ROCHESTER, June 16. — Miss Rosemary Webster, 21-year-old debutante daughter of Dr. and Mrs. David H. Webster of New York City and Stamford, Conn., forsook a \$1,000,000 inheritance today to marry Paul Gilson, 23-year-old bookkeeper in the St. Lawrence County Welfare Home and son of a Canton (N. Y.) tailor.

The wedding, which took place in the modest living room of the bridegroom's brother at 250 Pinnacle Road, this city, came as the climax to a widespread search by the police for the young woman following her disappearance from her dormitory room at St. Lawrence University last Saturday, two days before she was to have been graduated.

The bride's father, surgical director of the Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, and her mother, a cousin of the late Major Elwell Stephen Otis of Rochester, had both strongly objected to the match.

"She need not come home," Dr. Webster said over the long distance telephone after the ceremony had been performed. "He is not of her social or financial standing."

He added that his daughter stood to lose \$1,000,000.

Mother Says Heart Is Broken

Mrs. Webster said:

"I shall never accept this marriage. I do not want to see my daughter at the present time. She has broken my heart. There were so many other boys of her own circle."

When Mrs. Webster was asked if her daughter could return home if she obtained a divorce, she replied that divorce was against their religion.

As for the bride, she declared:

"They knew we were in love and wanted to marry before we left Canton. Father knew I was with Paul."

Mr. Gilson said:
