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Introduction

This book has been prepared for all those members of the several related families who wish to know something about their ancestors, who and where are their relatives, what many of them have done, and to have a history that each can add to, and then pass down through succeeding generations.

Records of the Lanphere families go back to the Middle Ages when they lived in France in the then provinces of Languedoc and Provence, on either side of the Rhone River and in which were situated the cities of Arles, St. Gilles, Nimes and Avignon. Dr. Charles Lanphier Patton of Springfield, Illinois wrote that while he was stationed in this area during World War I he saw the name Lanphier in many places.



The first known settlers of this area were the Greeks, then came the Romans, and Arles became the capital, crossroads and religious center of Gaul. It was later sacked by barbarians and Saracens who occupied it in 730 A.D.. In 879 to 1150 it was the seat of the Burgundy kings. In the Middle Ages it recovered as the center of Provencal culture. After Caesar's sack of Marseille in 49 B.C., Arles became the capital of Gaul. In the First Century A.D. it was the gateway for the introduction of Christianity into Gaul. In the time of Constantine's Empire, A.D. 330, it became the third city in size after Rome and Constantinople with a population of 100,000. It is now a city of about 20,000, the Roman Theatre still exists, and the Roman arena or amphitheatre which held 26,000 in early A.D. now holds about 15,000 people.

Many authoritative sources have given this area as the early home of the Lanpheres, Lanphiers (and many other spellings.)

Nimes was the capital of Languedoc and with St. Gilles became the strongholds of the Protestant teachings of Besanean Hugue, a Geneva Switzerland Reformer. These Protestants became known as Huguenots and were severely persecuted in the 1500's and 1600's, so much so that following the great massacre of them on the Eve of St. Bartholomew, August 24, 1572, great numbers fled from France. The Lanphiers fled from this area in southern France, from Normandy, and the Auvergne Mountain Region.

Huguenots

A religious reform movement in France that spread quickly after the 1523 French translations of the New Testament by Jacques Le Fèvre d'Étaples (which followed his 1512 writing of the "Sancti Pauli xxx" which has been interpreted as embodying the cardinal doctrine of the Reformation justification by faith.)

Posters attacking the Mass appeared on walls throughout Paris, "Affair of the placards October 1534." Then began many of the exiles, the most famous was John Calvin who left for Basel, Switzerland in 1534. More vigorous prosecution followed.

The Huguenot Church in Paris was formed about 1555. (The people in this Protestant movement took the name Huguenot from the name of one of the leading Swiss reformers, Hugue.)

In Portiers in 1558 it was decided that all Protestant churches should formulate by common accord a confession of faith and ecclesiastical doctrine, and the synod of Paris, May 1559, derived its inspiration from the constitution introduced by Calvin at Geneva and which subsequently was the model for all Presbyterian churches, -ecclesiastical authority resides in the people who elect the elders for general supervision of the church, choice of Pastors, churches are independent units but have common interests. Fifteen churches were represented at the synod, Two years later in 1561 there were 2150 churches.

Massacres and other events led to civil war, there was a serious defeat and the Huguenot leader, Louis I de Bourbon, Prince de Conde was killed at Jaruoc, war was revived and a peace treaty was made at St. Germain August 8, 1570. The Queen of Navarre was Conde's sister-in-law, her son Henry of Navarre became Henry IV of France, was to marry Margaret, sister of Charles IX of France. On the night of August 24, 1572, however, after a council at which Catherine d'Medici, Charles IX, the duc d'Anjou (later Henry III of France) and the Guises were present, there occurred the Massacre of St. Bartholomew's Day in which Gaspard de Coligny their most powerful leader and all the leading Huguenots in Paris were slain. But their survivors went on to lead further wars and after 40 years of strife obtained by their constancy the promulgation of the Edict of Nantes April, 1598, the charter of religious and political freedom.

Wars again broke out over lands retained by the Huguenots, they helped the English in some of their battles with the French, but Cardinal de Richelieu resolved to and did carry out his plan for putting an end to their political powers in France, La Rochelle fell on October 28, 1628, there were defeats in southern France, and in June 28, 1629 the peace of Alais was signed

whereby the Huguenots retained their freedom of conscience but lost all their military advantages.


By the middle of the 1600's the Roman Catholic clergy prevailed and so on October 18, 1685 Louis XIV pronounced the Edict of Nantes revoked. But the Huguenots continued to persist and in 1745 to 1754 there was considerable volume in Cervantes and Languedoc. By the efforts of Lafayette and others an edict of November 1787 restored the validity of their marriages and some other civil rights.

The law of December 9, 1905 which separated church and state finally halted the ever-continuing strife and a measure of freedom for French Protestantism.

Some went first to Holland, some to the Island of Jersey (where today they live under the name of Lanpriere) some to England and some to Ireland. In Ireland many returned to the Roman Catholic faith, and some of whom after about one hundred and fifty years migrated to Canada, particularly Ontario Province from which several families migrated again to central and western United States. Some of the families in Ireland stopped in Northern Ireland, or Ulster Plantation.

George Lanphear, probably in the 1640's or 50's, came from either England or Ireland to Massachusetts and shortly thereafter settled in what is now Westerly Rhode Island, where he bought land in 1669. He evidently came from a very well-to-do family. Some of his descendents live on a part of that land today and one of the streets leading to it is marked Lanphere Road in Westerly.

Albany County, established in 1683, from which came Montgomery County, from which county Fulton County was created in 1838. In 1791 Herkimer County was taken out of Montgomery County, and Oneida County was created out of Herkimer County in 1798. Rensselaer County came from Albany County in 1791.



It is very important to keep in mind that as families moved about through the centuries, names became changed as to their spellings for at least two reasons; 1) handwriting was mostly very poor, and 2) the sound of the spoken name gave different people different ideas as to how to spell it.

The arrangement and numbering system employed in this book is that used by the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society. Three sets of numbers are used: 1) the number that is given to each individual according to his place in his generation list in the chronological (date of birth) relation to his brothers and sisters and aunts and uncles in their sequential order, 2) the number of his generation which is the superior number placed after and above his name, followed by the name of his parent, his grandparent, his great grandparent, etc., in parentheses, 3) the small Roman numbers that number the children in each family in the order of the date of birth.

When an asterisk, *, appears between the number of the first kind given above under 1) and the small Roman number described under 3) it means that this individual, whether son or daughter, is, for the purposes of listing in the genealogy by generations, the head of his or her family of children, and so will appear again later on in numerical order underlined and at the left side of the page.

For an illustration for locating the name of any person, (use her maiden or unmarried name) in this genealogy take the number and name of Cousin Frances Lanphere Elder #8135. Her maiden name was Frances Lanphere. Knowing that her year of birth is in the 1880's (actually it is 1885) then referring to the above schedule her number will be in the 8000's. Turn to the pages showing children's numbers in the 8000 (second column of numbers from the left) her name is found as #8135, under her father's #7108, Sloan Lanphere as head of that particular family group, since an * (asterisk) appears after her number that means that she is the head of her own family in the Lanphere line. To learn more about her, her husband's name, Frank Ray Elder, or the names and numbers of her children, then turn to the page on which her number 8135 underlined is listed in the left hand column of numbers. In this manner one can work forwards for the names and numbers of her descendents, or backwards for the names and numbers of her ancestors.

THE LANPHIER COAT OF ARMS

Arms - Paly of Six gu and arg on a chief az a lion passant of the second.

Crest - A demi lion gu.

Translated -

Arms - Three red and three silver perpendicular bars on a field the top part of which is blue, but on which is a lion walking surmounted by a helmet in silver.

Crest - A red erect lion.

Motto - Virtute et Fidelitate.

Translated -

By bravery and fidelity.

According to Burke "General Armory" page 584 this Coat of Arms was by authority granted by Betham, Ulster, to Thomas Lanphier, Esq., of Parkstown County, Tipperary, Lieutenant Colonel, 86th Regiment, and to the descendents of his grandfather. It is through this grandfather, Thomas Lanphier who settled in Wiltshire England in 1572 that George Lanphear of Westerly, Rhode Island (who was born in adjacent Berkshire), and his descendents are included in this grant.

1001 Lanphear, George, born 1631 in Berkshire, England,
d. 10-6-1731, grandson of Thomas Lamphier, who with
many other French Huguenots fled from his homeland
in Province of Languedoc in southern France in
1572 to adjacent Wiltshire in England following the
massacre of over 30,000 on the Eve of St. Bartholomew
August 24, 1572. Over 60,000 people were killed in
the religious wars instituted by Catherine de Medici
(1519-1589). (See old records reported by Mrs. D.
Dorsey Wolf, Jericho Manor apt. 141, Jenkintown,
Penn., for the Huguenot Society of Pennsylvania 2-19-
1960,)

Some of Thomas's sons went to Ulster and others
to County Tipperary, Wexford, etc., in Ireland. On
April 18, 1669 George bought land from John Clarke
where the city of Westerly, Rhode Island is now
located. In 1704 he owned 200 acres of land, parts
of which are still owned by his descendents. George
married in 1669. On May 17, 1671 George took the
Oath of Allegiance to Rhode Island. This is recorded
in "New England Families" by Cutler, where it is
also reported that he was baptized in 3-2-1678, but
his wife became faint-hearted and came back out of
the water "un baptized." On April 25, 1727 the
town divided his land among his children as he was
considered unable to manage his affairs at this time.

To the additions and corrections to the 1970 Revised Edition - Lanphere
and Related Families

This section of the 1973 Supplement became necessary largely as a result of the considerable number of inquiries from new people interested in the genealogies of these families which came to their attention from seeing copies of the 1970 Revised Edition in one or more of the over forty copies given to the principal Libraries from Boston to Los Angeles, and the placing of this fact in the publications of some fifty Geneological Associations.

Undoubtedly more of these inquiries and further correspondence will continue in the future, but it is desirable to make this information already in hand available to people visiting the Libraries as soon as possible.

Another very interesting aspect of human living, migrating and inter-marrying becomes evident by observing that the Lanphere, Fuller Capron and other families arrived in Eastern Massachusetts along about the same time in the 1600's. Succeeding generations migrated into New York state and on into the western part in parallel where they stayed until the 1840's, where they found farming in particular badly hampered by the rapidly growing of trees and bushes (present day machinery would easily have solved this problem) so they migrated to Illinois, with later generations after the Civil War moving to Nebraska.

There were at least eight inter-marriages in the Lanphere and Fuller families, likewise with the Caprons - my father's middle name was Capron.



Elizabeth 10 years old bound to John Thompson of Stonington, to have two suits of clothes, a cow and a calf.

Mary, aged 7 years bound to Nehemiah Mason of Stonington to be learned to read and write, to have two suits of clothes, a cow and a calf.

Elisha Lanphear in 1730 to be bound out to Samuel Hinckley of Stonington.

George Lanphear, the first representative of the family in South Western Rhode Island, came from Newport and bought land in 1669 of Dr. John Clark.

In 1671 he took the oath of allegiance to Rhode Island, and was baptised by Elder Hiscox in 1678.

In 1704 he had 200 acres of land laid out.

The children of George Lanphear were:

In 1727 George Lanphear being adjudged incapable of managing his estate and affairs, his children petitioned the Town Council of Westerly for a division of his property, which being obtained, a bond for £1000 signed by his children and children-in-law, for his maintenance while living. He died in 1731.

The children of John Lanphear and Ruth----- were 1, John; 2, Daniel; 3, Amos; 4, Nathan; 5, Anna; 6, Ruth; 7, Experience; 8, Mary; 9, Patience; 10, Keziah.

Nathan, the fourth son of John and Ruth Lanphear, married, first, Mary Langworthy, and second Amy Champlin.

The two mothers bore the following children:- Patience, Pardon, Paul, Anne, Maxson, & Catherine, Mary, Nathan, Jr., Jonathan, Langworthy and Amos. *Amey*

Nathan, Jr., married, first Amy Crandall, whose children were, Polly, who married Benjamin Kenyon, Hannah and Ethan.

Nathan Jr., married, second, Catherine Greenman who had no children.

Nathan, Jr., married, third, Sarah Saunders who had these children: Amy, Elisha, Simeon, Abigail, Susan, Enoch, Hezekiah, Samuel, Joseph, Acus, Silas and William.

Elisha of this family married Betsey Potter. He died August 23rd, 1820, in his forty-seventh year. Their children were: Nathan, Betsey, Elisha, Thomas, Hannah, Elisha 2d, Emma and Harris.

Harris, born March 9, 1815, married October 12, 1837, Mary, born Jan. 19, 1818, daughter of Holden Andrews of Coventry, Rhode Island. Their children were: a son who died in infancy and Nathan Henry who was born Feb. 12, 1850.

Harris died June 15, 1888. Mary, his wife, died March 28, 1899.

N.H. Lanphear was married, first to Frances Jane Crandall, born July 10, 1846, died May 5, 1876, daughter of N.V. Crandall, April 1, 1871; second to California Corbet Burdick, born Jan. 18, 1844, died Jan. 28, 1912, daughter of Gardner Burdick. Their daughter Sylvia Wavie, was born Oct. 8, 1880.
