BRICK WALL BUSTERS CONTEST

It began in 1975 when I decided to organize our family photos. Many which had come from my grandfathers house and the rest were ones we had filed away over the years. Once I had them done I put them away. One night in 1977 I decided to look through some of these albums. I came to one I had put together on my great grandfather, J. P.(John Pius) Gutzweiler and his family. He had married Ellen Frances Brock and they had three girls. Marie, my grandmother, and her sisters Edith and Elsie. They also had two girls from Ellen's previous marriage to Fisher Alvin Ames. They were Addie and Eva. As I turned the pages I came to great aunt Addie's obituary. There it told of her passing and family mentioning my great aunts Edith and Elsie as her sisters. It noted that she was an active member of the Unity Church, The Mission Canyon chapter of the DAR and the California Chapter of the Mayflower Descendants.

It was the last item about the Mayflower Descendants that peaked my curiosity. Could it be that I have this line also? I asked my dad where I might be able to find out more on Aunt Addie and he told me to write to her daughter, my cousin Ellen Frances Merrow in Santa Barbara. And so I did. Cousin Ellen called and said that I was descended from one of the passengers on the Mayflower as we go through the Ames family that links us to that time. She sent me a copy of Aunt Addie's preliminary application which showed a line back to Francis Cooke. It had the address of the California Society so I wrote and sent a copy of this line to them and requested information on how one could become a member.

I received a reply back that informed me that the line on which my great aunt had entered was no longer an acceptable line. Frances Cooke had a daughter Jane who had married Experience Mitchell. The line presented went through the last Mitchell child Hannah. It had been shown through the will of Experience Mitchell and the death date of Jane Cooke that Hannah could not be her daughter. That and in his will he referred to his wife Mary(Parentage unknown). The State historian Edith Bates(Edie) Thomas did note that with the information I sent her she could see I had the same line as her husband through the first child of Jane and Experience Mitchell, Elizabeth who ,married John Washburn. This was a good line. Preliminary papers were drawn up and they informed me they had proof of lines from Francis Cooke down to my Bezar Ames and Lucy Goodnough. I just had to come up with the proofs from myself back to Bezar and Lucy.

At this time I knew nothing about genealogical societies and was told to check out a reputable genealogist who resides back east to help out. First I contacted Alicia Crane Williams who for a very short time corresponded with me until she agreed to take on the publication of the Mayflower Descendant that was being revived after about a forty year lapse. She told me she would not have time to do genealogy professionally any more as her time would be taken up with this publication. She gave me a list of genealogists in the area of which I selected and wrote to Roger D. Joslyn and requested his help in locating some information.

With information I had received from my cousin Ellen(a book by Faber K. Ames on his Ames family), I was able to trace my line back to Diana Crehore Ames who married Ephraim Brock. What I was unable to locate is where Diana was born and obtain the information about her birth and parents. This

was my Brick Wall!!.

Ellen Frances Brock, daughter of Diana Crehore Ames and Ephraim Brock had first Married Fisher Alvin Ames. Fisher was Diana's brother(born 1845). Ellen was born in 1855. Ellen and Fisher were Addie and Eva's parents. Addie's records all went through Fisher and not Diana, So, I had to prove Diana's parentage.

In around 1980 I received information that I had an Ames Cousin in Connecticut and wrote to him about my Ames line. Clarence Gilbert Ames was kind enough to send me a couple charts he made copies of on the Ames family. One took the Ames line down about 5 or 6 generations. The other chart had Bezar and Lucy and showed they had 10 children, most of whom died young. It surprised me as it had the Gutzweiler information on it which I thought I only had. I dashed off a copy to the State Historian and they replied it could not be accepted as this was not documented by a professional genealogist. It was drawn up by the family. And of course my question was how would the people back east know of my grandmother and her sisters and their birth dates. No matter they need more documentation.

I continued my correspondence with Mr. Joslyn requesting he continue working on this problem and checking out any ideas he might have that could locate some proof. In early 1983 I wrote him having wondered about Diana Crehore Ames. Cousin Ellen informed me Diana Crehore Ames has been names after her Aunt and Uncle. Diana Ames(Bezar's sister) and John Crehore who married Diana Ames. Since my Diana was named after her Aunt and Uncle I wondered if there might be like a favored status here where my Diana would have been mentioned in her Aunt's will. It was a long shot since my Diana had died in 1873 in an cholera epidemic in Nashville, Tennessee and they did not have any records locally or at state noting her death. This was a common occurrence during epidemics where deaths went unrecorded. Diana Crehore died in 1886 so Mr. Joslyn said he would check it out when he got to the records office.

In a couple of weeks I received a thick envelope from Mr. Joslyn and inside was the probate record of Diana (Ames) Crehore, Aunt of My Diana Crehore (Ames) Brock. The document listed as relatives (she had no children) all her nieces, nephews, grand nieces and grand nephews as well as any siblings that were still alive when the document was drawn up. It did not list my Diana Crehore (Ames) Brock, But did list "Ellen F. Ames", wife of Fisher Alvin Ames. We already had proof the Ellen Frances Brock married first Fisher Alvin Ames, her uncle, therefore we had the proof I needed.

I submitted this to the California Historian, Edie Thomas, and they approved my application and sent it on to Plymouth where the General Society approved it. I was elected to membership in the California Society in November 1983 at the Board of Assistants Meeting of the State Society. A couple years later I found a second line and received my supplemental from the society. Both lines are to Francis Cooke

A little side note to this story is that my great Aunts Edith and Elsie use to tell friends when they had company and spoke of the family, that they were blue bloods. It had been said that the Ames were of royal birth. Though I have never found a link in the Ames line to the royal lines I feel the Mayflower is our American Royal line and in the process vindicated my great aunts.

So the point of this story in relation to brick walls is do not overlook the siblings of a family. There

may be one or two that may have the pride of ones family to list everything a genealogist would want to know and give answers or clues to the answers you seek. It took me six years but the information was out there just waiting to be found.

With help from my cousin Ellen Frances Merrow of Santa Barbara and a Cousin Genealogist Roger D. Joslyn, we worked on this line. In 1981 Cousin Ellen's Husband D Merrow helped submit my

application for the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). It was accepted. In 1983 I transferred to the Orange County Chapter so I could become involved, as D had entered me into the Santa Barbara Chapter. In 1983 I was finally able to prove my line to the satisfaction of the Mayflower Society and was accepted as a member. I am descended from Francis Cooke. In 1997 I returned to the Blauer Family Reunion in Muscatine, Iowa.

The Chapter has won several awards from our Parade participation. These include the Huntington Beach July 4th Parade, The Strawberry Festival Parade (Garden Grove), and the Patriots Day Parade (Laguna Beach). With the deletion of details from the by-laws, I then sat down and wrote up a Policies & Procedures Manual detailing the responsibilities and duties of each of the officers. This to make it easier for when a new person takes over a given office, he will be aware of what he is to do.

I attended the Fall Board of Managers Meeting in November 2003 and took notes. I presented them to members of our chapter at our meeting so they could find out what the meeting was like. A copy was sent by our chapter Secretary (Shadwick) to the State Secretary (Jacobs) who then in turn sent them to the Executive Vice-President (Henderson) who contacted our chapter Secretary and requested my presence at the Annual State Meeting in Chico (April 2004) to take notes. I did this and made my report to Secretary Shadwick who disbursed them to various officers in the State. I attended the Fall Board of Managers Meeting in November 2004 and will be sent my report to Secretary Shadwick upon its completion. It was determined that for many years the State Society minutes from their meetings was the job of the Historian. I was asked to take on this post since I have been doing the notes the last three meetings and have been nominated to be on the April 2005 Slate for State office.



BLAUER FAMILY AND BUSINESS IN ORANGE COUNTY

Frederick Christian Blauer was born August 31, 1873, in Wapello, Iowa. The second of the five children of Fred and Juliana Elizabeth Brownnawell Blauer, Fred was raised on a farm like his father and grandfather had been in Grindelwald, SWITZERLAND. The family had come over in 1862, and settled in Sweetland (now Muscatine), Iowa.

Fred's father settled on a farm south of Tingley, Iowa. Here Fred and his brothers, William and John, and sister, Edith May, grew up farming. A younger sister, Mabel (Emma) died young. William operated a nearby farm with his family, while Fred and John managed the Tingley farm and Edith kept house.

Fred met his first wife, Harriet Inez Coate, while attending Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa. It was at Simpson's that Fred's enthusiasm for sports became evident. This enjoyment would remain with him for the better part of his life. Fred and Harriet were married on August 31, 1895, in a small country church at Grant Center in Grant Township. The wedding was at high noon and the reception was held at her home where a chicken dinner (with all the trimmings) was served to the assembled guests. Their honeymoon was a two week camping trip. Unfortunately, it rained the whole time.

Fred and Harriet set up house in Mt. Ayr, Iowa, where his uncle John had a large farm of Polish China pigs. Fred worked in a store owned by his uncle and Mr. Snedaker. After two years here, Fred and Harriet moved to Shannon City, Iowa, where he and Harriet's brother had a small variety store. This was an unsuccessful venture and they moved to Des Moines where Fred was produce manager in a downtown grocery store. Later, Fred joined the real estate firm of Mr. William Arnold. It was here in Des Moines that Fred and Harriet attended Grace Church. Fred was very active, serving as church treasurer, became involved in the Epworth League and many other activities of the church.

On July 22, 1906, a daughter, Marjorie Idylene Blauer was born to Fred and Harriet.

In about 1908, Fred made an exploratory visit to Southern California. Here he looked for a place where he could go into business and raise a family.

In the late fall of 1911, Fred and family moved to Santa Ana, California. They set up house at 1315 (later 1317) Spurgeon Street. Fred became a clerk at Hill and Conway Grocery. Hugh Hill was the husband of Harriet's cousin. In 1913, Fred bought out Mr. Conway's share and it became Hill and Blauer Grocery.

In 1914, sadness struck with the death of Harriet. Fred continued in the grocery business. It was some time between Harriet's death and 1917, that Fred took to seeing Miss Marie Diana Gutzweiler.

In 1900, John Pius Gutzweiler, his wife, Ellen Frances (Brock), and daughters, Marie, Edith Rose and Elsie Marguerite, moved to Santa Ana. They had previously resided in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where the girls were born, and then to Pasadena for a few months before making the move to Santa Ana. J. P. became associated in 1900, with Rafferty Florist, the first florist in Santa Ana, and eventually became foreman and manager.

On June 28, 1917, F. C. Blauer took Marie Diana Gutzweiler as his wife. The wedding was held at the home of the bride in the corner of her mother's bedroom. Marie had been taking care of her bedridden mother for six years. Marie had attended Santa Ana's public and high schools and went on to attend nursing school in Los Angeles. She returned home to work at the Santa Ana Community Hospital.

Following the wedding, Fred and Marie spent their honeymoon in Laguna Beach. The following year (1918), Fred bought out Hugh Hill's share in the store and it became known as Blauer's Grocery. It was located at 208 West Fourth Street in the basement of the Spurgeon Building. Fred was the first tenant in the newly built structure.

In 1920, the first son to this union was born - Frederick Christian Blauer, Jr. In 1922, their second son, John Winthrop Blauer was born. Earlier, in 1922, Santa Ana's first Auto Camp, a predecessor of the motel, opened with six cabins at 2535 North Main Street, south of the Santiago Creek Bridge. Rates were fifty cents a day, which included a cabin, cooking gas, water and a restroom. The Grocery and gas pump were owned by F. C. Blauer and

operated by Percy Getils.

On August 14, 1922, F. C. was the central figure in an article in the Santa Ana Daily Register, "Local Grocer Tells How To Stay Young -- Work Hard and Play Hard." He was very involved in the Santa Ana First Methodist Church; was one of the promoters of the successful YMCA building drive in the 1920's; helped establish the city's first softball league and raised funds for summer night play. This opened the way for sports to develop in Santa Ana and F. C. Blauer was appointed a member of the Santa Ana Night Ball Commission. It was this commission that promoted league and later, All-Star competition, both at Santa Ana High School and Lincoln Park. Later the game shifted to the Santa Ana Bowl.

F. C. Blauer always had an entry from Blauer's Grocery in the city softball league. Members of his teams included Horace Snow, Bill Cole, Eny Wilcox, Luther Babcock and Ed Leavitt Daley. There were overhead lights for night play and admission was ten cents.

Fred was a charter member of the Santa Ana Kiwanis Club, a member of the Elks Lodge, and one member of the committee to select the Boy Scout Camp in the San Bernadino Mountains.

In 1928 and 1929, Fred expanded his grocery into chinaware and other crockery.

Sadness struck on September 19, 1928, when Fred's dear Marie, age 38, passed away. She had been operated on only two weeks earlier, but cancer in those days was untreatable. Because of the expense for hospital care, Fred was forced to sell his Laguna Beach house to the William Spurgeon Co. It was here that Grandma Spurgeon would live. It was here at this house that the Blauer family spent many a wonderful outing.

F. C. Blauer vacated the Spurgeon Building in late 1928, and on February 2, 1929, the Santa Ana Book Store opened after extensive remodeling. F. C. then moved to 425 North Sycamore and 116 West Fifth street. With the fall of the stock market in late 1929, F. C. Blauer incurred large financial losses. This forced him to sell out his business by 1932-33.

Though his main business was the grocery and chinaware, Fred also dabbled in the nursery business at this store, His first license was taken out in 1920. With the closing of the store Fred was able to devote his full time and energies to Blauer's Nursery.

On September 20, 1930, Fred's daughter Marjorie married Charles Herold Goddard. They would reside in Santa Ana where the wedding took place. Fred, his two sons, and Marjorie's best friend, Mary Beasley, drove to All Saints' Episcopal Church were the ceremony was performed.

All of Fred's children attended Santa Ana public schools. By the time the boys graduated from high school and spent some time at the local college, World War II broke out and they joined the Navy. They served both here in the States as well as in Hawaii. Upon their return from the war, the nursery at 1317 Spurgeon Street and 1320 French Street became known as F. C. Blauer and Sons.

During the 1930's, Fred was blessed with three grandchildren by his daughter, Marjorie; Michael born February 14, 1932, William born April 20, 1934, and Patricia born December 9, 1936.

They would give Fred nine great grandchildren, four from Mike and his wife, Doris; two from Bill and first wife Virginia, and three from Patty and her husband, Bob. Fred Jr., who had married during the war to Aletha Joyce Crawford gave Fred two more grandchildren, Frederick Christian Blauer III born January 13, 1947 and Loa Christina Blauer, born January 15, 1945. They gave six great grandchildren to Fred, three each. On July 10, 1949, John Winthrop Blauer married Anna Pauline Kalbus. Marjorie and Herold made their home in San Bernadino. Fred and Aletha made their home in Tustin. In 1950, John and Ann purchased a home in rural Orange County. In a few years it was annexed by the city of Newport Beach. On February 8, 1951, John W. Blauer, Jr. was born, grandchild number seven. On July 20, 1952, the last of Fred's grandchildren, James Freeman Blauer, was born. To this date only John Jr. has added any great grandchildren to the list -- three!!

On March 15, 1959, Frederick Christian Blauer, age 85, passed away peacefully in his sleep. His enlarged heart, from years of physical activity and community service, finally gave out. Blauer's Nursery, known for it service to the Santa Ana community, had lost its patriarch and founder. Fred Jr. and John continued the family business giving the same quality merchandise and service they had been doing since World War II.

On the evening of April 30, 1961, Fred Jr. suffered a major heart attack that took his life. He was 41 years old. John proceeded to take the reins of Blauer's Nursery and in 1963-64 decided that due to insufficient parking around the residential area of Spurgeon and French Street a move was in order.

Blauer's Nursery relocated at 1622 South Bristol. A ten year contract to lease the property from the Bristol Street

Baptist Church was agreed to and the nursery took its residence across from Mater Dei High School. During the span of 1966-1973, John's son, Jim helped him out on weekends and during the summer at the nursery. Son John Jr. would join in at Christmas time to help sell Christmas trees.

In 1973, the church decided that with the lease coming up for renewal, it want to double the rent that it was receiving. This price could not be met. The church permitted the nursery to remain at the same rate on a monthly basis. During the spring, Green Thumb International Nursery came to terms with the church and purchased the property for \$100,000 cash. In June 1973, Blauer's Nursery closed its doors for the last time.

For 62 years the Blauer family served the Santa Ana community, 53 of which was geared to the horticultural needs. This included free delivery service and always willing to part with any knowledge that might be of help to the customer. Today an apartment complex sits on the site where F. C. Blauer lived and had his nursery at 1317 Spurgeon Street and 1420 French Street. It was here customers would not only come to shop for their gardening needs but also to see and be delighted by the parakeets and one of five monkeys that were there over the years. They also came to see the beautiful gold fish Fred stocked in the pond that was once used as a swimming pool by Fred's children and their friends.

James Blauer, the author of this article, continues the Blauer Family Horticultural tradition today as manager of the Costa Mesa, California, K-Mart Store's Garden Shop.

When she was about seven years old she was taken into a preachers home in Bridgewater, Iowa to take care of the children. She was returned to the orphanage at about eight years old. Her best friend was Gwendolyn Moran and they ran away to the downtown area. A family took them in, but the officials came and took them back to the orphanage. They were both whipped - and this was not the first time, it was a regular occurrence. Sounds like these were very tough times for girls in the orphanages.

When Vivian was about 10 years old she went to live with John and Dolly Blauer on a farm near Tingley, Iowa. Lots of hard work. She rode a horse to country school and took her eighth grade exam in Mt. Ayr, Iowa. She then attended high school in Tingley. Upon graduation at 16 years of age, she went into nurses training at Creston, Iowa. She received her cap in 1924.

On July 10, 1925, she was married to Elmo Vernon Breese by a Justice of the Peace in Marysville, Missouri. They lived in Creston and Elmo worked for Armour and Co. He was transferred to Fremont, Nebraska where their first daughter was born on May 4, 1926. They named her after the two grandmothers: Lois Belle. Right after this happy event. Elmo and family were transferred to Guthrie Center. Iowa where he was laid off.

The family moved back to Creston and in 1927 Vivian was reunited with her brothers. Vivian baked angel food cakes to help with the living expenses. The depression was very hard on everyone during this time.

In 1941 they moved to Omaha, Nebraska where Vivian worked at various Omaha area hospitals. Elmo continued to drive for Omaha Cold Storage until his death in 1958.

After being widowed. Vivian did several things. She moved to a new neighborhood and went to New York to train as an electrolysist. She put her new skills to work at Kilpatrick's and was there until retirement in 1972. In the meantime, she met and married James Maranto in 1964. They were married in the First Methodist Church in Omaha. In 1967 Vivian moved into the Maranto home. She and Jim shared a love of dancing and their 13 years of wintering in Texas. She was widowed again in 1985.



His residence is one of the best in his township, and is surrounded by evergreens and shade trees planted by his own hands. Mr. Blauer landed in America entirely without means. His parents helped him at different times, giving him in all about \$500, and when he came to Ringgold County he brought with him a capital of about \$5,000. By his energy and good business qualities he is rapidly moving to the front rank of Southern lowa's dairymen and stock-raisers. Mr and Mrs. Blauer, and their four eldest children, are members of the Presbyterian. Mr. Blauer was ordained an elder in the Congregational church, in Grand View, when he was twenty-lour


