Christopher Hussey, bp. Dorking, Surrey, Eng. s/o John and Mary
Wood. Dorking is 26 miles from London. Baptized 18 Feb. 1599.
Mary Wood or Marie Moor (hard to read old records) and John
Hussey were married Dec. 5, 1593. Then son John bp. Apr. 29,
1594 and d. Nov. 8, 1597. In 1670 Mr. John Hussey was living
near Wotton and at Sutton in Shere. No records of Husseys before
or after that time are in that locale.

When young, Mr. Christopher H. spent some time in Holland where
he solicited in marriage Theodate Batchelder, dau. of Rev. Stephen.
Rev. S. gave consent to their union on condition that they would
come to America with him, and they arrived in Boston 1632 on ship
William and Francis. Their eldest son was first child baptized
in Lynn, Mass by Rev. S. Hussey settled Newbury by 1636, 1638 to
Hampton which he and father -in -law founded. 1659 one of the
purchasers of Nantucket Island, subsequently he was a sea captain.
He died at Hampton, N.H. March 6, 1686 and was buried there Mar. 8.
Had 2 sons and 3 dau:

Stephen m. Marth Bunker, John m. Rebecca Perkins, Huldah m John
Smith and lived to be 97. Mary, Theodata. Eldest son Stephen
m. 1676, had lived at Barbadoes, had considerable property and was
a Friend before a Society was formed on Nantucket. He d. 1718 age
88 and left ch: Puella, Abigail, Sylvanus, Bachiller, Daniel, Geo.
and Theodata.

Second son John moved to Delaware by 1688.

The title page in the oldest book of records says: "The Records of the Church at Hampton as they were exactly kept from Nov. 19 anno Dom. 1696 together with some fragments extracted out of a manuscript of my father's by Jn^o Cotton Pastor of ye church. Aug. 5, 1707" His father was Seaborn Cotton. Later in the book is a page which says: "Continuation of the Records of the Church of Hampton from Nov. 15th 1710 by Nathl. Gookin Pastor of the Church."

NEW HAMPSHIRE LINK to the BATTLE of GETTYSBURG

In war there is often a turning point, an event or moment in history that propels one side toward victory. In July of 1863 as reports of an imminent clash in Pennsylvania of the Union's Army of the Potomac and the Confederate's Army of Northern Virginia reached the north - one native of New Hampshire suspected the time had come for the decisive battle of the Civil War.

John Badger BACHELDER, a lithographer and writer with an entrepreneurial spirit, rushed to Gettysburg, arriving just three days after the battle's end. There he came upon a horrifying scene: thousands of freshly dug graves and the bodies of dead and wounded soldiers in blue and grey uniforms strewn across five miles of fields. That day Bachelder launched into what would become a lifelong obsession with chronicling one of the great battles of human history.etc etc (letter sent to UNH for permission to reprint 11/13/98)

our number had dug a tunnel in order to escape, and to punish these, thousands of starving men were deprived of the morsel that would barely keep the breath of life in them from day to day. They shot men; cause - they had reached over the dead line for water or for a cracker that was a foot beyond it. They chased men with dogs, and these dogs did bite and mutilate them from the effects of which they died; cause - they the were attempting to escape. They put prisoners in chain gangs and in stocks; they whipped them at a whipping-post; they hung them up by thumbs; cause - these prisoners attempted to escape. They did force prisoners to be vaccinated with poisonous virus, and but few that were vaccinated lived. They beat and kicked sick soldiers who were too ill to keep up in line of march, and last of all, when they had killed by inhuman treatment and cruelties, they buried our friends and comrades in an indecent manner that even barbarians could not have excelled."

During seven months these men were kept in this prison, and in that time famine, pestilence and cruelty accomplished their work. About half their number died there, and of the remainder many returned with broken constitutions and permanently impaired health.

Four of the men from the 24th died in battle, 10 died of disease while in the U. S. service, 2 died at their homes while in the service, 3 died after reaching the Federal lines, 2 died at Charleston prison, 12 at Florence prison, and many, including **B. F. BACHELDER** of the 24th Independent Battery, died at Andersonville prison.

Minimal computations, little more than educated guesses, especially with regard to the southern forces, showed a North-South total of 623,026 dead and 471,427 wounded.

The butcher's bill came to no less than 1,094,453. There were more than 10,000 military actions, including 76 full-scale battles, 310 engagements, 6337 skirmishes, and numerous sieges, raids, expeditions.

Of 583 Union generals, 47 were killed in action; 425 Confederate generals, 77 fell. Approximately one out of ten able-bodied Northerners was dead or incapacitated, while the South lost one out of four, including her noncombatant Negroes. Some notion of the drain this represented, as well as the poverty the surrendered men came home to, was shown by the fact that during the first year of peace the state of Mississippi allotted a solid fifth of its revenues for the purchase or artificial arms and legs for its returning veterans. - *Epilogue, The Civil War, A Narrative, Shelby Foote; First Vintage Books Edition, September 1986, Volume 3, pp 1040-1.*

SURRENDER AND SUFFERINGS of the Civil War and Andersonville Prison

During the Civil War the 24th Independent Battery of the Union Army was in the south, and had suffered no great hardships until many were captured and sent to Andersonville prisoner-of-war camp near Americus, Georgia. The camp for enlisted personnel had been established in the spring of 1864 about 100 miles due south of Atlanta, and by mid year was holding nearly 30,000 Federal prisoners. Excerpts from some of the journals give accounts of their surrender and sufferings. *"Stripped of arms, mortified, sick at heart, we were penned by rebel guards and allowed to take a night's rest on the greensward. As the sun lowered we took a view of our once pleasant and happy camp. How desolate and dreary it was now!"* A number of the men were made prisoners and taken to the prisons at Florence and Charleston, from which some never returned.

Those who had surrendered took up their march under rebel guards who were loaded with the plunder they had taken from the town, much of which they were compelled to throw away. On the 25th of April they arrived at Tarboro, where the officers were separated from the men and taken to Richmond. The men were then taken on platform cars, by way of Wilmington, Charleston, Savannah and Macon to Andersonville (Georgia). On their arrival there they had their first sight of Captain Wirz (Captain Henry Wirz, the Swiss-born commandant, was eventually tried and hanged on November 10, 1865). One of them described him thus: *"Suddenly, as if it had been the devil himself, this fiend made his appearance through or near one of the fires. Short in stature, stooping figure, ill shaped head, awkward limbs and movement, a deep set ugly eye, and a tongue reeking with profanity - such was Captain Wirz."*

Andersonville has been so often described and its loathsome horrors so minutely depicted that no recapitulation is needed here. Clara Barton said of it:

"After this, whenever any man who has lain a prisoner with the stockade of Andersonville would tell you of his sufferings - how he fainted, scorched, drenched, hungered, sickened, was scoffed, scourged, hunted and persecuted - though the tale be long and twice told; as you would have your own wrongs appreciated and your own woes pitied, your own cries for mercy heard, I charge you listen and believe him. However strongly he may have outlined or deeply he may have colored his picture, know that the reality calls for a better light and a nearer view than your clouded distant gaze will ever get; and your sympathies need not be confined to Andersonville while similar horrors glared in the sunny light, and spotted the flower-girt garden fields of that whole desperate, misguided and bewildered people. Wherever stretched the form of a Union prisoner there rose the signal for cruelty and the cry of agony, and there day by day grew the skeleton graves of nameless dead."

Father Hamilton, who was there to administer the rites of the Catholic church to the sick and dying, said of what he found there:

"I saw a great many men perfectly naked, walking about through the stockade. They seemed to have lost all regard for delicacy, shame, morality, or anything else. I would frequently have to creep on my hands and knees into the holes the men had burrowed on the ground, and stretch myself out alongside of them to hear their confessions. I found them almost living in vermin in these holes. They could not be in any other condition than a filthy one, because they got no soap and no change of clothing, and were there all huddled together."

Mr. Merrill, in his "Record," says of the cruelties inflicted on prisoners there: *"Several times they ceased to issue rations for a day, and even two days; cause - some few of*

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
