Ordnance Depot and was responsible for the progressive improvement of that establishment. It was on this assignment in Hawaii that he developed the heart condition which led ultimately to his death. He requested an eight-months extension of his foreign service tour which carried him through February 28, 1936, the date of his retirement. He was retired from active service for physical disability on February 29, 1936 at the age of 60 years. He sailed from Honolulu on February 3, 1936 and reported poon his arrival in San Francisco to letterman General Hospital for observation and treatment. He established his residence at 122 Palm Avenue, San Francisco, where he spent the rest of his life.

For excellent service throughout the Spanish American War campaign and for coolness and gallantry in action in the engagement at Asomanto Mountain, near Aibonito, Puerto Rico, on August 12, 1898, Colonel O'Hern (then Second Lieutenant) was recommended for Brevet First Lieutenant in

the United States Army.

During World War I, Colonel O'Hern successfully solved many difficult problems having to do with the manning and operation of the Ammunition Depots and with the establishment of Ordnance supply and repair depots in the zone of operations of the Army. For his service, he was awarded the Victory Medal with four battle clasps for service in Meuse-Argonne, St. Mihiel, Aisne-Marne, and in a quiet sector. The President of the French Republic conferred upon him the decoration of Officer of the Order of the Black Star (Officier de L'Etoile Noire).

Colonel O'Hern became an active citizen of his adopted State of California. He was President of the Northern California Chamber of Commerce, which was an association of all the Chambers of Commerce in the Northern part of the State. This was perhaps the only instance where an Army Officer was afforded similar recognition

Colonel O'Hern was zealously interested in building up Benicia Arsenal and made many improvements during his stay there. He made a favorable impression from first acquaintance and affiliated successfully with civilian men of affairs in the vicinity of his station.

He did much to popularize the army in California and spent many illustrious years as a Corps Area Ordnance Officer, as is evidenced by the high efficiency ratings given him by superior officers in both the First and Ninth Corps Areas.

His career as one of the best known and most popular officers in the Ordnance Department came to an end on November 15, 1945 when he died in the Army Service Forces Regulating Station Hospital, Oakland, California, of an aortic insufficiency. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Gertrude O'Hern, and three children, First Lieutenant Edward P. O'Hern, Jr., Chaplain, O.R.C., Mrs. Mary Ransom O'Hern Wynkoop, and Mrs. Katharine Ransom O'Hern Hunt. Colonel O'Hern left a record in the War Department which shows that he served with

the time of his graduation from the United States Military Academy in June 1894, to the date of his retirement, February 1936. He was admired as a true friend and respected as an outstanding officer by all who knew him. His long and distinguished service is a brilliant chapter in the applies of the Ordnance Department.

Died September 11, 1945, at Cambridge, Massachusetts, aged 75 years.

Col. Thales Lucius Ames., U.S.A., Ret., (U.S.M.A. '95) died in Cambridge, Mass., September 11th, 1945, after a long illness.

Before attempting a final tribute to Ames, it will be helpful to give a brief summary of his ancestry, early life, cadet days and army service.



Ancestry:

Tradition has it, the first Ames landed in England from France at the time of William the Conqueror (1066). The name then was Ami (friend).

The family soon established their home at Bruton in Somersetshire, where they remained for several centuries. Col. and Mrs. Ames found in the Bruton Parish Church record an entry to the effect that "John and William Ames had sailed for the colonies in 1635".

These two brothers were the emigrant generation of that branch from which Thales Ames descended. The descendants of these emigrants, somewhere along the line, intermarried with the descendants of five of the Mayflower passengers, among whom were Francis Cook, John and Priscilla Alden and her parents; thus Ames was a descendant of five of the Mayflower passengers.

The family continued to reside in Massachusetts, where in 1706 Captain Thomas Ames married Mary Hayward and settled in West Bridgewater. Here the next five generations of the T. L. Ames branch were born. Among the five generations born at West Bridgewater was T. L. Ames' grandfather, Franklin Ames (1799-1882), who in

1821 married Polly Keith of pure Scottish descent. Her ancestors had likewise come to the colonies in the early days. One of Polly Keith's direct ancestors was Lucius Cary, later Viscount Falkland, who was killed in action against Cromwell and to whose memory a statue now stands in the House of Lords.

The name Lucius appears in one of Polly Keith's sons as well as in two of her grandsons, Lucius Holbrook ('96) and Thales Lucius Ames ('95). This couple had 11 children, one of whom was Ames' father, James Furnam Ames (1832-1898). Ames' grandmother, Polly Keith, was one of those early pioneer women who were towers of strength in helping to subdue the wilderness while successfully rearing large families. Of necessity they dealt with fundamentals and were not turned aside by unimportant, unessential details, with the result that they left their imprint on their posterity for many generations. To such women America owes more than will ever be realized.

In 1850, at the age of 18, Ames' father migrated to Dunn County, Wisconsin. He secured sufficient land for a farm, most of it heavily timbered. The trees were felled and shipped down a nearby river to the only mill in the vicinity, where they were sawed into lumber and dried. From this lumber James Furnam Ames built his house in the wilderness. In 1853-54 Ames' grandparents and many of his uncles and aunts joined his father in Dunn County. Ames' grandmother and grandfather continued to reside on the new farm until their deaths in 1872 and 1882, respectively.

In 1855 James Furnam Ames married Mary Kirk, also of pure Scottish descent, whose ancestors had migrated from Scotland in the early days and settled at Hummingford, Quebec Province, Canada, moving later to Dunn County, where James Furnam Ames married their daughter, Mary. James and Mary Ames had 13 children, eight of whom reached maturity. Among these eight, T. L. Ames was the fifth, born on the farm September 19th, 1869. Early Life:

Early Life:

A Wisconsin farm in those early days which had to produce sufficient crops to sustain 10 or 12 persons required that every available child in the household should begin to work just as soon as the child was able to do so; thus T. L. Ames learned to know hard labor for long hours at an early age.

There not being much cash in the household, Ames began to do his bit in this direction and commenced teaching in the Dunn County Grammar School at the age of 19. It is said that Ames displayed a remarkable aptitude for the profession of teaching, which he had previously selected for his tuture life's work. However, a cousin, Willard Ames Holbrook (U.S.M.A. '85), on leave, visiting his parents on their nearby farm, persuaded Ames to try for the then existing West Point vacancy in that district. This Ames did, and being successful, entered the Academy June 17th, 1891. He would have been over the maximum age limit on the 19th of the following September. Ames was baptized in his father's faith (Baptist) but later became a

mmunicant of the Episcopalian hurch (the faith of his mother and of his wife). He served as a vestryman in the "Manila Cathedral" during his service in the Philippine Islands. Ames received his education at the Dunn County Grammar and High School, and from the latter he entered West Point.

Cadet Days:

Ames' career at West Point was marked by slow but very steady progress in every phase of cadet life in which he participated. On the academic side, he stood 35 in the yearling class of 59, but graduation found him standing 11 in a class of 52.

In the military phase of his cadet life, Ames was not even made a corporal in his yearling year, but he was First Captain of the Corps his en-

tire senior year.

The writer doubts that Ames ever had put on a football uniform prior to his entrance into the Academy. Notwithstanding that, he was substitute first team center early in his first season and was permanent first team center during all three remaining seasons. In two of these last three seasons, Pop Corbin (Yale graduate center coach) placed Ames at center on the "All American Team".

Ames possessed a wonderfully well developed body. He stood 6' 2", weighing 184 pounds. He was speedy and possessed excellent muscular coordination. Ames was one of the few centers of his time who was fast enough to get down the field on a West Point punt in time to tackle and down the

receiver.

Army Service:

This is best told in Ames' own words:

"From June 12th, 1895 to January, 1933, served in and promoted through every grade from Second Lieutenant to Colonel, retiring September 30th. 1933. Service consisted of: Two years Coast Artillery; 1½ years Instructor of Mathematics, U.S.M.A.; transferred to Ordnance; 31/2 years Rock Island Arsenal, the last 2 years of which was in charge of Small Arms Manufacture; 2 years at California Powder Works, and Benecia Arsenal; 2 years at Sandy Hook Proving Ground; 3 years at Manila Ordnance Depot, P. I.; 4 months in France, World War I: 31/2 years in command of Springfield Arsenal; 2 years Ammunition Division, Office of Chief of Ordnance, Washington, D. C .: 5% years in Finance and Property Division, same office; 7 months Supply Division, World War I; 8 months Acting Chairman and Chairman, Ordnance Claims Board; 3 years office of Assistant Secretary of War and War College; 714 years Chief Ordnance Officer, First and Second Corps Areas.

While on duty at Rock Island Arsenal, Ames married Margaretta Kelton, daughter of the former Adjutant General of the Army, John C. Kelton. The ceremony took place in St. Margaret's Church, Washington, D. C. on June 28th, 1899. They had one child, Adelaide, born June 3rd, 1900 at Rock Island Arsenal. She graduated summa cum laude and Phi Betta Kappa in 1922 from Vassar. Adelaide became quite a distinguished astronomer, being well known for her work on "External Galaxies Brighter Than The

Thirteenth Magnitude". The results of her work were published after her death which occurred June 26th, 1932 on Lake Asquam, New Hampshire, by drowning.

Thales and Margaretta Ames were ideally suited to each other, both from their intellectual attainments as well as from their similarity in character and temperament. The death of their only child in the prime of life and with such a brilliant future was a crushing blow to both, but as all who knew them would have expected, they continued to carry on as usual.

After retirement in 1933, Colonel and Mrs. Ames took up residence at 33 Concord Avenue, Cambridge, where Mrs. Ames continues to reside.

An appraisal of Ames will always center around his strength of character. He possessed Spartan-like self control. He quietly but rigidly adhered to his own ethical standards under any and all conditions and yet was possessed of a kindly tolerance for the foibles of others.

The writer cannot conceive of Ames ever allowing himself to be placed in a position where he would be forced to ask help from anyone; his foresight and judgment were too sound ever to allow such a situation to arise. or, to use a common rural American phrase, Ames always "rolled his own hoop".

On the other hand, the writer never knew any man who more accurately answered the description of a certain English gentleman, to wit.: "A tall man helping somebody".

Ames was always quietly and without ostentation going to the assistance of someone in need or distress. It would have been impossible for him knowingly to do any person an injustice, but if unknowingly he ever did so, he would have rectified it the instant he became aware of his error.

The writer, whose association with Ames was quite infimate over the years, never saw Ames lose his temper. His self control under the most trying circumstances was most remarkable.

However, an act of cruelty, if flagrant, unjust or deliberate, would arouse in Ames an intense but quiet indignation, and when Ames' indignation was really aroused, "things began to happen". This can be vouched for by the few of his opposing football centers who deliberately violated the rules of clean sport in football. Under the impulse of intense indignation, Ames seems to have become possessed of superhuman strength, but having chastised the offending center, Ames would resume his usual calm demeanor.

One of the remarkable things regarding Ames with respect to his association with the U.S. Corps of Cadets and its traditions was the fact that it had practically no effect on his character, the essential ethical principles of which were fully and soundly developed when he entered West Point. The U.S. Corps of Cadets, with its traditions, is the character making body at West Point, as contrasted with the "academic" side. It is most unusual for any cadet to be unaffected by the Corps' traditions, but Ames was one such cadet.

A glance at his ancestry and the events of his early life reveal the rea-

son for this early maturing of his character: (a) Hard work with long hours; (b) absence of wealth and leisure; (c) nine centuries of tradition of the "House of Ames" whose family motto is "Non Sibi (not for self); (d) and lastly the influence of his mother, Mary Kirk Ames. She won and continued to hold the love, trust and admiration of all her children as long as she lived. A woman of staunch Christian principles, the mother of a large family (13), she left to her descendants the priceless tradition of a love of truth and honor. All these influences combined to mature Ames at an early age and planted in him a sound, kindly and at the same time strong character. In the death of Ames, the class of '95 has lost its finest character as well as the man most beloved, most admired and most esteemed by each one of its members. No greater tribute could be paid memory.

One of the few remaining pioneers of "lighter than air" aviation, Colonel Chalmers Gaither Hall, passed away on January 3, 1966. He was a fine soldier and a skillen engineer, gifted with a practical and progressive imagination. Active and cheerful, he left his home to dive for the Walter Reed Hospital whose he had an early morning appointment. Within a few minutes of his arrival wheat seizure brought to an end a fail and adventurous life dedicated to the service of his country.

Born in North Wilksboro, North Carolina, in 1875, the son of a Civil War Veteran, Chalmers, or Gaither, as he was affectionately called by was mechanically inclined family, from childhood. His aptitude in this respect took concrete form when, at the age of ten, he won first prize in a local competition for a house he had designed and built. He had a mechanically analytical mind and was constantly devising, designing and redesigning. He carried a screwdriver and pliers much as most men carry fountain pen or pencil. One of his inventions which he had patented, and concerning which he was most enthusiastic, was a particularly efficient type of piston ring. This he had incorporated in the engine of his own. car and achieved thereby a definite improvement in engine performance. Unfortunately his death came before he had completed arrangements for placing this device on the market.

His army career was a long and distinguished one which began at the age of seventeen when he left this light land Academy in North Carolina and entered the United States Initiary Academy, whence he gradual the class of 1897 with a Seco Light tenant's commission. The foreign


This is where we part company - speaking of ancestors. I am a descendant of NATHANIEL and your wife evidently claims THOMAS.

Dr. Eliot, in his biographical dictionary, deduces the late Hon. Fisher Ames' descent from the Rev. William Ames, son of the famous Dr. William Ames of England, author of "Medulla Theologiæ," and this is repeated in the preface to Fisher Ames' works; but the account here given of the family, drawn from authentic sources, renders this supposition altogether improbable. Besides, William Ames of Braintree, the ancestor of this family, was married about 1640, and died at Braintree 1654, whereas the Rev. William Ames, son of the Franequar Professor, and who came to N. 

We searched the Temple Records Index Bureau, Family Group Records Archives and International Genealogical Index to see if others have submitted information on your family. We are enclosing copies of the records we found in these files. The information enclosed represents research compiled by patrons. You may want to verify this information through original sources.

Our probate records only go to 1850. The All district index shows Bezer Ames estates was administered in 1861 (a bond, 1 inventory and 1 account of administration) file #12,042 in New Haven District.

The 1830 census index shows Beser Ames in Norfolk (none Suffolk County, p. 97, Dorchester. Perhaps Diane's birth records is in Milton or Dorchester or a new town. You should write to the town clerks. From the enclosed records you should be able to work out your lineage to Richard Ames or Bruton, England.

Enclosed is a list of private genealogists accredited by the Genealogical Department. If you would like their help, please write or phone them personally to explain your research needs.

We are pleased to learn of your interest in the records and services of the Genealogical Department. We hope you find our list of services helpful.

Since we do not provide detailed genealogical research we are enclosing some information which may assist you.

Counties or towns may have recorded birth, death, and marriage records before the state registered vital statistics. THE HANDY BOOK FOR GENEALOGISTS (Everton Publishers, Logan, Utah) is helpful for finding when a county was organized and when it began keeping vital records. The appropriate clerk, county seat, and zip codes are listed. The state office or the county clerk can help you learn if earlier records were kept in the towns.

To find a church record of your ancestor's birth, baptism, christening, marriage, or burial, write to the church where the event took place. The postmaster may forward your letter, or the local Chamber of Commerce may have addresses. Church, phone and city directories are also available at local libraries. A few helpful guides are: E. Kay Kirkham's A SURVEY OF AMERICAN CHURCH RECORDS (Logan, Utah: Everton Publishers, 1978) and A PRELIMINARY GUIDE TO THE CHURCH RECORDS REPOSITORIES, compiled by August R. Suelflow (St. Louis, Missouri: Society of American Archivist, 1969). These list the location of the regional repositories of various denominations.

Newspapers contain useful family information such as births, marriages, anniversaries, and obituaries. To search newspapers, an approximate date and place of the event are usually needed. Older newspapers are listed in Winifred Gregory's AMERICAN NEWSPAPERS, 1821-1936 and Clarence S. Brigham's HISTORY AND BIBLIOGRAPHY OF AMERICAN NEWSPAPERS, 1690-1821. AYER DIRECTORY OF PUBLICATIONS gives names and addresses of current newspapers. Many newspapers can be obtained from your local library on interlibrary loan. To order newspapers, consult NEWSPAPERS IN MICROFORM, UNITED STATES, published by the Library of Congress.

A great number of census indexes have been compiled by private publishers, especially for U.S. censuses available from 1790 through 1850. Most of the indexes are alphabetical listings of the heads of households in each state. As with any secondary source, researchers using a printed census index should be aware of the possibility of errors or omissions. Since the indexes are usually copyrighted, many are not available on microfilm in our collection. You can find advertisements for census searching in genealogical periodicals.

Libraries and historical and genealogical societies maintain special collections of regional material. Directories of these organizations are available at most libraries.

State, county, and town histories often contain accounts of families, churches, schools, etc. Marion J. Kaminkow's UNITED STATES LOCAL HISTORIES IN THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS lists many available histories. Libraries and historical societies near where your ancestor lived may have local histories. Our Library has a large collection of historical works.

Land and property records may contain genealogical information. Deed and mortgage records often name the place a person previously lived. They describe the land and its location and may give the names of family members. Land records are usually recorded at county offices. There are generally two indexes which list buyers and sellers. Both indexes should be searched. We have many land and property records in our collection.

Wills, quardianship records, and other probate records for your ancestors may be available. These are usually in the custody of the Probate Clerk in the county where the estate was probated. Our Library has these records from some counties, but seldom has the complete packets or case files.

We can search our three main indexes for your direct ancestors (those appearing on your pedigree chart and their children). The enclosed sample of our request (TOIR) form gives an explanation of the indexes. Please use the request form and include prepayment of \$1.00 per name. The old request forms can still be used if the search fee of \$1.00 is enclosed.

Enclosed is a list of private genealogists accredited by the Genealogical Department. If you would like their help, write or phone them personally explaining your research needs. We do not have a list of genealogists living in other localities, but accredited genealogists usually have outside contacts in their areas of specialization.

Many people have become interested in compiling and preserving the story of their families. The Genealogical Department Library welcomes family histories from all parts of the world. If you have a family history you would like to share with others we encourage you to type the material, include a name index, and list your sources of information. If you would like further information please contact our Acquisitions Department.

We hope this information will assist you, and we wish you success.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS AND RESEARCH SUGGESTIONS



GUIDE TO GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH (UNITED STATES)

Begin with yourself! Put your name on a pedigree chart. Add the names of your parents, grandparents, etc. Now record the birth, marriage, and death dates and places for each individual. See the sample pedigree chart below.

Your genealogical research should begin in family and home sources. These sources might include: family Bible, old letters, journals, scrapbooks, diaries, biographies, copies of vital records (birth, marriage and death), newspaper clippings, school records, military records, memorial or funeral cards, obituaries, deeds and land records, wills, etc. Correspondence with relatives may be needed to locate some of these records. You may be able to obtain information from family histories, family organizations, and local histories.

After locating your family records you will want to expand your research into other records of genealogical value. Many of these are available at the Genealogical Department Library and through our branch library system. You may also need to write or visit local courthouses, libraries, archives, and historical societies to locate these records. Be sure to make a record of the sources you search. The following may be helpful:

VITAL RECORDS - CIVIL (Birth, marriage, divorce, death)

To obtain available birth, marriage, divorce and death records write to the Department of Health at the state capitol or to the county courthouse.

Addresses are in "Where to Write" pamphlets available at many libraries and from the Superintendent of Documents, GPO, Washington, D.C. 20402.

<u>VITAL RECORDS - CHURCH</u> (Christening, marriage, burial, membership)

Write to the local congregation or to the denominational archives. Some directories are available at local libraries.

- <u>Federal</u> censuses were taken every 10 years from 1790. Film copies are available at the National Archives and at many libraries. State censuses were taken at varying intervals and may be available at state libraries and historical societies.
- PROBATE COURT RECORDS (Wills, administrations, petitions, etc.)
 Write to the Probate Court in the county.
- LAND AND PROPERTY RECORDS (Deeds, mortgages, grants, surveys)

 Write to the County Clerk or the Clerk of the Court at the county seat.
- MILITARY RECORDS (Service, pension, bounty land, etc.)

 Many records are kept at the National Archives. For information write to: National Archives (GSA), Washington, D.C. 20408
- EMIGRATION IMMIGRATION (Passenger and ship lists)

 The National Archives has the most complete set of U.S. passenger lists.
- NATURALIZATION (Declarations, petitions, etc.)

 For records before 1906 write to the County Clerk. After 1906, obtain a search request form at the nearest Federal Office Building.
- OTHER RECORDS (Tax, assessment, school, social and commercial, etc.)
- LIBRARIES SOCIETIES ARCHIVES (Public, historical, church, genealogical)
 The following books list these organizations and are available at most libraries: (1) AMERICAN LIBRARY DIRECTORY, (2) DIRECTORY, HISTORICAL SOCIETIES AND AGENCIES IN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA, (3) DIRECTORY OF SPECIAL LIBRARIES AND INFORMATION CENTERS, (4) DIRECTORY OF GENEALOGICAL SOCIETIES IN THE USA AND CANADA.

Dear Mr. Blauer

Your letter of 7-27-80 was in the huge mountain of mail that greeted us after a camping trip to New York and Pennsylvania last month. It has taken me some time to get through all that mail, while attempting to attend to many other matters as well. I deeply regret the delay.

As far as your Ames problem is concerned, I have found very little at this end and believe that proof of Diana C. Ames's parentage, if it exists, will probably be learned from Connecticut records. I am thinking that Bezar Ames may have left a will, or there may have been an administration of his estate. If he owned land in Connecticut, he may have deeded some to his children. All these types of records and more are in Hartford, and as I am planning another trip there soon for other clients, I shall dig into your problem as well.

At this end I did look up the birth certificate of Diana's daughter Ellen, since she was born in Massachusetts, but it does not show her mother's specific birthplace:

Massachusetts Vital Records (Boston), 90/192, Lynn, 1855, #1: ELLEN FRANCES BROCK, b. 1 Feb. 1855 in Lynn, female, F: Ephraim, carpenter, b. United States, M: Diana, b. United States, res. Lynn.

If you know of siblings of Ellen who may have been born in Massachusetts, please let me know and I shall likewise look for their birth records here, in hopes they may show something about Diana's birth-place. (I see the 1850 census shows that daughter Emeline A. Brock was born here, about 1847-8.) The 1855 census for Lynn might also help, although like the 1850 census, it only shows the state where a person was born. I take it there is no death certificate for Diana in Tennessee, showing her parents, or even just her birthplace.

The published vital records of New Haven fail to show the birth of Diana, as you know. The earliest record of the Bezar Ames family is the death of his child Abigail, 2 August 1836, aged 2. A son died 27 June 1841, aged 2, and another son died of cholera infantum on 23 July 1843, aged 4 months. The Ames family residence in 1843 was at the corner of Goffe and Speery Streets (Vital Records of New Haven 1649-1850 [Hartford, 1924], 2:707, 766, 791).

There may be some indication of Bezar Ames's Massachusetts residence

at the time of Diana's birth in the Norfolk County deeds, as Dorchester--now part of the city of Boston--was then in Norfolk County, as were Roxbury and other towns.

The Dorchester vital records have only been published to 1825, and later records are with the Boston City Registry, as are copies of the old church records. These are rather difficult to get at, but I have several things to check there and hope to do the searching soon.

I have not located a marriage record Bezar Ames and Lucy Goodnough. As you probably know, Lucy was the second of the name, for her parents, Ephraim and Elizabeth (Herring) Goodenow, had a daughter Lucy born 19 December 1797 (Roxbury vital records, 1:148) who died in 1799. Your Lucy's birth apparently went unrecorded.

As far as the Josselyn lineage is concerned, I would suggest you examine the wonderful Josselyn article in "Genealogical Research in England" in The New England Historical and Genealogical Register, volume 71 (1917), pages 19-33 and 227-257, compiled by Elizabeth French. Our Henry Josselyn (see my letter of 19 July 1980) is found on page 255 of this long Josselyn piece. There are a few bits and pieces that can be added to your line which are not in Miss French's article, but they are of minor importance at this time. Still, you might want to take a look at my "A Josselyn Note" in The American Genealogist, 53(1977):100.

Your line from Henry Josselyn can easily be traced in Deane's History of Scituate and Dwelley and Simmons's History of Hanover, as well as the published vital records for Scituate, Hanover, and Pembroke. I have not done much with the spouses of your Josselyn line from Henry down, but you can find Abigail (Stockbridge) Josselyn in my current Stockbridge article in the Register. I also have material I am putting together which will provide a bit more information about the family of Beatrice (Hampson) Josselyn in England. It will probably be published in TAG (The American Genealogist).

If none of these publications are available to you, I shall be glad to photocopy the particular pages for your files.

I hope to have something more to report before too long.

Dear Mr. Blauer

Thank you for your letter concerning the information you received about William Bezar Ames being born in Middleborough, Massachusetts.

I examined microfilm copies of the Middleborough vital records at the Massachusetts Archives, which cover to the 1840s, but I found no mention of any Ames, Eames, etc. names whatsoever. If your family did live there, it was probably for a short time only, and hence any births (and/or other events) were not recorded. Perhaps some record of a baptism for William--in Middleborough--exists.

Recently I went to Plymouth on a number of matters and while there I checked the deed indexes to see if your Ames family recorded any land for Middleborough, but there was nothing. I still think it will be helpful to examine records in Dedham, the county seat of Norfolk County, and I shall do this if you still desire it. Since Bezar was a laborer (at least in 1850), he might not have owned land in Dorchester, or elsewhere.

In Plymouth I did find one--and one only--deed involving a Bezar Ames, and this was for Bezar Sr. Here is my abstract:

Bezar Ames should have signed the deed also, but it was not so shown in this recorder's copy.

I checked the deed indexes, grantor and grantee, from 1802 to 1859, and although it is possible there might have been a very late-recorded deed for Bezar Ames, I doubt it.

Of course, all the grantors of the above deed were children and grand-child of Charles Josselyn, father of your Rebecca (Josselyn) (Ames) Studley. The person who purchased the property must have been Charles Jr.

My time and expenses for the Middleborough and Plymouth County work have amounted to about fifteen dollars, so please let me know if you wish me to continue with the Ames problem (Norfolk County records) and with the ancestry behind Rebecca (Josselyn) (Ames) Studley [the lines of the Josselyn spouces].

Your letter to Senator Edward Kennedy concerning genealogy in Massachusetts was referred to the State Archives. In Massachusetts, birth, death and marriage records are considered local records, and are maintained by the town and city clerks through the Commonwealth. There is no unified listing or index to these records until 1841, when the state began receiving a copy of the records. After 1841, vital records are indexed for five-year intervals.

To facilitate the use of early vital records, a series of books were published listing records from the clerks' offices and private sources through 1850. Again, these are arranged by town, and there is no central index. The books are available at many research libraries, including the Massachusetts State Library. To order copies of pages from these books, please follow the instructions under Section I on the enclosed sheet. You may be interested in checking the towns around Bridgewater and Middleborough. I have enclosed a map of Massachusetts showing the location of these towns.

Professional genealogists are available to help your research. If you are interested, the New England Historic Genealogical Society maintains a list of genealogists. Their address is shown under Section VII.

I hope this information will aid your research.

ROBERT AND THOMAS EAMES

It is now definitely established that at least two brothers, by name Eames (Robert and Thomas) came from England about 1634; Robert resided first in Charlestown, Mass., moved to Charlestown village, now Woburn, Mass. Many of his descendants may be found in Woburn and Wilmington. Thomas lived at Dedham and finally settled at Framingham, Mass.

It may be stated that some students of the subject engaged in research are of the opinion that John of Woburn 1650, Henry of Boston and Anthony of Charleston and Hingham 1634 and later of Marshfield were brothers of the above Robert and Thomas. From the history of the Sprague family by George W. Chamberlain 1923, we draw that Anthony Eames of Marshfield, Mass. was a son of Thomas and Millicent Eames of Fordington, St. George, Dorset, England. The names of Anthony; brothers and sisters are given and no mention is made of a Robert or a Thomas in the list. This together with other information at hand leads to the conclusion that Anthony of Marshfield, Mass was NOT a brother to the above Robert and Thomas of Woburn and Framingham respectively.

(Not III in book, Persis Eames who married Capt. Michael Pierce was the dau. of Anthony Eames.)
As to the source or root of the word, records warrant the statement that the name is from Heismes or Exmas, Normandy. The family of DeHeimes descends from the ancient viscount of Heimes as early as 978.

The name occurs prominently in ancient records and is spelled Eimes, Emes, Emes, Emas, Emis, Eames, Amies, Amyes, Amas, Amis, Ames, &c.





Dear Mr. Blauer

Yesterday I finally got to the State Library in Hartford, where I was able to spend a little over an hour in your behalf, looking for some proof that Diana Ames was the daughter of Bezar Ames and some indication as to whether she was born in Massachusetts or Connecticut.

I am very sorry to say that I was not very successful. Enclosed is a separate sheet showing what I did find. Most of this you may have seen already, but sometimes it is helpful to go over old territory, especially with fresh ideas, although I really did not have any particular ideas in mind. As you can see, none of the newspaper records told anything about the families of Bezar at his death or Diana at her marriage, but this is certainly not unusual for the particular time periods.

I found no newspaper record of Lucy (Goodnough) Ames's death nor any record of a grave marker. There was no probate record for her, nor were there any for the Brocks (even though they died elsewhere, sometimes there is a probate, particularly if they still had property in Connecticut).

The probate record I found for Bezar Ames has the same number as the one you gave me, but there is no will. This is an administration, and it is obvious he died intestate, so I am very curious about the will you mentioned!! I only listed the three documents in his file but did not make copies. I can get them if you wish, but there is no indication in them as to his children, only his widow Lucy being named.

Alas, I found nothing in the church records on the Ames or Brock families. The index to the church records really only covers about a quarter of the State Library's holdings of old church records, and is mostly for the Congregational Churches, those being the oldest generally. It could be that the family belonged to some other church which has not been indexed (I mean whose records have not been indexed). It would have taken a good long time to go through these records, which might be quite numerous for a place like New Haven, but I can do it on my next Hartford trip, if you wish. Do you have any idea what church they may have attended? Perhaps A. C. Baldwin, who married Ephraim and Diana, is a clue.

I just checked the inventory of the State Library's holdings of church records, and there are almost forty churches for New Haven!

I examined the lists of Connecticut men who served during the War of 1812, but did not find the name of Bezar Ames. He may have served from Massachusetts, of course, and I can check that at the NEHGS. If he did serve, he may have left a pension which would perhaps tell us some of the things we want to know. Have you checked into this idea at all? By the way, Massachusetts did not enter that war until 1814.

Also, where was Ephraim Brock during the time of the Civil War? I know he would have been in his middle thirties, but that is still quite reasonable for a Civil War soldier. He does not seem to have served from Connecticut. If you know or think he might have served, a check should be made to see if he might have had a pension.

Unfortunately, the deeds on microfilm at the State Library in Hartford usually go only up to about 1850. I noted two deeds for Bezar Ames during the period 1831-1840, but did not have time to check them. I doubt they would have established Diana's relationship, that early, but a letter to the town clerk might turn up later deeds, particularly if the settlement of his estate was made through land records. I know that no real estate was shown in the inventory of his estate in 1861, but I have often found that someone did own land even though it did not get inventoried! Have you tried this thought?

Also, some other discouraging news. I checked the Dorchester vital records at the Boston Registry last month: there is no record of any of Bezar's family in Dorchester in the period 1827 to 1836. I also checked the Boston records and the spelling Eames (etc.). This time was a rather slim period for recording births!

At this point, you might like to think about further research that I can possibly do for you. There is still a chance that the land records in Dedham (Norfolk County) might place Bezar there during certain dates, which would be good circumstatial evidence as to where Diana was born as well as the possibility that something else interesting might be learned.

Other than that, I can certainly help beef up your lines behind Rebecca (Josselyn) Ames, if you like, as well as those behind her husband Bezar Ames Sr. no doubt. Please let me know if you wish me to continue with any of this, and with what budget limit.

Finally I got to Dedham, to check the deed records for any clues to your Bezar Ames being there, which in turn might pinpint where his daughter Diana was born. Alas, there were no Bezar (or Lucy) Ames (Eames, etc.) entries in the index of grantors, 1793-1849 or grantees, 1793-1889. There were other names, of course, and some who might have been relatives, on whose deeds we might find Bezar and or Lucy signing as witnesses. This might place them in Dorchester, or wherever, but a long search would be required and with no promise of results.

I went on to Plymouth the same day where I attempted to trace back further some of your lines behind Rebecca (Josselyn) Ames. Of course, the Josselyn and Stockbridge lines are already known, so I concentrated on Rebecca's mother, Rebecca (Keen) Josselyn, whose parentage I did not know. Her marriage record in Pembroke styles her the 3d, I suspect to distinguish her from at least two other Rebecca Keens in town at the time (1760).

Earlier I had found one published genealogy which shows Rebecca was the daughter of Ebenezer and Mercy (Whitridge) Keen of Rochester, but I really could not document it properly. Unfortunately, I found nothing to help in the Plymouth County records. Ebenezer Keen is supposedly buried in Freetown, but I have no date for him. Bristol County records will help here, and if you want me to follow this up, let me know soon, as I need to get to Taunton for some other clients, and thus can split up the travel cost.

In Plymouth I did copy the probate records for Charles Josselyn (1739-1812) which not only confirmed his status as your Rebecca's father (which we already knew from deeds, of course), but also showed he was a bit "out of it" in his later years. I also found an administration for his widow Rebecca, which gives us an approximate time for her death.

Although I have not spent a great deal of time on it, I have mapped out your ancestry behind Rebecca to some degree, and this is shown on the enclosed charts. Some of it still needs to be verified—such as the line of Rebecca (Keen) Josselyn, as mentioned above—and many other dates and places can no doubt be filled in. Some of the lines can even be traced further back, but I thought it best to take a rest and "check in" to see if you want me to continue. I have not included photocopies of the "back up" to the information on the charts but do have all the citations, so I can copy the information

if and when you want it.

I shall be pleased to have your questions and comments and instructions for further research, if any.

This is a brief report on some of my "progress" on the Diana Crehore (Ames) Brock problem.

While in Boston a couple of weeks ago I got the idea that perhaps the Brocks might have lived with the Ames family, at least briefly, and if this happened, it might be indicated in the New Haven city directories, thus providing more weight to our case. I went through the available directories from 1840 through 1853-4, but alas, there was only one listing for Ephraim Brock, in 1851-2, and he was not at the same address as Bezar Ames! Well, I tried! For whatever it is worth, I am sending along my directory notes. As far as I know, the Uri is no relation, at least not a close one to Bezar. But who, I wonder, was the William Ames living with Bezar in the early 1850s? We have no record that Bezar had a son by that name? Maybe a nephew?

Following up on one of one the things I presented in my letter of 1 March 1983, I found a published Crehore genealogy which provides some helpful information about Bezar Jr.'s sister Diana Ames who married John Crehore. Copies of the pertinent pages are enclosed. I am holding my breath, now, for note that John and Diana had but one son, James Ames Crehore, who died after his father but before his mother. Thus, if she left a will, or if there is an estate record for her, it might show us something about her heirs. It is shown in this Crehore genealogy that Diana did leave a will, but it is not found in the Suffolk County Courthouse in Boston. Since she died in Danvers, it seems more likely her estate would be filed in Salem, so I am having a check made there.

Keep your fingers crossed!!

Just today I finally received copies of some of the papers in the estate file of Diana (Ames) Crehore which were finally located in Norfolk County. Although she apparently died in Danvers, Milton must have still been her home, and thus her estate was recorded there. Before I discuss the enclosed copies, let me first give you an abstract of Diana's death record:

Massachusetts Deaths, 364:189, Danvers, 1885, #56: DIANA CREHORE, died at Boston Hospital, 20 Apr. 1885, aged 88, female, widow, cerebral atrophy, born Bridgewater; father: Beza, born Bridgewater; mother: Rebecca, b. Pembroke.

As you will see from the enclosed, Diana Crehore's estate was administered by her brother-in-law, Ebenezer H. Hitchings of Boston (he married Diana's sister Lydia E. Ames in 1835). The most important document is the one listing Diana Crehore's heirs, for here you will find the names of the surviving children of Diana Crehore (Ames) Brock, whom I take to be Ella Ames, Emeline Rector, Addie Hatch, and Arthur Ames.

It seems to me that the heirs are listed by family somewhat in birth order of the children of Bezer and Rebecca (Joslyn) Ames, with some regard to male chauvinism, the male heirs listed first! Well, first we get the name of the one surviving sibling, Lydia E. (Ames) Hitchings, but the next names seem to be the heirs of Bezer [Jr.], who was the oldest sibling of Diana (Ames) Crehore. This works if I figure Clarence A. Ames, nephew, was really Clarence Gilbert Ames, grandnephew (son of William Bezar Ames). Next we have Bezar Jr.'s surviving son, Fisher A. Ames, followed by his surviving sisters, Elizabeth W. Hall and Abigail A. Wilmont. Then we get the surviving children of Bezar Jr.'s daughter Diana Crehore (Ames) Brock: "Emelina A. Rector, wife of Frank Rector; Ella F. Ames, wife of Fisher A. Ames; Abbie W. Hatch, wife of Isaac P. Hatch," and "Arthur L. Brock." (I have added punctuation to make it a bit clearer.)

I believe the next several names would then be the heirs of Diana (Ames) Crehore's brothers Marcus, Cyrus, Philander, and Charles

H., but since I have not followed these Ames lines, I cannot place them all with certainty. Diana's sister Rebecca Ames married William Wellington, and it seems clear that they left children Walter L., Julia, and at least one other who had a son Frank C. Wellington.

Would it be helpful if I drew you a chart?

So, at long last I believe we have something quite good which ties together various other records and proves that Diana Crehore (Ames) Brock was the daughter of Bezar Ames [Jr.]! There is just one problem which I hope you can explain. On the SAR aplplication copy you sent me long ago, you show that Ellen Frances Brock, daughter of Diana Crehore (Ames) Brock, was born in 1855 and died in 1919, and that she married John Pius Gutzweiler, born 1863, died 1945. The chart of Bezer and Lucy (Goodenough) Ames's descendants you sent me seems to indicate that Ellen Frances Brock was the wife of her uncle, Fisher A. Ames. To some degree, this seems indicated in the list of Diana (Ames) Crehore's heirs; rather, both Fisher A. Ames and his wife "Ella F." seem to be heirs, and nowhere do I see the name Gutzweiler. Can you enlighten me?

Please let me know if you need more help with this, for I think you can take things from here. As I wrote earlier, I do wonder about the current Mayflower Society policy with regard to the Mitchell problem.

Unless you advise me otherwise, I shall continue with researching the ancestry of Rebecca (Joslyn) Ames.

COMMENTS ON THE TWO WIVES OF EXPERIENCE MITCHELL OF PLYMOUTH, MASS.

By JOHN B. THRELFALL of Madison, Wisc.

Experience Mitchell came to Plymouth, Miss., in 1623 and is known to have had two wives. The first was Jan Cooke, daughter of Francis Cooke of the *Mayflower* and his wife Hester Mahieu. Experience Mitchell and Jane Cooke were married after 22 May 1627. She died at an unknown date but before 166t, and he married a second wife whose given name was Mary, her sumame yet unknown. The late George E. Bowman and other genealogists of Plymouth families have rather thoroughly examined the existing records that throw light on these people. From this material it is known that Experience Mitchell had the following children:

 ELIZABETH, b. prob. 1628; mar. 6 Dec. 1645, John Washburn, Jr. She was living in Nov. 1681, but he mar. (2) 1684-6, widow Elizabeth Packard. Her children, surname Washburn were: John, Thomas, Joseph, Samuel, Jonathan, Benjamin, Mary, Elizabeth, Jane, James and Sarah.

ii. Thomas. On 8 June 1666, John Cooke ratified and confirmed to Richard Wright and Thomas Mitchell upland and meadow "given by my father ffrancis Cooke unto the aforesaid Richard Wright and Thomas Mitchell" lying at Jones River in Duxbury "to be equally divided betwixt" the two. On 1 Aug. 1672, Thomas Mitchell sold his share to Wright and in the deed states that it was given him by his grandfather Francis Cooke of Plymouth (Col. Deeds, 3:234). He also had land at Dartmouth given him by his father but returned it in 1669 to his father, who the same day conveyed it to son Jacob. Thomas acknowledged the deed 1 March 1674. He apparently went to Block Island, R.I., where a Thomas Mitchell in 1678 was convicted of selling liquor to the Indians. He d. bef. May of 1687, leaving sons Thomas, John and Joseph, and perhaps daughters, assuming this to be the same Thomas (see The American Genealogist, 12:193-9).

 MARY, prob. b. 1630-34; mar. 24 Dec. 1652 at Plymouth, James Shaw, son of John. Three known children, surname Shaw: James, John and

Anne, and probably two other daughters.

iv. Sarah, prob. b. 1641-45; mar. John Hayward, son of Thomas and Susannah; his estate settled 1710; she d. after 1731; res. Bridgewater. Ten children, b. 1663-87, surname Hayward: Sarah, John, Joseph, Mary, Thomas, Benjamin, Susanna, Elizabeth, Benoni and Mercy.
 v. Jacob, prob. b. 1640-46; mar. 7 Nov. 1666, Susanna Pope, dau. of Thomas

JACOB, prob. b. 1640-46; mar. 7 Nov. 1666, SUSANNA POPE, dau. of Thomas and Sarah (Jenney) Pope of Plymouth; he settled at Dartmouth (now Fairhaven), was a carpenter and held rank of Ensign. He and his wife were killed by Indians in King Philip's War, June of 1675. Three children, raised by their uncle Edward: Jacob, Thomas and Mary.
 vi. EDWARD, prob. b. 1644-8; mar. MARY HAYWARD, dau. of Thomas and

(2), 26 Aug. 1708, ALICE BRADFORD, b. 28 Jan. 1677, dau. of Major John and Mercy (Warren) Bradford, and they had three children: Mary, Alice and Edward. He d. 15 March 1716/17, and she mar. (2) Deacon Joshua Hersey of Hingham; she d. 14 July 1746 at Hingham; Edward res. Bridgewater and raised three orphaned children of his brother Jacob.

vii. John; mar. (1) 14 Dec. 1675, Mary Bonney, dau. of Thomas; had one child, Experience; Mary d. 13 May 1677 and he mar. (2) 14 Jan. 1679/80, Mary Lathrop who d. 13 Feb. 1679/80. He mar. (3) 24 May 1682, Mary Prior; had eight children by her: Mary, Hannah, Joseph, Elizabeth, Elizabeth again, John, Sarah and Esther. He res. Duxbury,

moved to Providence, R.I., where he d. 14 Oct. 1719.

viii. Hannah; mar. ca. 1682, Joseph Hayward, son of Thomas and brother of John, as his third wife; had seven children: Mary, Thomas, Edward, Hannah, Susanna, Peter and Abigail; he d. 20 June 1718.

Bowman and most other writers have casually attributed all of these children to Experience Mitchell's first wife, Jane Cooke. There seems to be no evidence to support such an assumption, except in the case of Thomas, and therefore Elizabeth, who must have been the eldest in order to have married in 1645. Thomas and Elizabeth were named, perhaps, for Experience Mitchell's family, his father perhaps being Thomas Mitchell of Cambridge, Eng., and Amsterdam, Holland (Lora A. W. Underhill, Edward Small and His Descendants,

1934, 1:510).

Not one of the later children bore a Cooke name, i.e. Francis, Jane or Hester; except perhaps Jacob, named for Jane's brother. Furthermore, daughter Elizabeth was the only child of Experience known to name a child Jane; whereas Sarah, Edward, Jacob, Hannah and John (and also Elizabeth) all named a child Mary. None of Experience's children named a child Jane, Francis or Hester (Esther), except Elizabeth's Jane and John's Esther. It appears entirely possible that Jane (Cooke) Mitchell was the mother of only Elizabeth, Thomas and perhaps Mary; and that Experience's second wife, Mary, was the mother of the others.

All of the above is circumstantial evidence; hardly the kind a genealogist prefers. By the same token, there is not even this much to support Jane as the mother of all these children, as has been carelessly assumed. Although the Society of Mayflower Descendants accepts descendants through all of the children of Experience Mitchell for membership, such an assumption would seem to be suspect. There is, of course, always the possibility that second wife Mary was herself a

Mayflower daughter.

Dear Jim

Many thanks for your good letter which I received yesterday, and of course, for the check. I am glad to know you were pleased with the Diana (Ames) Crehore material which in turn should get you going with the Mayflower Society.

Thanks for clearing up the point about Ellen Frances Brock. I thought niece-uncle marriages would only be found among long-ago royalty! Do you have a copy of the divorce record (which I assume would be in Connecticut)?

Of course I shall be happy to discuss with the Mayflower Society if they need to contact me about any of the material relative to your lineage. It may indeed seem a little confusing, since there is some "back door" (if you will) documentation--all very straight forward genealogically, but often lineage societies would prefer things much more easily documented I think.

I thought I had written before about the Mitchell "problem," but apparently not. The best way to set it out is to send you the enclosed copy of Jack Threlfall's piece from Volume 127 of the Register. In the back of my mind I seem to recall Gene Stratton, the Historian General in Plymouth, mentioning this to me once when we were discussing Jack. I got the impression then that because there was no proof as to which wife of Experience Mitchell was the mother of his children, that the Mayflower Society generally accepted all lines back to Francis Cooke; however, Gene also said because Jack considered the matter "open," he himself would not apply for membership unless proof could be found.

All this is under the assumption that you are looking at the Mitchell line for Mayflower membership, but maybe you have another line in mind, of which I am not aware. At any rate, you probably do not have a problem with the Mitchell line, if the Society contines to accept line through all children of Experience Mitchell.

I shall be glad to help you with the families of the siblings of Diana C. Ames when you are ready. In the meantime, I shall see what more I can find behind your Josselyn line. As a reminder, my new rate is now fifteen dollars an hour, as I wrote in my report of 17 January 1983.
