The Petition of Patrick Harrigan
A Native of Ireland

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH,

THAT your Petitioner arrived in the United States of America, to wit:

and that in pursuance of an act of Congress, entitled "An Act to establish a uniform rule of Naturalization, and to repeal the acts heretofore passed on that subject," made a declaration of his intention to become a Citizen, and a report and registry of his nativity, age, allegiance, emigration arrival and in lieu of place of settlement in the United States, conformably to the said Act, before the Clerk of the Court of the District

of *Pennsylvania*

a certificate whereof is hereunto annexed; and that he has resided within the limits, and under the jurisdiction of the United States for five years last past, and for one year last past, within the State of Pennsylvania; that he has never born any hereditary title, or been of any of the orders of nobility in the kingdom whence he came, or elsewhere. He, therefore, prays he may be admitted to become a Citizen of the United States.
