



# Daniel Reed Dies At 83

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Rep. Daniel A. Reed, who served longer in Congress than any other Republican member, died today at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. He was 83.

Reed, who was also senior GOP member of the tax-writing House Ways & Means Committee, had entered the hospital 14 weeks ago for treatment of an infected foot.

Reed liked to describe himself as an old-fashioned Republican. He was strong for high tariffs and low-taxes.

His views on these matters brought him into sharp conflict with President Eisenhower, who was the seventh President to oc- MAJOR cupy the White House since Reed entered Congress in 1918.

Reed was a strapping six-footer who once played and coached football at Cornell.

He was born-on Sept. 15, 1875 at Sheridan, N. Y. He attended public schools and was graduated from Cornell with a law degree in 1898. He stayed on at Cornell for several years to coach the Big Red football team.

Reed was elected to Congress from New York's 43rd District on Nov. 5, 1918, six days before the end of World War I.

He is survived by his widow and a son, William, now with Standard Oil of Indiana.



Also, he was on the state committee of the Farmers Home Administration and served as a director of the Wayne County Agricultural Society for more than 20 years, and was its president from 1947 to 1950.

#### Active In Grange

Mr. Lehman was born in Wayne County Aug. 19, to Frederick and Mary Langell Lehman and married Arlene Eby Aug. 18, 1921.

He had lived all his life in Wayne County and in addition to his political interests, was active in grange organizations on local, state and national levels.

In 1963 he was appointed a member of the Wayne County Selective Service Board and was vice chairman at the time of his death. His appointment was approved by both the governor of Ohio and President John F. Kennedy.

He belonged at one time to Wooster Rotary and also to the Wayne Farm Bureau.

A charter member of the Canaan Pomona Grange, the Ohio Granges, and the national organization, he had served as deputy master of the county grange association and organized four of the local subordinate granges. He had received numerous state and national awards for his accomplishments.

He was a Canaan Twp, trustee from 1930 to 1935 and was president of the Wayne County association of township trustees and clerks, as well as having served as a member of the state legislative committee of the organization.







Reed was a strapping six-footer who once played and coached football at Cornell.

He was born on Sept. 15, 1875 at Sheridan, N. Y. He attended public schools and was graduated from Cornell with a law degree in 1898. He stayed on at Cornell for several years to coach the Big Red football team.



## Ex-Woosterian, Inventor, Dead At Age Of 91

DECATUR, Ill. (UPI) -John Leon Bennett, 91, an inventive genius who helped introduce the wire fly swatter and metal beer can to American life, died Sat-
