In 1661 he removed across the North River into Marshfield and died there Nov. 9, 1678, aged 86. His widow Elizabeth died Feb. 17, 1689. The Holmes line traced to one John Holm who is said to have come over as a volunteer with William the Conqueror.

Abraham Holmes, son of William, and father of Rose, was born in Marshfield, 1640, removed to Rochester, Mass., with his brothers Josiah and Isaac, in 1648. He was deacon of the First Congregational Church in Rochester, of which he and his wife, their son Experience and his wife, were original members. He was Town Treasurer in 1698 and several succeeding years. He died April 17, 1722, aged 82. His gravestone is still standing in the Old Cemetery at Rochester Center.

9314. 5. MARTIN. "Boston," Jan. 28, 1935. "Boston" asks me: "Can you supply proof (or suggestions) that Manasseh Martin, who removed to New York State (east bank of the Hudson River) in the 18th century, was a son of Manasseh in the Swansea-Rehoboth neighborhood?" Unfortunately, I can present evidence both for and against the idea of sonship.

First, I will state that the Manasseh Martin who died in Pawling Precinct, Dutchess County, N. Y., in 1775, was unquestionably the man who lived earlier in Swansea, married as his first wife Maribah Lake, and had these children born in Swansea in November, 1733, and July, 1745; Susan, Machir, Agrippa (mistakenly recorded Abner in Swansea Records, but definitely proved by Agrippa's own Bible and other irrefutable evidence to be Agrippa), Deborah, Amaziah, and Manasseh. The will probated in Dutchess County, May 22, 1775, names all these children and several others, including a daughter bearing the unusual name of Maritah, obviously for her mother.

I have a copy of the unpublished deed by which Manasseh Martin bought a farm in Dutchess County November, 1749, from Ebenezer Cole, who had removed from Swansea and bought that farm from the Crown in 1731.

Manasseh's youngest child was Aaron, whose descendants migrated less than many of the other children and hence seemed able to preserve more family history. I have lately received this from a descendant of Aaron: "Manasseh was born in Massachusetts in 1706 and

light on the parentage of an illegitimate child to be called before ecclesiastical or legal officials?"

A Deborah Cole, daughter of Hug' (3) Cole (Hugh 2, James 1) and Deborah Buckland, was born in Swansea in 1682, and remained unmarried until 1712, when she married her kinsman John Cole as his second wife. Was there a reason for her not making an earlier more desirable marriage? Or did the older Manasseh marry another Deborah Cole who died when her son was an infant? I have accumulated a mass of records of Coles who lived in Swansea but did not break into Swansea Records nor any of the Cole genealogies.

The younger Manasseh deeded land in 1739 in which he described himself as a carpenter (as he did in his will, also) and had Jonathan (4) Cole (Benjamin 3, Hugh 2, James 1) for one of the two witnesses. The Ebenezer Cole who sold his land to the younger Manasseh in Dutchess County was a brother of this Jonathan (4) Cole.

Hugh (2) Cole (James 1) had seven children recorded in Plymouth. He removed to Swansea before 1676, but no children are recorded there, though the E. B. Cole genealogy assigns several, and there would still be space for a daughter Deborah (though of course we have no trace of one). Hugh (2) Cole was a Baptist and a carpenter. The younger Manasseh was both, and served on the building committee when a Baptist Church was organized at South Dover, N. Y., soon after he moved to that vicinity.

The record which complicates the situation so exasperatingly is this, written by the older Manasseh Martin in "The Book Grantham," a volume on g Baptist doctrine used by the John Martin family for recording family data: "october ye 6th 1706 Manasseh Martin and hannah Carpenter was married and this was written March ye 5th 1722 or 3." This marriage date is six weeks earlier than the recorded birth-date of the younger Manasseh. Of course this was written seventeen years later, and he may have forgotten his wedding-date. However, this Manasseh announced himself to be "in reasonable health" when he made his brief will Feb. 5, 1728-9, in which he made his wife Hannah sole heir and executrix. He died in Warwick, R. I., March 20, 1754, and his wife Hannah, seven years his junior, married his successor in the Baptist pulpit.

"Boston" says he finds this man signed his name "Manasses" on original documents. Do any of these documents shed light on this problem? I have copies of two deeds filed at Taunton: (1) On Sept. 8, 1720, Manasseh and Hannah Martin of Rehoboth sold for 280 pounds land inherited from his father. (2) On Feb. 7, 1728-9, Manasseh and Hannah Martin of Warwick, R. I., sold for 120 pounds to Job Carpenter Hannah's share in her father's homestead in Swansea, etc.

I have already referred to the only deed I have found at Taunton given by the younger man, who signed himself, "Manasseh Martin." I have decided to give the details of this deed, in hope that it may indicate to some reader that grantor's parentage: "Book No. 31, p. 31—To all People, etc. I Manasha Martin of Swanzy, Carpenter—In Consideration of the sum of Twenty Pounds paid by Saml. Wheton of sd. Swanzy, yeoman . . . give Grant etc. a Certain Piece of Land, being ye one half of four acres of land, formerly granted to Mr. Timothy Brooks on Mattapolset (?) river in Swanzy . . . To build a sawmill on sd. river at ye upper falls . . . sd. 4 acres of land was in Partnership with Nathaniel Bla-

first grist mill at the mouth of the Moosauick river." He removed to Old Warwick, 1650, "and at the head of Mill Cove built a grist mill for the settlers." (Westcott Genealogy, 1932, pages 144-151.)

Thomas Stafford (1682-1765) who married 1707 Anne Greene (1688-1718) was the last of the seven children of Amos and Mary; Patience (above) was the sixth child. (Westcott Genealogy, page 152.)

2. STAFFORD, DAVIS. Hannah Stafford, born 1776, married first 1795 Robert Durfee, born 1772; married second John Davis. She was daughter of Thomas Stafford (1735-1816) and Rebecca Hill. Thomas was son of Samuel Stafford (1692-1752) and Hannah Bennett; Samuel was son of Amos and Mary (query 1.) (See Westcott Genealogy, pages 144, 147, 148.) R. L. W.

9777. BUNDY. B. B. P., Jan. 30, 1935. Are you sure Peter Bundy was born in Salem, Mass.? My recollection is that Bundy does not appear on Salem records. There were Bundys in Boston and Taunton, Mass.

Avery Genealogy, 1907: "Ephraim Avery married Abigail Bill. In his will, dated Jan. 1, 1790, calls himself of Montague, Mass. . . names wife Abigail and daughters Bathsheba, wife of Peter Bundy," and others. This is the Peter Bundy who died in Otsego Co., N. Y. Their daughter Rebecca married Elisha Shepard of Otego and Oneonta Plains, Otsego Co., N. Y.

According to Preston, Conn., Vital Records, Peter Bundy married July 14, 1746, Priscilla Prentiss, both of Preston. They had children: Esther, born Aug. 16, 1752; Peter, born Sept. 11, 1754; Elisha, born Oct. 6, 1760.

Esther Bundy married Henry Shepard of Canterbury and Coventry, Conn., and had son Elisha, born Oct. 4, 1772, Canterbury, Conn. They removed to Otego, N. Y. (see History of Otego), possibly by way of Massachusetts. His son Elisha married Rebecca Bundy.

History of Otego, N. Y., 1907, gives: "Peter and Elisha Bundy, brothers, came from Montgomery, Mass., in spring of 1787." Ephraim Avery above was of Montgomery, Mass., 1796.

I think the Peter Bundy born Sept. 11, 1754, is the one who married Bathsheba Avery and removed to Otego, N. Y.

I have a memorandum of a deed "James Bundy of Preston, Conn., to my son Peter Bundy of Preston," dated Jan. 13, 1748, recorded at Preston, Conn., L6, page 142. Peter Bundy conveys this land Nov. 25, 1749, (L6, page 180).

Elbridge Gerry was a member but was descended from Stephen Gerry, who was in Charlestown, Mass., as early as 1668 as a servant to Hon. Richard Russell.

His son Stephen (2) (posthumous), born about 1691-92, went to Taunton, Mass., and there married Mary, daughter of Eleazer and Elizabeth (Crane) Gilbert. They were the parents of Elijah Gary, called Major Elijah, due to his service in the militia. Major Elijah married, Dec. 16, 1742, Ruth, daughter of William and Mary (Abbe) Hoskins, and this couple were the parents of Seth, who married Zilpah Pierce.

In 1884 a man who professed to make a correct copy of Martin records from the Swansea record-book sent this to a Martin searcher who is still searching: "Maunassah, son of Maunassah and Deborah Martin, born Nov. 20, 1706." Great was my astonishment to receive this record in 1933 from Mr. Almy, Swansea town clerk: "Manasseh, son of Manasseh Martin and Deborah Cole, was born November 20th, 1706." Mr. Almy assured me that this was copied from the "original" record book. Why was Deborah's surname omitted when copies were made for printing? A genealogist whose attention I called to this matter said that a greater mystery was, why was Deborah's surname included in the birth record of her son? He was so skeptical that he drove down to Swansea to verify Mr. Almy's report, found it correct, and then decided this must indicate an illegitimate child.

There was only one Manasseh Martin to be the father in this record. He was the one born in 1681 to John and Joanna Martin; he continued to live in that same neighborhood for years, had a nephew (son of Ephraim Martin) named for him, and was ordained a minister in the Baptist church. I wish some reader, whether interested in Martins or not, would tell me whether the Swansea Baptist church records of 1706 have been preserved. 3778. I. MARTIN, COLE, N. C. P.,  
Sept. 9, 1932. In connection with my  
original query as to Manassah Martin  
and Deborah Cole, I give the following  
additional data.

In the Swansea Records, Book B, page  
97, is found: "Manassah, the son of Ma-  
nassah Martin & Deborah Cole was born  
November 20th, 1705-6." Neither of these  
Manassahs is that Manassah Martin, son  
of John and Joan (Esten) Martin, who  
was born Feb. 2, 1681, married Hannah  
Carpenter, described himself in a deed  
as a "weaver" but was also a Baptist  
minister, and whose will shows that he  
was childless. My Manassah might pos-  
sibly be the son of a John Martin men-  
tioned casually in the fragmentary Re-  
hoboth records as a land holder and as  
a member of a corner's jury. Or he might  
be the son of the "Widow Martyn" of  
Hingham whose estate was probated in  
1665. Will anyone having access to the  
Suffolk Probate Records tell me who were  
the heirs of this widow Martin?

Deborah Cole's lineage is also a mys-  
tery. She perhaps descends from James  
Cole, early in Plymouth, several members  
of whose family removed to Swansea and  
were Baptists, as were the Martins. Hugh  
(3) Cole (James 1, Hugh 2; married Debor-  
ah — and had a daughter Deborah,  
but she was too young to belong here.  
The only other Deborah Cole I found be-  
came the second wife of John Cole, Jr.,  
James Cole had, besides Hugh, sons John,  
James and Ebenezer whose descendants  
of that period I have not been able to  
trace fully, though I shall introduce an  
Ebenezer Cole into this article.

I have found only one other record  
about my first Manassah Martin. In the  
Bristol Co., Mass., Registry of Deeds,  
Northern District (Taunton, Mass.), Book  
No. 31, p. 231, I find a deed given by  
"Manasha Martin of Swanzeey, carpenter,"  
on March 11, 1739-40. He states "Sd. 4  
acres of land was in Partnership with  
Nathl. Biagrove, Esq. & Saml. Wheaton."  
Jonathan Cole was one of the witnesses,  
and Manassah's wife was not mentioned,  
hence was probably not living.

Swansea Records, Book B, page 194  
give this: "Manasseth Martin & Maribe  
Lake were married the 18 of July 1733."  
"Maribe" (Maribah) Lake was the daugh-  
ter of John and Susanna (Case) Lake. The  
Swansea Records list the following chil-  
dren she bore to Manassah: Susan,  
Machir, Agrippa (wrongly recorded  
Abner), Deborah, Amaziah, and Manass-  
ah (3).

Manassah (2) removed to Quaker Hill,  
Pawling Precinct, Dutchess Co., N. Y.,  
where he bought land from Ebenezer  
Cole and wife Mary Cole. Ebenezer had  
bought it June 8, 1731, and sold it to  
Manassah Nov. 1, 1749 (decd). In New  
York Maribah had four more children,  
Anna, Meribah, Ephraim and James  
(Bible and will; I have not found the  
date of her death.

Manassah (2) Martin married, second,  
Sarah (Martin) Marsh, widow of John  
Marsh. She had six children by her first  
marriage, and bore Manassah four: John  
(born 1758), Asa, George and Aaron. The  
house which Manassah (2) built near  
Quaker Hill was originally large, but it  
is not surprising to find various addi-  
tions built to it. Manassah's will, dated  
Aug. 19, 1771, and probated May 22, 1775,  
describes him as a carpenter.

Sarah, second wife of Manassah (2)  
Martin, was of a distinct Martin family.

3779. 1. MARTIN, COLE. N. C. P., Sept. 9, 1932. In connection with my original query as to Manassah Martin and Deborah Cole, I give the following additional data.

In the Swansea Records, Book B, page 97, is found: "Manassah, the son of Manassah Martin & Deborah Cole was born November 20th, 1705-6." Neither of these Manassahs is that Manassah Martin, son of John and Joan (Ester) Martin, who was born Feb. 2, 1681, married Hannah Carpenter, described himself in a deed as a "weaver" but was also a Baptist minister, and whose will shows that he was childless. My Manassah might possibly be the son of a John Martin mentioned casually in the fragmentary Rehoboth records as a land holder and as a member of a corner's jury. Or he might be the son of the "Widow Martyn" of Hingham whose estate was probated in 1655. Will anyone having access to the Suffolk Probate Records tell me who were the heirs of this widow Martyn?

Deborah Cole's lineage is also a mystery. She perhaps descends from James Cole, early in Plymouth, several members of whose family removed to Swansea and were Baptists, as were the Martins. Hugh (3) Cole (James 1, Hugh 2) married Deborah — and had a daughter Deborah, but she was too young to belong here. The only other Deborah Cole I found became the second wife of John Cole, Jr. James Cole had, besides Hugh, sons John, James and Ebenezer whose descendants of that period I have not been able to trace fully, though I shall introduce an Ebenezer Cole into this article.

I have found only one other record about my first Manassah Martin. In the Bristol Co., Mass., Registry of Deeds, Northern District (Taunton, Mass.), Book No. 31, p. 231. I find a deed given by

Susanna North, who was one of the victims of the witchcraft madness at Salem. George (2) Martin and his second wife name unknown to me (can any reader supply it?); George (3) Martin and second wife, Mercy Durkee (was she daughter of William Durkee, the hattermaker and his wife Martha Cross?); Sarah Martin married first John Marsh of Wingham Co., Conn., and they removed to Dutchess Co., N. Y., where this first husband died, and she became the second wife of Manassah (2) Martin. Sarah's will was probated May 15, 1755. She named her Martin children and the children of her first marriage; John Marsh, Mercham (elsewhere called Alahorn) Marsh, Sarah Lake, Susannah Martin (whose surname had been Marsh before she married her stepbrother Amasa Martin), Mary Cole and Hannah Ellis. I wonder what Cole family Mary Marsh married into.

After this long dissertation, it may be advisable to repeat that my desire is to learn the parentage of Manassah Martin and his wife Deborah Cole. N. C. P.

John Grommon, Martin Elmer, John Brunson, Obed Harvey, John Tuesdale, Abel Sprague, John Millerton, Marcy Harvey, Damaris Grommon, Sarah Norton; desired to be let off a Church by themselves: In answer to which, the Church sent Elder Waldo, Deac. - June 4 Daniel and Sarah Ross mentioned above still remaining obstinate, the Church fully Secluded them from their Membership for the above Offences.

May 16 A Difficulty: Settled: by Lydia Palmer, She making a Retraction of her being uneasy with the Government of the Church, in February the 5th 1767, in that the Church Judgeth of a Brothers Liberality to our Elder.
- July 3 Joshua Agard accused David Cumins that he refused to an honest Settlement of Accounts with him; Wherefore the Church sent Thomas Shelden, Eliab Wilcox and Fenner Palmer to enquire into it.
- Aug. 6 The Church having heard a Rumour that Cumfort Shaw had walked disorderly, they sent Benjamin Stevens, Agrippa Martin and John Shelden to enquire there into.
- Sept. 3 Benjamin Stevens, Agrippa Martin and John Shelden made Returns, they had left the above Rumour settled.

## Dealings with offending Members.

- 1767  
Sept. 3 Thomas Sheldon, Eliab Wilcox and Fenner Palmer make returns to the Church that they find Naught whereof to accuse Daniel Cummins as alledged against him by Joshua Agard heretofore.
- Oct. 1 Sarah Harden having for a long time neglected to assemble with the Church, they sent Daniel Lake to enquire thereinto: who made returns that through much Trouble and some Lukewarmness, She had neglected it, which She purposed to reform.
- Nov. 15 An uneasiness being manifested to the Church against Sabre Hunt that She had taken to much strong drink, together with her Lightness occasioned thereby; the which She Confessed, and proposed to bear Testimony against, where the same was done, the which the Church appointed Daniel Odel, Agrippa Martin and Timothy Fuller to hear.

Jan. 7 The last mentioned Men (viz) Daniel Odel, Agrippa Martin, and Timothy Fuller; made their returns the above accused Sabre Hunt had sufficiently bore Testimony against her taking to much strong Drink, the other Difficulties were alledged against her that could not be proved: wherefore the Church, after diligent enquiry, acquitted her.

Jan. 4 Thomas Barns having for a long time not assembled with the Church, it was voted that Elder Waldo should enquire of him the Reason thereof. Elder Waldo said that he had took an opportunity with Thomas Barns, and he proposed to reform his neglect in that Duty.

Elisabeth Whiteleys Evidence.

**Martin** said Jewit sent him to the widow Whiteleys after his Note he had seen Whiteley at Capt. Prestons and paid the money to Whiteley and took a receipt - seven years ago.

**Martin** told the Church he had the money of Samuel Stevens for making a cart and paid it to Whiteley at John Prestons and took a receipt.

(Esq. Jewitt and Esq. Casey supposed the said receipt was forged).

**MATTOON**, JOHN E. of Canaan Four Corners; son of **William S.** of Canaan, b. 1808, d. 1865 (m. Margaret Short), son of **Christopher** of Canaan, b. 1774, d. 1843 (m. 1802 Naomi Smith), served in war of 1812, orderly sergeant in company of State troops; son of **Charles** of Ballston, New York. **MATTOON**, JOHN H. and **THAD-DEUS H.** and **BENJAMIN F.** and **ANDREW E.** and **EDWIN O.** of Canaan; sons of **Benjamin** of Canaan, b. 1809, d. 1871 (m. 1839 Phebe C. Short); son of **Christopher** of Canaan, b. 1774, d. 1843 (m. 1802 Naomi Smith), served in war of 1812, orderly sergeant in company of State troops; son of **Charles** of Ballston, New York. [804]

**MEAD**, DAVID M. of North Chatham, b. 1838 (m. 1872 Anna Babcock); son of **PETER MEAD** of North Chatham, b. 1813 (m. 1836 Susan C. Pulver); son of **Claude D.** of Upper Red Hook, b. 1766, d. 1800. [805]

**MEAD**, GEORGE C. of Flat Brook; son of **Daniel A.** of Coxsackie, b. New Jersey, 1792, d. 1850 (m. Eleanor C. Hallenbeck), quarter-master in war of 1812; son of **DANIEL MEAD**, born in England, 1729, came to America, served in Rev. army (m. Phebe Price, b. 1719, d. 1831), died in July, 1809. [806]

**MELLEN**, WILLIAM HENRY and **LOVETT RUSSELL** and **CHRISTOPHER MARSH** and **JOHN STODDARD** of Hudson; sons of **William Henry** of Pittsfield, Mass., and Hudson, N. Y., b. 1766, d. 1826 (m. 1791 Lucretia, dau. of Perez Marsh, M. D., of Dalton, Mass.); son of **James** of Hopkinton and Mendon, Mass., b. 1739, d. 1812 (m. Elizabeth Russell of Holliston, Mass.), lieut.-col., one of Washington's staff, officer of the day when André was executed; son of **Thomas** (m. Elizabeth ——). [807]

**MELIUS**, EGBERT of Hudson; son of **Jonas** of Livingston, b. 1823, d. 1867 (m. 1851 Jane E. Minkler); son of **Jonas** of Livingston (m. Catharine Best), served as high private in war of 1812; son of **Peter**. [808]

**MELIUS**, MYRON of Ghent; son of **LUTHER MELIUS** of Ghent, b. 1840 (m. Sarah E. Link); son of **SYLVESTER MELIUS** of Ghent, b. 1815 (m. Milenna Howard); son of **Adam** of Ghent, b. 1784, d. 1851 (m. Sallie Waltermire); son of **ANTHONY MELIUS**, who emigrated from Germany and settled on the land now owned by his descendants. [809]

**MELIUS**, NORMAN SYLVESTER and **LYMAN BROWN** of Copake; sons of **SYLVESTER MELIUS** of Copake, b. 1817 (m. Maria Lampman); son of **Andrus** of Copake, b. 1780, d. 1854 (m. Christina Clum); son of **Jacob** of Copake, b. about 1732, d. about 1846 (m. 1st, ——, 2nd, Catharine ——), whose ancestor was among the early settlers of Dutchess county. [810]
