HE name of this family was spelled in early times Amyas, Amyes, Amyce, and Amys. More than one will recorded in Somersetshire, England, bears throughout its body the name of Amyas, although the testator signs himself Ames.

The earliest family of Amyas (or Ames) was settled in Nether Shelyngton, near Thornhill, in Yorkshire, and held lands in several other parts of the county,—namely, Wakefield, Horbury, etc. The arms were:

Arms.—Argent, on a bend cotised sable, three roses of the field.

Crest.-A white rose.

Motto.-Fama candida rosa dulcior.

THE FAMILY IN ENGLAND

There was an Ames in the Parliament held at Worcester by King John in A.D. 1200. It is recorded that Edmund Amys, canon of Hampton, was made Prior of Mountjoy in 1401.

Robert Ames was rector of Ringsted Magna, Ringsted, St. Andrew, Norfolk, in 1506.

Richard Ames held land in Great Rutten, Norfolk, before 1510.

Peter Amyas was rector of Castor St. Edmunds, Norfolk, in 1601.

I beseech all people, far and ner To pray for me Thomas Amys heartily Which gafe a masbooke, and made this chapel here And a suit of blew damask also gave I. Of God 1511 and 5 yere I the said Thomas deceased verily And the 4th day of August, was buried here. On whose soul God have mercy."

WILLIAM AMES, son of John Ames and Cyprian (Browne) Ames, of Bruton, Somersetshire, England, was born in Bruton, England, October 6, 1605. He came to New England by way of Holland and settled in Braintree as early as 1638, being admitted as a freeman May 26, 1647. He there was connected with the first iron works established in New England. Many of his lineal descendants have been connected with the manufacturing of iron, and to them rightly belongs the title of "Iron Kings."

Died in Braintree, Massachusetts Bay Colony, February 1, 1653.

Married Hannah. After his death, Hannah Ames married as her second husband, April 6, 1660, John Heiden (Hayden).

[Howard.—I. John Hayward (or Howard), of Bridgewater, came from England when about fifteen years of age, settled in Duxbury, lived in the family of Captain Miles Standish, and in 1643 was able to bear arms. In 1645 he is named as one of the fifty-four original proprietors of the grant of land which became the town of Bridgewater, Plymouth colony. In 1643 he was a carpenter in Duxbury, a representative in the general court in 1678 and often thereafter. Died in Bridgewater in 1700. Married

CAPTAIN JOHN AMES, second son and fourth child of Thomas Ames and Keziah (Howard) Ames, was born in Bridgewater, Massachusetts, April 7, 1738. He was a pioneer iron manufacturer in New England and proprietor of one of the nail and slittery mills. In 1773 he began the manufacture of shovels at his forge in Bridgewater, and with heavy, clumsy implements, including a trip hammer weighing about eighty pounds, and a common hammer and anvil, produced a shovel which compared favorably with those subsequently manufactured with improved tools by his son Oliver, who succeeded him in the business.

In the American Revolution he was the gunmaker of the Province of Massachusetts. He was captain of a company of "Minute Men" at Bridgewater and was repeatedly called into active service on "alarms" in Rhode Island and elsewhere. On March 23, 1776, he was commissioned captain of the fifth company, Third Plymouth County Regiment. In addition, he served in the regiment of Colonel Edward Mitchell. On a Rhode Island alarm he marched to Bristol, December 9, 1776, and served fifteen days. He also served in the regiment of Colonel Wade, enlisting June

26, 1778, and serving twenty-four days. On July 30, 1780, he enlisted in the regiment of Major Eliphalet Carey and served eleven days, on a Rhode Island alarm, receiving his discharge August 9, 1780. Toward the close of the Revolutionary war he was commissioned major of his regiment.

Died in Bridgewater, July 17, 1805.

Married, in Bridgewater, July 12, 1759, Susannah, daughter of Ephraim and Abigail (Tisdale) Howard. She was born May 14, 1736, and died January 11, 1821.

OLIVER AMES, youngest of the ten children of John Ames and Susannah (Howard) Ames, was born in Bridgewater, Massachusetts, April 11, 1779. He inherited his father's mechanical skill and ingenuity, and at the age of eighteen went to Springfield, Massachusetts, which was the home of his elder brother David, to learn the trade of a gunsmith. Oliver Ames continued to work in the Springfield Armory until the close of his brother's term as superintendent, in 1802, when he returned to Bridgewater and engaged with his father in the manufacture of shovels. Thus he acquired at an early age those habits of industry and that practical knowledge of the craft of the iron worker which were the foundation and means of his future great success. Soon after his marriage he began the manufacture of shovels on his own account, removing in September, 1803, to Easton, where he built the first factory for making the famous Ames shovels. His shovels, made lighter in weight than had been those from his father's forge in Bridgewater, proved popular and very salable. His argument

for manufacturing lighter shovels was that "iron was cheaper than muscle," and the use of the lighter shovels proved the truth of the argument presented in his words and has made them an axiom. For seven years, beginning in 1807, he resided in Plymouth, manufacturing shovels for another company. Returning to Easton, March 25, 1814, he, with Asa Waters, built a factory for the manufacture of cotton goods and, later, cotton machinery. This factory was subsequently destroyed by fire, and he thereafter devoted himself exclusively to the manufacture and improvement of shovels and spades. He sought constantly to improve the quality of his products and maintained the standard of every implement that bore his name. He brought to the business unusual physical energy and mental capacity.

In 1844 Mr. Ames retired from active participation in the business, transferring the management to his sons, Oakes and Oliver, under the firm name of Oliver Ames and Sons. In addition to valuable improvements made in the manufacture of shovels, he was the inventor of a number of other useful devices, including the furnace water-back and the iron wheel-hub. He took a deep interest in public affairs. He was a member of the lower branch of the state legislature in 1828–29 and again in 1833–34, and served as state senator in 1845. At one time he served as surveyor of highways of Easton. Mr. Ames was also successful as an organizer of labor. Considerate and just in all his relations with his workmen, his treatment of his employes resulted in a high degree of efficiency on their part.

Died in North Easton, Massachusetts, September 11, 1863, aged eighty-four years. A tablet to his memory in the Unitarian church at North Easton testifies that he was the founder of the Unitarian Society at that place.

Married, April 7, 1803, Susanna, daughter of Oakes and Susannah (Howard) Angier, who was born in Bridgewater, Massachusetts, March 8, 1783, and died in North Easton, Massachusetts, March 28, 1847. By the marriage of Oliver Ames and Susanna Angier were united on the shores of New England two of the chief branches of the English family of Ames. Through her maternal grandfather, Colonel Edward Howard, Susanna [Angier] Ames was a direct descendant of John Winslow, brother of Governor Edward Winslow and uncle of Governor Josiah Winslow, of the Plymouth colony, and his wife, Mary Chilton, the "Mayflower" passenger.

[ANGIER.—I. EDMUND ANGIER was the founder of that family in New England. He was the youngest of four sons of John Angier, "a person of good account and property at Dedham, England." The date of his birth has been given as about 1612. He was in Cambridge, Massachusetts, in 1636, and was made a freeman in 1640. He was a grocer or merchant, sometimes styled "woolen draper," and lived at the north-

west corner of Dunster and Mount Auburn streets, his store being on the opposite, or southeast, corner. He died March 4, 1691-2. Married, 1st, Ruth, "daughter of that famous light," Reverend Dr. William Ames, a noted English divine, who was professor in the University of Francker and author of "Medulla Theologiæ." [For biography of Reverend Dr. William Ames see forward.] Ruth (Ames) Angier came with her mother and brothers, after her father's death, to New England, where she married, and died July 3, 1656. He was an architect in Boston, 1870-76; studied drawing and painting in Paris, 1876-80; was an artist, illustrator, and writer in New York, 1880-83, and on January 3, 1883, founded, and has since edited, "Life"; author of several professional and literary works. He is a member of the National Institute of Arts and Letters and of the Century and City clubs of New York city. OAKES AMES, eldest son of Oliver Ames and Susanna (Angier) Ames, was born in North Easton, Bristol county, Massachusetts, January 10, 1804. He received his early education wholly in the district school of his native place, and when able to help in his father's shovel works, began at the bottom and learned the business practically. He was overseer of the works at an early age, and remained in that capacity up to his fortieth year, when, in 1844, his father turned over the active management of the business to his two sons, Oakes and Oliver, making the firm name Oliver Ames and Sons. Railroad building in the United States, stimulated by the discovery of gold in California, gave an immense impetus to the shovel trade, of which the Ames brothers, owing to the superiority of the Ames shovel over that of their competitors, enjoyed a large share. Their shrewd management of the manufacturing, sales, and financial departments of the business carried them safely through the panic of 1857 and into the industrial prosperity that followed that financial crisis.

Oakes Ames entered the political field in 1860, through his election as councilor for the Bristol district, and he thus became an adviser and counselor of Governor Andrew, the war governor of Massachusetts. His influence as a member of the governor's council made his duties national rather than local, and when the second congressional district of Massachusetts needed a strong man as representative of the district in the congress of the United States, the choice of the Republican party fell upon him, and he was elected by a large majority to represent the district in the thirty-eighth congress, and was re-elected to the thirty-ninth, fortieth, forty-first, and forty-second congresses. In congress he served on the committees on manufactures, the Pacific railroad, Revolutionary claims, and roads and canals.

He enjoyed the personal confidence of President Lincoln, who, in 1864, after all others had failed, urged him to interest himself in the construction of the Pacific railway and to use every effort to push it to completion. This, President Lincoln

said, was just the work for the "broad-shouldered Ames" to do. He considered the matter for an entire year before promising to undertake the work, and when he acted he brought to the task his untiring energy, which, joined with his knowledge, ability, and quick discernment, assured success to all enterprises in which he was the dominant factor. To show his faith in the project, he put one million dollars of his own fortune in the enterprise and pledged the entire remainder of his wealth for the same purpose. He appealed to friends in and out of congress to contribute to its success by liberal subscriptions to its stock. After overcoming apparently insurmountable obstacles, the road was completed and the last spikes driven May 10, 1869, "the most vital contribution to the integrity and growth of the National Union since the war."

He was a sincere advocate of general education, and largely upon his suggestion in 1869, Oliver Ames and Sons presented to the town of Easton a school-house, and personally he donated to the town a fund of fifty thousand dollars in seven per cent. railroad bonds, the income to be devoted to the support of schools and for the benefit of the children of the village of North Easton. Nor was the interest of Oakes Ames in the cause of education limited to his native town, or even to his native state. In the words of Doctor Edward Everett Hale, "the education of the whole country was a matter very near to his heart, and he took broad and large views of that education."

Died in North Easton, Massachusetts, from pneumonia, May 8, 1873.

Married, November 27, 1827, Eveline Orville, daughter of Joshua and Hannah (Lothrop) Gilmore, of Easton, and a descendant also of Francis Cooke, the "May-flower" passenger. She was born July 14, 1809, and died July 20, 1882, the mother of five children.

OLIVER AMES, third son of Oliver Ames and Susanna (Angier) Ames, was born November 5, 1807, in Plymouth, Massachusetts. By his father's removal to Easton in 1813 he became a resident of that town, which place was afterward his


home. He early began to learn the details of the shovel business and became expert and thorough in every branch of shovel manufacture. In 1828, being disabled for actual labor by a severe fall, he entered an academy at North Andover, Massachusetts, intending to prepare for college and ultimately to study law, toward which profession he felt a strong inclination, and, after spending a year and a half at the academy, he entered as a law student the office of William Baylies, of West Bridgewater. The confinement of the office proving unfavorable to his health, together with the increasing demands of business at home, led him to join his father and his brother Oakes, in 1844 entering into co-partnership with them, forming the house of Oliver Ames and Sons, and becoming the efficient co-laborer of his brother in the management of their great business.

As early as 1826 he was much interested in the temperance movement, supporting the cause of total abstinence, of which from that time he was a consistent and earnest advocate, serving it actively, contributing to it largely, and being the first man in Easton to sign the total abstinence pledge. For many years he was first vice-president of the Massachusetts Total Abstinence Society.

Mr. Ames was a member of the Whig party, and at its dissolution joined the Republican party, taking an active interest in its principles and measures. In 1852 he was elected to the senate of Massachusetts by the legislature, there being no choice by the people, and did excellent service upon several important committees. He was elected to the same office in 1857 by popular vote. In some of the campaigns he made effective speeches upon the issues of the hour.

In the year 1855 Oliver and Oakes Ames built the Easton branch railroad, and thereafter became interested in those important railroad enterprises in which the two brothers were so deservedly famous. Though Oakes Ames took the initiative in constructing the Union Pacific railroad, yet the prosecution and completion of this magnificent undertaking were owing to the united efforts of the two brothers. In 1866 Oliver Ames was elected to succeed General John A. Dix, president of the Union Pacific railroad, an office which he filled with signal ability until March, 1871. During this time the road passed through some of its severest trials, and his sound judgment, great business capacity, and inflexible integrity were of immense service in carrying this great enterprise safely through difficulty and peril to final success.

Oliver Ames held many positions of trust and responsibility. Besides his service as state senator, he was a trustee of the Taunton Insane Asylum for some twenty years; was president of the National Bank of Easton, of the Ames Plow Company,

and the Kinsley Iron and Machine Company; a director of the Union Pacific, Atlantic and Pacific, Kansas Pacific, Denver Pacific, Colorado Central, Old Colony and Newport, and other railroads; also of the Bristol County National Bank and other corporations. His public spirit led him to take great interest in enterprises of education, philanthropy, and reform. He was identified with agricultural, historical, and other societies, and served for years on the board of the school committee of Easton. He was also interested in the Unitarian churches of Easton and North Easton; was very constant in his attendance upon religious service, and for several years was a Sunday-school superintendent.

Mr. Ames stood among the foremost in reputation for a manly and unblemished character and for business ability—a reputation he well deserved. No one could associate with him without learning his strong, substantial, able, and honorable character. His name was felt to be a sufficient endorsement of the worth and promise of any enterprise.

Business cares were not allowed to engross all of Mr. Ames's attention. He continued to the last his interest in literature, kept himself familiar with the great questions that agitate thought and life, enjoyed the society of cultivated persons, and often surprised them by the clearness and comprehensiveness of his carefully formed opinions. In his character there were blended an admirable simplicity and a most cordial fellow-feeling, with a real dignity and refinement. He was noted for his generosity. No help was denied any object that commanded his confidence; but he shrank from all publicity in his benefactions. He had a high sense of honor, that was prompt to rebuke anything mean and dishonorable. He was not only philanthropic, but also deeply religious.

Many of his benefactions have not been disclosed, but those he was known to have bestowed were wisely made, and are accomplishing much good. Among his gifts in his native town are the Ames Free Library, the Methodist church, the beautiful Unitarian church and parsonage, and the village cemetery, with a fund to keep them in repair. He also gave fifty thousand dollars to the schools and a like amount for good roads in the town.

Died, in North Easton, Massachusetts, March 9, 1877.

Married, June 11, 1833, Sarah Lothrop, daughter of Honorable Howard and Sally (Williams) Lothrop, of Easton, Massachusetts. She was born September 23, 1812, and died in North Easton, February 28, 1890.

[Lothrop.—The name Lowthrop, Lothrop or Lathrop is derived from Lowthrope, a small parish in the Wapentake of Dickering, East Riding of Yorkshire, England, four and a half miles northeast of Great Driffield, and a perpetual curacy in the archdeaconry of York. The church there was an ancient institution said to have been built about the time of Edward III., although there has been no institution to it since 1579.

I. MARK LOTHROP was the American ancestor of Mrs. Oliver Ames. He was received as an inhabitant in the town of Salem, Massachusetts, on the eleventh day of the tenth month, 1643, and made a request for ground near his kinsman, Thomas Lothrop. He was granted land near Wenham. In 1656 he resided in Bridgewater, Massachusetts, and was one of the proprietors of the town. In 1657 he took the oath of "Fidelitie," and in 1658 was elected constable. For twenty-five years he occupied a prominent place in town affairs. He was elected one of the jury for trials and grand juror and surveyor of highways and was one of the committee appointed "to lay out all waies requiesett in the township of Bridgewater." The records also indicate that he took an active part in the affairs of the church. He died October 25, 1685. Upon his death, his son Samuel was appointed administrator of his estate, March 2, 1686, which was appraised at two hundred and fifty-three pounds, one shilling. Issue: 1. Elizabeth Lothrop. 2. The dates of their birth are not known, but the Bridgewater records indicate that his three sons were twenty-one years of age, or more, in 1682, when they were known as freemen.

IV. ISAAC LOTHROP, second son of Samuel and Abial (Lazell) Lothrop, was b. December 21, 1714; d. November 25, 1774. M., 1st, November 23, 1738, Bethiah, daughter of Major Edward and Mary (Byram) Howard. He m., 2d, April 13, 1742, Patience, daughter of Joseph and Mary (Ames) Alger, who d. August 16, 1779.

V. EDMUND LOTHROP, of Easton, Massachusetts, son of Isaac and Patience (Alger) Lothrop, was b. February 15, 1746. He settled in Easton and died there, March 26, 1815. His will was dated May 23, 1811, and probated April 7, 1815. His son Howard was sole executor. M., September 29, 1774, Betty, daughter of George and Abigail (Copeland) Howard; she was b. in 1751, and d. April 3, 1831.

VI. HOWARD LOTHROP, son of Edmund and Betty (Howard) Lothrop, was b. in Easton, Massachusetts, December 17, 1776. He early invested in the Keith furnace, in Pittsford, Vermont, and in time became sole owner, superintending the works for twelve years, but sold them in 1809. His father's health failing, he returned to Easton. where he remained for the rest of his life on the old homestead. He was a gentleman of the old New England type and a splendid specimen of what the common school can make of a youth with good, strong, common sense. He had a large local influence and was for many years a representative of the town in the state legislature and of his district in the state senate and also of the executive council. He was also once presidential elector and as such voted for Daniel Webster in 1836. D. August 23, 1857. M., June 13, 1805, Sally, daughter of Edmund and Sarah (Lothrop) Williams, She was b. May 9, 1787; d. May 15, 1864. Issue: 1. Edwin Howard Lothrop, b. March 22, 1806. He was graduated at Amherst in 1828. M., December 2, 1831, Anna Taylor, a native of Swansea, Massachusetts. 2. Edward Williams Lothrop, b. March 9, 1808; d. January 26, 1812. 3. Thomas Church Lothrop, b. July 16, 1810. He was drowned at Wareham, Massachusetts, in April, 1828. He was a merchant in New Bedford. M., in New Bedford, Massachusetts, Anna Avery Parker, daughter of John A. Parker. 4. Sarah Lothrop, b. September 23, 1812. M. Honorable Oliver Ames, Jr., as above noted. 5. Edward Williams Lothrop, b. April 8, 1815; d., unmarried, at Schoolcraft, Michigan, September 23, 1838. 6. George Van Ness Lothrop, b. August 8, 1817. He was graduated from Brown University in 1838 and afterward studied at Cambridge Law School. He received the degree of LL.D. from Brown University in 1863. In 1843 he located in Detroit, Michigan, where he married. He attained high rank in his profession and filled several places of public honor and trust, being attorney-general of Michigan from 1848 to 1851, and recorder of Michigan in 1852. In 1867 he was a member of the constitutional convention of the state, and was one of the commissioners of the Detroit Public Library. He was appointed United States Minister to Russia by Grover Cleveland in 1885. D. in 1897. M., May 13, 1847, Elmira Strong. 7. Henry Franklin Lothrop, b. March 1, 1820. He served several terms in the state legislature and was president of the Rutland County Agricultural Society. M., in Pittsfield, Vermont, October 5, 1848, Eleanor B. Sturges. 8. Cyrus Lothrop, b. October 13, 1822; d. February 17, 1912. He was for several years engaged in the iron manufacturing business in Sharon and Canton, Massachusetts, being afterward an iron merchant in Boston. He never married. 9. De Witt Clinton Lothrop, b. February 21, 1825. He resided in the homestead in Easton, Massachusetts. D. August 25, 1851. OAKES ANGIER AMES, eldest child of Honorable Oakes Ames and Eveline Orville (Gilmore) Ames, was born in North Easton, Massachusetts, April 15, 1829. He attended the public school at North Easton; the Easton Academy; Fruit Hill Classical Institute, near Providence, Rhode Island; and Leicester (Massachusetts) Academy. Upon leaving school, in 1847, he entered his father's shovel works, and was instructed in the details of manufacture. In 1856, with his brother Oliver, and cousin, Frederick Lothrop Ames, he was taken into the firm of Oliver Ames and Sons, and soon after the death of Oakes Ames, in 1873, the firm of Oliver Ames and Sons was incorporated, and he became the sole superintendent. In 1877, upon the death of Oliver Ames, Oakes Angier Ames became president of the corporation. of the plant at this time was one million, two hundred and fifty thousand shovels per year, and five hundred men were employed in their manufacture. intendence and management of this vast industry entailed much responsibility and seemed to require the personal presence and active oversight of some member of the Ames company. The choice for this position fell upon Oakes Angier Ames. was a position for which, both by his mechanical training and by his natural aptitude and ability to deal with practical affairs, he was singularly well fitted. no detail in this great manufacture of which he did not have a thorough knowledge. Long after he was made president of the corporation, in 1877, he continued also to act as superintendent, and to his wise oversight the great success of this important business was largely due. In devoting himself thus to these home interests, he sacrificed whatever ambition for public honors and political advantage he may have had. He was president of the First National Bank of Easton, trustee of the Easton Savings Bank, trustee of the State Lunatic Asylum at Taunton, Massachudirector of the American Loan and Trust Company and the Lincoln Bank of Boston, and of several other corporations. He was warmly interested in the

Unitarian church of North Easton, of which for many years he was the president. After the death of Oakes Ames, his sons, Oakes Angier and Oliver, erected the Oakes Ames Memorial Hall.¹ In this building the brothers, as trustees of their father's bequest, provided courses of free public lectures which were largely attended. From the income of the fund they furnished books and apparatus for instruction in manual training, and supported a kindergarten, besides classes for sewing and wood-working. They also provided magazines for all the families in which there were school children in North Easton village.

Tall, erect, and dignified in his personal appearance and bearing, friendly and democratic in his personal relations, the soul of justice, practical wisdom, and common sense, his death was a great public loss and a cause of private grief in his native town, where he was known and loved and honored.

Died September 19, 1899.

Married, July 19, 1855, Catherine Hobart, who died April 18, 1908. She was the daughter of Judge Aaron Hobart, of East Bridgewater, Massachusetts, a descendant of Edmund Hobart, who came from Hingham, England, to Hingham, in Massachusetts Bay colony, about 1633, with his wife, son Joshua, daughters Rebecca and Sarah, and servant Henry Gibbs. His sons Edmund, Thomas, and Reverend Peter soon followed him and they all settled in Hingham. He died March 8, 1649; married, first, in England, Margaret Dewey; married, second, October 10, 1634, Sarah Lyford, widow of John Lyford. He wrote his name Hobbard, but his son, the Reverend Peter, wrote it Hobart.

OLIVER AMES, second son and child of Hon. Oakes Ames and Eveline Orville (Gilmore) Ames, and thirty-fifth governor of the commonwealth of Massachusetts

¹ The Memorial Hall was dedicated November 17, 1881, and the occasion was a remarkable one, illustrating as it did the desire of the best men in the community to pay a tribute to the memory of Oakes Ames, their country's benefactor. Hon. John D. Long, then governor of the commonwealth; Hon. George S. Boutwell, Reverend Dr. Edward Everett Hale, Judge Thomas Russell, Hon. Robert R. Bishop, president of the senate; Hon. Charles J. Noyes, speaker of the House of Representatives; Reverend C. C. Hussey, a former pastor of Mr. Ames, and Henry B. Blackwell were the speakers at the gathering in the hall, which was presided over by A. A. Gilmore, of North Easton. under the constitution, was born at North Easton, Bristol county, Massachusetts, February 4, 1831. Among his colonial ancestors he numbered four "Mayflower" passengers: James Chilton, William Mullins, John Alden, and Francis Cooke. He received his early education in the public schools of his native town and at the North Attleboro and Leicester Academies, and, as a matter of course, was destined to a manufacturing career. With the view of pursuing such a career with a thoroughknowledge of the initiatory steps, he entered the establishment of Oliver Ames and Sons, occupying a position in which he might learn the methods of manufacturing and of general business. After some time spent in the shovel works, becoming satisfied that a course of higher instruction would aid him in the pursuit of his chosen career, he obtained his father's consent to a course of study in Brown University, where he spent a profitable year under the special supervision of its president, Dr. Francis Wayland. In 1892 he received from this university the honorary degree of LL.D. Returning to his home, he re-entered the works and speedily mastered the details of the industry. On the death of his grandfather, in 1863, he was given, by his will, a one-ninth interest in the concern, and became a member of the firm of Oliver Ames and Sons. As a member of the firm he, for several years, personally superintended the mechanical departments of the establishment. In 1876, when the firm was organized under the name of Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation, he became a director.

While actively engaged in the manufacturing business, he invented many new machines and improved others, and by his ingenuity and skill aided largely in facilitating and perfecting the manufacture of the Ames shovel and enlarging its sales in the markets of the world. But his continued active participation in the affairs of the company was brought to an end by the burdens and responsibilities imposed upon him by his position as one of the executors of the estate of his father, who died on the 8th of May, 1873. The estate, valued at about six millions of dollars, was, at the time he assumed its settlement, not only one in which large and diversified interests were involved, scattered throughout different states of the Union, but

was burdened with obligations resulting from the panic of 1873. By pledging his own fortune he was enabled to satisfy the immediate demands of creditors. became either president or director in the Union Pacific railroad; the Central Branch of the Union Pacific in Kansas; the Sioux City and Pacific; the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe; the Chicago, Iowa, and Nebraska; the Iowa Falls and Sioux City; the Cedar Rapids and Missouri; the Fremont and Elkhorn Valley; the Hastings and Dakota; the Waterville and Washington; the Republican Valley; the Soloman Valley and Atchison; the Colorado and Pacific; the New Orleans, Mobile, and Texas; the Hoosac Tunnel, the Toledo and St. Louis; and other railroad corporations. He was connected with other business enterprises, being a director of the Turner's Falls Water Power Company, the Moingona Coal Company of Iowa, and the Missouri Valley Land Company. He was also a director of the Commonwealth National Bank of Boston, the Bristol County National Bank, the Kinsley Iron and Machine Company, Equitable Life Assurance Society, American Loan and Trust Company, United Electric Securities Company, Industrial Improvement Company, Mexican Central Railway Company, and the Winsor Company, and a trustee of the Boston Savings Bank, the Boston Five Cent Savings Bank, the Howard Seminary, and the London Guarantee and Accident Company of London, England, and president of the Merchants' Club of Boston and the Boston Art Club. In all these positions his frankness of speech, his honesty of purpose, his confident attacks against obstacles standing in the way of success served to make him a power in the financial world.

In his earlier years he had served on the school committee of his native town, and had held the position of chairman and treasurer of its Republican town committee, but beyond the threshold of political life his engrossing business cares had forbidden him to go. The first step beyond the threshold was rather an accident than the result of a desire to gratify an ambition for public honors. During several years prior to 1879, he owned a residence in Cottage City, and was much interested in a movement to secure the incorporation of that town, then a part of the town of Edgartown. As chairman of the committee appointed to secure the necessary legislation, he presented the claims of the petitioners to the committee on towns, and after a favorable report, adopted every honorable means to convince the legislature of the justice of the bill which the report contained. He refused the assistance of the lobby, although he was assured that without it his bill would be defeated. The failure of the act of incorporation, largely due to this refusal, and the knowledge he obtained, while the bill was under consideration, of the methods which

petitioners before the legislature feel themselves obliged to adopt, and of the demands of the lobby, which were really nothing less than blackmail, proved of service to him in subsequent years when, as governor, he had under consideration bills, the passage of which the lobby had been largely the means of securing. After the failure of the efforts of the people of Cottage City, in 1879, to be set off from Edgartown, he was induced, in the autumn of that year, mainly for the purpose of obtaining a reconsideration of the decision of the legislature and of using his influence as a senator to secure the incorporation which had been, as he confidently believed, unjustly denied, to accept a nomination to the state senate. of his persistent efforts, the bill was again favorably reported, and on the 17th of February, 1880, Cottage City became an independent town. He was a member of the senate in 1880 and 1881, and in both years was a member of the committees on railroads and on education. His superior qualifications for an efficient performance of his duties on the former committee had been brilliantly demonstrated by his valuable service in the management of the various enterprises with which he had been connected, while the deep interest always manifested by him in the public schools peculiarly fitted him for the service which the labors of the latter called on him to render.

While in the senate, his career attracted the attention of the leaders of his party, and they were not long in deciding that he was worthy of high honors. was a critical period in the life of the Republican party. It had been in power in the state since 1857, with the exception of the year 1875, when William Gaston was governor, and elements of dissatisfaction had been gradually gathering, as they inevitably will, during long periods of party control. This dissatisfaction was culminating in Massachusetts in 1882, as it did afterward in the nation in 1884, when Grover Cleveland was chosen president. Benjamin F. Butler was the candidate of the Democratic party for governor, and Samuel W. Bowerman, of Pittsfield, for lieutenant-governor; but with Robert R. Bishop as their candidate in opposition to General Butler, and Oliver Ames in opposition to Mr. Bowerman, the Republicans felt sure of victory. Their hopes were disappointed, and General Butler was chosen. Mr. Bowerman was a popular man, a graduate of Williams College in the class of 1844, had been a representative in 1859, 1867, and 1868, and was an eminent lawyer, conservative in his tastes and wise and cautious in his judgment, and it was believed that he possessed all the political strength and following enjoyed by the Mr. Ames, however, was chosen by a large plurality.

The position in which he was placed as the leader of a Republican executive

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council in the administration of a Democratic governor was a delicate one. As on all previous occasions, however, under every condition he proved himself equal to the difficulties of his office, so acquitting himself, without in any degree abating the assertion of his own convictions and principles, as to secure and enjoy the confidence and respect of his chief. In 1883 he was again chosen lieutenant-governor by a large plurality over his opponent, James S. Grinnell, of Greenfield; in 1884 by an increased plurality over the same opponent; and in 1885 by a larger plurality still, over Henry H. Gilmore, of Cambridge. During the last three years of his service, George D. Robinson, of Chicopee, occupied the executive chair.

The career of Lieutenant-Governor Ames was marked by two events creditable to himself and of great importance to Massachusetts. For many years the state had been embarrassed by financial burdens assumed in aiding the construction of the New York and New England railroad, the Troy and Greenfield railroad, and the Hoosac Tunnel. As he was familiar with railroad values, no man was better fitted to assume the task of relieving the state of these troublesome burdens. Chiefly through his efforts and as the final result of negotiations directed by him, the interest of the state in the New England railroad, amounting to three and a half millions, was sold at the rate of 92.50 per cent., and that in the Troy and Greenfield railroad and Hoosac Tunnel, amounting to seventeen millions, was sold for five millions, although it had been feared that little would be realized. This result was accomplished, so far as the latter was concerned, in the face of serious opposition, and was finally not only acquiesced in, but universally commended.

Of the thirty-two lieutenant-governors who had preceded Lieutenant-Governor Ames, only six had become governor. Samuel Adams, Levi Lincoln, Marcus Morton, William Classin, Thomas Talbot, and John D. Long had alone held both offices. But when the three-year term of Governor Robinson expired, and he declined a reelection, no question was raised as to his successor; Mr. Ames was nominated without opposition, and chosen governor in November, 1886, by a plurality of eight thousand over John F. Andrew, his Democratic opponent, the son of the war governor of Massachusetts. After four years of service as lieutenant-governor, he came to the executive chair with a thorough knowledge of the affairs of the commonwealth and with an exceptional business capacity for their administration.

In November, 1887, Governor Ames was re-elected by a plurality of seventeen thousand over Henry B. Lovering, of Lynn, his Democratic opponent. In his inaugural address in January, 1888, he again brought to the attention of the legislature the subject of an addition to the state house, and made many recommendations

of the wisest and most practical character. There had been some political agitation concerning private and parochial schools, and suggestions had been made that they should be placed under state supervision. He met this agitation by advising such legislation concerning the public schools as should make their superiority over all others a conclusive check to the growth of private instruction. The calling in of savings bank books at stated periods for examination and comparison and the transfer of the settlement of claims against the state from the legislature to the superior court were among the recommendations included in his inaugural address and adopted by the legislature. Two special messages were sent to the legislature during the second year of his service which exhibited the same courage which was displayed in his veto of the Beverly Farms bill, one containing a veto of a measure appropriating money for the benefit of veteran soldiers in the town of Acton, and the other a veto of a measure giving an annual bounty to the Massachusetts State Firemen's Both of these bounties touched the sensibilities of bodies of men clannish and influential, but he did not hesitate to declare that the measures were class legislation, and on that account could not receive his signature.

In 1888 he was for the third time chosen governor by a plurality of twentyeight thousand over William E. Russell, his Democratic opponent. In his inaugural address of 1889, one of his most important and practical suggestions was the entire separation of savings banks from national banks. In some towns the same officers controlled both institutions, and it had in some instances proved easy for the assets of one bank to be transferred to the other to meet the requirements of official ex-This was one of the many illustrations of his business keenness to discover defects in our system of government which only need to be mentioned to be appreciated and corrected. At this inauguration he again for the third time brought the necessity of an enlargement of the state house to the attention of the legislature, and in response to his recommendation plans were adopted, and the sum of two million, five hundred thousand dollars was appropriated to carry on the work. By his appointment, John D. Long, William Endicott, Jr., and Benjamin D. Whitcomb were made construction commissioners, and under their direction, without a taint of political manipulation or corrupt dealings so often characterizing public enterprises, the work intrusted to their hands was faithfully, industriously, and conscientiously administered. It was with great satisfaction that on the 21st of December, 1889, in the last month of his official term, Governor Ames laid the corner-stone of the addition to the state house. On that occasion he said: "It is nearly a hundred years since Governor Samuel Adams, assisted by Grand Master

Paul Revere, laid upon land bought by the town of Boston, of the heirs of John Hancock, and conveyed by the town to the state, the corner-stone of our state house. Thus were three names, illustrious in our Revolutionary annals, associated with this event."

In June, 1888, the health of Governor Ames began to fail under the burdens imposed upon him by his official duties and his personal affairs. Though never afterward well, he in no degree, however, permitted his physical condition to abate his interest in the welfare of the state. On his retirement from office in January, 1890, the expressions of approval of his administration were both universal and sincere, and he returned to private life with every reason to congratulate himself that the exacting labors of a public servant had been performed with the entire approval of those whom he served.

After his retirement he sought rest and recreation in a visit to Europe, which was repeated in the summer of 1894. He gradually loosened the ties which bound him to business, and with his winter house in Boston and his summer house at North Easton he enjoyed the comforts and pleasures which he had earned in an active and useful life. His estate at North Easton contained about one hundred and twenty acres, with gardens and lawns and ponds, overlooked by the stone mansion in which he had gathered, with judgment and taste, works of art collected during his visits abroad. His taste for art, which he had early cultivated, was one of his marked characteristics, and he spent much time at home and abroad intelligently studying the works of distinguished artists and builders. While in Europe he never tired of visiting galleries containing pictures of the old masters, and his criticisms were always well conceived and just.

In the company of books he found an absorbing pleasure, and to the library which he had begun to collect in his early age he made in later years large additions of rare and valuable volumes. He was fond of poetry and felt great interest in the works of American poets. He took special pride in several books of poems sent to him by John G. Whittier, accompanied by friendly letters and containing the author's autograph. He lingered at his North Easton home late into the autumn, enjoying the scenery about him, busy in adding to it new features of beauty, and always ready with hospitable hand to greet the visitor to his home. The rich and poor, those of exalted and humble station, all of every degree, were here welcomed with open doors and words of friendly interest.

His interest in arboriculture was absorbing, and the groups of trees on his estate, all planted by his own hand, contain one hundred varieties, among which

is a fern-leaf beech which was the object of his special pride and admiration of every cultivated eye. Nor did he limit the exercise of his taste in this direction to his own grounds. The highways of Easton abound with trees of his planting, whose grateful shade is a constant reminder of the town's thoughtful benefactor. His deep interest in his native town and its people never ceased. The public spirit and generous liberality which had been prominent features in the character of his father were in a large measure conspicuous in him.

In 1888 Governor Ames began making an annual donation of two thousand dollars to the town, for the purpose of planting shade trees along the highways, this gift being conditioned upon the addition to it by the town each year of a sum equal to fifty cents on each poll. But his most memorable benefaction and one which stands as a monument to mark his interest in the highest welfare of his town is the high school house in North Easton, built at a cost of seventy thousand dollars, but not completely finished at the time of his death. It was dedicated December 12, 1896.

During the seven years which succeeded the failure of his health in 1888, his life was a continued struggle against disease. He endured suffering, not only without complaint, but with heroic courage. Hopeful at first of recovery, he at last became convinced that the heart which throbbed so long with sympathy and love was inevitably losing its life-giving power, and that his end was not far off. When finally the hand of death beckoned him he yielded without a murmur, and on the morning of the 22d of October, 1895, surrendered his life.

Married in Nantucket, Massachusetts, March 14, 1860, Anna Coffin Ray, daughter of Obed S. Ray, who was the first and only instructor of Navigation on the Island of Nantucket, and Anna Way (Joy) Ray, and a descendant of Tristram Coffin (1605–1681), of Norwich, England; and of Admiral Sir Isaac Coffin, Baronet, who was of the fifth generation in descent from the immigrant, Tristram Coffin, Senior, his father being Nathaniel Coffin, a graduate of Harvard College in 1744. Admiral Sir Isaac Coffin, Baronet, was born in Boston, May 16, 1759, in a gambrel-roofed wooden structure that fifty years ago was moved from its original site, at Beach Street and Oxford Place, to its present location on Harrison Avenue near Kneeland Street, where the building is used for manufacturing purposes. He entered the British navy, under the patronage of Sir John Montague, in 1773, at the early age of fourteen. In 1778 he was promoted to a lieutenancy; while as commander he served in "the splendid battle" of April 12, 1782, when the British fleet under Admiral Rodney, off the Island of Dominique in the West Indies, captured the French admiral, De

Grasse, and his fleet. In 1804 this native Bostonian was promoted to the grade of rear admiral in King George's navy, and he was raised to the dignity of a baronet the same year. In 1808 he became a vice admiral, and in 1814 he attained the highest rank in the service, that of full admiral. He had a record of thirty-one transatlantic trips, which in those days of sailing craft and long passages was much more remarkable than at the present time. He made several visits to his native land after his retirement and was well received wherever he went, Boston and Nantucket being the localities that were most frequently honored with his presence. died at Cheltenham, England, in 1839, in his eightieth year. Mrs. Ames is also a descendant of Edward Starbuck (1604-1690), of Derbyshire, England; of Thomas and Robert Barnard, of Salisbury, Massachusetts Bay colony, and settled in Nantucket; of James Skiffe, of Sandwich, Plymouth colony; of Edward Freeman, Saugus, 1635; of Peter Folger, from Norwich, England, 1635, to Martha's Vineyard; of Richard Swain, of Rowley, Massachusetts Bay colony, 1635; of Elias Maverick, Charlestown, Massachusetts Bay colony, 1632; of Christopher Hussey, Newberry, Massachusetts Bay colony, 1659, and of Damaris Shattuck, widow, Salem, Massachusetts Bay colony, 1641; of John Trott, whose daughter Mary married Edward Cartwright; of Thomas Joy, who married Joan Gallop; of Thomas Gardner and Margaret Fryer; of Richard Austin and Abigail Batchelder; of John Hussey; of William Bunker. Anna Coffin Ray was adopted by William Hadwen, of Nantucket. On her marriage to Oliver Ames, they established a home in North Easton, Massachusetts, where their six children were born. Mrs. Ames became cheerfully interested in the civic affairs of the town of North Easton, and especially manifested intense concern in the welfare of boys and girls. She built a gymnasium fitted up for the pleasure, comfort, and healthful recreation of both boys and girls. She organized and sustained among the boys an excellent band, which furnished music on all suitable occasions, induced the school board to add to the course in the high school stenography and typewriting, for which purpose she furnished the typewriters. charities have been prudently distributed after personal investigation, and she has sought rather to "lend a hand" than to encourage mendicancy, and in this way has elevated the surroundings of the working class, encouraged their ambition to institute in their homes better methods of domestic economy, in their varied employments ambition to earn better wages, and use the surplus to add to the comforts of home life, and to their amusements such as would improve at once their mental, moral, physical, and social well-being. Her position in the community is that of a "Big Sister" rather than that of a "Lady Bountiful."

FREDERICK LOTHROP AMES, only son of Oliver Ames and Sarah (Lothrop) Ames, was born in Easton, Bristol county, Massachusetts, June 8, 1835. His mother, Sarah (Lothrop) Ames, was the only daughter of Howard and Sally (Williams) Lothrop, of Easton, and sister of George Van Ness Lothrop (1817–1897), LL.D., United States minister to Russia, 1885–88, and of Edwin H. Lothrop, of Kalamazoo, Michigan, and a descendant of Mark Lothrop (the founder of the family in America), of Salem, Duxbury, and Bridgewater, previous to 1660.1

Frederick Lothrop Ames was prepared for college at the Academy in Concord, Massachusetts, and at Phillips Academy, Exeter, New Hampshire. He entered the Sophomore class of Harvard College in 1851, when only sixteen years of age, and graduated in 1854. He was inclined to take up the study of law, but deferring to the wishes of his father, he took his place as a clerk in the office of Oliver Ames and Sons, at North Easton, Massachusetts, of which firm his father was a partner. He remained an employee of that firm up to 1863, when he was made a partner, and in 1876, when the firm was reorganized as a corporation, he was made treasurer, and he continued to hold that position up to the time of his death. His interest in the larger fields of corporate undertakings never overshadowed his obligations to the house in which he was brought up and so closely identified before he reached his majority.



He joined in conserving the interests of the Union Pacific Railway, promoted and completed by his father and uncle, and, on the death of his father, he not only became the head of the North Easton iron and steel industry, but one of the principal owners and directors of the Union Pacific Railway company. The growth of the branches and feeders of this great artery of commerce was largely of his inception, and they grew to their full capacity under his nourishing care until their mileage exceeded by many thousands of miles the distance traversed by the original Union Pacific, the pioneer of all the great trans-continental railroads of the world.

His other enterprises, besides the three-score-and-ten railroad corporations of which he was a director and officer, included water-transportation routes, loan and trust companies, and banking institutions in Boston, Chicago, New York, and other cities. At home he was president of the First National Bank of Easton and of the North Easton Savings Bank. The directorships and offices he held in these various corporations were accepted after their financial standing had been carefully inspected, and only after he had made himself familiar with the details and transactions of each. His remarkable memory and quick business instinct greatly aided him in keeping informed as to the stability and conduct of the business of each corporation.

He was president of the Home for Incurables, a trustee of the Children's Hospital, of the Massachusetts General Hospital, of the McLean Insane Asylum, and of the Kindergarten for the Blind. He was also a director of the Museum of Fine Arts of Boston, and a fellow of the corporation of Harvard University, 1888–93, having been elected to succeed to the vacancy caused by the resignation of Francis Parkman, the historian. His associates in the corporation at that time were Charles W. Eliot, president; John Quincy Adams, William C. Endicott, Alexander Agassiz, Martin Brimmer, Edward W. Hooper, treasurer, and Henry P. Walcott, who, in 1890, succeeded Alexander Agassiz. He was a liberal financial supporter of the Arnold Arboretum and of the Botanical department of Harvard University, and his repeated benefactions greatly extended the usefulness of that department. He was a loyal son of the university and was continuously devising liberal plans for its benefit, the consummation of which was cut off by his untimely death.

As a horticulturist he not only assisted in supporting the important public gardens of the Arnold Arboretum, but on his own estate he erected extensive houses for propagating rare exotics, and his collection of orchids gathered at home and in foreign lands was unsurpassed in variety and value by that of any other private collector in the world. His active membership in the Massachusetts Horticultural Society enriched the annual exhibitions of the society, held in their hall in Boston, with the

best examples from his country home at North Easton, one of the most beautiful estates in New England, and he was for many years the vice-president of the society and a member of the finance committee. He was also for many years a trustee of the Massachusetts Society for the promotion of Agriculture.

In the direction of architecture he was also a leader, and he wisely called to his aid the unsurpassed knowledge of the art of which H. H. Richardson was master. The latter, who was the architect of Trinity church, Boston, designed for Mr. Ames the Public Library at North Easton, built and endowed according to the bequest of his father; the rustic gate lodge on his estate, built of massive moss-covered boulders; the beautiful store at Bedford and Kingston streets, destroyed in the great fire; the railroad station at North Easton, erected at his private expense, and the stately office building on Court and Washington streets, Boston (built by Shepley, Rutan, and Collidge), fine examples of the product of two minds intent on producing the best examples in architecture.

He was a liberal and discerning patron of fine arts, and splendid examples from the productions of Troyon, Millet, Rousseau, Corot, Diaz, and Daubigny, owned by him, with two portraits by Rembrandt, 1632, were frequently exhibited on the walls of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. After his death the two Rembrandt portraits became, by gift from Mrs. Ames, the property of the museum. He also collected valuable tapestries, jades, and crystals.

He was elected by the Republican party a member of the Massachusetts senate in 1872, and finding public life uncongenial, he declined further political preferment. He was an active member of the society of the Unity church (Unitarian) of North Easton and of the First church in Boston. He was a man of strict integrity, sound judgment, and possessed a strong and cultivated intellect and a self-poised, self-respecting, vigorous character. He was conversant with and interested in all the great questions of the day, had decided literary and intellectual tastes, and was a lover of the beautiful in nature and art. The Colonial Society of Massachusetts, of which he was a member, prepared in 1894 a "Memoir," written by Leverett Saltonstall, which the society printed for private distribution.

Died September 13, 1893.

HOBART AMES, eldest son and second child of Oakes Angier Ames and Catherine (Hobart) Ames, was born in North Easton, Massachusetts, August 21, 1865. His education, acquired at Adams Academy, Quincy, Massachusetts; Phillips Academy, Andover, Massachusetts, and a commercial school, was directed to his early choice of a business life, in the line of his family as manufacturers, and he took his place in the shops of Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation, and became conversant with the actual working of the processes employed in the various departments. His business talents have been recognized in all the corporations with which he has become associated as a stockholder. When it was decided to enlarge the business of the Ames Corporation by purchasing plants in various parts of the country, Mr. Ames displayed managerial ability of a high order in outlining and consummating the various plans which resulted, in August, 1901, in the organization of the Ames Shovel and Tool Company, with a capital of five millions of dollars. Of this corporation, Since the death of his father, in 1899, he has been Mr. Ames was elected president. president of the Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation. He is also president of the Ames Shovel and Tool Company of Texas, of T. Rowland's Sons, Incorporated, of the Wright Shovel Company, the H. M. In 1904 he assumed the management of the Castle Square Theatre, Boston, and continued in this management up to 1908, when he became director of the New Theatre, New York City, and until its close directed this theatre. Believing that there was a field for the production of a certain class of plays which required different housing than that afforded by any of the existing theatres, Mr. Ames planned and constructed, in 1911, the Little Theatre, which has become the recognized home of a distinctive class of theatrical performances.

Early in life he went to work in the shops to learn the details of the manufacture of iron into tools. He passed from the shops an expert machinist and went into the counting room as secretary of the Ames Shovel and Tool Company, and as a director in this and its various subsidiary companies, including the Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation, the T. Rowland's Sons, Incorporated, the Easton Investment Company, the H. M. Myers Company, and the Wright Shovel Company, of which he was secretary. He was also president and director of the American Pneumatic Service Company, a corporation with a capital of twenty million dollars, organized for the transportation of mail matter by the various post-offices of the world, the subsidiaries being the Chicago Postal-Pneumatic Service Company, the Boston Pneumatic Transit Company, the Chicago Postal Pneumatic Tube Company, the St. Louis Pneumatic Tube Company, the New York Pneumatic Service Company, the New York Mail and Newspaper Transit Company, and the South Side Plantation Company (New Orleans). OAKES AMES, youngest child of Oliver Ames and Anna Coffin (Ray) Ames, was born in North Easton, Massachusetts, September 26, 1874. He was prepared for college at Hopkinson's School in Boston, and was graduated at Harvard University, A.B., 1898. He received his Master of Arts degree in 1899. He remained at Harvard as assistant in botany, 1898, and in 1900 was made full instructor, serving 1900-10. In the closing year of his instructorship he gave a full course of lectures on economic In 1898, he was appointed Assistant Director of the Botanic Garden of Harvard University, of which George Lincoln Goodale was Director, and in 1909 was appointed Director, Professor Goodale having resigned. In 1915 he was called on to give the lectures on tropical botany in the School of Tropical Medicine of the Harvard Medical School. His high standing as a botanist secured for him fellowship in the Linnean Society of London, in the American Association for the Advancement of Science, in the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Boston, and in the New York Academy of Sciences; membership in the Society of American Naturalists, in the American Forestry Association; in the National Institute of Social Sciences, in recognition of distinction attained as a scientist; in the American Breeders' Association; in the New England Botanical Club, in the Massachusetts Horticultural Society, in which society he served on the board of trustees, and as vice-president, in the Boston Society of Natural History, in the Biological Society of Washington, in the Association Internationale des Botanistes, Sullivant Moss Society, and American Fern Society. He has written numerous papers for botanical periodicals and books dealing with orchids, among these being A New Species of Habenaria from Cuba (1903); Contributions to Our Knowledge of the Orchid Flora of Florida (1904); Additions to the Orchid Flora of Florida (1904); Three New Orchid Species (1904); Notes on Orchids New to Florida (1906); Descriptions of New Species of Acoridium from the Philippines (1906); Orchidaceæ Halconenses (1907); Notes on Philippine Orchids, with Descriptions of New Species (1909–13); Orchidaceæ Novæ et Criticæ Insularum Philippinarum (1912), etc., and the first five volumes of an exhaustive serial work

entitled "ORCHIDACEÆ." For the purpose of studying the chief groups of the Orchidaceæ from living specimens, he cultivated at North Easton the most varied collection of orchids, from a botanical viewpoint, that has ever been brought together in the United States. This collection, after it had served its purpose, was presented to the New York Botanical Garden. Through world-wide relationships with other botanists and with public museums and gardens, he has brought together one of the largest and one of the most important collections of critically determined species of orchids in existence. Connected with this collection is a working library, which in its special field is the most complete in America.

In 1905, he was actively engaged in critical botanical work for the Bureau of Science of Manila, a work which he has continued to the present time. Through his published papers, in which are described more than three hundred species new to science, he has become the recognized authority on the orchid flora of the Philippine Islands. In the revision of Gray's New Manual of Botany, he rewrote the pages devoted to the orchids of the territory covered by that manual. Contributions are also to be found in volumes 21–23 of American Gardening and in Bailey's Cyclopedia of American Horticulture.

For a short time after his graduation from Harvard University, he was seriously engaged in the factories of the Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation at North Easton, Massachusetts, learning through manual labor the details of the manufacture of shovels.

He was a member of Battery A, Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, 1895–98. He is a member of the school board of Easton, and served as chairman of the board for three terms; and a member of the corporation of the North Easton Savings Bank. In 1915 he was elected chairman of the Campaign Committee of the Massachusetts Men's League for Woman Suffrage. He is a member of the Algonquin, Boston Athletic, Massachusetts Automobile, and Boston Art clubs.

Married, in Lowell, Massachusetts, May 15, 1900, Blanche Ames, daughter of Adelbert and Blanche (Butler) Ames, and granddaughter of General B. F. OLIVER AMES, second son and third child of Frederick Lothrop Ames and Rebecca Caroline (Blair) Ames, was born in North Easton, October 21, 1864. was educated at Adams Academy, Quincy, and Noble School, Boston, where he prepared for Harvard University, from which he was graduated in 1886. graduation he made a tour around the world, and upon his return became associated with his father's business enterprises, particularly with the Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation. Later, when it was considered advisable to extend the business by purchasing various other shovel-manufacturing companies, he was an important factor in planning the combination which resulted in the organization of the Ames Shovel and Tool Company, of which he became a director, and which superseded the Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation. The Ames Shovel and Tool Company is now the largest producer of shovels in the world, owning the following manufacturing corporations: Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation, North Easton, Massachusetts; T. Rowland's Sons, Incorporated, Cheltenham, Pennsylvania; George Griffiths Company, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; The H. M. Myers Company, Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania; Wright Shovel Company, Anderson, Indiana; St. Louis Shovel Company.

FREDERICK LOTHROP AMES, third son and fifth child of Frederick Lothrop Ames and Rebecca Caroline (Blair) Ames, was born in North Easton, July 23, 1876. He was educated at the Groton School and at Harvard University, from which he was graduated in 1898.

Since leaving college, Mr. Ames has devoted a great deal of his time to agriculture. The Guernsey cattle of his estate "Longwater Farms" in North Easton, are famous throughout the country. By his methods of breeding, he has produced cows that have made remarkable records, and his intelligent work has greatly advanced the popularity of the Guernsey breed in the United States. Although deeply interested in farming, Mr. Ames is equally active in other directions. JOHN STANLEY AMES, sixth child and fourth son of Frederick Lothrop Ames and Rebecca Caroline (Blair) Ames, was born in North Easton, February 15, 1878. He was educated at the Hopkinson School and Harvard University, from which he was graduated in 1901. Thereafter he made a tour around the world, and this tour was supplemented by extensive traveling throughout the United States and Alaska. For a time he was an employee in the office of Oliver Ames and Sons Corporation.

He has always been interested in forestry, and took a supplementary course in forestry in the Harvard University School of Forestry, from which he was graduated in 1910 with the degree of M.F. He passed the civil service examination for the United States Forest Service, and from August, 1910, to March, 1911, acted as forest assistant, investigating the management of the white pine forests in New England and New York. The lands for the Harvard School of Forestry in Petersham, Massachusetts,—a tract of about two thousand acres in extent,—were given by him to Harvard University. This tract of land is used as a field of instruction, the school being located there for six months of each year.



ancient family of that name, which remains in Norfolk and Somersetshire, and was born in the year 1576. He was educated at Christ Church College in Cambridge, under the famous Mr. William Perkins, who died in 1602; from whom, probably, imbibing some Calvinistical tenets, he became afterwards very distinguishable for maintaining the same; inasmuch that he gave some disgust to certain persons in that University while he resided there Fellow of the College aforesaid. One instance of this is given us by Dr. Fuller, who informs us, "That about the year 1610-11, this Mr. Ames, preaching at St. Mary's, or, to use his own expression, having the place of a Watchman for an hour in the Tower of the University, took occasion to inveigh against the liberty taken at that time; especially in those colleges which had Lords of Misrule, a Pagan relique; which, he said, as Polydore Vergil has observed, remains only in England. Hence he proceeded to condemn all playing at cards and dice; affirming, that the latter in all ages was accounted the device of the Devil; and that as God invented the one and twenty letters, whereof he made the Bible, the Devil, saith an author, found out the one and twenty spots on the dice; that Canon Law forbade the use thereof, seeing, Inventio Diaboli, nulla consuetudine potest validari. His sermon gave much offence to many of his auditors; the rather because in him there was a concurrence of much Nonconformity; insomuch that

to prevent an expulsion from Dr. Val. Cary, the Master, he fairly forsook the College, which proved unto him neither loss nor disgrace; being, not long after, by the States of Friesland, chosen Professor of their University." It may not be improbable, that upon the rigour with which Archbishop Bancroft pressed Conformity on the Puritans for their separation from the Church, many learned men of them retired into the Low Countries; where English churches were erected after the Presbyterian model, and maintained by the States according to the treaty with Queen Elizabeth, as the French and Dutch churches were in England. But that "the reverend and learned Dr. William Ames, one of the most acute controversial writers of his age," as a late author styles him, settled with the English Church at the Hague before that Archbishop's death; or as he writes more expressly in another place, that he fled from the persecution of that Archbishop, and became Minister of the English Church there, does not strictly sort with chronology; because the Archbishop appears by his monumental inscription to have died some months before that sermon above was preached by Mr. Ames at St. Mary's. And Bayle says he published his book in favor of Puritanism the same year in England. It might not, however, be long after that he went to the Hague; for, in 1613, his dispute with Grevinchovins, Minister of Rotterdam, appeared in print. From thence, we are told, he was invited by the States of Friesland to the Divinity Chair in the University of Franeker, which he filled with universal reputation for many years. He was at the Synod of Dort in 1618, and informed King James' Ambassador, from time to time, of the debates of that assembly. After he had been at least twelve years in the Doctor's Chair at Francker, he resigned his Professorship, and accepted an invitation to the English congregation at Rotterdam, the air of Franeker being too sharp for him, who was troubled with such a difficulty of breathing that he concluded every winter would be his last. Besides, he was desirous of preaching to his own countrymen, which he had disused for many years. He held many public disputes, published many learned books, and was a very popular man in all this time; but as his writings were published abroad, and it is difficult to come at the first editions, so as to mention them distinctly, according to the course of publication, we shall cast them in a note together at the latter end. Upon his removal to Rotterdam, he wrote his Fresh Suit against Ceremonies, but lived not to publish it himself; for his constitution was so shattered, that the air of Holland did him no service, upon which he determined to remove to New England; but his asthma returning, at the beginning of the winter, put an end to his life at Rotterdam, where he was buried on the fourteenth of November, N.S. 1633. In the spring following,

his wife and children embarked for New England, and carried with them his valuable library of books, which was a rich treasure to that country at that time. He was a very learned Divine, concludes my last cited author; a strict Calvinist in doctrine, and of the persuasion of the Independents, with regard to the subordination and power of Classes and Synods. The same year he died, his Fresh Suit against Ceremonies was published, we suppose at Rotterdam, for no place is mentioned. The editor informs us that "with the coming forth of this book into the light, the learned and famous author, Dr. Ames, left the light, or darkness rather, of this world. And though his name, in this controversy, was hitherto concealed, yet that which was generally but imagined before (that the Reply, and this Fresh Suit, to Dr. Burgess's Rejoinder, were his work), is now certainly known to be his. It pleads truth succinctly and perspicuously, as indeed his vein in all his writings and discourses did most admirably lead him to do. Concluding, that he shewed himself a pattern of holiness, a burning and shining light, a lamp of learning and arts, a champion for truth, especially while he was, for the space of twelve years at least, in the Doctor's Chair at Francker," etc. After this advertisement follows a copper print of him, in a little black silk cap, thin piqued beard, ruff about his neck, and a cloak over his shoulder. The inscription round it mentions him to be fifty-seven years of age in the year of his death. On the back of this picture is a testimony by S. O., asserting "that the Doctor's books are famous in all Europe; upon which many have come to him out of Hungary, Poland, Prussia, and Flanders, to be educated; as sundry students in our own land can testify: and I myself, and divers others have heard them affirm, they would not have stayed there, but for the liking they had of him." Of these works, there is also in this book a catalogue; which, because short and imperfect, we shall, in a note below, enlarge; and conclude with mentioning two or three authors more of the name, to prevent their being confounded with him. One of them, named also William Ames, was a Divine and publisher of some tracts; but, indeed, later in time; he was a Master of Arts, and in 1651, preached a sermon before the Lord Mayor of London, John Kendrick, which was soon after printed. Whether this was son of the former, we are not positive; nor whether he was the same with that William Ames, who was a Quaker, at Amsterdam, and publisher of many books; from 1657 to 1677 and after; fourteen of which, written in Dutch, may be more particularly seen in the author who has taken the pains to preserve their titles.1 Another of this surname was Edward Ames, styled Bishop of Cork and Ross, and author of two sermons called the Prot-

estant Peacemaker; with a Postscript or Notes on Mr. Baxter's, and some other late writings for peace, 4to, Lond. 1682. But that he was Bishop of the said See at the date of that work does not clearly appear in the succession of Irish Bishops; for Dr. Edward Wetenhall is said to have held the same, from 1678 to the year 1699, and then was succeeded by Dr. Dive Downes.


