ORDER FOR PHOTOCOPIES
CONCERNING VETERAN

(See reverse for explanation)

For the purpose of obtaining the benefit of an act for the relief of certain surviving officers and soldiers of the army of the revolution, approved on the 15th day of May, 1828, I, George King, of Hampshire County, in the state of Virginia, do hereby declare, that I enlisted in the Continental line of the army of the revolution, for and during the war, and continued in its service, until its termination, at which period, I was a private in capt. Reed's Company, in the fourth regiment of the Maryland line. And I also declare, that my discharge has been lost; but that sufficient evidence of my being a revolutionary soldier, may be found in the fact, that I now draw a pension from the state of Maryland, for revolutionary services. And I further declare, that I was not, on the 15th day of March, 1828, on the pension list of the United States.

Before me, Robert Gustin, justice of the peace in the County of Morgan, in the state of Virginia, personally appeared this day, Dennis O'Brien, of the said County, who made oath, that George King, by whom the foregoing declaration is subscribed, is generally reputed, and believed to have been a soldier in the revolution, in manner as therein stated. Witness my hand, this 5. day of August, 1828.

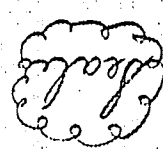

 Maryland, and commanded by me, to serve for three years, or
 during the war; and who by reference to the act of assembly for
 the year 1780, were entitled to the same pay, clothing, and
 rations, as officers of the same rank, and soldiers in the service
 of the United States, and which were engaged in the service of the
 United States, under the direction of the executive of Maryland;
 and that he continued to serve in said company both on and off the
 revolutionary war, when he was discharged.

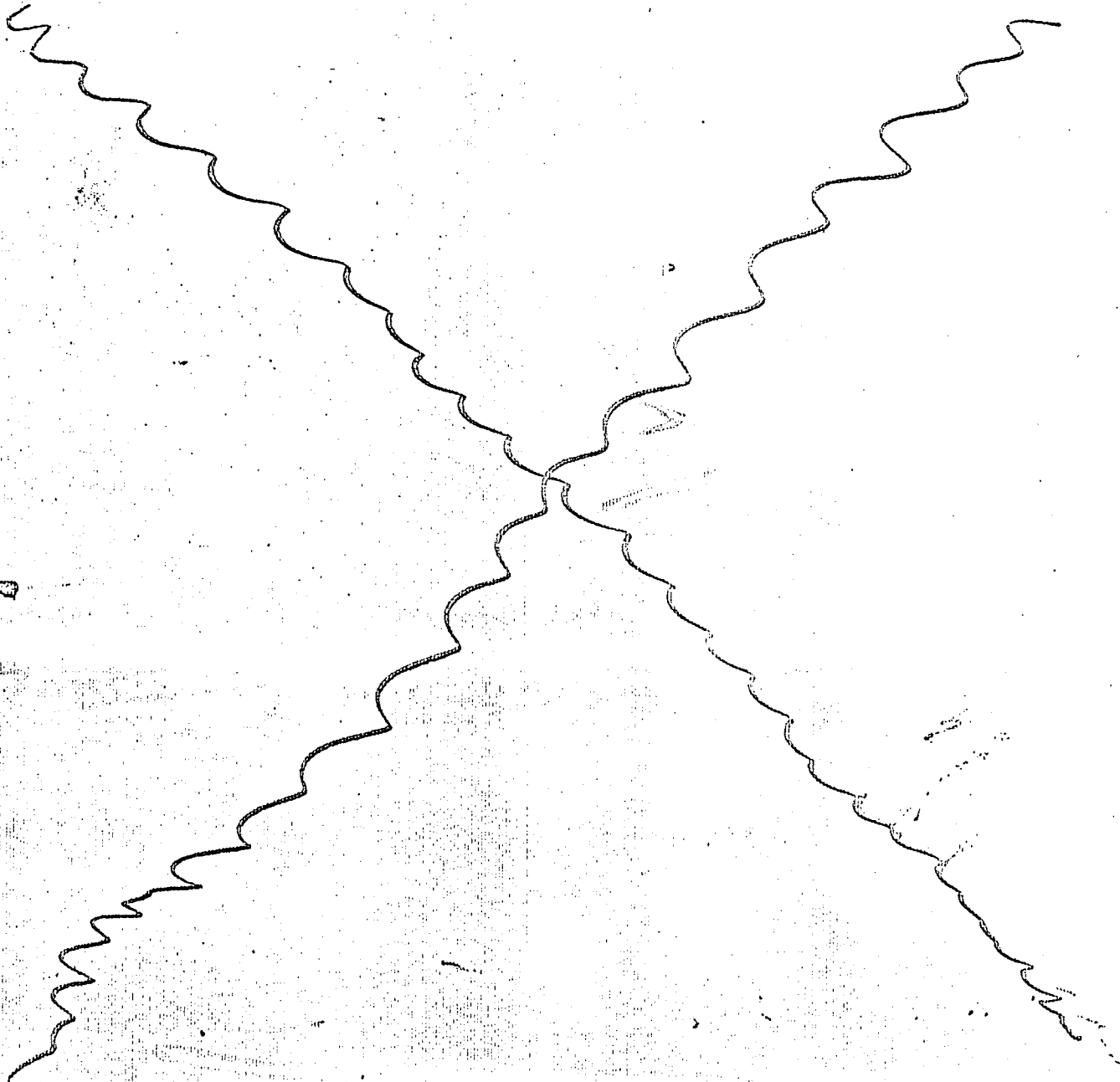

Orphans Court for Alleghany County

Be it remembered that on this 31st day of January in the year 1854 before the Orphans Court for Alleghany County personally appeared Mrs. Susanna King and made oath in due form of law that she is unable to procure any public or private record of her marriage as none exists to her knowledge and that the papers now on file to procure a pension under the act of February 3. 1853 embody the best kind of evidence of her marriage that she can produce.

On this 7th day of June 1853 personally
appeared before the Orphans Court of Alleghany
County, State of Maryland (it being a Court
& Record); Susanna King a resident of
Alleghany County aforesaid, aged 71 years,
who first being duly sworn according to Law
to do on her oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefits of the provisions
made by the act of Congress, passed on the 3^d.
of February 1853, granting Pensions to Widows
& Persons who served during the Revolutionary
war; that she is the widow of George King,
a private in Revolutionary war and whose
name is borne on the Pension rolls for State
& Maryland under the act of June 7th 1832
to the rate of Eighty Dollars per annum.
She further declares that she was married
to the said George King on the 9th day of July
1808; that her said husband died on the 20th
day of August 1848; that she was not married
to him prior to the second of January 1800,
nor at the time above stated. She further de-
clares that she is now a widow.

said George and Susanna King for about fifty years; that they lived together as man and wife and that the fact that they were lawfully married on the 9th. of July 1808 has never been called in question; that said parties were well known throughout Allegany County and were always recognized as man and wife, and that she, the said Susanna King has remained a widow ever since the death of her said husband, George King.

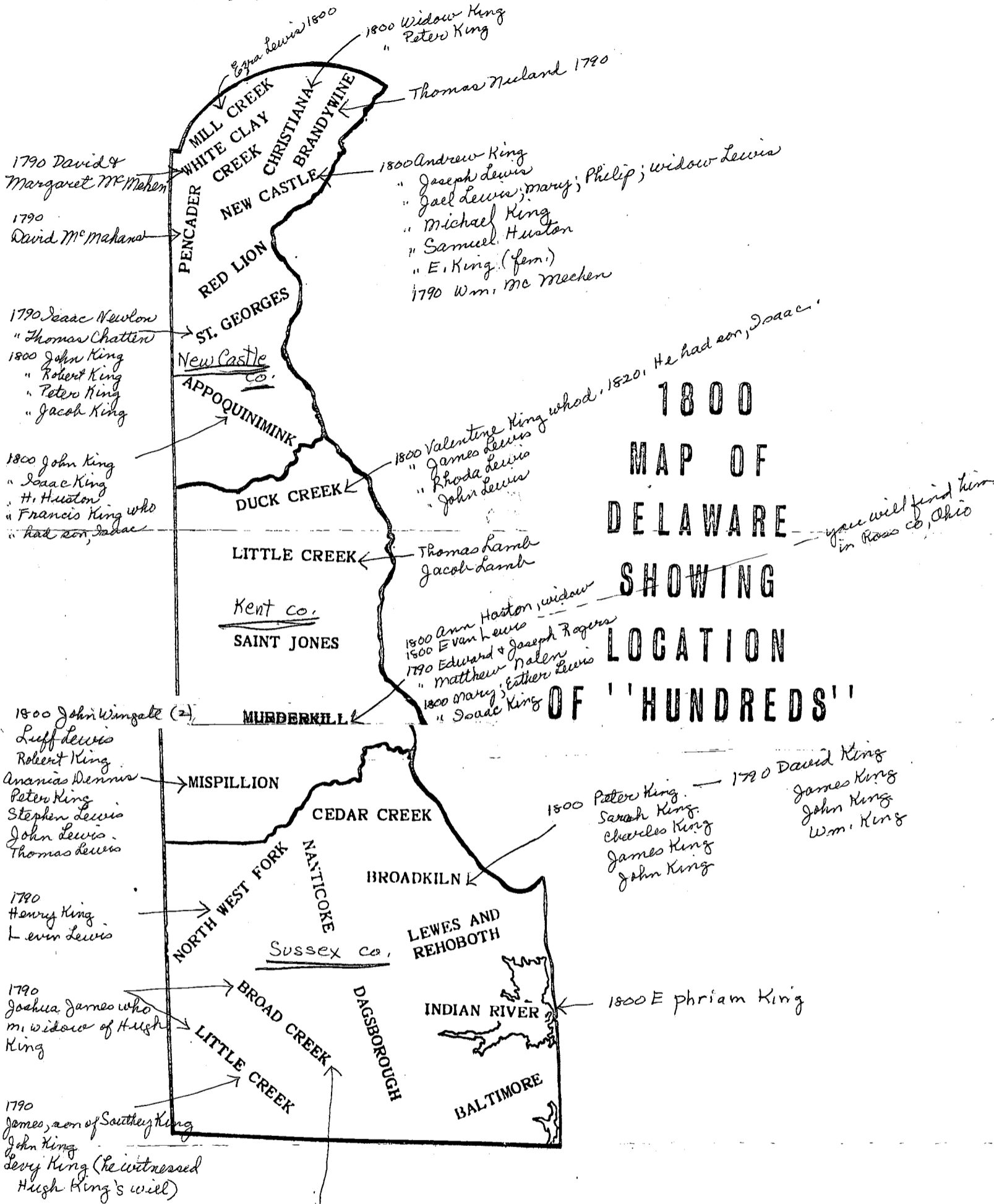
