On 10 June 1950, Jane Wallace and Jim Anderson were married in the beautiful old college chapel with Jim's father and Pastor John Kindsvatter officiating. The new couple moved to the farm west of Wooster where they ran the family dairy farm for several years. They moved to Mt. Pleasant, Michigan, in 1955 where both earned teaching certificates, then settled in Midland, Michigan, for the next thirty plus years. Jane taught elementary school for twenty-five years. Jim was a teacher, then a principal in Midland before accepting a position at Michigan State University where he taught for twentyfive years

Elizabeth Ann is the oldest of four children born to Jane and Jim Anderson. Elizabeth (Beth) was born in Wooster on 11 August 1952. She married Dennis Driscoll. They live with their three sons, John, James, and William in Midland, Michigan, where both are teachers.

James Anderson VII (Scott) was born in Wooster on

October 1954 and married Paula Wood. They lived in Maryland for a year before moving to Maui, Hawaii, where Scott teaches and Paula works in a restaurant.

John Wallace Anderson was born on 1 April 1956 in Mt. Pleasant, Michigan. He married Betsy Stebbins and they spent two years in Sierra, Leone, West Africa, as Peace Corps volunteers. They live on the farm on Munson Road south of Moreland, Ohio, with son Sam and daughter Marybeth. John works in the Poultry Science Department at O.A.R.D.C.

Katherine Laura (Laurie) Anderson was born in Midland, Michigan, on 10 September 1958, and lives in Columbus, Ohio, where she teaches school and works in

the public library

Summerhill, the farm-for-the-whole-family, was purchased in 1982. Located by Munson's Knob above the Killbuck valley in Franklin Township, the farm is the summer home and eventual retirement occupation for Jim and Jane, and the summer gathering place for the family. John and Betsy live there year around and several other family members plan eventually to move back to Wayne County and build on the farm. - James Anderson

Raymond R. and Marjorie R. (Houmard) Armstrong

Our household is one whose history has been intricately and wonderfully intertwined with the story of Wayne County for more than one-and-one-half centuries. Through our great-grandfathers of years past, our lives in the present, and our great-grandchildren in the future, our family and Wayne County have grown and

prospered together.

The account began when Captain Thomas Armstrong (born 8/22/1776) first visited Wooster while serving under General Beall during the War of 1812. (This was my husband's great-great-grandfather.) He and his wife settled the family here after the war, where they raised ten children. Thomas was active in politics, being a member of the Whig party. His interest and influence was also seen in his contribution to the founding of the Wayne Presbyterian Church in 1840. At his death, two years later, he was the first person buried in the adjoin-

ing church-yard.
The youngest of Thomas' ten children was named Calvin (6/3/1826-4/21/1901). He continued his father's example of farming and being active in politics and the local church. (A biography of Calvin and his father is included in the *Biographical Record of Wayne County*, published in Chicago in 1889 by J.H. Beers &

The first-born son was named Thomas Albert, commonly called T.A. He lived from 1849-1930, having three

children: Lewis, Vinnie, and Hugh. Hugh (1872-1956) was married in 1900 to Mae Wiles. In preparation for his bride, he constructed the residence at 1639 Armstrong Road. (Hugh's great-great-grandchildren currently reside in his home.) Hugh and

Mae had one child, Raymond Reed. While the Armstrong family was progressing in Canaan Township, the Houmard family had settled in Paint Township. David Houmard, in 1825, became the first Frenchman to live in Paint Township, relates Douglass' History of Wayne County. In a seventeen-week trip from Canton Berne, Switzerland, David and his new bride Mary Ann Rosalie emigrated to Wayne County. They purchased 160 acres of land in Paint Township in May, 1826 for a price of \$675. The first winter they lived in a crude log house of two rooms (which included space for the family cow and calf!) Mr. Houmard was a cutler but rade. Daniel Houmard continued to reside in Paint Township until his death about the year 1925. He had six children: Emma, Mary, Samuel, Alfred, Jules and George. Samuel E. Houmard (5/26/1871-2/27/1965) lived

his entire life in Wayne County. He was married to Esther Ellen Bushey (3/2/1876-5/8/1962) on October 4, 1900. After several locations when the children were young, the family settled in a home on Friendsville Road where they lived for 40 plus years. Samuel and Esther raised six children: Mabelle, Marjorie, Dorothy, Hazel, Verna and Charles. Early remembrances by Marjorie Ruth (July 4, 1903) include seeing Haley's Comet in 1911, and the first family car purchased in 1917 for 1911, and the first family car purchased in 1917 for

On August 29, 1923, the histories of the Armstrong and Houmard families were united at the wedding of Raymond Reed and Marjorie Ruth. (Their courtship had begun the previous winter at a box social at Wayne School. Marjorie's box, containing sandwiches, cookies and cake and decorated with ribbon, brought the highest bid that evening!) Raymond and Marjorie set up house on the family farm. Three children were born to them: John Raymond (Dec. 9, 1926): Richard Calvin (Jan. 5, 1928), and Betty Jean (Oct. 5, 1930).

There were many dramatic changes occurring on the farm during these years. In 1934, electricity arrived. Shortly afterward, the first radio, a cathedral-style table model, was purchased. In 1937 the family moved nextdoor to the larger family residence at 1777 Armstrong Road. Farm technology was progressing rapidly and agricultural specialization was becoming standard.

Raymond started a family poultry business in the ear-1940's. A processing plant was constructed in 1960. At its height, the operation processed 200,000 turkeys and ducks per year.

The business is continued today on a limited scale by his son John. John graduated from Burbank High School in 1944, and married Gloria Ann Walters of Rittman on October 30, 1948. John served with the U.S. Army in Korea from 1955-57. John and Gloria have two sons:

Daniel John (August 13, 1957) and David Raymoni vember 13, 1958).

Son Richard works for Federal Land Bank while tinuing to operate the farm work. He also graduated Burbank where both brothers enjoyed playing bask and baseball. In 1949 he married Annabel Lou Hoc Rittman. Dick and Annabel have two children: Allen (February 6, 1950) and Janice Ann (December 1968)

Daughter Betty also graduated from Burbani School, and was married to Lloyd (Hank) Ulrich o ruary 21, 1953. They also have two children: Ke Alan (August 12, 1956) and Karen Kay (March 29, Betty is employed as a secretary for Wayne M Shop while her husband works at Akron Brass.

Capt. Thomas Armstrong homesteaded the present Armstrong farm, where he died in 1842. He also became owner of the land just north, long known as the William Armstrong farm. William Armstrong in 1840 deeded 26 perches of land to the board of education, and on this land school No. 8 was built. In 1891 Harrison Armstrong deeded more land, eight-tenths of an acre, out of his farm, and on this land was built the tworoom school which became a landmark in the community and which operated until centralization closed district schools in the J. W. McConnell munity. Martha Myers were the teachers.


