MORE MICROFILM of N.C. ESTATES RECORDS AVAILABLE FOR LOAN FROM STATE LIBRARY

With the final acquisition of New Hanover County reels, the State Library of North Carolina's Genealogical Services completes its collection of North Carolina Estates Records microfilm available for loan to North Carolina residents through their local libraries. Especially valuable resources for genealogical and historical researchers, these records are the various surviving unbound documents that were generated in settling the estate of a deceased individual. The original North Carolina records are deposited in the North Carolina State Archives and were microfilmed there by the Genealogical Society of Utah. There are not microfilmed estates records for the counties of Avery, Dobbs, Harnett, Hoke, Lee, Swain, Tryon, and Vance.

Librarians may learn about borrowing procedures for these microfilm reels on the SLNC's Interlibrary Loan web pages at <http://statelibrary.dcr.state.nc.us/rsb/ILLGenealogy.htm#submitting2> "Submitting Requests for Cataloged Microfilm Items, including Estates Records." They will find OCLC numbers for submitting requests for these records on these web pages and must also include the surname of interest in the borrowing notes field of the OCLC request. For questions on how to submit genealogy photocopy requests or verify an item in the microfilm collection, librarians should contact Genealogical Services at 919-807-7460 or the Genealogical Services Librarian (email: pantoms@library.dcr.state.nc.us). For inquiries about the status of a request or for assistance in preparing a genealogy interlibrary loan request, they should call the Resource Sharing Branch at 919-807-7457 or e-mail Joyce Throckmorton at jthrockmorton@library.dcr.state.nc.us.

The addition of this microfilm expands the State Library's existing Core Collection of circulating North Carolina county records such as wills, deeds, marriages, and tax lists as well as federal population census schedules for our state, all available on Interlibrary Loan to North Carolina residents.

CAPT. TAYLOR BACON,² mariner; married widow Jemima Mascoll Jan. 24, 1764; died on his passage to St. Eustatia Oct. —, 1773; she died May —, 1790; children: 1. William,³ baptized Sept. 16, 1764; 2. Mary,³ baptized March 15, 1767; unmarried in 1801; 3. John Taylor,³ baptized Oct. 1, 1769; 4. Elizabeth,³ baptized Sept. 15, 1771; died Nov. —, 1791.

SAMUEL BACON,² merchant; married Anna (Hannah) Orne March 14, 1754; she died May 16,

His house stood where Creek Street now runs about two hundred and fifty feet from Mill Street. John Baldwin¹ lived in Salem in 1664, and Nicholas Bartlett,² a fisherman, and Robert Hodge,² a mariner, in 1665. Peter Welcome¹ lived at Butts point from 1665 to about 1670, when he removed to Boston.

Robert Glanfield¹ lived in Salem as early as 1665, being a shipwright and mariner.. He built a house in which he afterwards lived at what is now 16 Union Street. This house was taken down June 17, 1802. Un-

1761; he died July 29, 1765; his estate was valued at upwards of four thousand pounds; he owned several vessels, including ship Hitty, brig Ranger and schooner Anna; children: 1. Samuel,² baptized Jan. 5, 1755; merchant; died in 1777; 2. Mehitable,² baptized Nov. 30, 1755; married, first, John Lawless; second, John Templeman of Boston in 1783; 3. Peter Welcome married Hittabell Hoggsdell Nov. 3, 1665; children: Peter, born Aug. 7, 1666; died Aug. 25, 1666; Mehitabell, born Sept. 30, 1667; Mary, born Aug. 12, 1670.

Capt. Robert Glanfield was commander of the pink Dove in the winter of 1691-2; married Lydia Ward July 12, 1665; died in 1702; children: 1. Lydia, born Sept. 3, 1666; married William Carkeet; 2. Abigail, born April 20, 1668; 3. Peter, born June 7, 1670; 4. Robert, born July 27, 1672; sail-maker; married Rebecca Prince Dec. 25, 1727; they lived in Salem in 1734; 5. Sarah, born Jan. 16, 1674-5; married John Lander.

NOTES. Relative to the title of the Pickering house (volume II, page 282), Dea. Timothy Pickering devised it to his sons Timothy and John, and in a division of the estate, Nov. 17, 1778, the homestead was released to John. The latter conveyed it to his nephew John, son of Col. Timothy Pickering, Aug. 16, 1803. It has since remained in the family of the last-named John.

He joined the church 3 May 1648.

He was chosen Representative in 1655, and made Assistant of the Plymouth Colony in 1667.

From 1650 until his death Nathaniel Bacon devoted much of his time and a great deal of effort and energy to the public affairs of the settlement which he had chosen as his home. He was active either in the General Court, the council of war, or as a court officer. With astute business sense he acquired from time to time valuable lands which he cultivated and developed, meanwhile continuing the successful operation of his tannery.

In 1673 he owned sixty acres of rich meadow and timber lands on the common field near Bluches Point, thirty-two acres of timber and meadow lands at Cotuit, and several hundred acres along the so-called Mill Pond and at Sandy Neck.

He was made a freeman of Barnstable in 1645. In 1650 he was appointed constable of his home town. From 1652 to 1665 he served as deputy to the General Court. In 1657 he was chosen assistant of Plymouth Colony and was re-elected every year until his death in 1673. In 1658 and again in 1667 he was a member of the important council of war. He frequently served on commissions appointed by the General Court and gradually became one of the most prominent and influential citizens of the colony.

Died, in October, 1673.

Married, December 4, 1642, Hannah Mayo, eldest daughter of the Reverend John Mayo, who had brought to Barnstable her and his son Samuel in 1640. His wife, Thomasine Mayo, is recorded to have died in Yarmouth, England, February 26, 1682.

JOHN BACON, ESQUIRE, son of Nathaniel Bacon and Hannah (Mayo) Bacon, was born in June, 1664, at Barnstable, Massachusetts. His life work was the practice of law. So proficient was he in this field that his ability and judgment were widely known and highly respected. For many years he was judge of the General Court for Barnstable.

Died August 20, 1731.

Married, first, June 17, 1686, at Barnstable, Mary Hawes, daughter of John Hawes and Desire (Howland) Hawes. She died March 5, 1725-26.

Married, second, September 9, 1726, Madame Sarah Warren of Plymouth, a widow and grandmother.

THE FAMILY IN AMERICA

I

NATHANIEL BACON, son of William Bacon and founder of the family in America, was born about 1613. When he was about twenty-six years of age, he came from Rutlandshire, England, to Barnstable County, Massachusetts, settling in the village of Barnstable, where he was a pioneer. He was a tanner and leather finisher of good business ability and stern virtue. There he erected with his own hands a substantial house of oak logs which stood for two hundred and fifty years on "Mill Way."*

* This house was two stories high, 24 x 26 feet in dimensions with the lower story divided into three rooms. The front room which was used as a reception and living room was 16 feet square and contained a fireplace, 8 feet wide and 4 feet deep. When the house, which was one of the show places of Barnstable, was torn down in 1853, it was found that the oak logs which Nathaniel Bacon had cut down and hauled for the construction of his first colonial home, way back in 1642, were in as good a condition as they were when he used them in the erection of his house.

Bacon

Arms—Gules on a chief argent two mullets sable.

S BURKE'S "Peerage" so aptly remarks: "The antiquity of the family is beyond dispute; and there are few houses in the Kingdom more distinguished for the production of great and eminent men." The origin of the name is a matter of conjecture. Some etymologists derive it from the Anglo-Saxon word "bacan," meaning "to bake" and others trace it to "baccen," which was "beech tree" in Anglo-Saxon. Still other authorities insist that long before the Conquest of England by Duke William, Bacon was the name of a seigniory in Normandy.

THE FAMILY IN ENGLAND

Grimbaldus, a Norman gentleman and kinsman of William de Warranne, Earl of Surrey, is regarded as the progenitor of the Bacon family; came to England in 1066 with the Norman invaders and obtained grants of land near Holt, County Norfolk. His son,

Randolph (or *Reynolds*) is supposed to have adopted as his name Ralph de Bacons-thorpe* (perhaps from Bechuns Thorp meaning Beechtree village). His son,

George Bacon, of Baconsthorpe, County Norfolk, gave to his sister Agnes all the family estates in Normandy. His son,

* Some authorities insist that it was the grandson Roger, and not Randolph, who first assumed the surname Bacon.
