Shield - Quarterly 1st and 4th argent a cross flory gules; 2nd and 3rd or a cross gules, by way of surtout, argent, a saltire azure.

Crest - 2 dragons' necks and heads addorsed vert.

Motto - Humilitate

The shield is surmounted by a helmet. The helmet is topped by a torso, and the crest emerges from the torse.

The shield is quartered - a son has taken the arms of his father and put it in the 1st and 4th quarters and the arms of his mother's family and put it in the second and third quarters. The red is gules; it is considered to be the most noble of all colors. It denotes boldness and valor. Azure is for blue, representing the color of the pure sky; and it implies justice, humility, loyalty, and perseverance. Blue is said to represent heaven, which is the highest of all things created, the tribunal of God, and the ever-lasting mansion of the blessed.

Over two centuries ago eight brothers of Scotch-Irish Extraction, migrated to America from Scotland. These brothers, after leaving the ship, settled in different sections of the country so tradition goes.

- 1-1 Calvin Carlisle, born 1735, remained in Scotland.
- 2-1 Dr. John G. Carlisle, one of the brothers, born 1770, settled in North Carolina, married Nancy Sims, and lived in Burke County, North Carolina. Issue:

Several children died at birth or lived only a short time.

When John S. Carlisle was about grown, he left home in North Carolina, and went to find his brother who had previously left home and gone to Tennessee. When John arrived in the vicinity of where Joe was suppose to be found, he learned that Joe had recently left Tenn., for his old home back in North Carolina.

While John was roaming around from place to place he met a family by the name of Witty. Mr. Witty had three daughters named Matilda, Mealey, and Sallie. While John was living with the Witty family, he fell in love with and married Mealey. After John married and while living in La Grange, Tenn., a place near by, he returned to N.C. to visit his old home and bring his mother back with him, as his father had died and she was dependent. It had been sixteen years since John had gone from home or had seen his people except his brothers.

As there were no railroads John was forced to make the trip on horseback. He left Tenn. with \$300 in silver and an old cap pistol. It took him four weeks to make the trip. The country was thinly settled where he had to travel, also, it was very mountainous, and there were roving bands of robbers to dread.

One night he stopped at a house to ask if he could spend the night. He observed some Malatto boys in the yard but thought nothing of it until after dark. When the husband came in he proved to be a negro. During the night he overheard a conversation between two of the boys that caused him to be afraid. They planned to waylay and rob him as he left the next morning.

Early the next morning John left the place and found the boys on the wayside waiting for him. He began talking to them and kept his eyes on them so they did not attempt to rob him. He returned with his mother in a few weeks and made the long trip all right.

John S. Carlisle and Mealey Witty came into possession of and settled on the level, later owned by Annie Adams, now owned by Maude Adams, and reared most of their children there. Issue:

Three or four children died young.

Jasper and several brothers went to the war. Jasper lost an arm in service, but one boy refused to go and fight. He left home and lived in a cave over on Mill Creek. He would put on a dress and a bonnet during the day and plow two oxen. As there were few men at home, it was not unusual to see a woman plowing in a field. He lived in a cave until the war was over.

At the age of 21, Jasper married Mary Howell, born March 6, 1846; died Sept. 6, 1871. Jasper's brother Joe, married Mary's sister, Margaret Howell, another brother, Calve, married Lizzie Howell, three brothers married three sisters. Jasper and Mary had three children. Mary died 6 Sept. 1871, when Obediah was five months old. Jasper married about a year later to Anna Doggett, daughter of James Doggett and Louisa Murphy Doggett, Anna was born March 22, 1851. She lived about a year after she married Jasper, died 24 May 1873. No issue.

Jasper married a third wife, 1878, about six years after the death of his second wife Mary Jane Roberts, the daughter of Axom and Jane Russell Roberts. Mary Jane was born 26 Nov. 1852, and died 10 Aug. 1951, at the age of 99 years.
