Dear Camilla:
We hit the jactepot with the WITHEFS name! I checked the mortuary records first and found Mary A. Withers - sister - $1868-1926$, bur St. Fatrict's Cemetery. Then I went to the cemetery records and found her listed with lots of Gleasons', so I knew we were on the right track. I then checked her otituary and found the names of 3 brothers, so then I went to the city directories and found then listed living with her. I did check into one of the other Gleasons that were listed on the page I xeroxed from the cemetery records (enclosed) namely Martin $C_{0}$, because I thought he may have been another brother, but $x$ could not find a connection because his death certificate hes very little information on it." gt only lists his name, age and what he died from. No dr.'s name, paments names, birthplace or date, nor' informants. I did get a copy of his obituary, which I enclosed, but it doesn't have much either.

A problem I encountered, was with the cemetery crew, 1 called and made arrangements to go over to Butte to check the grave sites. I went there, no one was axaluzte, so I went to the cemetery (St. Fatricks) thimsing there was a misumderstanding. No one there, mo I went back to the officey by then it was locked and all the cars that were originally there were gone. This was 2 o'clock in the afternoon! I was hoping to separate the names that are listed on the sheet $I$ am sending you with all the eleasons' names so we could tell which ones are bumjed in the plot with Mary A. Withers. When I talked to the guy he said it was a large plot and they probably were all in the one plot. Maybe when you come to Montana you will have better luct: than I did with that crew. I am frustrated that I couldn't see the graves myself so it would clear up the matter. I drove through the cemetery twice looking for the grave, but it is a large cemetery so I didn't find them.

I also wanted to find out the date of Bridget's death, however I called the church after the cemetery incident and they gave me her death date. Then I went up to the Archives to get her obituary (there is no death certificate filed in the courthouse for her - it was not a Etate law until 1903 and then for a few years they are not completel, the Archives went to their Winter hours so they were closed on Friday's! I came back to Anaconda and checked the Anaconda Standard for her obituary, because there is a lot of Eutte news in it, but there was no obituary for hern If you want to write to the Archives directly and ask them to send you her obituary from the Butte
newspapers I am sure they will do ito Address: Butte/silver Bow Archives, Bute, MT 5970y I thought it more important to get her obituary than Michael's or Martin's, but $I$ found their's in the Anaconda Standard so am enclosing them" Not much information in them, especially Michael's (the father), but may be helpful anyway.

Now back to the other research I did on Mary A. Withers. I got her marriage record and her name is listed as Mollie, the only record $I$ found that listed that name all the others are Mary $A$. (enclosed). Also enclosed is her death certificate (they told me at the courthouse that normally it would not be on file there because she died out of the county, but evidently someone in the family requested that it be filed there - thank goodness because otherwise it would have been harder to locate her exact date - unless the chur ch had it of course)" Enclosed - copies of her obituary and a copy of the 1898 city directory showing the Gleason's. (I put a question mark on James Gleason because of the adrlmess -- it may have just been a typos. Mary lived at that same address - she was listed as a widow, but the courthouse does not have a death certificate on him, nor is he 1 misted it in the Archives mortuary records or cemetery records. They do not have Mount Moriah cemetery records so there is a possibility he was buried there, or maybe he died somewhere else and is buried there - they were not married very long and she never remarried). I will include the city directory information and funeral home information right after I finish this part of the letter.

Enclosed is Michael Gleason - the father - death certificate. Strange that the courthouse had that one because it is older than briciget's, but they do - of course it doesn't have much information either.

Some questions I have area where was Charjes Fu Eleeson in the early city directories? At school?

I found the Gleasons earlier than I first thought they were in Eutte! Back to $1885-86$ - did you know they were there that early?

Enclosed are the photographs of the Well family plota Matt Dennison did not have a headstone. I was talking to Eob Vine and he said someone stole it during World War II. I amsorry the ones of Samuel Vine and John Whelan's headstones are not discernible. There is only a funeral home marker for Mona Whelan, no headstone. The surfounding graves are mo comnection to your family - Morony, Gimperman, Toomey, Harany Shea and some Italians.

1 checked the marriage records for the Gieason's from 1888 through 1.912 but didn't find Michael. $s$ (brother of Mollie) I I have the info. in your file, but at this time I didn't see any commections to your" family for the ones I Iisted. If you decide you want it just let me know and I will send it to you.
