CANAAN — This cross-roads hamlet is the center of an area where, for nearly a century and a half, the people wagons, brought their families and of the community have successfully proven that it is a modern "land of Canaan" which conforms to the biblical description of the promised land "flowing with

and honey." Not only have its fertile acres been fruitful in their yields of grain and a diversity of farm products, but a citizenry with a pronounced determination to educate

its sons and daughters, has produced outstanding leaders in the

A FARM WEST of town Joseph the home of the pioneer, Stratton, who came here with his family in 1817. One of their fourteen children was Mark Stratton, who in 1835 married a Wayne county woman, Mary Schallenberger, of near Burbank. Mark and his bride went to North Manches-Mark and ter, Ind., where they established a home. They were the parents of Gene Stratton-Porter, noted novelist, whose gripping stories of romance and authoritative studies of bird life are still popular a quarter of a century after her death. Mrs. Porter died from injuries suffered in an automobile accident in Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 6, 1924. Descendants of her father's brothers and sisters continue to reside Canaan township and other parts of Wayne county. Included in her principal works were "The parts of Wayne county. Included in her principal works were "The Harvester," "A Girl of the Limberlost," "Freckles," and "Laddie."

BENJAMIN R. SHAW, blind music teacher, born in Canada, in 1827, came to Canaan as a suidaly widely.

young man, and was a widely known teacher of vocal music for many years. In addition, in earlier years, he wrote a deal of poetry, two volumes which were published.

His poems depict the sadness and deep feeling which characterized the early part of his physical darkness.

In an interval when sight been partially restored, but when the curtain was again being drawn across his vision, he wrote "The Inquiry" including these lines:

The sunbeams are fading, all fading away,

How faintly and dimly they

blend; Each dark-flitting shadow, tremulous ray,

Is a herald of gloom ne'er to end.

How life was brightened sympathy and by unexpected kind-ness is reflected in a poem, "The Stranger's Letter" which included these lines:

The truth that stranger taught is Benjamin Shaw married Julania Hoisington, a sister of Wirum Hoisington, and a daughter of the pioneer, David Hoisington. Wirum Hoisington was the grandfather of Ernest Hoisington, who with his family, still resides on 40 acres of the original Hoisington acres, a mile south of Canaan. Benjamin Shaw died in 1900 and both he and wife are buried in Canaan

acres | cemetery.

Their son, Dr. Clement Burbank Shaw, who received his musical instruction primary from his talented father, became a world famous bass singer. For a number of years he headed a celebrated Boston, Mass. male quartette, which won fame in the concert world. His later years were spent in New York City, where he continued to sing until his final illness. He died in 1938 at the age of 80, and lies buried in Canaan cemetery.

A STUDENT IN Canaan Academy, where his grandfather was on the original board of directors, and where his father was principal for nearly two decades, was the late Dr. Jonas O. Notestein, who died in 1928 after more than fifty years as a member of the faculty at Wooster College. Thousands of Wooster students came under the influence of his fine personality, and during his many years of service at the College he was one of the leaders who built strong the foundations Presbyterian institution. He was up his life work there as a teacher of Latin. From 1903 until his death he had been Aylsworth Professor of Latin.

His daughters, Lucy Lillian and Margaret, and his son, Dr. Frank B. Notestein, continue to live in the family home on Burbank road. Lucy Lillian Notestein, who serves as a trustee of Wooster College, is a department editor of the Reader's Digest. Dr. Frank B. Notestein is a consulting geologist for The Texas Co. Margaret Notestein is a member of the Women's Advisory board at the College.

IN THE FALL of 1819, according to reminiscences of Isaac Notestine, as printed in the Doug-lass history, the first election was held in an ashery that stood nearly a mile south of the present village of Windsor (Canaan). The electors, as given from the memory of George Sommers, a citizen, but not a voter then, included William Ewa voter then, included william Ewing, Sr., William Ewing, Jr., Thomas Armstrong, Joseph and Daniel Stratton, Eleizer Perago, John Templeton, James Rose, B. F. Miller, James Buchanan, Joshua and William Reed, Thomas Thrapp, Nathan Hall, David Plumer, Dr. Barnes, Daniel Blocher.

The ashery referred to was located on the east side of the road, a short distance north of the present Ernest Hoisington home.

"If we plow a little too deep, we can still turn up ashes at a spot there," Mr. Hoisington said. At the ashery lye made with wood ashes was boiled down into potash which was in great demand at early tanneries.

Ernest Hoisington's great-grandfather, David Hoisington, and his brother, John in 1819, walked from

claim to a quarter section of land. They walked back to Vermont and the following year, with the aid of limited equipment to their new Ohio home.

Since the Hoisingtons are not in-

cluded in the names of first electors it is probable the voting took place after they had returned to Vermont following their first journey here.

WILLIAM EWING, who came in 1812 and built a cabin, was the first settler in the township. Ten years later some 25 to 30 families had located here. In the next ten years immigrants came in streams. so that by 1832 not more than 25 quarter sections of land suitable for living were unoccupied.

Early families included those of John McIlvaine, James Smith, Daniel Oller, Henry Kopp, Simon Kenney, James and William Haskins, Enoch Gilbert, John and Justin Wiles, John and David Hoisington, the Shanklins, Jonas Notestine, Henry Shuffling, John D. Heckert, David Wiles, John, Henry and Daniel Frank, Jason and Sylvanus Jones, Zenas Z. Crane, Joseph, Henry and Jacob Zuver.

Canaan Academy was one of the first institutions of learning established in Wayne county. The building, a two-story frame, 36x48, was erected in 1842 by a stock comgraduated with a class of 13 in pany. Heads of the principal fami-1873, the third class to complete lies of the neighborhood pledged its work, and immediately took and paid in the money required to erect the building and start the school.

In the Hoisington home there is a small wooden box which contains the papers reporting the early meetings of the board of trustees, and including receipts signed by Philip Van Doorn as treasurer of the academy fund, for various sums as they were paid in. There is a record there, too,

of a contract made in 1849 with the Presbyterians of the community by which the church group agreed to finish the second floor for an assembly room for religious meetings. Trustees who signed this agrement were John Parmenter, Jonas Notestine, Justin Wiles, Daniel Emerson, Wirum Hoisington, Dennis Shaw, Alfred Hotchkiss, C. C. Drake and John Barnard.

Members of the first board of trustees were Dr. John Paul, Jonas Notestine, Justin Mills, Harvey Rice and Alfred Hotchkiss. Alfred Hotchkiss was the grandfather of Harley Russell, now, at 80 years, the oldest resident of Canaan.

THE SCHOOL was opened December 3, 1843, with 47 pupils, under the instruction of C. C. Bomberger, A. B., who taught three years.

Rev. Thomas Barr and Barker had charge during the summer of 1847, succeeded in the winters of 1847 and 1848 by Prof. Isaac Notestine, who, except for short intervals, remained in charge until 1863. After that year the school was taught by a number of professors until 1875 when it was closed, Prof. J. W. Cummings been the last principal.

While Prof. Notestine was teaching, in the winters of 1851,

down, and during the following summer a new brick edifice was erected, which housed the academy until its final days.

The records show that to build this new building, 200 shares of additional stock, at \$5 a share, were issued, raising a total of \$1,000.

Canaan Academy was one several similar educational institutions in Wayne and Ashland counties in the days before and immediately after the Civil War.

These schools were founded and

cational standards who were among the pioneer citizens of the community. They could not afford to send their sons and daughters across the mountains to schools in the East. and chose the community academy close at hand as the best substitute for the more elaborate edu-"older" cational centers in the states along the Atlantic coast.

The University of Wooster, where the first building was erected in 1868, was among the church schools on a larger scale established in this part of Ohio in that same period. Manned by faculties of specialists in various fields of education, they quickly spelled the doom of the one-man academies such as Canaan.

There are a few people in the Canaan vicinity who recall the last days when Canaan Academy was in operation, and a great many more who well remember the old two-story brick building, which stood a quarter of a mile west of the square, on the north side of what is now State Route 604. It was torn down some 60 years ago. The site was just across the road from the barn on the Harley Russell farm, and the land is now owned by Charles Cowick.

Prof. Isaac Notestine, served longest as Canaan Academy principal, was a son of Jonas, Acadwho was a member of the original board of directors. The Notestine family lived on a farm north-east of Canaan, now owned by Bricker.

HISTORIAN Douglass writes of Isaac Notestine: "Mr. Notestine had a remarkable experience in the school room, and we deem it appropriate to classify him with such veterans in the service Brinkerhoff and Downing." (The Brinkerhoff referred to was John Brinkerhoff, who taught 13 consecutive years at Golden Corners and in later years was principal of a school in Wooster and a member of the faculty at Wooster Academy: the Downing was Joseph H. Downing, who was one of the original students enrolled at Canaan Academy in 1843, and who was a teacher for many years.)

The spelling of the Notestine name was changed by Dr. J. O. Notestein after he became a faculty member at Wooster College.

The site for the academy was donated by Harvey Rice, who was the grandfather of Mrs. J. W. Irvin, of Wooster, and the great grandfather of Mrs. Frank Snell. After it ceas-

poses it reverted to being of the original owner, but later was sold to Capt. W. P. Van Doorn. Harvey Rice lived in the last house in the north end of town, on the west side of the road. This house stands.

Fannie Hoisington and Sallie Kenney were cousins of Mrs. Ir win. Her sister, Mary, attended the academy, staying at the Dushene home. They fashioned a rest bench for her at a rail fence, half way on her way to academy because of her frail health.

The James Wallace on the academy Excelsior program was the father of DeWitt Wallace, publisher of The Reader's Digest at Pleasantville, N. Y., one of the outstanding and most widely circulated monthly magazines of the present day. James Wallace and J. O. Notestein were students at Canaan together, and Notestein married Margaret Wallace, a sister of Mr. Wallace.

BRICKS AND STONE from the demolished building were hauled away by persons who needed second hand building material, and much of it went into the construction of arches in Canaan township sugar camps, the making of maple stove blew up. syrup and sugar having been thriving industry here for many years. Only a small amount of syrup is produced now.

Ernest Hoisington's mother, who was Barbara Whitmore, came to Canaan, from-Lancaster county, Pa., when she was a girl of 17, accompanied by a relative, Mattie Hasler Lane, wife of Abe Lane. They spent their first night at the Canaan hotel, operated by a relative. Accustomed to the traditional slow-moving black-strap molasses of eastern Pennsylvania, ordinarily removed from the container with a "stick." they had their first experience with the native free-flowing, golden maple syrup. Barbara thought it was wonderful, but her companion was somewhat shocked at the manner in which diners used it at the hotel dinner table.

"The d-n hogs dip their molasses with a spoon," she exploded when the two had retired to their bedroom.

A MAJOR INDUSTRY in Canaan for many years was the carriage and wagon shop operated by Eli Snell. It was a complete plant, including a blacksmith shop, and employed a number of per- here.

men, such as Harris, a body man, [] and Hinderer, a painter, divided their time between this plant and the Gerstenslager buggy factory at Marshallville, which later moved to Wooster and was the parent plant of the present Gerstenslager Co., builders of truck bodies.

ANOTHER CANAAN industry started as a grist mill, and later. when purchased by Daniel Leighty. was changed into a saw mill. The machinery for the mill was sold to Frank Snyder and moved to Burbank, where it was used in a water-power mill just west of that town. Daniel Leighty and his son. Jacob, developed a thriving lumber business which continued in Canaan until some 15 years ago.

Frank Snell, who lives southwest of Canaan, and who played around the carriage shop of his father, Eli Snell, when he was a boy, recalls his father's version of an academy incident which established one particular student as an amateur Sherlock Holmes.

Students as a rule, lived in rooms in private homes. Each had a wood heating stove to warm his room, and to cut the cost of school-

ing, frugal fathers of students cut firewood and hauled it to Canaan for their sons to use. This student noted that his woodpile was diminishing too rapidly to be accounted for by his own consumption of wood, so he went to the Snell carriage shop to borrow a brace and bit. He explained to Mr. Snell who was a liberal supporter of the school, that he was going to drill a hole in the end of a piece of stovewood, put some powder in it and close the opening. He did so and placed the "loaded" chunk at the point where wood seemed to be disappearing.

Two days later a citizen of the town not particularly known for his industry, reported that his heating

MR. SNELL ALSO reports that when "Hank" Snyder operated a store which was run in connection with the old hotel property, he followed the custom of trading "store goods" for farm products. One year the whole upper floor of the store was filled with sacks of dried plies he had taken in trade. Later the dried apples were shipped to Pittsburgh, Pa. These apples came from the farm orchards in the neighborhood, were fruit grew bountifully in the days before insect infestation made spraying a necessary part of fruit culture.

THE OUTBREAK of the Civil War brought great activity at Canaan, and this community responded in a big way in the matter of Approximately volunteers. young men went into service from here, forming what became Com-bany K, 16th Ohio Voluntary In-lantry. This fighting unit, later mown for its fine discipline, served three full years and took part in humerous hard battles. It suffered great losses in an attack upon the impregnable Confederate positions at · Vicksburg. Capt. Van Doorn was among those wounded

October 8th, the anniversary of the day in 1861 when the company left Canaan, was the time for the annual reunion of Company K, held for many years. One of the youngest soldiers in the unit was Milton Reed, who spent his last years in Wooster. Capt. Van Doorn also moved to Wooster from Canaan, living on North Market st. near St. James Episcopal church.

A FIFE AND DRUM trio, composed of Dr. G. W. Littell, fifer, Frank Feeman, drummer, and Dan Marshall, bass drummer, won a wide reputation for its martial music. This unit had served with the 16th regiment during the war, and following the mustering out of the military unit, the trio played at regimental gatherings, at Memorial Day cere-Day ceremonies here and elsewhere, and at numerous special events.

Capt. Van Doorn was desirous of having the trio continue beyond the lives of the original trio and he organized a young fife and drum group, which included Frank Snell, Rev. Frank Lane, Bert Bechtel and Jacob Snell. Andrew Bechtel, for a time, played the bass drum for this group.

Best known of the original tric was Littell, who in later years operated a drug store in Creston and served as post master there from 1880 to 1885.

REPRESENTATIVES of families whose lives have been identified with the community for

many years are residents of Canaan today.

One is Miss Effie Sell, who lives in the north end of town. Her father, Frank Sell, was funeral director.

Another is Harley Russell, 80, whose home, probably the oldest house in town, is at the extreme west end of the village. He operates part of the original farm of Alfred and Sarah Hotchkiss, who came into Canaan some 130 years ago. They cleared a place in the woods at the south end of the farm for their first crude cabin home, and a few years later built the present house. Their daughter, Emily, married Thomas Russell, who was a native of Canada, and Harley was one of three sons born to this marriage. The others were U. A. Russell, who spent most of his life in Wooster, and Henry, who died at Canaan.

HARLEY RUSSELL, more than 50 years ago, went to California, and worked for four years in the Mojave desert, at the huge borax deposit where Twenty Mule Team borax was made. He returned to Canaan, and has lived there ever since. Mrs. Russell was Golda Tot-ten. They have one son and three daughters, Robert, in Mary, wife of Frank Gerstenslager, Creston; Robert, in Creston; Mary, wife of Frank Gerstenslager, Creston; Lillian Miner in Barberton, and Ercell, who disappeared without a trace two years ago. There are five grandchildren.

THE THIRD representative pioneer families is Clinton J. Orr, 77, whose home is at the extreme east end of town. Mrs. Orr was the former Daisy Hawk. Mr. Orr is a grandson of Hugh Orr, one of five brothers who fled from Ireland during a rebellion in 1801. Two of those five brothers were never heard from again, but the other three made their way America. Descendants of one of them were the founders of Orrville. Hugh Orr, on coming Wayne county, first settled in East Union township, but in 1830 moved to Canaan, to a farm some three miles west of Canan Center. There their son, James Orr, was born and lived a busy and useful life. Clinton Orr is a son of James Orr, and was born and reared on the same farm. He lived there until retiring from active ment of the farm 28 years ago.

Russell and Mr. Orr, be-Mr. tween them recall numerous storekeepers in Canaan, including Yoder, Marshall, Bowers, and the present owner, A. S. Reber, who came from Apple Creek some 15 years ago and has built a tremendous business in foodstuffs, featuring a wide variety of meats.

Well remembered Canaan blacksmiths are Ramsey Hart, Unger, and Theodore Darrah.
DR. A. C. KNESTRICK, physi-

cian in Wooster for many years, started his medical career in Canaan. The last doctor the town had was C. M. Hanna, who left in 1913 and died three years later in Creston.

The only church in Canaan at present is the Methodist, Rev. H. E. Stout, of Burbank, being the

Eighty years ago there was a Reformed church in the north end

of town. Later this building was purchased by the Presbyterians, and used by them for a church. When a new Presbyterian church replaced another destroyed by fire at Jackson, the Canaan church was discontinued. The property was unused for years, and later was designated as a community center. Canaan Grange uses it for meeting place, and other community events are held there. A new furnace is now being installed and other improvements are in prog-

OLDEST RESIDENTS recall two bands in Canaan, one which was organized in the eighties, and the other in 1897. In 1902 this band made a trip to Washington D. C., where it played at a National Guard convention. One of its engagements was at the last street fair held in Orrville, where, with the Maysville band, it escorted the redoubtable Carrie Nation from the depot to a platform where she delivered a fiery anti-saloon dress.

Serving the community for many years as a notary public was "Tip Slutz, who was also a school teacher. He performed various services just below the grade of lawyer, just below the grade of for people of the community. 

The Chapman law does not shorten. the terms of any elective officers, but all of such officers, not including a Justice of the Peace, will hold over after the expiration of their respective term until the first Monday of January next following such operation of term.

That part of section 1448, which refers to the "next annual election after the passage of this act" relating to the tirat election under the original section and not the amended section. It does not in any way change the tenure of existing treasurers and clerks, except as to the right to hold over as above stated.



A GUILTY WRETCH.

Harley Russell in Custody on a Grave Charge.

James Totten, of Canaan township, on Wednesday, before Mayor Smith, caused a warrant to be issued for the arrest of Harley Russell, of the same township, for criminal conduct with Miss Goldie Totten, aged 14 years. Marshal Latimer and Deputy Andrew Reid arrested Russell and brought him to the city. When arraigned Thursday morning he pleaded guilty. Bond was fixed at \$800, in default of which he was committed to jail.

Russell is 29 years of age and the son of very highly respected parents. It is stated that the intimacy between Russell and the girl has been carried on for some months. He must certainly be a deprayed wretch, for a few years ago he figured in a similar scrape, but escaped and was away many months.

They have returned and the young woman is now Mrs. Russell This it is supposed will settle a criminal charge resting against Russell. It is stated that he executed a bond to the girl's father guaranteeing that he will live with and provide for her.

The law makes it a benitentiary of fense, of from 3 to 20 years imprisonment, for carnally knowing any female person ander 16 years of age, even with her consent, as the principle of law is that under the age of in years she is not competent to give her consent.

It is stuted that Mr. Harley Russell and young Miss Goldie Tutten, of Canasin township, were married out side of Ohio the latter part of last week. She is a minor, did not have consent of her parents, and hence Probate Judge Adair refused to issue marriage licenses. They went away, and assert they are legally married
