- * 1. Balser (Balthaser) Bortner (c1698-1747/8) - m. Maria Elisabetha _____ (c1695-c1750)
Farmer in the Tulpehocken Settlement in Lancaster Co., Pa. (part in Western part of Berks Co. after 1752). Arrived in Philadelphia in September, 1732 on Ship, "Adventure", from Rotterdam, Holland. Came from one of German States in the Rhine River Valley, probably the Palatinate. Common ancestors of almost all of the Bortners, Bordners, and Burtners in the United States. Children: Born in the Old Country: Jacob (Bordner), Anna Maria Barbara (Mrs. Henry Kann), and perhaps, George (although he might have been born in the Tulpehocken Settlement). Born in the Pennsylvania Colony: Peter, Philip Jacob, Phillipina (Mrs. Charles Shaffer, Mrs. Frederick Frasher), (Maria) Elisabetha (Betsey - Mrs. Michael Lau or Low).
2. George (c1732 - c1801) - m. Maria Appalonia Floucher (? - ?)
Son of Balser and Maria Elisabetha Bortner. Possibly born in the Old Country; possibly in the Pennsylvania Colony. Raised in the Tulpehocken Settlement in Lancaster Co., Pa. (part in Western part of Berks Co. after 1752). Farmer in Codorus Twp., York Co., Pa. after 1759. In Pennsylvania militia during the Revolutionary War. Children: Julia, Christina (Mrs. Abraham Hassler), George Jr., Ludwig, Catharine, Elizabeth, Philip, John, Peter, Margaret, Jacob, and Michael. Only John and Peter had any descendants named "Bordner" or "Burtner". All descendants of other sons who bore family name were named "Bortner". *
3. Jacob (c1755 - 1815) - m. (1) Susanna (Meyer ?)(c1755 - c1780); (2) Eva _____ (c1760 - c1820). Probably son of Peter Bortner. Farmer in Warwick Twp., Lancaster Co., Pa. until at least 1782, and later in East Pennsborough Twp. (part now in Silver Spring Twp.), Cumberland Co., Pa. In Pennsylvania militia during Revolutionary War. Children:(1) George (Burtner), Jacob (Bordner); (2) Samuel (Burtner). Also two daughters: Elizabeth (Mrs. Philip Bretz), Barbara (Mrs. Walter Linn) - - which marriage is unknown.
4. Jacob (1795 - ?) - m. (1) Susanna Schneider (?); (2) Name unknown; (3) Ann Hess.
Son of John Bortner and Juliana Gantz. Farmer in Hopewell Twp., York Co., Pa. Children: Josiah, Jacob Schneider, John (probably all in first marriage); perhaps others, names unknown. Only John changed his name ("Bordner"). All descendants of other sons who bore family name were named "Bortner". *
3. John (1768 - 1859) - m. Juliana Gantz (c1756 - 1824)
Son of George Bortner and Maria Appalonia Floucher. Born in Codorus Twp., York Co., Pa. Farmer in Hopewell Twp., York Co., Pa. Children: Jane (Mrs. Robert Hyson), John, Elizabeth (Mrs. John Fife), Jacob, Salome (Mrs. _____ Yost), Peter, Jesse. Only Jacob had any descendants named "Bordner". All descendants of other sons who bore family name were named "Bortner". *

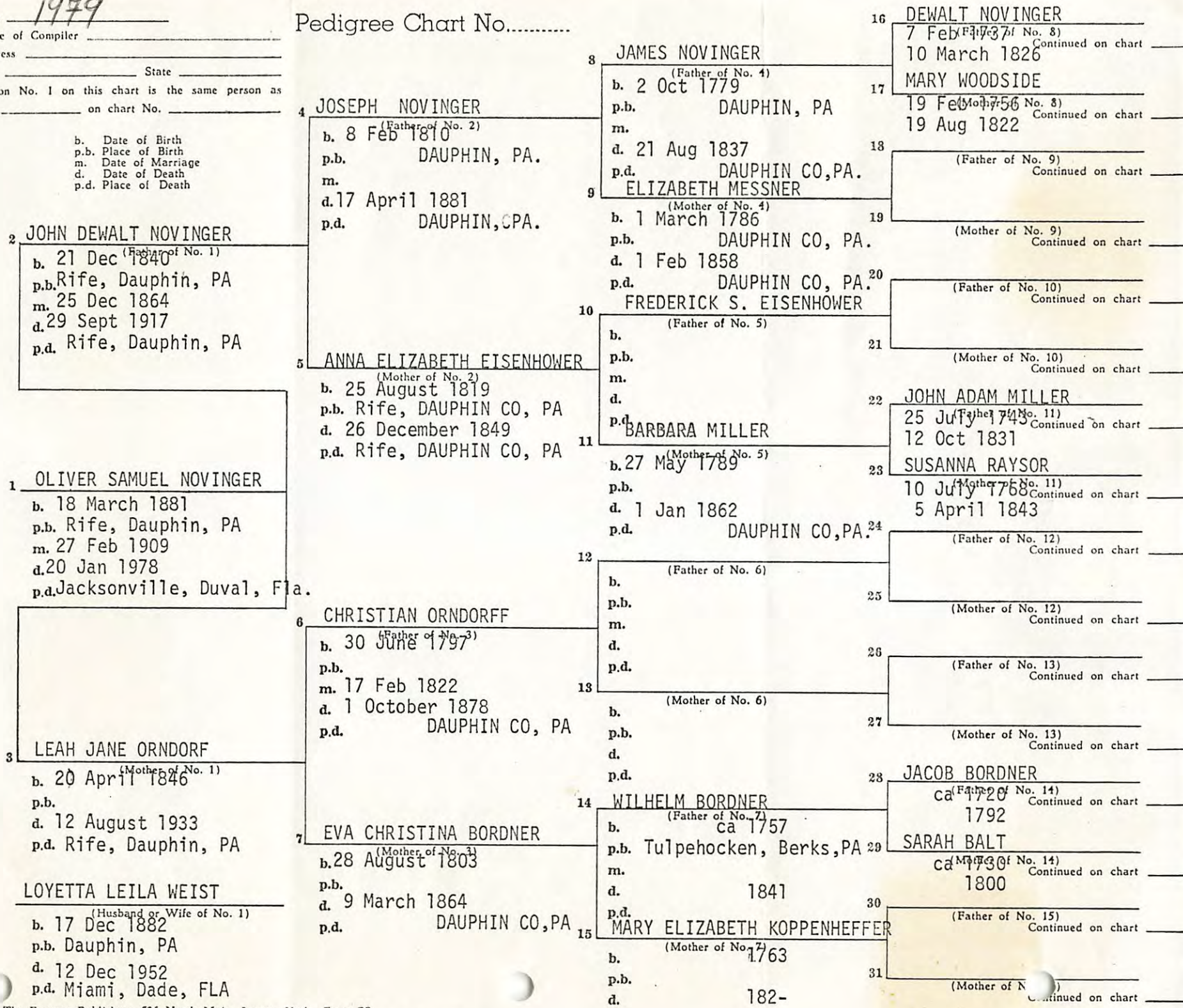

HANS NICHOLAS EISENHAUER
The 1741 Immigrant to America
and
His Descendants

1 HANS NICHOLAS EISENHAUER, whose birth year figures 1691, is the 1741 immigrant ancestor of the descendants represented in the 2,228 numbered families covered in this record. He was age 50 years when he came to America with his family. It is surely safe to say he never suspected he was destined to become one of America's most famous ancestors as the great-great-great-grandfather of DWIGHT DAVID EISENHOWER who was inaugurated 34th PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA on January 20, 1953, a matter of 211 years 2 months after the Eisenhauers arrival in this great new land. The date of death and place of burial of Hans Nicholas Eisenhauer have not been found but his death would be after March 1760 as at that time he attested his signature on his son 4 Martin Eisenhauer's will. His place of burial might be in Fredericksburg, Pennsylvania, as others of his family are buried there; he lived only a little way west and north of Fredericksburg.

Married Anna Margreta Struble in the Old Country. In the Bible of their son 3 Johannes Eisenhauer his (Johannes') parents are recorded on it's flyleaves in German script as "My father by the name of Nicolas Eisenhauer and my mother by the name of Anna Margrota Struble." Although no females were required to be registered on the ship's passenger list, only the males above the age of 16 years, we must assume she came to America with her husband. The date of her death and place of burial have not been found, but again it is likely she was buried in nearby Fredericksburg cemetery.

There are seven direct or indirect references to them in the records of baptisms of Reverend John Casper Stoeber and a will record:

May 14, 1749 "John Nicholas Eisenhauer and wife" were sponsors at the baptism of John Nicholas son of Peter Eisenhauer. In American usage it is reported that the name Hans becomes John, thus the name John Nicholas rather than Hans Nicholas as the sponsor;

Leininger was probably a son of George and Magdalena Leininger of York Co., Pa., as on Feb. 24, 1798 at York, Pa., there was a release by the heirs which named George Leininger as the eldest son.

JACOB LEININGER b Jan. 10, 1814, bapt. April 17, 1814, sponsors Jacob Miller and wife Maria.

16 FREDERICK EISENHOWER, son of 2 Peter Eisenhauer and Ann Dissinger, b July 15, 1794, presumably near Linglestown, Dauphin Co., Pa. He was the 17th and youngest child of his father's three marriages and his birth year figures his father Peter was 73 years old when Frederick was born. Frederick died March 13, 1884, Dickinson Co., Kansas, at age 89 years 7 months 28 days and is buried in Belle Springs, a River Brethren cemetery located about 12 miles south of Abilene, Dickinson Co., Kansas. At the time of his death he was living with son Jacob about a mile north of the cemetery.

In June 1953 Mrs. Katie Ann Haldeman-Walters of Abilene, Kansas, submitted the names and dates from the old Bible record of Frederick Eisenhower. Headstone records are from Keefer Cemetery located near Free Grace Church between Millersburg and Elizabethville, Dauphin County, Pennsylvania.

When he was 22 years old, in 1816, Frederick Eisenhower married Barbara Miller. They are the great-grandparents of President Dwight David Eisenhower. Barbara was b May 27, 1789, dau. of John Miller and Susanna Raysor; she died Jan. 1, 1862 and is buried in Keefer Cemetery.

Barbara Miller-Eisenhower is said to have passed along many interesting stories relating to the Eisenhowers and the Millers. She stated that after she married into the Eisenhower family they lived east of Millersburg, that later their daughter Catharine Eisenhower-Pike bought out the other Eisenhower heirs, built a new house and lived on the same piece of ground. She stated also that some of the Eisenhowers were from the borderline of France and that some were from Alsace France. She also reported that several of the early Eisenhowers went to Canada. As to the Millers, she claimed blood relationship to General Scott who was commander-in-chief of the American Army during the Mexican War. She also related the story passed along to her by her mother Susanna Raysor-Miller about the British soldiers coming into their home and running sabres through their featherbeds searching for American soldiers during the Revolutionary War.

The Eisenhowers were mostly of the Lutheran faith but Frederick became associated with the Church of the Brethren to which his wife belonged. By occupation he was a farmer and a weaver of bedspreads.

Pennsylvania census records list Frederick Eisenhower living in Lower Paxton Twp., Dauphin Co., Pa., in 1820; this is the first time he is listed as a family head and he was then 26 years old. In 1830 Frederick Eisenhower was in same township. In 1840 as Frederick Eisenhower was in Upper Paxton Twp. In 1850 as Fred Eisenhower, age 56, and Barbara, age 57, were in Upper Paxton Twp. The 1850 census is the first to list the names, ages, etc., of all members of a household; prior censuses gave the family head and the occupants of the home in statistics of males and females in age groups. In 1860 as Frederic Isenhauer, age 66, was living with Jacob F. Isenhauer and family in Washington Twp., post office Elizabethville, Dauphin Co., Pa.

In 1878, when Frederick was about 84 years old, he accompanied the members of his family who migrated to Kansas where his sons Jacob and Samuel bought

land around Hope, Dickinson Co., Kansas; dau. Catherine Eisenhower and her husband Samuel Fike or Pyke bought land east of Abilene in that county.

As may be seen, the family name is shown in many spelling variations in the early records, however beginning with Frederick Eisenhower the spelling remains consistently Eisenhower in his descendants. Only a very few other families spell the name Eisenhower, however there is a marked trend toward that spelling and it is quite possible many who carry this now famous and illustrious family name will change over to the spelling Eisenhower.

Eisenhower, First Sergeant, 2d Lieutenant, Company K, 158th Pennsylvania Infantry Militia. Mustered in Nov. 24, 1862 following enlistment Oct. 26, 1862 in Chambersburg, Pa., age 22. Second Lieutenant, March 18, 1863 in Newbern North Carolina. Both enlistment records in Union (Northern) Army, Civil War.

His widow Kitty E. Eisenhower applied for pension based on his Civil War service; in 1918 her address was Carlisle, Pa. She stated he was first discharged in 1863 in Harrisburg, Pa., and last discharged in 1866 in City Point, Virginia. The pension case contains many family details but I thought it seemed a bit confusing and contradictory and it should be given further study by interested persons for more clarification.

RHINELAND ORIGIN OF BALSER AND ELISABETHA BORTNER

It has been found that Balthaser and Maria Elisabeth Bortner, who arrived in America in 1732, came from Oberhochstadt in the Palatinate.

The village of Hochstadt, several miles northeast (north ?) of the city of Landau in the Palatinate (the Pfalz), was mentioned in documents for the first time in the year 776 (1200 years ago). In the middle of the 15th century an adjacent village was founded west of the Haardt Mountains; it was called "Oberhochstadt", while the original was called "Niederhochstadt". Today both parts of the village are united under the name "Hochstadt" with the Zip Code number 6741. (Reported by Dr. Fritz Braun, former Director of the Heimatstelle Pfalz in Kaiserslautern, in "The Historical Review of Berks County" (Pennsylvania), Summer, 1976.)

Hochstadt is located in the salient of present West Germany projecting into France, almost due east of Saarbruecken. It is in that part of the Pfalz west of the Rhine River that was coveted (along with Alsace and Lorraine) by King Louis XIV of France. During the several French invasions in the latter part of the 17th century and the early part of the 18th century, it was severely ravaged.

Proof of the origin of Balser Bortner and family was provided by Ms. Annette K. Burgert of Worthington, Ohio in a publication entitled, "The Hochstadt origin of some of the early settlers of the Host Church, Berks County, Pennsylvania". Mrs. Jean McNutt of El Segundo, California, has furnished excerpts of information contained in that publication, found by Ms. Burgert in records of the Evangelical Churches of Niederhochstadt and Oberhochstadt (perhaps Reformed churches formerly):

"Balthasar Bortner from Oberhochstadt" confirmed in 1710, according to an entry in the Niederhochstadt church records.

"Johan Jacob Bortner, son of Balthasar and Elisabetha Bortner", bantized Aug. 10, 1731, according to an entry in the Oberhochstadt church records. Sponsors: Jacob Sauter and Apollonia Meyer, both single.

Johan Jacob may have been the son, "Jacob", who came to America with his parents. It was common to use a person's middle name as his "calling name". However, according to the passenger list of the "Adventure", which carried Balser and family to America, Jacob was 10 years old in 1732. This age was confirmed approximately by a muster role of troops in service in King George's War in 1746; it listed Jacob Bordner, a soldier, as age 26. It is possible that Jacob was born in 1721, rather than "1731". But if 1731 was the correct year of birth of Johan Jacob, he would have been another son, perhaps called "Johan", who died young.

Ms. Burgert was inspired to research the Hochstadt church records by additional information in the aforementioned article of Dr. Fritz Braun. He showed that the name "Host" was derived from Hochstadt (the first syllable is pronounced as though the "ch" were "sch").

The Host Reformed Church was founded in 1727 at a place called "Host" located on the Tulpehocken Trail between the Delaware Indian village of Shamokin (present Sunbury) on the Susquehanna River, and Womelsdorf, home of Conrad Weiser, a leader in the Tulpehocken Settlement and mediator with the Indians. Host is about 3 miles northwest of Womelsdorf; both are also located on Tulpehocken Creek.

The Host Reformed Church records began in 1748. Ms. Burgert reported that she identified more than 25 families listed therein prior to 1760 as having come from Oberhochstadt or Niederhochstadt. The first entry in the Host church records involving the Bortner or Bordner families was the record of bantism of a daughter of Jacob and Sarah Bordner in 1756. Two earlier records were found for the family of Balser Bortner - - baptism of a daughter in 1738 at Christ (Little Tulpehocken) Church, near Bernville, and marriage of a daughter in 1748 in Christ Lutheran Church (Tulpehocken) near Stouchsburg. These churches were about 4 miles and 3 miles respectively from Host. The Balser Bortner family may have lived near Host.

Death of Balthaser Bortner and Administration of his Estate

Raymond C. Bordner of Myerstown, Pennsylvania recently sent to me a photostatic copy of the original Letter of Administration granted to his lineal ancestor, Jacob Bordner of Bethel Township, Berks County, in the Estate of Balthaser Bortner, on March 3, 1747, by the Registrar General of Wills and Estates of the Province of Pennsylvania. He found this among the papers left by his father, William T. Bordner of Myerstown.

The Letter of Administration discloses several facts which may be of interest to other descendants of Balthaser Bortner. These facts are:

Balthaser Bortner died intestate not long before March 3, 1747 in the Tulpehocken Settlement, then in Lancaster County (Berks County not yet being in existence). The Tulpehocken Settlement covered several subsequently created townships, now located principally in western Berks County. This establishes conclusively the year and general location of his death.

The Letter of Administration was issued to his son, Jacob, the widow having renounced her right to be named Administratrix. Therefore, she was still living when the Letter was issued. No other survivors were named in the document.

The Letter of Administration charged Jacob Bordner with selling personal property left by his father and collecting amounts receivable and applying the amounts realized ratably to payment of debts of his father. Perhaps the Letter implied, by its failure to deal with the question, that there would be nothing left over after payment of debts to be distributed to his legal heirs.

The Letter of Administration did not mention real property, and it may be assumed that there was none. If Balthaser had owned real property, he probably had conveyed it to one or more of his children before his death.

FOREWORD

My interest in the history of the Bordner family began as curiosity concerning my own lineage. My grandfather, who I admired and respected, was left an orphan in Western New York State when he was about three years old. While he knew his father's and mother's names and that they were Pennsylvania Dutch, he did not know much else about them. Late in life I undertook to solve this mystery by research.

Eventually I established my Bordner-Bortner lineage back to our mutual immigrant ancestor, Balser Bortner. In the process I examined records for all of the Bordner and Bortner families for the first four generations. By practical experience I became an amateur genealogist. I found genealogical research interesting.

It seemed to me that every family should have a published genealogy which would enable any interested member, presently living or to be born in the future, to find his or her family tree and learn something about his or her heritage. This should be a source of inspiration for many. Nobody had undertaken this task for the entire family, but The Bortner Association had published a genealogy in 1949 for one large branch of the family, "George Bortner of Codorus Township, York County, Pennsylvania, and his descendants". My retirement from Government service in 1963 gave me the time to use my acquired skill in genealogical research to prepare a genealogy for the rest of the family. And so I undertook the task, presumably for the Bordner family.

In the Summer of 1965, Mr. Clare S. Burtner of Butler, Pennsylvania, wrote to me, after hearing of my work, giving evidence of the descent of the Burtners of Western Pennsylvania from our common immigrant ancestor, Balser Bortner. Whereupon I extended the project to include the Burtners.

So here is the genealogy for the Bordners and the Burtners and their Bortner ancestors in America. All of the descendants of Balser Bortner in America who have carried the names, Bordner and Burtner, have been included in the registers of names, so far as I have been able to ascertain. There are certainly a few omissions, and there is an absence of data for a few, and some probable errors, for which I am sorry. I have done my best, within practical limits of time and expense.

This genealogy does not list the thousands of descendants of Bordner and Burtner daughters. Their names, of course, were changed when they married, and their descendants ought to be listed in other genealogies under their respective family names. It would have been impracticable to trace them for this work and meet the desired goal of completeness.

This genealogy does not include the descendants of George Bortner of York County, Pennsylvania, except in the few cases of ancestors of Bortners who changed their name to Burtner and Bordner. The previously-mentioned work of The Bortner Association is supposed to list all other Bortner family names. Between that work and this, all of the descendants of Balser Bortner in America who have carried the family name in any form should be listed.

FAMILY HISTORY IN PENNSYLVANIA

Balthaser Bortner, immigrant, and his family

Balthaser Bortner arrived in Philadelphia with his family in September, 1732 on the ship, "Adventure", from Rotterdam, Holland. They had probably started from their home in the Upper Rhine River Valley in the previous Spring. The voyage down the Rhine by barge took five or six weeks; the ocean voyage was longer. And there were delays in waiting for a ship at Rotterdam, and after taking the ship there was a stopover at Cowes on the Isle of Wight in the English Channel. Such voyages involved much suffering - - bad food and water, overcrowding, coldness, wetness, stench, and much sickness and disease. Some died. Survivors had to be strong and healthy as well as courageous.

Fortunately there is an authentic record in the Pennsylvania Archives of how Balthaser Bortner spelled his name - - the Oaths of Allegiance taken on September 23, 1732 by all of the family heads of the passengers on the ship, "Adventure". On the following page is a reproduction of page 74 from Volume 2 of "Pennsylvania German Pioneers", by Strassburger and Hinke, published by The Pennsylvania German Society, showing facsimile signatures from the original Oaths of Allegiance. Of course, these signatures are written in German script of the period. That book also listed Hinke's expert reading of the signatures; our ancestor's signature (indicated by an arrow) was stated to be written "Balser Bortner". "Balser" was a contraction often made by Germans for the biblical name "Balthaser". (English: Balthasar or Balthazar. Hebraic: Belshazzar.) Balthaser was the name of one of the three wise men in the bible legend of the birth of Christ in Bethlehem.

Other records all misspell Balser's name and the names of his wife and their children who came with him to the New World. The source of all those misspellings was the ship's passenger-list submitted by the ship's Captain to the Colonial authorities. The "Adventure's" passenger-list (which is also preserved in the Pennsylvania Archives and reported in "Pennsylvania German Pioneers") shows the names of Balser Bortner and his family misspelled as follows:

Misspellings on passenger-lists of European immigrants of that time were common. English-speaking people had great difficulty with German names, but there were also errors due to carelessness.

The given name of Mrs. Balser Bortner (Bortnerin in German) was actually "Maria Elisabetha" (Mary Elizabeth in English). "Merreles" is not a true name, either in German or English - - that was a crude contraction. There is no record of her maiden family-name.

In a biography of certain descendants of Jacob Bortner, a History of Berks County, Pennsylvania, states erroneously that there were two immigrant daughters named "Hannah" and "Mela". The passenger-list shows that both names applied to one daughter. However, there is no known name "Mela", either in German or English. Research indicates that her true name was probably "Anna Maria Barbara".

All of the 145 passengers on the "Adventure" were called "Palatines" in the minutes of the Provincial Council, which recorded the qualification of the ship's passengers for entry into the Colony. Only citizens of the Palatinate were properly called "Palatines", but that term was applied in Pennsylvania at that time to all German-speaking immigrants. While the Bortners, like the great majority of German immigrants of that time, probably came from the Palatinate, they may have come, as some did, from one of the other German States in the Upper Rhine Valley - - Hesse, Alsace, Baden, Wurttemberg, Bavaria, or Switzerland. Besides our general information on the sources of German immigration at that time, we know the following specific facts about the Bortners:

Apparently the Bortners spoke High German, because the recorded Wills of early Bortners were written in High German. This means that they did not come from one of the Low Countries or Northern German States.

The early Bortners were members of both the German Reformed and Lutheran churches.

There is a record in the Berlin Museum of a Coat-of-Arms authorized in 1454 by the German Emperor in Neustadt to be displayed by one Hans Bortner and his sons, Hans and Paul, presumably for valor in battle. Whether Hans Bortner was an ancestor of Balser Bortner, we do not know, but the family name was the same. Neustadt was in the Palatinate at that time.

In addition to such facts as we have, Dr. Fritz Braum recently told one of the members of the Bortner family that he thought the Bortners probably came from the Palatinate. Dr. Braum is Director of the Heimatstelle Pfalz in Kaiserslautern, which is understood to be a historical museum of the Palatinate.

Why did this Bortner family come to America? Doubtless they came, like other Germans came from the Rhineland in large numbers at that time, to be free men, to escape tyranny and oppression, to escape the ruins and horrors of frequent wars, to avoid religious discrimination, and above all, to enjoy all of the fruits of their own labor. They were doubtless peasants in the old country, and the position of peasants had only slightly improved since the Middle Ages. From their standpoint, the political and religious climate of William Penn's Colony, as well as its natural soil and climate, were better than in any other American Colony. And Penn's agents had long advertised among and solicited German protestants to come to his Colony. These sturdy farmers were among the best in Europe. They were desirable immigrants, as well as ripe for plucking away from their homeland.

Perhaps Balser Bortner, like many of his contemporaries, became a "Redemptioner" (or indentured servant) after his arrival in Philadelphia, in order to pay for the passage of his family. Such a period of voluntary servitude might have lasted as long as four or five years. In any event, the family was doubtless together on a farm during that period.

In the year 1738 there is a record of baptism of a daughter, Maria Elisabetha, by the Reverend John Casper Stoeber, in the Little Tulpehocken (Christ) Church (Evangelical Lutheran). This church, founded in 1734, then housed in a log structure, was in the Tulpehocken Settlement, located in the Northeastern part of Lancaster County. Later in 1752 most of that area became the Western part of the newly-created Berks County. Today this church is located $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles Southwest of the Village of Bernville in Jefferson Township, Berks County.

There is no record that Balser Bortner purchased land for a farm from the Proprietors, who were then the sons of William Penn. It is possible that he settled as a squatter, as many did, on land in the Tulpehocken Settlement owned by the Proprietors, and that he cleared the land of trees and built a log cabin for a home. However, it is also possible that Balser and his family actually lived on one of the two farms covered by early Warrants from the Proprietors - one in the name of his son, Jacob, in Earle Township; the other in the name of his son, Peter, in Heidelberg Township. Both of these Warrants are mentioned under the later discussions concerning the respective sons.

For information on the names of other children born to Balser and Maria Elisabetha Bortner, we are indebted to the compilation and publication by The Bortner Association, Glen Rock, Pennsylvania, of a genealogy for their branch of the family, "George Bortner of Codorus Township, York County, Pennsylvania and his descendants" (prepared by Charles H. Glatfelter and published in 1949). From that work we find the following additional information:

- Son, George, said by family tradition to have been a babe in his mother's arms when the family landed in Philadelphia in 1732.
- Son, Peter, born in 1734 in the Tulpehocken Settlement.
- Daughter, Philippina, born in 1736 in the Tulpehocken Settlement.

That work acknowledged that there may have been other children of whom they were uninformed.

The only additional child of whom we have knowledge was a son, Philip Jacob, generally called "Philip". There is no record of the year of his birth, but it is recorded that he was married in 1760. Hence, he doubtless was born sometime in the middle or late 1730's or early 1740's. Possibly he and Philippina were twins; she was born in 1736.

Balser Bortner died relatively young in 1747 or 1748. (1747 according to tradition among the descendants of his oldest son, Jacob, living in the original Tulpehocken area in Berks County - - 1748 according to tradition in the family of George, his second son, as stated in the aforementioned work of The Bortner Association.) When Balser's wife died is unknown, but it is suspected that she died about the same time.

It is believed that Balser Bortner and his family were the only ones having that family name to enter the Pennsylvania Colony. As will be shown later, a majority of their descendants have carried changed spellings of the family name - - "Bordner" and "Burtner", the former being greatest in number. There is no known record of immigrants by the name of either "Bortner", "Bordner", or "Burtner" entering the original colonies or the United States until the mid-nineteenth century, as will be discussed later.

Jacob, the oldest son of Balser, and his descendants

Before 1740 Jacob received a Warrant from the Proprietors to buy 160 acres of land in Earle Township, Lancaster County, for about 25 pounds. He probably occupied this land as a tenant on a rental basis while he undertook to pay for it, as was the usual custom. In 1743 a Patent (Deed) for this property was given to somebody else, probably because Jacob had not made the required payments to obtain title for himself. These facts are found in the Bureau of Land Records of The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in Harrisburg. In one of these records Jacob's name was misspelled "Burtner", but in another place the correct spelling was shown.

Not long thereafter on July 14, 1746, Jacob voluntarily enlisted in a force of 400 men raised in the Pennsylvania Colony to be employed, with troops from other colonies and British Regulars, to invade Canada. This was during King George's War, one of several French and Indian Wars that finally resulted in conquering Canada for the British in 1760. We learn from history that this Pennsylvania force was raised by the Colonial Governor over the objection of his pacifist-minded, Quaker-dominated legislature. The Pennsylvania troops went into Winter quarters in Albany in 1746. They were discharged in October, 1747, the expedition having been laid aside, although the War continued another year.

One of the muster-roles for this force in the Pennsylvania Archives, listed "Jacob Bordner", age 26, in 1746. Whether or not for the reason of that misspelling, or possibly because of an accumulation of such misspellings by English-speaking officials, Jacob changed the spelling of his family name to "Bordner", and that spelling has been used by all of his descendants who carry the family name. Later some of his nephews and grand-nephews also adopted that spelling. Incidentally we also find from the muster-role that Jacob was about two years older than stated in the "Adventure's" passenger-list - - not unusual when it meant a savings in fare for his ocean passage.

Jacob was released from military service just about the time that his father died. Probably he assumed responsibility for his brothers until they became old enough to support themselves. His oldest sister, Anna Maria Barbara, married a man from York County in 1748 and went there to live. It is believed that she took her two sisters with her, as stated later in the narrative relating to their brother, George, who also went to York County in the late 1750's.

Jacob married Sarah Balt, according to records of certain of his Berks County descendants, This was doubtless in the early 1750's, because their first child, a son, Jacob, was born October 23, 1754.

On April 10, 1761 Jacob was naturalized as a British citizen by the Colonial Supreme Court in Philadelphia. Their records showed his name to be "Jacob Bordner", and his residence in Berks County.

Shortly thereafter, on June 20, 1761, Jacob acquired land in Bethel Township, Berks County, by Patent (Deed) from the Proprietors, Richard and Thomas Penn, upon default by the person who held the Warrant. That property is just North and East of the present Village of Bethel; it lies on both sides of the Harrisburg-Allentown Road (U. S. Route 22). It is said to be good "limestone" land, which was prized by the Pennsylvania Dutch. It is fairly level land, although the Blue Mountain lies within sight about five miles North.

In the 1760's Jacob's Bethel farm was on the Pennsylvania frontier. Occasionally settlers in that area were killed by the Indians. During the French and Indian Wars (for which a final peace treaty was not signed until 1763), the French incited the Indians to attack the English Colonial frontier settlements. There was a line of forts along the Blue Mountain for protection of the settlers. One such fort was within sight of Jacob's house.

Jacob was too old for service in the Pennsylvania militia during the Revolutionary War, but three of his sons, Jacob Jr., John, and William, were in the militia. Although the record shows that Jacob Jr. was fined for skipping militia drills during the latter part of the war, it appears that he must have had some active service, because he was voted a pension of \$40 per month in 1836 by the Pennsylvania Legislature for his war service (only about one year before he died). His name is recorded on one of the placques to the memory of Revolutionary War soldiers in the D. A. R. Chapel at Valley Forge. After the war, Jacob Jr. held the rank of Lieutenant in the Pennsylvania militia.

When Jacob Sr. died in 1792, he Willed his 186-acre farm to Jacob Jr., but he made a settlement with his other children by requiring Jacob Jr. to make payments to them over a period of years. That was a normal pattern of handling estates in those days. Jacob Sr. was survived by five sons and one daughter, Anna Maria Schneider. Another daughter, Barbara, had died young.

Jacob's fourth son, Daniel, remained in Bethel Township, but his three other sons, John, William, and Peter, went to Lykens Valley in the Upper End of Dauphin County to the West. All of them were farmers.

Jacob's farm in Bethel Township was passed on from father to son, generation after generation. At one point, it was divided between two sons. One part remained in the possession of descendants for four generations until 1944, when the

last Bordner owner died, leaving no children.

In the 1820's one of Daniel Bordner's grandsons, also named Daniel, moved with his family to Hanover Township (the part now in Union Township) in Lebanon County, about ten miles West of Bethel. There he established an inn on the road between Allentown and Harrisburg. Later one of his sons, Daniel T., established a general store there, and the place became known as "Bordnersville". That name still appears on some more-detailed maps - - just East of the Indiantown Gap Military Reservation (Pa. Route 934). The inn was abandoned many years ago, and the general store was closed about 1955. Today there are only a few homes there at a four-corners; it is not on the main road; and no sign is displayed bearing the name "Bordnersville"; no Bordners live there now.

Several other descendants of Daniel Bordner also settled in Lebanon County over the years. Today there are many of his descendants in that county, and there are none of his descendants who bear the Bordner name remaining in Berks County. However, Lebanon County, as well as Berks County, is also the home of some of the living descendants of Jacob Bordner Jr.

In Dauphin County, just to the West of Lebanon County, there are many living descendants of John and William Bordner, who settled in the Lykens Valley. Many of them came from Powell's Valley (Jefferson Township), where one of William's sons, Jacob, settled sometime in the 1840's. In addition, Dauphin County is the home of a few of the descendants of Daniel Bordner of Berks County. There are no Bordners living in Dauphin County who are descended from Peter Bordner who also settled in the Lykens Valley, since all of his sons went to Ohio.

George, second son of Balser, and his descendants,
and his sisters, Anna Maria Barbara, Philippina, and Maria Elisabetha

Anna Maria Barbara, oldest daughter of Balser Bortner, married Henry Kann "from beyond the Susquehanna" on February 17, 1748 in Christ Lutheran Church, Tulpehocken, according to its records. (Actually the record shows her name only as "Maria Barbara Bortner".) This church is located near the present village of Stouchsburg in Berks County (not far from Myerstown).

All of the following with respect to the York County Bortners is taken from the previously mentioned genealogy, "George Bortner of Codorus Township, York County, Pennsylvania", except as otherwise indicated.

Henry Kann and his wife, "Anna Barbara", lived on a farm in Codorus Township, York County. In the early 1750's, the Kanns apparently took Mrs. Kann's sister, Philippina Bortner, into their home, and shortly thereafter Philippina married Charles Shaffer of Codorus Township. On September 27, 1759, Charles and Philippina Shaffer sold 100 acres of their land to her brother, George Bortner. This is the first record that George had moved to that area. Probably after his father's death until then, he had remained in Berks County, much of the time under the protection of his older brother, Jacob.

George lived on the farm he acquired in Codorus Township until he died (about 1801). However, when he died, he owned considerably more land.

George and his two oldest sons, George Jr. and Ludwig, were in the Pennsylvania militia of York County during the Revolutionary War, according to records

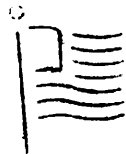

Dear Mrs. Berger:

Thank you for your letter of 27 March 1979 regarding my Novinger-Orndorff line. You will never know the scurrying and analysing of my files...and thanks to you, organization on that particular line that has occurred in the last three days.

I was never aware that I had quite so much information stored in my files, but now that I have acquired this super new I.B.M. Memory typewriter, it will be recorded for others, with room to add to what I have gathered.

I don't know if you have ever seen the book "From Mill Wheel to Plowshare" by Julia Angeline Drake and James Ridgely Orndorf, published by Torch Press of Cedar Rapids, Iowa in 1938. It is well-done for it's day, although spotty. I have a copy in my library, even though it is not my line, I figure it might contain some clues, when I do try to document earlier records. I have decided to send you what I do have in my files, accumulated randomly over the past 10 years...whenever the name appeared in records I was working with, I'd jot it down, so there is no real format.

Am delighted that you wish to take on the Orndorff project as I have undertaken the impossible task of tracking all the Davises in the U.S. born before 1850 and married before 1875. I know it sounds nutty but believe me..it is really beginning to jell now and I can help about 1 out of 3 researchers on the Davis families. Considering that I figure I am dealing with approximately 750,000 people, I think that is quite an accomplishment.

I heard the rumor about John Orndorff and Emeline Nolen once before, but that does not seem to be born out by church records, unless you can correct my line with proof. My records came from cemetery searches at Keefer and Killinger. The Keefer Cemetery is also called the Dunker Cemetery, and since my cousin, John Novinger was guiding us I don't remember how we got there, but there was a school across the street, and it was probably east? of Rife, Pa. I was so enthralled to be walking thru history at the time I simply did not note directions.

In looking over my notes...this is just surmise on my part and would have to be proven...it appears that

This same John is probably brother of Henry Ohrendorf m Maria Elizabeth Albert 28 December, Stouchsberg Lutheran Church, Berks Co, Pa. and they are both sons of John Orndorf, mentioned in will of his father Henry Orndorf 1794 of Haines Twp, Centre Co, Pa. Sound logical to you or do you have other records?

I have had poor luck with requested wills and deeds so have tried to make it a point of going to the court houses when I could to check records for myself. Have never done any in Centre County, but seems I have another field trip to make now. The people in Dauphin and Northumberland were most kind some 6 years ago when I was there...know they have been hassled a lot lately and it might be a touch more difficult. I have much to be done in Chester County soon anyway as there was a rat's nest of Davises..Welsh Quakers and Presbyterians there, which I have to unsnarl.

Please let me know what you can smoke out of the woodwork. I am very good at passing on pearls so will let you know if anything shows up.

Please let me know if you have anything on my Christian and Christiana (Bordner) Orndorff. Hoping to hear from you soon.
