first postmaster general, was patriotic but constitutionally adverse to bloodshed and resigned as an officer on General Ward's staff to serve as a civilian, committeeman and legislator. She thinks Osborn's wife, Martha Brandon, grand-daughter of Madame Foxcroft of Cambridge whose dau. m. Samuel Phillips' only son, Judge Phillips, the lieutenant governor, was a relative, perhaps sister, of General Nathaniel Lovejoy's second wife. Nathaniel prob. m. his second wife, Elizabeth Brandon, soon after the death of his first wife, on Apr. 26, 1775, possibly within a month, so as to provide a mother for his third child, Nathaniel. Miss Abbott thought Nathaniel met his first wife while on military service in Cambridge or at the headquarters of the American army. The naming of a dau. by his second wife, as Elizabeth Foster, shows his love for his first wife. A forceful letter complaining about the severity of militia service in Rhode Island elsewhere in 1777 was written by Nathaniel and is in vol. CL. *V. Mass. Archives.*

## THE COLLIER FAMILY

I. WILLIAM<sup>1</sup> COLLIER, of Duxbury, was—to quote Savage—"a Merchant of London, who came over in 1633, having for several years acted as one of the Adventurers. He had so generous a spirit as not to be content with making a profit by the enterprise of the Pilgrims unless he shared their hardships. Whether he brought a wife from home or had any here is doubtful, but four daughters came, of excellent character." Other authorities say that his wife JANE accompanied him. He was made a freeman at once, and rose to great prominence. He was elected Assistant Councillor of the Governor in 1634, and was re-elected to the same office every year (except 1653) until 1666. During at least two sessions he was Acting Governor. He was one of the commissioners appointed by Plymouth Colony in 1643, to form a confederation of the New England Colonies. "He appears to have been the wealthiest man in Duxbury, being rated as highest on the tax list." "He was a distinguished early settler and a great benefactor to the colony." He was one of the first purchasers of Dartmouth in 1652. He died in 1670. His four daughters, whom Savage mentions, were:

I. SARAH<sup>2</sup>. 2. Rebecca<sup>2</sup>. 3. Mary<sup>2</sup>. 4. ELIZABETH<sup>2</sup>.

## THE DAMON FAMILY

I. JOHN<sup>1</sup> DAMON, the founder of the Scituate family, came with his sister Hannah to the Colony of Plymouth probably as early as 1628. Their uncle, William Gilson, was their guardian. He

is referred to as "a man of education and talents." He held many offices of responsibility in the colony, being Assistant for several years.

In 1633 Gilson and several others settled in Scituate and laid out the village there. They were called "Men of Kent," since they came from Kent County, England. The principal street of the village they named Kent Street. In 1636, Gilson erected a windmill (perhaps the first in America) for grinding corn, being allowed by a special Act of the Colonial Court not above one-twelfth part as toll.

Gilson died in 1639, leaving legacies to his wife, his pastor, and JOHN<sup>1</sup> and Hannah DAMON, his nephew and niece. The Widow Gilson died in 1649, and leaving no children, the nephew and niece were recognized by the Plymouth Court as lawful heirs, since their mother was William Gilson's sister. JOHN<sup>1</sup> succeeded to his uncle's residence in Kent Street. In 1644, he had married CATHERINE<sup>2</sup> MERRITT (HENRY<sup>1</sup>) (see MERRITT family), by whom he had six children:

By the Colonial Records, it appears that John<sup>2</sup> and ZACHARY<sup>2</sup> DAMON were soldiers in King Philip's War in 1676, and received grants of land. ZACHARY was promoted to be a Lieutenant. In 1679, he married MARTHA<sup>2</sup> WOODWORTH of Scituate (see WOODWORTH family). He died in 1730, aged seventy-six. His children were:

3. MEHITABLE<sup>3</sup> DAMON (LIEUTENANT ZACHARY<sup>2</sup>, JOHN<sup>1</sup>), was born in Scituate in 1696. Another Mehitable<sup>4</sup>, her niece, daughter of Zachary<sup>3</sup> Damon and Mehitable Chittenden, is said by some to have married JONATHAN<sup>4</sup> MERRITT (JOHN<sup>3-2</sup>, HENRY<sup>1</sup>), in 1727. But Mehitable<sup>4</sup>, daughter of Zachary<sup>3</sup>, was not born until June eighteenth, 1716, and in 1727 was only eleven years old. It is true MEHITABLE<sup>3</sup> was at that time thirty-one, and perilously near old maidenhood, but we submit that the elder Mehitable is more likely to have been JONATHAN<sup>4</sup>'s bride than was the eleven-year old daughter of Mehitable (Chittenden) Damon. (See MERRITT family.)

By the marriage of MEHITABLE<sup>3</sup> DAMON, in 1727, the name of DAMON was merged in that of MERRITT; in 1786 the name of MERRITT was merged in that of SAWYER; and in 1812 the name of SAWYER was merged in that of MUNSEY.

the first marriage, were: Robert, Nathaniel, Jane, Abraham, and Sarah and Mary (twins).

(V) Abraham (3), third son and fourth child of Nathaniel and Jane (Lunt) Drake, was born March 1, 1726, in Hampton, and settled in what is now Brentwood. He was married, March 5, 1752, to Martha Eaton of Salisbury, Massachusetts.

(VI) Abraham (4), son of Abraham (3) and Martha (Eaton) Drake, was born June 7, 1758, in Brentwood, New Hampshire, and died in New Hampton. He was married, January 27, 1782, in New Hampton, to Anna Burnham, who was born July 26, 1756, in Lee, New Hampshire, daughter of Joshua Burnham, and died February 1, 1805. They resided in New Hampton, where all their children were born, namely: Polly (died young), Abraham, Polly (died young), Joshua B., Joseph, Nancy, Betsey S., Jeremiah M., Thomas, Polly and Simeon D.

(VII) Joseph Burnham, third son and fifth child of Abraham (4) and Anna (Burnham) Drake, was born December 13, 1789, in New Hampton, and married Polly (or Mary) Thompson. They resided in New Hampton, where they had the following children: Louisa, Nancy, John A., Betsey Dow, Joseph Thompson, Francis M. and Abraham.

(VIII) Betsey Dow, third daughter and fourth child of Joseph B. and Polly (Thompson) Drake, was born November 4, 1822, in New Hampton, and became the wife of Hiram Clark. (See Clark, IV).

George Allen Drake, business man of  
**DRAKE** Dover, New Hampshire, is perhaps one of the best examples of the purely self-made man that can be found in Strafford county, where he has lived something less than fifteen years. He is a native of Illinois and was born at Chatsworth in that state, April 10, 1868. His father, Charles W. Drake, died when George was seven years old, and within the next year he was left an orphan by the death of his mother. During the next five years he lived with the family of his brother and went to school when it was possible for him to do so, but in that respect his opportunities for obtaining more than an elementary education were very limited, at the age of thirteen years he started out to make his own way in life, turning his hand to whatever he could find to do and often doing the work of a boy much older and stronger than himself. At the age of eighteen he secured employment on the Union Pacific railroad, where he worked about two years, then went out to work on a ranch, and also for a time was in the service of the T. & S. railroad. In 1894 Mr. Drake came east and located in Dover, New Hampshire, having saved the money he had earned in railroading and ranching in the west, and with that as a capital he was able to start a general livery business in the city. This he continued successfully about ten years, and in July, 1905, purchased the steam carpet cleaning works formerly carried on by Daniel Page, and is still its proprietor.

Mr. Drake married, Carrie E., daughter of Timothy Hussey, and has one son, Charles W. Drake, born in Dover, December 18, 1899.

The only head of a family of this  
**SMALLEY** name early in New England was John Smalley, who came from London in 1632, in the "Francis and James" with Winslow, arriving at Boston, June 5. He removed to Eastham, with the first settlers. His children were: Hannah, John, Isaac and Mary. From John Smalley has probably descended the family of this article.

(I) David Smalley, probably born in Harwich, Massachusetts, January 29, 1745, son of Jonathan and Hannah (Weeks) Smalley, died 1796-97. He was a Revolutionary soldier as stated in "New York in the Revolution." He removed to Gilford, Vermont, and later to Rockingham and settled in Bartonsville (village). In the Vermont Gazetteer he is stated to have been elected surveyor of highways, March 31, 1783; tithingman, March 13, 1786, and surveyor of highways, March 5, 1787. He married Mary Gaines and they had children: Jonathan, David, Olive and Mercy.

(II) David, second son of David and Mary (Gaines) Smalley, born in Gilford, Vermont, 1780, was a shoemaker, and later removed to Grafton. He married, January 13, 1799, Electa Coates, died 1852. Children: Erastus, Darius, David, Harrison, Charles, Horace, Electa, Eliza and Sarah.

(III) Erastus, eldest son of David and Electa (Coates) Smalley, was born in Grafton, Vermont, January 21, 1800, died October, 1872. He was a farmer and lived in Grafton until about 1868, when he removed to Rockingham, where he settled on a farm south of Saxtons river on the road to Bellows Falls. He sold in a few years and bought near Bartonsville, and there his death occurred. He married Sally Beaman, and they had six children: Otis B., Philena, William, Sarah, Orren E. and Frank.

(IV) Orren Erastus, fifth child and third son of Erastus and Sally (Beaman) Smalley, was born in Grafton, Vermont, July 29, 1826, and died in Rockingham, August 16, 1900. He was brought up a farmer, but learned the blacksmith trade, and followed that occupation the greater part of his life. After his marriage he moved to Rockingham, where he lived until 1879, when he removed to Walpole, New Hampshire, where he resided on the Track farm seven years and cultivated the soil. In 1886 he removed to Putney, resided on the twin farms owned by Parker for two years, then returned to Bartonsville and worked at his trade till he died. In politics he affiliated with the Democratic party. He was a believer in spiritualism, and took an active interest in the church of that faith.

He married (first), at Rockingham, March 4, 1850, Elizabeth Roundy, who was born in Rockingham, and died there in 1874. She was a daughter of Ralph Griswold and Atlanta (Gilson) Roundy, of Rockingham, who was married March 23, 1830. He married (second), Maloney Sherwin, widow of ——— Davis, of Springfield, Vermont. The children of the first wife were: Ella, Sarah, Fred Orren, William G., Lemuel W., Helen M. and May. One child, Addie, was born of the second wife. Ella married La Forrest Lawrence, and lived and died in Northfield, Vermont. They had two children: Leon F. and Frank. Sarah married Will Hardy, of Haverhill, New Hampshire. She resided in East Haverhill, New Hampshire, where she died in 1887, leaving two children. Fred Orren is mentioned below. William G. lives in Marlborough, New Hampshire. Lemuel W. died in Walpole, in 1886. Helen M. married Frank Hardy, of East Haverhill, New Hampshire, and died in 1885. May married Will Cady, and they live in South Walpole, Massachusetts. Addie married Louis Gammel, of Rockingham, Vermont.

(V) Fred Orren, third child and eldest son of Orren E. and Elizabeth (Roundy) Smalley, was born in Rockingham, Vermont, December 9, 1857. After leaving the common schools he was employed in a flour mill in Rockingham, Vermont, conducted a livery stable at Galva, Illinois, ran on the Rutland

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and child of Dr. Francis and Isabella Hazen (White) Dana, was born in Boston, September 2, 1837. He was educated at the Lancaster (Massachusetts) Academy, and at the well-known Chauncey Hall School, Boston. When seventeen years old he went to Java on the ship "Flying Fish," and upon reaching that island he accepted a position in the large commission house of Paine, Stricker & Company. Two years later he engaged in the commission business on his own account at Singapore, and upon a visit to Boston he induced Francis D. Cobb to return with him to the far east as his partner. When the news reached him, in 1862, of the rebellion of the southern states, his patriotism caused him to return with all possible haste, and upon his arrival he enlisted in the Thirty-second Regiment, Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry, as second lieutenant, and was subsequently made captain of his company. For some time he served as an aide on the staff of Major-General N. J. T. Dana, commanding the department of the Mississippi West, and was mustered out with the rank of lieutenant-colonel at the close of the war. Once more sailing for the Orient he continued in the commission business at Singapore until 1870, when he returned permanently to the United States, and for the succeeding five years was engaged in the sheep raising business near Laramie City, Wyoming. For the past thirty years he has resided in Newport, New Hampshire, devoting his attention exclusively to the management of his property. For many years he has acted as a justice of the peace. He is a member of the Wentworth Club, Keene, and also of St. James Church, Burkhaven, Lake Sunapee.

On February 22, 1865, Colonel Dana married Frances Matson Burke, daughter of the late Hon. Edmund and Ann (Matson) Burke, the former of whom was born in Westminster, Vermont, January 23, 1809, and died in Newport, January 25, 1882. Ann Matson Burke was born in Stoddard, New Hampshire, June 20, 1823, and died in Newport, January 25, 1857. Mrs. Dana is a lineal descendant in the seventh generation of Richard Burke, of Sudbury, Massachusetts, from whom the line of descent is through Richard, Jonathan, Captain Jesse, Elijah and Hon. Edmund Burke. The first Richard Burke is supposed to have been born about the year 1640, and died at Sudbury in 1693-94. On June 24, 1670, he was married in Sudbury to Mary Parmenter, born there June 10, 1644, daughter of John and Amy Parmenter, and granddaughter of Deacon John Parmenter, who was one of the first settlers in that town. Hon. Edmund Burke was an able lawyer, and prominent politician of his day. In 1834 he established his residence in Newport, and immediately became a leading spirit in the Democratic party of New Hampshire. From 1839 to 1845 he was a member of congress; was commissioner of patents under President Polk; and for a time was associated with Thomas Ritchie in editing the *Washington Union*, which was at that period the chief organ of the national Democratic organization. About the year 1850 Mr. Burke retired from political life and returned to his home in Newport, where he spent the remainder of his days. His wife, Ann (Matson) Burke, was the daughter of Francis and Susan (Gibson) Matson, the former of whom was the only son of Hon. Aaron and Frances (Carpenter) Matson. Hon. Aaron Matson was at one time representative to congress from New Hampshire. Frances Matson, who married Colonel George H. Dana, was born in Washington, District of Columbia, October

7, 1847. There is a family tradition which asserts that Mrs. Dana is a lineal descendant of Peregrine White, who is distinguished in history as the first white child born in New England. Mr. and Mrs. Dana have one son, Francis, who is a lawyer of ability and is connected with the law firm of Messrs. Rawlins & Rawlins, of New York city.

This name has been traced to the SPALDING town of Spalding, in Lincolnshire, England, a market town of about six thousand people, at this time. In the market place is a spa or spring of chalybeate water, and some have conjectured that this forms the foundation of the name. All the men of the name of Spalding, or nearly all, are and have been of strong physique. Another authority conjectures that the name is derived from "spal," an old English word meaning "shoulder," and another old English word "ding" meaning "strike," and it is presumed the the early Spaldings were noted as "shoulder strikers." But be that as it may, the name has been borne in this country by many men of much worth, and it has been distinguished in military and civic life in all sections of the United States. It has been computed that eighteen of this name participated in the battle of Bunker Hill, where one had his horse shot under him. It has been noted in medicine, in the ministry, in law and in extensive business concerns. Down to 1872, there were fifty college graduates.

(I) Edward Spalding probably arrived on American shores between 1630 and 1633. He is found of record at Braintree, Massachusetts, where he was made a freeman May 13, 1640. On October 1, 1645, his petition with those of nineteen others for a grant of ten thousand acres of land was granted by the general court. In 1652 he was one of twenty to petition for the establishment of the town of Chelmsford, and this was granted on May 10 following, and the settlement began immediately. He was one of the selectmen chosen at the first town meeting there in 1654, again in 1656 and in 1660-61. On the first division of lands, February 4, 1661, he was granted twenty-eight acres. In 1663 he was surveyor of highways and in 1665 one of a committee to lay out the meadow lands. In 1666 he was one of the surveyors of Newfield, of which he was one of the original proprietors, and afterwards he was one of the surveyors of North Chelmsford. He is of record in 1664 as possessing an orchard of apple-trees which was then much desired in the colony. His first wife Margaret died at Braintree, in August, 1640, and his daughter Grace died the following year. He died February 26, 1670, and his second wife Rachel prior to April 5 of the same year. His estate was appraised at one hundred twenty-six pounds nineteen shillings four pence above his debts, which amounted to about thirteen and one-half pounds. At the time of this appraisal his wife's wearing apparel was valued at two pounds ten shillings. His children by the first wife were: John, Edward and Grace; by the second wife: Benjamin, Joseph, Dinah and Andrew. (The last named, and descendants are mentioned at length in this article.)

(II) John (I), eldest son of Edward (I) and Margaret Spalding, was born about the year 1633. He came to Chelmsford with his father, probably in 1654, and died in that town October 3, 1721. He was made a freeman March 11, 1660, and there were conveyances of land to him on November 16,

office, Washington, D. C. He was named for his (step) grandfather John Clement, a revolutionary soldier under Salem, New Hampshire.

(VIII) Giles Wheeler, born August 7, 1834; married, January 30, 1858, Sarah W. Abbott, born October 18, 1835. She died December 1, 1902. She was the daughter of Charles Abbott and his wife Sarah R. Carter, both being descendants of emigrants who settled in Concord in 1727—Nathaniel Abbott and Ephraim Carter, prominent in town affairs in their day and generation. No better woman ever lived than Sarah W. Abbott Wheeler.

Giles Wheeler lived on the old homestead at "Wheeler's Corner" until twenty years of age, attending school in winter terms of some ten or twelve weeks each, in the little red school house eighteen by twenty feet, generally known as the "Iron Works" district, but officially in the town district system as district No. 18; and in addition to that attended two terms of a private school kept in town, one term kept by Professor Hall Roberts, in the Athenian Hall, and one term by Rev. George S. Barnes, in the Natural Historical Hall. On leaving this school, May 7, 1853, he began learning the carpenter's trade, serving three years with Colby & Dow. On completion of this term of service he took the contract to build the present "Iron Works" school house for the sum of seven hundred and twenty-five dollars, and continued work at his trade until 1861, when he went to Plymouth, Massachusetts, to superintend a manufacturing business, remaining there three years. While there he was drafted for military service in the civil war, in both Concord, New Hampshire, and Plymouth, Massachusetts, under the same call for recruits. Having no taste for roosting on the fence or sleeping on plowed ground, he procured a substitute, a Yankee, William Gilson, a native of Pelham, New Hampshire, who had already been in the army for nine months, who was ready and willing to rough it again; took his place, fought, bled and died vicariously for his principal.

Returning to Concord, January 2, 1864, he resumed work at his trade, and in 1865 and 1866 built his present residence, where he ever after lived. He was engaged in the lumbering business with Mark T. Ladd two years, and in October, 1873, went into the office of Edward Dow, architect; continued in the business with him until the summer of 1885, when he received the appointment of superintendent of construction for the erection of the Concord post office and United States court house. After its completion he continued as building agent and superintendent of the high school house on School street, the Kimball and Franklin school houses, Margaret Pillsbury hospital, State Library building, Soldiers' Memorial Arch, and several business blocks on Main street, and occasionally making plans for buildings. He has held commissions as justice of the peace for some thirty years, and has been a member of the police commission of Concord from the beginning, and serving as clerk of the board; has attended every meeting of the board to date (1907). He has also served as administrator and executor in the settlement of many estates. He has been nominated for every political office in his ward, also for mayor and state senator, but being a "wicked Democrat," has fortunately always escaped an election. He is also the compiler of these genealogies and historical sketches, and the last living descendant of Daniel Wheeler, Sr., bearing the name of Wheeler, and has no descendants.

(VIII) Isaac Fitch Wheeler, born April 18,

1836; married, December 8, 1867, Harriet E. Ordway. He died March 24, 1902. His wife died June 8, 1907. His middle name was from his grandmother's people, the Fitches of Bedford, Massachusetts. His entire life was that of a quiet, unobtrusive, uneventful, industrious farmer, and was spent on the old homestead at "Wheeler's Corner." He lived at peace with all the world, owing no man anything, and died very suddenly of apoplexy in his own home. Universally lamented, he left behind him

"Far worthier things than tears—  
The love of friends, without a single foe,  
God's finger touched him and he slept.  
Oh friend, say not good night,  
But on some brighter shore bid us good morning."

(VIII) Albert Francis Wheeler, born March 15, 1839; died October 29, 1844.

(V) Thaddeus, youngest child of James and Mary Wheeler, was born December 16, 1742, in Bedford, Massachusetts, and was a pioneer settler of Hollis, New Hampshire, where he was a farmer. He was married in that town October 17, 1769, to Elizabeth Farner, and their children were: Elizabeth, Thaddeus, Minot, Theodore, Amos, James and Benjamin.

(VI) Minot, second son and third child of Thaddeus and Elizabeth (Farner) Wheeler, was born May 16, 1777, in Hollis, and settled about the beginning of the nineteenth century in Royalton, Vermont, where he was for many years an inn keeper. He was married, April 28, 1800, in Brookline, New Hampshire, to Sarah Farley, who was born June 3, 1781, in Brookline, being a twin of Elizabeth. She was a daughter of Benjamin and Lucy Farley, and granddaughter of Samuel and Hannah Farley, pioneer settlers of Hollis. Benjamin Farley was born March 11, 1756, in Hollis. Minot and Sarah (Farley) Wheeler were the parents of ten children.

(VII) Howe, son of Minot and Sarah (Farley) Wheeler, was born and reared in Royalton, Vermont, at a period when the country was new and the sorrowful experiences of the Revolutionary days were still fresh in the minds of the people. This town was burned and several of its citizens massacred by Indians during the Revolution, and the wife of Howe Wheeler belonged to one of the families that suffered most severely during that inhuman disaster. She was Amy Parkhurst, of Royalton, and a woman of strongly defined character who preserved the New England traditions in their strongest form. Mr. Wheeler spent his declining years in Worcester, Vermont, where he died in the winter of 1869-70.

(VIII) Elisha, son of Howe and Amy (Parkhurst) Wheeler, was born in Calais, Vermont. He was a farmer and at one time resided in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He married Elizabeth Cheney, daughter of Joseph Cheney, of Bradford, New Hampshire, and had a family of nine children, five of whom are now living, namely: Mary L., widow of George G. Fox, of New Boston. Elizabeth, wife of E. I. Barker, of Nashua. Susannah, wife of D. D. Dickey, of Hancock. Nathaniel N., who resides in Nashua. William W., also a resident of that city.

(IX) William Wallace, son of Elisha and Elizabeth (Cheney) Wheeler, was born in Cambridgeport, Massachusetts, August 4, 1846. His preliminary studies were pursued in the public schools, and he completed his education at the Francistown (New Hampshire) Academy. When eighteen years old he entered the employ of D. A. government service has been that of justice of the peace, which he has held continuously for the last twelve years. He is a highly cultivated and intelligent gentleman. Long years of reading and study have made him a most pleasant and agreeable conversationalist. He was married, May 5, 1864, to Martha Frances Marsh, who was born April 20, 1836, in Hudson, New Hampshire, and died February 5, 1906, in Merrimack. She was a daughter of Deacon Enoch S. and Martha (Whittier) Marsh, natives respectively of Hudson and Londonderry. (See Marsh.) Mr. and Mrs. Jones had two sons born in California, namely, James Ernest and Leslie Egbert. The former is station agent for the Boston and Maine railroad at Tufts College, and the latter is traveling agent and manager of Smith Premier Typewriter Co., and resides at Bangor, Maine. Both have received liberal educations. A daughter, Grace Marsh, born in Merrimack, is the wife of Louis Hoffman, and resides with her parents at Merrimack. She is the mother of two children: Margaret Frances, born March 31, 1900, and Maurice Leslie, March 1, 1902.

#### (Fifth Family.)

The origin of this family in New Hampshire, like many others of the first in what is now Rockingham county, is lost in uncertainty, partly through the destruction of early records upon the accession of Massachusetts authority in this region. It is not certain that this family is distinct from the Massachusetts family elsewhere treated in this work.

(I) William Jones was a resident of Cambridge, Massachusetts, in 1635, and sold out his lands there in 1638. He appears at Portsmouth in 1644, and was at Bloody Point (Dover) in 1644. He is not found in the records of that town after 1648.

(II) Stephen, supposed to have been a son of William Jones, subscribed to the oath of allegiance at Dover in 1665, and was an accepted inhabitant in 1666. He took the freeman's oath May 15, 1672, and was made ensign in 1691. In 1694 he was in command of a garrison at his house, and he was continuously representative at the general court from 1709 to 1715, inclusive. He was at Oyster River from 1709 to 1715, inclusive. He was at Oyster River in 1675, and was among the petitioners for making that a separate town in 1669 and 1695. In 1665 he was paid twenty-five pounds for keeping a pauper woman and child, and in 1669 the town meeting made arrangements to compensate him for work already done in building a meeting house. In 1696 he was selectman. He was married, January 29, 1663, to Elizabeth Field. The Stephen Jones figuring later in the town must have been his son. (Joseph Jones, who is mentioned with descendants in this article, was probably a son of Stephen. (I).)

(III) Stephen (2), undoubtedly a son of Stephen (1) and Elizabeth (Field) Jones, was a selectman in 1724 in Dover, and captain in 1729. No record of his family can be found, except in the parentage of a son. He resided in that part of Dover which became the town of Durham, and was among the petitioners for its separation.

(IV) Major Stephen (3), son of Stephen (2) Jones, was born March 3, 1706, in Durham, and was a citizen of that town. He was married about 1762 to Susannah Millet, who was born March 22, 1740, a daughter of Thomas Millet, her mother being a Bunker. The children were: Stephen Millet, William, Susannah, Abigail and Thomas.

(V) William, second son and child of Stephen (3) and Susannah (Millet) Jones, was born May

23, 1766, in Durham, and settled in New Durham, New Hampshire, where he was accidentally killed while hauling logs. He married Love Smith about 1792, and their children were: John, Sally, Susannah, Stephen, Ebenezer, Lydia S. and Lewis.

(VI) Lewis, son of William and Love (Smith) Jones, was born in New Durham, 1812, and died February 14, 1887, aged seventy-three years. He moved to Alton while a young man, and was a farmer. In his old age, about 1869, he moved to Farmington, where he died eighteen years later. He married, 1834, Betsey Edgerly, who was born in 1809, and died 1897, aged 88, daughter of Jeremiah and Betsey (Layton) Edgerly. They had eight children: Lewis F., who is mentioned below; Lucy J., Fannie B., who married Charles Hanson; Sarah, wife of Almon Leavitt; Charles W., of Washington; Oscar E., of New Haven, Connecticut; Clara A., who married Frank Gilson, and a child which died young.

(VII) Lewis Freeman, eldest child of Lewis and Betsey (Edgerly) Jones, was born in New Durham, September 9, 1839. At eighteen years of age he began work at the shoemaker's trade, and continued in that industry until August 22, 1862, when he enlisted as a private in Company A, Twelfth New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry, from the town of Alton, and was mustered in August 30, 1862. He was on that part of the battlefield of Gettysburg called the Peach Orchard, July 2, 1863, and was severely wounded, losing his left arm, and was discharged on account of wounds November 9, 1863. After his discharge from the military service he peddled about fifteen years, was engineer in charge of a stationary engine three years and kept a saloon in Farmington two years. He is a member of Carlton Post, No. 24, Grand Army of the Republic, and was a delegate to the National Encampment at Indianapolis in 1906. He married (first), Augusta Taylor, daughter of Rev. Chase Taylor, of Abington, Massachusetts. They had three children born to them: Ada E., who married Orrin N. Blaisdell; Annie, who married Lewis Gould; and Frank J., who died young. He married (second), Georgia A. Lawrence, of Nashua. Three children were born of this marriage: Ethel Blanche, who married (first) John Driscoll, and had one child, Gladys Jones, and (second), Harry Wentworth; George F., who resides in Somersworth, a veteran of the Spanish-American war; and Alice Maud, wife of Leland J. Smith, of Rochester.

(III) Joseph Jones was undoubtedly a son of Stephen (1), born probably before 1680, and died before January 30, 1744, at which time the inventory of his estate was made. This amounted to four thousand four hundred and fifty-six pounds, four shillings and six pence. His estate was divided in 1746, the beneficiaries being his widow Ann, his sons Joseph, Benjamin, John, Anthony, Richard, and a daughter of a deceased son Samuel.

(IV) Benjamin, second son of Joseph and Ann Jones, was born soon after 1700, in Durham, and probably settled in Lee, New Hampshire. His wife, Hannah Chesley, was born in 1751, in Durham, and they were married about 1767-8. He settled in Canterbury about 1773-4, and this may have been a second marriage. His children were: Benjamin (died young), Rosa, Elizabeth, Daniel, Henry and Benjamin.

(V) Daniel, second son and fourth child of Benjamin and Hannah (Chesley) Jones, was born in

Afterwards clerked in a hotel, the Davenport House, for one year, and in 1855 engaged with John Walraven (b. Aug. 23, 1827) in the fruit, confectionery and ice cream business. A year later he bought out his partner, then finally sold out the business entire and farmed for one season near Durant, Ia. He served in Captain Reed's company in an expedition to Crown Point in the summer of 1755.|| He served from April 20 to October 19, 1756, in Capt. Eliphalet Fales' company in the expedition to Crown Point.\*\* He was in the Crown Point expedition of 1759, serving from April 6 to November 29, as corporal in Capt. Leonard Whiting's company, 1st Battalion, Brig.-gen. Timothy Ruggles' regiment.†† His name appears as sergeant in a muster roll of Capt. Thomas Farrington's company, in which he served from March 6 to December 5, 1760.‡‡

John Trowbridge had reached his majority during his last period of service, and on his return home settled in Groton and engaged in business on his own account.§§ He continued to follow his trade, that of a shop joiner, and farming, to some extent, until his death. He was one of the original Presbyterian congregation organized in 1788 in Groton.

He served from July 18 to October 21, 1780.‡ From this date no further record of him was found.
