The distance was such that it would be necessary to bait his horse before his return.

HARDYS AND HARDIES

In the death at Dunnville (Ont.) on Sunday, November 16th, of MA. S. Hardy, Uxbridge loses one of its oldest citizens. Mr. Hardy can to Uxbridge in the early part of 1874, so that he had been a resident he for over fifty years. During that time he had identified himself with the life of the town in a good many ways, having served as a member of the Town Council and a member of the Public Library Board. He was all very much interested in the I. O. O. F., having been Noble Grand an D. D. G. M. for this district. Some years ago Nipissing Lodge No. 7 presented him with the Veteran's Jewel, of which he was very proud.

Mr. Hardy was a man of a very varied experience, having been at different times in his life spinner, merchant, soldier, tuner, manufacturer and traveler. He had been connected with the Mason and Hamlin Organ and Piano Company of Boston; McLeod and Wood, Guelph; the Uxbridg Organ and Piano Company, and other organ and piano companies and was a wonderfully skilled tuner. He was very fond of music, both vocal and instrumental, and was particularly fond of the violin. He had a good deal to do years ago with the development of orchestral music in Uxbridge. In his earlier life, he had a fine tenor voice. He had written and published several musical compositions. He was a man of strong personality, with a decided vein of independence, with a good deal of the pioneer instinct, a very fine sense of humor, and a great belief in education.

He belonged to the Puritan stock of New England, and was descended from many New England families of distinction. . . . On his mother's side Mr. Hardy was descended from Edward Spaulding who came to Virginia in 1619 and afterwards settled in New England about 1630,15

# PREFACE.

According to the best authority, the name Gillson, or Gilson, is derived from Gill and Giles. Archbishop French, in his book on words, remarks concerning the Gillsons, that some pronounced the G hard and others soft, and he accounts for it by saying the former were the sons of Gilbert, and the latter the sons of Giles.

Family surnames were not commonly in use previous to the tenth century. They were first used in France, particularly in Normandy. Previous to the Norman conquest the people in England had generally but one name.

The Gillson name is not found in England previous to the Norman conquest. The ancestor is said to have come over from Normandy with William the Conqueror, A. D. 1066, and from the name of Gillson being found in France, gives countenance to this.

Many of the name were located in Baresby County, Leicestershire, where some of the name now reside. The writer has a coat of arms sent him by a clergyman of the name, who says that his ancestors have been located in Leicestershire and Rutland for many generations. Unfortunately the parish records where most of them resided do not date back prior to 1653. It is said that the Leicestershire property was originally a park of the ancestor who came over with the conqueror.

The first of the name who emigrated to New England was William Gillson. He came from County Kent, England, (probably from the town of Feering, as many of the name were living there) with his wife Frances and two of his sister's children, Frank and Hannah Damon. He settled in Scituate, Mass., in 1631, (the history of S. says 1633). He probably came over in Winthrop's fleet in 1630. He was one of the founders of the

church in Scituate, (January 8, 1635), a man of good powers of mind and property, only four in the colony paying a higher tax in 1633. He built, (says Dean in his history of Scituate,) the first windmill in the colony for grinding corn, which before was pounded. There is an act of court respecting his mill in 1637. "It is enacted that ye miller of Scituate shall not take above the twelvth part for ye toul for grinding corn."

He was an assistant in the government of Plymouth colony from 1633 to 1638, (with the exception of 1635). In 1633 Edward Winslow was chosen Governor, William Bradford Deputy Governor, and William Gillson one of six assistants. (See Bailie's Memoirs of Plymouth Col., p. 209).

In the first tax list of Plymouth Colony extant, January 2, 1632-3, William Gillson is assessed 12 shillings. Second tax, January 2, 1633-4, 1 pound and 7 shillings, paid in corn, at 6 shillings per bushel.

His will is dated January 27, 1639, dying five days after, viz., February 1, 1639. Inventory of his estate taken by Anthony Annable, Henry Cobb and Edward Foster. Amount of the estate, 229 pounds 3 shillings and 2 pence. He left his estate to his wife Frances, (no child), and bequests to his nephew and niece, Frank and Hannah Damon, and kinsman Daniel Romball. After the decease of his widow, in 1649, John and Hannah Damon were sole heirs of his estate. They were very young when they came from England under the guardianship of their uncle William. The writer has interviewed several of the descendants of John Damon, now living in Scituate, but could not obtain any information leading to connect the family of William Gillson in England with the ancestors of James Gilson of Rehoboth, or Joseph Gilson of Groton, Mass.

John Damon married Catharine Merritt, June, 1644. There is an order of court relating to the estate of William Gillson after the death of his widow. "June 8, 1649, at this court, John Damon required yt he might enjoy his rights in ye lands of William Gillson, of Scituate. To clear up the aforesaid rights, papers were read and approved. Whereas, William Gillson did in his life time require earnestly several parcels of land for his accommodation, but being required of him by us the reason of his desire for so much land, being ancient, and having no issue of his body to inherit the same after him, his answer was, yt he

had brought over with him into New England two of his sister's children from their parents, and was bound in conscience to provide for them as if they were his own. Further, I, Humphrey Turner, of Scituate, do testify that William Gillson did say to me, I ask this land yt my kinsfolk may enjoy it when I am dead."

The following is taken from the New England Genealogical and Historical Register for 1860, vol. 14. "In a large volume bound in vellum, now in the Rolls office, Chancery Lane, London, containing the names of persons who left London, emigrating to New England and other places between 1630 and 1635, are found two of the name of Gilson, viz.: April 8, 1635, theis under written names are to be transported to New England, embarked in the Susan and Ellen, Edward Payne, master. The p, ties have brought certificates from ye ministers and justices of ye peace that they are no subsidy men, and are conformable to ye orders and discipline of ye church of England. Among the names occurs that of Ann Gilson, (servant) aged 34."

The other is dated May 2, 1635, and reads as follows:

"Theis under written names are to be transported to ye Barbadoes, embarked in ye Alexander, Capt. Burch, master, certificate of Gilbert Grimes, Mr. of Parliament, and certificates from ye ministers where they late dwelt. The men took the oath of allegiance and supremacie. Die et A. pred." Among the names is Thomas Gilson, aged 21.

The Island of Barbadoes, one of the Caribbean group, was settled by the English at the time New England was colonized, but the records there are silent in regard to Thomas Gilson or his descendants.

After 1638 a different system prevailed in relation to emigrants from England. Not much more trouble was taken about them than the rest of the cargo of vessels. The number would be entered but not the names. Doubtless (the register states) many of the emigrants to the Island of Barbadoes, Virginia and other places, eventually made their way to New England.

The next on the list of Gilsons are Joseph Gilson, of Chelmsford, and James Gilson, of Rehoboth, Mass. The genealogy of the descendants of Joseph Gilson, for five generations, will be found in the last pages of the book. The descendants of Joseph all write the name Gilson, the descendants of James, (with a few exceptions) Jillson.

The writer has not been able to find any record to prove that Joseph and James Gilson were or were not of the same family.

The tradition handed down from generation to generation among the descendants of James Gilson, is the old story of the three brothers who came over from England, and that they were of Scotch descent.

The writer has spent much time and means in searching town and county records, and all other sources of information in New England, in person or through the medium of town clerks, and also by an expert in London, in the hope of finding some previous record of our ancestor, but without success. All records were poorly kept in England as well as here. At the close of the book will be found abstracts from Gillson wills, copied from the English Court Probate records.

Below will be found all that can be ascertained in relation to James Gilson of Rehoboth.

Rehoboth was settled in 1644, by a company formed at Weymouth, Mass., and in 1661, Captain Thomas Willett was employed by Rehoboth to purchase of Wamsitta (afterwards Alexander), elder brother of King Phillip and son of Massasoit, another tract of land, which was called the Rehoboth North Purchase. This purchase included what is now Attleboro, Mass., Cumberland, R. I., and a part of Mansfield and Norton. April 10, 1666, Thomas Willett resigned and mace over the above purchase to Thomas Prence, Josiah Winslow and Thomas Southworth. And they sold the same date, viz., April 10, 1666, to the proprietors of Rehoboth that hold there a fifty pound estate and upwards, to be equally divided to the purchasers.

There were seventy-nine whole shares and a half. James Gilson's name first appears as one of the purchasers—one share—(bought of Samuel Sabin).

There is no record prior to this date of James Gilson in the Rehoboth town books. Unfortunately the oldest records of the first church were destroyed by the Indians in King Philip's war, at the time they burnt the house of Rev. Noah Newman, (the second minister of the town). The town records, however, of births, marriages, &c., go back to the first settlement. His name does not appear in the proprietors' land records of Rehoboth. The purchase gave him an equal right with the rest of the proprietors. The whole amount paid by the purchasers was four

hundred and eighty-four pounds five shillings and five pence.

The deed from Samuel Sabin to James Gilson is dated March
20, 1667, and acknowledged the 27th of February, 1673. Recorded in Plymouth Land Records, book third, page 333. Witness, Nathaniel Paine and William Carpenter.

The first division of land to the proprietors, of fifty acres to a share, was made March 18, 1668-9. The second division of fifty acres, February 18, 1684. Third division of fifty acres, October 31, 1699. Fourth division of fifty acres, in 1703. Fifth division of fifty acres, June 10, 1707. Sixth division of fifty acres, July 21, 1714. Seventh division of twenty acres, February 21, 1726-7. Eighth division of ten acres, April 14, 1735.

From the proprietors' records it appears they made their own regulations, gave their own titles to land, and enacted all their laws relative to the ownership and the original conveyance of their lands to others. A transfer of a share might be made by deed, and recorded in the proprietors' books.

The first and fourth division of land, and also a part of the division in 1707 and 1714, and all of the divisions of land in 1727 and 1735, was taken by James Gilson in what is now called South Attleboro, and was the homestead farm where he lived and died, and where his children were born. The second division and a part of the third division, as also a part of the divisions of 1707 and 1714, were taken in the west part of the purchase, now Cumberland, R. I.

This land was on the north and west of what was called Hunting Hill. This hill is located near land now owned by James Wetherhead, George W. Clark, and heirs of Nathan Sprague. He also took up land on the east side of Abbott's Run, near where Orrin Mowry now resides. His lands near Hunting Hill were sold by his sons (Nathaniel and James) to Jonathan Sprague, as the proprietors' books show.

Below will be found a few extracts from the proprietor's records. "First book of Rehoboth North Purchase lands, page 53. Bounds of the lands of James Gilson and his son Nathaniel. Likewise, 50 acres of land laid out to James Gilson and Nathaniel Gilson, his son, surrounding his first 50 acres, where his house stands, laid out March 8, 1705-6." (The bounds are omitted here).

And immediately following, same book and page, November

13, 1712, it reads, "Nathaniel Gilson and James Gilson (his brother) divided the above said 100 acres of land between them, and is butted and bounded as in the record above mentioned. And Nathaniel Gilson's part is the east part, (bounds given) and James Gilson's part is the west part. Recorded by Daniel Smith, Proprietor's Clerk."

There are other entries of land in the proprietors' books, laid out to James Gilson, sen., as also to his son James after his father's death, which occurred in 1712. It would be superfluous to insert them here. Below are given abstracts of several sales of land by Nathaniel and James.

"Bounds of the lands of Jonathan Sprague. First book of Rehoboth North Purchase Lands, page 227. Likewise 25 acres of land, (be it more or less) bought of Nathaniel Gilson, it being his father, James Gilson's, in the former division, near Hunting Hill. (Boundaries are here given.) Recorded July 9, 1708." And on page 228 it reads, "Likewise 6½ acres on James Gilson's right sold to Jonathan Sprague, lying adjoining his own land, north from Hunting Hill. Recorded March 13, 1715-6. Likewise, 12½ acres sold to sd. Sprague on sd. Gilson's rights, 6½ acres in the division grant of 1707, and 6½ acres in grant of 1714, being his first lot in sd. division, lying adjoining his own land, west side of Hunting Hill. (Bounds given.) Recorded March 13, 1715-6. Likewise ¼ of a share right, bought of James Gilson, which by deed at large doth appear, dated Sept. 28, 1708."

"Lands of Benjamin Crabtree, (page 363). Likewise, three acres and twenty rods laid out on the right of James Gilson, on the east side of Abbott's Run, it being partly a pine swamp. (Bounds given). Laid out March 24, 1724-5, (John Foster, surveyor)."

"Lands of Israel Woodcock, (page 402). Eighteen acres of land bought of James Gilson, lying by his own land, begins by a chestnut tree by the river, (Abbott's Run). Recorded January 7, 1714-5.

The surveyors were not very exact about the amount of land laid out to each proprietor. They called it so many acres more or less. The writer knows that the old homestead lot in South Attleboro, of two divisions of fifty acres each, contained over two hundred acres.

Now, a word about the change from Gillson to Jillson. It happened, no doubt, in this way. The majority of the early settlers here were of the middle and lower classes in England, and at that day very many could not read or write. James' Gilson, sen., left no papers of any kind, and his son James', in all deeds, &c., left by him, the originals of which are in the possession of the writer, were written by others, which he signed, the the state or witnessed, by making his mark.

In the proprietors' land records the name is written Gilson invariably. The first change is found in the Attleboro town record of births of the children of James<sup>2</sup>, in 1709. It is written Jelson, a mistake of the clerk without doubt. Daniel<sup>3</sup> wrote his name Jelson, after the pattern set by the town clerk (or some one else), for some years, and then changed to Jillson.

Nathaniel<sup>2</sup> and his wife, in their deed of his share of the homestead to Benjamin Day, dated December 18, 1712, signed their name Gilson, but in the proprietors' land records of Dedham Gore (now Bellingham), when Nathaniel drew in the first division of land, May 19, 1714, the clerk enters his name Jillson, and it is continued so to be written by all of the descendants of Nathaniel<sup>2</sup> and James<sup>2</sup> (with the exception of some of the descendants of James<sup>4</sup>,) to the present time.

James. There is no record to be found of his marriage. The name of his wife was Mary, and they both died a short time previous to the division of the homestead between their two sons, Nov. 13, 1712.

Their tomb stones are in the old burying ground in South Attleboro, and are common stones from the fields, plainly inscribed, "I. G., 1712, M. G., 1712."

The spot where James first located and built his log house can still be pointed out. It was burnt by the Indians in the summer of 1675 or 1676, at the time they were scouring the country in small bands. He was away at the time, (so tradition saith,) and his wife was at a spring near the house, with her child, washing, and the Indians did not discover her. If they had, there would have been no occasion of writing our family Genealogy—Nathaniel being an infant at that time. She fortunately eluded their observation, and escaped with her child to the garrison in Rehoboth, a distance of six miles, where her husband found her.

James Gilson's proportion of the tax to defray the expense of King Philip's war, was four pounds eighteen shillings and two pence. His name also appears among those who drew lots for the meadows in the north part of the town, (Attleboro) in 1668.

# SECOND GENERATION.

James.1 1. Nathaniel,2 (a cooper and farmer.) Of his marriage and birth of children there is no record extant All that is known of his wife is her name, Elizabeth, and that they were married between the year 1700 and 1705. He lived for several years after his marriage on a part of the homestead in Attleboro that has ever since been called the Old Field. The spot where his house stood can still be pointed out, but a part of the land he improved has since returned to its original state of nature. His two sons were probably born in Attleboro, before he removed to Dedham Gere, (afterwards Bellingham.) Nathaniel had lived in Bellingham but a short time previous to his father's death, in 1712. He was living there

# JOSEPH GILSON.

Of the history of Joseph Gilson previous to his marriage, in Chelmsford, Mass., the writer can obtain no information from County or Town Records, here or in England. He married in Chelmsford, Mass., (by Capt. Johnson, of Woburn,) Nov. 18, 1660, Mary Caper. He removed from Chelmsford to Groton. Mass., previous to March 5, 1665-6. At a town meeting held in Groton, March 5, 1665-6, the town agreed with several of the inhabitants to build a common pound, viz., Joseph Gilson, Joseph Page, and Daniel Pierce. I find by the history of Groton, (published in 1848, by Caleb Butler, for which I am indebted for much valuable information,) that at the period of King Philip's war, in 1675 and 1676, those of the inhabitants of Groton who had not taken their families to the garrisons, or block houses, had removed to some safer locality. The names of those who availed themselves of the protection of the garrisons are given, and as the name of Joseph Gilson is not on the list, he had probably removed to Concord, Mass., in the fall of 1674, or spring of 1675. Joseph died in Concord, in April or May, 1676, as I find by the inventory of his estate returned from Concord, and recorded in Middlesex Probate Records at Cambridge. The widow and children probably resided in Concord, or in that part of the town which is now Stow, (incorporated in 1683,) for some time. The date of her death is unknown. Two of the sons of Joseph, viz.: Joseph and John, returned to Groton, as the births of their chil-I dren are recorded there. What became of Timothy is not known. The records of Groton give the births of two children of a Timothy Gilson and wife Percis, viz.: Jonathan, born Dec. 15, 1726, and Timothy, born Oct. 29, 1730, (perhaps a son of Timothy, sen.) Joseph, sen., was one of the original proprietors of Groton. The name has ever prevailed in town to the present time. They have resided in those parts of the town set off to Pepperell and Dunstable, and in the northerly and easterly parts, as it is at present. Joseph located in what is now a part of Dunstable, set off from Groton in 1793.

Joseph, (a farmer,) resided on a part of his father's estate in Groton. His will, which is dated Aug. 20, 1735, shows that he had children, whose births are not on record. Abstract of his will: To his wife, Elizabeth, sixty pounds out of his estate, also the use and improvement of all his estate, both real and personal, so long as she remains his widow. To daughter, Elizabeth Moors, over what he had given her, fifty pounds, to be paid within one year after his death. To son, Jonas, thirty pounds, with what he now owes me by bond. To his daughter, Mary Farwell, twenty pounds, besides what he had already given her, to be paid in three years after his decease. To his daughter, Eunice, the wife of Ebenezer Sprague, ten pounds, together with all that is due to me from the said E. Sprague by bond, to be paid in three years after his death. To his grandchildren, the children of his daughter, Anne Chamberlain, deceased, the sum of thirty pounds, to be paid in four years after his death. To son, Isaac, all his real estate, and rights in common lands after the death of his wife. Isaac to pay the bequests to the heirs; Elizabeth (his wife) executrix. (The names of Joseph and Eleazer Gilson are among the list of his heirs when the estate was settled.) Joseph<sup>2</sup> m. for his first wife, Hepsibah ——; m. for second wife, Elizabeth ——. There is no record of either marriage extant. (No marriages were recorded in Groton between 1686 and 1706.)

Volunteers for two months, from the town of Hollis, to supply the places of Connecticut troops, who refused to stay longer. Paid the militia under Capt. Noah Worcester to Cambridge,—Ebenezer Gilson, £3. The name of Ebenezer Gilson disappears from the tax book of Hollis about 1782.

- 2. RICHARD GILSON, of Thaydon, Essex, in his will, dated 1605, names children, Richard, Thomas, George, Elizabeth and Mary.
- 3. Thomas Gilson, of Thaydon, Co. Essex, names his two brothers, George and John, under 24 years of age, brother Richard (who had four children), and sisters Elizabeth and Susan, and brother-in-law George Herder. Will dated, 1623.
- 4. RICHARD GILLSON, of Baresley, in Leicestershire, made his will in 1644, which was lost in the plundering of the town of Leicester; but on his death-bed a verbal will was made, which was administered on in 1653. He also had lands at Clison and Newbold. Children-John, William, Ralph, Richard and Alice. Ralph was a minor.
- 5. WILLIAM GILLSON, of Feering, Co. Essex, (husbandman). Will proved May 8, 1623. Sons, Thomas, John and Joseph; daughters, Mary Bexley, Clement Cakebread; grandchildren, John and Michael.
- 6. George Gylson; will dated 1616; proved March 21, 1617. He is described as of Clyffe, Co. Kent. Had lands in Porthill, in -, in Newton, Co. Leicester, in Holland, Co. Lincoln; also, at Southfield, Co. Herford, and in Morcott, Co. Rutland, and manor of Todworth, in Surrey; also, property in the parish of St. Brides, Fleet Street, London. Names his neices, Alice Bland, Eliz Casmer, Martha Banfield, Jane Freeman and Anne Edwards. Names his uncle, Thomas Gilson, and nephew, Robert Mershe.
- 7. Christopher Gilson; will dated 1633; names his sisters, Anne and Susan Gilson, and appoints his brother Richard executor. Testator used to serve in ship Exchange, to East Indies.

- 8. WALTER GILLSON; will proved in 1650. He was of Little Storston, Gloucester, and parish of Bridgeworth. He left a wife, Mary.
- 9. NATHAN GILSON; will dated 1691; proved, 1692. He is described as a citizen and haberdasher of London. Names brothers Thomas and Daniel; sisters Sarah Marlow and Eliz Grainger. He had land in Brook Street, Essex, which land his brother Daniel mortgaged. Speaks of wife, Mary.

In the time of James the first, George Gilson had lands in Leicestershire and Lincoln, and was also of London.

# Chancery Reg. P. M., pt. 2. No. 38.

An inquisition taken at Boston, Co. Lincoln, June 8, A. D. 1625, upon the death of John Gillson, of Boston. He held property there and elsewhere in the County, including the premises mentioned in his brother's Inquisition, (8 Jas. I.) He died at Boston 13 of March last past. John Gillson, son and heir, aged 8 years, 2 months and 13 days, or thereabouts.

# Chancery Reg. P. M., pt. 1. No. 116.

An inquisition taken at Boston, Co. Lincoln, 2 April, 8 Jas. I. (A. D. 1610,) upon the death of Francis Gillson, late of South Stooke, yeoman. He was seized in his demesne as of a fee of 2 messuages, 1 cottage and 17½ acres of land and pasture, with the appurtenances, in Frampton. He made his will 4 March, 1606. He mentions Sarah his wife, my sister, Margaret Warner, Richard Gillson, (my brother), John Gilson, (my brother). (Date of death left blank). John Gillson, of Boston, Co. Lincoln, next heir, aged 40 years and upwards.

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
