ried his second wife, Rebecca Palmer, daughter of the first Walter Palmer, of Stonington, Conn. By her he had six children. He died Aug. 19, 1683. His second wife died May 2, 1713. When he married her, she was the young widow of Elisha Chesebro'. They settled be Stonington, where she owned a great tract of land. I shall give, farther on, a very full account of their descendants.

ABOUT ASTON CLINTON. Lyson's "Magna Britannia" says: " Aston Clinton in the Hundred of Aylesbury and deanery of Wendover, lies four miles from Aylesbury, east, on the road to London through Tring." Dundridge and the Chapel Farm of the Baldwins were in that part of Aston-Clinton called "St. Leonards." This was a hamlet of the parish of Aston-Clinton, "about four miles from the mother church." It has (or had) an ancient chapel which " is supposed to have been formerly a chantry chapel (of the monks) to the Abbey of Missenden." In 1802, Aston-Clinton had 122 houses, 130 families, and 584 inhabitants. In the hamlet of St. Leonards there were 22 houses, 24 families, and 137 inhabitants. Dundridge remained in the family until 1748, when it "was sold by the heir of J. M. Baldwin, Esq., to Edward Darrell, Esq."

settled in Milford, Conn. Capt. Astwood died in London, in 1654. She died in Milford, in 1669. What is known of the marriages of the children of Sylvester and Sarah (Bryan) Baldwin is as follows:

CHAPTER SECOND.

Sylvester Baldwin of 1638.

Sylvester Baldwin, father of the family that settled at New Haven, Conn., in 1638, was born in Aston-Clinton, Buckinghamshire, Eng., a little previous to the year 1600. His father, Sylvester Baldwin, and his mother Jane Willis, were married in 1590, and he was their fifth or sixtn son. His grandfather, Henry Baldwin, held the manor of Dundridge, in Aston-Clinton, which went from him to Richard, his oldest son, and from Richard to our Sylvester's brother Henry.

HENRY BALDWIN, (Sylvester's grandfather,) inherited the manor of Dundridge from (Richard Baldwin, his father, whose will he "proved in 1552-3." He had a wife Alice and eight children, four sons and four daughters. His will, which is dated January 2, 1599, mentions his daughters as follows: Agnes; Jane, wife of James Bonus; Mary, wife of Richard Salter; and there was another who seems to have died previous to 1599. His will also mentions sons Richard, John, Robert and Sylvester. Richard inherited Dundridge, and died childless in 1636.

Jane Willis, in 1590, had six sons, and died previous to 1632. His sons were:

Hanny, buried in 1594. John, not living in 1632. HENRY, who inherited Dandridge. WILLIAM, no record.

WILLIAM, no record.

SYLVESTER, married Sarah Bryan in 1620.

These six sons were born between 1590 and 1600. Sylvester died in July, 1638, while on the way to America.

Before starting for America, our Sylvester Baldwin lived at St. Leonards in Aston-Clinton, near Dundridge, where he owned the "Chapel Farm." He was married to Sarah Iiryan, early in 1620, and they had the following children born and baptized in Aston-Clinton:

Sylvester Baldwin, father of these children, was the executor of his uncle Richard's will and his residuary legatee. His uncle Richard died in 1636. In July, 1638, Sylvester Baldwin, with his wife Sarah and his six living children, sailed for America in the ship Martin. They belonged to the "New Haven Company." Sylvester died on the passage, "in mid ocean," July 21, 1638. His will was admitted to probate, in Boston, where the ship Martin arrived. He left a large estate.— His widow and six children settled with the rest of the emigrating company, in New Haven. In 1643, "the Widow Baldwin," was recorded in New Haven as one of the weaithest proprietors. At some time after 1643, she was married to Capt. John Astwood, and they all

"SILYESTER BALDWIN, of Stonington, in ye county of New London, appearing and making application to this Court, for power administracon upon a certaine lemmy Loux Allies, of Mr. Panal. Or normal bequeathed to his brother, John Baldwin, in and by the last will of Mrs Sarah Astwood, which said John Baldwin, by report of Mr. Planab, of Milford, went to England about twenty-five years since, and is supposed to be deceased. Upon with ye court allows administracon of sid legacy to the said Silveste Baldwin, be having given sufficient bond for his faithful administration of the same according to law, and refund the estate if any other heir appeare."

The legacy was made in 1679, and was a singular legacy to grant administration for twenty-three years after, but the estate had no doubt been sold, and this proceeding was to get the proceeds.

John, the father, died 19 August, 1683. John Baldwin was in the famous difference between New London and Lyme. A meadow at Black Point, claimed by both towns, had been reserved by each for the respective elergymen of the towns. The war was in 1671. About thirty New London men, among whom were the leading persons in the town, went to mow the grass for their minister, and were met and resisted by a party from Lyme, there on a similar errand for their minister. There was strife; and constables were there, and justices too, so that warrants and

place, with no very great harm. The cooler heads finally agree to let the law decide the matter, and "drank a dram together with some seeming friendship." Each party was indicted; and as a disinterested men could be found in that county, they were tricat Hartford—twenty-one men of New London, and fifteen a Lyme. The town of New London was fined £15, and Lyme £9.

John Baldwin was complained of by a Lyme man for bruisin him with a endgel. President Dwight says the two towns agree to submit it to a combat, two being selected by each, of whom the Lyme champions beat. This late appeal to "wager of battle is dubious.

JOHN BALDWIN, OF STONINGTON, CONNECTICUT,

AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

1. JOHN BALDWIN, of Stonington, Connecticut, was son of Sylvester, who died on the passage to America, 21 June, 1638, and brother of Richard, of Milford. See aute page 41. His identity is established, beyond all question, by legal proceedings after the death of his son John. He was baptized in Parish Aston Clinton, County Bucks, England, 28 October, 1635, and no doubt then quite young. Sylvester Baldwin's family being part of the "New Haven Company," removed to that place. * John was married to his first wife in 1656. According to the records, a home lot, of an acre and a half, was assigned to him, and he received other grants of land in Milford. His first wife died in 1657, soon after the birth of her son John. Miss Calkins says his name appears in the New London records occasionally after 1654. His descendant, John D., of Worcester, says 1664. He was in Milford in 1658, and one of the heroes of New London, who had the strife with men of Lyme, in 1671, about the boundary line. On the 24th of July, 1672, he married Rebecca Palmer, daughter of the first Walter Palmer, of Stonington, and young widow of Elisha Cheesborough. They settled in Stonington, where she owned a large tract of land. She outlived him about thirty years, and died May 2nd 1713. The children were:

John, h. April 18, 1657; hapt, as an adult in Stonington, and d. in 1678, while gone to England. As the record which establishes this fact proves the line, I add it. His grandmother, Mrs. Astwood, had remembered him in her will, from

^{*} It has been generally supposed, that Mrs. Baldwin Rved for some years in New Haven, her name, with family, thing in the list of 1613; but see anterpages 77 and 78, as to the New Haven and Millord Rets. Fine may have remained in New Haven until her second marriage, as is thought by her descendant of this line, Hon, John D. Baldwin; but I do not consider it proved. After her marriage to Astwood, the family no doubt fived in Millord, next door to her son Richard Baldwin.

There were other Baldwins, in Aston Clinton and vicinity, mentioned as "servants", and "laborers," and not related to the Baldwins of Dundridge and of the Hayle; and Mr. Chester thinks the married Hugh was one of these. As neither John the brother, nor any child of his, unless it be Hugh, is a legatee in the will of Richard, it seems to me very probable that if Hugh was any son of John, he was the oldest and died young, and quite as probable that he was son of some other brother of Richard. John himself would not have been named in Richard's will, had he not happened to be selected as "overseer," and Richard may and very likely had other brothers and sisters.

I have left Hugh in place as son of John, but with great doubt whether he belongs there, as, with this expression of my doubt, no one will be misled.

- 2. GEORGE 2 John 1 evidently in 156% the eldest son, and so called in certain Chancery, proceedings in 1590. He was called cousin (i.e. nephew) in 156%, in will of Ellen of Dundridge, and her two daughters were to be guided by him in their marriages. His will, as of the Hayle in Wendover, County Bucks, dated 10 Feb'y, and proved 20 Mch., 157%, by his widow Avelyn, probably a sister of William Aystell, whom he called his brother, and named as overseer with his own brother Sylvester and his son Ralph. He names as his children:

 - 12. John.
 - 13. Henry.
 - 14. Michael.

The other children than Ralph were apparently under age, and Mr. Chester does not find what became of the others than Ralph and Edmond.

3. NICHOLAS 2 John 1. He had by his father's will, dated 1564, lands at Great Missenden and the Lee, a tenement at Wendover, &c. It appears, by Chancery proceedings in 1591, that he married Agnes Fisher, widow of William, and by another suit, that he had by Fisher at least a son Thomas. He lived at Eddlesborough, County Bucks, where he made his will, 2 July, 1577, calling himself a yeoman, and directing to be buried in Eddlesborough churchyard. The original will, proved 24 April, 1581, by his brother Sylvester, is on file in the Archdeaeonry Court of Bucks; but that part is torn away in which he enumerated his

children, except Triamor and John. His other children are identified in other ways:

- 19. Triamor. In the Chancery proceeding in January, 159%, he is called the youngest son. He was executor of the wills of his brothers Francis and Bartholemew in 1639 and 1655, and then disappears altogether. The will of a Triamor Baldwin, of London, was dated and proved as late as 1729. He could not have been the Triamor above, born before 1531, but, evidently from the peculiar name, some connection. He styles himself "gentleman," and left but one legitimate child, to whom he bequeathed considerable property in London. He provided handsomely for an illegitimate son and daughter, called by his surname. He alsoleft £100 to his brother William Baldwin, then living in or near New York; and £100 each to his nephews Triamor and William, sons of said William, his brother, and placed the nephew Triamor last in the line of remainder to certain property (one-fourth of the old Marshalsea Prison, immortalized by Dickens), which he devised first to his illegitimate son Thomas Baldwin,

Who William, in or near New York, was, I do not know. He could not have been William of Bucks County, Penn., who was from Yorkshire. He may have been William of Stratford, Conn. m. Ruth Brooks, 1688, but no son Triamor appears; and possibly not William, though a William appeared afterward in Stratford, for whom I do not account otherwise.

- 20. Winifred, who m. Everard Johnson. Both are named in the Bill cited, and living 1655, and she in 1661.
- 4. SYLVESTER² John¹ He* received from his father, by will dated 1564, certain lands in Aston Clinton, called Pleadell's. He was executor of his brother Nicholas in 1581, and is frequently mentioned in the Chancery proceedings referred to. His first wife Agnes, the mother of his children, was buried at Aston Clinton, 31 Dec., 1568. He m. 2d, Agnes Bacheler, widow (probably of Sylvester Bacheler, who was buried there 3 July, 1564). He was buried there himself 3 July, 1592. His will, as of St. Leonard's Parish, Aston Clinton, County Bucks, yeoman, dated 25 June, 1592, was proved 5 Oct., 1592, by his son Thomas, in the Archdeaeonry

[&]quot;He is the Sylvester erroneously said, in my article in the K. E. Hist. Gen'l Register, to be father of Henry of Dundridge, and m. Sarah Helly. My Information, derived from another (not Mr. Chester), as to the supposed convoyance from John to Sylvester, on his marriage with Sarah Gelly, I believe to be a myth; and the payment of taxes in 1579, was not by Sylvester and Henry, but by Richard and Henry.

The will was proved, in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, 21 March, 1695, by the reliet Anne. The children of Richard Baldwin, by his wife Anne Monteth were as follows:

- 90. Ann, evidently eldest child, as named in her father's will, and in that of Mrs. Elizabeth Monteth (whom he mentioned), which was dated 22 Feb., 169 §. She died unmarried, and letters of administration were granted, in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, 20 Aug., 1731, to her brother and next of kin. Robert Monteth Baldwin, Esquire.
- 91. Richard, who was living 22 Feb'y, $169\frac{4}{5}$, and also at the date of his father's will; but who probably died young, at all events without issue, as his younger brother possessed the family estate.
- 92. Elizabeth, living a the date of her father's will, 8 Dec., 1696, but of whom I find nothing further. The youngest child was
- 93. Robert Monteth Baldwin, who was evidently born after the date of his father's will. Mrs. Elizabeth Monteth, above named, was the widow of his mother's paternal uncle; and in her will, dated 22 Feb'y, 169\frac{4}{5}, left legacies of £500 each to the three children of Richard Baldwin and Anne Monteth, with the provision that if any of them died in their minority, or before marriage, their portions should go to any son of said James (see Richard) and Anne Baldwin, who should be baptised by the name of her dear deceased husband, Robert Monteth. He appeared to have outlived his brother and sisters, and to have died unmarried.

The will of Robert Monteth Baldwin, which is very short, was made 3 Sept., 1746, when he described himself as of the Middle Temple, London, Esquire. He simply bequeathed all his estate. both real and personal, to his "cousin," John Canham, Esquire, and appointed him sole executor. Canham proved the will, in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, 6 April, 1747. He may have been an actual cousin, son of one of his Aunts, Maria or Sarah; or the word "cousin" may have been used in the light of nephew, and he have been the son of the sister Elizabeth; or again, he may have been a relation on his mother's side. At all events, the estates of the direct line of Dandridge Baldwins appear to have descended to this Robert Monteth Baldwin, and he bequeathed them to his cousin John Canham, dving the last of his race. The very next year, 1748, according to Lipscombe (who wrongly calls him John Monteth Baldwin), this heir sold Dundridge and the other family lands, and the name of Baldwin ceased to be connected with them, after an ownership of 170 years, and a previous tenantry of Dundridge making up two centuries. It was left for the younger branches of the Dundridge line to perpetuate their race in America, while the older branch, which remained in England, taded out entirely in about a bundred years after the emigration.

JOHN BALDWIN, OF COUNTY BUCKS. ENGLAND,

AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

1. JOHN BALDWIN, of the "Hayle," County Bucks, England was named as the overseer of his brother Richard's will, in 155%. He made his own will 12 March, 156%, describing himself as of the Hayle, in the Parish of Wendover, County Bucks, yeoman The following is an abstract of it:

To each of my children's children, 4 pence. To Nicholas, my son my houses and lands in Great Missenden and the Lee, and a tenement in Wendover. To Sylvester, my son, a grove called Lord's Grove, in Wendover, and lands in Aston Clinton called Pleadell's; and the same, after his death, to go to his son John and his heirs forever. To Richard, my son, £20. To Robert, my son, £10. To Thomas, my son, a horse worth 33s. 4d. To George, my son, all the residue of my estate, and he to be my executor; as overseer, my son Sylvester. The will was proved 2 March, 1563, in the Archdeaconry Court of Bucks, by the son George. His wife evidently died before he did.

- 6. Robert. Mr. Chester fluds nothing of him after his father's will of 156 \$, and thinks he died young.

- 8. Hugh appears, in the will of the first Richard of Dundridge, as "Heughe Baldwyn my brother's son." He is not named in John's will, and if he was his son, probably died young. As Richard named no other brother than John, it is likely Hugh was son of John. Richard may have had other brothers; but Mr. Chester can find no trace or suggestion of them in the wills, very numerous, of Baldwins in Bucks or other parts of England. In the parish register of Aston Clinton appears the marriage of a Hugh Baldwin and Mary King, 24 Jan'y, 156, and of this Hugh, Mr. Chester finds no further trace.

Surrey, and was buried in St. Mary's Church, in that town. He made his will 11 Sept., 1661, describing himself of Guilford, gentleman, as he had a tight to do, being a barrister, though possessing no coat of arms. The following is a full abstract of his will:

To the poor people of Guildford, £3; to Mr. Holland, minister there, for my fun ral sermon, £3; to the ministers of St. Leonand's and Aston Chitou, Co. Bucks, each 20s.; poor of St. Leonards, 40s. I release my brother William the debt to me owing, if any there be, and give to my nephew, William Baldwin, and his sister Margaret, each £20; and to my niece Markwick, £10. I release to Henry Edwards, and Alice his sister, the arrearages of my brother John Edward's account appearing to be due to me, they allowing the £15 I am to pay for binding the said Henry apprentice; niece Sarah, daughter of brother Richard Baldwyn, £20, and to her and her heirs the tenement at East End. in Flitwick, Co. Bedford, devised to me by my said brother Richard. To dan, Jane, all my child bed linen, and all my late wife's rings, cabinets, &c.; also £500 at her marriage. To Edward, my son, sundry household stuff, the goods in my chamber at Clifford's Inn, sundry plate, Ac.; to my grandchild, Elizabeth Baldwin, £100 when 21. "I give to ye use of my brother Silvester, ---, or the issue of them - - shall be - equally to be divided;" to the children of my kinsman, John Torles, equally, £60. I appoint as my executors Thomas my son, and Jane my daughter, my overseers, to have the care of my estate until my son Thomas be 24, and my daughter Jane be 21 years of age.

The will was proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, 20 March, 1662, by both executors. It is evident he originally designed leaving legalles to the children of his brother Sylvester; or their children if they were dead; but eventually changed his mind, perhaps because inconvenient to obtain them. The blanks were never filled. He signed his name Baldwyn.

48. Thomas. He made his will 16 July, 1676, signing Baldwin, describing himself as of Guiblford. Co. Surry, Gentleman, which he was by right, as will appear hereafter. He 541 rings and other legacies to several friends; but the only bequests to his relations were: To Uncle William Baldwin, and his son William Baldwin, 2100 each; all residue to his dear brother Edward, Esq., who was executor. He directed to be buried in St. Mary's Parish, in Guildford, near his father. The will was prov. 121 1700, 1675.

19. SYLVESTER Sylvester Henry Richard He was the emigrant to New England, who died on board ship Martin, June or July, 1638. He is first mentioned in the will of his uncle Richard in 1633, as executor and residuary legatee-a high compliment to his nephew from a man of the property and apparent sense of Richard, especially as the next heir of Richard was a prosperous lawyer. He married Sarah 2, whose surname Hon. John D. Baldwin, of Worcester, informed me long since, on the authority of Hon. Ralph D. Smith, of Guilford, Conn., was Bryant. Mr. Smith, a very high authority in early relationships in Connecticut, could not some years after, on my visiting him in Guilford, give me his authority. The fact, however, will appear very probable, as the English relationship and acquaintance of the Bryants was then unknown, having been afterwards discovered by myself. SIMEON BENJAMIN was born May 29, 1792 on the site of the old Benjamin house in Upper Aquebogue, part of the town of Riverhead. His father Richard was in the fifth generation of Long Island Benjamin's.

The first United States Census, taken in 1790, listed nine men by the name of Benjamin, heads of families, in the Town of Southold from which Riverhead was erected in 1792. There were three Nathans, one Amasiah, one John, Joshua, Richard, Thomas and William. They were all descended from the Richard Benjamin who moved from Watertown, Mass., and settled in Southold in 1640. This is a remarkable record for one American family to stick to one town through 150 years.

PAGE 2. FAMILY RECORDS OF THOMAS & JEDIDIAN BALDWIN - 1684-1875

THOMAS BALDWIN came from England over into this country (America) when he was about thirteen years of age. Stayed only one year, then returned to England again, and lived with his father till he was twenty and one years of age. Then he came over again and settled at Norwich, Connecticut. The marriage of Thomas Baldwin with Sarah Calkins was November 3, 1684. Sarah Baldwin (wife of Thomas) died June 1685. Thomas married (2nd) to Abigail Lay September 20, 1692. Children: Abigail born July 5, 1693; Mary born June 5, 1695; Hannah born January 22, 1698/9; Thomas born June 15, 1701; John born March 8, 1703/4; Phebe born April 10, 1707; Ebenezar born April 10, 1710; Jabez born November 12, 1713 THOMAS BALDWIN died September 18, 1741. d. 15th Dec. 1737.

THOMAS BALDWIN JR. married Ann Bingham on May 5, 1730. Their children were: Anne born February 3, 1731; Abigail born July 28, 1732/3; Thomas born October 13, 1734; Jemima born August 9, 1736; Eunice born September 20, 1738; Lydia born October 19, 1740; Jabez born January 18, 1742/3; Eliphalett born April 3, 1747. Thomas died in April, 1767 of the Yellow Fever in the West Indies.

JABEZ BALDWIN married Lydia Barker, who was born January 27, 1745. Their children were: Jedidiah born March 29, 1768; Anne born February 5, 1770; Abigail born October 25, 177l; John born July 10, 1773; Thomas born December 25, 1775, d 1778; Jabez, Jr. born April 4, 1778; Lydia born March 23, 1780; Thomas 2nd, born December 30, 1782; Sally born February 4, 1790, d. February 1824. Jabez Baldwin died April 7, 1817, very suddenly was taken ill at midnight and died at one half past three o'clock A.M. of a cholramorbus. Taken from the records of the Town Clerk's Book of Norwich, CT. Lydia Baldwin, mother of the above family died June 24, 1820, aged 75 years, a little more than three years after her husband died.

JABEZ BALDWIN, Jr., died November 9, 1819 at Salem, Mass. aged 41 years, 7 months, and 5 days.

LYDIA BALDWIN died 1st Feb. 1833 aged 53 years of a Cancer. She was the wife of Alnoah Lamb of Mass.

THOMAS BALDWIN, 2nd, was supposed to be cast away on his return to North Carolina, in November 1839, as he never was hears from, after he sailed from New York.

BENJAMIN GENEALOGY: On June 27th, 1632 John Benjamin, with his son RICHARD and daughter Mary, sailed from England in the ship "Lion" Captain Mason in command and arrived at Boston, Mass., September 16, 1632. They settled that fall at Watertown, Middlesex County, Mass., about ten miles west of Boston Harbor, where the father John Benjamin lived, died and was buried.


The son RICHARD, whose wife's given name was Anne, moved in 1640 to Southold, NY in the northeast end of Long Island where they were among the earliest white settlers. Here both RICHARD and Anne died in 1681. Their children were: Anne born in 1643; RICHARD born in 1645; Simeon born in 1648; Percilla, married Thomas Trueston; Joseph; and John.

The RICHARD of this generation lived until September 29th 1730, when he died at the age of 85 years. His wife's given name was Elizabeth. He was a farmer at Cutchogue in the Town of Southhold, Long Island. Their children were: Richard 3rd, born 1681, died October 20, 1716; Anne born 1683, died in 1745; JOHN born 1684, died November 24, 1745; Amaziah; Nathan; Belluah; Jonathan; William.

JOHN BENJAMIN, 1684-1745 married Abigail Wells, daughter of Joshua Wells and Hannah Tuthill (1695-1781). John Benjamin was also a farmer at Cutchogue, Long Island. Their children were: Sarah; Abigail; Mary; Desire; Joshua; Benjamin; Anne; WILLIAM.

WILLIAM BENJAMIN, born in 1731, died April 21, 1809, aged 78 years, married in 1754 Mary Terry, daughter of James and Mary Corwin. Whe died May 3rd, 1798 aged 68 years. William Benjamin was born at Northville, L.I. then called Northsides, near Riverhead. Their children were: RICHARD; James; Asseniah; Mary, who married Rev. Manley Wells.

RICHARD BANJAMIN was born 1757 and died December 8, 1808 aged 51 years, married Nancy Fanning, daughter of James and Deborah Warner. This Richard was the father of SIMEON Benjamin, founder of Elmira College. He was also a farmer at Northville, L.I. The farm was located a short distance west of the Northville Church. The children of this family were: David, born September 1787, died October 12, 1861. Married Elizabeth Tuthill (b. Oct. 1792, d. July 4, 1882) daughter of Nathan and Ester Parshall; Rev. William Benjamin, born 1790 - died October 13, 1860. Married Amelia Hallock. He was a farmer and an ordained minister and preached regularly to the Shinnecock Indians, who knew him as "Priest Billy"; Rev. Moses Benjamin, supplied churches in western part of Long Island; Mary Benjamin, married Jesse Corwin of Greenport, L.I.; Hannah Benjamin, married a cousin John Benjamin; SIMEON BENJAMIN was born 1792 - died September 1, 1868.



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After the above text had been typed, another poem by my Mother was discovered. It is placed here to record and to preserve it.

Mother wrote this poem at Gunstock where she had ample time to work out her thoughts during World War II. Ideas which she used init wereundoubtedly influenced by her concern for her grandchildren in the armed services.

Another reason for presenting this poem here is that it carries idealism which is found also in the story recently written by her grandson John Milliken Hall under the Title "Conquer or Die", the motto on the escutcheon -Aut Vinci Aut Mori"-of the 505th Bombardment Group, in which John served in the Pacific theater. He relates experiences through the eyes of a non-commissioned officer, who contributed his best to help his country bring the war to a victorious conclusion. He writes with humor, pathos, and excitement and gives a vivid account of events which brought the war to an end.

Seth⁶ lived at first on the east side of East Street about halfway between the old Charles Palmer and the former Quane place. There used to be a big willow tree where this Baldwin house was located. After he married Esther McNair Hall, he apparently were to live in the old Hall brick house at the northwest corner of East Street and the cross road to Humphrey Lane and then in the "Yellow House", which Asaph I had built at the site where later. Andrew Palmer built a new house which passed to Charles Palmer. After Theron S. Ludington died, however, Seth and Esther moved into the Ludington house, which was more elegant than their former home. After Seth's death the house near Ludington's Corners was occupied by a Mrs. Pooler. Then, it was taken down and used to build a house further down East Street for Andrew Barton—about where Leifert had a house, more recently the Jural place.

When I was small, I remember Grandfather Asaph Hall talking about "Grandfather Baldwin". He was very kind to the six Hall children of Asaph II, and after Asaph's death helped the family in various ways. When Seth Baldwin died, he left his property to the six Hall children. This seems a bit unusual as his daughter Preelove was still in Goshen and had a daughter, Lucretia. Apparently, Lucretia was not well, as she died in 1855. This situation may have been a factor in the disposition of Seth's estate.

Seth was active in the Connecticut militia, rising to the rank of Colonel. Marion Hall Fisher discovered Seth's appointment as a lieutenant, had it restored, and presented it to the Goshen Historical Society. It is valuable because it bears the autograph of Jonathan Trumbull.

Brewen⁵ was laid to rest in East Street Burying Ground. His simple stone was marked:

"In Memory of Brewen Baldwin who died Sept 16, 1833. AE 81."

His wife Hannah was buried there before him with a stone marked:

"Hannah, wife of Brewen Baldwin, died June 10, 1823. AE 67."

Since Baldwins were regularly buried in East Street, it is more than likely that the children who died young were placed there, although there do not seem to be stones for them.

"In Memory of Lucy Baldwin wife of Mr. Daniel Baldwin who died May 12th, 1808. Aged 59 years."

Lucia, the daughter of Birdsey and Lucia Baldwin, was buried in East Street Burying Ground. Her stone was inscribed:

"Lucia A. daughter of Birdsey and Lucia Baldwin died October 20, 1828. AE 2."

Collins Baldwin was an interesting character who rode a fine horse in fine clothes with a tall hat. He never married. He lived in a house on the south side of Ivy Mountain Road part way up the hill. Apparently, his remains were placed in East Street Burying Ground, although there is no stone to mark the spot.

As was usual, the Baldwin children who died young were likewise placed in East Street Burying Ground. These would include the infants born in 1784 and 1785, Lucy of 1789, and Gustavus of 1795. No stones remain to mark any of these graves.

Daniel⁵ lived above Ludington's Corners (Kelly's Corner). These corners were so named after Theron S. Ludington married Daniel's daughter Abigail and took over Baldwin lands about that area. Their son, Theron D. Ludington, built a house nearby on the Ivy Mountain Road. Theron S. Ludington built an elegant house on the north Side of Ivy Mountain Road. It contained a ballroom. The best rooms had elegantly carved woodwork. There was a store connected with Theron's house. Theron S. died in Baltimore on a sales trip there, after having contracted yellow fever.

Daniel was interred in East Street Burying Ground, as was also his wife. Their stones read:

"In Memory of Daniel Baldwin who died December 14, 1829. Aged 76 years."

Samuel⁴ is commemorated by a tombstone in East Street Burying Ground marked:

"In MEMORY of Mr. Samuel Baldwin who died Feb" 22nd 1804 in the 79th year of his age."

[Note: The date on the stone looks like "1809", but at 79 years of age it must be 1804. Also, the Baldwin Genealogy gives Oct. 22, 1804 as date of death with a note from a descendant it should be February 22 on the stone.]

In the East Street Burying Ground there are also stones inscribed:

Samuel⁴ had land in North Goshen including that on Long Hill from which the Gunstock property was carved.

Stephen⁴ took over the Goshen property bought by his father, Timothy³, and opened up by his brother Michael⁴. The time of his settling in Goshen is between the time of the death of his father in 1757 and 1762, when the records show he was present.

Stephen and his wife were both interred in the East Street Burying Ground. He lies under a double stone reading:

" In Memory of Mr. Stephen Baldwin who departed this life Jan. 27, 1766 in his 40th year."

"At his left lies his daughter Freelove who died Decr 13, 1765 in her 11th year."

There is no stone now for Stephen's wife, Freelove, but she was undoubtedly buried beside her husband, as was the daughter Freelove who lived only 10 years.

Stephen⁵ was buried in the East Street Burying Ground. His tombstone carries the lengthy inscription:

"In Memory of Stephen Baldwin who died May 21st 1810. Aged 52 years

"That God, whom he served in life, did not forsake him in the closing scene. He manifested himself to him and caused him to triumph. The arrows of death were blunted and the grave lost its terrors.

"His mind was tranquil and serene, No terrors in his looks were seen. His Savior's smile dispelled the gloom, And smoothed his passage to the tomb."

The third child of Stephen⁵ and Susannah Adams was Silas, b 9 June 1792. He m 3 April 1816 Harriet Humphrey dau Samuel Humphrey. In 1820 Silas and Harriet moved to Aurora, Ohio, where he d 6 Dec 1824. She returned to Goshen, and 25 Aug 1825 she m a Robert Palmer as his second wife.

Nathaniel³ was known as Deacon, for he was active in the church in each town where he lived--Guilford, Litchfield, and. Goshen. He moved to Litchfield in 1733 and to Goshen in 1739. He was a weaver by trade. He was one of the three proprietors of Goshen who bought two rights, drawing Nos. 22 and 42 for choice of land in the first divisions. He was on the committee to lay out the new town, treasurer, selectman, and moderator. After he came to know his son-in-law, Ebenezer Norton, who had married his daughter Elizabeth, he engaged in business with him. Nathaniel was elected representative in 1759 and 1760. His widow became blind sometime before her death. Both were buried in East Street Burying Ground.

His stone was inscribed:

"In Memory of Dean Nathaniel Baldwin Who died Oct. 18, 1760 in his 67th year."

Her stone was inscribed:

"In Memory of Mrs. Elizabeth wife of Dn Nathaniel Baldwin. She died Mar. 14, 1786. AE 90."

Nathaniel³ settled on East Street on the west side about opposite the land of David and Asaph (I) Hall, known to us in more recent years as the Charles Palmer place. He built his house at the southwest corner of East Street and the lane leading westerly to Humphrey Lane.

Timothy Baldwin had the position of Ensign. He bought two rights in Goshen, drawing Nos. 20 and 44 for choice of lands in the first two divisions. He did not settle in Goshen himself, however, but sent sons to clear land, build, and fence. Michael settled rights for his father and then returned to Guilford. Thereupon, his brother Stephen took over and remained in Goshen.

It is likely that Timothy's widow, Bathsheba, was interred in East Street Burying Ground, for she went to Goshen to live with her children and died there.

It has been said that Michael came to Goshen about or after 1745, although the rules for establishing a clear title would have required clearing and building before that year. He was a powerful man, a blacksmith, of little education. He decided that his family was not to grow up uneducated in the wilderness, Hence he returned to Guilford and then moved to New Haven to secure a good education for his family. He was eminently successful in this and his descendants were truly able, even illustrious.

All the children became outstanding. Abraham graduated from Yale 1772, taught there a few years, served as an army chaplain in the Revolution, studied law, and moved to Georgia. He was elected there to the legislature. He promoted educational institutions out of which came the University of Georgia, and was its president 1786-1802. In 1785 he was a member of the Congress

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Addendum 3

Goshen Baldwins - A Bit of Genealogy

Since the Baldwin family was one of the most prominent in Goshen, had much to do with opening up the northeastern and northern parts of the town, became intertwined with other prominent families, and played a direct role at Gunstock, it seems advisable to record more about the Baldwin family. A Baldwin daughter married a young Norton. Although at first the girl's father did not approve of her marriage, he and the husband, Ebenezer Norton, developed many common interests. Then, another Baldwin girl married Theron S. Ludington, who then settled at the corner of Ivy Mountain Road. Then, too, Seth Baldwin married the widow of Asaph Hall I.

With this bit of introduction it is well to give a brief genealogical outline of pertinent parts of the Baldwin family.

It will be noticed that a great many Baldwins were interred in East Street Burying Ground. There were some buried there who have no tombstones today, and these are noted where there has been indication of burial there.

Although the Baldwin family was one of the first and foremost of original proprietors and various Baldwins cleared land, built houses, farmed, carried on businesses, and participated actively in town and state affairs, there are no Baldwins remaining in Goshen. Many young folks moved to Vermont, New York, and Ohio. A few went south. Yet it is a family which should be well remembered and respected.

Goshen Baldwins descended from the immigrant Nathaniel Baldwin, who was one of the first settlers in Milford, Conn., in 1639. His father was Richard Baldwin of Cholesbury, Buckinghamshire, England, a weaver. He had an older brother Timothy who was an executor of his father's will in 1633, and a younger brother, Joseph, who was under 21 at the time of the probate. The three brothers then disappeared from English records and are found settling in Milford. Nathaniel was a cooper. He moved from Milford to Fairfield.

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

Sylvester, immigrant to Naw England, died on board the ship Martin in June or July, 1638. His nuncupative will was proved at Boston in the Massachusetts Bay Colony 13 July, 1638; he uttered the will 21 June 1638 and it was presented at the Court of Assistants held in Boston on the 4th day of 7th month, 1638 September, 1638) when the widow Sarah and the son Richard were allowed as executors according to will. Ralph D. Smyth, the historian of Guilford, Connecticut had stated that the maiden name of the of Sylvester Baldwin was Sarah Bryan, but he not give Charles C. Baldwin proof. Since then it has been alleged that she was a sister of Alexander Bryan of Milford, Connecticut, which is absolutely (sec BRYAN). The widow removed to New Haven and enrolled among the first planters at that place with five in her family and £300 assessed valuation. married 2, in 1640 to John Astwood of Stanstead Abbey, Hertfordshire, born in 1609, died in 1653; he was an immigrant on the Hopewell, and at Hilford, Connecticut in 1639. Sarah in her own will, dated 9 November, 1669, mentions my beloved brothers Richard Platt and Thomas Wheeler to be the overseers, to see this will fulfilled " (Baldwin Genealogy, by Charles Candee Baldwin, 1881, vol. I, p. 43). From this statement it has been assumed by some that Richard Platt Mary Bryan, who would then be a sister of Sylvester Baldwir's wife. We cannot disprove Mr. Ralph D. Smythe assertion, but it would seem quite possible that might have confused the parriage of Samuel Baldwin with Amy Bryan, which took place at Aston Buckinghamshire, 17 October, 1623, with the present connection. From a study of the connections of Richard Platt (see PLATT), who is undoubtedly the one who narried Mary Grover at Aldenhan, Hertfordshire 12 November, 1620, it may be supposed that Sarah was either his sister and a daughter of Richard and Rose (Windsor) Platt; or a sister of his wife, and hence Sarah Grover. It is improbable that her Platt, but she may well have been a member of Grover family of Cheshan, Buckinghanshire. interpretation of the statement made in Sarah's will is that Richard Platt and Thomas Wheeler were called brothers in a religious sense, that is, brethren the church, and as a consequence not necessarily related to her. There is considerable probability that this interpr totion is correct. Thomas Wheeler of Milford, Connecticut, who is probably the "brother" of Sarah () (Baldwin) Astwood, made his will 18 November, 1672. Therein he desired "my loving friends, Mr. Robert Treat, brothers Daniel & Samuel Buckingham, to be ye overseers...." This ambiguous phrase-clogy complicates the problem of solving the implied relationships. Daniel Buckingham married Hannah Fowler and was of a leter generation than Thomas Wheeler; the word "brothers" we think applies to an objective description of the known relationship between Daniel and Samuel Buckingham. As the descendants of Sylvester and Sarah Baldwin have been of frequent and detailed reference, we omit them here.

3. John, born at Dundridge, Buckinghamshire, about 1565; identified as the one of that name who was an ironmonger and resident of Chesham, Buckinghamshire. His will, dated 16 December, 1651, was proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury 26 October, 1652, and filed at 154 Bowyer. The abstract says that he was to be buried in the churchyard at Chesham; his daughter Marie Butterfield, 5 marks. To Richard field, one house wherein he now dwelleth. To Thomas Beecher, 25. To William Beecher, the brother of them, 220. To my daughter Anne Didsbery, 20s. To my daughter Didsbery's children,£5 a peece. To my daughter Martha Ward, 12d. And to my daughter Ward's sonne. To Thomas Ward the house that Robert lives in. To John Ward, my daughter's sonne, £20. To Ward, my daughter's daughter, twenty nobles. To Hary Ward, 20 nobles. first husband, Martha and Mary, whose portion of £30 each was delivered to their father-in-law, Barrows, by John Latimer of Wethersfield, Oct. 20th, 1651. For the faithful performance of his trust, Burrows pledged his house, land and stock at Pequonock, which shows how early he had settled east of the river. Mary, wife of Robert Burrows, died in Dec., 1672. Only two children have breatraced: Samuel and John, both presented to be made freemen of the colony in October, 1669. The subsequent history of Samuel is not known. John married, Dec. 14th, 1670, Hannah daughter of £4ward Culver, and had a large family of children. He died in 1693.

Amos Richardson, of Stonington, died Aug. 5th, 1683.

Mary, his relict, survived him but a few weeks. John, the oldest son of Mr. Richardson, was minister of the church in Newbury, Mass., where he was settled in 1674. He had two other sons, Stephen and Samuel, and a daughter, Prudence, who married, first, March 15th, 1682-3, John Hallam; second, March 17th, 1702-3, Eluathan Miner.

A lingering lawsuit was sustained by Mr. Richardson for several years against the town of New London to obtain possession of a house lot, formerly granted him, which, comprising the greater portion of the Parade, (State St.,) had been assumed by the town for a highway and public square. Mr. John Plumbe was Richardson stightway and public square, that Richardson should be indemainted for his lot, out of the nearest unoccupied hand that the town owned. In execution of this judgment the marshal took four pieces one piece of ninety-six rods, being a part of the original lot and on the north side of it, the same on which the first Episcopal charch was afterward creeted; a lot at the corner of Main and State Street, west side, which had hitherto been left common and uninclosed; ten rods on Mill Cove, and one hundred rods on the Beach.

"These two last pieces (says the marshal's return) were prized according to law, on the Cove, one rod for two, and on the Beach, two rods for one; the four pieces containing 285 rods were delivered to Mr. Amos Richardson and accepted in full satisfaction; Feb. 13, 1681."

William Hough, died August 10th, 1683.

The family of Samuel Hough, oldest son of William, is registered

st Saybrook, and in connection with the record it is stated that Wilkam Hough, was a son of Edward Hough, of West Chester in Cheshire, England. It has not been ascertained that this Edward Hough emigrated to America, but a widow Ann Hough that died in felorester, Mass., in 1672, aged eighty-five years, was perhaps his refict, and the mother of William Hough.

William Hough married Sarah, daughter of Hugh Calkin, October 20th, 1635.

Hannah Hough married John Borden of Lyme; Abiah married the second William Douglas; Sarah married David Carpenter.

The marriage of William Hough and the births of three children, are reorded at Gloucester; the remainder in New London, but it is mentioned that Samuel was born in Saybrook. The father being a bose builder might have been temporarily employed in that place.

The last four children of William Hough are not afterward found at See London; it is probable that they were scattered in other towns. Small the oblest son settled in Snybrook. Capt. John Hough, the second son, was a noted man of his time, powerful in frame and mergetic in character. His wife was Sarah Post, of Norwich, and Capt. Hough was at one time a resident in that place. His death was caused by a fall from the scalfolding of a house which he was balling in New London, August 26th, 1715. No external injury modd be discovered, but he lived only an hour. Such an event was mistigent at that time to move the whole town.

William Hough, Jun., married Ann, daughter of Samuel Lothrop, of Norwich. He died April 22d, 1705. His reliet, Widow Ann Hough, died in Norwich Nov. 19th, 1745.

John Baldwin, of Stonington, died Au, 1st 19th, 1683.

Among the original emigrants from Great Britain to the shores of New England, were several John Baldwins. Two of these, father

I has home, which belonged to Richard Christophers, was on State Street, the end is no street, near the corner of the present Bradley Street, but at that time no street for the least of it, and the house franted the water. and son, who married Mary and Hannah Bruen, have already been mentioned in this history, as belonging to Milford, and subsequently joining the company that purchased Newark. Another John Baldwin was of Guilford, where he married Hannah Burchet, or Birchards in 1653, and afterward removed to Norwich. A fourth John Baldwin was the one now under consideration, and may be distinguished as the son of Sylvester, of whom John, Sen., of Milford, was probably a brother.

Sylvester Baldwin died on the voyage from Great Britain, a passenger in the Martin, 1638, making his will "on the main ocean bound for New England." In this will be is said to be of Aston-Clinton in Bucks; he notes wife Sarah, sons Richard and John, and daughters Sarah, Mary, Martha and Ruth. The will was proved in July, before Deputy Governor Dudley of Mass.'

In 1645, the Widow Baldwin is found enrolled among the residents of New Haven; five in her family and her estate estimated at £800.* She afterward married John Astwood, one of the first planters of Milford, and removed to that place. Richard Baldwin, her oldest son, married and settled at Milford. John, the second son, we suppose to be the person who came to New London, where his name appears occasionally after 1654, but not as a fixed resident till about ten years later.

He is on the rate list of 1667, and on the roll of freemen in 1668. He purchased two houses in the town plot and had several grants of land.

Ilis first wife died at Mifford in 1658, leaving a son, John, born in 1657. This son came to New London with him, received adult baptism in 1674 and after that event is lost to our records. From some probate testimony given at a much later period, we learn that soon after arriving at maturity, he sailed for England and never returned.

John Baldwin, the father, married July 24th, 1672, Rebecca, reliet of Elisha Cheschrough, and daughter of Walter Palmer. This connection with a richly downed widow, whose possessions lay in Stonington, led to an immediate transfer of his residence to that

place. By this marriage he had a son Sylvester and several daughters.

Benjamin Atwell, died 1683.

The name suggests a family connection with the Benjamin Atwell hilled by the Indians, while he was engaged in hay-making, August 11th, 1676, at Casco, within a mile of the present Portland, Maine. Benjamin Atwell of New London, had been at that time about ten years an inhabitant. He was constable of the town in 1675. He led a son Benjamin, whose birth is not recorded in New London; Themas born 1670; John, 1675; Joseph, 1677; Richard, 1679; and Samuel, the youngest child, born April 28d, 1682. Joseph, Richard and Samuel, settled about 1710, on wild land in the North Parlsh of New London. Joseph died without issue. Descendants of the actors remain in that vicinity.

Two of the grandchildren of Samuel, that is, of the fourth generation from the first settler Benjamin, were living at the commencement of the year 1850. These were Samuel Atwell and his sister factoin, children of Samuel Atwell second. Samuel died Nov. 26th, 1850, aged ninety-five years and six months; Lucretia, daughter of Samuel second and relict of Joseph Atwell, died Oct. 25th, 1851, 1801 102 years. She was born Nov. 19th, 1749, O. S. Here are three generations covering the space from 1682 to 1851.

Renjamin and Thomas Atwell, the two oldest sons of Benjamin water, died in New London leaving descendants. John, in 1712, was of Saybrook.

Daniel Comstock, died 1683.

William Comstock the father of Daniel, came from Hartford in 1613 and lived to old age in his house upon Post Hill; (near northment of Williams and Vauxhall Streets.) His wife Elizabeth was spot fifty-five in 1663. No record has been found of the death of enter. His land was inherited by his son Daniel, of New London, and grandson William, of Lyme. The latter was a son of John Comstock deceased—and his mother Abigail in 1680, was the wife of Moses Huntley, of Lyme. It is probable that Daniel and John was the only children of William Comstock, sen., and his wife
