Sixty two pins higher.

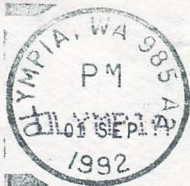
We have Marie's eighteen year

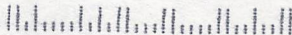

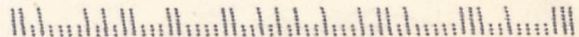

I do keep in touch with John, by phone.

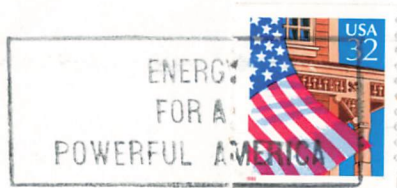
He does have worries with heart problems.

HOLIDAY GREETINGS 1998

Dear Family & Friends,

Well it has been another busy year for me and my family. I continue to be active in my genealogical pursuits. I didn't realize it until after our August Genealogical Society(OCCGS) meeting, where we celebrated the society's 35th Anniversary, but I have been working our sales table for over 11 years(since 1987)!!! Except for maybe two times I was able to attend all of the OCCGS meetings this year.

January 3rd I attended OCCGS and January 10th my SAR(Sons of the American Revolution) meetings. During the week of January 12th I was on Vacation. On the 14th I had Jury duty. During Jury selection for a case I was asked several questions concerning doctors and back problems. As the afternoon was getting late I was excused by the defense attorney and my Jury service was complete. On the 17th I flew up to Oakland to attend the State Board of Assistants Meeting of our State Mayflower Society. I got to see our State Library, which has a wonderful collection of books on New England and Pilgrim Research. It was just a one day trip up and back, but enjoyed it none the less. On January 28th I attended the Memorial Services for friend, SAR Compatriot and former Governor of my Mayflower Colony, Jim Emerson, who had passed away in December. I was honored to be asked to sing "Amazing Grace" by his family and pleased to do so. I received some very nice compliments following the service.

In February I had OCCGS on the 7th and SAR on the 14th. On the 22nd along with members of my SAR Orange County Chapter, I attended the morning church service honoring George Washington and the afternoon Massing of the Colors at Forest Lawn in Burbank. Due to poor weather conditions we did the Massing in the auditorium. Several of our chapter were Color Guards in Uniform of the Revolutionary Period. I was asked to do the National Anthem and was pleased to accept the honor. On February 28th we held our first Mayflower Colony meeting of the Year.

May is one of my busiest months. I had to work on the 2nd so I missed my OCCGS meeting. On the 9th I had my SAR meeting. I took my Vacation from the 14th-20th so I could attend our State Mayflower meeting in San Diego on the 15th & 16th. I was asked to be a part of one of the vignettes and sang several songs for the Friday night entertainment. I did the National Anthem on Saturday at our afternoon banquet. On the 23rd my SAR chapter participated in the Garden Grove Strawberry Festival Parade. We all wore our Revolutionary War uniforms and had our antique auto. On the 25th we had our annual Memorial Day services held at the Old Santa Ana Cemetery. My SAR Chapter presented our colors and I laid a wreath on behalf of the chapter. On the 30th we had five members of my SAR Compatriots who attended dedication ceremonies of 8 new memorials at the Civic Center Walk of Honor in Santa Ana. These Memorials were dedicated to the 8 Orange countians who had recieved the Congressional Medal of Honor. Several of the honorees were there. Family members accepted for those who were no longer with us. A very special occassion.

On the 8th several of my SAR members and their wives & I went out to attend the Riverside Chapter meeting. On the 12th we held our 5th Annual Constitution Day Luncheon. We had Ben Franklin, Patrick Henry, Thomas Jefferson, Abigail Adams and Louisa May Alcott. It went very well and was our best effort for this event yet.

On September 20th my family received a treat with a full day visit from my Aunt Marjorie(Dad's sister) and her son Bill and his wife Marla. We had a Bar-B-Q lunch at the house of hamburgers and my lemon pie and talk about the family and my work on the family tree. I even showed cousin Bill how I could print out a chart for him from the records in the computer. That evening after my brother and his wife and kids had returned from several soccer games we went to their place in Huntington Beach. Here Aunt Marjorie got reacquainted with Jr. and finally got to meet his wife Kathy and the grand nephews(Rob & Chad) and grandniece(Shannon) for the first time. We had dinner there before our family had to return to San Bernardino. We had a wonderful time.

On the 26th our Mayflower Colony hosted the State Board of Assistants meeting followed by our own colony meeting and lunch. We had 73 attend. It was my first meeting as governor. We had a rocky start due to the small space allocated for our group. When we got there the room was only set up for 60 people and no room for our Gift Tablet set up. Warren & Betty Warner of the Santa Barbara Colony were kind enough to help us set up our merchandise in their room. This worked out very well and we did good business.

October was slow. I had OCCGS on the third and did an afternoon workshop on Huguenot research and ancestry. On the 10th I had our SAR Meeting. This month was also when I have my annual testing with my cardiologist. Everything is looking good.

On Nov.7th had my OCCGS meeting, the 14th my SAR and the 21st was my Mayflower Compact Day Luncheon. I took the previous week off before the Compact Day Luncheon to try and finish as much of our colony history as possible. At this luncheon I was the speaker. I did a slide presentation on the **Historical Sites and Landmarks of Plymouth, Massachusetts**. It went over very well. Our Web master hopes to put it and a presentation I did a couple years ago on **The Mayflower House** on our web site.

Thanksgiving was once again held at my brothers home, where the Blauers and Lynches gathered. We had our own mini Jam session. I sang Bass/Baritone, Sister-in-law Kathy played the piano, Keith, Kathy's brother, played guitar, and Kathy's sister-in-law, Judy sang alto. We had a good time.

As December starts I have been baking for our OCCGS meeting on the 5th. This will not be our usual meeting, but a gathering with some show and tell of personal heirlooms that members have been fortunate enough to possess. Finger foods are the treat of the day. I have been busy baking batches of Fudge Brownies, Neiman Marcus Bars and Oatmeal Scotchies. On the 12th my SAR will hold our 5th Annual Bill of Rights Day Luncheon. Plans for the rest of the month include more baking especially for our pot luck at K-Mart on the 24th. We will be at Jr. & Kathys on the 25th to celebrate Xmas. Otherwise it will be work as usual.

The saddest part about the last year has been the loss of so many friends from work and from my different societies that I belong to. It makes one all the more thankful for those who are still with us and appreciate what we had with those we have lost. Memories are precious!!!

I worked on other projects besides my Mayflower colony history. There was my calendar that the State Society SAR considered for use at the National Convention for 1999 in San Diego, But at the Fall Board of Managers Meeting decided not to use it. So, I guess I will have to find someone else to publish it.

I had a good sweat pea crop this year and have already planted the first of two sections for next spring. I plan to get the other section planted in January when I take my next week off. I replanted some of my daffodils and planted some new azaleas to replace some that had died. I still have a couple more to plant. Our fig crop was fair this year, but will still get a couple of batches of jam from them. I have been freezing my lemon juice for making my lemon pies. One of the things I will be doing a lot of in December.

Jr. & Kathy continue their busy schedules with the kids having some sort of game every weekend. Kathy is working on her Masters in Elementary Education which will lead to a badly needed raise so they can enlarge their kitchen. Jr. continues with the Lifeguard(Marine/Fire Dept.) of Newport Beach.

Dad still goes to Riverside three days a week to take care of things at the Nursery there and when the time comes, to plant my sweat pea seeds and get them started before bringing them home for me to plant. If weather permits he goes down to the beach on Mondays and Fridays. If its warm enough he will go in for a swim, otherwise its a nice walk. He plays his computer games and continually is helping me to figure this machine out.

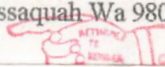

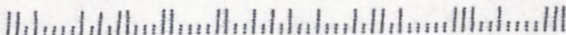

Christmas Greetings 1999

Dear Friends & Family,

Another busy year has passed and yet I still have so much to get done. It seems to never stop and I wouldn't have it any other way. Except, if I were to win the Lottery or Publishers Clearing House. This would mean I could retire and have an extra 40 hours per week to get things done.

I continue with my monthly meetings of our Genealogical Society(OCCGS) and Sons of the American Revolution(SAR) and Mayflower Society meetings.

In January it was OCCGS on the 2nd and SAR on the 9th. I was suppose to have the week of the 10th off for my vacation(1 week), but personnel screwed up so I took the following week (17th) off. On the 23rd I spoke to the California Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society on Quaker Research. With my research of my Aunt Marjorie's lines I found a lot of Quakers so, I have some knowledge in this area.

So we were left without an entry for our SAR Chapter. I decided since I had informed our OCCGS people I would not be able to attend, I would stay home and try to get some stuff done. On the 13th it was the SAR. On the 19th & 20th I went up to Santa Barbara. I stayed with Cousin Ellen and husband D Merrow on Friday. On Saturday we attended the State Board of Assistants meeting and then the regular Santa Barbara Colony meeting and lunch. I had taken up our Gift Table to try and sell stuff, but we did not get the room we were promised so we were unable to display our merchandise properly. We barely made \$100.00. With the State Secretary absent, I was asked to do the honors of taking notes. I did so as I take notes at all the meetings I attend anyway. Got to see many friends I have made from around the State in attending these meetings.

In April it was OCCGS on the 3rd and SAR on the 10th. Due to Inventory at the store and weekend deliveries, I was unable to attend our SAR meeting. But many of my compatriots made it clear that my presence was sorely missed. We had our colony Mayflower Meeting on the 24th, which completed my first year as Governor. The biggest accomplishment of this year was probably the start up of our web site at www.ocmayflower.org.

May was packed. OCCGS was on the 1st. SAR on the 8th. Took my vacation the 13-19 and flew up to Oakland for our State Mayflower Meeting on the 14-15th. On the 22nd we took our Gift Table to San Diego where their colony celebrated their 50th Anniversary. Had to work the 29th as I was unable to get a car for the Strawberry Festival Parade for my SAR Chapter. On the 30th ceremonies were held for Memorial Day at the Civic Center's Walk of Honor. Our President, Larry Magerkurth, and I were in uniform to present the colors from our SAR Chapter and presented a wreath at the Korean Memorial. The next morning upon opening the newspaper(Orange County Register) there on the front page was a photo of Larry and I as we saluted after laying the wreath. It was headlined "A Salute to Veterans". What a kick and in full color!!

In June it was OCCGS on the 5th, SAR on the 12th and on the 19th we held our annual Mayflower Colony picnic in Mission Viejo at the home of June Lazich who is the colony's Assistant Governor. On the 24th I was able to arrange the first meeting of people interested in our homeowners association in several years.

In July I had to forego the OCCGS Meeting and instead attended the National Congress of the SAR in San Diego. The first time held in our state in 20 years. I took vacation time for this. I left on Saturday the 3rd and returned early on Wednesday the 7th. I had a wonderful time and served in the special George Washington Color Guard during the Congress. I attended the business meetings, luncheons and banquets. I had a very good time and experience. It may be the only National Congress I attend of the SAR as they are yearly, expensive and usually back east. Because of this meeting we cancelled our July 10th SAR meeting, but did get together at the home of President Magerkurth to work out the plans for the State SAR meeting our chapter was hosting in November. When my GP phoned and told me he had spoken to my cardiologist and that he was concerned that I may start bleeding on a flight I was taking only two weeks after the surgery, I cancelled the surgery and it has been rescheduled for January 4th.

Feeling things had slowed down in August they were back in the fast lane come September. I had OCCGS on the 4th, I took my vacation on the 9th and flew out to Boston, then got bus and taxi down to Plymouth. Here I would attend the triennial Congress of the Mayflower Society. This means I missed my SAR meeting on the 11th. There was a Juniors and education meetings on the 10th. A Tour of the Adams' homes of Quincey, Mass. on the 11th and dedication of the plaque for the Brewster Islands. There was the Pilgrim's Progress on the 12th with the official opening of Congress. The Meetings began on the 13th and finished on the 14th. That evening we had our banquet and I returned on the 15th. I and several members of my colony transported our medallions, watches and pamphlets which we sold back at the meeting to our members. We made over \$1,700.00 for our colony!! The day before I left on September 8th while riding my bike to work I was hit by a driver. I was taken to the hospital and after tests was released. I am under treatment by my Chiropractor as I am having a slight problem with my neck getting stiff at times. Otherwise I was okay for the flight back east. A bit of a scare though. On the 25th we held our regular colony meeting and on the 26th was our homeowners association block party. This was the first held in several years. As Sec/Treas. I was involved in the planning, set up, breakdown, taking dues and selling raffle tickets. And when I wasn't busy I was trying to get photos of the festivities and have some lunch.

On October 2nd after my OCCGS meeting I attended the wedding of Wendy Shadwick daughter of friends Jim & Sue Shadwick. Jim is also an SAR member of the Orange County Chapter. He and Sue requested that I sing at Wendy's wedding. I did the song "Evergreen" and a terrific reception followed. On the 9th it was SAR once again. On the 19th I met with a neighborhood resident about his application for the SAR and Mayflower and explained to him what was required and gave him the number of our chapter registrar for further help in filing for membership. I worked the last three Saturdays of the month. On the 31st our SAR chapter's Board met at the home of Bill Gage to finalize the plans for the upcoming State meeting our chapter was hosting.

Instead of attending the OCCGS meeting on the 6th of November I was attending the State SAR meeting. I arrived on the 4th and set up the Registration Table in the lobby of the Buena Park Hotel, which I helped man as Head of Registration. Friday the 5th we had a special ceremony that began at the entrance of the hotel. Dressed in colonial uniform and dress, the men of the SAR, Ladies of the State Auxiliary and members of the DAR promenaded over to Independence Hall at Knott's Berry Farm. Here Patrick Henry led us in the Pledge to the Flag after giving the Red Skelton story on it. I sang the National Anthem. There was a photo session with all those in colonial garb. A signing of a proclamation was held inside the Hall. A tree planting ceremony followed outside the back of the Hall. The trees planted were Tulip Poplars from Mt. Vernon and seeds were taken from one of the 8 trees that were around during the time of George Washington. This to honor our first President on during the 200th Anniversary of his death (Dec. 14, 1799). After the planting I led in singing **God Bless America**. 

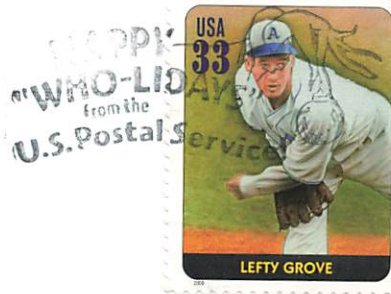

LEE LUPHER BARTRUFF will be 100 years old on November 30. 1894

If you think that time has whizzed by, let her tell you just a few of her adventures, accomplishments and determinations. This is a most unusual lady!

It all began with Lee's birth at the family-country home in southern Iowa in 1894. Her mother's first husband had died at age 27 of yellow fever in New Orleans, where he taught college math. Finding herself with a small boy and a soon-to-be-born daughter, Lee's mother Anna Marie moved to Iowa to be with an aunt and uncle. It was they who introduced her to Gilbert Luper, a prosperous, progressive farmer. Gilbert, a widower, the son of a Pennsylvania carriage-maker, had fought as a cavalryman in the Civil War. He and Anna Marie were later married; Lee was their only child.

Life on the farm was lyrical for Lee: she loved the land, the trees, flowers and animals, and knew them all. She also enjoyed the 16-student country school with its pot-bellied stove. There she received a good foundation for life-long learning. Her favorite thing was a large geography book, with many pictures, which she pored over whenever possible. Her unquenchable love of travel was born!

Sadly, her mother developed cancer, and despite the care of Des Moines' best doctors, died at 36. During her long illness, she and Gilbert agreed that, for the good of the three children, he should sell the farm and move to a place offering good education. So by the time Lee was 12, she was adjusting to Des Moines schools and the loss of all she had loved in the country. (They moved only the piano and organ--everything else was sold.) Gilbert was never again employed; he devoted all his time and caring to his children,

as a good Victorian father. Their home was directly across the street from Drake University.

After having a housekeeper, Lee and her half-sister Elizabeth suggested to their father that they take on those duties. He consented, and thenceforth brought home the needed supplies. The girls cooked, cleaned and ran the household. They were 12 and 15. Lee considers the difficulties an excellent preparation for life's later demands.

At the end of three years the family moved to nearby suburb Highland Park, to a more modern house, this time across from Highland Park College, where Elizabeth eventually studied music. Being near these colleges insured many enjoyable cultural activities. Also the Laphers now had a lovely garden, in which both Lee and her father were very much interested.

Cooking was taught in the 8th grade then, and Lee became one of the top students in her class. (She used the Drake University Library as a resource.) The school principal invited four girls to demonstrate their cooking skills on a central dais in a hall at the Iowa State Fair in Des Moines--one of United States' most famed fairs. Lee was much influenced there by the Director of Demonstrations, an accomplished elegant lady from Iowa State University Extension. Lee won a \$10 prize for her part in the demonstrations and additional writing, so she bought a fine-looking French blue winter coat, being allowed to co-sign her father's check for the additional \$9.

For the ensuing four years, Lee attended the Fair, demonstrating jelly-making and "cold-pack" preservation of food, in the Boys and Girls Club Building. Excited and interested by all she saw, she knew that Iowa State University was where she wished to go. She

convinced her father that this would be the place for her, and he consented, although friends and neighbors thought she should attend a Des Moines college.

Believing there was inadequate knowledge for the maintenance of good health, Lee resolved to study nutrition and become a hospital dietitian. When she finished college, she moved to Los Angeles with her sister and brother-in-law. She interned at Good Samaritan Hospital (without pay) until certified for a government position. However, World War I was over, and no such positions were open. She worked at nearby Clara Barton Hospital for almost a year, but found supervising the preparation of trays a disappointing use of her skills. Her hours were 7 to 7, with the promised "recess" rarely honored. She was so small she had to make her own uniforms. Finally, at the age of 22, she began searching for a new position.

After Practice Teaching in Hermosa Beach schools, she was offered \$95/month to stay, but through a Teachers' Agency she found an opening in Prescott, Arizona, teaching Home Economics. Her three years there were a pleasure. Prescott, once the capitol of Arizona, was very prosperous, with surrounding mines and ranches. Lee rode horseback regularly, enjoying the countryside and her new friends.

From her class she sent a girl to Tucson in May to a competition; she was outstanding, which brought good publicity, and an entry into the national competition. It also brought Lee a raise! Lee's subsequent period of teaching in Phoenix was cut short by her father's fatal illness. She took him, by train, to Los Angeles, where her sister helped with his care. He died of cancer six months later.

Lee's travels began while she lived in Prescott, the first being to Alaska aboard a British ship out of Vancouver. It ran aground near Prince Rupert, but the next high tide floated it free. Then there was a wood-burning paddle-wheeler that had to be hauled over the rapids on the Yukon River. A grizzly bear was swimming there!

There was a trip to Cuba, where she danced with the cadets at their West Point. On her first European trip, with a collegiate group from Quebec, her room-mate was a court reporter.

Lee's next job was in San Diego, where her "wharf-rat" students were really tough. She then taught in the Huntington Park-Bell schools for 15 years, bringing her total teaching years to 24.

Lee married Harry Bartruff, a high school Physical Education director and coach, in 1929. It was a 61-year union of mutual companionship and respect, as well as a shared passion for travel. In 1932 they built their first home, in Pasadena. Ten years later they built again, on a half-acre in Flintridge, enjoying a spectacular view, large rooms and of course a garden. Their third home overlooked Pasadena's Arroyo Seco. Their adventures continued at Leisure World for 10 years before they came to Spring Lake Village.

In 1939 the Bartruffs drove down the International Highway and spent the summer in Mexico. They were never ill, and enjoyed the whole experience.

In 1946 Lee resigned her teaching position, and within a year had a radical mastectomy and radiation, plus a thyroidectomy. Convalescence was very slow.

Harry took a sabbatical in 1950 and the pair spent 10 months touring South and Central America. They traveled on their

own, exploring as their fancy drew them. Peron was in power when they reached Argentina, with paid "demonstrations" in the streets. Visiting Iguazu Falls required a series of boats on La Plata, Parana and Iguazu Rivers; they saw three ^{S. Am.} national capitols en route. In Tierra del Fuego they were so taken with their lakeside quarters that they stretched their 2-day stay to 18! After visiting Chile they took a freighter to Peru, where they stayed a month. Central America was also on their itinerar:

Wherever they went, Harry checked out the sports situation: he played golf in Lima, and in Buenos Aires visited the 18-story Athletics Building (which required a guide!) He also noted the moat around the soccer field...

Returning home, Lee resolved to help bring all the Americas together by tutoring foreign students at the local Junior College. She prepared them for the "Minimum Essential" test for entering regular classes. She enjoyed it so much, she continued for 12 years, including students from many different countries. She always urged her students to take their learning back to their native lands.

1954 found the Bartruffs on a 90-day trip round the world on the U.S. President Polk, touching 26 ports after San Francisco. 10 years later they circled the globe by air, seeing the interior of India, Tibet, the Holy Land, Greece, Japan and the Near East. Zanzibar was being taken over by the Communists (whose gunboats underscored their presence). Bartruffs' guide was also a pilot, luckily; theirs was the last plane out, landing in Dar es Salaam.

Lee's memories of 1958 center on the S.S. Mariposa, which took them to Tahiti. During the celebration of Bastille Day, Lee and Harry followed whichever crowd looked interesting, increasing their list of adventures. One led them to the Governor's mansion, where two huge

Tahitian men presented a pig, chickens and fruit hanging from a pole borne on their shoulders. A pledge of allegiance in Tahitian followed, with the Governor responding in Tahitian. Then dancers from the various islands, gorgeously costumed, competed. The ship proceeded to New Zealand, Australia, Fiji and Samoa before returning home via Honolulu.

Highlights of later trips: a stop in Iceland en route Norway-- thermal heating in the former, the city of Hammerfest in the latter: a strategic area leveled by the Nazis and lovingly rebuilt by its citizens; also a priest's shipboard prayer for clearing weather, whereupon the fog lifted, fjords and waterfalls were admired! A Greek ship out of Trinidad, docking in Algiers and Casablanca. White (!) camels coming into Marakesh with a caravan. The loveliness of Spain.....

After Harry's retirement in 1964, he became Commander of the Veterans of World War I in Palm Desert (where the Bartruffs wintered), and Lee headed the Auxiliary. Blue ribbons were won, funds raised, goals accomplished. Harry became Service Officer, responding to needs presented to him by the veterans. (He remained their interested friend until his death here at Spring Lake Village in 1990.) And while at Leisure World, Lee started a ^{Quilting Group} Center for Abused Children in Orange County which is still operating. - 9 7.20 pm, 11.11.11

Although the Bartruffs had no children of their own, they taught other people's for the grand total of 68 years. (Jack Kepler was one of Harry's students.) They also sponsored three street children, through the Christian Children's Organization, after the Korean War, providing for them until they were ¹⁴18, and writing encouraging letters. They later sponsored three ^{Children}~~brothers~~ from an Untouchable family^{as} in a small Indian village near New Delhi. The children attend a government

school; the older boy, Omsen, now 14, writes with considerable maturity. (His Hindi letters must be translated.) Lee counsels and encourages him.

Lee hopes to be remembered as a teacher, social worker, counselor, lover of children, of nature and the peoples of the world. Spring Lake Villagers cherish her presence.

Spring Lake Residents honored me with a beautiful celebration on my 100th Birthday. I now have a sponsored child Jimmie Richard. 6 yrs old. I have been a recent sponsor of a Cancer Trust fund Center with the most modern technology in Santa Rosa.

Adventures of a lifetime

Elfrieda Martens survived San Francisco's 1906 earthquake, but when asked about the most memorable time during her 101 years, the story of being marooned on an Arctic iceberg for 10 days before rescued by Russian sailors.

Longtime Sonoma County resident Elfrieda Martens has a list of adventures, coming 22 years after experiencing the Great Quake of '06.

As only 7 when she was rocked by her family's Mission District home during one of history's worst earthquakes, at first thinking it was a strong shaking the house. "My life has been an I can tell you," said Martens, talking about her life to a visitor in her Santa Rosa home where she has lived for 40 years. She was born in the last century and lived in grand style through the 20th century. She relishes ushering in the 21st century so her life will have touched centuries and two millennia.

Up in bed and say, "I made it, I made it," Martens said of her plans for mid-2000 New Year's Eve. "I've lived a very

good life. I'm not afraid of dying, but when I say my prayers, I ask God to let me live to the year 2000. That would be something."

She was born Elfrieda Niewerth on Aug. 13, 1898, in San Francisco. Her father was a cooper in San Francisco, crafting wine and whiskey barrels. Her mother, who lived in Sonoma County as a young woman, was a maid to the wife of Anton Korb, one of the Korb brothers who founded Guerneville's Korb Champagne Cellars in 1886. The couple met at the Guerneville winery when the cooper traveled north to build barrels for Korb.

Martens went to business school and became an administrative secretary. She worked in the '30s as the payroll clerk for the Phillips Van Orden Co. in San Francisco, where she was once held at gunpoint by bandits who took \$3,000 in cash from the company's coffers.

"That's when \$3,000 was worth something," she said.

Martens now spends her days reflecting on the high-flying times she had as an adventuress, society maven, career woman and devoted wife to wealthy businessman Hans Martens, a brilliant entrepreneur who developed the gauze tea bag. His success

allowed the couple to travel the world and live a privileged life. They moved to a ranch in Healdsburg in the '40s, relocating to Santa Rosa in 1959.

But it was in 1928 that Martens had the adventure of her life.

Martens had traveled to Europe and set off with two cousins from Germany for a cruise of the Norwegian fjords on the Monte Cervantes. While the vessel was cruising Bell Sound near Spitzbergen, it struck an iceberg and water entered its bulkhead.

Help came when the Russian ice-breaker Krassin responded to the ship's SOS. While water was pumped from the bulkhead, the crew from the Krassin worked 10 days repairing the deep gashes on the forward side of the Monte Cervantes. Passengers were stranded on Spitzbergen, which Martens describes as an ice-covered island at the top of the world.

"Our fresh water supply had run out; we were forced to drink distilled ocean water," Martens recalled.

As she gets ready to mark the century's end, Martens is thankful for the adventures of a lifetime that was never boring. Martens, who lived for excitement, said she could handle anything but boring.

A survivor's memories of simpler times

To Lee Bartruff, a 105-year-old Santa Rosa, the best thing about growing up in the early part of the century was that life was simpler and people helped one another.

The darker side, she said, was the lack of antibiotics, vaccines and other benefits of modern medicine. Children died of diseases such as whooping cough and typhoid.

"Most families lost at least one child. Every illness was dangerous. It was all so tragic," Bartruff said. She survived whooping cough because her parents took turns holding her in a standing position for several days.

"You didn't dare lie down," she said.

She was born in Iowa on Nov. 30, 1894. Her father, Gilbert Lupher, fought in the Civil War, after which he moved to a farm in Iowa where he raised corn and hogs.

"I had a happy life living in the country," Bartruff said.

In the eighth grade, she came up with a list of principles that would guide her life — goals such as honesty, honoring your elders and respecting others.

"I've lived by these rules and they've influenced my whole life," she said.

A star student in high school, Bartruff studied nutrition at Iowa State University. She was a dietitian and home economics teacher for 25 years, spending most of her teaching career in the Los Angeles area.

She and her husband, Harry Bartruff, moved to Santa Rosa 13 years ago, becoming residents of Spring Lake Village, a retirement community affiliated with the Episcopal Church. Harry Bartruff, a retired athletic director in Pasadena, died in 1990 at the age of 92.

Today, Bartruff is Spring Lake Village's goodwill ambassador and guiding light, visiting seniors 20 years younger who are in the village's nursing facility because of failing health.

She attributes her long life to great genes, good nutrition, healthy living and a positive attitude. She learned stress management before the term was invented.

"Long ago I learned to close the wounds," Bartruff said. "You can't fuss and worry. You must channel all that into something positive and uplifting."

Bartruff has had four bouts of cancer, surviving the disease that killed both of her parents. She said modern medicine has allowed her to realize the longevity provided by her genetic blueprint.

She's planning on toasting the dawn of the new Millennium at a New Year's Eve party at Spring Lake Village but isn't certain if she can stay up until midnight.

"I'm looking forward to 2000 because it means I will have lived in three centuries," Bartruff said.

The grand lady of Spring Lake Village loves life but does not fear death.

"So long as I have my mind, I want to live," she said. "So far, my body is still manageable and gets me around."

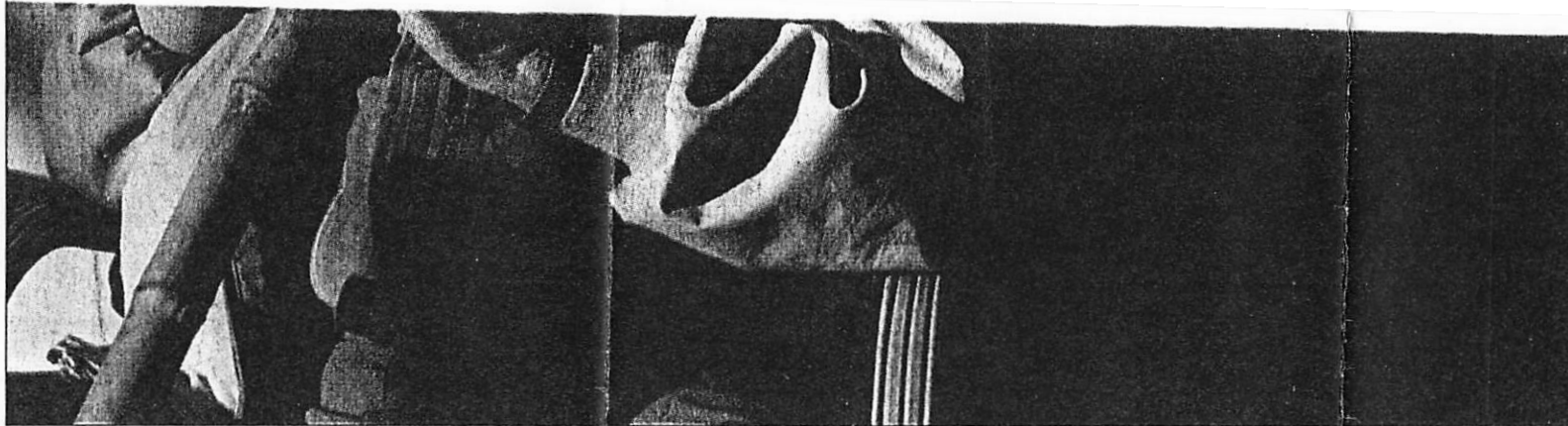

Jim,

I only recently discovered Mathias Brownwell in an attempt to find the correct ancestor of my Philip Grove. He was a very exciting find! Currently, somebody has Philip Grove matched up with what I believe are the wrong Grove's. Thus, when I obtained Philip Grove's "Last Letters", or essentially the final payments of his estate, I happened to come across a portion of payment from the estate of Mathias Brownwell who died in Cumberland County to his grandchildren, the children of Philip Grove. This information was filed in Centre County. It made sense that Mathias Brownwell was Philip's father-in-law as the name Brownell has been passed down in the family as a middle name.

So, since I didn't know what Philip's wife's name was, except assuming that her last name was Brownwell and in trying to locate where Philip came from before he arrived in Centre County to have been counted on the 1810 Census there, I ventured to Cumberland County last Friday.

They have about 20 very fat binders that contain just the indexes of names for all marriages, cemetery records, etc. However, even though I know that Mathias Brownwell died in Cumberland County, I was unable to find any marriage records for Philip and Unknown Brownwell. I was also unable to find any marriage records for Mathias, nor any cemetery records.

I was successful in obtaining a copy of the estate sale of Mathias Brownwell. He appeared to be quite well off for that period of time. However, I was not able to locate a Will. Which seems odd to me, because the document I found in Bellefonte, indicated that there was a true Will. The only clue I was able to obtain from the estate sale was that the following individuals bought items from the estate: John Brownwell, John Brownwell, Jr. and Henry Brownwell. There were notes "against" Henry Brownwell and Elizabeth Grove. This proved to be a little frustrating as well, because somebody had the name of Philip's wife as Catherine Brownell and a 2nd wife of Elizabeth Burd. I have not been able to replicate their sources. Maybe Philip's wife was Elizabeth Brownwell?

Now it does seem that Mathias Brownwell enlisted in the Revolutionary War out of Lancaster County, but here we have to remember that Lancaster County encompassed at one time Dauphin County, Franklin County, Cumberland County and so on. I also know that Mathias Brownwell was in Dauphin County during the 1790 Census. So he must have moved from Dauphin County to Cumberland County.

I did find Mathias' obit:

"American Volunteer Thursday Oct 1, 1829: On Tues. morning last, at an advanced age, Mathias BROWNAWELL, inhabitant of North Middleton Twp."

I think I need to go back to Cumberland County and see if I can dig something more up. Maybe there is a Will filed at the Courthouse that the historical society doesn't have record of . . . Since this name is a new search for me, I didn't realize all the potential spellings of the last name. I searched under Brownell/Brownwell/Brownawell/Brownhill, etc. I never thought to look under variations of Braun????? Maybe looking under it with variations of this spelling I might have more luck.

I've ordered records before from the National Archives, but only on Civil War Veterans. These records have been helpful. Do you happen to know what the National Archive records are like for the Revolutionary War?

By the way, I did happen to see someone's family pedigree that had Mathias Brownwell's father as Gabriel Braunewell.

For lack of a better place to put them, I added them into the notes of Elias Brownawell (his name was among them, plus several others in that family or nearby relations). I was really surprised to find so little. I checked every spelling I had on them and could not find *any* variation of Brownawell before the early 1800's, in the Online Census', even though the information I have indicates they were in the U.S. much longer than that. I'm sure it was just that the internet still doesn't have nearly as much as the libraries and such have.

Tingley (Iowa) Vindicator, April 19: Our entire community was surprised to learn Tuesday of the death of Uncle Fred Blauer, which occurred at 1 a.m., at his home south of Tingley. He had been poorly for some time, but was confined to the house only about a week. He was born at Bern, Switzerland, Jan. 24, 1836, and came to the United States in 1862, landing at New York Dec. 15 of that year. He at once moved on out to Iowa, settling first in Louisa county. Dear Friends & Family,

As you can see I am behind again in getting my annual Christmas Letter out. It is now the 22nd as I write this and I have the day off for baking and writing this letter. Yes, this year I am cheating a bit by sending this out by e-mail. Those who are not on my e-mail list for Christmas will have to wait and won't get this till after the 25th. You will notice that this

year I have tried to do my letter by subject rather than month. Hope it is not too confusing when jumping around the calendar with my events and doings.

It has been another busy year to say the least. This is in great part to the credit of my boss, Al, at Rite Aid who works very hard to arrange it so I can get most of the Saturdays off I need for meetings and a couple during the week once in a while. I in turn do whatever I can for him and the store.

I was able to attend most of the meetings of the Orange County California Genealogical Society (OCCGS) this year. I was asked and was pleased to make out the Certificates for the volunteers who give their time for the Society. There are four categories; those who have worked up to 99 hours, those who worked 100-249 hours, those who worked 250-499 hours and those over 500 hours. I was unable to make the meeting for their presentation but was informed by the President that they were well received. So much so they have asked that I do it again this coming February. We meet the first Saturday of the month unless there is a holiday as will occur this coming January. In that case they move it back a week which causes a problem in that the second Saturday is my SAR(Sons of the American Revolution) meetings. SAR wins out as I am the Recording Secretary. At our OCCGS meeting this month after having helped set up the room and sales table one of the ladies remarked how dead it was in the room. I told her I would take care of that. So I walked up to the front where the microphone was and having made sure it was on I began to sing "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas". They enjoyed it so much they decided to have me do it for the entire group towards the end of the meeting. They enjoyed it I gathered from the applause and one person commented about doing it more often. We'll see what they want to do.

In February I was unable to make the OCCGS Meeting as I attended the State Meeting for the Huguenot Society. I am recording Secretary for them also. The State Meeting is held once a year and usually down here in the south. They are planning to do it in the North next year in an effort to revive the Northern Chapter. The La Rochelle Chapter here in the southern part of the state is fairly active and well attended. Because the chapter has its meetings during the week I am unable to make them due to work.

For my SAR it was a busy year with my fellow compatriots. Besides our regular meetings I performed the National Anthem once again for the George Washington Commemorative Massing of the Colors at Forest Lawn in Burbank, California. This was in February and is always around the weekend nearest George Washington's Birthday. I have been doing this for many years and as long as they will have me and my voice remains in good form I will be happy to continue. There are over 50 Color Guard units from around Southern California and many units from various SAR Chapters in Revolutionary War Uniforms that attend this event.

In November 2003 I had attended the State's Fall Board of Manager's Meeting in Los Angeles and like I always do at meetings I take notes. It is the historian in me that does this as I might want to refer back to something that happened. Anyway I got home and typed up my notes and had them for my chapter meeting the following weekend. Our Chapter Secretary sent my notes to the State Secretary who sent a copy to the State's Executive Vice-President, who would become President in 2004. He sent a request to my chapter Secretary to see if I would be able to attend the Annual State Membership Meeting in April in Chico. I told them I could not afford that kind of money for transportation and room and all. They agreed to help pay for it so I said yes. So my notes were used as the official notes of the meeting and were used in great detail when reported in the California Compatriot, our State Magazine. On November 5 & 6 I attend this years Fall Board of mangers Meeting in Monterey and just got the report finished this last week and mailed out to the State Secretary and Editor of our State Magazine. Recently our State Secretary noticed that for decades the Historian of the State was the one to take the notes. This was discontinued after one man held the post of both Secretary and Historian for some 20 years. They plan to return to that format and have asked me to become the State Historian in April 2005 when elections are held at the State Meeting.

Now I will actually have a title and may get some money from the budget to help with my travel expenses.

In March I appeared once again in the Patriot's Day Parade in Laguna Beach with several of my fellow compatriots and a 1931 Model A deluxe Coupe. We took 3rd place in the Antique Auto Division. As that was the first Saturday I had to miss OCCGS meeting. I also appeared in the 100th running of the Huntington Beach July 4th Parade. All dressed up in our Revolutionary War uniforms. We tried very hard to place an entry in the Tustin Veteran's Day Parade, but they were not able to get back to me with any information until a day or two before the parade and by that time I was unable to do it as I couldn't keep my boss on hold. It was the most disorganized parade as far as informing the participants. As a result our entry was nonexistent in this parade. I was unable to mail out flyers on location of where to go and check in and where we lined up No maps, nothing. The Veteran's putting on this show have no sense of organization and we have been informed the City of Tustin will not foot the bill for it next year, which may be just as well.

In May I was able to attend my High School's Memorial Day Service. I did not wear my Rev. War uniform like last year, yet one of the veteran's recognized me as the one who sang the national Anthem last year and immediately got a hold of the organizers and I did the National Anthem for them again. I also attended the Memorial Day services on the 31st at the Old Santa Ana Cemetery in my Rev. War Uniform. I assisted in the presenting of Colors from our Orange County SAR Chapter as laid a wreath on our behalf.

I continue as Eagle Scout Chairman. Here I conduct the Eagle Scout Scholarship Contest and calligraphy the names of new Eagle Scouts on our Certificates of Recognition. This year I did 536 Certificates for the Eagles in Orange County. This is a new record for one year. When I started in 1989 there were under 300 per year. So far I have calligraphied 5888 certificates for Orange County Eagles and 15 from other districts over the years for a total of 5,903. Seems like a lot but that is over a 15 year period. That averages out to about 32 certificates per month. Of course there are sometimes more and sometimes less.

I also continue as Editor of our chapter newsletter, Muskets & Broadsword. I try, if room permits, to write a historical article about some topic relevant to that given month.

Currently our chapter is working on plans for the 2005 Annual State Meeting we will host here in Orange County. I started collecting stuff for decorations back in 2001 & 2002 when I was at KMart. I am still doing that and am on the decoration Committee with Barbara Magerkurth the wife of our Executive Vice-President Larry Magerkurth. Larry who is a member of our chapter will become State President in 2005 at this meeting, which is why our chapter is hosting. During the Summer I spent a couple weeks after the fourth of July looking for discounted items for use and found some at Michael's, a craft store nearby. I also found a Hook Rug with an American Flag on it and God Bless America. I had not done a hook rug since about 1983, but decided it would make a good raffle item. I bought it took it home and over a period of 2-3 weeks in August I got it completed and presented to our Board as a raffle prize to raise money for the chapter for expenses we might incur for putting on this meeting. Just have to get it framed and I will be set.

My Mayflower Colony cut back this year due to financial problems. Not enough income from our Gift Table and too many expenses at the hotel we used. Besides the meals we had a fee for the room, a fee for the podium and microphone, a fee for the coffee set up a fee for any flags and easels provided for display. Too much outflow and not enough inflow of cash. In 2003 we voted to go from four meetings a year to two. We eliminated the February and September meetings and kept the Annual Meeting in April and the Compact Day Luncheon in November. We also got a new location where we could meet.

In February a bunch of us got together to try out our new home, Marie Callender's in Irvine. They have a nice private room for our group and we only have to pay for the meals. Everyone seemed to enjoy it, so we held

both our April and November meetings there. In April I was reelected to my position as Recording Secretary. Our Compact Day Luncheon in November was so well attended we may have to find a bigger place. We had 70 people come, which made the room a little crowded, but we did it. I made my Turkey cakes for the raffle once again. These are cakes shaped and decorated so they look like a turkey. It has been a tradition since the 1980s.

We were able to take our Gift Table to various colony meetings here in the south. We went out to the Inland Empire area(San Bernardino/Riverside) on February 21st. Two of the ladies from our colony, June Lazich and Donna Cole, and my self were a part of the program also. In April, while I was in Chico with my SAR Compatriots, June Lazich our colony Governor and Deputy Governor South for the State took our table to the San Gabriel Valley Colony Meeting. In May we went down to San Diego on the 15th. The table went to the Los Angeles Colony meeting on June 26th. On October 30 we went up to the Santa Barbara Colony. They want us to return with our table again. Enroute home June, Donna Cole and I stopped by and saw my dear Cousin Ellen Frances Merrow. It was with her help I got into the Mayflower Society. She lost her husband D(Deward) in April, so I was so happy we were able to stop by and see her if only for a short visit.

On the State level of the Mayflower Society I continue as Education Chair and Scholarship Secretary. In the fall I encouraged the various colonies throughout the state to get their local schools to check out the web site created by our National Education Chair Duane Cline. The information at www.rootsweb.com/~mosmd/ is very comprehensive and deals with considerable areas of the history of the Pilgrims. And it's free for use by anyone, including students and teachers. If you were looking for a good site for information on the Pilgrims this would be the first site I would recommend. In June the State awarded 2 scholarships of \$1000 each to deserving students who have a Mayflower connection with the California Society.

These scholarships are all funded by donations to that fund from members. There is no funding from the State, so each year the number we give out is based on the money in the fund. As Scholarship Secretary I have a committee of judges(3) who rate the applications. I tally their totals to come up with a winner or winners. Applications for next year are available and have been sent out to the colonies for distribution to their members.

One of the many groups I belong to is the Society of Colonial Wars. Though they meet several times during the year I am usually only able to make their meeting on the 3rd weekend in January. Which I was able to attend this year. It is called the General Court and they are joined by the Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims(which I also belong to) and the Sons of Liberty Chapter SAR. I had a great time and took a, lot of photos. Though I did take notes I did not type them up or send them to anyone. Just my luck they would want me to be Recording Secretary for them .

Another group I was able to make meetings of is my Sons of Union Veteran's Segwick-Granger Camp 17. We meet on the 3rd Thursday of the odd numbered months. In this group I serve as the Eagle Scout Coordinator(I do the Certificates presented to Eagle Scouts) and Education Instructor. I write articles for our camp newsletter on the Civil War.

This was an interesting year healthwise. Though there were no major illnesses, I now had insurance and could have my sinus surgery done. In July 2003 I lost my sense of smell due to the buildup of polyps in my sinus cavity. This would be my fifth surgery since 1988. I saw the sinus surgeon in January who required a release from my GP. I saw my GP in February, but they would not release me for the surgery until my cardiologist released me for the surgery. So, for the first time in 2 years I had another nuclear test with stress test(treadmill) at my cardiologists office. I had not had one in 2003 as I did not have insurance yet from my new job with Rite Aid and the union. I had the testing on February 20th. I felt fine, but the cardiologist noted a weakness in my hearts pumping action. So on March 10th he did an angiogram. He found all look fine. Everything was open. no clotting, but he still wasn't sure why the weakness. He then decided to do a TEE(they place a tube down my throat and view the heart from the lungs). This was done on April 7th. Still unable to determine the cause he placed me on Altace. This tends to stabilize my heart rate. By June I was finally

given clearance for my sinus surgery.

I called the Surgeon's office and left a message and they were to call me back. At the end of June they still had not called back so I called them. They set a date for Late August. I saw my cardiologist on the 16th and it was a go. They just had to get me off my coumadin and on Lovenox four days prior to the surgery (Aug 26th). Well we ran into a problem with the insurance people. In March when I had the angiogram they approved it within a week. This time it took almost a month. Papers were filled out wrong on the insurance company's end. They finally approved it mid to late September. My appointment was made for October 7th and I finally had my surgery. I can now smell. Mostly concentrated odors. After 5 surgeries I guess there has to be a certain amount of damage that makes it so one cannot smell like they use to. At least I will be able to smell my sweetpeas next year.

Speaking of which, I had another great year. Many died out by early August, but I had two sections that held on until September. Thanks to the shade of the old maple tree that kept them out of the mid day heat. I began planting for next year in September. They are coming along nicely with the warm Santa Ana temperatures we have had lately. Early on we got hit hard by some very cold weather and many have been looking a little piqued. I have planted all but 2 sections in the back corner. I still have 2 more sections to do, but won't get to them for another week or so with the Holidays and all the extra time at work. Dad put up one flat and I did three flats from the seeds I pulled off this year from the pods. I still did not plant all the seeds. I have some left I can use for next fall's planting. Gave one full flat away to friend Judy Swan so she and her daughter can plant them around their homes and have wonderful fresh cut and great smelling flowers next year.

Dad turned 82 in October. He goes out to the nursery in Riverside still. Recently Ron the owner, had surgery on his knees and is busy recuperating so dad only goes up once maybe twice a week to water and check out the plants. When home he continues to spend some time in the afternoons walking along the beach. If it is warm enough he even takes a swim.

John Jr., continues as a Captain with the Life Guard/Fire Department here in Newport Beach. Kathy continues to teach elementary school in Santa Ana. They both keep busy with the schedule of the kids. Robbie turned 19 in September and is in his second year at Orange Coast College and plays on the Baseball team. Chad turned 17 yesterday and is a junior in high school. He is now into baseball also.
