"The remains were brought to her old home in Sandy Creek for interment. The funeral was held, from the home of her son, Hollom M. Potter on Tuesday at 1 p.m., Rev. D.E. Post, assisted by Rev. M.G. Seymour, officiating."

"Mrs Porter had been a member of the Baptist church in Sandy Creek for the past fifty-six years." (All the Salisbury family were Baptists.)

"She was the eldest and last surviving child of Daniel Salisbury."

"The remains were accompanied from Conneaut by her son, Edgar J. Porte of Springfield, Pa., her daughter, Mrs Effie M. Leveatt and her niece Miss Mary Olmstead of Conneaut, who with her sons, Hollom M. and Orlo R. Porter of this town survive their mother. The interment was in the family plot in the Orwell road cemetery (known as Stevens Cemetery)."

This establishes that she was the daughter of Daniel Salisbury!! Sanford Wheeler quoted from it, but I need the entire write-up with the newspaper heading.

Sorry the photocopies are so light, but the machine I was using was waiting for the repairman!

If the enclosed check for \$15 is not sufficient, let me know. I do not know how long you will work to locate and copy these items. I do want to be fair.

Good luck with the program your historical group is presenting. I know from experience that such events are work!

I really have found a great many ancestors in all lines since I began working on the Porter-Salisbury-Rounds problems with you. I even helped an author with a new genealogy of the Rounds family. This is a fascinating - yet time consuming - hobby.

A Bicentennial Tribute To Veterans of 1776

Although Jefferson County was highly strategic as a borderland in both the French and Indian Wars and the War of 1812, the area was not the site of any of the great battles of the American Revolution. According to the history books, the American line of defense lay mostly along the Mohawk and the Susquehanna rivers during the War for Independence, and the land of Jefferson County was much given up to the enemy due to the presence of the British fort on Carleton Island in the St. Lawrence River. Perhaps the area's greatest distinction during those years was as an escape route for many Tories on their way to the safety of Caada.

When the new nation had been born, however, and the awesome wilderness was first being cleared, it was to Jefferson County that many of those who had tought in the Revolution moved. As a result, more than 350 Revolutionary War soldiers are buried in the county, and records of their presence provide a national heritage for today's residents.

The list of names and short biographies of the Revolutionary War heroes of Jefferson County is presented by The Times through the cooperation of the Leray de Chaumont Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution on the occasion of this year's national celebration. The names were originally copied by Mrs. Frank M. Williams, a member of the local D.A.R., while in Washington, D.C., at the Archives of the Veterans Administration, Ethel Swaffer copied Mrs. Williams' records for use in the Leray de Chaumont Chapter Library.

Robert Ackerman

Robert Ackerman was born in 1761 or 1763 and died May 7, 1839. His body was buried in Sherwin's Bay Cemetery, Town of Brownville. His wife was Roxelene Child.

Shubael Adams

Shubael Adams, born Jan. 16, 1757, in Pomfret, Conn., was drafted as a private in August, 1776, at Brooklyn, Conn., Windham County in Capt. Joseph Abbott's company of Col. Ebenezer Williams' regiment of the Connecticut State Militia. He served seven months along the Hudson River. In May, 1777, he was drafted to serve three months at New London, Conn. He served one month in 1778 at Groton, Conn., under Capt. Elijah Avery.

Mr. Adams came to Watertown in 1807. He and his wife are buried in Brookside Cemetery, Watertown. Mr. Adams died Sept. 18, 1837, in Watertown.

Ebenezer Allen

Sgt. Ebenezer Allen was born May 24, 1762, at Dudley, Mass., a son of Joseph and Elizabeth Warner Allen and was mustered with a group of men in Worcester County. Mass., by Thomas Newhall, muster master, Captain Corbin's Company, Colonel Davis' regiment.

He married Phoebe Healey, daughter of Samuel and Phoebe Curtis Healey March 16, 1786. Mr. and Mrs. Allen both died in the Town of Hounsfield. Mr. Allen died July 3, 1824. The couple is buried in Muscalonge Cemetery, Town of Hounsfield.

Joseph Allen Joseph Allen, born Nov. 24. 1758, at Westport, Mass., the son of Daniel and Elizabeth Seabury Allen, enlisted March 4, 1777, for three years and served in the Revolution as a private in Capt. William Hudson Ballard's Company of the Seventh Massachusetts Regiment of Foot commanded by Col. Ichabod Alden.

He married Prudence Earl, daughter of Caleb and Elizabeth Brightman Earl June 27, 1784.

The Allens came to Black River country in March, 1805, from Galway, Saratoga County, by way of Redfield and Adams. The trail was marked in places only by blazed trees.

Mr. Allen purchased 320 acres of land on Bear Creek and built the first house on the site of the Allen Blacksmith shop. He served as magistrate for 40 years and gave to the public a lot for a burying ground and also laid out part of the public square or "green" which was part of his original purchase. He was the father of 10 children, eight of whom are buried in the village cemetery at Pierrepont Manor, Town of Ellisburg, with Mr. Allen and his wife. Mr. Allen died Sept. 23, 1838, at Pierrepont Manor.

David I. Andrus

David Ira Andrus, born in 1766 in Connecticut, served as a fifer in the 6th Company of the 4th Connecticut Regiment commanded by Col. Zebulon Butler, having enlisted at Southington, Jan. 1, 1781. He transferred to Captain Robertson's 2nd Connecticut Regiment commanded by Col. Heman Swift and served as a private until March 1, 1783. His name appeared on the rolls until May 6, 1783.

He first married Sally Ranney at Middle Upper House, Connecticut. Following her death July 22, 1818, in the Town of Ellisburg, he married Mrs. Esther Hinman.

David I. Andrus came to Black River country with Daniel Fox about 1800 and in 1805 he settled at Ellisburg, and became an agent for Samuel Wardwell of Rhode Island. He built the first sawmill at Mannsville and the first dwelling at that place. He was elected a member of the assembly in 1809 and 1812, served as sheriff in 1812-1813 and 1815-1818, and was the father of four daughters and four sons.

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He died Aug. 21 or 22, 1831, and is buried in the Giddingsville Cemetery, Town of Ellisburg.

Henry Anstead

Henry Anstead enlisted in September, 1781, in New Jersey in Capt. Thomas' Co. of Colonel Lamb's regiment of the New York Line. He was in the battle of New Brunswick, N.J., and was discharged at West Point Nov. 1, 1781.

He was born in 1750 and married Elizabeth Ritter in Herkimer County. The couple had seven children. Henry and Elizabeth Anstead are probably buried at Evans Mills where members of the Anstead family are to be found, although the location of their graves is not known. Mr. Anstead died in the Town of LeRay April 24, 1838.

Amasa Allen

Revolutionary War veteran Amasa Allen, born March 7, 1753, died Dec. 22, 1820. He is buried in Old Theresa Cemetery, Town of Theresa. His wife was the former Alice Lord.

Elijah Allen

Elijah Allen, a Revolutionary War veteran, is buried in Three Mile Creek Cemetery, Town of Clayton.

Thomas Sawyer

Thomas Sawyer, a native of Sterling, Mass., served as a private in Capt. Daniel Robbin's Co. of Col. Whitcomb's regiment from Lancaster, Mass., at the Lexington Alarm.

A son of Elias and Susannah Huck Sawyer, he married Susannah Fuller Jan. 12, 1779, in Sterling. The couple lived at Plymouth, Vt., 12 years before coming to the wilderness of the Black River Country about 1800.

He became acquainted with Judge Coffeen and Capt. Butterfield and acquired land between Burrs Mills and Watertown, which is now occupied by his descendants. Mr. and Mrs. Sawyer were among the first nine members of the Congregational Church of Burrs Mills.

Mr. Sawyer died April 23, 1825, in the Town of Watertown. He and his wife are buried in Brookside Cemetery.

Gideon Scott

Gideon Scott, whose name appears on a descrip-

tive list of men received to reinforce the Continental Army for a six-month term. was born in April, 1753, in Leverett, Mass. He served as a corporal in Capt. Joseph Sallrro's Co. of Col. David Wells' Regiment. He also served on the expedition to the Northward and as a sergeant in Capt. Elisha Lyman's Co. of Col. Elisha Porter's Regiment. He and his wife, Sarah, reaided in the Town of Antwerp. Mr. Scott died

March 4, 1830, in the Town of Antwerp and he and his wife are buried in the old part of the Antwerp village cemetery.

Thomas Smith Thomas Smith died Sept. 12, 1835 at age 79. He was buried in the Dexter Cemetery.

John Spencer

John Spencer died July 30, 1817, and was buried in the Depauville Cemetery.

Samuel Shelley

Samuel Shelley was born Jan. 20, 1765, in Stratford, Conn., and served as a fifer in Capt. Paul Brigham's Company of Col. Isaac Sherman's Regiment. He also was at Valley Forge, 1777-1778, was present at the Battle of Monmouth, in camp at White Plains in Huntington's 2nd Brigade and served along the Hudson River.

He married Catherine Pride and resided in the Brownville-Limerick area. He is buried in a destroyed cemetery at Limerick.

Jacob Shew

Jacob Shew was born April 15, 1763, at Johnstown, a son of Godfrey and Kate Fry Shew. He and his father and two brothers were taken prisoners by the Indians and Tories and were taken to Canada.

Eventually they were sent to Boston and exchanged for British prisoners. Jacob then enlisted in the Continental Army. He served as a private in the Tryon County Militia Third Regiment under Col. Fisher and was a private in Harper's Regiment, Putnam County.

He married Hannah Putnam March 10, 1787. The couple lived at Evans Mills. Mr. Shew, who died Jan.

23, 1853, at Evans Mills, is buried with his wife in the Evans Mills Village Cemetery.

Jacobus Smith

Born Jan. 5, 1765 at Marbletown, Ulster County, Jacobus Smith enlisted April 1, 1782 at Marbletown for nine months in Captain Pauling's company of Col. Frederick Wiesenfelt's regiment. He was the colonel's guard for his entire enlistment.

After the war he moved to the Town of Pamelia, where he died about 1842. He was buried March 9, 1842.

Martin Sheley

Martin Sheley, a native of Philadelphia, Pa., was born in 1756 and enlisted at Albany in April, 1778, in

Capt. James Dixon's Co., Col. Hay's Regiment. From Albany he went to Peekskill and White Plains, served in 'Capt. DeGraff's Co., Col. Yates' regiment for one year, being discharged at Stillwater Jan. 1, 1781.

He and his wife, the former Margaret Jackson, had eight children: Jane Whitman, John, James, Katherine, Mary, Martin, Fanny and Richard.

Mr. Sheley died March

12, 1840, in the Town of Theresa and is buried in the Theresa Village Cemetery.

Ephriam Smith

Ephraim Smith, a native of Lyme, Conn., was born Sept. 5, 1762, drafted in the Town of Lyme, New London County, Conn., about April 1, 1778, to serve in the Connecticut militia six months. He served as a private in Capt. Hardy's Co., Col. Ledyard's Regiment, at Ft. Trumbell. In June he marched to Providence. R.I., going through Mohegan, an Indian town, Norwich, Plainfield, Providence and crossed the river into Massachusetts to join General Sullivan in Rhode Island. The Army attacked the British at Newport, but retreated and went back to the north part of Rhode Island. He left Rhode Island in September, was discharged and then did scouting duty along the Long Island Sound until the end of the war under Capt. Hardy.

Mr. Smith lived in New Norwich, Mass., seven years, in Saratoga 34 years and in 1833 had lived in Le-Ray for seven years. He and his wife, Deobrah Sanford of Saybrook, Conn., had seven children: Leander, George, William, Thomas, Ephriam, Sanford and Jeremiah. Mr. Smith died Aug. 21, 1837, in LeRay. He and his wife are buried in the Evans Mills Village Cemetery.

Ezra Smith

Ezra Smith, son of Henry and Lucretia Moore Smith, was born Jan. 13, 1754, in Sudbury, Mass., and enlisted in 1775; He served eight months as a private with Capt. John Nixon and enlisted in 1776 for 12 months. He enlisted for three months in 1977 and was at the Battle of Bunker Hill.

He married Phoebe Walcott. They came to Rodman from Nelson, N.H., in 1802. They were parents of seven children: Reuben, Jesse, Henry, Ezra, Rebecca, Ruth and Lucretia. Later he went to live with a son, Henry, at Ellisburg, where he died June 22, 1833. Mr. and Mrs. Smith are buried in Saxe Cemetery, Town of. Ellisburg.

Abraham Spofford

Abraham Spofford died Oct. 28, 1813. He was buried in the DePauville Cemetery.

Levi Smith

Levi Smith was born May 25, 1755, at Haddon, Conn. He enlisted at West Hampton, Mass. in Captain Catlin's Company, Colonel Mosely's regiment of Mass. troops for four months. He later enlisted in Capt. Wales' company for two months.

He married Betsey Allen and moved to Jefferson County, living in Ellisburg for at least eight years. Betsey Allen Smith is buried in the Worth Cemetery. Her daughter, Salley Allen Wilcox, wife of Sterling Wilcox, lived at Worth and her mother may have lived with her.

Levi Smith died Sept. 4, 1848 in Jefferson County. It is not known where he was buried.

Jeremiah Spencer Jeremiah Spencer was buried in the Corbins Corners Cemetery, Town of Clayton.

INSTRUCTIONS TO ASSESSORS.

For the instruction of assessors, extracts from an act of the Legislature, passed April 16, 1851, are published above. By reference to said act, it will be found that the duties to be performed by assessors are as follows:

First, They shall annually, between the first days of May and July, in each year, make out an alphabetical roll of all able-bodied white male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, residing in their respective assessment districts, noting the names of such as are under the age of twenty-one years.

They shall consider every individual as able-bodied, unless he has some bodily defect, plainly perceptible, such as the loss of a limb. If any individual claims that he is not able-bodied, on account of some physical infirmity, or bodily defect, which is not apparent, his name must be placed upon the roll, and he must be required to furnish the affidavit, as prescribed in the tenth section.

Second, After the completion of said roll, they shall give the notice required by the ninth section, the form of which shall be substantially as follows :

Notice to persons exempt from the performance of Military Duty.

WHEREAS, it is required by section ten of the militia law, passed April 16, 1851, which is printed with this notice, that any person exempt from the performance of military duty, in order to avail himself of such exemption, should file with one of the assessors, an affidavit [which should specify particularly the facts on which he claims to be exempt, and refer to the law applicable to his case.]

Therefore, Notice is hereby given, that the assessors of , have made their roll of all persons liable to be enrolled, according to the laws of the United States, and that a copy thereof is left , where the same may be seen, and , one of their number, at with examined by any person interested therein, during the ensuing twenty days.

§ 10. Any person whose name appears on the said roll, and who claims that he is not liable to military duty, on account of some physical defect or bodily infirmity, or that he is exempt from the performance of military duty by any law of this State, or of the United States, may, within the said twenty days, and not after, file with the assessor having such roll an affidavit, stating such facts on which he claims to be exempt, or not liable to do military duty. Such affidavit may be made before the assessors or one of them, either of whom is hereby authorised to administer an oath for that purpose; and the assessors shall cause all such affidavits to be filed in the office of the city, village or town clerk; and if any person shall swear falsely in such affidavit, he shall be guilty of perjury.

Assessors.

Third, On some day or days during the first week in August in each year, the assessors shall meet and determine, from the affidavits which have been filed during the said twenty days, who are exempt or not liable to do military duty.

They will note in the columns prepared for that purpose the causes of exemption, and fill up the saveral columns as required by said section.

Fourth, After said roll has been completed as required by the eleventh section, they shall make three copies thereof, each of which shall be signed by them, and to each they shall attach the affidavit as prescribed by the sixth section. Such copies shall be disposed of by them, in the manner prescribed by the twelfth section.
