Thus concludes the documented facts, but the letters contain many clues to a great personal human interest story. If the reader will note, the addressee changes from "John Baker" to John P. Baker. The navy said that all who serve must have, at least, a middle initial, and one of that person's own choosing. My father once made the observation, "of all the letters in the alphabet, why did he choose 'P'?" I thought a long time about that, and developed my own personal theory. Under what circumstances would motivate a fourteen year old farm boy living a thousand miles from the nearest ocean to decide on a career in the United States Navy? Perhaps he had read stories of the sea and of a naval hero or two. Who might one of these naval heroes be? none other than John Paul Jones, Of course. John Baker, in his boyhood hero worship, fancied himself--John Paul Baker, but being a modest sort, never revealed that to anyone, but in any case became--John P. Baker.

But, Alas! after three years at sea, John Baker had realized his dreams and found them somewhat wanting. He resigned from the Navy, returned to Circleville, married a local girl, settled down and raised a family. What is so surprising is, that upon his resignation, after four years service, John was just barely eighteen years old.

The original Navy Department letters did not come to light until one hundred and ten years later, found among the effects of his son, John W. Baker (deceased) of

Kingston, Ohio. Other than his son, no modern day member of his family had any knowledge of this episode in the life of John Baker. John lived out the remainder of his life in anonymity, but I think it is worthy of note that two of his sisters married Brunners, John and Thomas K. One of John's daughters was Mame Boggs, owner of the Boggs Hotel, and John's grandniece is Dorothy Brunner Eveland of Circleville. Today, John rests beside his wife, Caroline Robinson, in Forest Cemetery.

The Story of Midshipman John P. Baker of the United States Naval Academy

OCCGS REFERENCE ONLY

The United States Naval Academy was established at Annapolis, Maryland, in 1845, by George Bancroft, Secretary of the Navy, who persuaded President James K. Polk to approve the transfer of an old army post at Annapolis, Fort Severn, from the War Department to the Navy Department.

The Naval Academy was opened officially October 10, 1845 with Commander Franklin Buchanan as its first superintendent. At first, the academy was known as the Naval School; the course was five years in length, of which only the first and last were spent at the school. The intervening three years being spent aboard ships in active service. It was re-organized in 1850-1851 as the United States Naval Academy with a course of study of four consecutive years.

Sir:

In accordance with your wish to enter the Naval Service of the United States as a midshipman, you are hereby notified that you may on the tenth of March next, or as soon thereafter as practicable, proceed to Annapolis, Maryland, and report to the Superintendent of the Naval School at that place, for the examinations contemplated in the accompanying extract from the "Plan for a Naval School".

If after such examinations you shall obtain a satisfactory certificate of your qualification in all respects for the Naval Service, you will receive an acting appointment, orders to the Naval School and your traveling expenses. If the examinations should be unfavorable, you will receive neither an acting appointment nor your traveling expenses.

You will inform the Department seasonally of your intentions.

Dear Lucy,

Always glad to hear from you. Sorry that your family has had a death but glad that Aunt Ollie was there when she and her ability to love were needed and I bet she was to. This week my 22 year old son received a letter from the State of Wisconsin, that his ex-wife and her second wife had had his baby taken from them by the State. He received this letter telling him that the case would be in court the 30 Sept., if he had a claim, and the letter got here the 14 Oct. His lawyer finally reached someone, and the baby is alright in a foster home. We have no idea as to what has happened but the authorities will release him to my son it seems as soon as the judge gets back to town to sign the papers. This is my youngest grandson and he will be two next 10 April, and thank God he is alright.

Lucy, Mrs. McAllister seems to be a very capable person. She is a college graduate, and has several books to her credit. She has been in this business for many years and has worked on this Baker thing since 1942, or before. All she is after is to prove the truth. Does anyone know that Peleg was married just once? Perhaps that is the problem. At any rate she too is related to a Peleg Baker of Kentucky, and he was the brother of a David Baker, and she thinks it was the David that was buried on the Ratcliff farm. That Baker's first child was named Michael. She has been in touch again with the 94 year old Thomas Fountain Baker of the family of Michael through his son Moses. This represents nearly 100 years of history of the area and he still owns the farm that his grandfather bought in 1737, I believe. Surely, we are all after the true history of our family.

I myself am not interested any more for myself, as I do not believe that the Andrew, son of Moses, was my relative. I do not believe that his birth was early enough for the second Andrew to have been born in June 1813. Jonathan, grandson of Michael, through Moses, was born 1793, in N.C. Mrs. Sharon Hunt, 1717 Glazier Drive, Concord, California 94521, is a descendant of the David buried at Ratcliff Farm. I am not challenging anything, especially whether there is or isn't Indian blood but certainly if he married a Cherokee he would have been in a better position for that in N.C., as that was the home of the Cherokee Indians.

I'm sure that it is not Mrs. McAllister's purpose to hurt anyone as it is not mine. The letters that I received from Mrs. Bushman about the information that I had sent you, I felt were uncalled for and undeserved. I wrote and wrote to her trying to explain that with out proof I couldn't just change my records. At this point I'm not trying to prove anything but trying to get everyones family stories of what they have been told about their family. Of course there will be a lot of mistakes but atleast we will have something to work with. To me, the deplorable thing is, that everytime we just do what you did, and bury a loved one, we have buried a part of our history right there. Whatever they knew of their family, whatever they could have told us, is lost, gone forever, and so many times we do not think to ask questions until the ones that had the answers are gone. These people lived as we live, laughed, loved, cried, and yet in two or three generations their grandchildren will be saying, "My gr. grandfather, born ca 1900, was _____ Jones married _____ Baker?" and some character like me will be waving her magic wand and trying to come up with instant answers.

As much as possible I give references, also others that are working on that same line. As soon as possible the information that is sent to me is put on file cards and in their proper places to be used for those that ask for help in that area. You have been very kind in thanking me for whatever aid I gave you, you also have been unusually thoughtful in trying to be of service to me in return. I'm very grateful for your help. I answer 15-20 letters a week, sometimes more, and several hours of research has gone into the answers. To you and to others inquiring of a Peleg Baker, I've sent all of the information that I had on hand, hoping that it could be used and the truth proved by those working and of that family. I have also requested that when someone has the answers to their family history that they write me and tell me so that I can up-date my files and be better able to help the next that asks for it. All of my research has been in the southern part of our country and although having heard from everywhere I have learned a lot about the family in general, I have not gone into a lot of history of some areas. While I was at the library one Saturday, my husband happened to open one of Mrs. Bushman's letters. The first thing that he said to me was, "Where did you pick up the crazy lady?" I tried to explain that she was getting old and short of time and she was so very interested that she tended to get impatient with us poor mortals. When Mrs. McAllister took all of the information that she had received from Mrs. Bushman, which she bought, to a professional that is familiar with research on the East Coast and area and after examining the material, back came the question that my husband asked. So now the search for the truth.

I wish I had a fellow searcher interested in proving the truth on my Davis line. I've added at least 15 more connected names to this family the last month. I was thrown a curve by a great uncle that left a scrap book saying that his grandfather was Captain Enoch Davis of N.C., and the Rev. That was not so, as that Enoch left N.C., and moved to Washington County, Indiana, and could not have fathered our family of N.C., and Georgia. Our Davis of the American Rev., was Elijah Davis who fought for 6 years and lived in N.C. His son Enoch, born 1780, was in a lot better position to father our Dr. Daniel Puckett Davis, born 1824. Since I have gotten on the right track it is a whole new ball game and everything really fits. The real weird thing is that this family also has a Baker line and it seems to be the same one that my husband is connected to. If so our ancestors married brothers and sisters twice and inter-married back and forth with the same families. Abbeville District, S.C., is proving to be very interesting with more Nobles than I have ever found before, also Cunninghams right with the Bakers and Davis families. If I can solve this thing it will be big.

I've also found Phebe-Andrew marriages in the East. Again I can't prove that they aren't my family but it would seem unlikely as Phebe said on the 1850 census that she was born 1781, in Kentucky, and her son Elisha, was born in 1800, Kentucky. If this was true then her family were very early arrivals in Ky., and for this reason I do appreciate your Pulaski County, information very much. Mrs. Bushman sent me the census of 1820, for a Andrew Baker but it does not have a female in the age bracket of Phebe, but it was of Pulaski County.

As for my aches and pains this is one of my worse seasons but will be soon over. Our weather is beautiful with the changing leaves, warm days and cool nights. I'm still getting tomatoes from the garden. We are quite concerned with the problem of getting everything through this winter with the high prices of feed and hay. A calf does not bring as much as it did 20 years ago. The world is indeed a puzzlement.

They were very kind but did not know as much as I did. One sent me a picture of the Baker brothers but our William Frank was not in it. The picture was taken at the 50th Anniversary of Francis Marion there in Oak, Neb. We found a picture of the yard full of relatives in Grandfathers papers. The Neb. cousins say that a lot of the family settled near Denver and others in Wyoming.

I hope I haven't bored you to tears. I thought if you were going to help me look I better give you all of the help possible because I haven't gotten very far. Probably the daughters of Andrew are buried in the North West part of Mo. as is their Mother Nancy. So far I have not been able to locate any of the children of Andrew Sr. in 1880, to find where their father was born. In his Will he called his Mo., farm a Plantation. He did not have a education so it would seem that he was born in the frontier somewhere.

I'm sorry to hear of your having problems with your back. It sounds like some of my troubles. I have been a victim of Rheumatoid Arthritis for 20 years and its on again off again sessions. For about the last three years it has been in my legs and I've had to just about give up everything. That is one reason I like Genealogy, I can take my ancestors and go to bed. For the first 15 years it was in my arms and shoulders. I feel lucky that it left me in pretty good shape there. I have had to learn again to control my arm to write and had to go back to exercises on the piano to master it all again. If my legs come out as lucky it will seem a miracle. Anyway I understand your difficulties and do not want you to put yourself out for me, but thank you for all effort in our behalf.

Any information on the Baker family is appreciated. I will certainly keep in my notes all that I get on Peleg or his family, parents or children. I have recently received a letter from a descendant of the David Baker married Ann. he is a son of Michael with his first son named after his grandfather. It does seem odd that as rare as the name Peleg was that two would show up in the same area. At this point I am gathering all of the information possible from every where. I will try and prove my theories later. Again thank you and I am very glad if I was able to help you in your search.

DANIEL JAMES BAKER (From "HISTORY OF ALABAMA AND HER PEOPLE, VOL III p. 20)

"The people of Crenshaw County are very well acquainted with the name of DANIEL JAMES BAKER, for he is editor, manager and publisher of the Crenshaw County News, the leading paper of this section, and the official democratic organ. MR. BAKER was born at Troy, Pike Co., Ala. June 14, 1883, a son of DANIEL A. BAKER, and grandson of ABNER BAKER, who was born in S. C. in 1800 and d. at Troy, Ala. in 1895. His remains are buried eight miles south of Luverne. A clergyman of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, he preached in Southern Alabama, Florida and Georgia. During the war between the states he was Cadet of the Home Guards in Florida. He m. a Miss Vaughan, b. at Vaughanville, Geneva Co. Ala. He d. in Southern Ala.

DANIEL A. BAKER was b. in Ala June 9, 1853, and he is now living at Troy. He was m. in the vicinity of Troy and soon thereafter he went to Florida where he spent a few years as a timber operator, and also as a school teacher. Returning to Troy, he read law, was admitted to the bar and has continued in active practice ever since, being a distinguished attorney. Very active in the democratic party he represented Pike County in the Ala. State Legislature for one term represented Pike, Crenshaw and Coffee counties in the State Senate. In former years he was tax collector of Pike County. A strongly religious man he has long been one of the active workers of the Methodist Episcopal Church South. He m. Margaret Madison, who was b. near Troy, Ala. in 1844. The following children have been born to them: EUGENE A., who lived in S. C.; JESSE GALENA who m. James Madison and died at Troy at the age of 30 yrs.; but he survives her and now lives in Texas; ABNER M. who is a painter and decorator in Troy; WILLIAM E. who is a photographer of Montgomery, Ala; KATIE who resides at Troy, the widow of Ben Vaughan, printer of Troy; DANIEL JAMES, who was the 6th in order of birth; and ANGUS L. who is a traveling painter and decorator, and lives in Louisiana.

DANIEL JAMES BAKER received his educational training by the home fireside and began work at the early age of 12 years, in a cotton compress at Troy, and after 4 years of that kind of work learned the printer's trade at Troy, working at it during the summer months for 6 years, and during the winter ones being in the employ of the Atlantic Compress Co. His trade learned, Mr. BAKER left Troy, and going to Montgomery, worked in job printing offices of that city and for the Montgomery Advertiser until 1915 when he came to Luverne and was connected with the Crenshaw Co. News as a printer for 4 years. For the succeeding 4 years he was with the Luverne Journal, but returned to the News, and in 1925 became part owner, editor, manager and publisher of the paper, which was established in 1901, and has always been a democratic organ. It circulates in Crenshaw and surrounding counties. The plant and offices are located on Forest Ave. Luverne. This is one of the live newspapers of the South, and the plant is equipped with every modern faculty for newspaper work. MR. BAKER is a Democrat. The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, holds his membership. He belongs to Home Lodge No. 500 K. of P. Montgomery; and Luverne Camp No. 606, W.O.W. of which he is a past consul. In addition to his interest in the News, Mr. Baker owns real estate at Troy. He is unmarried.
