ANCESTOR'S SERVICE.

My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

Thomas Baker enlisted in the continental army May 1775 under Capt. Robt Olliver in Col. Ephraim Podlett's regiment, first stationed at Cambridge previous to the battle of Bunker Hill. He with his regiment was ordered to march to Bunker Hill, and was engaged in that conflict. Major Willard Moore in command of the regiment (about 300 men) Major Moore was killed in this engagement. Major General Lee commanded the wing of the army during the siege of Boston. Thomas Baker remained at this station until Feb 1776 when he was discharged. He enlisted again in July 1776 for 5 months as a Sergeant under Capt Timothy Childs in Col. Buggles Woodbridge's regiment. Going up the Connecticut river to fort no 4 (now Charlestown, Sullivan Co N.H. to draw 5-days rations. crossed Vermont to Lake Champlain joined the garrison at fort Ticonderoga N.Y. where he remained until mustered out in Dec 1776. He applied for pension Sept 24th 1832 aged 51 years which was allowed. At the battle of Bunker Hill he was stationed in the redoubt and his co officers were

Captain Robert Olliver. Lieut. Thos Grover. Ensign Abraham Pennal.

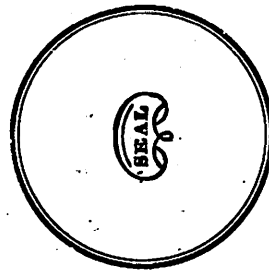

State records as a Private on the Lexington Alarm Roll of Captain Hugh McLellan's company of Minute Men in Col. Samuel William's regiment, which marched in response to the Alarm call of April 19, 1775. He served ten days and was discharged and enlisted May 1st under Captain Oliver in Col. Doolittle's regiment. He was in the battle of Bunker Hill. Major Willard Morse who was in command was shot at his side. His regiment lost six killed and nine wounded during the engagement. At the battle of Bunker Hill, he was stationed in the redoubt and his company officers were Capt. Robert Oliver, Lieut. Thomas Grover, Ensign Abraham Pennal. During the siege of Boston, Major General Lee commanded this wing of the army. Thomas Baker remained at this station until Feb. 1776 when he was discharged. In July 1776, he enlisted again for five months as Sergeant under Captain Timothy Childs in Col. Ruggles Woolbridge's Mass. Regiment and going up the Donn. River to Fort No. 4, near Charlestown, Sullivan Co., N. H., he drew five days rations, crossed Vermont to Lake Champlain and finally joined the garrison at Fort Ticonderoga, N. Y. where he remained until mustered out Dec. 1776. He applied for pension which was allowed in Sept. 24, 1832. He died Jan. 14, 1840. From Colrain in Mass. he moved to Salem, N.Y., thence to Sandy Creek, N.Y. where he died.

He served ten days and was discharged and enlisted May 1st under Capt. Oliver in Col. Doolittle's Regiment. He was in the Battle of Bunker Hill. Maj. Willard Moore who was in command was shot at his side. His regiment lost six killed and nine wounded during the engagement. At the Battle of Bunker Hill he was stationed in the redoubt and his Company officers were, Capt. Robert Oliver, Lieut. Thos. Grover, Ensign Abraham Pennal. During the siege of Boston, Maj. Gen. Lee commanded this wing of the army. Thomas Baker remained at this station until Feb. 1776, when he was discharged. In July, 1776 he enlisted again for five months as Sargeant under Captain Timothy Childs in Col. Ruggles Woolbridge's Mass. Regiment and going up the Conn. River to Fort No. 4 near Charleston, Sullivan Co., N. H. he drew five days rations, crossed Vermont to Lake Champlain and finally joined the garrison at Fort Ticonderoga, N. Y. where he remained until mustered out Dec. 1776. He applied for a pension which was allowed On Sept. 24, 1832. He died Jan. 14, 1840. From Colrain, Mass. he moved to Salem, N. Y., thence to Sandy Creek, N. Y. where he died.
