Thank you for the information that you sent on the Aikine family. It doesn't look like there is any relationship very close. There might be back in the 1600's, but we haven't gone that far as yet.

Sometimes I get so confused. I have been corresponding with Bonnie Fuller, who is working on the Zimmerman family. She has an Akin in her husbands family. She is related to the Zimmerman family in N.J., but we think there might be a connection back in Bavaria. My family is the Koch-Cook, and Zimmerman family from Dunkirk, Chautauqua Co., New York. Chautauqua Co., N.Y. is near Ontario, Canada where the Aikines were. If there weren't so many people you would think that they might be related. I have more fun looking for my husbands ancestors, as all mine came from Germany, but his go back to the Mayflower. The Aikines, Grants and Wylde seem to be the only exceptions. Also the Ballances born in Ireland.

I am enclosing what I have on the Aikine family. Sometime I hope to get more. You may keep this to see where these come in.

### My Eddy Family genealogy

I am a member of the Eddy family that came to America in 1630 from Cranbrook, Kent County, England. The parent of the two brothers who came to America was William Eddy, the Vicar of Cranbrook. The older brother, from whom I descend was John Eddy the other brother was Samuel. A little later two of the daughters came.

I have two of the books the Eddy Family Association Published, the 1930 edition and the 1940 supplement.

In it I found the Aiken names. Perhaps they are new to you, it would be nice to think so, but if not, here is reinforcement.

This last set IDA GENEVIEVE EDDY descends from John Eddy of Taunton. The Eddy Family Association has tried to sort out this different Eddy but can trace him back no farther and so they call him John of Taunton. (This is not the same John as mine of Cranbrook. This John of mine can

be traced back into British history.) This John Eddy of Taunton seems to come to a sudden dead end. You may have Aikens married into two different Eddy families.

#### JOHN EDDY OF TAUNTON AND HIS DESCENDANTS

John Eddy--(parentage not known) died Nov 27, 1695 at Taunton, Mass. married (1) Nov. 12, 1665, Susannah Paddock of Dartmouth (Taunton, Vital Records), who died March 14, 1670, at Taunton (Vital Records). She was the dau of Robert and Mary Paddock (Austin Gen Reg pp 187-189). He married (2) May 1, 1672, Deliverance Owen of Braintree, Mass. (Taunton and East Bridgewater, Vital Records). She was the dau of William and Elizabeth Davis Owen (Austin, 160 Allied Fam.) and was born Feb 15, 1654. Another authority gives the wife of William Owen as a daughter of Charles and Margaret Grice. Deliverance married (2) Nathaniel Smith, who died before 1717. (Taunton Deeds, Vol XII, p 202) She died May 3, 1726 at Norton, Mass.

For years Miss Clara Clara Avery, a descendant of John Eddy of Taunton, has searched both in Old England and New England for some clue to the parentage of this John Eddy, but with no success. The compiler also has studied most carefully the early records of Plymouth and of Taunton. Every reference to this John Eddy previous to 1670 which has been discovered is hereafter recorded. Both Miss Avery and the compiler feel that there is a very close association between the family of John Eddy of Taunton and Samuel Eddy of Plymouth and that John at one time was either a member of Samuel's household or else a very close neighbor.

The first mention in the records of the John Eddy known later as John Eddy of Taunton, carpenter, is as a witness to a deed in which John Eddy of Taunton, carpenter, is as a witness to a deed in which John Eddy of Plymouth, blacksmith was the grantee. He purchased lands adjoining those of John Eddway (Eddy), carpenter.

The Plymouth records have two other references to a John Eddy who is not the John Eddy, blacksmith, son of Samuel. John, the blacksmith, went to Marthas Vineyard in the late summer of 1660 and remained there the rest of his life, so he cannot be the John of the following records. On July 23, 1661, a jury was summoned to enquire into the sudden death of John Bond of Plymouth, a servant to George Watson (Plym. Court Orders). John Eedey was one of the twelve to sign the verdict.

A list of those owning land in Taunton in 1643 contains the names of Mt. John Browne, John Gilbert, Jr., Thomas Gilbert, Christopher Thresher, Richard Stacey, William Hailstone, John Macomber, John Browne, William Hodges, Thomas Harvey, Aron Knapp, William Wetherell, and a second list adds Thomas Lincon. There is no Eddy on the list.

How or when John Eddway, carpenter, came into possession of that tract of land in Taunton is not recorded. If a deed or grant of land could be found it might solve the problem of that parentage of John, the carpenter. There can be no doubt of the fact that there is a very close relationship between the carpenter John and the family of Samuel of Plymouth. The first names of the descendants of John of Taunton are almost identical in the first three or four generations with those of Samuel of Plymouth. Eleazar, Deliverance and Experience, of the Taunton line, do not appear in the Plymouth group, but Samuel, Obadiah, Zachariah, Ebenezer, Jonathan, Joseph, Asa, Nathan, Ephraim, Moses, and Joshua, are characteristic of both.

John Eddy, the carpenter, and Zachariah Eddy, son of Samuel, married sisters. After his marriage to Susannah Paddock, John Eddy went to Taunton and settled on his land there, not far from Scaddings Pond and its outlet, Mill River. In 1675 when a Census was taken to learn the fighting strength of the town at the outbreak of King Philips War, John Eddy appears as the head of a family.

He may have been a brother of John Eddy, the blacksmith. At this period both in England and in New England, brothers bearing the same name are frequently found. He may have been a half-brother a son of Samuel, by a wife before Elizabeth, or he may have been a son of that Eddy, who according to Pope (Pioneers of Mass) came from Boxted, Eng., in 1639. It is known that Samuel had a younger brother, Zachariah Eddy, so it is possible that he was the immigrant Eddy of 1639 and John was his son. Perhaps this Eddy of 1639 made his home with Samuel or perhaps he did not live long and that is why no trace of him can be found in the records. In this event it is very easy to think of the carpenter, John, as a member of his uncle's family and so at hand when a witness for the deed was needed.

October 29, 1630

On that day the little vessel "Handmaid" brought to Plymouth the two sturdy sons of William Eddy, Vicar of Cranbrook, after a voyage whose only record is one of storm and exhausting hardship. The two were John and Samuel Eddy.

John, the older brother, had married Amie Doggett of Groton. Since she was a distant connection of the second wife of John Winthrop, first Governor of Mass Bay Colony, it is easy to believe that John's decision to come to America was a part of the upheaval of thought and conscience that brought 25,000 Puritans to the shores of New England between 1630 and 1643. The counties of Suffolk and Essex in England, where John and Samuel Eddy went sometime after the death of their father, were aflame with the spirit of reformation and of protest against the indolent corruption of the Church of England. Quite possibly the two brothers had acquaintances among the Plymouth Pilgrims, for it is likely that a definite sympathy with the spirit of liberty and of reform within the Church of England had been bred in the Vicarage at Cranbrook in the days of persecution under Elizabeth and James.

William Eddye born at Bristol, England d. at Cranbrook County Kenty, England, Nov 23, 1616 married (1) at Cranbrook, Nov 20, 1587, Mary Fosten, dau of John and Ellen Munn Fosten. Mary died in July 1611 and William married (2) Feb 22, 1613/14, at Cranbrook, Sarah Tayler, a widow. She died before Feb 5, 1639/40. when her will was proved.

Thank you so much for the AKIN data you sent. I am delighted to have found one more descendant of John Akin. I am very sure of Rebecca Akin who married into the Eddy family. You will note that one of the children has a name of ABIEL. Rebecca Akin of South Yarmouth is a descendant of the Abiel Akin who moved to South Yarmouth and was a mariner. A Quaker, he was married (1) Catherine Kelly, and (2) to Anne Wing.

His parents were Thomas Akin and Peace Russell. Thomas Akin a descendant of John Akin, his father, Thomas Akin Sr., was one of the children of John Akin and his (1) wife Mary (Briggs) Akin. So you have really given me one of my needed descendants.

I am not sure yet about the other one - Ida Genevieve who married INGOLLS, and whose son married Alice Aiken of Benton, Ill. This in Franklin Co. is the town which used to be called Aikensville, and I have not yet been able to pinpoint the families there as members of the John Akin family. I have many records of them, but there seems to be one link along the line missing.

It is so close to the Kentucky border that I hesitate to say they are or are not members of the CLAN, but they very well could be since so many of the AKIN families - adventurers at heart - rafted down the rivers and some did go southward.

Am enclosing some Eddy data which I extracted from the Vital Records of New Bedford Mass. Don't know if any of them are of interest to you but thought I'd send them along, just in case.

## RHODA ( AKIN ) TALLMAN

Rhoda Akin , daughter of Elihu and Ruth ( Perry) Akin was born at Dartmouth, Mass. Her father Elihu was one of the younger sons of John Akin ( 1663-1746) and his second wife Hannah ( Sherman-Bowen) Akin. Her date of birth as given in the Vital Records of that area was the 15 Sept., 1755. He married William Tallman at Dartmouth the 13 Feb. 1774. We have not been able to verify his parents.

During the year 1796 the family migrated to Saratoga County, N.Y. However, their known children were all born in Dartmouth. We have no verified date of death for William Tallman. Rhoda ( Akin) Tallman died at Frankfort, N.Y. the 30th June, 1844.

THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH,

T H A T James AITKEN now aged

Seventeen Years and Two Months

by and with the consent of his brother David AITKEN

hath put himself, and by these Presents doth voluntarily, and of his own free will and accord, put himself apprentice to Robert HENRY

to learn the art, trade, and bystery of A House Carpenter

and after the manner of an apprentice, to serve from the day of the date hereof, for and during and until the full end and term of three years and ten months

during all which time, the said apprentice his master faithfully shall serve, his secrets keep, his lawful commands every where readily obey: he shall do no damage to his said master, nor see it done by others, without letting or giving notice thereof to his said master: he shall not waste his said master's goods, nor lend them unlawfully to any: he shall not contract matrimony within the said term: at cards, dice, or any unlawful game, he shall not play, whereby his said master may have damage: with his own goods, nor the goods of other, without license from his said master, he shall neither buy nor sell: he shall not absent himself day nor night from his master's service, without his leave: nor haunt ale-houses, taverns, dance-houses, or play-houses; but in all things behave himself as a faithful apprentice ought to do, during the said term. And the said master shall use the utmost of his endeavours to teach, or cause to be taught or instructed, the said apprentice in the trade or mystery of a house carpenter and procure and

provide for him sufficient meat, drink, washing and lodging fitting for an apprentice, during the said term and to pay thirty nine dollars per year for clothing and twenty dollars when the aforesaid term of service is fullfilled.

And for the true performance of all and singular the covenants and agreements aforesaid, the said parties bind themselves, each unto the other, firmly by these Presents.

The first paper money issued on the national level, June 18, 1775, was \$2 million in bills of credit, with the 12 federal colonies pledged to share in their redemption. Paper money not only paid for guns and military supplies, but also served as propaganda encouraging Americans to fight. Notes bore such slogans as "An Appeal of Heaven" and "Pro Arms et Focis" and featured woodcuts of victorious battles - according to The World Almanac.
