In the name of God Amen this third day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and thirty six, I Simon Gates Jun'r of Stow in the County of Middlesex in the Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England, yeoman, being under much bodily indisposition but as perfect as ever in memory & understanding, do constitute and ordain this to be my last Will & testament, that is to say principally & first of all I recommend my soul to God who gave it and my Body to the Earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion & Expence of my Executor hereafter named. In the belief of the Resurrection & as touching the worldly estate which God hath given me I give and dispose as followeth.

Item. I give to my brother Elisha Gates whom I constitute the sole Executor of this my last will & testament all that messuage or (living?) which I purchased of Steven Gates of late in ye possession of my Uncle Nath'l Gates which messuage lyeth in Stow aboves. and is bounded as is set forth in the Deed which sd. Steven Gates gave to me which messuage with the buildings and appurtenances are to be enjoyed by him ye sd. brother Elisha Gates during the term of his natural life & after his Death to descend to the oldest male heir of his Body & after him to be possessed and enjoyed by the eldest male Branch of the House or Family of my sd. Brother Elisha Gates from generation to generation forever, but if my sd. Brother should dye without such a Male Heir of his Body said messuage is to be enjoyed by the Female Heirs of his Body during the term of Their Natural lives and after the death of all of them to revert to the oldest Male Branch of the Family of my Brother Amos Gates to be enjoyed by his and his eldest male heir & so from generation to generation forever, unless one of the sd. daughters of my sd. Brother Elisha Gates should marry with one of the natural posterity of my father Simon Gates of the Name of ye Gates's. For this case, ye eldest Daughter of my said Brother Elisha Gates that shall so marry shall enjoy sd. messuage and her oldest Male Branch of her Family in the Name of the Gates's generation to generation forever, and my will is that the eldest daughter of my sd. Brother Elisha Gates that shall so marry shall enter upon the possession of the same messuage immediately upon the death of father sd. Elisha Gates if she shall marry in her sd. father's lifetime, but if she shall marry after his Death

she shall enter upon it immediately upon such Marriage and the other sisters are to be from thence forward excluded having any right in the messuage abovesaid and further if their shall still be a defect of male issue of the Name of Gates's in her Family then any one of her other sisters shall be entitled to sd. messuage if they shall marry one of the Posterity of my sd. Brother Elisha Gates. The land which I purchased of Jonathan Gates lying in Stow abovesaid and on Elizabeth Brooke conveyed to me in ye deed bearing Date the 28th of November 1732 to be enjoyed by him or disposed of at his pleasure together with all my undivided land in Grafton in the County of Worcester to be at his free disposal & further I give and bequeath to my sd. Brother Elisha Gates all my money bonds bills & indentures with all my livestock all my chattels and moveable estate wheresoever and whatsoever enjoining & obliging him to pay all my just Debts & funeral charges and all the legacies & Bequests hereafore or hereafter mentioned in this my last Will & testament - -

Item. I give to my Brother Amos Gates all my meadow lying in the great meadow in Stow abovesd. to be at his entire disposal. I also give to my sd. Brother fifty pounds to be paid him by my Executor abovesaid within fourteen years after my decease.

Item. I give to my eldest sister Hannah Heald ten pounds to her, her Heirs & Assigns to be paid her withint fifteen years after my decease by my Executor abovesd. - - - - - - - -

Item. I give to my sister Mary Haynes ten pounds to be paid within sixteen years after my Death by Executor above nam'd.

Item. I give to the Children of my sister Susanna Fitch one pound apiece, that is to say one Pound & twenty shillings to each of the children she hath, shall have, being born of her Body, to be paid them by my sd. Executor as they shall arrive at the age of twenty and one years and revoking all other wills by me at any time made I do ratify & confirm Elisha Gates the sole Executor of the same. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year first above written.

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

Stephen Gates of Hingham, Lancaster and Cambridge, Massachusetts. Contributed by Mrs. Frances E. Sage, Endicott, N.Y.

Printed below is material from the Boston Transcript of 16 September 1925 concerning the ancestry of Stephen¹ Gates. Although it was published over sixty years ago and is absolutely correct, it is amazing how the error it mentions has persisted and been brought forth time after time. I feel it is my responsibility to combat the false story of Stephen Gates's ancestry whenever I can, because it was my own grandfather who started it in the first place. He gave the misinformation to C. O. Gates, who incorporated it into the preface of his book, Stephen Gates of Hingham and Lancaster, Massachusetts, and his Descendants (New York, 1898). I think my grandfather must have seen Peter Gates's pedigree in one of the publications of the Harleian Society and merely jumped to the conclusion that Peter had to be Stephen's grandfather.

GATES. There is a Gates genealogy, frequently quoted and apparently generally accepted, which gives Stephen Gates, the immigrant, as son of Thomas Gates of Norwich, Norfolk, England, and grandson of Peter and Mary (Josselyn) Gates of London. Mr. Charles Otis Gates in his book on the Gates family gives this line and seems to be satisfied with the evidence, although he gives no proofs. Within the past month I have seen a Visitation of Suffolk made in 1612 and delivered in 1621 which includes further data, that shows that Stephen could not possibly have been a grandson of Peter and Mary Gates. Peter Gates was twenty-nine years old in 1612, and had one "son and heir, Josselyn, aged 3 and 2 daughters." Stephen's birth date is not known, but he was married and had five children, all born in England, when he came to America in 1634 or 1642, I have seen both dates given, but incline to the later one. Obviously Peter could not have had a son Thomas born after 1612, who would be a grandfather in 1642.

The Hon. Benjamin A. G. Fuller of Boston stated in the New England Genealogical and Historical Register [sic] in 1877: "From certain old manuscripts in my possession, it seems that Stephen Gates, second son of Thomas Gates of Norwich, Norfolk, came to this country and settled at Hingham." There has never been any reason to question this statement, but the later claim that Thomas was the son of Peter seems now disproved.

Peter Gates was married to Marian Jocelyn in the parish of High Roding, Essex, 6 October 1605; and their son Jocelyn was baptised at the London church of St. Mary Woolchurch Haugh in February 1606/7.

association with him I never found Mr. Clark wrong. When he said a thing I knew it was so, for, though many a time I had been sure he was mistaken, I never in the end had found him to be." This unusual accuracy was accompanied by a keen sense of justice, combined, however, with great personal modesty and a most kindly, sympathetic nature, showing itself in constant thoughtfulness for others and in liberal assistance to all good causes.

Mr. Clark was married in Hartford, Connecticut, April 15, 1869, to Mary, eldest daughter of Charles Haskell Brainard of that city. Of this marriage, one son, Charles Brainard Clark, was born in Boston March 19, 1874. On June 23, 1892, in Boston, he married for his second wife, Emma Angeanette (Harding) Otis, who, with his son, survives him.

He lived in Boston until 1894, when he took up his permanent residence in his father's old home at Framingham, an estate of much natural beauty, and there, amid congenial surroundings both in and out of doors, he lived a quiet, cultured life during the hours that could be spared from his business activities. There, also, he received his friends with a charming hospitality that will always be gratefully remembered. One of these well says of him: "His spiritual aspirarations were known to his intimate friends, and they knew perfectly well that he based his trust on the everlasting things of life, even in the life of to-day. Never could there be a truer friend. To us all he has left a legacy of sweet, tender remembrance — an essence that quickens in one the desire to be worthy of one's day here, as helpful, as fair to all, as was he."

As for other estate I have already given him to the value of £24. To my beloved wife Hannah Read fifty pounds of stock and moveables to be at her own dispose, one room of the house which she shall choose, and a privilege in the cellar, during her widowhood, likewise the improvement of the rest of my housing and lands, tan fats and orchards not disposed of, until my son Thomas comes to the age of twenty-one, then my wife and my son Thomas are to improve it together until my son Nathaniel is twenty-one, then my wife shall resign up all said lands and housing to my two said sons, except the room and cellar privilege, they to provide her with corn, meat, malt, wood and clothing, to provide for two cows for her during her widowhood, and help if need require, and some fruit of the orchard. To my two sons Thomas and Nathaniel, (upon the above condition, to provide for their mother), my dwelling house, barn, orchard, tan fats and house lot, twelve acres in the Ragged plain, four acres more, lying between the land of James Read and Nathaniel Carpenter, fifty acres in the fork of the river upon the Mill River, two shares of meadow ground and the ponds on the east side of the river adjacent to the lands, ten acres nearest to the aforesaid lands in the fork of the river, ten acres in the second division and my meadow in the forty acres, four acres of salt meadow at the hundred acres, likewise ten acres of land at the northerly end of the great plain (unless David Peren continues with them

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chiefly of that character. Mr. Goss was throughout his life an enthusiastic autograph collector. Soon after the Civil War he wrote the "Melrose Memorial," and "Annals of Melrose in the Great Rebellion, 1861-65." Among his other works are "Early Bells of Massachusetts," published in 1874, "The Centennial Fourth, 1876," "History of Middlesex County," in 1890, "The Life of Col. Paul Revere," in two volumes, in 1892, and the "History of Melrose," in 1902. He also contributed with considerable regularity to the Magazine of American History, The New England Magazine, the Bay State Monthly, and other periodicals.

Mr. Goss early allied himself with the Orthodox Congregational Church of Melrose, was Treasurer and Collector of the Society for fifty years, a term of service that has rarely been equalled in this position, and for the last ten years of his life was a Deacon of the Church. During all this time he was a constant attendant of the Sunday School connected with the church.

On December 22, 1903, Mr. and Mrs. Goss celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage at their home in Cedar Park, Melrose, where a very interesting occasion was made by the host of friends who gathered to do them honor.

Mr. Goss was a member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, elected in 1869, and an original trustee of its Kidder Fund. He was also a member of the Prince Society and at one time its Treasurer, the Bostonian Society, the Bunker Hill Monument Association, the American Historical Association, and many other historical and literary societies.

Mr. Goss died immediately after his return from a summer vacation spent at Jackson, N. H. He contracted a cold, and pneumonia developed speedily, ending a career that had been faithful to God, himself and his brother men. Gentle, lovable, wise, a man whole-souled and true, and one whose like is rarely met.



He was the second son of Thomas Gates of Norwich, Norfolk County, England; he came from Hingham, England, to Hingham, Massachusetts Bay, America, in the ship "Diligent" of Ipswich, England, in the year 1638. He was accompanied by his wife Ann (The Chute Genealogy," by William Edward Chute, gives her surname as 1611) and two children.

He settled at Hingham, Mass., removed thence to Lancaster, Mass., at the settlement of that place, was there in 1656, and subsequently went to Cambridge, Mass., where he died in 1662. His will, dated June 9, 1662, was proved October 7, 1662, therefore his death occurred between those dates.

Mr. H. S. 'Nourse, in his book, "EARLY RECORDS OF LANCASTER," speaks thus of Stephen Gates and his family:

"The Gates blood seems to have been of decided tropical nature. The daughter, Mary, very boldly contradicted the minister in the public assembly. Stephen Gates quarrelled with his neighbors, the Whitcombes, was deprived of his constable's staff, and moved away from Lancaster after less than three years' residence. He died at Cambridge in 1662, and his sons attempted, without success, to break his will, alleging that their father was not of disposing mind."

This "tropical nature" of the Gates blood was evidently a heritable element, for they were fighters in the Indian and

By his will Stephen, the eldest son, received the house and lot in Lancaster. His wife and son Simon received his place in Cambridge, his son Thomas was to remain with them at his pleasure. Ann, the widow of Stephen Gates, married Richard Woodward, of Watertown, Mass., in 1663. The "Chute Genealogy" says: "Richard Woodward, aged 45, and wife, Rose, aged 50, Ipswich, England, came to Watertown, Mass., in 1634, with his two sons, George and John."

"Rose died in 1662, aged 80." (?) "He married 2nd, Ann widow of Stephen Gates, and died February 16, 1665, Æ. 76." Ann resumed the name of Gates on the death of Richard Woodward, and died at Stow, Mass., February 5, 1682-3.

was born in Stow, Mass., July 10, 1718. He was a husbandman, and lived on the old "Gates Farm," which had belonged to his father and grandfather before him. He was often engaged in town affairs, and held various offices. In 1753 he was chosen field-driver and deer-reeve, and in 1757, surveyor of highways. He served as warden in 1767, and as constable for three years. He held the military rank of ensign, and was so called on the records as early as 1767. When over sixty years of age, he gave his aid to the cause of American Independence, and rendered acceptable military service during the Revolution.

Daniel³ Gates, his father, who was born April 25, 1685, and died March 22, 1759, was a man of good standing in the town of Stow, where he resided. He was chosen at various times, by his fellow-townsmen, to act on local committees. In 1720 he was tything-man, and in 1721 fence-viewer. He served as selectman in 1724, '38, '47, '51, and '52. He was appointed one of a committee December 9, 1724, "to agree with and procure a man to keep school for said town [Stow] for one quarter, to teach children to read and write on sd day it was voted and the School is to be kept one month at Phineas Rice's house, and the 2^d month at Daniel Gates, and the 3^d month at John Taylor's house." In 1736, the town voted to give Rev. John Gardner a gratuity, and it is gratifying to learn that the name of Daniel Gates does not appear among those who "entered their Desents against the vote of sixty pounds."

After the marriage of their son Silas, Daniel and Anna* Gates conveyed to him the homestead estate, and it is supposed that their last days were spent with him.

This homestead was a portion of the so-called "Gates Farm," which Stephen Gates bought of an Indian in 1684. Below is given a copy of the conveyance from the aboriginal owner, which is on record in Middlesex

Registry of Deeds, vol. ix: p. 57. The original instrument, engrossed on parchment and in good preservation, is still in existence in Stow.

To all people to whom this prient Deed of Sale shall come Benjamin Bowhoe an Indian of Pompacittaquutt in New England Sendeth Greeting know yee that I the sd Benjamin Bowhoe for & in consideration of the Sum of fourty shillin in currant money of New England to me in hand at & before the Ensealing & delivery of these prients by Stephen Gates of Stow of Pompacittaquutt in the county of Middlesex within the colony of the Mattachufetts in New England yeoman, as Affignee of Edward Drinker of Boston in New England aforesd Potter, well & truly payd, the Receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge & my-Selfe there with fully satisfyed & contented and thereof and of every part thereof do hereby acquitt exonerate & discharge the sd Stephen Gates, his heyrs executors & Administrators for ever by these prsents have given, granted, bargained, fold, aliened, enfeoffed releafed & confirmed, and by these prients do freely, clearly and absolutely give, grant, bargaine, fell, alien, enfeoffe, release & confirme unto him the sd Stephen Gates his heyrs & Affigns for ever Three hundred Acrs of land, bee the fame more or less scittuate lying & being within the sd Township of Stow on both Sides of a certain Brook there comonly called & known by the name of Elsabeth als Alsabat Brook according as the sd land is mentioned to be bounded in a certain Deed of Sale thereof under the hand & seal of the sd Edward Drinker given & delivered unto the sd Stephen Gates & which sd land is now in the Tenure & occupation of the sd Stephen Gates Together with all & fingular the proffitts, privileges, rights, libertyes, benefitts, Advantages comodityes, heredittamts & Appurtenances Whatsoever to the sd Three hundred Acrs of land or to any part thereof belonging or in anywife appertaining or therewith now used occupied or injoyed To Have

and to Hold the sd Three hundred acres of land with all other the above granted prmifes unto the sd Stephen Gates his heyrs & Affigns forever & to the only propper use benefitt & behoofe of him ye sd Stephen Gates his heyrs & Affigns for ever. And I the sd Benjamin Bowhoe for me my heyrs executors & Administrators do hereby covenant, promife & grant to & with the sd Stephen Gates his heyrs & Affigns in manner & forme following (that is to Say) that at the time of this prient bargaine and Sale & untill the Ensealing & delivery of these prients I was the true, sole & lawfull owner of all the afore bargained prmifes & am lawfully seized off & in the fame & every part thereof in my own propper right and have in my self full powr, good right & lawfull Authority to grant sell, convey, & affure the fame unto ye sa Stephen Gates his heyrs & Affigns as a good perfect & abfolute Estate of Inheritance in ffee simple without any manner of condition, Reversion or limitation whatsoever so as to alter, change, defeat or make voyd the fame & that the sd Stephen Gates his heyrs & Affigns shall & may by force & vertue of these prsents from time to time & at all times for ever hereafter lawfully peaceably & quietly have, hold, use, occupy, possess & injoy the above granted prmises with the appurtenances yre unto belonging free & clear & clearly acquitted & discharged of & from all & all manner of former & other gifts, grants, bargains, sales, leafes, morgages, Joyntures, Dowers, Judgemts Executions, Entalles forfeitures & of & from all other Titles, Troubles, charges & Incumbrances whatfoever, had, made, comitted done or fuffred to be done by me the sd Benjamin Bowhoe or my heyrs & Affigns or at any time or times before th' Ensealing hereof.

And further that I the s^d Benjamin Bowhoe my heyrs Executors & Administrators shall & will from time to time & att all times forever hereaster warrant & defend the above granted prmises with the appurtenances & every part thereof unto the s^d Stephen Gates his heyrs & Assigns against all and every prion and prions whatsoever any ways lawfully claiming or demanding the same or any part thereof. In wit-

Stephen² Gates died possessed of this farm, lying on and around Spindle Hill, which he left to his six sons to be equally divided among them. The division deed was dated March 26, 1710/11, and was recorded July 1, 1718.* Two sons, Stephen³ and Thomas,³ sold their shares and removed to Connecticut. The other four, Simon,³ Isaac,³ Nathaniel³ and Daniel,³ settled in Stow. Daniel's share was next adjoining that of his brother Nathaniel, and included the dwelling-house, barn and

orchard. In the conveyance of the farm to his son Silas, mentioned above, dated March 25, 1741, and entered for record May 20, 1757, he described it as follows:—

"One mefuage and parcel of Land lying and being in Stow above sd and Consisting of plow land meadow land pafturage & Woodland with a house & barn on the fame Containing by Estimation Seventy and three acres be the fame more or lefs fifty acres of the fame as it is Computed is farm land being a part of Gates Farm so Called the other twenty & three Acres as computed is Division land all of it laid out to me as my proportion of the farm right Save five acres and Sixty rods which I purchased of Hezekiah Hapgood all of said Land lyeth in one Intire Peice save only the partition of a highway and adjoining to the laft mentioned fifty acres & all together make one Intire Meffuage."*

After the death of Silas⁴ Gates, his real estate passed to his two elder sons, Jonathan⁵ and Oliver⁵. Jonathan removed from town, and Oliver succeeded to the homestead, which he afterwards conveyed to his son Oliver,⁶ in two deeds, one of which was dated July 1, 1816, and the other December 30, 1822; but they were not recorded until June 18, 1839, shortly after his death. He reserved to himself the back part of the house, with liberty, however, "to use the oven which is in the front part of the house," and "to pass through the front part of the house to the well for water"; and he gave the

right to his son Oliver,6 "to pass through the back part of the house, up chamber and down cellar."

When Oliver⁶ made his will in 1846, he bequeathed the estate to his grandsons Stephen⁸ and Ephraim,⁸ Jr., provided they would "carry on the farm in a good husbandry like manner, and carry in one half of the produce to their Mother Lydia Gates during her life." His will mentions one son Ephraim,⁷ his wife Lydia, and their five children: Stephen,⁸ Ephraim,⁸ Olivia,⁸ Lydia⁸ and Mary⁸. He died March 3, 1850. The inventory, which was taken April 18, 1850, described the real estate as follows:—

The homestead of said deceased, situated in Stow, containing by estimation ninety acres, with the buildings, appraised at \$3,000.

About four acres of woodland situated in Cedar swamp, appraised at \$175.

About ten acres of land situated on Marble Hill, so called, appraised at \$153.

Ephraim,7 the son of Oliver and Olive Gates, was born April 25, 1802, and died January 29, 1872; he was the one who bought Widow Mary Gates's third* in her husband's estate, which his father had been accustomed to rent,† and also assumed some risk in securing a good title, for it is family tradition that one heir never ap-

peared to sign the deed, and that a little piece of the farm is to this day, called "No-man's land."

Stephen, son of Ephraim and Lydia (Walcott) Gates, was the last of the race to own this ancestral estate, for in 1863 he purchased all the right, title and interest, of his brother Ephraim, Jr., for \$700. He married June 16, 1869, Ellen Fitzgerald, and died May 18, 1883, leaving three children, the eldest of whom, Daniel Stephen Gates, was born in Stow, May 12, 1870, "on the old homestead," and takes a justifiable pride in the fact that he is of the eighth generation who has lived there. He is now a resident of Medford.

In January, 1886, the homestead was sold to Daniel A. Fitzgerald of Brookline, Mass. Thus passed out of the family the "Gates Farm," which had been in its possession for two hundred years. It is situated about a mile southwest of the centre of the town, at the foot of Spindle Hill, which, save for the disappearance of the forests that once crowned its summit, remains unchanged since the day when the first settler took up his abode there. The house is in a pleasant location, surrounded by abundant foliage, and in sight of Elsbeth brook. It is now unoccupied, and in need of repair to insure its preservation. In years gone by, Mr. Henry Gates, one of Stow's well known and most respected citizens, has seen four generations in this house at one time: Oliver, (1753-1839); Oliver, (1776-1850); Ephraim, (1802-1872); Stephen, (1831-1883).

Silas⁴ Gates married (1), Mary Whitcomb, daughter of Jonathan and Rachel (Woods) Whitcomb, of Bolton, who was baptized October 4, 1724.

Children, born in Stow:

- I. ELIZABETH,⁵ born July 16, 1744; married in 1767, Joshua Brown, son of Joseph and Grace (Fairbanks) Brown, who was born in Stow, June 24, 1742, and died there June 27, 1817; she died in Stow, Nov. 23, 1826. He was an officer in the Revolution, and was present at the battle of Bunker Hill.
- 11. Anna, born Mar. 27, 1746; married (intention June 19, 1766), Jonathan Wood, son of Jeremiah and Elizabeth (Farr*) Wood, who was born at Payquage (now Athol), Aug. 23, 1744, and died in New Braintree, Sept. 19, 1807; she died there Sept. 8, 1805. He was a husbandman, and resided in Stow, Athol and Gardner before his removal to New Braintree, where he was a useful citizen, and "third deacon" in the church. From this town he enlisted in the Revolutionary War.
- III. Daniel, born Oct. 28, 1747; died Jan. 20, 1778. He marched on the Lexington Alarm, and afterwards had eight months' service as corporal in Capt. Samuel Patch's company, Col. William Prescott's regiment. Feb. 24, 1777, he enlisted in the Continental Army as a private and joined Capt. Joshua Brown's company, Col. Timothy Bigelow's regiment, and was in service at the time of his death. His will may be found in the Addenda.

IV. Jonathan, born July 25, 1749; married Nov. 28, 1785, Hannah Salter, daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Knight) Salter, who was born in Stow, Aug. 5, 1759. He was a soldier of the Revolution and a United States pensioner. He enlisted Feb. 24, 1777, and joined the same company and regiment to which his brother belonged. His name appears on a receipt dated Boston, April 11, 1782, for bounty paid him by Col. Jonathan Hapgood, for three years' service in the Continental Army.

After the war he married, and resided in Stow, where he engaged in farming. In 1793, he was called "of Gardner," when he sold his interest in a parcel of land belonging to his grandfather, Jonathan Whitcomb. He later removed to Westminster where he died. The administration of his estate was granted to his "second son," Samuel Gates, at the request of his widow Hannah, who petitioned for the appointment Mar. 2, 1827, stating that the eldest son was away from home, "I know not where." The bondsmen were Samuel Gates and Harvey Coolidge, Jr., of Gardner.

- v. SILAS, born Feb. 19, 1750/51; probably died young.
- VI. OLIVER, born April 20, 1753; married in Harvard, Oct. 25, 1775, Patience Merriam, daughter* of Nathaniel and Esther (Muzzey) Merriam, who was baptized in Lexington, April 6, 1746; he died May 26, 1839.

According to an agreement of the heirs,* Oliver and his brother Jonathan received the real estate upon the death of their father. Oliver settled upon the homestead, as has been stated, where he always resided. In 1784, and again in 1793, he and his brother and sisters sold their right in certain land of their grandfather, Jonathan Whitcomb, "late of Bolton deceased," which was located in Templeton and Harvard. He was then called "Oliver Gates, Jr., of Stow, husbandman."

The death of his wife is not on record, but it is evident that she died early in life, while he lived to more than fourscore years and five, and was cared for by his son Oliver. He disposed of his property by deed and left no will.

Silas Gates married (2), (intention July 25, 1756), Mary, widow of Thomas Wheeler and daughter of John and Hannah (Buttrick) Daby, who was born in Stow, October 24, 1722.

VII. Mary, born June 28, 1757; married (intention April 24, 1773), Daniel Hooker, son of Jacob and Mary (Farr) Hooker, who was born in Littleton, June 25, 1750. He was a cordwainer by trade and lived in Stow, prior to 1790. In that year he sold his farm, which was situated in the northerly part of the town, to Ephraim Russell for £58: 15s.: 8d. The family afterwards

settled in Brandon, Vt. He is doubtless identical with the Daniel Hooker who was in Capt. Amasa Cranston's company in 1776.

Silas Gates married (3), in 1760, Anna, widow of Samuel Hammond and daughter of Jonathan and Anna (Livermore) Bemis, who was born in Watertown, July 4, 1730.

VIII. EUNICE, born June 26, 1761; married Jan. 27, 1780,
Amos Wheeler, son of Hezekiah and Sarah (Buss)
Wheeler, who was born in Acton, July 12, 1754. He
was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, and marched
from Stow in 1777, to join the army under Gen.
Gates. They removed to Charlestown, N. H., where
he was taxed in 1792. The town has reason to remember Mr. Wheeler and other public-spirited citizens,
for the magnificent shade trees which adorn its streets
and have added thousands of dollars to its real estate.
In 1800 he secured the most thrifty trees to be found,
and planted them on Main Street. To-day they are
the "Great Elms" which have brought comfort and
shade to more than three generations, who have
walked or sat beneath their branches.

IX. CATHERINE, born Mar. 5, 1763; married Mar. 6, 1783,
Aaron Willard, son of Benjamin and Sarah (Brooks)
Willard, who was born in Grafton, Oct. 13, 1757, and
died in Boston, May 20, 1844. She died in Roxbury,
July 30, 1785. He and his son Aaron were famous

clock makers. His name appears on the Lexington Alarm Roll and he afterwards had further service in the Revolution.

Silas Gates married (4), May 8, 1769, Mary, widow of Jonas Brown and daughter of Peter and Lydia Graves, who was born in Stow, August 10, 1735, and died in Ashby, June 19, 1831.

There are also several other papers which have been preserved in the family, and which give additional light on the same subject. These documents are printed verbatim below.

A FAMILY TREASURE.

MONG the heirlooms possessed by various members of the family there is one of special interest—an ancient silver spoon—cherished for the associations which surround it,

rather than for its intrinsic value. Tradition relates that this spoon once belonged to Anna, the wife of Daniel Gates, of Stow, and the letters engraved upon it were reputed to be the initials of Anna Eveleth Gates, and were thought to show that the maiden name of Mrs. Gates was Anna Eveleth.

Among the various reasons assigned for this belief were an occasional mention by some of the elder members of the family, of an Eveleth ancestor, which was supposed by their younger relatives to refer to Mrs. Daniel Gates; and it was also claimed that she was a sister of the Rev. John Eveleth, one of the early ministers of the Church in Stow. But a conveyance of property by Joseph Eveleth of Ipswich (father of John),

family. He moved to Monomoit Shortly after 1681 when he bought a farm. In December 1686 he exchanged his Monomoit farm for a large tract at South Sea (now Harwichport). By deed dated 8 April 1687 he sold half interest in the farm. His wife's name is unknown (History of Chatham, Mass. 115 f.). He was bur. in Bridgetown, Barbados, 7 June 1691 (Burial Register of St. Michael's Church, there).

- Jemima, born perhaps 1636-7. Not the teenage runaway bride vii. some make her, but an adult woman when she m. in Boston, 10 June 1661, Joseph Benjamin. The marriage record implies that she was living in Boston at that time and, as stated above, I suspect she had been living with her brother Thomas.
- Jobaniah, bapt. Dorchester, 23 (4) 1639. Records of the 1st viii. Church of Dorchester 169 shows: "The returns of such children as have been baptized in the Church of Dorchester by communion of churches, their parents, one or both, being members of the Church at Windsor or Hingham" including the above baptism. He apparently d. young, probably in 1641, when so many Barnstable children died.

In 1639 Thomas Lombard was one of the first settlers of Barnstable, apparently there already when the Rev. John Lothrop arrived with the main group of settlers. Plymouth Colony Records show that on 3 Dec. 1639 Thomas Lumbert was "allowed to keepe Victualling, or an ordinary, for entertainement of passengers, and to draw wyne at Barnstable." The last two children of Thomas were born at Barnstable.

- Jedediah, b. 20 Sept. 1640 (M.D. 11:97), bapt. 5 Dec. 1641; ix. m. 20 May 1668, Hannah Wing. He was proposed as a freeman 6 June 1682.
- Benjamin, b. 26 Aug. 1642 (ibid.), bapt. 5 Aug. 1643; m. (1) x. 19 Sept. 1672, Jane Warren, d. 27 Feb. 1682; (2) 19 Nov. 1685, Sarah Walker, d. 6 Nov. 1693; (3) 24 May 1694, Widow Hannah Whetstone (M.D. 11:98). Benjamin and Hannah were living 11 Feb. 1704/5 when their daughter Martha was baptized. According to "B.C.of Mass." in Genealogy & History of 15 Nov. 1945, he d. in 1725.

Thomas Lombard died between 10 June 1663 when he acknowledged his will and 8 Feb. 1664 when his inventory was taken. He left most of his estate to his wife and three younger sons, Caleb, Jedediah and Benjamin. He also confirms that he formerly gave lands to sons Barnard and Joshua and son-inlaw Joseph Benjamine and son-in-law Edward Coleman. He mentions daughter Margaret Coleman, grandchild Abigaill Benjamine and daughter Jemima. Widow Joyce Lumbert deposed to the truth of the inventory (M.D. 16:124-126). The widow Joyce Lumbert is mentioned as late as 19 Sept. 1683 in Barnstable church records.

BERNARD LOMBARD, born ca. 1608, the second son shown above, probably came to New England with his father in 1630. He became a freeman in Massachusetts, 1 April 1634, when he

was probably a resident of Dorchester (Savage). He was not living in Scituate on 28 Sept. 1634 when the Rev. John Lothrop arrived there, as he is not included in the list made by Lothrop of those having houses in Scituate at that time. However, he moved there a short time later, as he was granted a lot on 6 April 1635. Bernard and his wife joined Lothrop's church, 19 April 1635 (Genealogical Notes of Barnstable Families

His wife's name is unknown, and it is possible that he had two wives. A clue to the identity of the second wife may be in Bernard's deposition of 20 (12) 1668 in which he calls William Clarke of Yarmouth "Father Clarke." This probably means father-in-law. Bernard probably married in 1632 or a little earlier, and he may have married in England, as he was about

Bernard moved to Barnstable in 1639 with the Lothrop group and apparently lived there the rest of his life.

Children:

- Thomas, b. ca. 1633 or perhaps a little earlier. If he or Abigail had been b. after April 1635, they would have been baptized by Mr. Lothrop. Bernard took the oath of fidelity at Barnstable in 1657. He m. Elizabeth Derby, 23 Dec. 1665. That he was not the son of Thomas is proven by the fact that he
- is not mentioned in the will of Thomas, and the arrangement of Barnstable vital records (M.D. 11:97) implies he is Bar-
- Abigail, b. perhaps in 1634. While there is no proof that she is Bernard's daughter, it seems likely she is. She married at Barnstable, 6 Jan. 1654, James Claghorn, and they moved to Yarmouth ca. 1662. Abigail committed suicide Oct. 1677 by hanging. The inquest mentions that she was found by her daughter Elizabeth and her son Robert (Plymouth Colony Recs.).
- iii. Mary, bapt. Scituate, 8 Oct. 1637; m. Barnstable, Dec. 1654,
- iv. Martha, b. probably 19 Sept. 1639, but recorded in records set down long afterwards as 19 Sept. 1640. As she was baptized 3 Nov. 1639, she must have been b. before that date. I do not . believe there were two Marthas as only one was baptized. She m. 1 July 1657, John Martin.
- Jabez, probably b. 1 July 1641, recorded as 1 July 1642 but baptized 4 July 1641. Otis says Lothrop usually baptized children on the Sabbath following their birth. He m. at Barnstable, 1 Dec. 1660, Sarah Derby, and he was listed as a freeman in Barnstable in 1689.

A Joseph Lumbert, aged ca. 29, deposed on 3 July 1671 that he was 30ston, 1667, and heard John Turner give to Mathew Darbey all that ad in Barnstable (M.D. 17:61). If b. ca. 1642, he was not son of ther Thomas or Bernard but this may be an error for Jabez. Another eph took the oath in 1657. The Joseph above would not have been old with in 1657, so this may be an error for Joshua whose name does not ear in the lists of those who took the oath. A Jeremiah Lumbert is ably a misreading of Jemima (see Bowman in M.D. 18:198). Windsor Way, Redwood City, CA 94061

chusetts. The children of Asa Platts, all by the second wife, were: Maria F., Asa Anson (died young), Almon A., and Anson A. (twins), Martin W. and Lyman W. Mrs. Platts by her first marriage become the mother of one child: Sivona F., now Mrs. John Mixer, of Arlington, Massachusetts.

(VII) Anson Alfonso, fourth child and third son of Asa (2) and Fidelia (Emerson) Platts, was born in Rindge, July 18, 1845. He was educated in the district schools, and at Appleton Academy, New Ipswich. At the age of twenty-two he left school and worked in a bobbin shop for a while and taught one term of school. In 1877 Mr. Platts removed to Keene, where he resided about a year, and then removed to Reeds Ferry, in Merrimack, and entered the employ of Fessenden & Lowell, in whose employ he has been (1907) for thirty-one years. Mr. Platts is a very industrious and useful member of the community, and takes a part in all important movements for its betterment. He has been a member of the school board in Rindge two years; treasurer four years; moderator six years. In politics he is a Republican. He is a trustee of Wheeler Chapel, and was one of the committee appointed to secure the soldiers' monument for Merrimack. He is a member of the Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, and of Souhegan Lodge, No. 98, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, of which he is treasurer. He married, June 29, 1869. at Rindge, Cynthia Lawrence, born December 9, 1847, daughter of William and Lucinda (Lowell) Lawrence, of Rindge. She was educated in the common and high school, graduated from the latter, afterward taught school in Ashburnham, Massachusetts, and Brookline and Rindge, New Hampshire.

The lineage of the family herein traced begins at a very early period in English history, and covers the ancestry of many prominent citizens in the American Colonics and the United States. It has been conspicuously identified with various wars of this country, beginning with the early struggles with the Indians, continuing through the Revolutionary war. War of 1812, and the great Civil war. Its representatives in this country have been people of high spirit and temper in many cases, and their bravery upon the battlefield has been conspicuous. In the walks of peace, in manufactures, in the arts, in agriculture and in every worthy calling of life it has borne well its part.

(I) Thomas Gates, Esq., of Higheaster and Thursteubie, county of Essex, England, born 1327, was the original ancestor of the family so far as now known.

(II) William Gates was the father of two chil-

dren: Geoffrey and Ralph Chies.

(III) Sir Geoffrey Gates married Agnes, daughter and heiress of Sir Thomas Baldington, of Aldersburg, Oxford, England.

(IV) William Gates married Mabel, daughter and heiress of Thomas Capdow, of Higheaster, and his wife Ann, the daughter of Thomas Fleming, of Essex. Their children were: Geoffrey and Anna.

(V) Sir Geoffrey Gates married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir William Clapton Knight, of Kantwell. Sussex. Their children were: Sir John, Geoffrey, Henry, William and Dorothy. (VIII)- Peter Gates, of London, married Mary Josselyn.

(IX) Thomas Gates was a resident of Norwich.

Norfolk, England.

(X) Stephen Gates, second son of Thomas Gates, the first American ancestor of the familycame from Hingham, England, to Hingham, Massa-chusetts, in the ship "Diligent," of Ipswich, in 1638, accompanied by his wife, Ann (HiH) Gates, and two children. He was among the first residents of Lancaster, and subsequent to the year 1656 was a resident of Cambridge, where he died 1662. We are led to believe that he and his family were of stubborn and independent character, from facts that he quarreled with his neighbor and lost his constable's staff; his daughter Mary contradicted the minister in open meeting; and his sons tried to break his will. In 1663 his widow became the wife of Richard Woodward, of Watertown. She died at Stow, February 5, 1683. Their descendants participated in the Indian wars, Revolutionary war, and wars of 1812 and 1861; one enlisted in the Revolutionary war at the age of ten years. Their children were: Elizabeth, Mary, Stephen, Thomas, Simon, Isaac and Rebecca.

(XI) Stephen (2), eldest son and third child of Stephen (1) and Ann (Hill) Gates, was born about 1640, and died in 1706, in Acton, Massachusetts. He resided throughout most of his active life in Stow, Massachusetts, and was an early proprietor of Preston, Connecticut, where most of his descendants still reside. His will was made at Stow, September 5. 1701, and was proved in 1707. He married Sarah, daughter of George and Elizabeth (Hammond) Woodward, of Watertown, Massachusetts. Their children were: Stephen, Simon, Thomas, Isaac, Nathaniel, Sarah, Rebecca and

Daniel.

(NII) Simon, second son and child of Stephen (2) and Sarah (Woodward) Gates, was born June 5, 1666, in Stow, and probably lived and died in that town. He was married May 4, 1688, to Hannah Benjamin, of Stow, and their children were: Simon, Joseph, Benjamin, Elisha, Israel, Amos, Hannah Mary, Susanna and Elizabeth.

(XIII) Elisha, fourth son of Simon and Hannah (Benjamin) Gates, was born about 1715, in Stow, and died December 9, 1803, in Bow, New Hampshire. He resided most of his life in Stow, with his wife Lucy, and their children were: Elishamith his wife Lucy, and their children were: Elishamith and Erabid.

Persis, Abraham, Sally, Lydia, Lucy and Ezekiel.
(XIV) Abraham, second son and third child of Elisha and Lucy Gates, was born May 4, 1769, in-Stow, and died September 21, 1852. He resided in Stow, Bolton and Holden, Massachusetts, and after a short time in Claremont, settled in Bow, where he became pastor of the Calvin Baptist Church. The society was poor and was unable to sustain him properly, and he engaged in farming as a means of livelihood. He died at the home of his son in Chazy, New York, and was buried in the Valley cemetery at Manchester. He martied Judith Tenney, who was born April 6, 1768, in Byfield, Massachusetts, and died while on a visit in Deerfield, Vermont. Her body was also deposited in the Valley cemetery. Their children were: Jeremiah, Abraham, Judith, Eliphalet, Sarah Mead and Mary Tenney The first two were born in Stow, two in Bolton

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This ancient New England name is HAPGOOD of English origin and is first found in Massachusetts, whence it has enread out over various sections of the United States. It has been identified with social, material and moral progress, and has contributed its share

to the growth of the nation.

(I) Shadrach Hapgood was born about 1642 in England and embarked at Gravesend, May 30, 1656, for New England in the ship "Speedwell," Robert Locke, master. The vessel arrived at Boston, in July, and Shadrach Hapgood soon took up his residence on the south side of the Assabet river, about one and one-half miles south of the first meeting house. He had a lot of fifty acres and for two or three years engaged there in farming. He was a soldier in King Philip's war, and was among those killed in that struggle. He was married October at, 1664, at Sudbury, to Elizabeth Treadway, daughter of Nathaniel and Sufferance Treadway. She was born April 3, 1646, and was the mother of Nathaniel, Mary, Thomas and Sarah. She was residing at Sudbury when she received the sad news of her husband's murder by the Indians. Her elder daughter married John Whitney, and the younger married Jonathan, his brother.

(II) Thomas, second son of Shadrach and Elizbeth (Treadway) Hapgood, was born April 1, 1660, in Sudbury, where he resided. He was mar-April 9, 1671. Their children were: Cyrus, Sarah, udith, Elizabeth, Thomas, Hepzibah, John and

(III) Thomas (2), second son and fifth child of Thomas (1) and Judith (Barker) Hapgood, was born April 18, 1702, in Sudbury, and lived in ShrewsDUIN MAILH 121 raim, Solomon, Asa, Elijah, Seth, Joab, Demaris,

(IV) Lieutenant Asa, third son and child of Thomas (2) and Demaris (Hutchins) Hapgood, was born December 6. 1728, in Shrewsbury, Massaachusetts, and settled on his father's homestead in that town. He was required to pay to each of his brothers and sisters a considerable sum in consideration of retaining the homestead. About 1754 he sold the estate to his brother Jacob and removed to Rutland District, now the town of Barre, Massachusetts, which was incorporated in 1756. About 1763 he began to be conspicuous in the management of affairs in the Rutland District. A meeting was called February 23, 1773, "to consider a circular letter from the town of Boston concerning the State and rights of the Province." The letter was referred to a committee of which Asa Hapgood was a member. A warrant for a town meeting issued March 15, had this article. "To see if the District will petition the Great and General Court to be set off as a town." Asa Hapgood was placed upon a committee to present this petition and an act granting the same was passed at Salem, June 14, 1774, and signed by the governor three days later. As Hapgood was chosen chairman of the committee of safety in 1775, and of the committee of correspondence, and was also chairman of the board of selectmen of the Rutland District. In April, 1779, the legislature voted to call a convention of delegates from the towns to a meeting at Cambridge on the first of September following for the purpose of framing a form of government. In this important convention Lieutenant Asa Hapgood was a delegate from Barre. He appears as a private on the muster and pay rolls of Capt. William Henry's company, Colonel Whiting's regiment, for service in Rhode Island. The time of the enlistment was May 3, 1777, and he was discharged July 5, of the same year. He died at Barre, December 23, 1791. He married Ann Bowker, who was born September 4, 1728, and their children were: Levinah, Thomas, Betsey, Sophia, David, Asa, John, Anna, Windsor and Artemas.

(V) David, second son and fifth child of Lieutenant Asa and Ann (Bowker) Hapgood, was born May 10, 1757, in Barre, and left home at the age of twenty-two years and purchased a large tract of land, twelve miles west of Windsor, Vermont, near the center of the present town of Reading. He immediately commenced improvements and was distinguished for his enterprise, courage, energy and perseverance. At that time there were but two families in the region and these were distant in opposite directions for several miles from his location. He labored here alone during the first season, and ere he had completed his harvest news reached him that the settlement at Royalton, twenty-five miles north of Reading, had been destroyed by Indians from Canada and many of the three hundred inhabitants massacred and others taken captives. Trusting in his solitude for defence he did not flee, until returning to his cabin after a temporary absence he found the savages had plundered it. He immediately reurned to Massachusetts and spent the winter of 1778-79, and enlisting young men of Worcester county to accompany him, he returned in the spring to his former home. These included his brother Thomas; here they endured privations and hardships

18. Sarah Gates, b. 1673 at Marlboro., d. 1754, age 81, at Preston, Conn. Unm.

She was the daughter of Thomas Gates (Thomas I). With wife Elizabeth resided at Stow, Marlboro, and Sudbury, and in 1703 went to Norwich, Conn., to that part which afterward became Preston.

Sarah, daughter of Stephen² Gates, was born April 27, 1679 at Marlboro, died unm.

From Stow Vital Records. Sarah, d. of Stephen (Gats) and Sarah, d. Jan. 27, 1724.

Sarah, daughter of Thomas² Gates (Stephen¹), was born Nov. 20, 1673 in Marlboro; living unmarried July 10, 1723, when she is mentioned in her father's will.

These volumes are in the Mormon Library, but are bound so tightly, will not lay flat. Am considering sending to the Sons of the Revolution Library in Glendale for a copy. Need this for other families who married into the Gates tribe. If you need any other info, let me know.

CopiED A. City Library-

Amos Brown , May 30, 1771, at Leominster, Mercy Gates. Am trying to determine whether this Amos was the son of Amos Brown of Stow. Amos 4 Brown (Edward 3 Boaz 2 Thomas 1), was the son of Edward and Elizabeth (Hapgood) Brown.

The Hapgood Genealogy says that Elizabeth, daughter of Shadrach died unmarried. Have not found this in the records of Sudbury or Stow.

Potter's "Old Families" identifies the wife of Edward Brown as Elizabbeth Hapgood. He seems to be correct.

Edward died March 5, 1711, aged about 38 years and is buried in the Old Cemetery at Stow Lower Village. The administrators of his estate were Elizabeth Brown, widow and Nathaniel Hapgood, both of Stow, and Thomas Brown of Concord.

In the settlement papers, she gives to her brother, Nathaniel Hapgood, a sum of money in repayment of a debt. This is quoted else where, but am sending for the papers to confirm this.

I do have a copy of Puritan Village and have permission to copy from it, but the publisher wants two copies of my production, if it ever gets off the ground. One copy is for the author, Mr. Powell, who is very ill.

Potter's Old Famiilies in the circulating library is in tatters. The Sons of the Revolution library has a much better copy. I have copied most of the pages relating to Brown families.

It starts with the Barrett family and probably carries it through extensively. Next is Blood the Brøoks, Brown, etc. Then Bulkeley and Buttrick. The Buttrick families carried forward are:

Samuel who married Elizabeth Blood Abigail who married John Flint Deacon Jonathan who married Elizabeth Wooley.

Other major families are: Conant, Davis, Farrar, Flint, Hartwell, Hayward, Hosmer, Hubbard, Jones, Minott, Potter (naturally), Prescott, Wheeler, Willard, and Wood.

The Daby family may be covered incidentally if they married some of the above. I am still working on the microfilm of the Stow Town Records - for a list of town officers. The Daby name occurs frequently.

Many thanks for sending the materials. Will get back to Thomas Noyes later.

The first Brown death in the Concord Registers was Joseph Browne who died Sept. 29, 2671. Your copy of his will is the easiest to read that I have seen. And the copy is clearer than

the one I received. I have tried to figure mine out and gave up. I have concluded that this Joseph Browne was no relative of the Thomas Brown family, all of whom were adept for the times in reading and writing - all could sign their names. Many became town clerks_-Thomas, Jr., Eleazer, Boaz Brown, Jr. and Thomas, son of Jabez . Perhaps others. Apparently the fathers taught the sons - the schools weren't much then.

I have the vital records of Stow and Boxboro. Apparently Heald later became Hale. But the record shows - Israel Heald, husband of Martha, died Sept. 8, 1738. age about 78. (copy enclosed)

Don't find the marriage, but will enclose the pages. May have missed it.

I am looking for the ancestry of Joseph Heald, first husband of Mercy Brown, daughter of Boaz Brown, Jr. First child, Mary, born June 22, 1714, so the marriage was probably in 1713. He died at Stow, March 22, 1724. More research needed, but apparently she married 2nd, Nathaniel Hapgood of Lancaster, born about 1696; died about 1746; son of Deacon Nathaniel and Elizabeth (Ward) Hapgood. Intentions Dec. 3, 1727. But Note Strulk. Toseph Gates + Marcia Heald, INT. Mar. 12, 1725-6.

Have completed the layout of five notebooks with the first five generations (more or less) for the descendants of Boaz, Jabez, Eleazer, Thomas, and William of Sudbury. Now it is a matter of check and double check. Could spend forty years in research, but am going to try to cut it to a few more months. Have to work on them simultaneously, otherwise will have to send for the same book several times.

Received four responses to my query - one you have. It didn't work out, but she is a very nice lady. Sent her some material which she was happy to receive. The other responses were requests for information. I don't mind that, it forces me to dig through all this mess, and try to get it organized.

Also forced me to do a little thing on Boaz Brown, Sr. (enclosed) to keep from retyping it for each one. This needs several revisions, but I think it may do for a format for others. Am anxious to get on with the first pages on Jabez.

I think Maxine Lines may have the solution for his daughter, Sarah. She was born May 20, 1680 at Sudbury; m. July 3, 1721, at Groton to Nathaniel Woods; d. March 3, 1724-5, (45th year) at Groton. He is in Savage. Maxine says he m. (1), Eleanor; (2), Alice; (3) Sarah Brown; (4), Mrs, Mary Derbyshire, a widow. Gives reference: NEHGR Vol. 64 page 35. Will have to get to the City Library to look that up. If this is true, one wonders why Sarah did not marry earlier. As you know, most did not dally that long.

Gates Family

In the Lower Village Cemetery, the oldest cemetery in town, we find a marble monument, on which are inscribed the following names of the Gates Family—
Isaiah Gates, died March 31, 1822; Susanah Hapgood, his wife, died May 15, 1847, age 69 years; Rufus Gates, their son, died September 15, 1853, age 40 years.

Joel Gates, died December 16, 1869, age 75 years; Eunice (Piper) his wife, died February 22, 1863, age 73 years.

We find no record of these names in the "Gates Genealogy" to which we are indebted for much of our record concerning the early history of this old family. We trust this may aid some one to find where the missing link fits in, so that the record may, at some future date, be complete.

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Cushing appears to have made an erroneous statement. Stephen's children Elizabeth, Stephen and Mary were all born before 1638. It is unlikely that one of these young children should have been left in England and come at a later date.

Stephen Gates and ANN VEARE were married in Hingham, England, 5 May 1628 (*The American Genealogist*, vol. 10, p. 199, April 1934). She deposed in Middlesex County, Mass., Court, 12 June 1673, aged about seventy years, from which it appears that she was born in or about 1603. It is believed that Stephen Gates was born probably in

or near Norwich, co. Norfolk, England, about 1600.

He settled in Hingham, Mass., where he received a grant of three acres for a house lot, twelve acres for a "greate Lott," and a three acre planting lot. His house lot was on Town (now North) Street and was bounded on the north by the street, on the east by William Buckland's land and upon the west by the town swamp. In 1647 he received a grant of half an acre of salt marsh. On 26 June 1648 he sold his house lot, etc., to William Hersey, but remained in town for some time before his removal.

Stephen Gates and his wife probably did not become members of the Hingham church until about 3 May 1646, when their children Simon, Thomas, Isaac and Rebecca were baptized. Birth dates of the

children are not found in the Hingham town records.

If Stephen Gates was in Cambridge, Mass., in 1652, as stated by some writers, he did not remain there long, since he was one of the early settlers of Lancaster, Mass., where he subscribed to town orders

3 April 1654.

While living in Lancaster he was admitted freeman 14 May 1656. He was elected constable, at that time a responsible and honorable position. In 1657 he failed to notify the voters about a town meeting. In consequence, he was fined ten pounds, but the fine was remitted when he informed the court that his failure was due to sickness.

In 1658 there was trouble between the Gates and Whitcomb families due to the fact that three sons of John Whitcomb had killed three swine belonging to Stephen Gates. Whitcomb agreed to pay for the swine, but afterward sought to be released from paying, claiming that he was "aged & weak and mean in estate." The court decided that he must pay for the swine. See Henry S. Nourse, *The Early Records of Lancaster* (1884), p. 63, for particulars concerning this case.

It is stated that Stephen Gates was deprived of his constable's staff. This probably occurred after his failure to notify the voters about the meeting, to which reference has been made. At the time of the Gates-Whitcomb trouble Stephen Gates was living in Sudbury, Mass.

He next appeared in Cambridge, where he made his will, 9 June 1662, and died before 29 Sept. 1662, when the inventory of his estate

was taken.

In the report of the Cambridge committee for seating the meeting house, 19 Jan. 1662/8, it was provided that "Goodie Gates" should be

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seated "at ye end of ye Deacons seats." This record refers to Stephen's widow.

She married secondly (contract 18 April 1663), as his second wife, Richard¹ Woodward of Watertown, Mass., who died 16 Feb. 1664/5. In her will, dated 18 April 1682, she described herself as of Pompasitacutt (Ponpositicut, now Stow, Mass.). The will was proved 9 April 1683. In it she calls herself "Ann Gates." A footnote states that "my last Husbands name was Woodward but I generally went by ye name of Gates notwithstanding." There are conflicting statements about the date of her death. According to Stow records Anne Woodward died 19 Feb. 1682 [i.e. 1682/3]. Marlborough, Mass., records state that Wid. Hannah [!] Gates died 5 Feb. 1682 [i.e. 1682/3].

Simon was a soldier in King Philip's War. In 1735 his son, Jonathan Gates, was granted land in Narragansett Township on account of his father's service in the war (THE REGISTER, vol. 16, p. 145, April 1862); afterward resides in Lancaster, Cambridge and Boston.

Simon Gates was sued 9 Nov. 1670 by John Woods of Marlborough, Mass., for breaking a marriage contract with his daughter Frances. In his suit against Gates Woods stated that "he hath contracted with another to the great wrong of said

Frances."

Thomas left a will, dated 10 July 1723, with a codicil, 8 April 1724, in which his wife is not mentioned. He gave his

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new Bible to his son John of Stow. John had received land in Stow by gift of his father. He mentioned sons Joseph and Josiah who had received their portions, but he gave some more land to Joseph. He gave to son Caleb part of his homestead. Caleb's oldest son, Thomas, when he became of age, was to receive the rest of the homestead, "both lands, buildings and orchards, never to be sold or mortgaged." He mentioned daughters Elizabeth Holmes, Deborah Standish, Abigail Fobes, Sarah and Ruth, then single, and Mary Rose. The inventory amounted to £535. 6s.

He was "of Norwich" in 1723, when he made his will, but his death was recorded in Preston. His land was probably

partly in Norwich and partly in Preston.

He was a soldier of the Revolution and a United States pensioner. He enlisted Feb. 24, 1777, and joined the same company and regiment to which his brother belonged. His name appears on a receipt dated Boston, April 11, 1782, for bounty paid him by Col. Jonathan Hapgood, for three years' service in the Continental Army.

After the war he married, and resided in Stow, where he engaged in farming. In 1793, he was called "of Gardner," when he sold his interest in a parcel of land belonging to his grandfather, Jonathan Whitcomb. He later removed to Westminster where he died. The administration of his estate was granted to his "second son," Samuel Gates, at the request of his widow Hannah, who petitioned for the appointment Mar. 2, 1827, stating that the eldest son was away from home, "I know not where." The bondsmen were Samuel Gates and Harvey Coolidge, Jr., of Gardner.

- v. Silas, born Feb. 19, 1750/51; probably died young.
- VI. OLIVER, born April 20, 1753; married in Harvard, Oct. 25, 1775, Patience Merriam, daughter* of Nathaniel and Esther (Muzzey) Merriam, who was baptized in Lexington, April 6, 1746; he died May 26, 1839.

According to an agreement of the heirs,* Oliver and his brother Jonathan received the real estate upon the death of their father. Oliver settled upon the homestead, as has been stated, where he always resided. In 1784, and again in 1793, he and his brother and sisters sold their right in certain land of their grandfather, Jonathan Whitcomb, "late of Bolton deceased," which was located in Templeton and Harvard. He was then called "Oliver Gates, Jr., of Stow, husbandman."

The death of his wife is not on record, but it is evident that she died early in life, while he lived to more than fourscore years and five, and was cared for by his son Oliver. He disposed of his property by deed and left no will.

Silas Gates married (2), (intention July 25, 1756), Mary, widow of Thomas Wheeler and daughter of John and Hannah (Buttrick) Daby, who was born in Stow, October 24, 1722.

VII. Mary, born June 28, 1757; married (intention April 24, 1773), Daniel Hooker, son of Jacob and Mary (Farr) Hooker, who was born in Littleton, June 25, 1750. He was a cordwainer by trade and lived in Stow, prior to 1790. In that year he sold his farm, which was situated in the northerly part of the town, to Ephraim Russell for £58: 15s.: 8d. No direct proof of this has been found, but it is variously indicated, and the compiler of the Merriam Genealogy in reply to an inquiry regarding the parentage of Patience, writes, "Nathaniel Merriam, born in Lexington, Dec. 6, 1705, with the wife and children you name, corresponds with the man who died at Harvard, 'Sept. 27, 1783, Act. 77,' and Patience his daughter, is a hopeful candidate for your Gates honors."
