Pat and Mike Stories and Careful Dieting Keep Oil King Healthy, Says His Physician

CLEVELAND, OHIO, July 10.—(Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.) John D. Rockefeller, modern Midas, whose hand has always turned all that it touched to gold, will live to 100 years old. This is the decisive statement of a physician of nearly half a century, Dr. Hamilton Flisk Biggar of Cleveland, who has lived and played with Rockefeller for months at a time. The attainment of a century of life by the world's richest man will be largely due to Pat and Mike, the two Irishmen who have consulted much to the joy of the doctor.

It Keeps Him Young.
 Mr. Rockefeller loves Pat and Mike's stories," says the doctor, who is 77 himself, three months older than his famous friend and patient. "It is largely his keen sense of humor and his delight in good stories that keeps him young."

One of his latest stories, he says, he was coming up from the train and on the train was a woman who was pestering the conductor with questions. She became a great nuisance and he became disgusted. Finally she said: "Conductor, why is it that you put your hand to the engineer when he wants him to start instead of pulling the bell rope?" "Why," replied the conductor, "when I wave my hand it means he'll get out of here." The conductor returned to the man who had heard the remark and said: "You should not have told that way to that woman. She is the wife of one of the directors of our road."

"I know," said the conductor, "I have a few minutes he returned and the man said to him: 'What did you say when you apologized?' 'Ah, she didn't say anything; she waved her hand.'"

The world's richest man, says Dr. Biggar, has learned the laws of long life and has few men. "And what he has done, anyone can do," says his physician. "It is merely a matter of common sense, living the simple life, physically and mentally and spiritually, eating enough food to maintain vitality—eating to live and not living at."

Daily setting-up exercises and outdoor exercise through golf or some other pastime. Happiness in family and home and in the world.

That's His Recipe.
 These are the ingredients in the recipe, says the famed Dr. Biggar, which have brought John D. Rockefeller to the age of 87, will make him live to a happy 100, and can be the same thing for any person. "The key is every doctor's ideal diet," says Dr. Biggar, "a man who keeps well rather than gets well. He is in better trim than I am. He knows me about my own health and of my advising him. John D. has a sweet tooth, but he would take poison as soon as eat anything. Aside from his liking of sweets, food means nothing to him. He is bored. He hates lunch-banquets any sort of feast for his ability. He feels that human beings should be able to get together and do something more than a groan-able as the excuse." "Fruit, vegetables, light meats, keep the world's richest man young, he says. Rockefeller never drinks cold beer. Always lukewarm, even on the hottest days.

COUPLE OF JOHN D.'S FAVORITE STORIES

It seems there was an Irishman whose name was Mike, and Mike went into a restaurant to order a meal. He had just been paid, and wanted a little of everything on the menu card. He ordered olives. When they came he nibbled one, put it back on the plate, nibbled another, put it back, and stopped after trying the third or fourth. Another customer came in and sat down at Mike's table and ordered olives, too. Mike looked at him curiously, then asked, "Do you like olives?" "Yes," said the stranger. "You're a damn liar," said Mike.

It seems there was a race horse whose name was Enza. A man went to the race and bet heavily on Enza. But his heart sank lower and lower as Enza lagged behind. Then just at the very last moment influenza.

He regulates his life to the day. The temperature of the day is told him each morning and he plans his day accordingly. Seldom does he play more than eight holes of golf. His average score is 45 for the eight holes. Sometimes he plays the customary nine.

He guards his health with eternal vigilance. If even slightly indisposed he stays in bed and rests. "Mr. Rockefeller really enjoys life," says Dr. Biggar. "He wants to live as many years as possible. That's why his health is so important to him."

John D. loves the old hymns, the old ballads. He hums "Swanee River," "Old Black Joe" and "Annie Laurie." He reads and reads the 121st and 91st psalms. "But he is not merely an old machine looking after his body and forgetting other people," says Dr. Biggar.

"I have traveled more than 200,000 miles with him; I have crossed the continent with him many times, and been abroad with him many times."

"He has never forgotten my comfort at any time. I have never been a guest in his home but what he came into see if the windows were properly opened, if I had enough blankets, wanted anything."

Started by a Game.
 A game of blind man's buff began the friendship between the doctor and his patient. John Dee had been playing the game with his children. He ran into a sharp corner and cut his forehead.

"I was called in, and he begged me to fix it so that he would have no scar," says Dr. Biggar. "That job began our friendship. That was 46 years ago."

Again and again the old doctor stressed the repartee, the sparkling humor, the love of epigram in the world's richest man.

"I once saw him look at a cartoon of himself—a very bad one—and he laughed and said, 'Wouldn't that rock-a-feller?'"

"He loved to tell a story of the days when a Cleveland boarding house keeper made him eat the leavings at second table because the other boys complained of the odor of crude oil about him. He sat on the porch until the others had eaten and left, then meekly went in and took what was left."

"When he was attacked for 'tainted money,' he would laugh and say, 'Wouldn't some of them like some of that tainted money, though?'"

"Once John D. went to buy a car. When he asked the cost of maintenance, the salesman said, 'It depends on the price of gasoline.' Mr. Rockefeller said, 'I guess I can afford it then.'"

Likes Butte.

"Butte is one of the most prosperous mining centers in the world," Mr. Bernard said. "Mining methods used here are accepted as the standard in all mining sections. Butte has one advantage for miners not found in any other mining town. It is an up-to-date city and a man employed here has every facility known to the resident of any city in the country."

Mr. Bernard expects to spend several weeks here before returning to New York.

Dear Camilla:

We hit the jackpot with the WITHERS name! I checked the mortuary records first and found Mary A. Withers - sister - 1868 - 1926, bur St. Patrick's Cemetery. Then I went to the cemetery records and found her listed with lots of Gleasons', so I knew we were on the right track. I then checked her obituary and found the names of 3 brothers, so then I went to the city directories and found them listed living with her. I did check into one of the other Gleasons' that were listed on the page I xeroxed from the cemetery records (enclosed) namely Martin C., because I thought he may have been another brother, but I could not find a connection because his death certificate has very little information on it. It only lists his name, age and what he died from. No dr.'s name, parents names, birthplace or date, nor informants. I did get a copy of his obituary, which I enclosed, but it doesn't have much either.

A problem I encountered, was with the cemetery crew. I called and made arrangements to go over to Butte to check the grave sites. I went there, no one was ^{around} available, so I went to the cemetery (St. Patricks) thinking there was a misunderstanding. No one there, so I went back to the office, by then it was locked and all the cars that were originally there were gone. This was 2 o'clock in the afternoon! I was hoping to separate the names that are listed on the sheet I am sending you with all the Gleasons' names so we could tell which ones are buried in the plot with Mary A. Withers. When I talked to the guy he said it was a large plot and they probably were all in the one plot. Maybe when you come to Montana you will have better luck than I did with that crew. I am frustrated that I couldn't see the graves myself so it would clear up the matter. I drove through the cemetery twice looking for the grave, but it is a large cemetery so I didn't find them.

I also wanted to find out the date of Bridget's death, however I called the church after the cemetery incident and they gave me her death date. Then I went up to the Archives to get her obituary (there is no death certificate filed in the courthouse for her - it was not a state law until 1903 and then for a few years they are not complete), the Archives went to their Winter hours so they were closed on Friday's! I came back to Anaconda and checked the Anaconda Standard for her obituary, because there is a lot of Butte news in it, but there was no obituary for her. If you want to write to the Archives directly and ask them to send you her obituary from the Butte

newspapers I am sure they will do it. Address: Butte/Silver Bow Archives, Butte, MT 59701. I thought it more important to get her obituary than Michael's or Martin's, but I found their's in the Anaconda Standard so am enclosing them. Not much information in them, especially Michael's (the father), but may be helpful anyway.

Now back to the other research I did on Mary A. Withers. I got her marriage record and her name is listed as Mollie, the only record I found that listed that name, all the others are Mary A. (enclosed). Also enclosed is her death certificate (they told me at the courthouse that normally it would not be on file there because she died out of the county, but evidently someone in the family requested that it be filed there - thank goodness because otherwise it would have been harder to locate her exact date - unless the church had it of course). Enclosed - copies of her obituary and a copy of the 1898 city directory showing the Gleason's. (I put a question mark on James Gleason because of the address - it may have just been a typo). Mary lived at that same address - she was listed as a widow, but the courthouse does not have a death certificate on him, nor is he listed in the Archives mortuary records or cemetery records. They do not have Mount Moriah cemetery records so there is a possibility he was buried there, or maybe he died somewhere else and is buried there - they were not married very long and she never remarried). I will include the city directory information and funeral home information right after I finish this part of the letter.
