later years and eventually in her last illness and death, and even to tend to her affairs after her death, it can never equal what she did for me. I am attempting now with my own children to amortize the debt to her by trying to give to them what I owe to her.

It's rather difficult to be specific and name one way in which the family was important in fostering my development through childhood to maturity. In retrospect I guess it was a lasting sense of values, long-term goals, and outstanding example is how my mother fostered my development. She made doing the right thing seem worth the effort. She put long-term goals ahead of short-term goals and gave us the motivation to weather the storms between ports. Her unflagging example made the whole thing possible.

There weren't any conflicting tasks of mine with the family, as I recall. Admittedly, it is difficult to recall some aspects of this study.

Looking back, which is difficult, it seems to me that I poorly met the shift in developmental tasks at the stage where the last housekeeper left. Prior to that time the house cleaning, food preparation, washing, ironing, etc. were the responsibility of the housekeeper. It was ever thus in my remembering up to the rather significant age of thirteen years. Then, WHAM! Housekeeper Number Six left to work in a defense plant because it was more patriotic than cleaning our house and my mother decided we could manage without a replacement. The proverbial roof fell in as my mother and I attempted to cope with the above mentioned chores in what amounted to our "spare time". It was a difficult adjustment at a difficult age. In retrospect I think I met that developmental task poorly. *Me age facto pubatty had aquit*

In general, I think the individual developmental tasks complimented each other. It's a strain, however, to be concise about happenings of a minimum of thirty years ago, you know.

Contracting Family

My family helped me "leave the nest" by providing encouragement and partial financial support. Although getting a job right out of high school would have eased our economic picture, my mother had a longer range view than that. She encouraged both my brother and me to go on to college.

Where we lived it was possible to attend a junior college while still living at home. This reduced expenses considerably and allowed me to continue working part time as I had all through high school. This was further supplemented by evening baby-sitting. Under this arrangement my mother was providing room and board and I was handling the rest of the expenses. Of course my potential earning power was not being realized as yet.

At the end of two years I was able to truly "leave the nest" when I went on the the university for the next two years of college. With the help of a small scholarship and a modest clothing allowance from my mother I was able to survive through that period. My savings were supplemented by a part-time job for the university in the department of my major.

Upon graduation my resources were virtually depleted, but I had achieved my goal. My mother assisted at the second stage of the launching by lending me enough money to buy a second-hand car to get me to my place of employment. She also lent me enough for living expenses until my first pay check. It didn't take long to pay the financial debt once I was established in a full-time, professional level job. The personal debt will never be fully paid. Although I was able to advise and assist my mother in her Allocation of resources was very well handled. This was done much in the style of "Mama's Bank Account" by Katherine Forbes. Although there never was alot of money, there always seemed to be enough for the really important things. I still don't know exactly how that was accomplished.

The division of labor was somewhat askew due to having domestic help. We had certain responsibilites outside of what she did. But it wasn't until after the last housekeeper left that the burden really descended.

Socialization was a task very successfully met. My mother was very social herself and moved smoothly and surely in a group. Mostly by example, sprinkled with direct guidance, she led us down the path to being socially acceptable creatures.

One thing my mother had trouble doing was releasing us at maturity. Under the circumstances, I think that was understandable. We were her whole life for so long it's easy to see why it would be harder to do than under more usual circumstances.

The maintenance of order was very sucessfully met. This also was done mostly by example.

Placement of members in larger society was also successfully met. As noted above, my mother was quite social and as a teacher was more active in the community than some full-time housewives might be. Her skills in this area made our transition smoother than it might have otherwise been.

Maintenance of motivation and morale was also successfully met. My mother's personal spitit encouraged and generated an <u>esprit de corps</u> which carried us as a family through many difficult periods.

imposed an atypical situation

Obviously the stage of the family at the time of the death of my father which shifted the developmental tasks. The absence of my mother due to the necessity of her returning toteach furthur magnified these discrepencies. These factors certainly interferred with or affected meeting developmental tasks.

As to individual developmental tasks, my mother did everything humanly possible to equip us to enter society as useful citizens. However, as noted repeatedly above, my father's absence affected both the family and my individual developmental tasks. It is rather obvious that my mother couldn't meet all of her own and my father's tasks. This limitation was the only limit on my family's help toward me meeting my developmental tasks. My family of orientation was very definitely inner-directed in its personality orientation. If my father had lived, it might have been different. However, at his death my mother assumed her double dose of developmental tasks with all the strength she could muster. She instilled in me, mostly by example, an almost exaggerated sense of responsibility and a taste for the satisfaction of a job well done, with almost no need for approval.

As you might expect in an inner-directed family, my family of orientation was definitely entreprenurial. Because of the circumstances under which I grew up, independence, mastery, training the child to change the situation, self-control, etc. were essential to our survival as a family unit.

As I recall from what my mother has told me in the past, I was raised in a strict manner as a child. This was typical in the 1930's and I believe my mother "went all the way" at that time.

However, again of necessity, as we passed from infancy to childhood she became more permissive. This was no doubt partially influenced by having to do the job alone.

The distinction between traditional and developmental conceptions of family members is less clear cut than any of the catagories above. My family of orientation was a blend of both. Traditional and developmental were probably about equally shared. If a choice had to be made, then the trend was probably from the middle ground toward the developmental.

Expanding Family

Although my mother and father built a new house in anticipation of my arrival, they built it with one bedroom and space in the attic for two more to be built later. Because of my father's death this was never done. When the housekeeper arrived, she moved into the breakfast room, which adjoined the kitchen. When my brother was of an age that my mother thought he should be in a separate room, he moved into a corner of the dining room. When the housekeeper left, he moved into the breakfast room. That left my mother and me in the bedroom.

Although this was a less than ideal situation, I don't recall that we felt especially deprived. The Depression had its clutches on the nation's economy at that time and we fared better than most. Since we had food, clothing and medical care, I'd have to say that my family was relatively successful in meeting the developmental tasks of physical maintenance. When it is realized that my ninty-eight pound mother was doing the providing, I'd say that she was pretty successful.

We visited often with my paternal grandmother and maiden aunt and even spent brief vacations at their home. Since we were the only grandchildren on that side of the family, they were predictably indulgent to a fault. They bestowed luxuries when our needs were in the realm of necessities.

While my father was living, his salary was the only source of income. However, his parents were wealthy and I know that valuable gifts were bestowed with some frequency. This was still true to a lesser degree after my father's death, when my mother's salary was the sole source of income.

Know Because I was so young when my father died, I don't specifically what his occupation was. His education, through a Bachelor of Arts degree, was in liberal arts with a law minor. He had railroad experience in the Quartermaster Corps and upon discharge went to work for the Atcheson, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad. I only know that he was involved with freight rather than passengers. It could be assumed that with the indicated education 2206 ANZA and experience that the position had some authority and/or responsibility associated with it.

In expectation of my birth my parents built a new home in the suburbs and moved from a flat in The City, which they had occupied since their marriage. My mother had stopped teaching at the time of their marriage and was at home full time. Presumably, my father was progressing in his job as he had been employed eight years at the time of my birth.

The area where our house was built was considered a "fashionable suburb" by society editors and some others. It is still considered so by some.

Atmosphere of Home of Family of Orientation

It is difficult to make definitive statements in this area because of the atypical situation. A working mother and an almost constant stream of domestic help of necessity produced flexibility in family roles. When my mother was at home (school vacations in particular) she was obviously the head of the house. In her absence the gap was fulled with varying degrees of success by the housekeeper. As my brother and I grew up we assumed responsibilities in accord with our age and abilities. My interests were mainly in the garden until we dispensed with the housekeeper when I was thirteen. Housework came as a rude shock at a particularly vulnerable age. I have not recovered from the trauma even yet.

Companionship would certainly describe my family of orientation interactions. My mother of necessity relied heavily on us in proportion to our age for helping make decisions that affected us all. Also of necessity the housekeeper was considered part of the family. She participated to the extent that the decisions affected her.

BIOGRAPHY: MY FAMILY OF ORIENTATION

Framework

My father was thirty-three years old and my mother was thirty-one when I was born. They had been married four years at the time of my birth. They met during World War I while my father was serving as a lieutenant in the Quartermaster Corps of the United States Army. Prior to that time he had recieved a bachelors degree from Saint Ignatius College, which is now the University of San Francisco.

My mother had graduated from State Normal School, which is now San Francisco State College, and was teaching elementary school. As was common in that generation, they did not marry until my father was "established" in his job.

Although my maternal grandfather had died when my mother was four years old, her mother married again and had three more children. My maternal grandmother died the year my father was discharged from the Army. Since my mother lived with them and the half-sisters and brother were still of school age, these family ties may have been a factor in the delay of the marriage.

My father lived with his parents, a brother, sister and an old-maid aunt. His father died a month before I was born.

My brother was born eighteen months after I was. As is often the case when children are close in age, we were often mistaken for twins, much to our mutual disgust.

When I was three and my brother was eighteen months old, my father died. Since my mother never remarried, there were no more siblings and my mother assumed the developmental tasks of both mother and father. This necessitated her almost immediate return to elementary school teaching. It also necessitated the inclusion of a live-in housekeeper into the family. There were about six of them in a period of about ten years, which was less than satisfactory, but a fact of life, domestically speaking, then even as now.

My extended family lived in San Francisco - eighteen miles to the north. My paternal grandmother, her unmarried sister and my father's unmarried sister made up one household. My mother's step-father, his unmarried sister, and my mother's younger halfbeother and half-sister made up the second household. My mother's older sister, who was married and had three children about the same ages as my brother and me, made up the third and last household of my extended family.

My aunt and uncle with the three children visited us often as we lived in what was considered "the country" by The City dwellers. Actually, we lived in a residential suburb of San Francisco called Burlingame.
