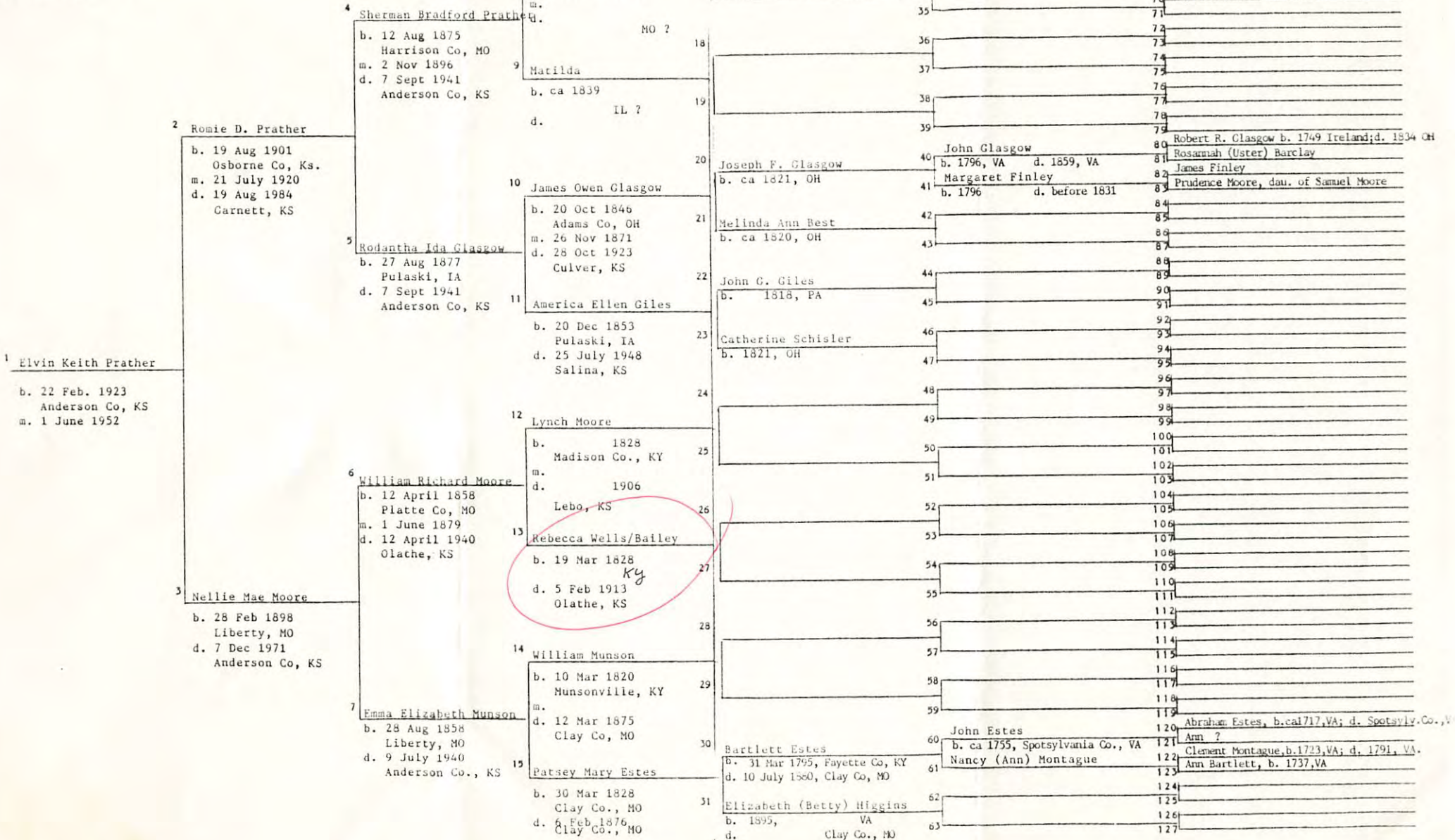

Thank you for your offer to help me with my Bailey family connections. I have enclosed two family group sheets for your use and for your library. They are incomplete, as you can see. I have also enclosed a copy of some census records of the Bailey families in Henry Co., IN.

Harriet Ellen (Bailey) Harrigan, daughter of Henry W. Bailey & Catharine Mogle was my great-grandmother. Her daughter, my Aunt Grace (Harrigan) Shanahan is still living, about 94 years old. Her mind is still pretty sharp and, although she didn't know a lot about her grandfather, Henry W. Bailey, (he died before she was born), she remembers family reunions over in Andrews. I think that with the right prompting, she might remember other things. She probably knew "Aunt Peg".

The Henry Co. Indiana Census records indicate a connection with the Level and Bowman families. Indeed, many of the family in Fulton Co. were buried in the Bowman Cemetery. I'd like to know the connection.

I believe that a David Bailey & Ezekial Level were mentioned in the Duck Creek Meeting in Henry Co., also (Quaker).

Henry W. Bailey lived in Wayne Twp. Fulton Co., IN near Grass Creek.

I am flying to Omaha on August 26 and, depending on my Omaha cousin's work schedule, will travel to Indiana sometime during that week. I fly to New Orleans on Sept. 3, so it will be before that.

Again, thank you for your assistance. If there are copies of materials to be made, I will of course reimburse you for the cost. I do have copies of all of the published Fulton Co., IN materials, although I may not have integrated all of the available information onto the enclosed group sheets. I work about fifty hours a week, at the moment, and haven't had time.

Now, last but not least, we will pay our respects to John (Cork). Why Cork, I never knew. Sam and Bert's lives were similar and they were together more or less. The three brothers, congenial as brothers, but Cork was different. The first difference I knew of, was when he built himself a little one-room home on the family lot where he lived alone, because they said he was living off of the old man as Sol and his three sons had lived on together after the death of Mrs. Ellis, until Sam and Bert left for employment elsewhere.

Cork was friendly, jolly and well liked by young and old. In time he grew a beard in Winter - living in bachelor quarters he wasn't as tidy as he could have been - in modern time he might have been termed a hippie, but he would work. He liked to hunt, trap and fish and roam in the woods - had transplanted ginseng and some wild flowers, including the rare lady slipper in a suitable place at his last home in Monument City. With the coming of the new school building in 1912 the Ellis property was condemned for school ground, so Cork moved his mansion up the river to the east side of Haley's Mountain.

The Salamonie came up higher over all the lowlands in the night at the start of the 1913 flood and Cork was forced to go to the top of the mountain. A fact he made known next morning with his peculiar yell Feeeahh a boat was secured and a very nervous Dan Hart went to the rescue. Cork entered the boat on one condition, you let me row. He was quite at ease in a boat so he made the trip safely and found lodging at a neighbors till the water receded.

In the beginning I said he was friendly and jolly - he was also temperamental and if anyone offended him, he never forgot. For some reason he got peeved at the local store keeper. I forget who it was at the time so Cork bought an extra supply of staples for himself and some for sale, including candy bars, tablets, pencils, etc., and had school kids for patrons. He used onions and potatoes by the bushel. A loafer started to spit tobacco in the ashpan once. Cork exclaimed hastily, "Don't do that, my supper is in there." He was roasting potatoes in the ashes. Once in a bad mood he even said "Doctors should all be shot and hospitals dynamited." Well, some man went to see him once and found him on the floor, rolling in agony - kidney stones. Of course, he got the needed help pronto and plenty of food, attention and whatever was needed. To my knowledge he never got peeved at anyone afterwards. He had plenty of friends before his illness - just didn't realize how they

would stand by.

I heard one of his yells at our back door one day - there was Cork with a big bucket of turnips from his garden he was passing out among the neighbors.

The years passed by as they have a way of doing, and Cork became quite ill. Bert, who was at that time turnkey at the Huntington County jail, came out and got Cork and took him to the hospital area of the jail where he could be cared for.

During the night he passed away quietly in his sleep with Bert who had dropped off into sleep setting by the bedside. Some time later Bert went to Oregon to be near Sam. They had adjoining lots in the same cemetery where they have both been buried.

#### THE BAILEY FAMILY

There are no known records as to the nationality of the Bailey family. The first persons known of were: Basil Bailey and wife of Harrison County, Ky. Their known children were: John Bailey, Washington Bailey, Benjamin Bailey, b. 11-10-1793, and Margaret Ann Bailey.

Aunt Peg as she was commonly called came to Huntington County in her late life and lived with relatives. The last one was Maria Zook Bailey where she made her home for quite a number of years. She never married, was noted for her sharp wits and tongue, but her bark was worse than her bite and she was well liked. She was thought to be 102 years old at her death. She was buried in the Monument Cemetery.

Benjamin Bailey and his wife, Susan Wood of Maryland, married Dec. 19, 1818, left Kentucky possibly about 1830 and came to Henry County, Ind.

Tradition has it that the last thing Grandmother Susan did when the wagons were loaded and started, was to visit the grave of her young child, then cut across the fields to catch up, also that she walked the greater part of the way to Indiana. No doubt the type of roads made walking preferable.

Benjamin died July 11, 1833 and was buried in the Nettle Cemetery in Henry County near Hagerstown.

WAYNE CO.

They were the parents of nine children who lived to be adults and all came to Huntington County, all but three remained there.

They were: Mariah, b. Dec. 19, 1819, was a cripple from childhood and never married; Amanda, b. 6-12-1820, d. 5-4-1905, she married George Richardson who went west in

the 49 Gold Rush and died in Colorado or California; William Hartwell, b. 2-28-1822, d. 4-23-1890, married Frances Graham, 3-25-1847; Henry W., b. 1-12-1825, d. 5-4-1900, married Katherine Mogul; Emeline, b. 10-15-1825, married Martin Zook, b. 12-9-1819, d. 3-12-1880; Francis Marion, b. 3-1-1829, d. 2-6-1899, married Mary Ann Silvers; Elizabeth, b. 3-2-1831, married Daniel Hardman, and they moved to Iowa possibly about 1862; James Madison, b. 10-22-1832, d. 12-11-1878, married Josephine Yoast, 7-3-1862, she died 12-11-1907, and Thomas Benjamin, b. 2-18-1834, d. 1-21-1902, married Christina Shock, 5-2-1855.

The foregoing persons are the ancestors of the numerous Bailey descendants in Huntington County.

After the death of Benjamin Bailey in 1833 at the age of 39, his widow Susan (Wood) Bailey married (date unknown) John Bowman, a German Baptist Brethren minister.

Apparently all of her children but one had already come to Huntington County as the records at the Recorder's Office show that on Dec. 11, 1862, Susan Bowman bought 60 acres just east of what is known as Lost Bridge and 105, extending from the Salamonie River north to the former Monument City Road, at that time a National Road leading from Warren, Ind. along the Salamonie to Lagro. On the same day my grandparents, James Madison (Matt) and Josephine (Yoast) bought 80 acres on the north side of the Monument City road. My mother, Clare (Bailey) Heiney was born there March 2, 1865. After she and my father, B. F. Heiney, were married they lived there and my brother Fred and I were also born there. Our younger brother, Howard, was born later when we were living in Warren.

Grandfather Bowman built the house in which they lived. It consisted of three fair sized bedrooms and one small one, a living room and a large kitchen. A good spring of water near as was the case with all the houses in the very early days; also a milk trough through which the water flowed. This spring was shaded by an enormous willow tree which must have been near 100 years old when cut, but the spring still made a swampy place in the field.

With the Bowmans came the crippled daughter, Mariah, and the widowed daughter, Amanda Richardson, and her two daughters, Sarah Catherine and Susan (perhaps in their early teens) and Sammy Wycoff, an orphan boy whose dying father, grandfather had promised to care for, and he did as Sammy is buried on

the Bowman lot in the Monument Cemetery. It seemed to be common knowledge that anyone needing a home found it with the Bowmans.

Although I never knew them personally, I do know the numerous relatives had nothing but praise for them.

#### H. FRANK BAILEY

H. Frank Bailey no doubt had charge of more funerals of friends and relatives during his time than any man of his profession. We who knew him knew he was a perfectionist to the nth degree, even so he had his good as well as bad moments. He told me one of the good ones. After World War I he was conducting the 2nd burial of Garland Robbins who had met death and was buried overseas. Incidentally, (I would like to say here Harley Bailey by some quirk of fate had part in both burials), H. Frank was to play Taps. He had just paused at the end of the first score when his ear caught the echo from the woods in the background - needless to say he continued in that order - he said "I never heard Taps sound so beautiful."

Frank started in his Profession when a young man to the amazement of all who knew him, working for H. M. Purviance, later going into business for himself. He considered his work a sacred trust and he and his wife, Daisy, were very kind and sympathetic with people in their grief.

On one occasion a pallbearer was on the wrong side of the grave, when Frank motioned to him, he just hopped across the open grave.

Another episode was the case of a man who was quite able-bodied, but was slightly confused mentally (possibly due to a light stroke) and had a few phrases he used frequently but at times were a serious misfit. He was a pallbearer for a neighbor. When the casket had been lowered he looked down at it and quoted one of his favorites "Now let him whistle."

Everyone needs a change from their work. The Bailey Orchestra furnished that change and was in great demand, especially in the Spring for high school commencements.

In time the xylophone was added and the daughter, Mary, and son, Carl, became members of the orchestra, although Carl was so small he had to stand on a stool to play and frequently had to be awakened from sleep for the closing numbers.

Commencement time was something people looked forward to, not only for what it meant to the graduates and their families, but the good music and the good speakers as well. One, whom I have always remembered was Barton

Reese Pogue. The first thing he did was to read the account of David going out to fight Goliath from one of the Bibles to be presented to the graduates.

Special attention was given to David's refusal to wear Saul's armor and the need for young people to find the life work for which they were best suited not necessarily like father like son or the thing a parent had aspired to do and for some reason had not achieved so insisted the son or daughter should do. He pointed out so many misfits in life were due to that fact.

Hopefully, young people of today, due to counselling and greater opportunities, are more likely to find the work for which they are best qualified.

#### DR. G. G. WIMMER

Regardless of the weather, there were usually a few loafers at the Store in the evening, conversation being the usual procedure, but on this particular Winter night in walked Dr. G. G. Wimmer of Mt. Etna. He was in trouble. His car had slipped off the river road near Haley's Mt. (now called Monument Island). Every man was on his feet more than willing to help Doc.

He came to Mt. Etna from Medical School and started his practice there. His Mother came with him. He chose Mt. Etna as they had relatives at LaFontaine he once told me. Once he was asked what he would like to do for a vacation, replied: "Oh, take some Medical training I suppose." At any rate that was about the only times he was away.

He married a local girl, Edna Baine — they had one daughter, Ruth, who became a public school teacher. In time they built a nice house and he never went elsewhere to practice. Dr. Wallace Grayston was once quoted as saying "When Dr. Wimmer diagnoses a case he is usually correct."

There were no set office hours, nor appointments, if he was out on a call you made your own choice, either wait or come back later. The charge for years was 50 cents, including a package of pills. He was the family doctor in many families for several generations and he had no file cabinet of case histories. When he gave an order, if it wasn't carried out, there was likely to be an explosion, yet he was kind and sympathetic.

During the flu epidemic in 1918, he went day and night. Between calls he slept while Nathaniel Case drove, and during calls, Casey

slept.

In later years, when his health began to fail, he saw patients at the office only and later in his home. During this time the ladies of the Jennings' Chapel Ladies Aid decided to have a Birthday Card Shower for his birthday, which was in early October.

Arthur Mitchell was the carrier on Route 7, Huntington, and he was instructed to hold all cards and deliver them all on the appointed day. Fortunately, some slipped by early so they were delivered as they came. I said fortunately, for the plan was so popular it really snowballed, cards came from all directions and many states. One from India, from Olive Kindley Colson who with her husband, Ralph, were serving in the Foreign Mission Field. I saw one day's mail, a shoe box stacked with cards on end filled and this was several days later. Mrs. Wimmer remarked: "He has opened everyone," and they were thoroughly appreciated.

Medical practice has changed through the years, and great progress has been made. The things that are now done are modern miracles for which we are truly grateful, all of which has been possible for contributions from each era in its time.

#### BERT AND MYRTLE'S GOLDEN WEDDING

David Elbert (Bert) Schell and Myrtle May Thomas were married January 20, 1900 by Rev. J. Z. Barrett at the home of her parents, David and Laura (Satterthwaite) Thomas, one mile north and one-half mile east of Monument City. Myrtle's sisters, Jessie, Hazel, and Ruth at later dates were all married in the same room, and 22 years later, Bert and Myrtle's daughter, Mildred, also.

They went to housekeeping a mile north of Pilcher's Chapel on the Range Line Road, where they lived for eleven years. They sold out and went to Majenica where they operated a grocery 2 years. They then sold the store and moved to the Thomas farm, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas having moved into Huntington. Bert farmed and also worked with his brothers at times doing custom work for farmers such as threshing, clover hulling, hay baling and corn shredding.

Two daughters and a son were born to this couple, Mrs. Franklin (Mildred) Bailey, Marvin Thomas who died at the age of three, and Mrs. Wilmer (Lucile) Bugher.

As the years passed, relatives and friends were numerous and frequent guests at the

Last Will and Testament of David Bailey deceased  
(From Will Record B page 86)

State of Indiana, Henry County ss:

I, David Bailey of the State of Indiana and County of Henry being ill in body and being desirous to settle my outward affairs do make and publish this my Last Will and Testament.

First all my just debts & funeral charges to be paid out of my property the balance of my property to be disposed of as follow to wit: I give and bequeath to my Wife, Sarah all my property and the profits arising my property for her use and benefit during her lifetime or widow hood. If my Wife Sarah should marry, I will her one sixth part of my estate forever; otherwise I will the same sixth sixth part after her maintenance to her disposal; I wish the other five parts divided into twenty parts and eight parts I will and bequeath to Sister Mary's children to be equally divided amongst them and Levi's Children to share the portion of their father. I will and bequeath to my two Sisters, Millicent and Caroline the other twelve parts to be equally divided between them. I wish my executors hereafter named to take the care of my property and dispose of the profits to my wife Sarah as they think most profitable and now for the due management of my estate and affairs I do nominate and appoint Richard Ratliff, Peter Pearson and Rice Price executors of this my Last Will and Testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this the first day of the third month One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty one.

The Cincinnati Enquirer of a recent date contained the following article regarding Aunt Peggy Bailey, of Polk township.

HUNTINGTON, Ind. October 16. The Enquirer some time ago stated that "Aunt Betty" Dowling, of Seymour Ind., aged 101, was probably the oldest old maid living. There lives a few miles southwest of Huntington an old maid who is eleven years older than Miss Dowling. Her name is Margaret Ann Bailey. There are records in the possession of the family which prove beyond doubt that the old lady has reached the advanced age of 112.

"Aunt Peggy" Bailey, as she is familiarly called, was born in Harrison county, Kentucky March 10, 1785. She remained in Kentucky until 1863. Since that time she has made her home with a great-grand-niece, Mrs. Maria Bailey, and they live now on a farm nine miles southwest of Huntington.

Aunt Peggy's mother lived to the age of 106 years, her father was 102 when he died, and she had an aunt, Ruth Taylor, who lived to the great age of 116 years. Aunt Peggy was the eighth of eleven children, and she is the only survivor of the family except her youngest brother, Washington, who, so far as she knows, is still alive. If living, Washington is near the hundred-year mark.

Ever since Aunt Peggy was eight years old she has smoked tobacco. She works about the house the same as the rest of the family, doing chores, milking the cows, feeding the chickens, hunting the eggs and assisting with the cooking and other housework. She has splendid eyesight and has never used glasses in her life.

When asked why she never married the old lady replied with apparent feeling:

"Just because I didn't want to. This getting married business is a desperate thing, and I never wanted to take any chances. I have seen so much of it that I don't think I want any of it. I never saw any man that I thought I would like well enough to marry."

"Did you ever have a sweetheart?"

"That's nobody's business, young man," she replied warmly. "When I was a young girl I used to go with the fellows to dances, log rollings and husking bees, and had as good a time as any of the rest of the girls, but I never wanted to get married. We had just as good times in those days as the young folks do now, but it was different."

Aunt Peggy's health is good. During her entire life she has had but one serious sick spell, and that was about twelve years ago, but at present she is well, and apparently bids fair to live and enjoy her old pipe for several years to come.

Thank you for writing regarding the Bailey family of Fulton Co., Indiana. I visited Rochester and Fulton Co. several years ago, copying many records of my Bailey, Mogle and Harrigan families there.

My g-g-grandfather was Henry W. Bailey, census shows born about 1822, KY. I know neither his parentage, nor his siblings. My earliest record of him is in Henry Co, Indiana, I believe. He married into my Mogle family there.

I am wondering if the W. in his name stands for William.

My great-aunt Grace Shanahan is in her nineties and still lives in Michigan. Although she is slowing down, her mind is still pretty sharp. She is the youngest child of Patrick J. & Harriet Ellen (Bailey) Harrigan on my group sheet. Henry Bailey was her grandfather, but he died around the time she was born.

I know Aunt Grace said there were a lot of Bailey relatives around Andrews in Huntington Co., Indiana, but I have not yet followed up on this. In the 1920's when Harriet Ellen (Bailey) Harrigan died, Aunt Grace said a lot of her Bailey relatives came and they were dressed in "funny clothes." She had referred to them as Amish or something, she thought, but this might be a mistake. Henry Bailey married a Mogle, German Lutherans. I don't know what religion the Baileys were, but most of the family was buried in the Bauman (Bowman) Cemetery in Fulton Co....the Mogle's, Bailey's, and all but my Irish Catholics.


There was some connection to the Leavell and Bowman families, as evidenced by the census records. I noticed a William Bailey listed in an estate records for a Susan Bowman in Huntington Co., Indiana.

I am sending you some various notes I have on the Baileys of Indiana. I have not followed up on the wills listed in Ohio and other places. I did check Fulton Co., but as you know some of there records were lost.

Perhaps you might be able to tie in some of this information with yours. Can you send me a group sheet on William Bailey and some basic information on your Kentucky Baileys? Will reimburse your costs, if necessary. (I have access to a copy machine in my office, so no problem for me.

Thanks again for writing.

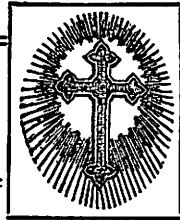
