On this day of September 1832 personally appeared in open court before the Justice of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions now sitting ~~Robert~~ Covey a resident of said County in the State aforesaid aged twenty one years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress, passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832: That he was born in the State of New York ~~Deafness~~ County where he was raised until he was sixteen years of age, at which time under the laws of said State he was subject to military duty, & being in the immediate neighborhood of a landing of the British forces he was constituted, what was then called a "minute man", subject to be called at any time, bound to obey such call. He was first marched under the command of Capt. Comfort Liddenton, in a Regt. commanded by Colo. Henry Liddenton, was marched to Park Hill in S<sup>d</sup> State, but was in no general engagement. Afterward he was ordered under Capt. Joel Meade 20 or 30 miles west of the State line in pursuit of the hostile Indians - after being thus for four years engaged in the service of his country in his native State he removed to the State of Virginia in Washington County about thirty after his arrival he was drafted as a substitute for Robert Leanspelt who was drafted for six months, under the command of

Capt. William Edmondson & Capt. William Campbell  
- tell, that he was marched over the Blatanga  
river & crossed the yellow mountain near the  
head of said river, crossed Broad river, &  
went to King Mountain, was engaged in  
the Battle fought at that place - that  
he was partially acquainted with Capt  
Campbell, Major Shelby

On his return he volunteered to fight under  
Capt. Patrick Campbell & Capt. Archibald  
Campbell in pursuit of the Cherokee  
Indians - that they travelled down the  
Cherokee & French Broad rivers until  
they came to said nation - He states he has  
no recollection of any <sup>having seen</sup> ~~any~~ <sup>of the</sup> ~~persons~~  
of no person, whose testimony he can pro-  
- cure, who can testify to his service - He  
hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a  
pension or annuity, except the present, & declares  
that his name is not on the Pension roll  
of the agency of any State - sworn & subscribed
