GENERATIONS OF BUSEYS

Records have been found showing that the father of John Simpson Busey was Jacob Busey; that Jacob Busey's father was Mathew Busey; and that Mathew Busey's father was Samuel Busey. (This is a correction to page 6 of the book) However, at this point, there is question concerning two different Samuel Buseys whose fathers were brothers, Paul and Charles. Their father was Paul Busey, who was the first of the Busey family to come to America.

Listed below is the information available on these first six generations of Buseys in America, beginning with Paul Busey. Remember that either of his sons could have been our forefather, as is explained better a little later.

The following information was sent to me by LaVerne Busey, who lives in Shelbyville, Kentucky. It is taken from papers published in 1957 entitled Ancestry and Descendants of Mathew Busey of Maryland, North Carolina, and Kentucky, compiled by Mrs. Eva Marrell Harmison and Miss Emma M. Rouse. Most of the following information is copied straight from their papers. Many of the dates differ from what I have in the book, so probably theirs are more accurate.

The first of the Busey family in America was Paul Busey, who was in the Province of Maryland, Calvert Co. in 1651. From the land records of Maryland is this item of unknown date: 5th January ".. Henry Cox demandeth Four Hundred Acres assigned to him by Mr. "William Eltonhead (ut supra) and two Hundred Acres of Land more for transporting himself and Paul Busey son of Elizabeth his former wife into this Province Anno 1651."

Paul Busey evidently served Henry Cox for his transportation to America and according to another document dated 11 June 1659, had fulfilled other legal provisions to acquire 150 acres of land in 1659. These records have not indicated the country of origin of Paul Busey, but family tradition has inferred both Scotland and England.

* No proof has been established to determine which Samuel Busey of Maryland migrated to Rowan County, North Carolina. If the Samuel of North Carolina was the father, as believed, of Mathew Busey of Rowan County, then he would have been the approximate age of Samuel, born: ca 1707, son of I(A*) Paul Busey, or of Samuel, born: ca 1709, son of I(B*) Charles Busey.

Mathew Busey resided in Rowan County, North Carolina before 1768 and until 1800. He was taxed in Rowan County in 1768 in Morgan Bryan's District; in 1778 in Captain Reed's District; and in 1784, he was taxed on 320 acres of land in Captain John Graham's District.

On 25 October 1786, Mathew received a deed for 420 acres of land in Rowan County located on both sides of Bear Creek, this area within the "Forks of the Yadkin", and another deed for 260 acres of land on the waters of Bear Creek on 18 May 1789, for which he paid fifty shillings for each one hundred acres. On 18 April 1797, he sold 200 acres of this land for forty pounds.

Two of Mathew's married sons, Isaac and John Busey, seem to have been the first of this family group to leave North Carolina. They went to Franklin County, Kentucky and were on the tax rolls of 1797 in that county.

It appears that after the crops were harvested in the fall of 1800, Mathew, with his family and two remaining married sons, Samuel and Charles with their families, also began the long journey to new land in Kentucky. Doubtless, they made their way by ox cart and pack horse over the mountains to the West over that part of the Wilderness Road blazed by Daniel Boone and others to the fort of Boonesborough - to travel on beyond the now abandoned fort settlements, West to the counties of Franklin and Shelby, there to settle on good land.

On the 28 February 1803, Mathew bought 573 acres of land in Shelby County on the waters of the Lick; near the present Shelby-ville, Kentucky. In this same year, on 30 September, after he had become a resident of Shelby County, Mathew sold the remaining 233 acres of his North Carolina land for \$370. Mathew and Edith Busey lived the remainder of their lives in Shelby Co., Ky.; both buried in the family burial ground contained on the farm which Mathew willed to his son, Jacob.
