WILL OF SALLY BACK

Wayne County Kentucky, June 29th day 1844

Know all men by these presents that I Sally Back of the County and State aforesaid being old and weak in body but of sound mind and disposing memory I do make and declare the following to be my last will and testament, hereby revoking all other wills heretofore made by me, being impowered by my husband Jacob Back in his will to dispose of certain things as I pleased, being now of sound mind I hereby give and bequeath the things as follows:

1st. It is my will and desire that after my death that all my close and beds and bed clothing and goods of any kind and all such things which I die leaving shall be equally divided between my three daughters Patience Cooper Elender Loyd and Elizabeth Higginbotham, and it is further my will that Elizabeth Andrew and Sarah Cooper my two grand daughters shall both of them have one share equal with my own daughters before named out of my beds and close and goods before named each of them making one share which is to be equally divided between them.

2nd. It is further my will and desire that after my death that all my money which I may die leaving may be equally

divided between my children as follows, Charles Back, John Back, Thomas W. Back, Patience Cooper, Elender Loyd. Elizabeth Higginbotham and it further my will that my two grand daughters Elizabeth Andrew and Sally Cooper shall jointly have one share of my money equally with my own children above named the foregoing I mean to include all money on hand and all money which may be coming to me and it is to be divided after my death as soon as it can be collected provide thaough subject to the following condition, whereas my grand daughter Martha Back claims a debt against me for her company staying with me for which I don't consider I owe her a cent for. I consider her claim unjust and if my said granddaughter Martha Back should recover anything for her claim that which shy may recover or any body for her that which she recovers shall be my son Charles Back portion of the aforesaid money or if there should be any suit brought against the estate or me on account of the claim, it is my will that my son Charles Back shall not have any part of my money but if there is no more said nor done about the Claim forever it is my will that my son Charles Back shall have a equal share of my money as before named.

3rd. It is further my will and desire that a mare colt which I now have and which I raised and all other stock which I may die leaving shall go to my daughters Sharlotta Ruthy and Polleys children which is my motherly (motherless) granddaughters as the remains of the property in my husbands will directs.

4th. It is further my will and desire that my son in law Giles W. Loyd be my executor and that my executor shall have full power to divide the above named money and property as I have directed as near as he can, and it is further my will that the County Court do no appoint any appraisers for the property can be divided without, and it further my will that the County Court do no require my said executor to give any security as my executro.

The following wills were submitted by Mrs. Ruby Markland, 933 South Wolcott, Casper, Wyoming. While we would not usually use two wills in one issue of The Family Tree, these were the wills of Mrs. Markland's second great grandfather, Jacob Back, and his wife, Sally Back. They seem to belong together.

The will of Jacob Back, recorded in June 1840, seems primarily concerned with the parceling out of his slaves (and any children they might have in the future) to his heirs. While we may not agree with Mr. Back, we must bear in mind that such things were common during this time. Today, it seems so cruel as to be inhuman to bequeath to people the lives of other human beings. Mrs. Markland comments that her husband threatened to sever all connections with such a family. Sally Back's will, recorded in 1844, concerns mostly household belongings, along with her desire that an ungrateful granddaughter should not have her reward.

WILL OF JACOB BACK

I. Jacob Back of the County of Wayne and State of Kentucky being old and infirm in body but of sound mind and disposing memory and knowing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death do hereby make and declare the following to be my last will and testament. 1st I do hereby appoint, constitute and make my son Charles Back and son in law Giles W. Loyd my executor and desire that they see this my last will shall be faithfully and fairly carried into effect. 2nd. My will and desire is that the whole of my estate of which I may die leaving and possessed of both real personal and mixed shall belong and remain for the use and benefit of beloved wife. Sally during her natural life. It is further my will and desire that my said executor do sell at publick auction such of my estate except my land and negroes as in their opinion might or will be subject to waite and loss by keeping and to pay all of my just debts that may be against me and the rest that may remain to be put out on interest and the interest to be applied to the support of my beloved wife Sally and as much of the principal as may be necessary during her natural life. 3rd. It is my will and desire that my beloved wife Sally shall have the power to dispose of her clothing and bedding and money as she may think proper after my death. 4th. It is further my will and desire that after the death of my wife that the whole of the land estate of which I may die leaving and possessed of shall be equally divided between my two sons John Back and Thomas W. Back. 5th. It is further my will and desire that after the death of my wife that my son Charles Back shall have and is hereby give and bequeathed my negro man named Peter and a negro boy named Harrison to remain my said son's for his use and the use of his children. 6th It is further my will and desire that if my negro woman Dilly shall have more issue or children that the first one living shall be and belong and is hereby given and bequeathed to my daughter Elender Loyd to remain for the use and benefits of my said daughter and for the use of her children. 7th. It is further my will and desire that my daughter Patience Cooper shall have and is hereby given a negro girl named Juley about four years of age and is also hereby given and bequeathed the second child my negro woman Dilley may hereafter have for the use of my said daughter and for the use of her children. 8th, It is further

my will and desire and is hereby given to my son Charles Back the third child that my negro woman may hereafter have to remain for his use and for the use of his children. 9th. It is further my will and desire and is hereby given to my two granddaughters Elizabeth Andrews and Sarah Cooper a negro boy named Elisha about one year old and also the fourth child that my negro woman Dilley may hereafter have to remain for their use and for the use of their children. 10th. It is further my will and desire that the above named four children that my negro woman may have hereafter that the negro woman shall succle the children and keep them til they are six months old and at that age each of these heirs that is to get them is to take them from her. 11th. It is further my will and desire that when my negro woman Dilley has these children that whoever of the heirs is to have the child they are to pay the midwife fees and to nurse the negro woman. 12th, It is further my will and desire that after the death of my wife that my daughter Elizabeth Higginbotham is not to hinder the children that she may have herafter from going to and belonging to them as heretofore named. 12th. It is further my will and desire and is hereby given and bequeathed that if any of the heirs that is hereafter named does not get a child of my negro woman that she is to have hereafter by the negro woman not having them or by their desiring that each of the heirs that fail to get one is to have one hundred dollas in money out of my other estate in lieu thereof. 13th. It is further my will and desire if my wife Sally and is hereby given to my son in law Giles W. Loyd my still and tubs and all that pertaines thereto after my death. 14th. It is further my will and desire and is hereby given to my borther in law Nicholas Loyd all of my wearing clothes that I may die leaving and the saddle that I may own for his use if he out lives me and if the said Nicholas Loyd dies first the above named clothes is hereby given to my negro Peter. 15th. It is further my will and desire if my wife Sally does not want to keep the negroes in her possession that they be hired out to them that they belong to at private contracts. 16th. It is further my will and desire that all the rest of my estate shall be sold and the money divided equally amongst all of my motherless grandchildren except Elizabeth Andrews and Sally Cooper as they, foresaid children comes of age. 17th,

TOMBSTONES

Doris C. Buckner of 2711 East Morris, Wichita, Kansas is the winner of the 'tombstone of the Month' contest for this issue. Mrs. Buckner sent us the following entry:



THE WATTS FAMILY TOMBSTONE

Located in Pleasant Valley Cemetery, 1 mile south and 1 1/2 mile west of Stanley, Kansas.

In 1852, Anthony Banaugh Watts and his wife, Sarah Dodson Watts, a great-granddaughter of Daniel Boone, purchased a mill and twenty-three acres of land on Indian Creek in Dallas, Missouri, The Watts Mill prospered and became a landmark in the Kansas City area and to travelers starting west on the Santa Fe Trail.

After the death of Anthony Watts, in 1861, the grist mill continued under his son, Stubbins Watts, and later under his grandson, Edgar Watts. In 1942 the huge buhrstones finally came to rest - the mill had been in the family for 90 years.

Prior to 1922, members of the Watts family were interred in the family burying ground near the mill, but Stubbins Watts, realizing that the site was in the path of the rapidly growing community of Kansas City, requested that all the family remains be moved to the Pleasant Valley Cemetery.

When the mill died and was dismantled, one of its stones came to mark the final resting place of Anthony, Stubbins and others of the family who had spent so many years among the turning shafts of the old Watts Mill.

and, above all, by parish registers. But they are prime sources in their own right and valuable supplementary and complementary sources as well. In the absence of the records just cited and before the advent of parish registers, they are your staple sources and I hope that I have been able to convince you of the validity of this and to have at least given you some introduction to the values and by inference at least the pitfalls of their use.


There are other land records which should at least be briefly mentioned. In the running of any landed estate and particularly a large one, there has always been a need for rentals, accounts, surveys, field books, abstracts of holdings, all of which I have already mentioned in the context of manorial records and copyhold tenure. When applied to freehold and leasehold tenures, they serve the same purpose and will take much the same sort of forms as they will or may take in the copyhold and manorial context. So what I have had to say about these records earlier applies equally now and I do not think that I need repeat more than the general statement that they can be

valuable as locators of an ancestor at a particular place at a particular time and especially valuable if a family was located in one place over a period of years.

This, then, seems the right moment to come up out of the mine and to call a halt to our prospecting. I hope you have found some useful veins in the rock and that you will exploit them with benefit in your researches.

She has them on the 1910, 1900, 1880, 1870 censuses, and has his Civil War pension records, but cannot locate him with his parents in 1860 or 1850 for sure. Can anyone tell us whether the Edward BLACK family in Cincinatti dwelling # 902 on the 1850 census for Hamilton Co., Ohio, is NOT his? Migration patterns and additional information related to the BLACKS of Newberry Co., SC, especially the descendants of David Benjamin BLACK 1789-1857.

The Millers of Plainville (Georgia) Starr Miller, 1974. Xerox, 8 pages. File copy. David Benjamin BLACK was listed on the 1840 Cherokee Co., AL census with 8 children, and the 1850 as well. By 1853, he was on the Springtown Gordon Co., GA tax list. Springtown Valley ran all the way from Plainville to the mountain and up to Reeves (farm?). This is the valley in Floyd, later Gordon, County, Georgia, where the BLACKS, ZUBERS, MILLERS, JOHNSONS, and ANTHONYS lived. Thomas MILLER, born in 1773, lived in Cherokee Co., AL from 1835 until his first wife Margaret BROWN died. He then lived in Floyd Co. for a while, then returned to Alabama in 1863. He died in Jefferson Co., 20 May 1865 and is buried in Crumley Chapel Cemetary near Adamsville. He had come to Alabama in 1835 from the Long Cane Creek area of Abbeville District, SC., and brought his sons William and Wesley. There were all together forty or fifty souls who came to Alabama from SC. We know that Whitfield ANTHONY and his son were Methodist preachers, and my information suggests that David BLack, his son James B. BLack, and the others came to that part of Alabama to proselyte the Indians in the area, sent by the South Carolina Methodist Conference.

William S. JOHNSON was born in North or South Carolina in 1821, and by 1850 was in Cass Co., GA. In 1860 he and his family were in Gordon Co., without moving, because the county boundaries had changed. They came to Jefferson Co., AL about 1865, after the War, and he and his wife, Delia THOMAS, are buried in Crumley Chapel Cemetary. William's father was supposedly Pleasant JOHNSON, who had a large farm in North Carolina. William and Delia married in Rockingham Co. NC in 1844.

The MILLERS were from Snow Camp, Alamance Co, NC, and the JOHNSONS and THOMASES may have been, too. These families were probably from Pennsylvania before that. The BLACKS, THOMASES, and JOHNSONS supposedly had land in NC before the Rev. War,

and were granted land in Georgia for their war service.

There is a W. ZUBER listed in Floyd Co, Ga., in 1840, with 6 children. He would have been born 1800-1810. His father, if this is Williamson ZUBER, may have been Daniel ZUBER who was in the 1850 Floyd Co. census, age 66 with his wife Nancy and son Richard K., age 21, and Mary, age 20. According to this, Daniel was born in PA about 1784. Living with him are John BLACK and William H. ZUBER as day laborers. The ZUBERS had been in Georgia since before 1830, so they were not in the party with the MILLERS, but there are a number of ZUBER families in Abbeville, SC. Williamson ZUBER is on the 1870 Gordon Co, Ga. census with his wife, Annie COPELAND BLACK, age 49, born SC, the second wife of David B. BLACK.

There were no Blacks living in Los Angeles, Marin, Monterrey, Mendocino, Napa, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz, Shasta, Solano, Sonoma, or Yolo Counties.

From Blacks in the far West we will go to Blacks in the far East... Betsey Powell POLGLASE (see Queries), sent me three family group sheets on one of the earliest Black lines in this country, that of John BLACK who came to this country by 1631. I will give a summary of the information, but for confirmation and further data, write Mrs. POLGLASE. Maxine SANTMYER and Mary GROSLAND are also researching this line...

John BLACK b. circa 1609 in England Wife Susanna SHOCKLEY?. He was admitted a freeman in 1631/32, admitted to the Church in Charlestown, Massachusetts in 1634/35, and moved to Salem in 1636, where daughters Lydia, who died, and a second Lydia in 1638, and an unnamed daughter were born. Mrs. POLGLASE surmises that two other daughters, Elizabeth and Persis, were born before this, in Charlestown, about 1632-1634. Elizabeth married 4 times, to Humphrey GILBERT, William RAYNOR, Henry KIMBALL, And Daniel KILHAM. Persis married Robert FOLLETT 29 Nov 1655 in Salem. Lydia married Isaac DAVIS 28 Sep. 1659 in Beverly. John also may have had a son John who was born about 1642 and who married Freeborne WOLFE, the widow of Robert SALLOWS on 29 Jul. 1664. Freeborn had four children by Robert SALLOWS, and John may have had one son, John BLACK, jr, baptized 14 Jul 1666, Martha, bap. 22 Mar 1667/68, Peter bap. 25 Jul 1669, Susanna bap. 25 Aug 1672, and Nathaniel bap. 2 Sep 1677 with Freeborn. All of these baptisms took place in the First Church Unitarian in Beverly, Mass.

John BLACK born circa 1609 died 16 Mar 1675 in Beverly, Massachusetts. John his son, made a will in 1698, but was still alive in 1700 because he is listed as owning a lot in Beverly in 1700. His son, the third John BLACK, married Deborah --- by 1686, and then married Mary MORGAN 18 Aug 1700 in Beverly.He had one daughter, Elizabeth, bap. 31 May 1686 at the First Parish of the Unitarian Church in Beverly, Mass. She was the daughter of his first wife Deborah. There is some confusion about which John did which marriage, as is usual when there are hosts of John Blacks in one area. I think I have summed the material up correctly, but if you have any questions, write Betsey POL GLASE, whose address is in the Queries section. Other BLACK marrieages in the Beverly area that may be related; Nathaniel Black married Martha MOORE 1695 in Milton; Elizabeth BLACK married Joseph WALLIS 13 Jan 1702 in Beverly; Holland BLACK married Sue BLACK 14 Feb 1712 in Beverly; Nathaniel BLACK married Mary OBER 13 Mar 1734 in Beverly.

My third great grandmother was Rachel BLACK, born 1750 in Bath Co., VA, which was then Augusta Co. VA. Her parents were Alexander BLACK ans wife Jane who purchased 250 acres on Cowpasture River from Thomas LEE in 1750. She had a brother Alexander BLACK, jr., who married Agnes Nancy KINCAID and died in KY in 1818.

Alexander BLACK SR. died in 1764 after being constable. I note that a John MILLER adminittered his estate. He had a daughter Mary BLACK who married a Mr. MILLER. Other daughters were Nancy who married Thomas MCCLUNG abt 1756- Thomas MCCLUNG was killed at the Battle of Point Pleasant in the Ohio River in October of 1774, in the fight with the Indians. Margaret BLACK who married William FEMESTER died before 1775. Most of this family

lived in what is now West Virginia.

The 250 acres of land was divided between Alexander BLACK, jr. and his older brother, William BLACK who married Sarah HICKLIN abt 1763 and moved to CLark Co. KY, where he left a Will about 1813. William had a son named George Miller BLACK. Alexander BLACK had no children, and when he left a will in Fayette Co. KY in 1828 he had outlived all his sisters and brother William. He left his property to be divided among the nieces and nephews. One or two great grandchildren in the MCCLUNG family were also listed, also Geo ge and Robert MILLER, Abraham MILLER (who could have been the husband of Sarah GIVENS MILLER, daughter of Rachel BLACK GIVENS.

A history of Bath and adjoining counties has been written in which there is the state-ment that Alexander BLACK was born on the boat coming to America. I have looked in vain to find the name of a BLACK family who came to America between 1710-1720; I am told there is no record of any BLACK coming to America prior to 1735. (Ed. note-We have no less than 22 BLACK men to the US by 1735) Rachel and Alexander jr. were the youngest members of the family and William, Margaret, Mary and Nancy were all born in the 1740's.

I have noted that there was a Rev. Alexander BLACK who came over in the 1760's and was a Tory during the Revolutionary WAR. I have nothing on him. I believe there was an Alexander BLACK in what became Washington Co, VA in the 1760's. Also the Rev. SAmuel BLACK, uncle of Samuel BLACK, wife Jane PORTER, had son Alexander.

<u>Editor's note further</u>. This was submitted in 1982, and has since been more researched. See the query column for another researcher on this line.

CABARRUS COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA BLACK FAMILIES

While researching an inquiry about BLACKS in North Carolina, I extracted all the BLACK marriages in Cabarrus County, trying to make some tentative family groupings. The 1800 census for Cabarrus County lists James, age 45 or older; John jr., age 26-45; another John jr., age 26-45, and Thomas, age 26-45. The 1810 lists only John and Samuel, as does the 1820. The 1830, however, lists Stephen B., Charles S., John, John M., Samuel, and Thomas. The 1840 lists Ezekiel C., John W., Joseph I., Joseph M., Samuel M., Thomas N., Thomas P., and William G. By 1850 there is only a Samuel W. I was originally looking for BLACK-ALEXANDER-YOUNG connections, but I kept coming across BLACK-WHITE connections, so I tried to put them together. I was also intrigued by the disappearance and reappearance of names on the censuses. I put together the following information.

I grouped Stephen B., Matilda, John M., Elizabeth, Richmond A., Ezekiel C., Thomas B., and Charles S. together because of the closeness of their marriage dates, and the probable fathers for them would be John or Samuel in the 1810 or 1820 census, or the older Thomas. This is only and idea. There were also three much older men; Robert BLACK who married Mary CALDWELL 4 Feb 1793; James who married Sophia YOUNG 20 Mar 1805; and David M., who married Winsome DANIEL 3 Jul 1806. These three may be related. I haven't done extensive research on any of these. I looked for the 3 men I starred above in other 1850 censuses, and found all three of them in the 1850 Hardeman County, TN census very near each other. This led more credence to the idea that they were brothers. Looking back a generation, I found all three on the 1840 Hardeman census as well. These are their 1850 listings;

Stephen B. BLACK b. 1799 NC, wife Rosanna, Ch: Washington 20, Sarah 15, John 15, Julia 13, Robert 12, Linley 6, Virginia 4. Both parents b. NC Charles S. BLACK b. 1805 NC, wife Margaret Ch: Sintha 21, John 18, Jane 20, Margaret 15, Washington 11, Alexander 9, Mary 4. Thomas B. BLACK b. 1807 NC, wife Caroline, Ch: Frankland 16, Easter 15, John 11, James 9, Edwin 7, Celia 5, Zachariah 1. Also Martha WARFORD 18, possibly an older married daughter, and Jane, her daughter.

I also have the following group sheets for Cabarrus County BLACKS; 1850-60 census; Ezekiel C. BLACK 50 NC, wife Martha, Ch: James 20, Monroe 18, Elizabeth 16, Hessie 14, Martha 13, Mary 10, Ezekiel 7, Tersey 5, Samuel 2. All born NC. Joseph M. BLACK 38 NC, wife Rebecca Ch: Elizabeth 4, Cornelia 8 on 1860, Rozena 7 on 1860, Lorna 6 on 1860, Edward 3 on 1860 Sarah 1 on 1860.

Joseph S. BLACK 38 NC, wife Mary, Ch: Robert 13 on 1850, Louisa 11 on 1850, Harvey 9 on 1850, James 7 on 1850, John 5 on 1850, Martha 2 on 1850, David 8 on 1860.

We are now preparing an index for the 1985 issues of the newsletter. We still have some of the 1971-83 all names and the 1984 Black only indexes left. As these were mailed to those who requested them, I apologized for the poor 'printing. They kept being delayed and eventually I just printed them on my printer and xeroxed them. I reduced the price accordingly. There are a few left. They are ugly, but still a good finding tool. I also have completed extracting all the BLACKS in the 1850 Georgia census, and will be running that info in parts in the newsletter. For those who want it all in one piece, I can have some printed in entirety... The results of the survey on the contents and format of the newsletter are in, and I have tried to include some of the suggstions in each issue. Everyone wanted his or her own area highlighted, of course, and the most prevalent request came from people researching in the North. I did not think the newsletter had a Southern bias, but I checked back through the issues for the last two years and found a little less emphasis on the Northeast, so I ahve included more from that area in each subsequent issue. Everyone was in favor of the new format, and thought the printing and presentation had become more professional. No one has complained about the raise in price, understanding the cost of mailing and printing has gone up twice. I may switch to a computer word processing program for the newsletters and see how that looks. Everything I do is designed to increase efficiency and reduce cost. This is still a one person operation, and it is getting to be enormous. My thanks to all of you who took time to answer the survey and to those of you who included a "keep up the good work" comment with your dues renewals. We are still mailing to 300 or more each time, but I will have to eliminate some of the libraries to keep the costs down. Being nonprofit helps the costs, too. If anyone out there needs a charitable write off.....

Roger POLING married Margaret BLACK by 1787. Roger was the son of Martin POLING. The families lived in the Goose Creek area of Loudon County, then moved to Georges Creek in Allegheny, now Garrett Co., MD. In the <u>History of Barbour County</u>, West Virginia, page 400 is found:

John I. HOFFMAN was born near the mouth of Laurel Creek in 1841, the son of Israel Putnam and Anna BLACK HOFFMAN . . . John HOFFMANN, his grandfather, was a German and came from Loudon County, Virginia and settled near Meadowville in 1797 when the father of the subject of this sketch (i.e. John Hoffman) was six or seven years old . . John BLACK, the grandfather of John I. Hoffman (i.e. Anna BLACK HOFFMAN'S father) . . came from what is now Garrett County, Maryland . . .

Mr. Long tells me that the POLINGS and BLACKS left Loudon by 1780, moved to Hunterdon Co., New Jersey, then Garrett County, Maryland about 1786, and on to West Virginia about 1810. John BLACK married Hester BILES 21 Dec 1806, according to Hunterdon County marriage records.

ALEXANDER BLACK OF BATH AND AUGUSTA COUNTY, VIRGINIA 1720-1764

Another line that I receive frequent queries about is the lineage of Alexander BLACK, born circa 1720 "on a boat coming to America", who was one of the first settlers of Highland County, Virginia. Margaret Elgin is the primary submitter on this line. Her address is 3003 W. Broadway #2, Tucson, AZ 85745.

THE BLACK FAMILY OF GREEN BAY WISCONSIN

William, the seventh son of Samuel BLACK and Jane PORTER, had children Samuel, Sarah, Agnes, William Porter, and Andrew Clinton. William Porter Black married Susanna Verdies in 1820 and had 15 children - 14 of which reached maturity. The 15th child, also Andrew Clinton BLACK, was born in Columbus, Ohio in 1825. In 1846 he made the first of several trips to Wisconsin by way of the lakes and canals, to Milwaukee, whence he traveled on foot along an Indian trail to the Fox River Valley. His destination was Green Bay, where he purchased 256 acres of land where he later built his home. First, he returned to his Ohio home. In 1848 he made another visit to buy more land, and in 1849 he made another, final trip to Wisconsin to make his permanent home there. He married Mary MERRITT from Ohio in 1851, and became quite a business man and land owner. At the time of his death in Kaukauna Wisconsin in 1907, he owned about 1800 acres of land. He came to Kaukauna because he thought the great water power there would some day make a great city possible. He was one of the first settlers in that part of Wisconsin to have Indians come to his home for food. The hardships in the early days were heroic. Andrew Clinton BLACK died in 1907 at the age of 83, and his wife Mary died in 1898 at the age of 70, on their beautifully kept farm in Kaukauna. They are buried in Kelso County, Kaukauna, Wisconsin. They were the parents of 13 children. One son, James William BLACK was born in 1860, and married Carrie PIERCE PARKS in 1893 in Appleton, Wisconsin. She was born in Pewaukee in 1863, a descendent of Daniel PIERCE who landed at Newburyport, MA in 1634. The children of James William and Carrie P. Parks were:

Arthur James who married Florence LUND and lived in Kansas Florence Mary who married Henry WEILAND and lived in Pennsylvania Claribel Lord who married Byron CARPENTER and lived in Missouri Myron Parks who married Isabel BRENNER and stayed in Wisconsin

John BLACK, the eldest son of Samuel BLACK and Jane PORTER, married Jane ALEXANDER and was the founder of BLACKSBURG, Virginia. He had 12 children, the youngest of whom was Alexander BLACK, born in Blacksburg, VA, in 1800. Alexander married Elizabeth MCDONALD and he and his whole family except one son came to Richland County, Wisconsin. Harvey Black, a doctor, remained behind in VA. The children who came with Alexander and Elizabeth were:

SOUNDEX? What's That?

have never used it... I didn't know about it".
When I heard that, it came as a great surprise
because the person speaking had been doing
research for many years. My curiosity was

aroused and I checked with others. "Just what is Soundex?" was the response I generally received. Soundex indexing is a must for those researching the 1900 census and possibly a great help when using the 1880 census.

Before explaining the use of Soundex, some background information may be of interest. The W.P.A. in the 1930s, as part of a Federal Works Project, hand-copied the names and pertinent data from the enumerations of 1880, 1900 and 1920. This information was written on regular file cards. The cards for each census were coded and filed by State.

The code was based on phonetics and all names that sounded alike could be interfiled. Even though the spelling might be different or incorrect, a surname would fall in place provided that it began with the same letter of the alphabet. All three of the indexes have been put on microfilm. Only the 1880 and the 190 indexes are available to the public for research and the two differ from each other.

The 1880 Soundex includes only those families or households where there were children up to 10 years of age. A separate file card, as well as one for the head of the household and family, was made for a resident child when the head of the household was not the parent of the child. This was done even though the surnames were the same.

The 1900 Soundex, in every instance, lists everyone regardless of age and relationship in the household. The microfilm of the 1900 Soundex is available at the Regional Archives located at Laguna Niguel and this makes a search in the 1900

Alexander Thomson, who was an original partner of Robertson, and Samuel Williams, who was Austin's personal secretary, were not put on the witness stand. Thus, a friendship continued that began between the Robertson, Blacks and Hambrights (John Robertson, George Black and Frederick Hambright) during the struggle for American Independence, when William Tryon was the tyranical English Governor of North Carolina in 1775.

On December 22, 1836, a General Land Office was established. Each Claimant of public lands filed a description and location of his lands as best he could. John S. Black's application (registered in the General Land Office in Austin, Texas) states that he came from Tennessee, that he was forty years of age at the time he placed application for land, and his wife Mary (Mary Bingley of Tennessee) was thirty-two. He named their childred as:

Monroe	(1820-)
Gavin Bingley	(1822-1865)
Lucinda	(1828-1903)
John S., Jr.	(1832-1893)
William	(1835-) ?

Since William was not of age when his father's will was probated in Grimes County Court at his death in 1855, we know that William was born in Texas, in December, 1835. John S., Jr. was also born in Texas, 1832.

Certificates issued by Stephen F. Austin were dated 1830 and 1831. John S. Black received a certificate for his land (one league) in 1831, which reads that he made application for such land in 1830. He was granted one league (4,428 acres) which is now identified as the John S. Black Headright or League and is abstract number 5 in Grimes County. This land lies immediately north of Anderson, Texas and is crossed by State Highway 90 (the road between Anderson and Roans Prairie), the highway crossing the south line of the survey on the south line of the old William Lindley Homestead and crossing the north line of the survey on the south line of the old Jolly place.

Mescoalaroes. The East Texas Caddoan tribe survived under the name of the Bedias Indians (Bedias means brushwood in the Caddoan language). The Caddoan family was originally divided into two branches—the Cado tribe and the Hasinai Tribe. Texas (Tejas meaning friends) was derived from the Hasinian language.

John S. Black was noted for his heroic courage, great endurance and perseverance in protecting the early settlers from the scalping Indians. He made friends with his red-skinned neighbors, smoking the peace-pipe with them and patiently teaching them the way of the pale-face. These friendly tribes often served as a tryst between the settlers and the more hostile bands of Comanches and Cherokees.

Besides Indian hostilities, some other struggles of the pioneers were Stephen F. Austin's numerous long absences in Mexico, confusion and discord of the government in his colony, suspense about land titles, cholera, yellow fever, and even the severe drouth which destroyed the corn crop and drove the adventurous settlers to a diet of lean deer and buffalo, and freezing Texas northers.

Even though Austin had priority over land grants in Texas, other impresarioes were partly successful in forming colonies. Sterling C. Robertson, for whom Robertson County is named, from Tennessee was brought to trial in Saltillo, then the capitol of Coahuila and Texas, while trying to formulate a colony of his own. The following eleven men, all of whom were Stephen F. Austin colonists, were witnesses in Robertson's favor:

Early settlers roamed in scouting parties prospecting for perment homes. "Prior to the time John S. Black settled on Black's Prairie, Jesse Grimes, for whom the county was named, scouted in this section. He first settled on the old Atascita Road near the San Jacinto crossing and later came to Grimes county. Madison, Walker, Grimes and Montegomery Counties were one huge prairie. They camped at the spring, Northeast of the present site of Anderson." (This spring is a few feet from the north fence of the Highway 90 roadside park.) "They were much impressed with this section of the country—it being the most beautiful they had ever seen. An old Bedias Indian Chief told them to 'wait', he could show them 'another prairie'. From there they went to Holland's who sometime before had settled on the creek that bears his name. Near this settlement was a band of Kickapoo Indians. From Holland south were the Burneys and McIntyres." Quoted from "DEATH OF RUFUS GRIMES, 1901", by Captain W. E. Barry.

This prairie, still known as Grimes Prairie, is where Jesse Grimes was given one league of land, patented to him, April 6, 1831. It joined Margaret McIntyre's league on the west and two years later the McIntyre line moved back one mile to make room for the Franklin Greenwood survey.

A monument has been erected in honor of Jesse Grimes on the roadside park between Anderson and Roans Prairie, a portion of the original Spanish Land Grant to John S. Black and in almost the identical spot where Grimes' Scouting Party camped.

At the time the Austin colonist were settling in Texas, there were the Cherokees and their twelve bands of United States Indians, embracing portions of the Delawares, Shawnees, Kickapoos, Alabamas, Coushattas, Caddoes and Pawnees. There were, also, remnants of ancient Texas Indians, some almost extinct, such as the Achaees, Jaranenies, Anaquan, Bedwiss; and still formable tribes of Carankahues, Texahues, Lipana, Keechies, Ionies, Towdashes; besides the still principle tribes of the Comanches, Kiowas; and to the West were the Apaches, Navajoes and others pertaining to New Mexico but often depredating in Texas, as did tribes from across the Rio Grande River, hailing from Coahuila proper and from Chihuahua. Chief tribe of these invaders was

John S. Black and his family came to Texas and settled on the Choushatta Indian Trace in what is now Grimes County. They built a home in a picturesque prairie where buffalos foraged on tall, nutritious grasses, about three miles northeast of the present site of Anderson, Texas. He, being the only white man between this site and the Trinity River, it was called "Black's Prairie".

Texas was still a province of Mexico at this time and this province was known as Coahuila and Texas. It was once known as the Federal State of the Republic of Mexico.

The John S. Black family was essentially a part of Stephen F. Austin's upper colony. The quota of Moses Austin's colony of three hundred families was soon filled and Stephen F. Austin was given new grants and the bounds of the colony extended. More than a thousand land titles were issued to heads of families by Austin between 1821 and 1831 and the population of the colony grew upward to five thousand--possibly seven thousand.

Austin's upper colony was formed into a municipality, known as Washington Municipality which was later divided into the following counties:

Montgomery Grimes Lee Fayette Colorado

and parts of:

Burleson Walker Madison San Jacinto

Trimming Washington County down to its present size.

SECTION II LIFE AND HISTORY OF JOHN S. BLACK

JOHN S. BLACK played an important role in the colorful Indian-Mexican-Anglo American drama enacted on the Texas Frontier.

He was the grandson of George Black, who emigrated with the Nottingham Colony from Maryland into North Carolina in the year 1751. The Nottingham Colony originated in, what is now, Rising Sun, Maryland which was still Pennsylvania. The Mason and Dixon Line (1767) had not been established when George Black went into North Carolina.

George Black's name appears on the list of early members of the Buffalo Presbyterian Church near present Greensboro, North Carolina. "The first voice raised in America to destroy all connection with Great Britian came from the Scotch-Irish Presbyterians", wrote the famed historian Bancroft in his HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES, Volume X, Page 77. In 1775, patriots rallied in North Carolina and Twenty-seven men at the Mecklenberg Assembly signed a "Declaration of Independence". In less than a month another group of patriots had issued a similar resolution, "The Tyron Declaration". These These two declarations antedated the National Declaration of Independence by more than a year. George Black was one of the forty-nine signers of the "Tyron Declaration of Independence".

John S. Black's father, Gavin Black (son of George Black, The Tyron Signer) married Sarah Hambright in North Carolina. His name appears on the first United States Census in Irredell County, North Carolina in 1790, of which included 306 Black names. He and Sarah lived among the Presbyterians and came to Tennessee with a group of Presbyterians from North Carolina in the year 1790. They founded Black's Station, now in Blount County, Tennessee. John S. Black was born that same year - 1790.

John S. Black married Mary Bingley in Tennessee. Their children were Monroe, Gavin Bingley, John S. Black, Jr. Lucinda and William. Grimes County Court records show that William was born in Texas.

Family Heirloom Photos, a subsidiary of the BLACK FAMILY RESEARCH ORGANIZATION, can copy old photographs and supply multiple copies for family reunions at a very reasonable rate. Send for a price list.

The BFRO has a genealogical consultant on staff available for hire with all proceeds going to the BFRO. Kathryn Morrow, a professional genealogist with 17 years of experience in US research, can do research in any state through the combined Oklahoma Historical Society-Oklahoma Genealogical Society-Oklahoma D.A.R. library in Oklahoma City. Library research is \$5.00 an hour with a \$10.00 minimum to begin. Travel to other areas or county courthouses is higher. Mrs. Morrow makes an annual trip to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City, Utah for her research clients. This library is considered the world's largest repository of genealogical reocrds, containing over 1 million rolls of microfilm that are the equivalent of 5.5 million bound volumes containing more than 1 billion names and information on 8 million families. Anyone interested in having their families researched at this library, or interested in going with Mrs. Morrow, write the BFRO for details.

The BFRO files contain information on over 6000 individuals born before 1900 with the surname BLACK and more than 150 family group sheets. Material from the file and new research is indexed and sorted with the use of an Apple 11 Computer and is printed with a Gemini 10X Starmicron printer. The enormous amount of information is handled with a DB Master database management system, which is considered to be one of the most flexible systems for the home computer. We are happy to share our experience with this set up with anyone who is trying to computerize their own genealogy.

This month's obituary was taken from The Weekly Teller, Lancaster, Wisconsin. The date of the newspaper was August 23, 1883.

"Judge Jere S. Black Dead"

"Among the long list of distinguished men dying this year, the Hon. Jere. S. Black is now numbered. He died at his home in York, Pennsylvania, last Saturday, aged 74. Judge Black was born on a farm in Somerset county. He himself followed the plow until he was old enough to take care of himself. Before he was seventeen he became a Jeffersonion Democrat, and began the study of law. As a youth he was of ungainly figure, and was naturally aggressive and fell into many conflicts with the boys. When he became a politician he was still aggressive. His father was a Democrat but turned Whig when Jackson ran for president. Afterwards his father was nominated by the Whigs for congress, to keep Jere from running for congress on the Democratic ticket. He had a large practice as a lawyer before he was 21 years old. In 1843 he was appointed judge of the court of common pleas. In 1851 he was made chief justice of the supreme court of Pennsylvania. As a jurist his opinions are everywhere recognized as models of judicial rhetoric. In 1857 he was appointed attorney general, in Buchanan's administration, and was the leading spirit in the cabinet. When Gen. Cass retired in 1860, Mr. Black became secretary of state. He saved Buchanan from ignominious surrender of government property to the rebels. Since 1861 he has followed his profession, and has been engaged in most of the very noted suits. He was one of Johnson's attorneys in the impeachment trial. In late years he has been heard from outside of the law. A paper by him, responsive to Ingersoll's infidelity, was very widely read. Quite recently he published a paper condemning Jeff Davis's secession, to which the great rebel replied and tried to be very sarcastic. He published a masterly opinion a couple of years ago showing that of law and right railroads are entirely under the control of the people, and their so-called owners are mere agents. He was a very able and conscientious man. Though past the allotted three score and ten, he thought there was yet work for him to do, and he was very unwilling to die, but expressed no fears of death. He was truly such a man as the country now needs. Strong as were his party prejudices, and abused as he was for not leaving the Democratic party and more openly fighting the rebels, and though he was Tilden's attorney before the electoral commission and Garfield was one of the southern commissioners who favored Hayes, he yet freely and openly declared, during the last presidential campaign, that Garfield's integrity was sound and his character spotless, and that, if a Republican had to be elected, Garfield was the proper man. We wish that such men as Jere. Black could live always. In our history he will live always."

Alexander BLACK, the son of William BLACK and Sarah HICKLING (see page 5, #1), was born in Augusta Co, Va October 14 1765and at the age of 20 he crossed the mountains into Kentucky and lived at Strodes Station, where he became a friend and companion of Daniel Boone. On June 15 1791, he mustered in to Capt. James Browning's company of Kentucky Volunteers, which was in the service of the US against the Wiau Indians of central Indiana. On Feb 20, 1793, he married Jane Crockett of Bourbon County, KY, a distant cousin of Davey Crockett. They lived on their farm in Clark County about two miles north of STrodes Station, until about 1809 when he sold 104 acres on Strodes Creek and came up inot Ohio where he settled on a tract of land in Champaign County. He was given a captain's commission in the War of 1812 and was granted a warrant of 160 acres of land for his service. He died at his home in Champaign County on June 16, 1854, and Jane died of cholera on June 21, 1849. They are both buried at the Baptist Cemetery at Kingscreek, Champaign County, Ohio. William BLACK, the third son of William BLACK and Sarah HICKLING, was born in Augusta Co. VA Nov 3, 1780, and moved with his parents to CLark Co., KY. He died sometime before 1827.

Rachel Black, the third daughter of William BLACK and Sarah HICKLING, was born in Augusta Co., VA Feb 3, 1782, and married John BARNES in Kentucky. Robert BLACK, the youngest son of William and Sarah, was born in VA Jul 14, 1786, married Eleanor WILSON in CLark Co., KY Nov 118,1810. He later moved to Orange Co. Indiana and died Dec 6, 1828 at Orleans.

William BLACK and His Descendants of Augusta County, Virginia, and Clark County, Kentucky

Alexander Black was born aboard ship when his parents came to America. He appeared in Augusta County records (now Bath Co.) in 1746 when he purchased 250 acres of land on the Cowpasture River on the forks of the Bullpasture. He was granted a deed for his land Nov. 3, 1750. It appears that he came to Virginia from Pennsylvania with other Scotth-Irish settlers. His parents probably died in Pennsylvania, as no trace of them is found in Augusta Co. records. Alexander Black qualified as a Lieutenant of Foot Soldiers before the County Court August 20, 1752. Alexander Black died in 1764, and his farm was divided between his two sons. He and his unknown wife were the parents of six children;

Elizabeth (Peggy) 6 Rachel

William Black was born about 1735 and fought in the French and Indian War. and later in the Revolutionary War. He served in the Virginia Colonial Militia, as early as Aug 11, 1756. He was united in marriage on Jan 12, 1763 to Sarah HICKLING, a daughter of Thomas HICKLING. Sarah also served the cause of the Revolution by sewing tents. She sewed forty four yards of heavy linen into two tents for the use of the Augusta Militia, by hand. William Black and his entire family moved to Clark Co. , Kentucky in 1792 on land in the northern part of what is now Nelson County, and which as sold by him in 1806. William Black died Feb. 14, 1811. William and Sarah were the parents of eight children; Alexander born Oct. 14 1765 see page 6

My third great grandmother was Rachel BLACK, born 1750 in Bath Co., VA, which was then Augusta Co. VA. Her parents were Alexander BLACK ans wife Jane who purchased 250 acres on Cowpasture River from Thomas LEE in 1750. She had a brother Alexander BLACK, jr., who married Agnes Nancy KINCAID and died in KY in 1818.

Alexander BLACK SR. died in 1764 after being constable. I note that a John MILLER administered his estate. He had a daughter Mary BLACK who married a Mr. MILLER. Other daughters were Nancy who married Thomas MCCLUNG abt 1756- Thomas MCCLUNG was Rilled at the Battle of Point Pleasant in the Ohio River in October of 1774, in the fight with the Indians. Margaret BLACK who married William FEMESTER died before 1775. Most of this family lived in what is now West Virginia.

The 250 acres of land was divided between Alexander BLACK, jr. and his older brother, William BLACK who married Sarah HICKLIN abt 1763 and moved to CLark Co. KY, where he left a Will about 1813. William had a son named George Miller BLACK. Alexander BLACK had no children, and when he left a will in Fayette Co. KY in 1828 he had outlived all his sisters and brother William. He left his property to be divided among the nieces and nephews. One or two great grandchildren in the MCCLUNG family were also listed, also Geo ge and Robert MILLER, Abraham MILLER (who could have been the husband of Sarah GIVENS MILLER, daughter of Rachel BLACK GIVENS.

A history of Bath and adjoining counties has been written in which there is the statement that Alexander BLACK was born on the boat coming to America. I have looked in vain to find the name of a BLACK family who came to America between 1710-1720; I am told there is no record of any BLACK coming to America prior to 1735. (Ed. note-We have no less than 22 BLACK men to the US by 1735) Rachel and Alexander jr. were the youngest members of the family and William, Margaret, Mary and Nancy were all born in the 1740's.

I have noted that there was a Rev. Alexander BLACK who came over in the 1760's and was a Tory during the Revolutionary WAR. I have nothing on him. I believe there was an Alexander BLACK in what became Washington Co, VA in the 1760's. Also the Rev. SAmuel BLACK, uncle of Samuel BLACK, wife Jane PORTER, had son Alexander.

CABARRUS COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA BLACK FAMILIES

While researching an inquiry about BLACKS in North Carolina, I extracted all the BLACK marriages in Cabarrus County, trying to make some tentative family groupings. The 1800 census for Cabarrus County lists James, age 45 or older; John jr., age 26-45; another John jr., age 26-45, and Thomas, age 26-45. The 1810 lists only John and Samuel, as does the 1820. The 1830, however, lists Stephen B., Charles S., John, John M., Samuel, and Thomas. The 1840 lists Ezekiel C., John W., Joseph l., Joseph M., Samuel M., Thomas N., Thomas P., and William G. By 1850 there is only a Samuel W. I was originally looking for BLACK-ALEXANDER-YOUNG connections, but I kept coming across BLACK-WHITE connections, so I tried to put them together. I was also intrigued by the disappearance and reappearance of names on the censuses. I put together the following information.

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I grouped Stephen B., Matilda, John M., Elizabeth, Richmond A., Ezekiel C., Thomas B., and Charles S. together because of the closeness of their marriage dates, and the probable fathers for them would be John or Samuel in the 1810 or 1820 census, or the older Thomas. This is only and idea. There were also three much older men; Robert BLACK who married Mary CALDWELL 4 Feb 1793; James who married Sophia YOUNG 20 Mar 1805; and David M., who married Winsome DANIEL 3 Jul 1806. These three may be related. I haven't done extensive research on any of these. I looked for the 3 men I starred above in other 1850 censuses, and found all three of them in the 1850 Hardeman County, TN census very near each other. This led more credence to the idea that they were brothers. Looking back a generation, I found all three on the 1840 Hardeman census as well. These are their 1850 listings;

Stephen B. BLACK b. 1799 NC, wife Rosanna, Ch: Washington 20, Sarah 15, John 15, Julia 13, Robert 12, Linley 6, Virginia 4. Both parents b. NC Charles S. BLACK b. 1805 NC, wife Margaret Ch: Sintha 21, John 18, Jane 20, Margaret 15, Washington 11, Alexander 9, Mary 4. Thomas B. BLACK b. 1807 NC, wife Caroline, Ch: Frankland 16, Easter 15, John 11, James 9, Edwin 7, Celia 5, Zachariah 1. Also Martha WARFORD 18, possibly an older married daughter, and Jane, her daughter.

I also have the following group sheets for Cabarrus County BLACKS; 1850-60 census; Ezekiel C. 

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in the present Grimes county in the year 1833. He built the famous old Fanthorp Inn in 1834, as a home for his bride, Rachael Kennard, whose ancestors received grants of land eight miles northeast of Anderson in 1832. The Fanthorp Inn was the stagecoach stop and a stagecoach stand was maintained across the road from the Inn. In 1839, Fanthorp purchased new land and town of Fanthorp was established. Later, Fanthorp Village was moved a little farther north and named Alta Mira. When Grimes County was carved out of wastern Montgomery County in 1846, the name Alta Mira was changed to Anderson in honor of Kenneth L. Anderson, the last Vice President of the Republic of Texas, who died at Fanthorp Inn.

Catholic worship was enforced until Texas got its independence. The first protestant churches in Grimes County were established by the Baptist denomination. The old Oakland Baptist Church had its beginning a short way east of the John S. Black homestead, on the old road (not State Highway 90) and was assembled for years under a brush harbor. A church building was not completed until 1854. When State Highway 90 was laid, this early church was moved to Roans Prairie and still retains the name of Oakland Church. The old Oakland Burial Ground is still cared for at the original location.

The first Texas Baptist General Convention was held in the Anderson Baptist Church, located near old Fanthorp Inn, in the year 1848. An Episcopalian school, called Saint Paul's Seminary, was established in Anderson and was well attended in the '50s and '60s.

The early churches were the greatest civilizing agencies. They brought people together, preened in their Sunday apparel. The circuit preachers talked on every subject, during their two and three hour sermons--thus, the church was the first source of education in the country.

Closely connected to the churches, and next to them in educational efforts, were the lodges. As far back as 1827, Stephen F. Austin had taken steps to organize a Masonic Lodge in Texas. His plans were thwarted when the Mexican Congress passed a law supressing Masonry. The next attempt was made when Anson Jones placed the charter, obtained from the Louisiana Grand Chapter,

An excerpt from THE TEXAS GAZETTE, Austin, Texas on March 27, 1870--Page 2, Col. 2 reads:

"EXPRESSION OF APPRECIATION TO CAPTAIN SPICER OF THE HANNAH ELIZABETH --John S. Black and ten other men express their appreciation to Captain E. Spicer, Captain of the Schooner Hannah Elizabeth, for a good voyage from New Orleans to Harrisburgh. Some of the other men were: J. Jones, T. Jones, D. Harris and Robert Wilson."

All of the above mentioned men settled in Grimes County.

The Black Stage Coach Line was actually an improvement and extension of the original Black Ox-Wagon Route. The stage coach followed the main thoroughfare from Louisiana through Nacogdoches, through Anderson in Grimes County and on to Austin. Sometimes it proceeded to San Antonio, when the associate stage-line was too crowded to accommodate its ever increasing number of passengers. (This was called The San Antonio Road by these stage-coach drivers, NOT Old San Antonio Road.) For an era, this road was the main thoroughfare over the Texas frontier. General Zachary Taylor marched the United States troops over this road, when they went to settle the United States-Mexican border line in 1846. A portion of this famous road, from Independence in Washington County to Huntsville in Walker County, was known as The Sam Houston Trail, when Sam Houston so frequently traveled it.

When John S. Black settled on the vast prairie with his family, there was a mere trace of a road (the word "trace" being derived from the Indian word travois) originally knows as the Coushatta Trace, beaten out by the Coushatta and Alabama Indian Tribes on their travels from Louisiana through the Texas wilderness.

Anderson, once the fourth largest town in Texas, still maintains its quaint colonial atmosphere. It was founded under the name of Fanthorp, being named for Henry Fanthorp who emigrated from England to Virginia and settled



deputies to assist you at all times in rendering aid to the women and children who have been driven from their homes and escort them to the War Depot."

Captain Black also procured provisions for the troops.

When the battle-cry of General Sam Houston's army, "Remember the Alamo! Remember Goliad!", was heard on April 21, 1836, the Texans were up against the army of a nation with resources more than two centuries old. The battle with the Mexicans lasted less than twenty minutes and is known as one of the seven most decisive battles in the world.

The colonists had already declared their independence in a form similar to that of the National Declaration of Independence, on March 2, 1836, at an official Convention at Washington-on-the-Brazos.

This was actually the port of entry into Texas for Stephen F. Austin. While Austin's vessel, "THE LIVELY", was anchored at San Felipe at the mouth of The Brazos River, Austin entered Texas riding horse-back through Nacdoches and crossed the Brazos River, where many of the first three hundred settlers had arrived and were encamped near Washington-on-the Brazos.

Stephen F. Austin, "The Father of Texas", died in 1836 and Sam Houston took up the reins of government of the New Republic.

After the Battle of San Jacinto, Captain Black continued to serve the Republic of Texas in the Quartermaster's Department with headquarters in Houston, Texas. According to receipts written on the 8th of May, 1836, and the 19th of May, 1836: "1 wagon....\$300.00" and "3 Yoke Oxen \$600.00", were used in hauling ammunition - 3200 lbs. per trip - for the Waltham Range Camp in Montgomery County.

The Ranger Force had been organized to assist in curbing Indian attacks on the colonists.

The last years of Captain John S. Black were spent at his home three miles northeast of Anderson, Texas, raising horses. (End of excerpt)

and not the Mexican people. In 1833, Antonio Lopez de Santa Ana Lebron had maneuvered himself into the Presidency of Mexico. He assumed dictatorial powers and vowed to crush the people of Texas with his own hand. There were a number of slight skirmishes between the settlers and Mexicans.

Austin called his army The Federal Army of Texas, which led to the organication of a calvary brigade with Stephen F. Austin as Commander-in-Chief. John S. Black served as a member of Stephen F. Austin's first Calvary Brigade in 1835. He was honorable discharged because of a wound received in his chest for which medical aid could not be procured in the army camp. A copy of this discharge is in the Archives of the Capitol Library in Austin, Texas. It is written in long-hand by Stephen F. Austin and signed by Stephen F. Austin as Commander-in-Chief.

Among the war records of John S. Black, is another order written in longhand, as follows:

"To certify that John S. Black intered Bexar on the morning of the 5th of December. He has discharged his duties with honor to Texas and credit to himself. He has ten days to reach home. This 13th day of December, 1835. Signed: John York, Capt., Texas Garrison; Edward Burleson, Commander-in-Chief."

John S. Black's oldest son, Monroe Black, participated in the Seige of Bexar with his father, December 5th to 9th, 1835.

When John S. Black returned to service, he was commissioned to Captain in the Quatermasters Department in preparation for the Battle of San Jacinto. His duties included the organization and operation of wagon-trains, which met the troops at Groce's Plantation where General Sam Houston held his men in rendezvous for the Battle of San Jacinto. Captain Black's orders, written in long-hand, authorized him to confiscate wagons and teams in good faith of the government and give receipts. His orders read:

"This power is to be exercised with the greatest precaution so as not to produce individual distrust. This will be a difficult task. Appoint

appointed Commissioners on the Republic's Indian Commission. \$9,000 was appropriated for Indian purposes and Frontier Protection".

Reservations were set aside for the Indians in Texas. It took years to corral the hostile "red skins" and the reservation plan was not successfully put into operation until 1854, when the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation of 1,280 acres was established in east Texas near the present town of Livingston. John S. Black lived long enough to see the first Indians placed on the reservation. Old settlers remember the sight of bands of Indians passing through Anderson on their journey to the reservation. By the year 1860, only six Indians were listed by the United States census as then residing within Grimes County. By 1890, all Texas Indians were living on the Coushatta Reservation.

The John S. Blacks were a sociable family. Hospitality always seems to have flourished on Texas soil. The yellowed pages of old letters tell of the gay times as quiltings, barbecues, balls, weddings, camp meetings and when freezing northers blew, ice-cream suppers were enjoyed. One formal and elegant event that the Blacks attended was the Santa Ana Ball in Brazoria on the Brazos River in the year 1833. Santa Ana had ordered Colonel Jose Antonio Mexia, with a strong force, to investigate rumors of rebellion in Texas Territory. Maxia was assured that Texans (American settlers) were true to the Mexican government. Mexia and Stephen F. Austin were received at Brazoria with speeches and salutes of cannon. A week long celebration was held including the famous Santa Ana Dinner and Ball. Probably the most important function in all Texas history was the famous and elegant San Jacinto Ball held in Houston, in the very new Republic of Texas. All army officers and their families received written invitations. Captain John S. Black and his family were included. General Sam Houston, who had just returned from New Orleans where he had received medical treatment for wounds inflicted during the Battle of San Jacinto, led the Grand March with Mrs. Baker, wife of Captain Moseley Baker.

John S. Black was active in military affairs of Texas versus Mexico.

Actually, the war for independence was between the Texans and Santa Ana

in his saddlebags and carried it with him through the Battle of San Jacinto. The Grand Lodge of Texas was organized in Houston, Texas in the year 1837, being named the Holland Lodge. Anson Jones was elected Grand Master, following the organization and John S. Black was accepted as a member. From 1842 until 1861, at least seventy-five lodges were sponsoring and supporting educational institutions. The fraternal organization, Independent Order of Oddfellows, was introduced into Texas from Louisiana in the year 1838 through the efforts of Jacob DeCordova, publisher and land agent. These lodges made great strides in advancing education among the early settlers.

In December, 1832, Sam Houston, who lived in Blount County, Tennessee, crossed the Red River into Texas essentially as an adjustor of Indian claims. Among the men whose services Houston enlisted was John S. Black. Sam Houston and John S. Black were "Tennessee Cousins", Mary Black having married William Houston in Greene County, Tennessee, which marriage bond was signed by Michael Harrison as security. In Tennessee, The William Houstons had three sons and four daughters, all of whom were living in 1877 and all were members of the Presbyterian Church.

Sam Houston was a frequent visitor in the John S. Black home. Sam Houston Black, a grandson of John S. Black, was born when Sam Houston was spending a night in the Black home.

Excerpt from THE TELEGRAPH AND TEXAS REGISTER, Houston, Texas on November 2, 1842--Page 3, Col. 5: "INDIAN TREATY--

Col. Terrell, Capt. John S. Black and son and Major Ranson left Washington-on-the-Brazos on the 18th day of October to attend the Indian Council at Waco Village on the 25th of October. They were to be joined on the route by Etham Stroud, Joseph Durst and Leonard Williams, who are associated with Col. Terrell and Capt. Black as Commissioners. Major Ransom, we understand, was appointed Secretary of the Commission (Indian Commission).

THE IRISH POTATO FAMINE IMMIGRANTS

brought ruin to tens of thousands of tenant farmers and rural laborers and reduced almost all of Ireland to poverty. Dependent on the potato not only as the staple of his diet but as a means of barter and paying rent, the Irish peasant was forever at the mercy of his crop; yet accustomed as he was to the natural cycles of bounty and dearth, nothing could have prepared him for the calamity of the Great Potato Famine. When the blight struck it brought total destruction to the primitive agrarian economy of the island. There was no means of counteracting it, no known chemical agent that could retard it; nor was there an alternative crop that could be quickly sown and harvested.

At the time — despite the abolition of the vicious Penal Laws — very few Irish farmers owned their own land or held title to their cottages and cabins, and when the crop failed they had no means whatever of satisfying their remorseless landlords or the hated "gombeen man," the ubiquitous money lender. Rents and obligations soon fell into arrears, and before long there were wholesale evictions throughout the length and breadth of Ireland. Thousands of families were thrown on the meagre resources of local jurisdictions or roamed the countryside in desperate search of food. For many of these wretched cottiers — homeless now and without any means of sustenance, in dread of the hunger which claimed the lives of a million of their countrymen — the choice was painfully clear: quit Ireland or perish. Of necessity, therefore, hundreds of thousands chose to leave, and during the epochal period from 1846 to 1851 more than a million men, women, and children immigrated to the United States and Canada, mostly through the nort of New York.
