SUMMIT, N. J., Feb. 17.—Announcement has been made of the engagement of Miss Priscilla Alden Hadger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Kingsbury Badger of this place to Edward S. Gilson of Brooklyn and Amityville, L. I., formerly

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Mas Badger, whose ancestors on both sides came to this country on the Mayflower, is a descendant in the eleventh generation of John Alden and Priscilla Mullins. She is a grandaughter of the late Rev. Dr. Daniel Scelye Gregory, Presbyterian minister and writer, who was editor of the Standard Dictionary.

Mr. Gilson was graduated in 1928 from Williams College and three years later from New York University Law School. He is a lawyer with the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York.

The wedding will take place in October.

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Alden Badger, a descendant in the eleventh generation of John Alden and Priscilla Muilins Alden, to Edward Smillie Gilson, whose ancestor, Roger Conant, landed at Plymouth in 1623 and was the founder of Salem, Mass., took place this afternoon in the New Providence Presepterian Church, which celebrated its 200th anniversary last year.

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HOME IS BARRED TO HER

Mother is 'Heart-Broken'-Bridegroom at Rochester Says Next Move Is Up to Father

ROCHESTER, June 16. Miss
Rosemary Webster, 21-year-old debutante daughter of Dr and Mrs.
David H. Webster of New York City and Stamford, Cons., forsook a \$1,000,000 inheritance today to marry Paul Gilson, 23-year-old bookkeeper in the St. Lawrence County Welfare Home and son of a Canton (N. Y.) tailor.

The wedding, which took place in the modest living room of the bridegroom's brother at 250 Pinnacle Road, this city, came as the climax to a widespread search by the police for the young woman following her disappearance from her dormitory room at St. Lawrence University last Saturday, two days before she was to have been graduated.

The bride's father, surgical director of the Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, and her mother, a cousin of the late Major Elwell Stephen Otls of Rochester, had both strongly objected to the match.

'She need not come home," Dr. Webster said over the long distance telephone after the ceremony had been performed. "He is not of her social or financial standing." He added that his daughter stood

to lose \$1,000,000.

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Mrs. Webster sald:

T shall never accept this marriage. I do not want to see my daughter at the present time. She so many other boys of her own circle."

When Mrs. Webster was asked if her daughter could return home if she obtained a divorce, she replied that divorce was against their religion.

As for the bride, she declared:
"They knew we were in love and
wanted to marry before we left
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Mr. Gilson said:
"The next move is up to her father. I'm sorry he doesn't see it our way. We can get along."

He added that he did not know where he and Mrs. Gilson would spend their wedding trip, but said it would have to be brief because he must return to his job next Monday. ...

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Reports were that Dr. and Mrs. Webster offered her a \$1,000 diamond necklace and a trip to Europe if she would obey their orders.

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Stormy Scene at Interview

Last week, Dr. and Mrs. Webster went to St. Lawrence University, and a stormy interview followed. The young woman ended the interview by running to her room. One hour later, it was learned, she was nowhere near the campus.

Mr. Glison met her somewhere in Canton, and they headed for Rochester and the home of his brother, Gardner.

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On Monday they obtained a marriage license at the City Hall and made arrangements for the marriage deremony to be performed by the Rev. Willard Page, pastor of the Western Presbyterian Church at Palmyra, who recently married a couple in an airplane. If This afternoon the couple left for Canton by train.
