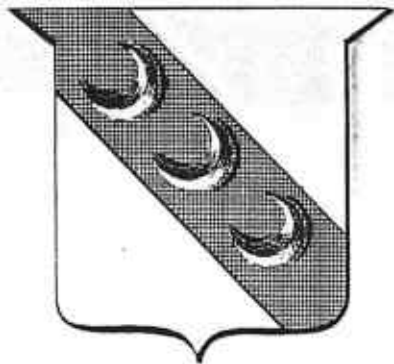

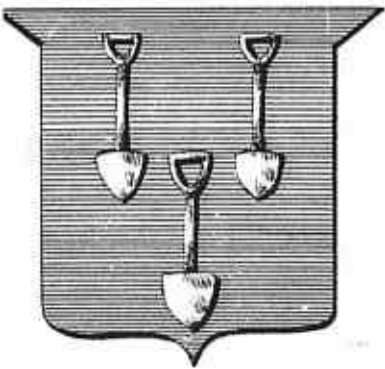

I have copied parts of the account on Cynthia's death.

"Mrs Cynthia Salisbury Porter, relict of John W. Porter, entered into rest at the home of her daughter, Mrs Leveatt, at Conneaut, Ohio, last Saturday. Of her illness and death the Conneaut Bulletin says:

(I didn't take time to copy this portion of the obituary - except for, "Mrs Porter was sister-in-law to our brother John Olmstead." - the rest tells mainly about the character of Cynthia and as a Christian. Perhaps this will be something you will want to have a copy of.)

"The remains were brought to her old home in Sandy Creek for interment. The funeral was held from the home of her son, Hollom M. Potter on Tuesday at 1 p.m., Rev. D.E. Post, assisted by Rev. M.G. Seymour, officiating."

"Mrs Porter had been a member of the Baptist church in Sandy Creek for the past fifty-six years." (All the Salisbury family were Baptists.)

"She was the eldest and last surviving child of Daniel Salisbury."

"The remains were accompanied from Conneaut by her son, Edgar J. Porter of Springfield, Pa., her daughter, Mrs Effie M. Leveatt and her niece Miss Mary Olmstead of Conneaut, who with her sons, Hollom M. and Orlo R. Porter of this town survive their mother. The interment was in the family plot in the Orwell road cemetery (known as Stevens Cemetery)."

How good to talk with you tonight and hear you say that you will locate these references for me!

About ten years ago I joined the Society of Mayflower Descendants through lines to other grandparents; now I want to use my Grandfather Porter's line to send in a supplemental to John Billington. The Society now requires that every proof be accompanied by the title page! Sanford Wheeler sent the following two items to me; I have xeroxed copies to send to you and will indicate what I need:

Town of Sandy Creek Cemetery Records

I need the title page of these records or of Sketches from which this page came.

The account of Cynthia Salisbury Porter's death in the March 12, 1896 issue of the Sandy Creek News with the newspaper heading and dateline. This establishes that she was the daughter of Daniel Salisbury!! Sanford Wheeler quoted from it, but I need the entire write-up with the newspaper heading.

Sorry the photocopies are so light, but the machine I was using was waiting for the repairman!

# A Bicentennial Tribute To Veterans of 1776



Although Jefferson County was highly strategic as a borderland in both the French and Indian Wars and the War of 1812, the area was not the site of any of the great battles of the American Revolution. According to the history books, the American line of defense lay mostly along the Mohawk and the Susquehanna rivers during the War for Independence, and the land of Jefferson County was much given up to the enemy due to the presence of the British fort on Carleton Island in the St. Lawrence River. Perhaps the area's greatest distinction during those years was as an escape route for many Tories on their way to the safety of Canada.

When the new nation had been born, however, and the awesome wilderness was first being cleared, it was to Jefferson County that many of those who had fought in the Revolution moved. As a result, more than 350 Revolutionary War soldiers are buried in the county, and records of their presence provide a national heritage for today's residents.

The list of names and short biographies of the Revolutionary War heroes of Jefferson County is presented by The Times through the cooperation of the Leray de Chaumont Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution on the occasion of this year's national celebration.

The names were originally copied by Mrs. Frank M. Williams, a member of the local D.A.R., while in Washington, D.C., at the Archives of the Veterans Administration. Ethel Swaffer copied Mrs. Williams' records for use in the Leray de Chaumont Chapter Library.

### Robert Ackerman \*

Robert Ackerman was born in 1761 or 1763 and died May 7, 1839. His body was buried in Sherwin's Bay Cemetery, Town of Brownville. His wife was Roxelene Child.

### Shubael Adams

Shubael Adams, born Jan. 16, 1757, in Pomfret, Conn., was drafted as a private in August, 1776, at Brooklyn, Conn., Windham County in Capt. Joseph Abbott's company of Col. Ebenezer Williams' regiment of the Connecticut State Militia. He served seven months along the Hudson River. In May, 1777, he was drafted to serve three months at New London, Conn. He served one month in 1778 at Groton, Conn., under Capt. Elijah Avery.

Mr. Adams came to Watertown in 1807. He and his wife are buried in Brookside Cemetery, Watertown. Mr. Adams died Sept. 18, 1837, in Watertown.

### Ebenezer Allen

Sgt. Ebenezer Allen was born May 24, 1762, at Dudley, Mass., a son of Joseph and Elizabeth Warner Allen and was mustered with a group of men in Worcester County, Mass., by Thomas Newhall, muster master, Captain Corbin's Company, Colonel Davis' regiment.

He married Phoebe Healey, daughter of Samuel and Phoebe Curtis Healey March 16, 1786. Mr. and Mrs. Allen both died in the Town of Housfield. Mr. Allen died July 3, 1824. The couple is buried in Muscalonge Cemetery, Town of Housfield.

### Joseph Allen

Joseph Allen, born Nov.

24, 1758, at Westport, Mass., the son of Daniel and Elizabeth Seabury Allen, enlisted March 4, 1777, for three years and served in the Revolution as a private in Capt. William Hudson Ballard's Company of the Seventh Massachusetts Regiment of Foot commanded by Col. Ichabod Alden.

He married Prudence Earl, daughter of Caleb and Elizabeth Brightman Earl June 27, 1784.

The Allens came to Black River country in March, 1805, from Galway, Saratoga County, by way of Redfield and Adams. The trail was marked in places only by blazed trees.

Mr. Allen purchased 320 acres of land on Bear Creek and built the first house on the site of the Allen Blacksmith shop. He served as magistrate for 40 years and gave to the public a lot for a burying ground and also laid out part of the public square or "green" which was part of his original purchase. He was the father of 10 children, eight of whom are buried in the village cemetery at Pierrepont Manor, Town of Ellisburg, with Mr. Allen and his wife. Mr. Allen died Sept. 23, 1838, at Pierrepont Manor.

### David I. Andrus

David Ira Andrus, born in 1766 in Connecticut, served as a fifer in the 6th Company of the 4th Connecticut Regiment commanded by Col. Zebulon Butler, having enlisted at Southington, Jan. 1, 1781. He transferred to Captain Robertson's 2nd Connecticut Regiment commanded by Col. Heman Swift and served as a private until March 1, 1783. His name appeared on the rolls until May 6, 1783.

He first married Sally Ranney at Middle Upper House, Connecticut. Following her death July 22, 1818, in the Town of Ellisburg, he married Mrs. Esther Hinman.

David I. Andrus came to Black River country with Daniel Fox about 1800 and in 1805 he settled at Ellisburg, and became an agent for Samuel Wardwell of Rhode Island. He built the first sawmill at Mannsville and the first dwelling at that place. He was elected a member of the assembly in 1809 and 1812, served as sheriff in 1812-1813 and 1815-1818, and was the father of four daughters and four sons.

He died Aug. 21 or 22, 1831, and is buried in the Giddingsville Cemetery, Town of Ellisburg.

### Henry Anstead

Henry Anstead enlisted in September, 1781, in New Jersey in Capt. Thomas' Co. of Colonel Lamb's regiment of the New York Line. He was in the battle of New Brunswick, N.J., and was discharged at West Point Nov. 1, 1781.

He was born in 1750 and married Elizabeth Ritter in Herkimer County. The couple had seven children. Henry and Elizabeth Anstead are probably buried at Evans Mills where members of the Anstead family are to be found, although the location of their graves is not known. Mr. Anstead died in the Town of LeRay April 24, 1838.

### Amasa Allen

Revolutionary War veteran Amasa Allen, born March 7, 1753, died Dec. 22, 1820. He is buried in Old Theresa Cemetery, Town of Theresa. His wife was the former Alice Lord.

### Elijah Allen

Elijah Allen, a Revolutionary War veteran, is buried in Three Mile Creek Cemetery, Town of Clayton.

### Thomas Sawyer

Thomas Sawyer, a native of Sterling, Mass., served as a private in Capt. Daniel Robbin's Co. of Col. Whitcomb's regiment from Lancaster, Mass., at the Lexington Alarm.

A son of Elias and Susannah Huck Sawyer, he married Susannah Fuller Jan. 12, 1779, in Sterling. The couple lived at Plymouth, Vt., 12 years before coming to the wilderness of the Black River Country about 1800.

He became acquainted with Judge Coffeen and Capt. Butterfield and acquired land between Burrs Mills and Watertown, which is now occupied by his descendants. Mr. and Mrs. Sawyer were among the first nine members of the Congregational Church of Burrs Mills.

Mr. Sawyer died April 23, 1825, in the Town of Watertown. He and his wife are buried in Brookside Cemetery.

### Gideon Scott

Gideon Scott, whose name appears on a descrip-

tive list of men received to reinforce the Continental Army for a six-month term, was born in April, 1753, in Leverett, Mass. He served as a corporal in Capt. Joseph Sallro's Co. of Col. David Wells' Regiment. He also served on the expedition to the Northward and as a sergeant in Capt. Elisha Lyman's Co. of Col. Elisha Porter's Regiment.

He and his wife, Sarah, resided in the Town of Antwerp. Mr. Scott died

March 4, 1830, in the Town of Antwerp and he and his wife are buried in the old part of the Antwerp village cemetery.

### Thomas Smith

Thomas Smith died Sept. 12, 1835 at age 79. He was buried in the Dexter Cemetery.

### John Spencer

John Spencer died July 30, 1817, and was buried in the Depauville Cemetery.

### Samuel Shelley

Samuel Shelley was born Jan. 20, 1765, in Stratford, Conn., and served as a fifer in Capt. Paul Brigham's Company of Col. Isaac Sherman's Regiment. He also was at Valley Forge, 1777-1778, was present at the Battle of Monmouth, in camp at White Plains in Huntington's 2nd Brigade and served along the Hudson River.

He married Catherine Pride and resided in the Brownville-Limerick area. He is buried in a destroyed cemetery at Limerick.

### Jacob Shew

Jacob Shew was born April 15, 1763, at Johnstown, a son of Godfrey and Kate Fry Shew. He and his father and two brothers were taken prisoners by the Indians and Tories and were taken to Canada.

Eventually they were sent to Boston and exchanged for British prisoners. Jacob then enlisted in the Continental Army. He served as a private in the Tryon County Militia Third Regiment under Col. Fisher and was a private in Harper's Regiment, Putnam County.

He married Hannah Putnam March 10, 1787. The couple lived at Evans Mills. Mr. Shew, who died Jan.

23, 1853, at Evans Mills, is buried with his wife in the Evans Mills Village Cemetery.

### Jacobus Smith

Born Jan. 5, 1765 at Marbletown, Ulster County, Jacobus Smith enlisted April 1, 1782 at Marbletown for nine months in Captain Pauling's company of Col. Frederick Wiesenfelt's regiment. He was the colonel's guard for his entire enlistment.

After the war he moved to the Town of Pamela, where he died about 1842. He was buried March 9, 1842.

### Martin Sheley

Martin Sheley, a native of Philadelphia, Pa., was born in 1756 and enlisted at Albany in April, 1778, in

Capt. James Dixon's Co., Col. Hay's Regiment. From Albany he went to Peekskill and White Plains, served in Capt. DeGraff's Co., Col. Yates' regiment for one year, being discharged at Stillwater Jan. 1, 1781.

He and his wife, the former Margaret Jackson, had eight children: Jane Whitman, John, James, Katherine, Mary, Martin, Fanny and Richard.

Mr. Sheley died March

12, 1840, in the Town of Theresa and is buried in the Theresa Village Cemetery.

### Ephraim Smith

Ephraim Smith, a native of Lyme, Conn., was born Sept. 5, 1762, drafted in the Town of Lyme, New London County, Conn., about April 1, 1778, to serve in the Connecticut militia six months. He served as a private in Capt. Hardy's Co., Col. Ledyard's Regiment, at Ft. Trumbull. In June he marched to Providence, R.I., going through Mohegan, an Indian town, Norwich, Plainfield, Providence and crossed the river into Massachusetts to join General Sullivan in Rhode Island. The Army attacked the British at Newport, but retreated and went back to the north part of Rhode Island. He left Rhode Island in September, was discharged and then did scouting duty along the Long Island Sound until the end of the war under Capt. Hardy.

Mr. Smith lived in New Norwich, Mass., seven years, in Saratoga 34 years and in 1833 had lived in LeRay for seven years. He and his wife, Deobrah Sanford of Saybrook, Conn., had seven children: Leander, George, William, Thomas, Ephraim, Sanford and Jeremiah. Mr. Smith died Aug. 21, 1837, in LeRay. He and his wife are buried in the Evans Mills Village Cemetery.

### Ezra Smith

Ezra Smith, son of Henry and Lucretia Moore Smith, was born Jan. 13, 1754, in Sudbury, Mass., and enlisted in 1775. He served eight months as a private with Capt. John Nixon and enlisted in 1776 for 12 months. He enlisted for three months in 1777 and was at the Battle of Bunker Hill.

He married Phoebe Walcott. They came to Rodman from Nelson, N.H., in 1802. They were parents of seven children: Reuben, Jesse, Henry, Ezra, Rebecca, Ruth and Lucretia. Later he went to live with a son, Henry, at Ellisburg, where he died June 22, 1833. Mr. and Mrs. Smith are buried in Saxe Cemetery, Town of Ellisburg.

### Abraham Spofford

Abraham Spofford died Oct. 28, 1813. He was buried in the DePauville Cemetery.

### Levi Smith

Levi Smith was born May 25, 1755, at Haddon, Conn. He enlisted at West Hampton, Mass. in Captain Catlin's Company, Colonel Mosely's regiment of Mass. troops for four months. He later enlisted in Capt. Wales' company for two months.

He married Betsey Allen and moved to Jefferson County, living in Ellisburg for at least eight years. Betsey Allen Smith is buried in the Worth Cemetery. Her daughter, Salley Allen Wilcox, wife of Sterling Wilcox, lived at Worth and her mother may have lived with her.

Levi Smith died Sept. 4, 1848 in Jefferson County. It is not known where he was buried.

### Jeremiah Spencer

Jeremiah Spencer was buried in the Corbins Corners Cemetery, Town of Clayton.

### Ezra Schofield

Ezra Schofield was buried in Calcium Cemetery, Town of LeRay.

# Adjutant-General's Office,

ALBANY, MAY 1, 1851.

Pursuant to the provisions of an act of the Legislature, passed April 16, 1851, entitled "An act for the enrollment of the militia, to abolish militia fines in certain cases, and to exempt members of uniform companies from working on highways, and serving on juries," the Adjutant-General has prepared this book, as the form of the roll to be used by the assessors, and hereby issues the following instructions and forms to govern them in the performance of their duties under the said act.

## Parts of the Militia Law, of 1851, which relate to Assessors.

- § 3. The assessors chosen in each city, village, town or ward, shall annually, between the first days of May and July in each year, make out a roll which shall contain the names of all persons in their respective assessment districts between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, liable to be enrolled by the laws of the United States, arranged alphabetically, and shall make three fair copies thereof for the purposes hereinafter directed. **Enrollment.**
- § 4. It shall be the duty of the adjutant-general to prepare a roll, in such style and form as he shall deem most convenient and proper, for the use of the assessors, and in addition to the names, as herein directed, the assessors shall take and set down in separate columns to be designated on said roll, opposite to each name, such further information as the adjutant-general may deem important and requisite, to comply with the law of Congress. **Adj't-Gen'l to prepare a roll.**
- § 5. The adjutant-general shall attach to said roll, such instructions as shall enable the assessors to carry out the provisions of this act, and on or before the 20th day of April, in each and every year, he shall furnish to the supervisors of each city, village, town or ward in this State, sufficient numbers of said roll, so prepared, as aforesaid, to enable the said assessors of the towns, villages, cities or wards, to carry out the provisions of this act. The supervisors shall deliver the said rolls to the assessors immediately upon receiving the same from the adjutant-general. **Adj't-Gen'l to prepare instructions.**
- § 6. The assessors shall sign the copies hereby required to be filed and delivered, and shall attach thereto an affidavit substantially as follows: **Assessors shall make affidavit.**
- "The undersigned, assessors of the town of \_\_\_\_\_ in the county of \_\_\_\_\_ being severally sworn, say that they have made strict and diligent inquiry to ascertain the names of all persons required to be enrolled, as liable to military duty, by the laws of the United States, residing in said town, village or ward of \_\_\_\_\_ that the roll hereto annexed is as near as these deponents can ascertain, a correct roll of all persons, residing in said town or ward, who are liable to be enrolled." The said affidavit may be taken before any officer authorized by law to take affidavits, whose duty it shall be to take the same without fee or reward.
- § 7. All tavern keepers, keepers of boarding houses, persons having boarders in their families, and every master and mistress of any dwelling house, and head of quaker or shaker societies or communities, shall, upon the application of any assessor, give information of the names of all persons residing or lodging in such house, or belonging to such society or community, and liable to be enrolled, and all other proper information concerning such persons as such assessor may demand. **Duty of tavern keepers, &c.**
- § 8. If any person of whom information is required by any assessor, in order to enable him to comply with the provisions of this act, shall refuse to give such information, or shall give false information, he shall forfeit and pay ten dollars for each item of information demanded of him by any assessor and falsely stated, and the like sum for each individual name that may be refused, concealed, or falsely stated; and every person who shall refuse to give his own name and proper information when applied to by any assessor, or shall give a false name or information, shall forfeit and pay a like sum, to be recovered in any court of competent jurisdiction, in the name of the commanding officer of the regiment, and it is hereby made the duty of the assessors to report the names of all persons who may incur the penalty in this section prescribed to the commandant of the company district in which they reside. **Penalty for refusing, &c. information.**
- § 9. As soon as the roll is completed, the assessors shall forthwith cause notices thereof to be put up in three of the most public places in the village, city, town or ward, which notices shall set forth that the assessors have made their roll of all persons liable to be enrolled according to the laws of the United States, and that a copy thereof is left with one of their number to be designated in such notice, at some place to be specified therein, where the same may be seen and examined by any person interested therein, during twenty days; the assessor with whom such roll is left, shall submit the same during the twenty days specified in such notice, to the inspection of all persons who shall apply for that purpose. **Notice of enrollment.**
- § 10. Any person whose name appears on the said roll, and who claims that he is not liable to military duty, on account of some physical defect or bodily infirmity, or that he is exempt from the performance of military duty by any law of this State, or of the United States, may, within the said twenty days, and not after, file with the assessor having such roll an affidavit stating such facts on which he claims to be exempt or not liable to do military duty. Such affidavit may be made before the assessors or one of them, either of whom is hereby authorized to administer an oath for that purpose, and the assessors shall cause all such affidavits to be filed in the office of the city, village, or town clerk, and if any person shall swear falsely in such affidavit, he shall be guilty of perjury. **Affidavit to be made by persons claiming to be exempt.**
- § 11. On some day or days after, in the first week in August, the assessors shall meet and determine who are exempt or not liable to do military duty, and in a column prepared for that purpose in such roll, opposite the name of each person not exempt, shall insert "fifty cents," and opposite the name of each person not liable to do duty shall insert "exempt," or "not liable," as the case may be; and opposite the name of all members of uniform companies on each roll, shall insert "u. c.," and against the name of any military officer in commission and liable to do duty, the title of his office; and shall also insert against the names of persons between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one years, "under twenty-one;" but if such person will have arrived at the age of twenty-one years on or before the fifteenth day of November following each enrolment, then the designation last above provided need not be made. **Assessors to determine who are exempt.**
- § 12. When the said roll shall be completed as aforesaid, the said assessors shall make three fair copies thereof, and shall sign each of said copies, and attach thereto an affidavit as herein before provided; one of which copies shall be filed in the office of the town clerk, and one other copy shall be delivered to the commandant of the company district in which such assessors reside, and the other copy shall be delivered to the supervisor of the town or ward with the assessment roll of the town or ward, who shall deliver the same to the board of supervisors at their next annual meeting, and it shall be called the "military roll of such town or ward." **Assessors to make three copies of the roll.**
- § 13. The assessors, in the execution of their duties, shall use the forms and pursue the instructions which shall from time to time be transmitted to them by the adjutant-general. **To use forms &c., sent by Adj't-Gen'l.**
- § 14. If any assessor shall refuse or neglect to perform any of the duties required of him by this act, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars, to be recovered in the name of the commanding officer of the regiment within the bounds of which he resides, and if any assessor shall wilfully neglect or refuse to perform such duties as hereby required, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. **Penalty for neglect or refusal.**
- § 15. If any assessor shall neglect, or from any cause omit to perform his duties, the other assessors, or either of them, of the city, village, town or ward, shall perform such duties, and shall certify to the commandant of the company district with their roll, the name of such delinquent assessor, stating the cause of such omission. **Other assessors to perform duties omitted.**
- § 16. The board of supervisors of each county in this state, at their annual meeting, shall cause the military roll of every city, village, town or ward, to be compared with the assessment roll of the same city, village, town or ward; and all names on the said military roll, liable to pay the said commutation of fifty cents, shall be transferred to the corrected assessment roll of the same city, village, town or ward, and in a column to be provided for that purpose, in the said corrected assessment roll, shall be set opposite the name of every person so liable to pay such commutation the sum of fifty cents; and if the person shall be assessed for real or personal property on such assessment roll, the said sum of fifty cents shall be added to the other tax against the same person. **Duty of board of supervisors.**
- § 17. The said sum of fifty cents against every person who shall appear by the said assessment roll liable to pay the same, shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as other taxes are collected in the said county. And the warrants annexed by the supervisors to the assessment rolls of the several towns and wards, shall direct the collector to collect the said sum of fifty cents from every person appearing by the said assessment roll, liable to pay the same, in the same manner as other taxes are collected, and to pay the same to the county treasurer. And where the name of any person between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one years, shall appear on the said roll, liable to pay the said commutation, the said warrant shall direct the collector to collect the same of the father, master or guardian, with whom such person shall reside, or out of any property such minor may have in the city, village, town or ward. **Made of collecting commutations.**

Fees of assessors.

§ 22. The fund so created shall be applied exclusively to military purposes, for the benefit of the militia of the said county; except that assessors shall be entitled to receive for their services required by this act, the sum of one dollar and twenty-five cents for each day's service, to be paid out of the military fund created by this act in the hands of the treasurer of each county, upon the certificate of the supervisor of the town or ward in which said assessor may discharge said duties, that the account rendered by said assessor is just and reasonable.

No money to be paid by Co. Treasurer, except fees of assessors.

§ 23. No money shall be paid from such fund by the county treasurer, except the fees of assessors as before provided, but upon the order of a board of officers, as provided in section twenty-four of this act, countersigned by the commandant of the brigade, and which order shall specify on its face the objects for which such money is paid.

Duty of commandants of company districts.

§ 24. It shall be the duty of the commandant of every company district to make or cause to be made a complete enrolment of the names of all persons liable to be enrolled by the laws of the United States, which enrolment shall be made from the lists furnished to said commandants by the assessors as herein provided, and shall contain all the information set down in the same manner as is contained in the lists so furnished by the said assessors. After the said enrolment is completed as herein directed, it shall be the duty of commandants of company districts annually thereafter, carefully to correct their rolls, from the lists furnished by the assessors as herein provided; all persons whose names appear in said enrolment, shall be regarded as legally and properly enrolled, and the notice given by the assessors, as prescribed in section nine of this act shall be a sufficient notice of such enrolment. If the name of any person liable to be enrolled shall have been omitted by the assessors, the commandant of the company district shall add such name to his roll, and notify the person thereof, and also the assessor of his district.

Neglect or refusal to pay commutation.

§ 31. If any person shall neglect or refuse to pay the commutation tax as herein prescribed, and the collector of the town or ward to whom the warrant for the collection thereof shall be given, shall be unable to collect the same, it shall be the duty of such collector to return the names of all such persons to the assessors of the town where such person resides, which return shall be delivered by said assessors to their successors in office.

Unpaid tax to be a charge the next year.

§ 32. Whenever it shall appear from the return of any collector, made in pursuance of the last preceding section, that any person has neglected and refused to pay such commutation tax, and that the collector has been unable to collect the same, such sum shall be added to his annual commutation tax of the next year by the assessors.

## INSTRUCTIONS TO ASSESSORS.

For the instruction of assessors, extracts from an act of the Legislature, passed April 16, 1851, are published above. By reference to said act, it will be found that the duties to be performed by assessors are as follows:

*First*, They shall annually, between the first days of May and July, in each year, make out an alphabetical roll of all able-bodied white male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, residing in their respective assessment districts, noting the names of such as are under the age of twenty-one years.

They shall consider every individual as able-bodied, unless he has some bodily defect, plainly perceptible, such as the loss of a limb. If any individual claims that he is not able-bodied, on account of some physical infirmity, or bodily defect, which is not apparent, his name must be placed upon the roll, and he must be required to furnish the affidavit, as prescribed in the tenth section.

*Second*, After the completion of said roll, they shall give the notice required by the ninth section, the form of which shall be substantially as follows:

### *Notice to persons exempt from the performance of Military Duty.*

WHEREAS, it is required by section ten of the militia law, passed April 16, 1851, which is printed with this notice, that any person exempt from the performance of military duty, in order to avail himself of such exemption, should file with one of the assessors, an affidavit [which should specify particularly the facts on which he claims to be exempt, and refer to the law applicable to his case.]

Therefore, Notice is hereby given, that the assessors of \_\_\_\_\_, have made their roll of all persons liable to be enrolled, according to the laws of the United States, and that a copy thereof is left with \_\_\_\_\_, one of their number, at \_\_\_\_\_, where the same may be seen, and examined by any person interested therein, during the ensuing twenty days.

} Assessors.

§ 10. Any person whose name appears on the said roll, and who claims that he is not liable to military duty, on account of some physical defect or bodily infirmity, or that he is exempt from the performance of military duty by any law of this State, or of the United States, may, within the said twenty days, and not after, file with the assessor having such roll an affidavit, stating such facts on which he claims to be exempt, or not liable to do military duty. Such affidavit may be made before the assessors or one of them, either of whom is hereby authorized to administer an oath for that purpose; and the assessors shall cause all such affidavits to be filed in the office of the city, village or town clerk; and if any person shall swear falsely in such affidavit, he shall be guilty of perjury.

*Third*, On some day or days during the first week in August in each year, the assessors shall meet and determine, from the affidavits which have been filed during the said twenty days, who are exempt or not liable to do military duty.

They will note in the columns prepared for that purpose the causes of exemption, and fill up the several columns as required by said section.

*Fourth*, After said roll has been completed as required by the eleventh section, they shall make three copies thereof, each of which shall be signed by them, and to each they shall attach the affidavit as prescribed by the sixth section. Such copies shall be disposed of by them, in the manner prescribed by the twelfth section.
