

"An American Century"

Grace Edith was born 6 December 1898 to Zeno and Dora Miller on a farm in Canaan Township, Wayne County, Ohio. Her mother died when she was three and at the age of twelve Grace went to live with her paternal grandparents, Michael and Catherine Miller, in Creston, Ohio. She graduated from Creston High School in 1917, attended Wooster College and Ohio University and taught school for six years before her marriage to John B. Garver of Strasburg on 21 June 1923. Formerly a member of the Jackson Presbyterian Church, Grace joined the Strasburg United Brethren Church shortly after her marriage. In 1925 the church choir was organized with Grace as the director; she continued in that capacity for over sixty years. She worked in the children's departments of the church and at different times was teacher of the women's Otterbein Class. She was active in many community organizations. In 1929 Grace assisted in starting the first Kindergarten, Strasburg Schools. She was a charter member of the Women's Club of Strasburg. She was also a charter member and past president of The Ladies Auxiliary to Charles Hofer American Legion Post No. 522. Grace was active in musical circles, including being a seventy year member of the McDowell Music Study Club. As a charter member and later member of the Board of Directors, she was active in organizing the Tuscarawas County Philharmonic Society. She also performed as soprano co-soloist with the Tuscarawas County Philharmonic Orchestra. Grace was past county president of the Parent Teachers Association, a member and past Worthy Matron of Cypress Chapter No. 540, Order of the Eastern Star, and Deputy Grand Matron of District 14, O.E.S. With her husband, she was a charter member of the Strasburg Dramatic Club, playing a lead role in "January Thaw." She

was active in the Republican Party and attended the Republican National Conventions in 1956 and 1960 with 16th District Delegate and husband, John Garver. After John's retirement in 1962 from the Garver Bros. Company store they enjoyed traveling, fishing, and gardening together. John died in 1983 at the age of eighty-seven. In 1978 she was honored as Sesquicentennial Queen of Strasburg's 150th anniversary. In 1992, Grace was recipient of the Strasburg United Methodist Church AGAPE Award.

Grace is the mother of three children, Elizabeth Garver Jolie, Jo Garver Bichsel, and John B. Garver, Jr. She has thirteen grandchildren and twenty-six great-grandchildren.

At 100, she continues her active life, enjoying family and friends. Her many talents, wonderful disposition, and joy in finding goodness and beauty in the world, have been an inspiration to all who know her.

Grace Garver's love of life is exemplified in the following poetic lines by Angela Morgan:

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## MEMOIRS OF THE MARVIN & YOUNG FAMILIES

#### Robert F. Mehrling

This is a portion of the memoirs of Angeline (Mrs. William L.) Long, nee (Sarah)Angeline Young written in her own hand at her home in Columbus, Ohio, on January 29, 1930, at the request of her daughter, Gertrude Rang. The original is now in possession of Mrs. Rang's grandaughter, Laura Wilson, of Santa Fe, New Mexico. Mrs. Long was the grandaughter of Stephen and Sarah B. Marvin and great grandaughter of Isaac and Hannah Marvin whose families settled in Shelby, Ohio in 1818.

#### MARVINS

"My grandfather, Mr. Stephen Marvin, and my grandmother, Sarah Burr \_\_\_\_\_\_, were married, April 5, 1818, in Connecticut at Saugatuck, a suburb of Bridgeport. Grandfather was twenty one and Grandma would be eighteen her next birthday in June. They immediately started on their wedding journey with an ox team carrying their worldly goods. My great grandmother, Deborah Burr Moyer, came with them. My great uncle, Silas and his wife, Judy, also. I am almost certain grandfather's father and mother came in the same party. There were three other families in the group of pioneers, the Wilsons, Whitneys and Smileys. They were six weeks making the trip. The last twenty miles they had to cut their road through the then wilderness in Ohio to the present site of Shelby, Sharon Township, Richland County. Great Uncle Silas settled on a place two miles east of Shelby. I also think my great grandfather had his farm perhaps a quarter of a mile east of Uncle Silas. I remember visiting these two farm homes when I was four years old. At that time Uncle Hiram Marvin lived there and they always spoke of it as the old Marvin place. My mother, Angeline Marvin, was the first white child born in Sharon Township. She was born, March 10, 1819. There were twelve other children born to this couple, namely: Burr, Charles, Daniel, Eleanor, Edwin (these two died very young), Hiram, Jane, Ellen, John, Laura, George, and Emily. The rest grew up. Several lived to an old age--past eighty. My grandfather was a tanner and shoemaker as well as a good farmer. He carried on all three of these trades. Grandmother Marvin was so sweet and kind every one loved her. She lived to her seventy eighth year.

"My great grandmother was Deborah Burr, a full cousin of the famous (or infamous, as you will) Aaron Burr. She was a woman of determined character and versatile attainments--was well educated, a tasteful milliner. She taught school several years at Milan, Ohio. My mother spent quite some time with her grandmother to have the advantage of the school there. Either Mr. Wilson or my grandfather built the first large frame house in Shelby. I think grandfather's was first. He put twenty-five thousand bricks in the chimney. There was a wide fire place in the kitchen that would take a six foot back log. There was a brick oven built in at the side. There were two other fire places on the first floor, three more on the second. The house was built in 1833. Uncle Silas was a cabinet maker and he supplied most of the furniture. The half of the upper floor was partitioned with folding doors so it could be used as a ball-room or for community gatherings. The home still stands at 57 N. Gamble at Shelby, Ohio.

"Uncle Daniel went to California in the Gold Rush. I guess he didn't get much gold. He and Uncle George were seriously wounded in the Civil War at the Battle of Stone River. In 1868, my grandparents reached their fifty years of wedded life and held open house for three days. There was ample entertainment for all comers. My grandfather died the following August of an acute illness."

#### YOUNGS

"Downing Howard Young, my father, was born in West Virginia. When he was two years old the family came to Holmes County, Ohio. He had seven sisters and nine brothers. He loved his mother but did not get along well with his father. He was a delicate boy as regards to health, perhaps his mother shielded him. His father, having such a family to provide for, may not have had enough love and patience to encompass them all. My father ran away from home when he was sixteen years old and made his own living from then on. Having had but six months in school but being ambitious and observing, he became very well educated. He was admitted to the Bar when still a young man. The earliest account of his family origin, that there were two boys left orphans, George and Charles Young--just where I don't remember having heard. One boy was brought up by a Welsh family. I think it was Charles was adopted by a Scotch family. Father was from the Scotch branch. His maternal grandmother was Bridget Brannon, born in County Down, Ireland. That's all I know so far. Of his own brothers and sisters, I knew two sisters and one brother. Aunt Phoebe Wagner came to visit us a few times in New Haven. She

had one son; he married and lived near Greenwich, Huron County, several years. Her two daughters died young. I've forgotten this cousin's given name. He and his wife came to see us at New Haven several times. Once they came bringing with them a young girl named Laura Critchfield. She was a grandaughter of father's brother, Lemuel. She had a striking resemblance to Ella Howard, my sister Mira's only daughter. I never saw her again. Father's brother Wesley, visited us at New Haven--a nice old man with a young second wife. About the year 1865 or6 one of Uncle Wesley's sons, Nathan Young, an ex-Civil War veteran, with his wife and two pretty little girls came to New Haven to live. He bought the house opposite where Aunt Cele lived, built a shop and set up in the harness business. They lived there about ten years. We always enjoyed their company. They had another little girl in N.H. named Grace. After leaving they had a boy and three other girls. We've always kept in touch with that family.

"Father's sister, Elizabeth, lived several years with father and mother, until she married Joseph Ruckman. I might mention here that father took care of his mother in her last days. She died at his home in Shelby. Aunt Elizabeth Ruckman lived on a farm south of Plymouth with her family of ten children, only five miles from our New Haven home. So we knew them well.

"Father and mother were married, September 4, 1837. He was just twenty-one and she was past eighteen years. Downing Howard Young and Angeline Marvin--their children:
