During the Revolutionary War, Valentin Mochel and Valentin 2nd would serve in the Army during winter weather and farm in the other seasons. This is apparently the reason that their names do not appear on any muster role. It is a fact that they never received pay for serving in the Army. One letter sent home by Valetin Mockel, which was lost when the Mogel log home burned about 1916, told of the Army's defeat and retreat from Long Island and how Valentin and Valentin 2nd worked as a team in shooting British officers. One would be reloading while the other was in firing position. The letter indicated that this was the strategy of the troops.

A word of mouth story which is very interesting, is that the women that were left home on the Mogel farm poured lead bullets while the men were away. After the Battle of Trenton a Prussian deserter came to the farm house for food. Upon seeing what the women were doing he asked to help. The Prussian made multiple bullet molds and improved methods. Production increased to such an extent that a letter of commendation was received from Washington's Quartermaster. Unfortunately this letter was burned in the Mogel log house fire.

The original Mogel home was a huge log house which was destroyed by fire about 1916. As the years passed wood sheathing and a type of stucco were added to the sides. One side room had ceiling and walls completely covered with old guns and pistols. Most of the guns had been made by the Mogels. Everything was lost except Grandfather David's Civil War bayonet and a badly melted flintlock which I recovered. I still have the bayonet.

Heinrich (Henry) W. Mogel, a son of Valentin Mochel, 2nd joined the 15th Regiment, Volunteer Troop of Cavalry. The Captain was Samuel Wilson and the unit was the 2nd Div., 2nd Brigade, Bucks Co. Militia which saw service in the War of 1812-1814.

David W. Mogel (Mokle), a son of Heinrich W. Mogel, saw Civil War service at Suffold, Va. He was a member of the 167th Regiment, Company D, Penna. Volunteer Infantry.

Even though David W. Mogel spent most of his service in northern Virginia in the Army of the Potomac, he sometimes found himself elsewhere. The story goes that in June 1863 he and other soldiers were sent on a mission by railroad. These troops were filtered in with units already in position. David W. Mogel found himself with a Michigan outfit at a place later known as the Gettysburg Battlefield. Even though wounded he never received disability. David W. Mogel, like one of his brothers, had a language block and this is the basis for this story which Grandfather David liked to tell. The brother, I forget which one, was a bit of a lady's man. On the first day of the famous battle the brother was in the town of Gettysburg in a young woman's home. He never realized that the rebels were taking the town. Upon leaving, he was spotted. He ducked under the porch but was dug out by bayonet. Because he could not speak English, the rebels. decided that he was foreign mercenary. He was placed against a board fence to be shot by a firing squad. A split second before the fire order, he swung over the fence and got away. Believe it or not!

Oscar A. Mogel, Sr., son of Valentine F. Mogel, who in turn was the son of David W. Mogel, researched the family history. The information from his work verified known family history. However, the most interesting result of his work was that the family has a crest or coat-of-arms which was bestowed on a family for being engaged in the manufacture of metal items (swords) or skilled in the use of the sword. Since the past Mogels were artisans this seems to the more likely reason. The coat-of-arms can be seen on Oscar's headstone at Belleman's Church, Centre Township, Berks County, Pa.

Valentine Mochel moved from the Rhine River country of Western Germany to Alsace. A short time later he emigrated to America from the seaport of Rotterdam (Netherlands) and qualified in the port of Philadelphia, Penna., Aug. 28, 1750. He appears on the list of 337 passengers imported on the ship "Phoenix," John Mason, Master. The Phoenix sailed from Rotterdam, Holland to Philadelphia touching at the Port of Cowes, England.

Valentine Mochel first settled and took up land in a place known as Penns Valley in Perry County, Penna., and also Millheim in Centre County. He found the Indians troublesome and moved to land north of Belleman's Church, Berks County in 1752. A son of Valentine Mochel, John Adam Mochel later returned to Penns Valley.

The following interesting story of Valentine Mochel was passed down. Valentine Mochel was forced to move from the Rhein River Valley to Alsace due to Prussian oppression. While The farming in Alsace he hired a pretty French Housekeeper. Prussians came to Alsace and an officer made improper advances to Valentine Mochel's Housekeeper. In a fair fight Valentine Mochel killed the Prussian Officer, but since Valentine was just a farmer orders were issued that he was to be hung. Valentine Mochel fled to Holland and took passage on the sailing ship the Phoenix. The ship's master, John Mason was ordered to put Valentine Mochel ashore but John Mason set sail as the Phoenix had already cleared the harbor. If this account is true, and there is no reason to the contrary, the Mogels are here by the grace of a hangman's noose.

Valentine Mochel, Valentine 2nd, Heinrich and David were all craftsmen with skills in gun smithing, carpentry, black smithing and mechanics. I recovered from the barn a hand truck completely made of wood including the wheels, a badly rotted percussion pistol and some wooden gear wheels. Also, the frame of the old barn does not have a single nail - it is held together by wooden pegs.

Valentine <u>Mogel</u> took the oaths of Naturalization to become a subject of the Kingdom of Great Britain April 10, 1761 which is signed by Edward Shippen, Jr., "Prothunotary of the Supreme Court of the Province of Pennsylvania."
