A prosperous agriculturist of Grand View iownship is John F. Walter, who owns one hundred and ninety acres of land upon which he engages in general farming and stock-raising. His birth occurred in the township where he is now residing on the acth of September, 1863, being the eldest son of George and Anna (illauer). Walter.

The fasher is a native of Germany and the mather of Switzerland, and they emigrated from their respective constraints to the United States. They met and were subsequently married in Muscatine county, following which event they located on a farm. From that period until the death of his father Mr. Walter cultivated rented hand, Being the only help he inherized the homestead of his parents, containing fifty acres, upon which he resided until 1876. Disposing of his property at that time he bought two hundred acres of land east of Grand View, which he operated until his retirensed in 1907. When he withdrew from active farming Mr. Waker owned three hundred and thirty-six acres of hand, all of which was well improved and in a good state of cultivation. This he has recently divided among his four sous. Mr. and Mrs. Walter are now registing in Grand View, enjoying in their latter days the case and comfort rewarded them for their hard work and self-denial during their youth. Besides our subject the other members of their family consisted of : George, who passed away on the 8th of December, 1910, at the age of forty one; Marilia, who was eight years of age at the time of her death; Fred, who is an agriculturist of Louisa. county; William, who resides in Letts; Benjamin, who died as the age of two ycars; and one who died in infancy.

Practically the entire life of John F. Walter has been spent in the township where he is now residing, the district schools of which provided him with his education. After acquiring sufficient knowledge of the common branches to enable him to begin his life work, which he had already decided should be farming, he devoted his entire attention to assisting his father with the work of the homestead. At the age of twenty-six years, he began his independent career as an agriculturist by reating land which he cultivated for a year. At the expiration of that time he bought his present homestead, which contains ninety acres located on section 26. During the period of his occupancy he has wrought many interovements in this property, which he has brought too a high

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state of cultivation. He is operating this in connection with the one hundred serves of the old homestead which was presented to him by his father.

Mr. Walter was married February 10, 1890; to Miss Iella Haas, who was born in this county on the 20th of April, 1868. Mrs. Walter's father, the late Peter Hass, was a native of Germany, from which country he emigrated to the United States with his patents when a south of offeren. Mrs. Haas, who prior to her marriage was Emma Judiesch, was born in Switzerland and when a child of five years she was brought to the United States by her parents. Mr. and Mrs. Huge were married in Musicatine county, and logan their connectic life on a rensed farm, in the cultivation of which he was engaged for several years. When they had acquired the necessary capital they bought land in Louisa county, and there the mother, who is now sixty-seven years of age, still resides, but Mr. Haas passed away in April. 1110 at the age of seventy-one years. Their family numbered ten children. Frank, who passed away at the age of twentysix years: Elizabeth, the wire or George Haschar, now living on the old Haas homestead; John, who died when he was siv years of age; Ella, now Mrs. Walsee; Mary, who married William Allon, of Louisa county; George, who is a resident of Louisa county; Emma, the wife of Edwin Klackhaha, of Garner, Jowa; Luin, who became the wife of Herman Lohse, of California; Edward, who is unenarried and living in Grand View; and Eather, who died when she was eightcan vezrs of age.

To Mr. and Mrs. Waiter have been born seven children: Earl, who was born on the gch of February, 1892, and was graduated from Muscatine high school with the class of 1911; Ruth M., born on the 55th of September, 1894, at home; Luiu F., horn on the 70th of February, 1897, and now attending high school; Mildreil L., born on the 70th of October, 1907, and attending the district school; Fisa L., born on the 30th of July, 1903; and Donald K., whose high nominared on the 73th of August, 1906. Their chiest child died in infancy.

In religious faith Mr. and Mrs. Walter are Congregationalists, and fraternally he is a member of the Independent Order of Orde Fellows, being identified with the Grand View lodge. The political views of Mr. Walter coincide with those of the republican party, for whose candidates he always casts his ballot, but he has never had official apprations. Mrs. Jesse Browning passed away in Winfield this week where she was visiting relatives. Her home was in Lone Tree, where she moved with her family from this county some eight or ten years ago. The funeral will be held in that city today conducted by J. R. Hammond.

Losco Lee died last Tuesday at the home of his uncle, J. F. Lee, in Fredonia. He was a man about sixty years of age, and came to Predonia from Davenport about three weeks ago. The cause of his death was dropsy. He leaves two sons, residing in Davenport.

George Walter, Jr., a well known and prominent young farmer residing about a mile east of Grandview, was instantly killed Wednesday morning by a fall of twenty feet from the top of a hay barrack on his farm. No one saw the accident and he was dead when his body was discovered at 7:30 in the morning. Circumstances surrounding the accident, however, lead to the belief that Walter had grabbed a rope which hung from the top of the barrack and attempted to swing himself to the ground with it, when the rope broke letting its human burden fall with such force that Walter's neck was broken and his skull fractured.

His young daughter discovered the body of her father. She screamed and her mother came to the scene. Mrs. Walter believing her husband still alive hastily summoned a physician, but a brother of the dead man who arrived a few minutes later declared that Walter had been dead for several minutes and it is believed that death was instantaneous.

Mr. Walter was about forty years of age. He leaves a wife and three children, besides his aged parents and three brothers. He was a prominent and wellknown resident and his sudden and tragic death has greatly shocked the entire neighborhood.

LOUIS WIEDERRECHT.

Louis Wiederrecht engaged in general farming, is a native son of Louisz county, his birth having here occurred in 1857. His parents were George and Salarne (Sultzbarger) Wiederrecht, natives of Germany, from which country they emigrated to the United States where they were married. They subsequently located upon a farm in Lamba county where they spent the remainder of their lives. Mr. Wiederrecht met with success in his agricultural pursuits and added to his really holdings from time to time until he finally acquired two hundred and seventy-one acres of land, all of which was well improved. Six children were bern unto him and his wife as follows: George: Solome, the deceased wife of Henry Leberknecht; Louis: Elizabeth, wher married George Kreimer: Fred; and Kate, the wife of Samsel Schafer. They are all residents of Louiss munty. The father passed away in April, **1969** the mother's denise having occurred in the preceding autumn

Louis Wiederrecht obtained his education in the district schools of his pative bounty which he attended until he felt that he was fitted to begin business in himself. He then laid aside his text-books and assisted his father with the roltivistion of the fields multil he was twenty-seven years of age. Subsequent to his infirtinge he rented the himiestead which he operated until the death of his father, after which he surchased one humiled and thirty-two acres of land which he cultivated for a year and then sold to his brother. He next hought one hundred and fifty one acres in Port Louisa township which constitutes his parsent housestead. Since first heating here he has added another, fifteen

acres to his holdings, which now aggregate one hundred and sixty-six acres, all of which is well tilled with the exception of fifteen acres of timber on section 18.

On the 20th of April, 1886, was celebrated the marriage of Mr, Wiederrecht and Miss Katle Blazer, a native of Switzerland, from which country she emigrated with her parents when a child of four years. Upon their arrival in the United States they located in Musicatine, but later they bought land in Louisa county. There the parents resided until their retirement from the farm when they removed to Grand View, where they lived with one of their daughters antil called from this life, the father surviving for ten years after the mother had passed away. Eleven children were horn unto Mr. and Mrs. Blauer, six of whom survive: Mrs. Wiederrecht, who is the youngest of those living; Mary, the wife of Charles Pantel; Annie, who married George Walters; and Rosa, who became the write of Jacob Lieberknecht, all natives of Louisa county; Christ, who is a resident of North Dakota; and Maggin, the wife of John Dankert, of Muscative. Those who have passed away are Fred; John, Elizabeth, Ulrich and Susie: Units Mr. and Mrs. Wiederrecht have been born four children: Vertion, whose birth occurred on the 16th of March, 1887, is a member of the class of tort of Cornell College, at Mount Vernon, Iowa : Lola, who was born in 1889, is a gradnate of Cornell, and is now teaching at Greene, Iowa; Mable, Born in 1891, is a graduate of the high school and is now teaching; Incz, born in 1893, will graduale with the class of 1912 from the high school at Wapello, Iewa.

The family are all of the Methodist Episcopal faith, while his political support Mr. Wiederrecht accords the ansihilates of the republican party. Although he has never been an office seeker he served on the school board for two years and as constable for one. He is one of the capable and industrieus farmers of Port Louisa township and his success is the result of honest and well directed effort.



JACOB BEIK,

Jacob Beik, who spent the larger part of his life in this, and was one of the prosperous farmers of Port Louisa township, was born in Germany, in May, 1832. He was a son of Frederick and Sarah (Schneider) Beik, both of whom were natives of Baden, Germany. The family emigrated to America in 1845

and after spending a year near Buffalo, New York, located in Louisa county, lowa, where the father purchased one hundred and eighty-two acres of land, He was a man of good judgment and great industry and applied himself with such diligence that he acquired six hundred and thirty acres of land. He died August 23, 1884, his wife having been called away about two years previously, on December 13, 1882. There were the following children in their family, of whom three sons died within fifteen months: Frederick, who was born in Germany and died in California; Jacob, of this review; Sarah, the widow of a Mr. Benz, of Muscatine, Iowa; Louis, George and Katherine, all deceased.

Jacob Beik came to America with his parents at the age of thirteen and a year later arrived in lowa, where he spent the remainder of his life. He received his education in the public schools of Germany and lowa, continuing with his parents until twenty-seven years of age. He then began farming on his own account and acquired three bundred and twenty acres in Port Louisa township. He devoted his attention especially to stock-feeding and, being a good judge of stock and also understanding thoroughly how to prepare the same for the market so as to receive the highest prices, he was very successful in his business.

On June 18, 1863, Mr. Beik was married to Miss Emma H. Jackson, and to this union six children were born, four of whom survive, namely: Charles, of Port Louisa township; Mollie, the widow of John Hardman, also of Port Louisa township; Frank L.; and John J. The mother of these children died November 12, 1875, and Mr. Beik, was married, August 23, 1877, to Miss Alverda A. Handley, who was born at New Boston, Illinois, March 30, and is a daughter of Eli and Katherine (Denison) Handley, both natives of Indiana. Her parents were married in Mercer county, Illinois, and were among the early settlers of lowa. Her father was a cabinet-maker and followed his trade until his death, which occurred about (896). Her mother died in (857). They were the parents of two children: Alverda A.; and Elizabeth R., the wife of George Weidetecht. of Louisa county. Six children were born to Jacob and Alverda Beik; Finna G., who became the wife of Louis E. Downer, of Muscatine county, Iowa; Katte B., who married II. Schweitzer, Jr., of Grandview; Arthur K., superintendent of the Aurelia (Iowa) high school; Grave E., who is the wife of G. W. Weber, of Columbus Junction, superintendent of the high school; Harold J., a graduate of the Wapello high school, who is still at home; and Paul D., who is also at home and is now attending the high school.

Mr. Belk died on the 18th of May, 1908, leaving many friends as well as his immediate family to mourn his death. He was a sincere believer in the Bible and a consistent member of the Church of God, with which his widow and children are connected. From his boyhood he was unusually active and industrions and he became a self-reliant man, who possessed the ability that would have won success in any honorable calling. He was a lover of his home and many acts of kindness endeared him to those with whom he was associated. As the father of a large family he set an example of patience and persevenue in well doing which his children found embertly worthy of initiation, and thus

nobly he performed his part in life's mission. Mrs. Alverda A, Beik is still living and resides upon the home farm, where she is surrounded by her children and possesses all of the comforts and conveniences that may be desired.

Mr. Lieberknecht gave his political allegiance to the republican party and his fellow townsmen, recognizing his worth and ability, called him to various positions of public trust. He assisted in organizing several school districts of Contord township and was a member of the school board for a number of years. He served as a member of the board of trustees of Grand View township and blocwise held the office of justice of the peace. During the last eleven years of his life he acted as county supervisor, ably discharging the duties devolving upon him in that connection. He died in the faith of the Congregational church on the 30th of June, 1903, and was laid to rest in Grand View centery. The period of his residence in Louisa county covered more than a half century and as he had gained an extensive and favorable acquaintance within its borders, his demise was the occasion of deep and widespread regret. His widow, who still resides on the old homestead, has now attained the age of fifty-eight years. She and her children are also faithful members of the Congregational church.

FRANK L. BEIK.

One of the highly successful farmers and stockmen of Louisa county is Frank L. Beik, who with his brother is engaged in the cultivation of four hundred and ninety-two acres of land in Port Louisa township. Mr. Beik was born in the township where he is now residing on the 25th of June, 1872, and is a son of Jacob and Emma (Jackson) Beik, the father a native of Germany and the mother of Pennsylvania. An extended biographical record of Jacob Beik, deceased, appears on another page of this volume.

The boyhood of Frank L. Beik was spent in a manner very similar to that of other boys of his circumstances in the more sparsely settled communities. He attended the district school during its brief sessions and when not thus engaged assisted about the farm in the performance of such tasks as were assigned by parental authority. He remained a member of the paternal household until be bad attained his majority at which time he began working for himself. The first year he rented land but at the expiration of that period he purchased one hundred and thirty-nine acres on section 12. Fort Louisa township, upon which he continues to reside. Later he and his brother formed a partnership and they now own four hundred and unrety-two acres of well improved land, practically all of which is highly cultivated. As they are extensive feeders of stock their fields are almost entirely devoted to the cultivation of grains which are best adapted for that purpose.

On the r2th of April, (894, Mr. Beik established a home for himself by his marriage to Miss Mollie Kammerer, who was burn in Louisa county December 12, 1873. She is the eldest daughter and second child of J. and Caroline (Charles) Kammerer, natives of Germany from which country they emigrated to the United States in an early day, locating upon a farm in Louisa county which they cultivated until their demise. They were the parents of the follow-

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ing children besides Mrs. Beik; John, who is a resident of Muscatine county; and Harry, Bert, Charley and Otto, all of who are living in this county. The mother passed away September 27, 1885, but the father is still living in Port Louisa township. Unto Mr. and Mrs. Keik have been born five children. Marcus, whose birth occurred June 24, 1895; Eurona C., who was born on the 5th of January, (899; Bertha M., born November 23, 1900; Leona, born July 8, 1907; and Lucille 1, born in January 29, 1911.

The family are all cannest Christians and fraternally Mr. Beik is identified with Grand View Lodge, No. 724, I. O. O. F. 

The end came very quietly and peace. fully at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, only several hours after he was taken to his bed.

Mr. Blauer came to America with his brother, John, and sister, Anna, in 1862, two years before the parents and the other chlidren came. The Blauers lived in the vicinity of Grandview and here the children were reared.

He was united in marriage to Miss Rose Monaway, Muscaline, Iowa, on November 14, 1875. They owned and lived on the farm now owned by John Walter. Here their five childzen were born, four of whom surviv . the father. They are: Ira, of Kettle Falls, Wash.; Mrs. Lydia Recd Arthur and Braie, all of Heaton, N. Dakota.

In the spring of 1887, the family suffered the loss of wife and mother. An infant daughter died at the same time, and mother and daughter were buried together in Grandview cemetery. Perhaps no greater compliment could be paid Mr. Blauer, nor one more descriptive of the man, than to say, that for years he filled the role and did it exceptionally well, of being both father and mother to his children, and rearing them to be citizens of abilility, industry and high character.

In the late 80's he moved from Grandvew to Diagonal, Ringgold county, Iowa, where the family lived till 1899. Then the move was made to the fertile, virgin lands of Wells county, N. D. Mr. Blauer was highly successful in farming and in business and acquired a large body of good land.

When a young man he joined the Congregational church at Grandview While living in Diagonal he attended the Presbyterian church. After moving to Heaton, he was affiliated with the Congregational church there. He has always taken an active part in religious life and was always in regular attendance at the various meetings.

For the past 35 years he has been a member of the Knights of Pythiaz lodge, joining while at Diagonal.

He was a gentleman in every scase of the word; of quiet speech, and mild manners, yet a character 61 force, whose influence was strong and ever on the side of right. He lived to a ripe old age and his life was filled with good deeds. It would seem to those who knew him best, that there would not be a single thing in his life to regret.

His business associates said his word was as good as his bond. He was held in affection by the immediate members of his family, his grand children, his near relativer here, and in highest esteem by friends and neighbors where 'ever he Hved. Some of his friends in Dakota wrote during the last illness solicitous of him and anxious for his recovery.

Mr. Blauer -enjoyed, traveling aud did much of it, even in spite of his advanced years and greatly impaired eyesight. About 17 years ago he went to Switzerland, where he spent some months visiting the scenes of his boyhood and making acquaintance with consins, and old family Irlands OL roos t peare tre tres eled shorter distances, yet he would undertake with confidence and assurance, a railroad journey of 500 or 600 miles. Only last April he went unattended to the state of Washington to visit his son, Ira, and sport the summer there.

Wagner, of Grandview, Beecham, who was employed at the St. James hotel at Davenport, purchased a ticket there Sunday night for Keokuk, where he has an aunt named Mrs. Kate Fry. He should have made direct connections for Keokuk at the Junction, and it is presumed that he failed to get off when the train stopped and finding that he was being carried by, jumped from the train and fell under the wheels of the passenger. The verdict of the inquest simply declared that the victim met his death by being run over by some train.

Beecham's remains were horribly mangled and portions of his body were scattered along the right of way for nearly a quarter of a mile, and one foot was found Monday morning by the side of the track near Cotter, about five miles away. The head was entirely severed from the body. His body was discovered about 1 o'clock in the morning by C. J. Nichols, of the Junction, a young man who was returning home on foot along the railway track from Washington.

Avery Miller, a nephew of Des Moines, arrived Tuesday morning to take charge of the remains. Mr. Miller's mother, Mrs. Amanda Childre, sister of the dead man, was not able to come and his parents, living in Missouri, could not be located. 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JACOB LIEBERKNECHT.

Jacob Lieberknecht, who passed away in Concord township on the 30th of June 1903, was long numbered among the representative residents and prosperous agriculturists of Louisa county, owning four hundred and sixty acres of land at the time of his death. His birth occurred in Pennsylvania on the 30th of August, 1840, his parents being Nicholas and Cathevine (Reihold) Lieberknecht, both of whom were natives of Germany. They emigrated to the United States in 1840 and were matriced in Pennsylvania. Nicholas Lieberknecht worked at the shoemaker's trade until 1841 and devoted the remainder of his life to general agricultural pursuits. About 1850 he came to Iowa, taking up his abode among the

pioneer settlers of Louisa county. In the conduct of his farming interests he won a gratifying measure of success, owning eight bundred acres of valuable land at the time of his demise, which occurred in 1872. His wife was called to her final test in 1901. Unto them were born nine children, as follows: Jacob, of this review; Margaret, the deceased wife of Nicholas Lang, of Muscatine county, Jowa; John, who died when twenty-one years of age; Mary, the deceased wife of Christ Werner, of Louisa county; Henry, William and Louis; all of whom are residents of this county; Benjamin, who passed away when forty-nine years of age; and one who died in infancy.

On attaining his majority Jacob Lieberkpecke started out as an agriculturist on his own account, operating a portion of the old homestead form until the time of his marriage. Following that important event in his life he purchased three hundred and twenty acres of the home place, the property being now in possession of his widow. Subsequently he augmented his holdings by additional purchase and at the time of his demise owned four hundred and sixty acres of well improved land, all under a high state of cultivation except a tract of one hundred and fifty acres of timber land on section 25. Concord township.

On the 23d of December, 1875, Mr. Lieberknecht was united in marriage to Miss Rosina Blaner, a native of Switzerland and a daughter of Frederick and Anna (Rubic) Elauer, who were likewise natives of that country. They crossed the Atlantic to the United States in 1862, settling on a farm near Grand View, Iowa, and operating the same until 1874. In that year MP Blauer disposed of the property and bought a tract of eighty acres west of town, residing thereon until the time of his retirement. Both he and his wife spent their remaining days in the home of our subject, Mr. Blauer passing away on the 4th of May, 1896, while Mrs. Blauer was called to her final rest on Thanksgiving Day, 1880. Their union was blessed with eleven children, namely: 1/rederick, who passed away in Ringgold county, Iowa, when sixty-three years of age; Anna, the wife of George Walter, Sr., of Grand View, Iowa; John, who died in Ringgold county, Iowa. when seveniy-one years of age; Elizabeth, who was the wife of Peter Schmoker and passed away in Louisa county when forty years of age; Christ, who is a resident of North Dakota; Margaret, the wife of John Dankert, of Muscatine, Iowa; Mary, the wife of Charles Pantel, of Louisa county; Susia, the deceased wife of Daniel Anthony, of Keokuk county, Iowa; Mrs. Lieberknecht; Kateina, the wife of Louis Wiedervecht, of Louisa county; and Ulrich, who died in Germany.

Mr. and Mrs. Lieberknecht had seven children, but the two first born died in infancy. Hilton F., whose birth occurred on the 6th of May, (88), wedded Miss Ethel Browning and resides in Louisa county.
