooke. Patty married John House of Louisburg, who died and left her a widow with eight children - Henry, Isaac, Duke, Thomas, Patsy, Mary, Nancy, Francis.
 1. Henry House who married Kekoe Mitchell, was David Yarborough's brother [?] and managed the Branch House in Louisburg. They had several children - Caroline, who married and went to Florida; Patty who married in Marion and went to New Orleans. She has a son who is now a conspicuous man in Marion, so Mr. McL tells me.
 2. Isaac died young.
 3. Duke died young.
 4. Patsy married Lt. Dick Plummer, U.S.A., lived in Alabama. I had a photo of young Dick Plummer, who was killed in the war, but it was burned up.
 5. Francis, for whom my mother was named, married Mr. Tharrington of Hillsboro, afterwards of Alabama.
 6. Nancy married John Ligon. You probably know all about his branch. I only copied the part referred to the Yarboroughs and only the main points of that, as I am exceedingly busy.

*Karen's note: Have records of three daughters, but nothing on a son James.

**Karen's note: The records bear this out. Nathaniel did indeed deed his NC

property to his brother Charles. When Charles died, Charles' heirs demanded that all of Charles property be equally distributed, which included the property he was "holding" for Nathaniel. There was a lengthy court battle where Nathaniel's heirs tried to regain their father's property.

***Karen's note: V. Nan Yarbrough's note on this paper says: "Re: Item 10., son Thomas: He may, indeed, have been the Thomas who married Mary Green of Warren Co., NC, however, if that be true, then the writer omitted Mary Green's last name which was Davis. This Thomas was the great, great-grandfather of my husband. He married Mary G. Davis in 1812. She was the daughter of Jonathan Davis."

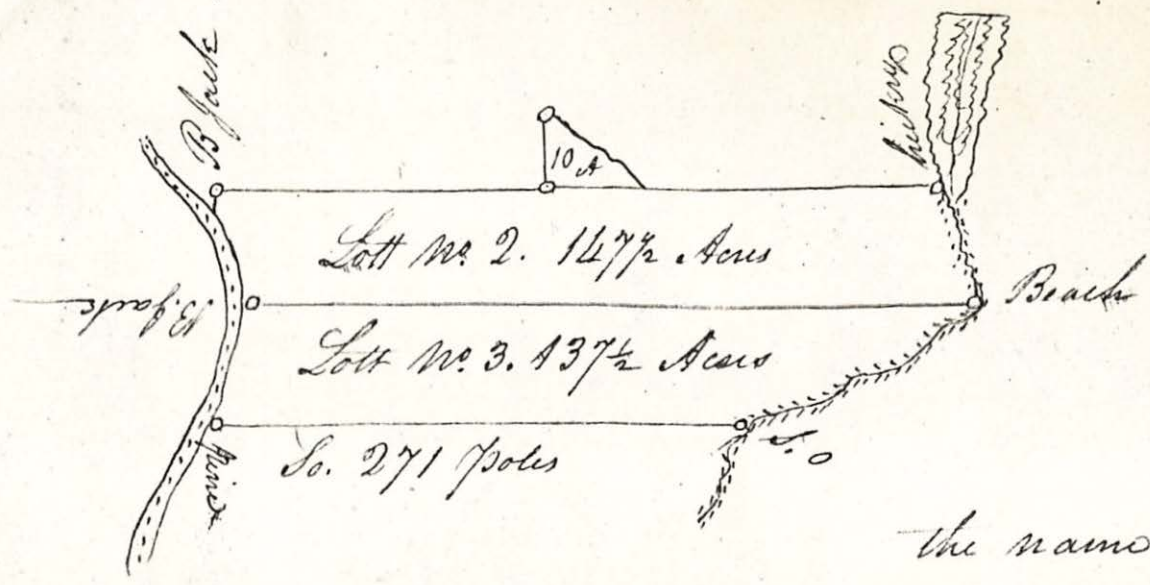

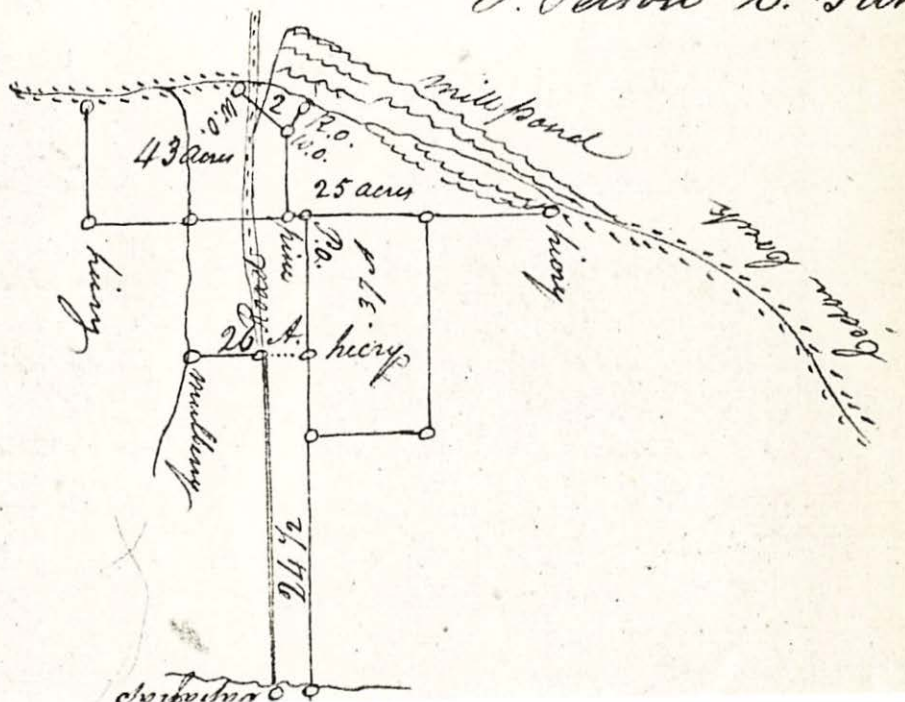

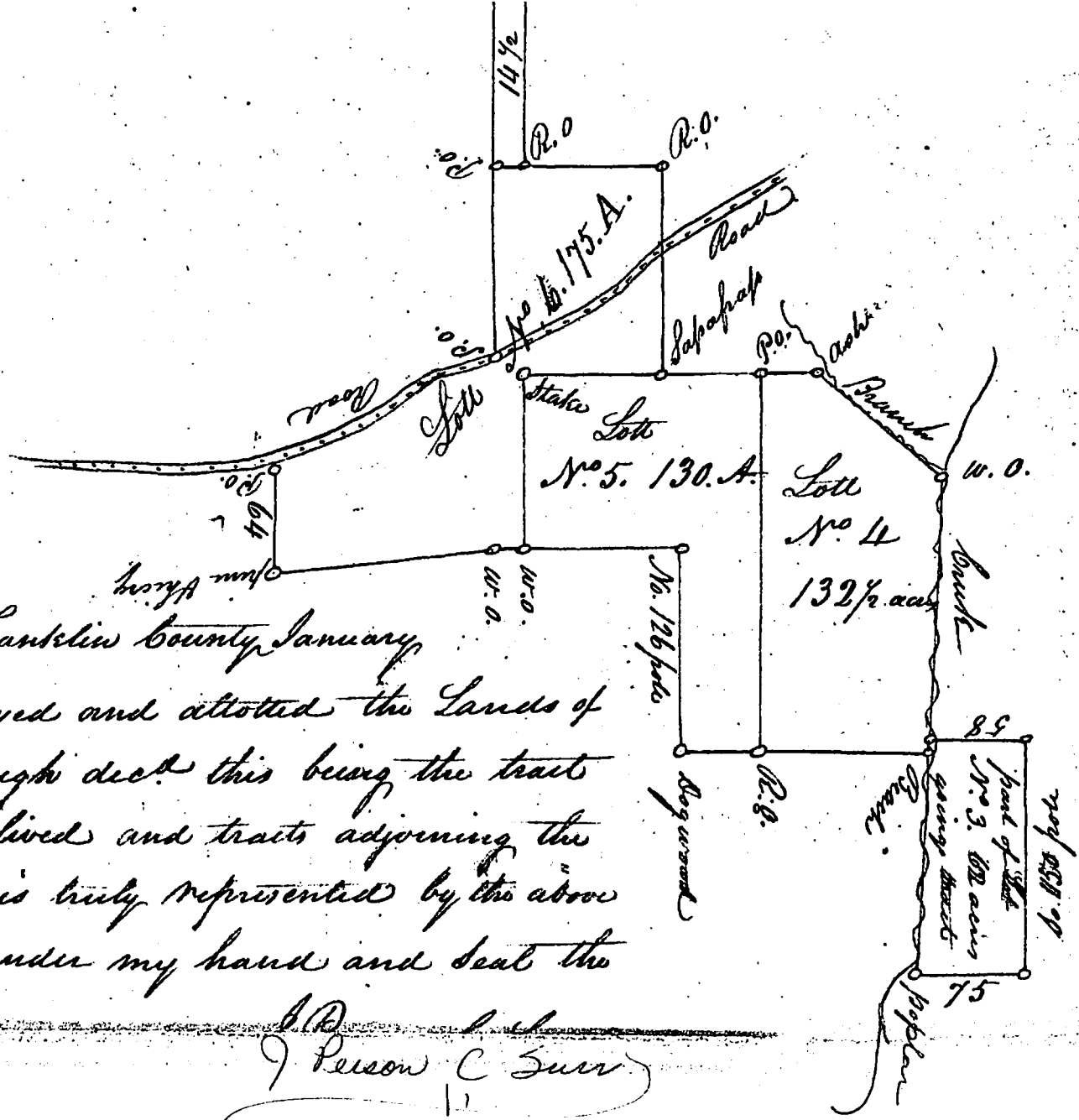

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to Henry Yarborough I, of Virginia, and Henry Yarborough II, of North Carolina.

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, S. 1607, based upon service of Henry Yarborough in the War of the Revolution. This is the record of the only Henry Yarborough (Yarboro) found on file in the Revolutionary War records of this office.

Henry Yarborough was born in the year 1761 or 1762 in what was then Bute County, North Carolina, that county was later Franklin. He was the son of Zachariah Yarborough, the name of his mother was not given. He moved with his father, about the beginning of the Revolution to Randolph County, North Carolina.

Henry Yarborough, while residing in Randolph County, volunteered in 1779 or 1780, served six months in a company of horse, commanded by Captains Brittain Fuller, Jacob Williams, and Knight; he was out in pursuit of Tories and in frequent skirmishes.

At the close of the Revolution, he moved to Rowan County, North Carolina, where he lived until

the year 1823, when he moved to Tipton County, Tennessee.

The soldier, Henry Yarborough, was allowed pension on his application executed September 4, 1833, then living in Tipton County, Tennessee. He at that time signed, Henry Yarborough, Senior.

There is no reference to wife or children.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, name and address of person paid, and possibly the date of death of this pensioner, you should apply to The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, Washington, D. C., and give the following data-

=ed all the Services required of us; Such as Scouting and
collecting provisions. While we were there Stationed and employed
it was that Col. Riegilly the Commanding Officer of the Bricks House
was taken by some of our forces and with him about two

hundred prisoners, who at once surrendered upon the exhibition of our false Logo painted and made to resemble Calamash. They were all marched into the Camp, and subsequently marched northwardly under the command of Capt. Williams. After Williams left us with the prisoners we hoped under the command of a Captain of horse whom name I cannot now recollect, but he was attacked by General Morgan's command. There were also there Col. Washington's Genl. Green's Dragoon and several others, down of whom perhaps had no certain record at that time. He been Genl. Greene was our command for in check. I was a Troop employed the whole two months in the fortification war against the Tories, having prepared Kerns with them and some times pretty sharp fighting. I was this young and being private ~~with~~ the associates of the Tories down lord upon them, showing the women and children. Capt. Williams and Genl. = Genl. Ely's militia's command on these occasions. We were marched from the six mile creek north to Charlotteville proper = Storia and then encamped by General Morgan, who gave me a written discharge. I continued nevertheless for several years to carry on the provision war against the Tories, who were so engaged against me this I could not stay at home in safety and who did me much damage. I could relate much of the behaviour of the King's ~~with~~ in the last part of 1760 & certain I should not think of necessary in which I have been promoted engaged. Judge Mearns of N. C. when about to visit the King of this State I sent a man to me requesting a detailed account of this war he being I could furnish a more correct history of than many than any other man he has seen. I was however upon the eve of moving to this country, and am weary of had no time then to care to speak matters. I was born in the year 1761 or 2 in what was then called Bute but now Franklin County's spot received or about the commencement of the Revolution was my father moved up to Randolph County where we were living. I was not contented as a private soldier in the home as others were. It about the close of the war we moved up to Rowan County N. C. where there are many persons by whom I could procure my service. In the year 1823. I moved to this Lytle County

Thompson and have visited here ever since. I was once told that
if I would send my discharge to Capt. Matthews of No. 8th Street
I would pay. I gave it to a man by the name of Beaumont. When
he returned from Capt. Matthews' he informed me that Matthews
said he had nothing to do with it. That Capt. Fisher the man
under whom I volunteered used to make out our pay roll. That
I demanded my discharge Beaumont said he had fallen out
of the Army and that his papers were all the papers. I said
that he had lied. I was unable to reclaim it and have never
received one cent for my Service ever ordered by me for the U.S.

REGULATIONS UNDER THE ACT OF JUNE 7, 1832.

The following regulations have been adopted:

This law has been construed to extend, as well to the line, as to every branch of the Staff of the Army, and to include under the terms "Continental Line," "State troops," "militia," and "volunteers," all persons enlisted, drafted, or who volunteered and who were bound to military service, but not those who were occasionally employed with the army upon civil contracts, such as Clerks to Commissaries and to Store Keepers, &c., Teamsters, Boatmen, &c. Persons who served on board of private armed vessels are also excluded from the benefits of the law, as well as persons who turned out as patrols, or were engaged in guarding particular places at night, and were not recognized as being in actual military service.

Four general classes of cases are embraced in this law:

1. The Regular Troops.
2. The State Troops, Militia, and Volunteers.
3. Persons employed in the Naval Service.
4. Indian Spies.

As rolls of the regular troops in the Revolutionary War exist in this Department, all persons claiming the benefit of this law as officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians or privates, will, in the first instance, make application by transmitting the following declaration, which will be made before a Court of Record of the County where such applicant resides. And every Court having by law a seal and Clerk is considered a Court of Record.

Every applicant will produce the best proof in his power. This is the original discharge or commission; but if neither of these can be obtained, the party will so state under oath, and will then procure, if possible, the testimony of at least one credible witness, stating in detail his personal knowledge of the services of the applicant, and such circumstances connected therewith, as may have a tendency to throw light upon the transaction.

If such surviving witness cannot be found, the applicant will so state in his declaration, (l) and he will also, whether he produce such evidence or not, proceed to relate all the material facts, which can be useful in the investigation of his claim, and in the comparison of his narrative with the events of the period of his

alleged service, as they are known at the Department. A very full account of the services of each person will be indispensable to a favorable action upon his case. The facts stated will afford one of the principal means of corroborating the declaration of the applicant, if true, or of detecting the imposition, if one be attempted; and unless, therefore, these are amply and clearly set forth, no favorable decision can be expected. All applicants will appear before some Court of Record in the County in which they reside, and there subscribe and be sworn to, one of the declarations above provided, according to the nature of his case.

The Court will propound the following (*m*) interrogatories to all applicants for a pension, on account of service in the Militia, State troops, or Volunteers, except the Militia of New Hampshire and the State troops of Virginia.

1. Where and in what year were you born?
2. Have you any record of your age, and if so, where is it?
3. Where were you living when called into service; where have you lived since the Revolutionary war, and where do you now live?
4. How were you called into service; were you drafted, did you volunteer, or were you a substitute? And if a substitute, for whom?
5. State the names of some of the Regular Officers, who were with the troops, where you served; such Continental and Militia Regiments as you can recollect, and the general circumstances of your services.

6.

{	<i>To a Soldier.</i>	{	Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given, and what has become of it?
{	<i>To an Officer.</i>	{	Did you ever receive a commission, and if so, by whom was it signed, and what has become of it?

7. State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood, and who can testify as to your character for veracity, and their belief of your services as a soldier of the Revolution.

The Court will see that the answers to these questions are embodied in the declaration, and they are requested to annex their opinions of the truth of the statement of the applicant.

The applicant will further produce in Court, if the same can be done, in the opinion of the Court, without too much expense and inconvenience to him, two respectable persons—one of whom should be the nearest clergyman, if one lives in the immediate vicinity of such applicant, who can testify, from their acquaintance with him, that they believe he is of the age he represents, and that he is reputed and believed in the neighborhood to have been a Revolutionary soldier, and that they concur in that opinion. If one of these persons is a Clergyman, the Court will so certify, and they will also certify to the character and standing of other persons giving such certificates.

The traditinary evidence of service is deemed very important, in the absence of any direct proof, except the declaration of the party. And the Courts are requested to be very particular in the inquiry whether the belief is general, and whether any doubts have ever existed upon the subject.

Applicants unable to appear in Court, by reason of bodily infirmity, may make the declaration before required, and submit to the examination, before a Judge or Justice of a Court of Record of the proper county, and the Judge or Justice will execute the duties, which the Court is herein requested to perform, and will also certify that the applicant cannot, from bodily infirmity, attend the Court.

Whenever any official act is required to be done by a Judge or Justice of a Court of Record, or by a Justice of the Peace, the certificate of the Secretary of State or Territory, or of the proper Clerk of the Court or County, under his seal of office, will be annexed, stating that such person is a Judge or Justice of a Court of Record, or a Justice of the Peace, and that the signature annexed is his genuine signature.

No payments can be made on account of the services of any person, who may have died before the taking effect of the act of June 7, 1832; and in case of death subsequent thereto, and before the declaration herein required is made, the parties interested will transmit such evidence as they can procure, taken and authenticated before a Court of Record, showing the services of the deceased, the period of his death, the opinion of the neighborhood respecting such services, the title of the claimant, and the opinion of the Court upon the whole matter.

[a] The declarant must appear in open Court, unless prevented from doing so by reason of bodily infirmity; in which case the declarant will follow the rule laid down for his guidance.

[b] The declarant must make his declaration in the county where he resides. [Who should fail to do so, he must assign a sufficient reason for not conforming to the rule.

[c] The age of the claimant must invariably be mentioned.

[d] The declarant must mention the period or periods of the war when he served.

[e] Every continental officer or soldier must give the name of the Colonel under whom he served; otherwise a satisfactory examination of the claim cannot be had. Every claimant must state, with precision, the length of his service, and the different grades in which he served, in language so definite as to enable the Department to determine to what amount of pension he is entitled. In a case where the applicant cannot, by reason of the loss of memory, state precisely how long he served, he should amend his declaration by making an affidavit in the following words:

"Personally appeared before me, the undersigned, a Justice of the Peace, &c. A. B. who, being duly sworn, depose and say, that, by reason of old age, and the consequent loss of memory, he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his service; but, according to the best of his recollection, he served not less than the periods mentioned below, and in the following grades:—For _____ year _____ months, and _____ days, I served as a _____ For _____ months and _____ days, I served as a _____; and for such service I claim a pension."

It is important, in all cases, to determine with precision the period for which each applicant served, and the particular rank he held, as the law directs the pension to be paid according to the grade of the pensioner and the length of his service. The use of the phrase *about three or four months*, is too indefinite, and all such qualifying expressions are objectionable. Some persons who apply for pensions merely state that they served two years in the militia, &c. without specifying the tours, the names of the officers, and other particulars respecting their service. This form of a declaration is highly objectionable. It must, in every case, be clearly shown under what officers the applicant served; the duration of each term of engagement; the particular place or places where the service was performed; that the applicant served with an embodied corps called into service by competent authority; that he was either in the field or in garrison; and for the time during which the service was performed, he was not employed in any civil pursuit.

[f] The law makes the relinquishment indispensable.

[g] The opinion of the Court is always required.

[h] The Clerk must give his certificate in every case.

[i] The Clerk must fix his seal, and if it has no device or inscription by which it can be distinguished from any other seal, or if he has no public seal of office, the certificate of a Member of Congress, proving the official character and signature of the certifying officer, should accompany the papers.

Mode of authenticating papers.

In every instance where the certificate of the certifying officer who authenticates the papers is not written on the same sheet of paper which contains the affidavit, or other papers authenticated, the certificate must be attached thereto by a piece of tape or narrow ribbon, the ends of which must pass under the seal of office of the certifying officer, so as to prevent any paper from being improperly attached to the certificate.

Proof of Service.

[j] In a case where the name of the applicant is not found on the records of the Department, he must prove his service by two credible witnesses who are required to set forth in their affidavits the time of the claimant's entering the service, and the time and manner of his leaving the same, as well as the regiment, company, and line to which he belonged. The magistrate who may administer the oaths must certify to the credibility of the witnesses, and the official character and signature of the magistrate must be certified by the proper officer, under his seal of office.

[k] The notes from [a] to [i] are all equally applicable to the cases of Militia men, Volunteers and State Troops. The proof required by rule in note [j] applies to continental troops only.

[l] This traditinary evidence is indispensable in militia cases.

[m] If a witness cannot be found, the declarant must state the fact.

[n] The answers to the interrogatories must all be written, and sent to the War Department, with the declaration.

The data furnished herein are obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, W.4870, based upon the military service of Nathan Yarborough in that war.

Nathan Yarborough (the name also appears as Yarborough and Yarbrough) was born April 14, 1750, in Duplin County, state not given.

While residing in Chatham County, North Carolina, he enlisted in December, 1779, served as a private in Captain James Herndon's Company, Colonel James Hinton's North Carolina Regiment and was discharged March 24, 1780; he enlisted about the first of December, 1780, served as a private in Captain Etheldred Jones' Company, Colonel Farmer's North Carolina Regiment, and also in Captain Nichols' North Carolina Company, was in the battles of Guilford, Camden and at the siege of Ninety Six and was discharged the latter part of June, 1781.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 5, 1833, while residing in Chatham County, North Carolina.

He died January 4, 1834.

The soldier married September 7, 1790, Mary, her maiden name not given.

Soldier's widow, Mary, was allowed pension on her application executed August 6, 1841, at which time she was aged eighty-one years and resided in Chatham County, North Carolina. In 1848, she stated that she was aged eighty-six years.

She died March 8, 1854.

In 1841, Jeremiah Yarbrough, made affidavit in Chatham County, North Carolina, and stated that he was then seventy-one years of age and was the youngest brother of Nathan Yarbrough. There is no claim for pension on file in this office on account of the services of Benjamin Yarbrough.

oath states that Nathan Garbergh was a man grown before
the Revolution broke out that his father had given him off
a part of his Land and Nathan had built his father a
workshop to himself on his own place that she reared and
made his Clothes and she further states that Nathan was
Drafted to go into the army for a three months term
and as he understood he went to the South that she Recalled
he went and stayed his term out and returned home in
the Spring in time to make a Crop and she further
upon her oath states that the next fall about the time
he finished gathering his Crop he was Drafted for three
months to go to the South again that her Brother Kings
was also Drafted and went into the Service at the same
time and the Deponent further says that Nathan
went off into the Service and had been gone some time
but very unexpectedly come home and informed her
that he had been in South Carolina but must then
come back that the British was in Chas after this
and that after the army had crossed the Catawba River
that Nathan Garbergh informed them that his
Company was stationed at the ford to keep the British
from crossing as long as they could but that Gen
Davidson had been killed and the men beaten or
killed and she further says that Nathan told her
that his Captain and a part of his men started

to overtake the army and were overtaken by the British
Light Horse in a Long Lane and that they had to make
their Escape the Best way they could or be killed or made
prisoners and that Nathan could not give any account
what had become of Benjamin his Brother And the
Deponent further saith that Seth Carter returned with Nathan
and stated the same that Nathan stated And the Deponent
further saith in a few days after Nathan Come home
his Brother Benjamin also Come home and informed
them that he and Captain Soms and a considerable Number
of the men had overtaken the army and marched with
them to Guilford Court House that he was sent home
from there to Collect all the Chatham men that had come
home and Capt Soms had gone to work to Collect the
Waker men and that he was to meet Capt Soms on New
River with the men And the Deponent further saith
that Nathan and Benjamin Collect the men and
while they were engaged in that she was herself engaged
in preparing them Cloathing ready against they
started and she further saith that in a short time
they returned from Collecting the men and took their
Knapsacks and started and she never expected to see either of
them again as Cornwall was then in the Country there was
a great alarm and the Deponent further saith that she
heard no more of Nathan after he left home the last time
as she Recollects until General Green Marched to Ramsays
Mills which was within four miles of her fathers when Nathan
Come home and she and the Rest of the family thought he
had been gone over three months he had Come home to
stay But Nathan informed them that he was not yet
discharged And the Deponent further saith that General
Green and the army Lay at Ramsays Mills several days that
her father went to let Nathan discharged But informed them
when he Come home that the officers did not seem willing
to give him up that he was called the strongest and most

active man in his Regiment and a good soldier and that Nathan
said the times were so troublesome that he had rather be in
the army than at home and that he was going with General Grant

to her to wash and do up his cloaths for him against the time he had
to march and either bring or send them by his father and she
further sayth that she prepar'd his cloaths that her father made
Nathan a pair of shoes and that she and her father both
went to carry his cloaths and shoes the day the army marched

and this Deponal further sayth that when Nathan left them
at Ramsey's mills he told them if he ever got back it would

the following Declaration in order to obtain the Benefit

attached to South Carolina that he was commanded by Col James
Wenton in General Dillingtons Brigade that he served his term

appear by his discharge which is herewith annexed
and He further states upon his oath that he was again
Drafted and entered the Service ^{as a private} in the month of September
1780 that he was Drafted in Chatham County that he
had orders to go to Hillsborough that the Chatham Troops
met at Hillsborough but for some cause which he does not
now Recall at they had no officers that the small party was
encamped in Hillsborough and that Capt Childred Jones who com-
manded the Troops from Wake County was stationed at that
distance and in the Country to keep clear of the small party

while they had orders to march to South Carolina that
their officers failed to come on and that they had the

Nearly or quite two full Companies in number and he
further states that in the afternoon of Before Morgan and
Green attacked from the Catawba Capt Jones took his men
was ordered to go on an Island at the River at these
ford and guard the passage and prevent the British from
crossing if they should attempt it during the night that he
went in upon the Island and kept their station during the
night without any knowledge that the main body of the
Army was going to march off during the night that the
next morning as soon as daylight appeared a heavy fire
commenced between the British and the men stationed at
a ford three miles below. That Capt Jones very soon had
orders to quit his station and march out of the Island
and when they marched and the Army was gone and
Capt Jarman informed them that General Davidson
who commanded below was killed and his men defeated
or dispersed that the British had crossed the River and
were about to surround them and gave orders for them
to disperse and every man take care of himself and
he further states that it created great confusion but
that Capt Jones who was a brave man tried to rally
his men and retreat in order that a considerable part
of the men rallied and they took up the line of
march after the main Army and he further states
that they marched about four or five miles when they
were pursued by a large number of British Light
Horse and were overtaken and that they had to
surrender by flight into the woods that some were killed
and that he himself escaped with Seth Cotton who
was the only one of the Company he saw after was
sent home by the British that he was at a loss what to do
believing that the British had got between them and
the main Army they were afraid to follow any further
so they went home and he further states that he had
a Brother at the same time in the States named Benge
who he was apprehensive was killed and he further states
that a few days after he and Seth Cotton got home
that his Brother Benjamin also came home and informed
him that himself and Capt Jones and some of the men
succeeded in overtaking the Army and that he had orders
to collect the men again who had come home in that
and that Capt Jones had gone to wait to get the

Wade man who has got home and that they as soon as they
could be collected had orders to meet on Haw River and he further
states that he assisted in collecting the scattered men and they met
Capt. Louns on Haw River as soon as they possibly could be collected
and from Haw River they immediately set out and marched
to Dan River where they found General Green and he further
states that when they got to Dan River General Green had the
Companies regularly organized and that the Chatham men
were taken from Louns Company and put under the command
of a Capt. Stedley as well as he recollects and he further
states that from Dan River he marched under General
Green to Guilford that he was in the Battle of Guilford
and he further states that from there he marched with Green
to Ramsey's Mills that there he thought his Term of Service
would expire. But as he had been Drafted for a three
months Term of Service to be performed in South Carolina
it was insisted that that service had not been performed and
the terms were so troublesome that he felt more safe in
the service then he did at home he states that he consented
to go with Green to South Carolina and serve at a
Law rather than exist to be discharged and he
further states that from Ramsey's Mills he marched
under General Green to Camden in South Carolina
that there they had a hard Battle in which he
was engaged he thinks in the Statist of it that they
they were Beaten there and from there they were marched
to Ninety Six then they changed the post and spent some
time in Battering the British works at Fort Green
and took it by storm. But that they were again
Beaten with considerable Loss that from Ninety
Six Green marched toward North Carolina again
But on the march his term expired and he was
Honourably discharged and highly Complimented by
General Green for the faithful manner that he had performed
his Duty and he further states that while on his way home
from South Carolina that the weather set in very wet
so that he was for several days Drunked with
constant Rains so that his death on him and the

Contents of his Knapsack were lost and as it was very warm
Weather every thing in his Knapsack mildew'd or Rotten he
says he got home and he further states that he put his
discharge into his Knapsack as the safest place he had
But when he got home it was entirely destroyed by the
Wet and Mildew and he further states that he was
Discharged in the latter part of June 1781 But by whom
his discharge was signed he does not recollect and he
further states that his Last Tour of Service commenced
the first of December in 1780 and terminated the latter
End of June 1781 and he further states that he was in
actual Service the Last something more than six months
But how many days or weeks he cannot say but that
he can with safety positively say that he served six
months in the Last Tour and that he served more
months in the whole and he further says that he
has no Documentary evidence whereby he can prove

I Richard F. Garbrough of the County of Franklin & State of North Carolina do make & publish this my last Will & Testament in manner & form following, that is to say.

First that my Executors hereinafter named shall pay out of the first money that comes into their hands as a part of my Estate, my debts that I may owe.

Item I give and devise to my Wife Elizabeth & give her the following property, viz. all my House hold & Kitchen Furniture, my ^{new} Carriage & Harness, Wagon & Gear, pair of Carriage Horses, Two choice Milch Cows & Calves and the following Negro Slaves, A Moby & Aaron & his Wife, Milly, my Carriage driver Guckson, woman Seller & her two Children Bill & Charles. The whole property to be valued at fair prices by two or more discreet and disinterested persons, I also give her One Thousand Dollars in Cash to be paid to her by my Executors as soon as sufficient funds come to hand. I also lend her during her life or widowhood my dwelling House & Lot with the exception of the corner Red House & Lot, which latter I wish rented out for the benefit of my Children as hereinafter provided for. I wish my Executors also to allow my Wife one Year's Support for her & such of her Children as may remain with her, and should my Wife at any time hereafter wish to leave Louisburg or break up House Keeping, my Executors are authorized to sell my House & Lot if they think it advisable together with the corner Red House

& Lot (or separately) to the best advantage either
at public or private sales and pay over annually
to my wife the Interest that may accrue on the
proceeds of the Sale during her life or widowhood
deducting the value of the Corner House ^{& Lot} of sold
together, I also wish my wife allowed after
the first year the same board for such of
my Children as may remain with her, as other
boarding House, Charge

Item I give to my son James H. Yarbrough
one Negro Boy named Jack

Item I give to my Daughter Mary M.
one Mulatto Girl named Olivia and any increase
she may have after the date of this Will.

Item I give to my Son Richard H.
one Negro Boy ^{by the name of} Willard & my Gold
Watch, Also to my Son John Brown one
Negro Boy named Henry and to my Son William
Henry one Negro Boy named Robert, I also
give to my little Daughter Adella Fanny one Negro
Girl named Catherine (daughter of Amy & July.)

All the rest of my property both Real & personal
not otherwise disposed of or provided for I wish
my Executors to sell to best advantage either pub-
licly or privately, unless there should be some of
the Negroes that my Children may wish to retain
& in that case my Executors may permit them
to do so at a fair valuation, if agreeable to the other
Children, My Slave Woman Sarah may be permitted
to take care of her Mother and hold to no other service
except to support herself & Mother during the life of the
latter & at her death I wish ^{Sarah} allowed the privilege of
selecting from amongst my Children a Master or Mistress
for life and no charge is to be made by my Executors

On her account provided she is accepted as a gratuity,
my ^{new} man Eaton now in the possession of Mr. Dea Ray
of Haystackville, I wish to have the privilege of
selecting some person to buy him so as not to separate
him from his wife, and I wish my Executors to pay him
out of the proceeds of his sale the sum of Fifty five
Dollars as a reward for his fidelity. - At my death
I wish an Inventory carefully taken of all the
effects of my present firm of Richard H. Garbong
& Co and ^{my} partner William H. Strother will then go on
to wind up & settle the business of the concern according
to agreement, that is to say after paying all the debts
of the concern & settling the accounts of the respective
Partners, whatever there may be left as profit or have
been made is to be divided in the following manner
viz One third is to belong to William H. Strother
and Two thirds to my Estate or to my Executors.
As soon as my Executors are prepared to settle up
my Estate or at the end of Ten Years provided
Guardians are appointed for my children, I wish my Estate
divided as hereinafter directed, viz I give to my
Executors the sum of Five Thousand Dollars in Trust
for the sole, separate and exclusive use of my Daughter
Josephine A. Perry during her natural life, and free
from the control authority or power of her present Husband
and at her death to be given absolutely to her children
that may survive her, the issue of a deceased child
to stand in the place of his or her parent, and if
my said Daughter should die without leaving a
child or children or the issue of such, then I wish
the money or whatever else may be held in place
of it to be equally divided between her living
Brothers & Sisters, In the mean time I wish my
Executors to hold or keep at Interest the principal sum

Of Five Thousand Dollars so as to pay over to my
Daughter Annally the Interest or permit her to use
only that sum annually, and I wish that to paid
as to insure to her the use & benefits of it. If at any
time however my Daughter should want or wish of the
money used in a Slave or servant for her own use,
my Executors are at liberty to do so, to be held or
kept however for the use & interests of this Trust
& no other. All the balance of my property I wish
divided between my other six Children & Wife, to wit
James, Mary, Richard, John, William and Adella
Fanny, and as follows viz making the share of my
Wife & the six last named Children equal so far as
the personal property is concerned, viz value all the
property given to my Wife including the Thousand Dollars
& value the Negroes given to the Children also my
real estate I wish divided equally between my
six last named Children, and my House & Lot
or the proceeds of it I wish divided in same manner
at the death or second marriage of my Wife.

In making division of my Negroes it will ^{no} doubt be to
the interest of my Children, that some of them should
be sold, such for instance as are not faithful or not
likely to render my Children much service. Whatever
the cause may be however that renders it necessary
to sell I would prefer that my Executors should give
them an opportunity to select purchasers provided they
can do so at fair prices and in all such cases
they are authorized to sell privately.

Reposing full confidence in ^{my} Nephew
A. S. Jeffreys & my Son James St. Garbrough I
appoint them my Executors to carry into effect this my
last Will & Testament and as a compensation
for their trouble, I allow them Five Hundred

Dollars each & should only one qualify I allow
him the whole sum, say One Thousand Dollars,
and as I am but little money I would prefer that
my Executors, should only collect my funds as they
become necessary to pay demands, and hold the
balance of my estate in good Bonds at Interest,
should my estate, or any part of it however be kept
together longer than would otherwise be necessary
(for want of Guardians or any other cause) I wish
my Executors to be allowed for their care and attention
to the same five percent per Annum on the
net income, and five percent on the disbursements
that may become necessary for the support and
education of my children.

And by revoking & making
void all other Wills made by me, In
Testimony, whereof I have unto set my
hand and seal this 3rd day of April
A. D. 1857.


