Taking the above in connection with the 1743 will of Joseph Gillett of Hartford, and the baptisms of his and Mary's six daughters, it is apparent that here is a record of the order of births of the three sons and six daughters of Joseph and Mary (Griswold) Gillett, entered on a Hartford town book. Why the son Matthew, born between his sisters Abigail and Dorothy, has no baptismal record can only be surmised as perhaps due to infant ill health, or that the baptismal record was overlooked or not clear. The town record must have been together, in one place, and so seemingly reported for record at one time; and if so, after the birth of Dorothy in 1710. This could account for a most probably error in the month of Hannah's birth, "Nov.", since she was bapt. Oct. 18. And if the son Joseph was both May 17 (date of the parents' marriage) then the son Joseph born Feb. 16, 1692 (1692/3) in Windsor to Joseph Gillett (almost surely Joseph3) must have died young. A confusion of family dates seems more probable. The son Matthe was doubtless named for his mother's brother, Matthew Griswold. Joseph<sup>2</sup> Griswold made his will 6 Sept. 1716, 11 ventory taken 29 Nov. (Manwaring, vol. II.), and bequeath to his three sons and "To my daughters, Mary, the wife of Joseph Gillette, and Abigail, the wife of Josiah Phelps, 25 pounds apiece out of moveables. I give to my grandchild Sarah Gillette 5 pounds out of my moveables."

#### THE BROTHERS JONATHAN AND NATHAN GILLETT AND SOME OF THEIR DESCENDANTS

12. John Gillett (Joseph, Jonathan ), of Deerfield, Mass., and Lebanon, Conn., born in Windsor, Conn., 10 June 1671, died in 1755 (Abridged Compendium of American Genealogy, by Virkus, 1925, vol. 1, p. 342). He married in Lebanon, 3 Jan. 1699/1700, Experience3 Dewey, born in Westfield, Mass., 9 April 1682, daughter of Josiah2 and Hepzibah (Lyman) Dewey.

His remarkable experience in the last decade of the 17th century is of high interest to his descendants; and the European part of it was probably duplicated by few New

England contemporaries.

As Sheldon's Deerfield History (vol. 1, p. 254) states of the year 1696; "From beginning to end this proved another troublesome year to the town. The Court also provided a garrison; and scouting was continued on the frontiers. Although this dangerous service was performed with boldness and fidelity, sudden inroads of the enemy could not always be averted. Like a whirlwind they came and went, leaving destruction in their track." The detailed story of what happened that year to soldier John's Gillett is told in the Stephen Williams manuscript, beginning: 77ber 16, 1696, John Smead & John Gillett being in the woods, looking or tracking Bees, were besett by a company of French Mohawks. J. G. was taken prisoner & J. S. escaped - the indians fearing a discovery by S. 16 of them hastened away toward the town, and three were left with 1. G. It being lecture day the people were got out of ye meadows, that so yr might attend ye lecture, so that ye enemy came as far as Mr. Danl Beldings house that was within gun shot of ye fort. . . . [Mr. Belding, son Nathaniel, ac. 22, dau. Esther, 13, taken prisoners: wife, 2 sons, 1 dau, killed: I son badly wounded: 2 daus, escaped. Other hostilities at fort, in meadow, etc.] . . . the enemy went up Green River & came to their companions that they had left with Gillett. John Smead came into July

the Town soon after Mr. Belding's family were well off. Ye lat night ye enemy lodged in a round hole near the river, above ye rock, at Nid st, where ye fires were fresh, thence set away for Canada by ye way of Otter Creek, leaving Connecticut river &c. When they came near Otter creek, they came upon some tracks of Albany indians that were going to Canada. (for in those times ye indians from Albany were wont to go a-scalping, as they call it, to Canada) they sent out their scouts & were upon the look. out, and at length discovered yr smoak; and then they flung down their packs & painted themselves & tyd their English captives to trees & left two men to guard them; & proceeded to yr business, & having divide themselves into two companies, they sett upon the secure company (weh consisted of six men) & killed two of ym, took two & 2 escaped. Among ye slain was one Uroen an indian known among ye english (& suspected to be a bloody fellow & sometimes mischievous to ye english). Of their own men one was woundd in ye fleshy part of the thigh (as one had been before at D'f'd), the prisoners were one a Scatocook indian & ye other young Albany Mohawk. When the skirmish was over, the English were brot up & so they proceedd on their journey. Mr. B. asked the Scatacook Indian, (now his fellow prisoner) what he thought the enemy would do with them, who replyd that they would not kill ye english prisoners, but give some of them to ye french & keep some of them themselves; but he expected to be burnt himself, but when they came to ye lake, one rainy night, they made no fire, and some of them lodgd under ye canoes, from whom this Scatacook made his escape having loosed himself by some means from his cords &c., and altho he was psud the enemy could not recover him &c. As to the young Albany Mohawk, he was kept alive. being of their own nation (the french mohawks went from yr nation over to Canada for ye sak of ye romish religion). Wn Mr. B. & company came to the fort calld Oso, the males were obliged to run the Gauntlet near it. Mr. B being a very nimble or lightfooted man, received but few blows, save at first setting out, but the other men were much abusd by clubs, firebrands, &c;

"They arivd at Canada 8ber 9. Now they found what the Scatacook indian had said, to be true, for the indians kept Mr. B. himself & his daughter with them, & gave J. G. & N. B. to the french. J. G. worked at a serve to ye Nuns at their Farm. N. B. worked for the Holy Sisters. On ye 9th of July following, Mr. B was sold to ye french & lived as a servt with the jesuits at the seminary; his business was to wait upon them & cutt wood, make fires & tend the garden &c. He accounted himself favorably dealt with. In ye winter following Coll Abrm Schyler with some others came to Canada & brought with them a copy of ye Articles of peace between England and France & returnd home with some Dutch Captives. In Aprill following Coll peter Schyler & Coll A. Schyler & the Dutch Domine, wth some others, came to Canada & the French governor gave liberty to all captives, English & Dutch, to return home, yea alowed them to oblige all under 16 years of age to return wth them, those above yt age were to be at their liberty &c. These Dutch Gentlemen gathers up wt captives both English & Dutch they could & returned june 8 & took Mr. B and his xdren and Martin Smith with abt 20 more English with them, & arrived at Albany in about 15 days, where ye Dutch showed to him a great deal of kindness, offered to send him home directly to Deerfd Coll Schyler clothd him & his xdren at the desire of his brother Mr. John Belding of Norwalk who paid him for the clothes &c. after about three weeks' stay at Albany, Mr. B and his children went down the River to N. York where his Br had provided a place for his entertainment & from York he went in a vessill to Stamford & from there went to Norwalk to his friends & after some stay there, returnd to D'fd. J. G. got home a little before him by the way of France & so to England, having received great kindness in England.

Colonel Partridge in a message to the Massachusetts General Court told the story of John Gillett compactly, as follows: "Wheras John Gillet who hath been a very active and willing souldr within the County

of Hampshire & Being on the 16th day of Sept 1696 out upon service & together with some others was that day taken by the Enemy & suffering hardship was carried to Canada Captive & there Remaynd till Septer Last & then was sent from thence Prisonr unto old ffrance & thence (by the later Articles of Peace) the ad Gillet together with other Captives was Released & carried into England: Since his Arrivall there hath Lived & obtained pay for his Passage by the Charitie of some English Marchets there; & now being arrived here Destetute of Money or Cloaths for his P'sent Reliefe Humbly propose it to ye Honoble Genll Corte to allow him something wt this Corte judge meet for his P'sent Reliefe.

Samuel Patriag —

June 17 1698 — In the House of Representatives — Ordered that there be allowed and paid out of the Publick Treasury the sum of six pounds to the above named John Gillet for the consideration above mentioned

(Sgd) Nathl Byfield, Speaker."

Original Simsbury, Conn., joined Windsor on the west. In 1845 citizen Noah A. Phelps published a significant History of Simsbury, Granby and Canton (two towns set off from original Simsbury) in which he stated that in 1675 the New England Colonies became much alarmed by Indian movements and that it was soon manifest that war was inevitable. In October the legislature ordered the evacuation of Simsbury; and again in March 1676, and on the 26th the "settlement was ravaged," "the ruin complete," town deserted for about a year; and the settlement at a stand still, or nearly so, for about ten years. And "For more than thirty years after Philip's war, in 1675, the inhabitants lived in almost daily apprehension of attacks from the Indians." Consideration of this condition may well have decided their location in safer Lebanon, Conn., to such men as Sergeant Josiah Dewey of Westfield and Northampton. Mass., and Deerfield-experienced John's Gillett.

The Lebanon tract was sold by Indians in 1692 to four proprietors, and settlement began in 1695. In 1700 the proprietors deeded the land to 51 persons who had taken lots, and formal organization began. Among the 51 named grantees were Josiah Dewey, Sr. and Jr., John and Nathaniel; and John Gillett. An 1810 meeting of grantee descendants included Isaac Gillet. Josiah Dewey, Sr., assisted the four proprietors in distributing the home lots and in making the first division of the common undivided land. That same year he and William Clark of Saybrook bought land ad-

joining Lebanon on the north and northwest.

The ancestry record of Experience (Dewey) Gillett is pertinent and interesting from the standpoints of provable accuracy; and one unique genealogical sentence rarely duplicated. Sergeant and Deacon Josiah<sup>2</sup> Dewey (Thomas<sup>1</sup>) was born in Windsor, Conn., 1641; as a young man went to Northampton, Mass., where on 6 Nov. 1662 he married Hepsibah<sup>3</sup> Lyman, daughter of Richard<sup>2</sup> and Hepzibah<sup>2</sup> (Ford) Lyman. And according to a 35-page 1928 Ford Genealogy by J. Montgomery Seaver, American Historical-Genealogical Society, Philadelphia (page 23): "Richard Ly-

man was a descendant (24 generations removed) of Alfred the Great, King of England; also a descendant (21 generations removed) of Henry I., King of France, and a descendant (21 generations removed) of Donal-Bane, King of Scots."

The very able large 1898 "Life of George Dewey, Rear Admiral; and Dewey Family History," published by the Dewey Publishing Company, Westfield, Mass., gives a very detailed valuable account of this Josiah Dewey family, ancestor of Admiral George Dewey. It shows that he moved to Westfield, Mass., 1670, where he was Sergeant of the Guard during Philip's War, and was Deacon of the Church. And its records correct the error of an 1875 Dewey Genealogy that stated that Josiah's wife Hepzibah (Lyman) died about 1670/1; and he married second, Experience. The final conclusive proof of this error was its picture of the Lebanon tombstones of Josiah and his wife, with inscriptions as follows:

"Here lies ye Body of Dn Josiah Dewey He was born in Windsor 1640 Joined ye Church of Christ in Westfield and ordained Deacon Removed to Lebanon In its beginning where he did much Sarvis for God & Man he lived a holy & a Religious & Lived to a great age & he slept in Jesus Septem 7 1732 in ye 92 year of his age.

"Here lies ye Body of ye Worth Mrs Hephzibah ye Wife of Don Josiah Dewey She was the Daughter of Mr Richard Lyman of Hartford She was one that feared ye Lord & Slept in Jesus June ye 4 1732 in ye 89 year of her age."

But this 1898 Dewey Genealogy omitted the record of the youngest known child of Josiah and Hepzibah Dewey, given in later Westfield publications. In 1945 the Westfield, Mass., Athenaeum published family records from the town files at City Hall. And by January 1937 was published the baptismal records of Westfield Church of Christ from 1679 to 1836, which included, page 8: year 1686, 10 mo. 19 d. Minde-

well, daughter Josiah & Hephzibah Dewy.

The list of 22 Lebanon homelots laid out on the east side, south to north, of the highway, includes No. 7 to John Dewey, 9 to Dea. Josiah, 10 to Nathaniel, 18 to Josiah Jr. 19 to John Gilet. The statement is made (p. 390, 1898) Dewey Gen.) that "all had signed in Dec. 1697 except Thomas Root, whose lot went to John Woodward." If "in" means "by" 1697, it demonstrates John Gillett's precaptivity connection with the settlement. Sheldon's Deerfield History states (p. 173) that after John's Sept. 1696 capture, "Oct. 23, administration was granted on his estate . . . he being killed or captured by the Indians, therefore as to his personal residence in Deerfield is dead." Neither Northampton nor Springfield probate records include this item; perhaps because fire destroyed some in Springfield. 17 Jan. 1728/9 "Josiah Dewey second yeoman" of Lebanon deeded to his son John, two parcels in Lebanon, "one of which is my homelot on which I now live with land adjoining bounded northeastwardly on the main street of Lebanon, northwestwardly on the lot of Dr. Ebenezer Gray and on the southwest by a highway on southeast by land of John Gillett abt 40 acres; the other parcel 18 ac of Timber Hill to the rear of Ebenezer Hunts farm." Recorded Lib. 8 fol 158-9. (p. 393, 1898 Dewey Gen.)

13. Nathaniel<sup>3</sup> Gillett (Joseph,<sup>2</sup> Jonathan<sup>1</sup>), of Deerfield, Mass., and Lebanon, Conn., born in Windsor, Conn., 4 May 1673, died in Lebanon 10 July 1714, as the vital records of both towns show. He married Sarah ———. The History of Enfield, Conn., by Allen, 1900, vol. 2, gives the following: "Sarah Gillett widow of Nathll Gillett of Lebbanon; died here in this town ye 6th January 1716/17 in ye 37th yeare of her age." She was therefore born in or near 1680.

The Lebanon records give the births of his five children, and the death of one of them, their ages at the time of his

death and that his wife's name was Sarah.

# THE BROTHERS JONATHAN AND NATHAN GILLETT AND SOME OF THEIR DESCENDANTS

14. Samuel Gillett (Samuel, Jonathan), of Hatfield, Mass., born in Hatfield 14 May 1672 [sic], died very shortly before the 6 June 1769 probating of his will. Hence he was aged almost exactly 97 years, oldest among the recorded Gilletts. If there was no younger unrecorded child, he and his just four year old sister Hannah were almost surely the two Samuel' Gillett children taken captive with their mother in the Indian attack on Hatfield homes that "began suddenly at 11 A.M. with a blood-curdling yell" 19 Sept. 1677, 17 captives taken; Obadiah2 Dickinson, uncle of Mrs. (Gillett) Jennings, one of them. 12 left dead, and 4 wounded. In the evening an attack in Deerfield, where one was killed and 4 taken prisoners. After months of negotiations, on 2 May 1678, the living captives set out from Sorel, Canada, with an escort of French soldiers, on their return home and reached Albany 22 May. Captivity Jennings, half sister of the Gillett children, was born 16 (or 14?) March. Historians Sheldon and Boltwood specifically include Samuel<sup>3</sup> as one of the captive children.

By 1697 Samuel<sup>3</sup> married Hannah<sup>3</sup> Hastings, born in Hatfield 19 Jan. 1677, daughter of Dr. Thomas2 (Thomas1) and Anna2 (Hawkes) Hastings of Hatfield, and niece of Elizabeth2 (Hawkes) Gillett, wife of Joseph2 Gillett, uncle of Samuel<sup>3</sup>. Doubtless she died before her husband, since no wife is mentioned in his will. Samuel Gillit of Hatfield and Hannah his wife deeded the following land to Nathaniel Dickinson, 20 Feb. 1703/4, consideration 25 pounds: "a certain part of his house lot in Hatfield 1 of The Breadth Thereof Running from the Town Street to the River Containing Two Acres and a half", "abutting on the Town Street west & on the River East, Bounded by the house lot of Sergt Stephen Belding North and the other Part of ye said Jilletts houselott South." Wit .: Samuel Partridge, Henry Dwight, Sgd., Samuel Gillet, Hannah L Gillet [her mark] (Springfield, Mass., Hall of Records, vol. B, p. 151).

15 Oct. 1719 William Randall of Enfield, Conn., gave a warranty deed to 71 acres to Henry Dwight of Hatfield, Mass., and the witnesses were Samuel Gillett, Joseph Jennings, maternal half brothers almost surely. (History Enfield, Conn., vol. I, p. 2100, Public Documents.)

23 Sept. 1720 will of Stephen Belding of Hatfield, Mass. witnesses, Thomas Hastings, Scribe, John Belding, Sam'll Gillett, John Hastings. 29 Oct. 1720 all 4, named in order above, personally appeared (1898, Belden Gen., p. 88). "Hatfield men, who were of that troop which rode up the dark valley, on the morning of Feb. 29, 1704" after the previous day Deerfield massacre, included Samuel Gillett. (1910, Wells Hist. Hatfield, Mass.) 1922 "Index, Society of Colonial Wars", lists Samuel<sup>2</sup> Gillett, Sr., and "Samuel Gillett, Jr. 1672-1769, Hatfield, Mass. Soldier at Battle of Deerfield Meadow 1703." (1703/4?) "In 1735 Samuel Hunt petitioned 'ye Court' for a grant of land to the survivors of the Falls fight. In 1736 a grant of six miles square was made. It was located on the north bounds of Deerfield and called Falls Fight Town, finally Bernardston." Mass. Archives, vol. 114: Samuel Jellet, of Hatfield, June 1736. grantee of Bernardston, soldier in the Falls Fight (pp. 598-605). P. 606: Samuel Jellet, jr. of Hatfield, grantee Bernardston, 1736. Vol. 116, p. 190: May 8, 1752 Saml Gillet, propr. Falltown (Bernardston). - When and by whom was this land later deeded away? Wells Hist. Hatfield, p. 126: "In 1708 Samuel Gillett had 1500 trees boxed for tar and turpentine."

15. Thomas Gillett (John, Jonathan), of Windsor, Conn., was born there 18 July 1676 and baptized the 23rd. He was doubtless named for his maternal grandfather, Thomas Barber of Windsor and Simsbury or for that deceased grandparent's energetic namesake son, "Lieutenant Thomas Barber" of Simsbury (1845 Phelps Hist. Simsbury, etc., p. 153). Wintonbury Parish records give the date of his death, 28 Feb. 1761 "in 87th year"; doubtless because his three sons lived in that part of Windsor, and he probably lived with them. Descendants of the family became noteworthy there.

The Parish was the Fifth Society in Windsor, located in the southwest part of the town; the first petition of May 1734 by 27 residents asking only for "local winter church privileges" (November-March), since they were "six miles from Windsor North Society house of worship." In October 1736 the Province Assembly granted a larger petition for "parish privileges" by establishing a parish nearly four miles square, about seven-tenths lay in Windsor, one-tenth in Farmington, two-tenths in Simsbury and so named Win-ton-bury. There were 65 families, 325 persons, and the church organized and located in February 1738 had 67 members; four Gillett families among them. In 45 years over 1147 children were baptized there. In 1845 the parish became the town of Bloomfield.

Thomas3 married first, in Windsor, and both of Windsor, MARTHA MILLS, who died within a very few years with no

record of children born, and and secondly in Windsor, 26 Feb. 1704/5, Hannah<sup>3</sup> Clark (John,<sup>2</sup> Hon. Daniel<sup>1</sup>), born in Simsbury 15 Aug. 1686, died in Windsor 20 Feb. 1708/9, leaving three sons. Stiles in Ancient Windsor states of her grandfather: "Hon. Daniel Clark, an attorney at law, a first settler and man of much influence and position at Windsor; held many public offices; was Secretary of the Colony, 1658-64; & 1665-6." "Married (1) Mary<sup>2</sup> Newberry (Thomas<sup>1</sup>)." There is no known record of a third marriage, though one seems probable. The following 1726 probate record proves that Thomas<sup>3</sup> was then alive, and might suggest a third marriage about 1716.

16. Samuel3 Gillett (John,2 Jonathan1), of Suffield, Conn., and Granville, Mass., born in Windsor, Conn., 16 Feb. 1677/8. He was five years old when his mother married secondly, Captain George Norton of Suffield, the town that became the boy's home for most of his life. In the later years of his life he lived in Granville, across the line in southwest Mass., and died there "in 1739, aged 60", but was buried in Suffield. (Northampton Probate Records give administration of estate 1934.) He married in Suffield, 22 Jan. 1701/2 (int. 20 Dec. 1701), Rebecca3 Bancroft (Thomas,2 John1), born in Springfield, Mass. (part later Enfield, Conn.), 23 Feb. 1680, a family name that connects with both the Jonathan and Nathan Gillett lines, and the Windsor Stiles family. The immigrant ancestor John Bancroft reached Lynn, Mass., in 1632 and died so soon that to his London poet brother Thomas it seemed no landing, and he wrote the lines:

"You sold your land the lighter hence to go
To foreign coasts, yet (Fate would have it so)
Did ne'er New England reach, but went with them
That journey toward New Jerusalem."

Widow Jane Bancroft received 100 acres in Lynn in 1638. Her daughter Anna<sup>2</sup> married 13 May 1647 Sergt. John Griffin, settled in Simsbury, Conn., had ten children and one of them, Sarah<sup>2</sup> Griffin, married Elias<sup>2</sup> Gillett (Nathan<sup>1</sup>). Son Thomas<sup>2</sup> Bancroft of the Springfield, Mass. region, residence at the "lower wharf," now Enfield, Conn., was a

selectman of Westfield; 8 Dec. 1653 married Margaret<sup>2</sup> Wright (Samuel<sup>1</sup>) and their daughter Ruth<sup>3</sup> Bancroft married John Stiles and had many children; and daughter Rebecca<sup>3</sup> married Samuel<sup>3</sup> Gillett; and son Nathaniel<sup>3</sup> had descendants in Granville, Mass. Rev. Ezra<sup>5</sup> Stiles, President of Yale from 1772 to 1795, was the son of Rev. Isaac<sup>4</sup> and the grandson of John<sup>3</sup> and Ruth<sup>3</sup> (Bancroft) Stiles, and he wrote of his grandmother's family: "The Family of Bancroft are of a brisk, smart, quick, sensible & lively cast. Samuel<sup>3</sup>'s probated will is dated March 30, 1769, when he lacked only a month and a half of being 97; and it was signed only by his mark, though formerly he had signed his name. But there is proof that some, perhaps most of it, was written before 1760; half proof, before 1754; and the probability is

that it was begun soon after the death of his only son, Samuel,4 whose estate was in court for administration 14 Aug. 1750. His son Samuel4's record helps the dating of the father's will.

By Feb. 14, 1760 the youngest granddaughter of Samuel<sup>3</sup> would have been 21; and if the will was written after 16 May 1754 would not granddaughter Martha have been called Martha Graves; and if after 10 Nov. 1757, granddaughter Hannah have been Hannah Morton? The impression is of a grief-absorbed father concentrating impulsively on the three young daughters of his recently deceased only son.

Another important query connected with Samuels's will concerns his oldest child, Hannah, born 9 Jan. 1697/8. Does the fact that her father's will, written perhaps in 1750, names her only as Hannah, prove that she had never married? No, there are similar proved cases. Her mother's older sister, Margaret<sup>3</sup> Hastings, born in Hatfield in 1674, in 1707 married Nathaniel Evetts. The Guilford, Conn., vital records, Barbour collection, record the marriage in Hatfield, Mass., by Rev. William Williams, May 9, 1722, of Hannah Gillet of Hatfield to Jonathan Evarts of Guilford, Conn. The oldest of their two sons and five daughters, Jonathan, was born 16 Nov. 1723; and the youngest, 7 May 1741. The dates preclude the idea that the bride was Hannah's sister Mary, who was only ten years old at the time of the marriage, though their father's will named her as Mary Evers. #### GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN ENGLAND

Communicated by the Committee on English and Foreign Research By G. Andrews Moriarty, A.M., LI\_B., F.A.S.G., F.S.A.

EVIDENCES ON THROCKMORTON FAMILY

Additional information recently received from Anthony R. Wagner, Esq., F.S.A., Richmond Herald, furnished him by the late Mr. Campling, an authority on East Anglian families, adds further evidence tending to identify John Throckmorton of Providence with John, son of Bassingborne Throckmorton of Norwich.

The will of Edward Colvell gent, of Braswell, dated 1 Aug. 1679, proved 9 Feb. 1679/80, mentions "my kinsman John Throckmorton

of Middletown in New England" (cf. The Register, vol. 98, p. 68). He also mentions his deceased kinswoman, Grace, late wife of Henry Payne.

The will of Thomas Colvvll of Thelyeton, co. Norfolk, gent., dated 4 June 1633, was proved at Norwich 24 Oct. 1634. He directed that he be buried in the churchyard of Otley, co. Suffolk, with a monument of his arms and those of Calthorpe thereon. He left to the poor of Brome, co. Suffolk. Sir Thomas Cornwallis my late master. To Lady Jane Bacon, late wife of Sir William Cornwallis knt. deceased, son and heir of Sir Thomas and to Sir Frederick Cornwallis knt. and Bart., grandchild to the said Thomas. To John Colvell gent., son of John Colvell gent., my nephew a stone which was my grandfather's. To Thomas Colvell another son. To Grace, Elizabeth and Peronina my neices, sisters of the said John Colvell my nephew. To Grace my neice now wife of Henry Payne. To Grace my neice, late wife of Robert Smith gent, and to his two children by her. To Thomas Shardelowe vent, whose first wife was my sister. My nephew John Colvell sole executor. Norwich Consistory Court 1634 fol. 22b.

Thomas Shardelowe named in the above will was a second cousin of Bassingborne Throckmorton (cf. chart). Admittedly this connection of Bassingborne's family with Edward Colvell was not one of blood and was somewhat remote, but undoubtedly the two families were well acquainted and he might well leave a legacy to Bassingborne's son or grandson; the term "kinsman" was loosely used at this period to denote any connection. What is certain is that Edward Colvell belonged to a family settled in Norfolk and the neighboring parts of Suffolk, the very region whence John, son of Bassingborne, came and this tends to show that Bassingborne's son John is identical with John of New England.

In his "G. Fox Digged", &c. Roger Williams quotes his letter to John Throckmorton, in which he pointed out to him that he ought to know his duty to uphold law and order as he had been an officer of a corporation ("G. Fox Digged", &c., ed. Naragansett Club, p. 20). This indicates that Roger considered that Throckmorton should know something of law, at least in the case of municipal corporations.

#### HASTINGS, BARONS OF LITTLE ESTON, Co. ESSEX, ENGLAND

The greatest of English mediaeval historians and antiquaries, the late J. Horace Round, once remarked that it is practically impossible to keep informed upon all which has been written upon the subject of mediaeval genealogy in the vast number of scattered publications. Recently this writer experienced the truth of this statement when he came across an admirable paper upon "The Barony of Little Eston and the Family of Hastings", by L. Landon, Esq., in vol. XIX, p. 174, of the Essex Archaelogical Society Transactions (1930). This article enables him to add to and compels him to make some changes in his account of the second family of Hastings in Part II



THIS is styled in the act for erecting the county of Worcester, " The land lately granted to several petitioners of Medfield," and many of the first fettlers here were from the town of Medfield, and hence the place was called Newmedfield, until its incorporation, which was, by an act of Court, on the 24th of June, 1738, when it received the name Sturbridge.

This town is large in its dimensions, containing by actual survey, about 28929 acres. It is situated in the fouthwest corner of the county, and is divided from Woodstock and Union, on the fouth, in the state of Connecticut, by the state line; and bounded west, on Holland and Brimfield, in the county of Hampshire; on the north, by Brookfield; and on the east, by Charlton and Dudley. The grant of this tract was made in the year 1729, in the month of August, but it was thought scarce-

ly habitable by reason of its broken rough state; and the soil, for the most part, requiring hard and great labour to render it productive; but the first fettlers being a robust, resolute, sober and industrious fet of men, were determined to get an honest living, by "the sweat of their faces," and, through the bleffing of God, they foon converted. this wilderness into a fruitful field. The original proprietors built a house for the worship of God, which was raifed on the 20th and 21st days of June, 1733, and on the 3d of September following it was consecrated by the Rev. Joseph Baxter of Medfield, who preached from Isaiah lxiii, and 5th. From that time the place increased fast in the number of good and industrious people, who very quickly obtained to live comfortably; and like others of that age, early fought for a teacher of piety and morality. On the 29th of September, 1736, the Rev. Caleb Rice was ordained to the pastoral office over the church and flock of God in the place. He was a pastor after God's heart; found in faith; a good preacher, endued with excellent ministerial gifts, and very exemplary in life, as well as focial and benevolent in his deporte ment. He lived in great harmony with his people, in the fore part of his ministry: But about the year 1747, a number of the brethren and inhabitants, conceiving they had received new light, different from what was common among their neighbours, separated from him, which rendered his work more arduous, and his life uncomfortable. From separatists they became anabaptists: N

But it pleased the Great Head of the church to remove Mr. Rice from his labours, by death, on the fecond of September, 1759, whose praise was then through all the churches, and his memory is still dear to many. He was succeeded in the work of the gospel ministry, in the congregational church and fociety in Sturbridge, by the Rev. Joshua Paine, who was separated hereunto on the 17th of June, 1761, and still continues the faithful and beloved pastor thereof. The people here have furprifingly · flourished and increased; for there are now about 1800 fouls in the place. The congregational church is large, confisting of about 150 members of both fexes. On the 29th and 30th days of June, 1785, they raised a large new meetinghouse, which is elegant and well finished; in which the first fermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. Paine on January 7th, 1786, from first of Kings, viii. 27.

There is in the town a very respectable society of anabaptists, comprising about one fifth part of the inhabitants. These also have built them lately a handsome meetinghouse. As great peace and harmony subsist between the two societies, as can well be expected under such circumstances: Difference of sentiments, as to modes and rites of religion, scarcely injures good neighbourhood; nor does it prevent their mixing in families, or friendly social circles.

The inhabitants at present are industrious and frugal, charitable, and given to hospitality. The great precepts of the Christian religion, moral vir-

tue, and the instruction of their youth, they make their study and care. They live in peace and love.

However hilly, rough and uneven the town was at first, yet, by industry and frugality, the people are become wealthy, subsisting chiefly by the cultivation of the earth. By hard labour the soil is become fruitful. It is good for orcharding and grazing. Much butter and cheese are made here, especially the former, which has obtained high credit in the markets. The land is pretty good for grain. The growth of wood is similar to that of the towns in the vicinity, oak of all forts, walnut, chesnut, pine in considerable plenty, especially in its earlier days; ash, beech, birch, maple, elm, &c.

The town is in general well watered by springs, brooks, rivers and ponds. The River Quinebaug, which has its source in Brimsield, runs through this town near the centre, from west to east. On this there are large bodies of good interval, and valuable meadow lands. There are valuable ponds in the town, well stored with the usual sorts of fresh water sish.

Near one of these ponds, called Lead Mine Pond, a number of adventurers from Europe, some years past, dug deep for ore. A considerable quantity of which they carried with them to England; but they have never returned to their pursuit.

Sturbridge is fituated at the fouthwest angle of the county, on the state line, about twenty miles from the courthouse in Worcester; and it is sixty five miles from Boston, and considerably to the fouth of west. acquired and retained the utmost confidence of all who had dealings with him. In 1891 he gave up the contracting business and that year supervised the erection of the present postoffice building, a responsible position, and one for which he was well qualified by reason of his previous experience in the building line. About the time his duties in this capacity were completed he was elected to the office of county commissioner and was serving in this capacity at the time of the erection of the present county court house. Mr. Poyser became a stockholder in the Buchet & Gibbs Plow Company and is now serving as vice-president of the same. Although he does not now take as active part in business affairs as formerly, yet he still retains a keen interest in passing events and keeps in close touch with all questions concerning the varied interests of his city, county or nation. Although now almost seventy-seven years of age, he possesses to a remarkable degree his physical and mental vigor.

John R. Poyser was married in Canton, on the 28th of October, 1852, to Miss Mary Mellen, of that city, the daughter of Patrick and Nora (Lynch) Mellen. Four children have been born to this union, briefly mentioned as follows: Mary Frances died at the age of nine years; William J., who is secretary of the Bucher & Gibbs Plow Company, married Helen Bucher and they are the parents of three children, Edna, Helen and John R.; Joseph died at the age of three years; Ella is the wife of Frank Alexander, of Canton.

Politically, Mr. Poyser was originally a Whig, but upon the formation of the Republican party he identified himself with it and has been firm in his allegiance to its principles. His first vote was cast for Jackson, and he still has a vivid recollection of the Harrison campaign of 1840. He has always taken a keen interest in political matters and in his active years performed much effective service in advancing the interests of his party.

Mr. Poyser, while personally a most unostentatious citizen, is well known in the city of his residence as a man of clear foresight and tenacious, resolute purpose, and as possessing the highest type of sagacity, ingenuity and firmness in overcoming obstacles in the way of his success. And it is also well recognized that his success has not come from lucky chance, but has been the result of his own ability, integrity and silent perseverance. He has for many years occupied a most prominent place in the business, moral and social life of Canton and is one of those conspicuous figures whose characters have left their impress upon the history of the county and have caused it to be known far and wide for its development of men of acumen and sound judgment.

ARTHUR N. KALEY.—Although a young man, and but recently admitted to the bar, the subject of this sketch has achieved local distinction as a lawyer and bids fair, at no distant day, to take his place among the successful members of the Stark county bar. His father, Joseph Kaley, a native of Pennsylvania, came to Stark county when a boy and is still living here, having reached the age of seventy years. He is a son of John Kaley, who was born in the Keystone state, where his ancestors settled in a very early day.

Joseph Kaley, the subject's father, married Miss Marriam Cornelia Warren, who was born in New York, her father, Levi Nelson Warren, being a native of Shirley, Massachusetts. In many respects Mr. Warren was an extraordinary man. After receiving a fine education he read medicine and began the practice, but later devoted much of his attention to wood carving, in which he acquired artistic skill seldom equalled. He was a mechanical genius and could turn his hand to any kind of workmanship, from the construction of the most intricate piece of machinery to the tracing

of the most delicate artistic designs, besides carving from wood every form of animal and vegetable life. He also traveled extensively over various parts of the world and possessed wide general information as well as superior scholastic and technical attainments. carving from a piece of oak wood the figure of a dove for the altar of a Presbyterian church in Rochester, New York, Mr. Warren met the lady (Miss Phoebe Brown, formerly of Coventry. Connecticut) who afterwards became his wife. In company with her mother, the young lady visited the place where he was at work, and while admiring the beautiful figure upon which he was engaged, an acquaintance sprang up between them which, ripening into love. eventually led to marriage. Charles Warren, the father of Levi Nelson Warren, was a distinguished soldier of the Revolution and a near kinsman of General Warren, who fell while gallantly cheering his men at the battle of Bunker Hill. The name is inseparably connected with the struggle for independence and for many years prior to that time various menibers of the family figured conspicuously in the civil and military annals of Massachusetts. The original Warrens of New England came to this country to escape religious persecution, bringing with them only such of their wealth as they could hastily collect, leaving behind large and exceedingly valuable estates in the city of London and elsewhere. Owing to the destruction of public records by the great London fire the descendants of the family have never been able to establish a legal claim to the property, which now includes a large area in the most populous part of the city, besides valuable estates in the country.

Reverting to the personal history of Arthur N. Kaley, it is learned that his birth occurred in Massillon, Ohio, on the 1st day of December, 1867. At the proper age he entered the city schools, and in due time passed through the various grades, graduating from the high

school in 1886, with the second honors of his class. Immediately thereafter he entered college, but owing to ill health he was obliged to discontinue his studies a short time before completing the prescribed course, a matter which caused him much regret. There is a time in the experience of every young man when it becomes necessary for him to choose a vocation, and fortunate indeed is he who selects one suited to his tastes and inclinations. In this respect young Kaley has nothing to regret, as he decided upon a profession for which his talents peculiarly fitted him, to-wit, the law. After the usual course of private reading, during which period he held a position as private secretary to an attorney representing large business interests, he entered the law department of the Western Reserve University, where he was graduated in 1899 with the degree of Bachelor of Law. Prior to the above date Mr. Kaley made two extensive European tours, one in 1896, the other two years later, visiting in the course of his travels various parts of England, France, Germany, Holland, Belgium and Switzerland. In this way he obtained a practical knowledge of the world, such as colleges and universities fail to impart, enriching his mind by visiting many points of historic interest, coming in close touch with the manners and customs of the people of various countries and becoming familiar with their civic and political institutions. In the fall of 1899 Mr. Kaley was admitted to the bar at Columbus, Ohio, and during the ensuing year practiced his profession in Cleveland, Ohio, building up a fairly lucrative business. Impressed with the idea that his native town afforded a more inviting field, he returned to Massillon, in 1900, and since that year has been engaged in the general practice in this city. As a lawyer he is studious and energetic, well versed in the principles of jurisprudence, and familiar with every detail of practice. Few men of his experience have been more success-
