Ralph Spafford, chairman of the county Republican central committee, was chairman of the meeting. Others who spoke briefly were Representative Homer W. Hall, Senator Florence Fifer Bohrer, Representative Gus Johnson and John M. Lindsey, a former representative from Nebraska.

Mr. Funk said: "I want to say at the outset, and this is verified by conversation with many men regardless of political affiliation, that if Mr. Hoover was not President he would be the outstanding man to be selected by whoever was President to head a commission that would undertake to devise ways and means to relieve us from this depression, unemployment and low prices that our nation and the world is now passing through."

Cites Accomplishments.
"As President he has not only undertaken but accomplished much and if we will agree to allow him four years more to forward his plans he will be considered in an entirely different light than many people think of him today."

"Comparatively few people actually know Herbert Hoover. I mean by that unless one has had the privilege to become not only personally but intimately acquainted, and to work with him and study his motives, Hoover defies politics in the way it now hooks itself on to our national business methods of running our government."

"I know from first hand how he feels about it. He has talked to me many times, but of course he recognizes that no single man can change this situation."

"For this reason the politician does not know Hoover. In fact, many of them do not want to know him intimately—I mean—and thus Hoover is not a favorite in the political fraternity."

"No President since Lincoln has had more to combat from a political point of view. His enemies hate him bitterly and some, I am sorry to say who pretend to be his friends, are only lukewarm."

"On the other hand, however, of those who have worked with him not necessarily always agreeing with him but at the same time understanding the true motive of his conscientious mind, I have yet to find or hear of a person who would not go to the limit with him and for him."

Consulted With Him.
"Personally speaking about Mr. Hoover I was very close to him during 18 months of the war in 1917 and 1918."

"It was my privilege to consult with him often, and many times he and I were alone in his private office of the food administration. Holding the position that I did as one of his advisers, I felt it was my duty to study and analyze both him and his actions as well as the duties that were presented to the food administration for action."

"And I did study him. I think I know Herbert Hoover as well as any man in the United States. I said this 12 years ago, and I say it again: He is just like all of us, human, and no human being ever lived who is more sincere and wants to do the right thing than Herbert Hoover."

"It seems to me too many of us farmers and business men are laboring under not only false statements but unacquainted facts, as

DRYS INDORSE CANDIDATES

Mrs. Bohrer, Hall and Johnson Approved by League.

The Anti-saloon league of Illinois has issued a list of candidates for congress and the general assembly to whom it has given its indorsement, according to an Associated Press dispatch from Chicago to The Pantagraph Wednesday.

Among those listed are: Representative Homer W. Hall, Bloomington, candidate for re-election in the seventeenth district; Charles Adkins, Decatur, candidate for representative in the nineteenth district; State Senator Florence Fifer Bohrer, Bloomington, candidate for re-election in the twenty-sixth district; Charles Lee, Decatur, candidate for state senator in the twenty-eighth district; G. J. Johnson, Paxton, candidate for re-election as state representative in the twenty-sixth district; W. C. Chynoweth, candidate for state representative in the twenty-eighth district.

Richard Yates (Rep.) was the only one of four candidates for congressman at large to receive the league's support; none was named for United States senator, and no candidates for congress in Cook county were named.

The league named 10 downstate candidates for congressional representation; 15 downstate state senatorial candidates and 48 downstate candidates for representative in the general assembly.

Andrew J. Johnson, Alton Veteran, Dies

Andrew J. Johnson, 76, of 1505 West Graham street, for many years an employe at the Alton roundhouse here, died Wednesday morning in the state hospital at Peoria. He had been ill three months.

Mr. Johnson was born in Hawkins county, Tennessee, Sept. 23, 1836. Jan. 26, 1877, he married Sarah Catherine Stapleton, who survives him. There are also three sons and a daughter living, Henry J. Johnson, 1312 West Market street; H. D. and Nancy A. Johnson, at home, and George W. Johnson, New York.

The body was taken to the John A. Beck company chapel. Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

"This effort," Mrs. Dean said, "to organize, crystallize and give expression to the sentiment in favor of the election of President Hoover and Vice President Curtis is a nation wide campaign activity authorized by the national Republican committee and endorsed by the party organization of the state. The organization of the Hoover-Curtis activities among the women of Illinois is being vigorously pushed. We shall cordially welcome the active support of every woman who is interested in the reelection of President Hoover and Vice President Curtis."

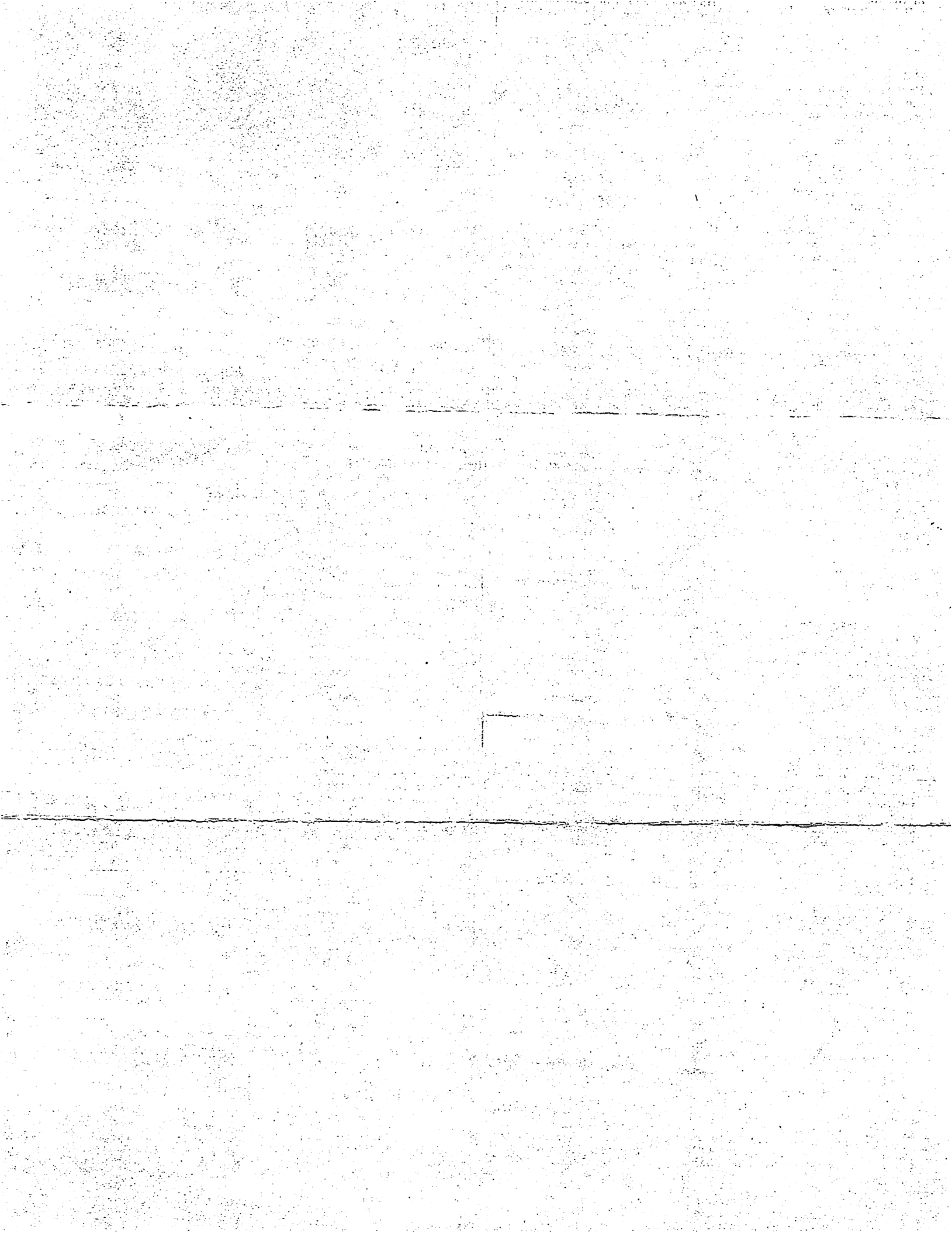
