GENEVA, Ohio (UPI) — A full-scale investigation of the train-car smashup that killed six women here Saturday night was ordered today by City Manager Robert Salisbury.

Dead were Sylvia E. Sanker, 18, the driver; Jennie M. Angelo, 21; Darlene M. Muzenic, 21; Barbara Cowan, 19; Sandra Vansack, 18; and Jullane M. Palko, 20, all of Youngstown.

Police said their convertible, apparently going only "about 15 to 20 miles an hour," drove past the red flasher lights which were operating at the crossing and into the path of an 89-car eastbound freight train. There were no gates at the crossing.

at our business buildings and exclaiming: "So this is Wooster! Doesn't look a thing like back home!"

But, you want to know something about your "babies," so let me present them to you individually:

In Arkansas

Wooster way down there in Arkansas, in the land of rice and cotton, has a population of 118, and is in Faulkner county, there in the famous Ozarks, 7 miles over the mountains to the nearest railroad.

This is the only other Wooster with a post office. It is in the very center of the state and 32 miles north of Little Rock, the state capital.

J. L. Patton, postmaster and general storekeeper of Wooster, Ark., writes:

"Wooster, Ark., got its name

peaches, pears, plums, and all kinds of peas and beans. The soil is very fertile, and we have fine drinking water. We have four very large orchards which ship several carloads of peaches; also ship grapes, and apples. Most all the farmers have small orchards for their home use.

We ship lots of cream, eggs and chickens. We have electricity, one church, which is Baptist, Masonic lodge, large school building, gymnasium building 70x90-feet, just completed. Most of the people own a car and radio. J. L. Patton is postmaster and keeps the office in his large general merchandise store.

In Michigan

Wooster, Mich., 38 miles north of Grand Rapids, has a population of 20, and is in Newaygo county, on the Pere Marquette railroad, 25 miles east of Lake Michigan. The 20-Wooster-ites that live here their mail through the Fremont, Mich., post office.

Miss Nellie Stocking, postmaster, Fremont, Mich., writes: "Some time around 1875 the Pere Marquette railroad put in a side track and freight house about half-way between Muskegon and Big Rapids for the accommodation of the Rysan and Hill Lumber Co., then doing an extensive business in this vicinity.

"This siding was known as Worcester Hill. Some time later a post office was established and the Hill was dropped and the spelling changed to Wooster. The post office was taken up when the R. P. D. went through.

"At one time Wooster, Mich., had a creamery, potato store house, farm implement building, saw mill, pickle station, blacksmith shop, two general stores, two garages, a town hall and a doctor. All that remains today is a general store, garage, and town hall.

Wooster is about a quarter of a mile from Crystal Lake, a beautiful place with many summer cottages lining the shore. In past years millions of feet of logs were loaded at Wooster, also sugar beets, cattle, hogs and lumber."

In Washington

Wooster, way out west in Washington, is just one mile from the Pacific ocean, so you can say it is on the Pacific coast. It is in Grays Harbor county on the Northern Pacific railroad.

This Wooster has an alias—a very romantic one, Aloha West, as it is just west of a little town named Aloha. However, the railroad insists on calling this place Wooster. The Washington Woosters get their mail through the Aloha, Wash., post office.

They are guarded against Communist reprisal by plain clothesmen of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Gouzenko's dramatic flight from the Soviet embassy in 1945, when he carried documents and messages stuffed in his shirt, was one of the opening chapters of the cold war. It focused attention on the efforts of Russia to get atomic secrets.

EVIDENCE HE took implicated 20 Canadians, including a member of Parliament, a number of civil servants and an army officer in an espionage ring directed from the Soviet embassy here.

His testimony before a royal commission led directly to the arrest of Dr. Alan Nunn May, British physicist who was convicted in Britain of giving atomic secrets to the Russians.

Indirectly, the Ottawa spy trials in which 12 persons were convicted of violating the Official Secrets Act, led to the eventual arrest of Dr. Klaus Fuchs and put investigators on the trail of atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

Operations now in progress. As the American and British troops moved in force across the border of Tunisia from Algeria French Colonials battled furiously against German and Italian soldiers, now reported to number some 10,000, sought to extend the area of their control around Tunis, the capital, and other vital points.

The Morocco radio said that the advance into Tunisia of American and British forces was continuing rapidly as Axis aircraft attempt to harass their movements through constant air attacks.

Axis planes concentrated their assaults on the East Algerian ports of Bougie and Bone where Allied reinforcements were going ashore steadily. Bone underwent several air alerts and Allied fighters and anti-aircraft guns quickly challenged the enemy craft, shooting down several of the planes.

Enemy submarine activity also was on the increase and the Morocco radio said that 10 U-boats had been sunk off the African coast in the past two days.

A unit of 100 Allied parachute troops was reported by the Daily Mail to have been employed as the vanguard of British and American ground forces moving in on the Germans and Italians in Tunisia.

A Reuter correspondent in Algiers stated that a big convoy of additional troops on large transports, including famed world liners, had arrived to reinforce Gen. Anderson's first army. No losses were incurred in the troop movement, and the voyage was without incident.

Encounter Opposition An announcement from Allied headquarters in North Africa said that Axis raiding forces which attempted to bomb dock installations, troops and supply ships in North African harbors ran into a hornet's nest of American and Royal Air Force fighter planes. Allied craft replied to the Axis serial assaults with heavy bombings of Bizerte and Tunis. A score of German-Italian planes have been shot out of the air over Tunisia.

Gen. Anderson revealed that his task force driving on Bizerte consisted of 90 per cent British troops and then said tersely: "I don't give a damn whether they are British or American as long as the job is done."

French Engage Germans French forces in Tunisia, it was revealed, engaged the Germans and Italians at a number of points. Anti-aircraft batteries continually fired on German landing planes.

Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, American commander-in-chief of the Allied forces in North Africa, revealed that the combined Axis forces in Tunisia were of considerable strength.

He said that the Axis now apparently is determined to try to hold its bridgeheads there as long as possible.

An entirely unconfirmed report from Madrid by the Scandinavian Telegraph Bureau reaching London through Stockholm said that "a considerable part" of the Italian fleet engaged British and American naval forces in the Mediterranean. Allied sources had nothing to say concerning this report but it was known that Axis U-boats attempting to disrupt the Allied landings were suffering heavily.

Corsicans Resist

Over on the other side of the Mediterranean, which Premier Mussolini had hoped one day to call his private lake, 11 Duce's troops were reported running into difficulties in the occupation of the French island of Corsica, north of Sardinia. The Morocco radio quoted Swiss correspondents in Rome as stating that the Corsicans were violently resisting the occupation of Napoleon's birthplace.

The political situation in the French African colonies occupied by the Americans was beginning to clear with the establishment of a coalition government under former Vichy Defense Chief Admiral Jean Francois Darlan.

Giraud In Command Gen. Henri Honore Gaud, one of France's greatest generals who escaped from the watchful eyes of the gestapo and made his way to North Africa at the start of the American invasion, was placed in command of military forces.

Lieut. Gen. Mark W. Clark, deputy commander to Gen. Eisenhower, expressed his satisfaction and that of his superior in Gen. Giraud's appointment.

Esther was a sophomore at the University of Southern California. After their arrival in Wooster, they were directed to Rev. Services will be conducted privately by Dr. Williams Tuesday at the McConnell Funeral Home.

AMISH FARMER GOES TO JAIL

Ben Raber, Amish father tried in common pleas court 10 days ago on a charge of failing to send his child to high school, today began serving a 30-day jail sentence and at the same time it was revealed that practically no progress has been made in a conference to settle the controversies here over school attendance.

It was brought out today that there had been a conference set last week but that bishops of the Amish church had declined to attend the conference arranged by Prosecutor Raymond Morgan and school heads.

Want Definite Program Attorney Charles Jones, who had represented Raber in his trial here, said that the Amish leaders were willing to attend a conference if definite programs had been worked out to use as bases for conferences but that they were not willing to meet just for a general discussion.

The conference was to have been held last week in the office of the county superintendent but the day before the conference was to have been held, Amish church leaders sent notice they would not attend, Prosecutor Morgan said today.

Raber went to the county jail today as his decision in the choice of serving a jail term or posting \$100 bond for the attendance of his son at high school. He had been given 10 days to make that choice after Judge Walter J. Mougey found him guilty 10 days ago.

Postponement Refused

Today Raber asked the court to give him some additional time so that he could continue with the operation of his corn husker in his community but the court refused to have a further hearing on the matter when the prosecutor expressed the opinion there was no need for further discussion and postponement of the serving of the jail sentence.

Raber said today that his son was not in school and that he was not at home. He declined to tell the court and Prosecutor Morgan where his son now is living. Under this attitude, the prosecutor and court indicated they felt no need for complying with the request of Raber for delays in putting his sentence into effect.

W. E. Krelling, attendance officer who had filed the charge against Raber, said today that he recently learned of four more cases where children have not been in school and their parents decline to say where the children are living.
