#### Lewis Wiederrecht, Prominent Farmer, Dies

Lewis Wiederrecht, son of George and Salome Wiederrecht, was born in Louisa county, near Grandview, Nov. 12, 1857, and died at the home of his son, Vernon, near Wapello, March 17, 1944, aged 86 years, 4 months, 5 days. During his last illness, which dated from Christmas Day, 1943, a daughter, Mrs. Charles B. Campbell, came from Phoenix, Arizona, to help care for him.

He grew to manhood in this community, attending the rural schools of the early days and becoming skilled through his own efforts and keen mind, in the arts and practises that pertained to his life-long occupation of faming.

On April 29, 1686, he was united in marriage to Miss Kathryn Blauer of Grandview, who preceded him in death on March 19, 1936. Their home was established in Jefferson township, where their four children were born. In 1907, they moved to the farm in Pt. Louisa township, which was his home during the remainder of his life, with the exception of a few years spent in Wapello and a number of winters spent with his daughters in the warmer climate of Phoenix, Ariz.

Early in life, he became a member of Congregational church in Grandview, later transferring his membership to the Grace Methodist church in Wapello. When a Brotherhood Gospel Team was organized in the Wapello churches, he occame an active member, enjoying some of the richest religious experiences of his life through these associations. He rejoiced in the merger of the two Methodist congregations in Wapello and in the completion of the new place of worship.

Although quiet and unassuming, he had the faculty of making and keeping many good friends. He loved his home and family, having the best interests of each one on his heart. He prayed especially for the three of his grandsons who are in the armed services

He was preceded in death by two sisters, Mrs. Henry Lieberknecht and Mrs. George Kreiner and two brothers, George and Fred.

Among the survivors are his four children: James Vernon and Mrs. Walter Morris, of Wapello, and Mrs. Paul E. Lischer and Mrs. Charles B. Campbell of Phoenix Arizona; ten grandchildren, three of whom are in service, Robert Morris, in California; Jimmie Wiederrecht in Corsica and Harlan Wiederrecht in South America; two great grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Sam Schafer of Wapello, a number of nieces and nephews, other relatives and a great host of friends.

menths and 9 days. She came to America with her parents and a large family of brothers and sisters when she was four years of age. Her family reached New York in December, 1862, and came by way of St. Louis to Pt. Louisa and settled in Grandview township. Here she grew to womanhood and on April 28, 1886 was united in marriage with Lewis Wiederrecht of Wapello. They made their new home in Jefferson township and here their four children were born, one son, Vernon, of Wapello, and three daughters, Mrs. Walter Morris also of Wapello, Mrs. Paul Lischer and Mrs. Inez Campbell of Pheonix, Arizona. Beside the husband and children there are ten grandchildren and a numbe: of nieces and nephews who survive.

In 1920 Mr. and Mrs. Wiederrecht moved to Wapello where they resided for a number of years until Mrs. Wiederrecht's failing health caused her to seek relief in a southern climate. During these last years of her life she suffered much physical pain from her affliction of arthritis, but she was always patient and cheerful.

In her girlhood she accepted the Christian faith and united with the German Congregational church of Grandview, but a few years after her marriage transferred her membership to the German M. E. church of Wapello.

By nature she was modest and unassuming, always thinking of the welfare and happiness of others and ready to make any sacrifice of self. This nature caused her to make many

true friends as she went thru life. Even in her last years of sickness she won the love and admiration of many new friends and neighbors. Truly it may be said that her life was one of humble service to her Lord and Saviour and her passing to her eternal reward is God's benediction upon that life.







Bradleigh spent 2 weeks this summer with me here at CRC. He enjoys Family camp and playing with a good buddy.





He enjoyed everything about cars from learning the history behind each and every one to working on them and driving them. Richard enjoyed a lot of things in life and they went hand in hand with each other. Naturally he enjoyed traveling since it would often involve driving, but he enjoyed traveling by other means as well. Boating was something that he always enjoyed through out his life from running on the river and lake in his Woody in his earlier years to the slower pace of his pontoon boats in the former years. And then there was flying which was yet another method of getting from place to place that he really enjoyed because it offered a whole different perspective of the world and looking at the beauty of nature. Richard was a nature lover, he always liked trees and animals, he liked spending time in the timber making trails and burning brush which was just a good excuse to have a cook out with family and friends. In the later years he had an opportunity to do some singing in some of the plays he was in which gave him an opportunity to once again enjoy something that he had enjoyed so much in his school days.

Richard farmed all of his life and lived within a two mile radius of where he started and finished life. Everything about his home and surroundings remained very constant through out his life. Not only did he tread on the same territory for life he lived under the same roof with his only sister for life. He seemed just as content to enjoy other peoples accomplishments as he did his own.

My Great Uncle Richard asked me to write about him and only briefly mention things like his cars. The number one thing he asked me to convey was the importance and value of his faith. Struck and emotionally overwhelmed by the understanding of how simple it really could be he found himself knelled down in the grass crying like a baby, he had come to the point of willing to accept the free gift of salvation for the asking and willingness to receive it. From that day on he had an inner peace and contentment and never again found himself pondering over issues like " have I done enough or have I done it well enough". Now you know where that ear to ear grin really came from as he drove his car around waving at people.

I am sure going to miss my Great Uncle and life long friend but it will only be for a short period of time. He also taught me that all losses that mattered were only temporary and that the choice I made in life would validate that or void it. All of life comes down to saying one of two little words, yes or no and to ignore it implies a response of no.

In closing I wish to point out two very indisputable facts that should stir some serious thoughts in all of us and make us wonder about the claims in the Bible. Every one will pass in time, no exceptions. and we will be deceased for many many more years than we were alive. Doesn't this merit serious thought about what lies beyond the grave. There is one little phrase that we all have heard or used not knowing it actually held the one true secret to all of eternity, "Its not what you know but who you know" Do you know who Jesus Christ is? There is your "million dollar question" another phrase we all know.
