



Hiram Calkins

Further to Joyce Woldt discovery of Hiram C Calkins. Joyce writes:

"Hiram C Calkins was born about 1816 in New York, probably in Cayuga County. He was the son of John and Aseneth (Andrews) Calkins. He was a lawyer by profession. After the war he was appointed U S Deputy Marshall for Wisconsin and later was U S Receiver of the Land Office at St Croix. He died June 21 1893. Uncle Hiram and Aunt Phoebe Ann raised 2 children, a girl, Lola, and a boy, Hiram."

Then from Mary J Keith who is doing a web page for the G A R Post 20 Museum, P.O.Box 1865, Aurora IL 60507, with special permission to reprint, came the following:

"The Aurora Post 20 GAR made an effort to collect war stories from veterans, and distributed questionnaires to as many veterans as could be found. Very few of those documents survive. Sadly to say the one from Hiram is not among them.

In the book the returns that were lost, a hand written account of the veteran was substituted, using the questionnaire as source.

Comrade Hiram Calkins who was born the 14th day of October AD 1816 in Aurelius, Co. of Cayuga, State of New York.

Entered the service at Ripon WI (being at the time a resident of Wausau, Marathon Co, WI), Aug 15, 1861 as Private in CO B, 1st WI Cavalry, and served until Feb 18, 1863 when he was discharged at St Louis MO, by reason of chronic Diaphorea and heart

disease. In Sep 1861 he was promoted QM Sgt, and in March 1862, Regimental Commissary Sgt., which latter position he held at the time of his discharge. His first battle was at Bloomfield MO, and he was also a participant in various skirmishes. From Dec 1862 until the date of his discharge, he was confined to hospital at Jefferson Barracks, MO.

The most important events in his term of service Comrade Calkins deems those which transpired at the above mentioned battle of Bloomfield. He says "We were surprised by the enemy coming upon us in force in numbers largely superior to ours, about two o'clock a.m., the sentinels at their posts giving us the first sign of their approach. In response to the bugle's rally call "our men had hardly commenced to get in line when we were confronted by the enemy, who had, in the darkness prevailing, came in full force upon our front and left flank, we being ignorant that they were the enemy until they opened fire upon us not to exceed five yards distant. When we discovered it to be the enemy the order to fire was given, and after a hand-to-hand encounter of about ten minutes, in which time they found the efficacy of our resolves to much to stand at short range, they began to give way, and in the daylight we had so far broken their force as soon to withdraw from the field. The attack was so sudden that the necessity for prompt action seemed to possess every man in our command at the same time, and no one seemed to think of personal danger. But each comrade fought on his own hook, until the enemy fell back and gave us time to concentrate. Only three persons were reported as panic stricken, one a lieutenant, one sergeant, and one a private who, seeing the great odds against us said to me afterwards "I ran and hid". The lieutenant being a little late getting to the rallying point, "smelt the battle afar" and concluded to keep out of harm's way. The sergeant stood by his colors until wounded, when he gave up the contest as hopeless."

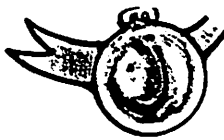

From Lakewood Washington

Further to the letter from Nancy Blackwell of Morton IL that was featured in the July 1999 Calkins World.

Hi Minnie,

My conversations with Lucille Holmes in Chadwick IL, and a look at her records, found the **family birth information** page out of the old family Bible. The bible itself had been stored with a lot of other belongings in an old barn and the mice had gotten into the most of it, but Lucille had saved the family page. The bible belonged to **Russell Calkins** and in his handwriting are the following entries (and the spellings are his). **Russell Calkins** Jan 6th 1778; **Pamela**-my wife Sept 15 1800; Married August 16th 1818; **Harriet Calkins** Feb 13 1820; **Patty Calkins** Aug 3rd 1821; **Charles S Calkins** Jan 19 1823; **Hester Ann Calkins** Aug 1st 1825; **Rufus P Calkins** Jan 24 1827; **Russel Calkins** April 18 1829; **Isabel Calkins** April 9 1831; **Francis Marion Calkins** Aug 17 1833; **Eliza Melissa Calkins** Jan 21 1835; **Jessey Elliot Calkins** Aug 26 1837; **Henry Bernard Calkins** July 11 1839 (This child died at the age of 2 and is buried in Richland NY next to his parents)

Then, to our amazement, when we turned over the page, we discovered the marriage dates of all but 2 of the children, shown as follows: **Harriet Calkins** Aug 10 1838; **Martha (Patty) Calkins** Mar 26 1837; **Charles S Calkins** March 13 1844; **Hester Ann Calkins** Oct 18 1853; **Russel D Calkins** Oct 17 1854; **Isabel J Calkins** Nov 12 1851; **Eliza M Calkins** Sept 6 1853; **J.E (Jesse Elliot) Calkins**; April 16 1858 (first marriage) Nov 24 1875 (second marriage). Dates missing for **Rufus Price Calkins** and **Francis Marion Calkins**.

If anyone wonders why a lot of information is misinformation- I have found death certificates and/or obits for several of the siblings and parent's place of birth varies from Canada to New York to Vermont for Russel (Vermont being correct) So its no wonder the rest of us are confused.

Have found another living relative of Charles Salmon, s/o Russel and Pamela residing in the state of Colorado. He is **Clifford N Crowe** and has been gracious to share xerox copies of photos from his family, namely three of the children of **Charles S** and **Patience Calkins**. How wonderful to put faces to names.

My hope is to eventually to put faces to all of Russel's children. I have a photo of the five brothers taken ca 1900. I would like to find descendents of the sisters and hopefully find photos of the five sisters. I am continuously finding more information about the sisters, but have made a hit with only three siblings, **Russel**, **Dean**, **Jessey Elliot**, and **Charles Salmon**.

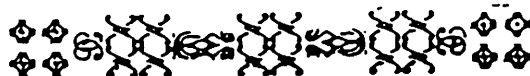

It was pretty exciting to walk around and talk to some very friendly people who knew some of the history. WE actually talked to the owners of the house that now stands where the old warehouse once was. I had the Calkins World issue with me and he seemed interested in knowing about the association and actually meeting a real Calkins even though I don't think C.C. is in my direct line.

He pointed in the direction of the island book store where we were able to purchase the book that most of the information came out of. We also went to the library and found what appears to be the first book about the island heritage which helped create the new edition.

It seems CC had a bit of a sense of humor. It says "The logged off lands of the island sprouted wild blackberries which lured many pickers from Seattle. Residents were delighted when Mr Calkins' two tame bears, who also like blackberries, frightened the pickers, sending them scampering down the hillside, back to their rowboats. Back they went to Seattle with stories of the wild animals on Mercer Island."

My husband and I thought that was rather funny and thought you might get a laugh out of it.

(End of quote... but I have to add this: The wild blackberries that she spoke of are a type of wild berry that grows only on the west side of the Cascade Mountains, and the above story about the pickers, can only be truly appreciated by those of us that were raised in western WA and had as children picked pails of these berries to be preserved by our parents for later delicious eating. We can also understand why the Seattle residents would travel by rowboat to Mercer Island to gather this rich harvest.....Editor)

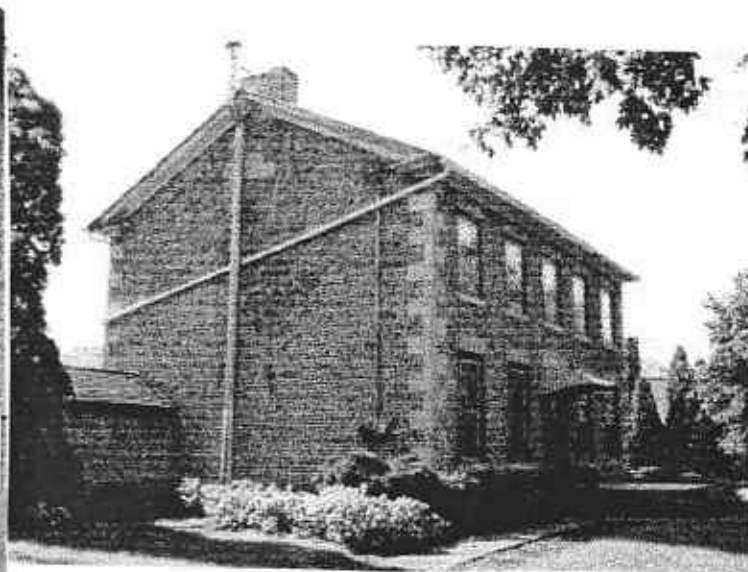

Well, they found out soon enough that California Dreamin' wasn't all it was cracked up to be. Only Doris and Ethyl found work. They picked fruit and peeled peaches and had to buy their own paring knives from the orchard, to work. Allen was a licensed electrician, but only in Michigan, he worked for the prison, at one time and Perry was a truck driver. He used to deliver pop and beer, around Adrian. After the dreams faded and the discouragement, became reality, the Calkins family started back to MI. With more time than money, they decided to take the northern route, home. They stopped in Salt Lake City for a few days and rented a house-keeping apt. There they celebrated Joan Leota Shaw's second birthday. Her uncle Allen bought her a little sombrero, to wear. Joan, wandered off into the kitchen and when no one was looking, turned the gas to the oven on. Ethyl Calkins, not knowing, lit a match to start dinner. She opened the oven door to light it and BOOM!! Luckily, no one was seriously hurt.

They left Salt Lake City and their next stop was Wyoming. Allen and Perry warned the rest of the family about the Rattle Snakes they heard about. They told them that if you hear one shaking its' rattler, don't move, just stay still! That afternoon they stopped and set up camp. They made dinner and by evening they were all snuggled in the tent. Doris and Ethyl remembered what their husbands had told them about the rattle snakes and they were a little concerned. They both lay there on their backs with their eyes wide open, when all at once they heard it. A rattle snake; and by the sound of it, it was a big one! It finally went away but Doris couldn't sleep, the rest of the night. The next morning, when they crawled out of the tent they discovered their rattle snake. What happened was a dog came by in the middle of the night and relieved himself on the side of the tent. Some Rattler!

Back at home in Michigan, Allen Calkins and his family settled in Adrian. Perry Shaw and his family settled in Pittsford and later moved to Indiana, just before W.W.II

I FOUND MARY JANE!

During recent research in Missouri, I came unexpectedly upon Mary Jane's very legible gravestone. I rejoiced---another Caulkins found!!

She was born in Clark County, Indiana, on March 12, 1828, the daughter of Nehemiah and Hannah (COVERT) CAULKINS and granddaughter of Isaac Caulkins. Mary Jane's mother likely died in childbirth or soon after. Her father remarried to Rebecca APPLGATE in Indiana before moving to Illinois about 1829. He died in 1833, leaving Mary Jane and her brother Silas (see Calkins World, Vol. 8, No. 4, Oct. 2001 for his story) under the care of their stepmother and her new husband, John JORDAN, as guardian. Mary Jane CAULKINS married Thomas H. ELLIS in Morgan County, Illinois on February 15, 1849.

In my research I followed Mary Jane and her husband from Illinois to Missouri and Kansas and back to Missouri. Forget the notion that our ancestors didn't travel much! Thomas H. Ellis was a newspaper man and as most newspaper men of that era, very involved in politics. He is listed in the 1883 History of Pike County (MO) on the "vigilance committee" for the Democratic party in 1848 to organize and convince others in Spencer Township that annexing Texas and fighting in the Mexican War was a good thing. Soon after their marriage in 1849 and again in 1851, the couple lived in Pike County, Missouri and sold land in Illinois that had been inherited by Mary Jane. In the 1850 census in Louisiana, Pike County, Missouri, they both appear to be age 32. I believe it should have said 22. Three children are also listed--Henry and Joseph Ellis and Mathilda BACHELOR, ages 14, 10 and 14. Were the boys from an earlier marriage of Thomas'? Or his brothers? And who was Mathilda? While in Winchester, Scott County, Illinois in 1851, Thomas was editor of the Western Union and Illinois Valley Register newspapers, published "every Friday morning on the north side of the square over Bacon's tin shop" and were "devoted to politics, agriculture, education, literature, news, the markets, etc." Thomas helped his brother Henry B. Ellis establish a newspaper in Louisiana, Missouri, and was outspoken about his opinions of Henry Clay's "compromise bill."

December 11, 1854, Thomas and Mary Jane sold their printing press and other property in Scott County, Illinois. By April 1859, the Ellis family was in Johnson County, Kansas. This is according to a

land deed and a document that gave Thomas the power of attorney for Mary Jane's brother, Silas. Thomas H. Ellis is listed in the Olathe Herald among those with delinquent 1859 taxes. His land in Lexington Township was being sold to pay the taxes. The 1860 census only shows initials instead of full first names, but the family of T.H. and M. J. Ellis found in Lexington, Kansas with sons, H.H., S.C., W.H. and a daughter S.A. appears to be a match. Thomas' occupation was given as landlord.

From hours of research I learned that Thomas H. Ellis was a legislator in Kansas in 1863 or 1864, representing Miami County. I'm not sure which years yet but supposedly Thomas was a lawyer, probably before his legislative term. Although I've never located Thomas H. Ellis in the 1870 census (and many other people who I know were alive in 1870!), his sons Silas and Willie were living with their Ellis grandparents in Troy, Lincoln County, Missouri. The oldest son could have been on his own, but I believe the young daughter must have died before the 1870 census. It was an assumption that Mary Jane (Caulkins) Ellis died some time between 1860 and 1870.

At the Missouri State Historical Society in the spring of 2002, I was fortunate enough to discover that Thomas H. Ellis had moved to St. Louis. I found him in the 1880 census as a stationery salesman with his new wife, Mary, three young children, his two older sons Henry and William, and his mother. St. Louis city directories provided more clues. I learned Thomas and his second (or third?) wife Mary were buried in Troy, Missouri. I had about given up hope that I'd ever find what happened to Mary Jane (Caulkins) Ellis because I assumed she died and was buried somewhere in Kansas. This most recent trip (Aug. 2003) provided an opportunity to walk through the Troy City Cemetery. There was Mary Jane's stone as plain as could be! She died December 15, 1867 at the age of 39 years, 9 months, and 3 days. Near her stone I found stones for Thomas Ellis' parents and three of his brothers, but I didn't find Thomas H. Ellis and his wife Mary B., who died in 1895 and 1907! I'm still hopeful that I might find living descendants of Mary Jane (Caulkins) Ellis.

"We used to put our kids to bed so we would have talk time." Marilyn Smith-Anderson said. "Now they put us to bed so they have talk time"

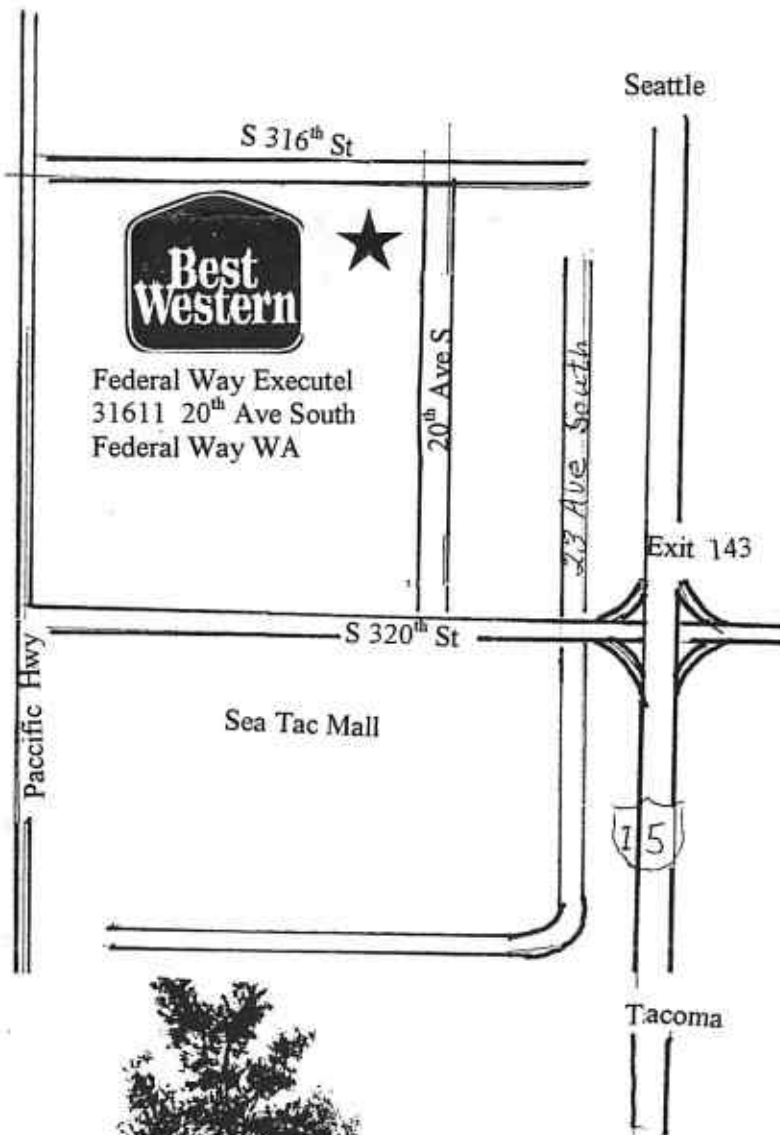
Come Sunday, the family members would pack up and disperse to their homes. By late December, they'll be starting to make their reservations for next year's Campin' Cousins gathering.

THE RIDE OF PAUL REVERE

Paul Revere (1735-1818) was an American silversmith, engraver, and patriot, whose efforts as a courier for the revolutionary cause made him a folk hero. The son of a silversmith, he was born in Boston, on January 1, 1735. While still a young man he acquired a reputation as a designer and maker of elegant silverware; his finely wrought tankards, bowls, and pitchers were much prized, and his tea sets served the Boston aristocracy for a century (only one is known to have survived complete). Revere also turned his manual dexterity to the making of artificial teeth, surgical instruments, and engraved printing plates. His most famous engraving, depicting the 1770 Boston Massacre, put him in the forefront of anti-British propagandists. With other patriots, he took part in the Boston Tea Party in 1773. When the fighting began, he carried messages for the revolutionaries of the area. The historic midnight ride of April 18, 1775, was made by Revere and two others from Boston to Concord to warn of the approach of British troops. Revere's role is exaggerated in Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's ballad "Paul Revere's Ride"; actually, British scouts detained him en route, but one of the others got through to the patriots in time.

Revere also engraved printing plates and printed money for the Massachusetts Congress and designed the first official seal for the united colonies as well as the seal still used by Massachusetts. He established a gunpowder mill at Canton, Massachusetts, and served as a major of militia in Boston after the British withdrew (1776). After the war Revere operated a brass foundry and manufactured sheet copper at Canton, besides continuing his successful trade as a silversmith. He died May 10, 1818, in Boston.

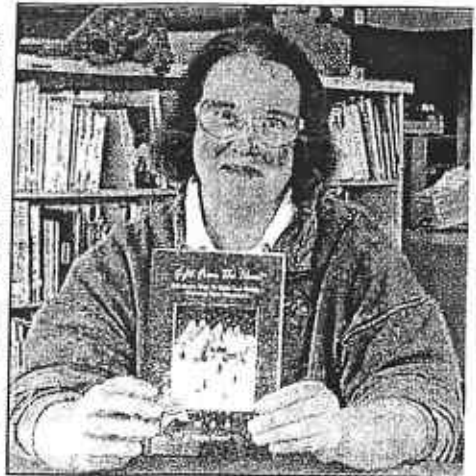

Paramedics Kill Pet Snake wrapped Around Woman

Paramedics beheaded a family's 9 foot pet python after it wrapped itself around a pregnant woman's stomach and also entangled her husband.

"My children are scared to death," Brad Carter said. "My wife can't lay down on the bed, she's so terrified. She can't stop crying. She thought for sure it would kill her and the baby."

Mary Ann Carter, who is 8 mo. Pregnant, woke up about 10:00 a.m. Wednesday to find the Burmese python coiled around her stomach and biting her buttock, police said.

Her Husband tried to free her using a small knife, but he, too, became ensnared. "It totally locked up the right side of my body," Carter said

Then a neighbor tried unsuccessfully to help.

"We used a crow bar to try to get its mouth off her. We had a good 15 minute struggle," Carter said.

Finally, paramedics used a hacksaw to remove the animal's head and release its death grip.

"I don't think there is a written procedure to unravel a snake from its owner. Officers had never responded to a call like that." Police spokesman, Bill Robinson said.

Mary Ann Carter was scheduled to undergo medical tests today to determine if the snakebite affected her fetus, he said. The Carter's 2 children, ages 4 and 5 – witnessed the ordeal inside the single room apartment at a downtown resident motel, and police called crisis councilors because they witnessed the snake's decapitation.

His wife never wanted a snake but finally agreed about 3 weeks ago, Brad said. The unemployed construction worker paid about \$150 for the 3 year old reptile.

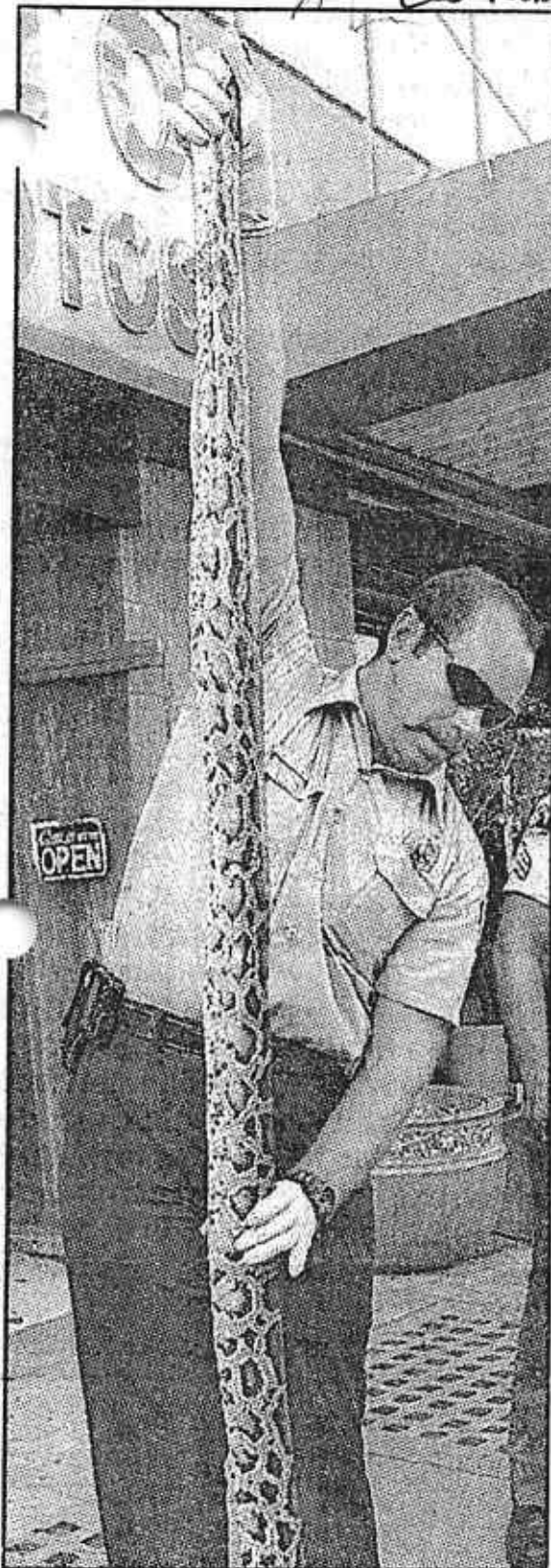
"She's is naturally scared of snakes, but I've been begging her for years to let me get a snake," he said. "We finally found one and look what happens."

City regulations do not prohibit snakes as pets, although it probably should have been kept in a cage, Robinson said

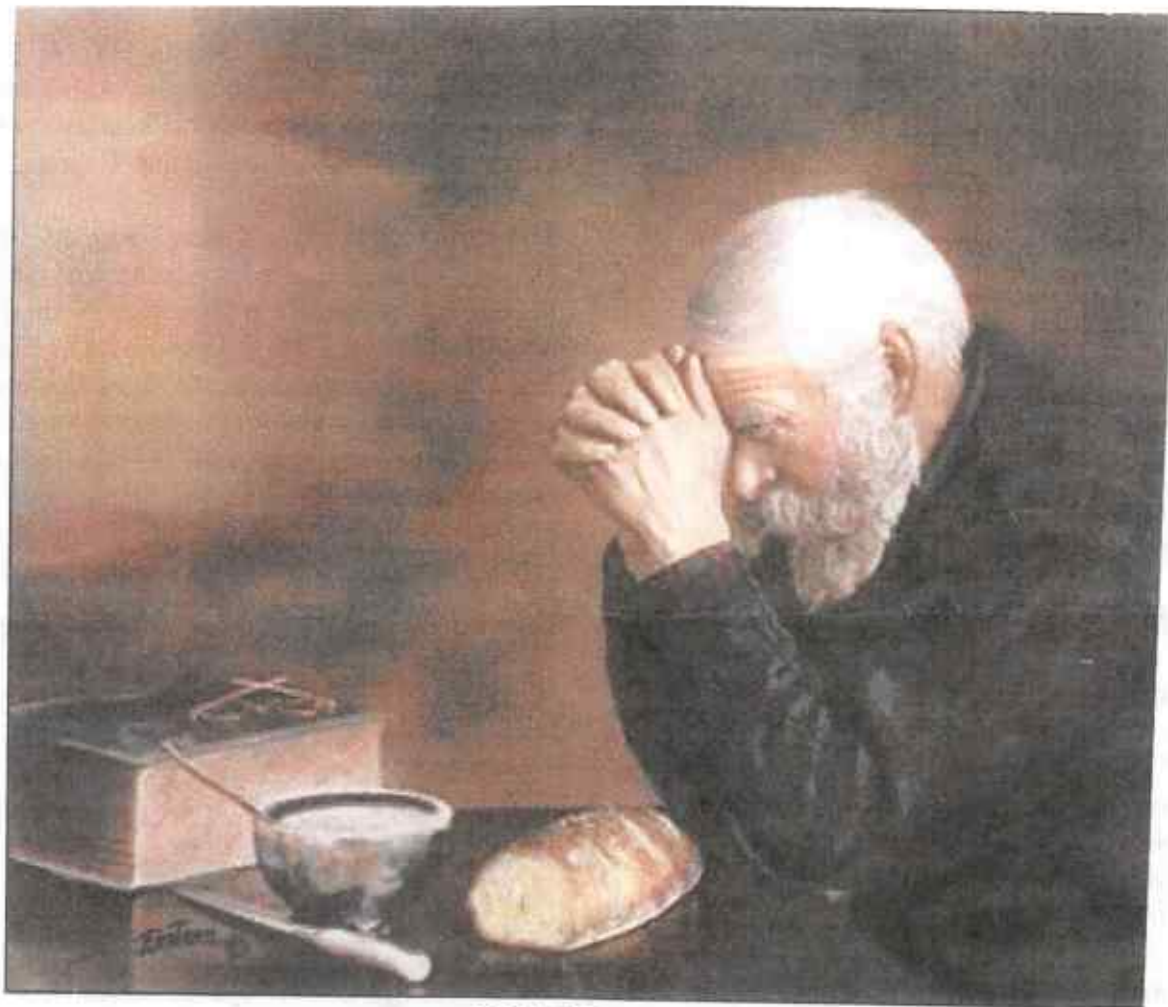

Secondly, ca 1920 Mildred (last name unknown). Who died 31 Dec 1919. He raised a large family of 9 children. His line of descent: John; James L, Ebenezer D., Ebenezer, Elijah, John, John jr., John sr, Hugh, Rowland.

The Calkins have lived in Henrietta, NY since, at least
Oct. 3, 1839. This is based on a head stone for a George
Calkins, son of Hiram and Esther Calkins,, who died at
age of 4mos.

The headstone is in the Tinker Cemetery est.-1810. The
next record of Hiram is his purchase of the land used by
the Society of Friends in Henrietta for their meeting
house located on what is now known as Calkins Road.
The 1853 assessment tax rolls show Hiram owned 130.5
acres in the range and lot numbers through which
Calkins Road now passes. In 1875 Samuel Calkins was
the town's supervisor. In 1885 Samuel Calkins was the
postmaster. Samuel and his son John began a coal and
produce store in the mid 1890's. Info. provided by John

Recipes are coming in and the stories vary from a couple of sentences to a paragraph. On the recipe submitted by your editor, Ardella Douglas, she wrote about her grandmother's Swedish Meatballs. She said, "Swedish

meatballs come in many varieties. My Swedish grandmother didn't use a recipe. Coming from a family who cooked by memory and what ingredients were handy, I don't always follow exactly. For example: cream of mushroom soup can be a substitute for the gravy (sauce) for meatballs. Can be served with new potatoes or rice. My mother was Swedish, so I learned to cook by watching her and my grandmother. This meal was a favorite for a large family dinner".

Deadline to submit recipes is May 2005 - so there is plenty of time to forward your favorites. But, while you're thinking about it, why not write them up now so yours will be sure to be included in the cookbook. And remember, stories will make these recipes "come alive".

In June 2002 Pat published a family history entitled *CAULKINS IN CALIFORNIA: The Family of William O. And Mary Emma Whittier Caulkins, Our First 400 Years (A chapter of Our Story)*. The following recipes were included in that publication.

BOSTON BAKED BEANS

2 cups dry beans	1 onion
1 cup syrup (scant)	½ tsp. ginger
½ lb. bacon or salt pork	Salt and pepper

Soak beans overnight and cook until tender. Add syrup and bacon which is cut in chunks and fried about half done. Cook onion in fat and add to ingredients. Bake for several hours at 325. Serve with brown bread.

BOSTON BROWN BREAD

1 pint rye flour	3 cups sweet milk
1 pint graham flour	1 tsp. salt
1 pint corn meal	2 tsp. baking soda
1 pint sour milk (buttermilk)	1 cup syrup

Mix all together and steam in covered cans for two hours.

Clinch Calkins

Not only an unusual name, but a very unusual, and interesting person. A Calkins cousin to be proud of.

Clinch Calkins, who was line of descent is Marion Clinch Calkins-11, Judson Wells-10, Delivan-9, Isaac Rowley-8, Caleb-7, David-6, Samuel-5, Samuel-4, John-3, Hugh-2, Rowland-1.

The following appeared in the National Biography

"Calkins, Clinch (15 July 1895- 26 Dec 1968), poet, polemicist, novelist, was born Marion Clinch Calkins in Evansville, Wisconsin, the daughter of Judson Wells Calkins, a politically liberal owner of a general store, and Julia Clinch, a lover of music and literature. Calkins graduated from the University of Wisconsin 1918, and packed artillery shells in a Milwaukee plant and then returned to Madison to teach in the university's English and history departments and to do social work. She submitted a poem, "I was a Maiden," to an annual competition in the Nation, a favorite magazine in her parents house. Wanting a "neutral" name that was neither masculine nor feminine, she dropped her first name and entered the contest using "Clinch Calkins". Shortly thereafter the magazine editor, Oswald Garrison Villard, traveled to Wisconsin to tell Calkins her poem had won first prize but couldn't be published, because it was so "advanced" it would cost the magazine its mailing privileges. Instead the poem was given third prize and was not printed, Calkins recalled that the magazine "after that . discontinued its poetry contest." "I was a Maiden" was published in Calkins Poems (1928). The lines that were too "advanced" were: "My lover holds me in his close embrace / And all his members with mine tightly lace / And he has died and I will near his son, / I will name him after love, Corruption"

In the mid 1920's Calkins moved to New York City and was a vocational counselor in the school system and a social worker at Lillian Wald's Henry Street Settlement.

Her father, alarmed at her moving to the dangerous city, insisted that she take a revolver with her. Soon uncomfortable in New York, Calkins buried the pistol in the graveyard of Trinity Church. One of the immigrant boys she was teaching scolded her "MY God Miss Calkins, I coulda used that gat!"

IN 1927 Calkins worked as a bibliographer in Florence, Italy, for art historian, Richard Offner. She wrote poems and under the name "Marjorie Wattles", humorous columns for New Yorker in its first years. Her poems were published by Alfred A Knopf in enthusiastic praise. In his review, Lionel Trilling wrote that Calkins was "producing one of the finest bodies of American poetry."

Calkins greatest success, however, came in a work of social criticism. With funding and 300 case histories from the National Federation of Settlements, she wrote, *Some Folks Won't Work* (1938), a book documenting what happens to people who lose their jobs. The book appeared less than a year after the 1929 crash, and was reviewed on the front page of the New York Times Book Review. It became both a best seller and, in a real sense, the first book of the depression. Marquis Childs said the book would touch the heart of the most complacent Babbit. Paul Douglas wrote, "I am a statistician and I pride myself on being tough-minded, but these stories left me weak with the anguish which always comes from seeing brave soul struggling with impersonal fate.... I can only wish that every comfortable family may take the occasion to read this book."

Calkin's book brought to the attention of Harry Hopkins, Franklin Delano Roosevelt's right hand man. When the New Deal began in 1933, Hopkins invited her to join his Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA), Calkins traveled the country reporting on economic conditions and sometimes ghost wrote for Hopkins, his *Spending to Save. The Complete Story of Relief* (1938) has many echoes of *Some Folks Won't Work* because they came from the same author.

Calkins and her husband, Mark Merrell, whom she had married in 1938 and who headed the drug industry division of the National Recovery Administration (NRA), socialized with many important New Dealers. One of them, A.A.Berle later wrote, "I think she kept many of us healthy and sane through those years... For her, there was neither high nor humble- merely men and women appreciated and esteemed for their qualities, the best of which she evoked." The couple had one daughter. Calkins was especially close to Henry Alsberg, the director of the Federal Writers' Project, and his second in command, her fellow Wisconsin alumnus, Clair Laning; the night Alsberg was ignominiously fired her sought refuge in the party thrown by Calkins and her husband.

In 1936 the Senate voted to investigate whether workers trying to organize labor unions were being denied their constitutional rights of free speech and assembly. The investigation by Senator Robert E Follette's Civil Liberties Committee drew more media attention than any congressional inquiry since the one organized to look into the Teapot Dome scandal. Calkins, seconded to the committees staff, reported what she heard and saw in *Spy Overheat* (1937), the first book to examine industrial espionage.

IN 1939, while caring for her young daughter, Calkins wrote a verse drama "State Occassin" about the rise of an American fascist. IN 1943 Broadway producer Lee Simonson complained in print he hadn't anything to produce. Calkins sent him her play, and Simonson optioned it. He finally decided the play's time has passed, and "State Occasion" was instead produced at Catholic University, with Alan Schnieder directing and Ed McMahon in a small role.

After W W 2 Calkins devoted many years to preparing a biography of inventor Marchese Guglielmo Marconi with his daughter, Degna. The biography appeared in 1962, but by that time Calkins had withdrawn from the project. While continuing to write poetry, some of which appeared in the Intellectual review journal *Botteghe Oscure* and her second book of poems. *Strife of Love in a Dream* (1965), she turned to fiction. *Lady on the Hunt*, a satire on the fox hunting set, appeared to mixed reviews in 1950. Two years later she published *Calendar of Love*, a portrait of two Washington couples' lives against the public turmoil of the previous thirty years. The reviews this time were more positive. Paul Pickrel in the *Yale Review* commended the book for its "sense of the responsibility lived." Particularly praised was Calkins's journalistic rendering of little known aspects of the New Deal, notably as one reviewer put it, "the boring and squalling days of the NRA."

Calkins died in McLean Virginia"

Some Places to Search

The following was submitted by Joyce Feustel, and is interesting as well as possibly helping some one.

"The portion below came through from another list so thought I would pass it along.

There are several places to look for lost ancestors, we may not like the idea but it might provide some answers. Poorhouse, Insane Asylum, Prison, and being born out of wedlock. I think some census's do record the fact they were there. Just like the prison records.

One is the Poorhouse records. There is a site that is under construction that has quite a bit of information already. You might check there for your surname. Also it gives the story of the poorhouse.

REVISE HOME

Another place is insane asylum records. I don't have a site for this but the records should be in the Archives of each state.

Another records that we don't like to think about is Bastardy Bonds. Below is a portion describing this and what these women went through. A far cry from today, wouldn't you say? "North Carolina Bastardy Bonds," by Betty J Camin. 1990.

"The Bastardy Bonds of North Carolina are just as the title states-bonds posted because of the birth or impending birth of a bastard child.. These bonds were intended to protect the county or parish from the expense of raising the child. It is asked that in reading this material, the reader do so with love and understanding of the problems of these men and women

When the pregnancy of an unmarried woman or birth of her child was brought to the attention of the court, a warrant was issued and the woman brought into court. She was examined (questioned) under oath and asked to declare the name of the child's father. The reputed father was then served a warrant and required to post bond. If the woman refused to name the father, she, her father, or some other interested party would post the bond. In some cases it was found that the mother and reputed father, together posted the bond. If the woman refused to post bond, or declare the father, she was often sent to jail."

The time period covered by this book is from the formation of the county to about 1878. The author felt that publishing anything more recent might be disturbing to some. This book only contains the records for 30 counties. She also suggests that if you wish to have a copy of the original bond or bond book entry, that you go to the NC Archives or hire a researcher to locate the paper. At the time she published, the original material in the state archives had not been microfilmed. She did state that microfilm of the court records were available for a fee from archives.

I am sure that other states have similar records, this just happens to be NC. We have to be aware of all the possibilities of what could have happened to our ancestors.

All of them weren't trailblazers, or rich, or one of the famous ones.

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NOTABLE DESCENDANTS OF HUGH AND ANNE CALKINS

To use the words of an ex-President, let me make one thing perfectly clear: I do not work on genealogy in order to gain reflected glory by proving descent from an illustrious person, or kinship to the rich and famous. Nevertheless, it is sometimes interesting to look at genealogy relationships and see how widely cousins spread in a few generations. Mr. Gary Boyd Roberts, Senior Research Scholar of the New England Historic Genealogical Society and a nationally recognized genealogist, author and lecturer, has published numerous books and articles showing the relationships among many famous people. In an address given before the International Reunion of the Calkins Family Association in May, 2000, Mr. Roberts provided the descent of some notable persons from the progenitors Hugh and Anne Calkins. HONORABLE WILLIAM H CALKINS

The Hon. William H Calkins, was the last of the Territorial Judges of Washington Territory. He was born 18th Feb 1842 in Pike County Ohio. In 1853 he removed with his father's family to Indiana where for the next three years worked on their farm. In 1856, his father, being elected County Auditor, young Calkins worked as his Deputy for 2 years. From 1858 to spring of 1861, he was editor and book keeper of the Indiana *Daily Courier* at Lafayette, employing his leisure time studying law.

At the age of 19 he enlisted in the Indiana Troops. He was later made First LT of CO. H 14th Iowa Infantry, and was taken prisoner and held in the famous Libby Prison. He was later released and joined his reg., and was promoted to the rank of



W H Calkins

Major in 1865.

On June 20 1864 he married Hattie S Holton, formerly of KY. They had 3 children, 2 sons, Daniel and Carroll and 1 daughter, who became Mrs VanCarter.

After studying law and attending law school at Louisville KY., was admitted to practice in 1866 in IN. He was elected Prosecuting Att. that year, and re-elected in 1868. In 1870 was elected member of 47th General Assembly of IN.

1874 he was nominated by the Republican party for Congress but was defeated by a Dr Hammond. He was successful, however, in 1876, 1880, and 1882

On his appointment by President Harrison to the Washington Territory bench, he removed to Tacoma Washington Territory, and served until statehood in Oct 1889, after which he retired to private practice and died in Tacoma WA on January 29 1894, at age 52.

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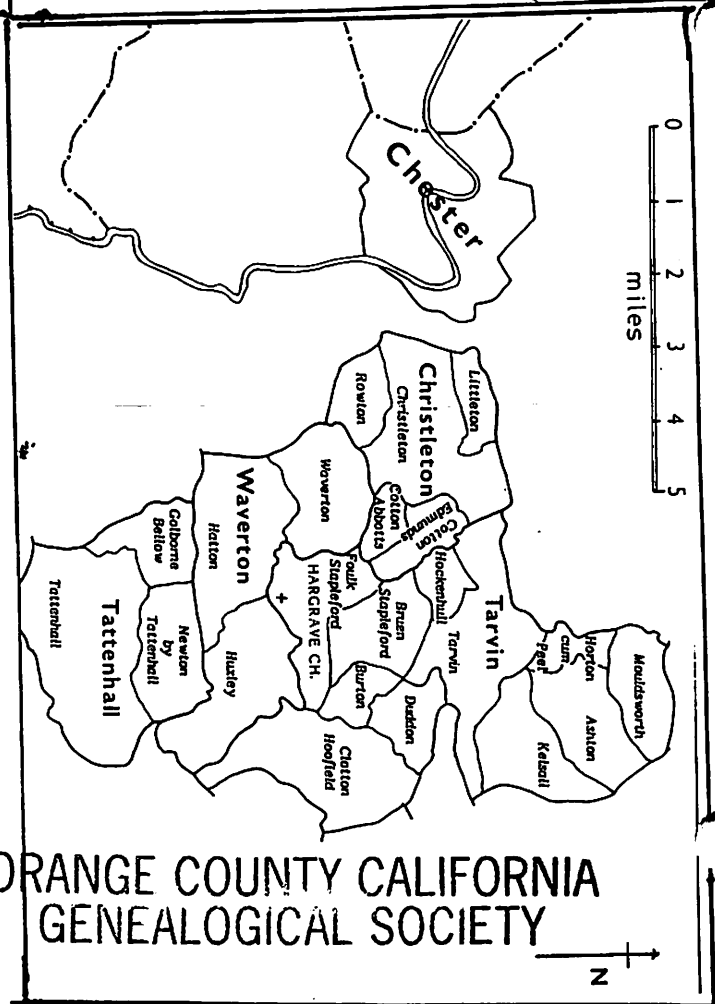
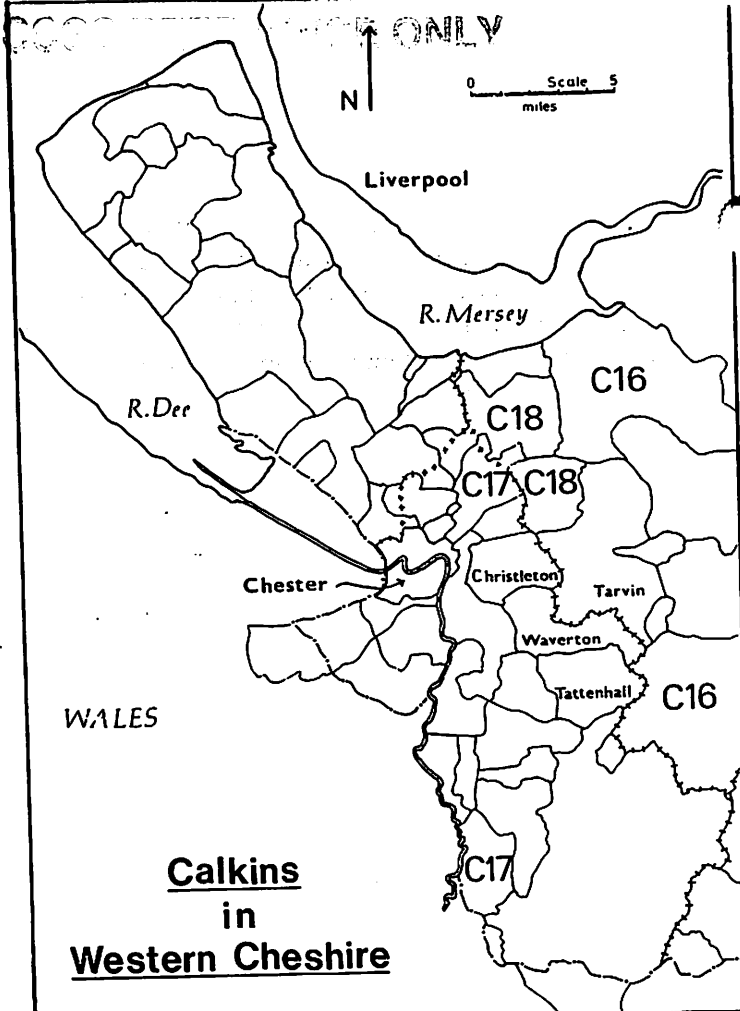

Married, March 4, 1840, in Earlville, by Professor A. C. Kendrick, of the Hamilton Literary and Theological Institute, Mr. H. A. Gardner of DeRuyter, to Miss Minerva A. Calkins.

Henry Albert Gardner was born February 14, 1810 in New York and died December 5, 1853, the son of William Gardner/Gardiner and Mercy Higginbotham⁹. The 1850 census lists Henry Gardner (age 40), Minerva (29), and a son Henry (8) living in Granby, Oswego County, New York. The 1860 census lists Minerva A Gardner (age 38), Henry C (18) and Caroline (10) living in Granby. The 1870 census lists Henry C Gardner (age 28), Carrie L Gardner (20) and Minerva Rose (49), living in Granby. It appears that after the 1860 census, Minerva married _____ Rose, and that he either died, or they separated before the 1870 census. The 1880 census for Oswego Falls, New York, lists M A Gardner (age 58), Henry C (37) and Carry L (26), so it appears that Minerva had resumed using the Gardner surname by 1880. Minerva could not be found on the 1900 census. Oscar Calkins' will lists his sister, Minerva Rose living in Fulton, New York.

The 1895 Landmarks of Oswego County, NY-Family Sketches¹⁰, contains the following biography.

Clinton H. Gardner, notary, bank director, and retired merchant at Fulton, was born in De Ruyter, New York, June 19, 1842. His father, Henry A. Gardner, a carriage manufacturer, established his business at Lower Oswego Falls in 1847, where his widow Minerva (Calkins) Gardner still resides at the age of seventy-four years.....

8. Oscar F. Calkins was born on March 28, 1821 in New York, his birth date being calculated from his obituary. From Reference 8;

Married, June 27, 1854 in Waterville, by Reverend D. T. Elliott, O. F Calkins, Esq., of Earlville, and Miss Anna Maria Williams of Fremont, Ohio.

The 1869-70 Sherburne Business Directory⁵ lists Oscar F Calkins as an attorney at law, dealer in fancy stock and farmer living in Earlville. Oscar Calkins died February 25, 1893 and is buried in the Earlville

Cemetery, with his wife Annie M (1833-1901), and a child Florence A, who was born and died in 1865. A large monument with these names inscribed is located in the cemetery. On the 1900 census for Sherburne, the widow Anna Calkins states that she was born in Ohio in January 1833 and that she had given birth to one child and none was living. Charles Tuttle, "nephew", born in January 1834 in New York, is living with her.

9. Mary Jane Calkins was born in April 1824 in New York and died after the 1900 census. She attended The DeRuyter Institute in Hamilton during the 1840-41 school year¹¹. From Reference 8;

Married October 27, 1846 in DeRuyter, by Reverend E. D. Taylor, H. Whittemore, a merchant, to Miss Mary Jane Calkins of Earlville.

Married October 27, 1874 at Little Falls, New York, by Reverend A. LeRoy, assisted by Reverend R. R. Prentice, Reverend A. M. Prentice, of Brockport, New York, and Miss Jennie Whittemore, of Little Falls.

Died May 29, 1876 in Little Falls, of typhoid fever, Genevieve W., wife of Reverend A. M. Prentice, of Brockport, New York, age 27 years

The 1850 census for Sherburne lists Henry Whittemore (age 29, born in Connecticut), Mary J (25), Genevieve (2) and Washington Calkins, Mary Jane's father. The age for Washington Calkins is blank and his birthplace is listed as Rhode Island. The family is living in Little Falls, Herkimer County, New York on the 1860 thru 1900 censuses. On the 1870 census, a Sybil Daniels (83, CT) is listed with the family. The 1880 census lists Henry and Jane Whittemore, Sybil Daniels (age 92) "mother", and Arthur Prentice (4) "grandson". The 1900 census states that Henry was born in May 1819 and Mary in April 1824, and that Mary had given birth to 2 children and that 1 was living. Arthur Prentice (born in March 1877) was also listed, but now was identified as "nephew". Arthur was probably the son of Genevieve and A. M. Prentice, born shortly before his mother's death.

The Little Falls Town Business Directory for 1869-1870¹² lists Henry Whittemore as a collector of tolls on the Erie Canal. In his will, Oscar Calkins did "hereby nominate and appoint my friend Henry Whittemore of Little Falls, New York to be my executor" and identifies Mary Jane Whittemore as his sister.

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THE FAMILY OF WASHINGTON CALKINS OF CHENANGO COUNTY, NEW YORK

The book *Calkins Family in America*¹, page 91, states that *Washington Calkins (John⁶, John⁵, John⁴, John³, John², Hugh¹) was born in 1777 in Rhode Island and died 1856 in Earlville, Chenango County, New York. He married Mary (UNKNOWN). She was born about 1782 and died 1840 in Earlville. Only one child is listed for them; Warner Calkins, born about 1803 in New York and died December 29, 1877 in Earlville. Mary, the wife of Washington Calkins, and their additional children are identified here.*

THE DEATH OF OSCAR CALKINS, A SON OF WASHINGTON CALKINS

Sherburne, Chenango County, vital records state the following:

Oscar Calkins died at Sherburne on February 25, 1893 age 71 years, 10 months, 28 days. He was the son of Washington Calkins, born Connecticut, and Mary Eastman, born Oneida County, New York.

The will of Oscar Calkins is defined to be all the legal papers relating to his death. His will, probated in 1893 in Chenango County, lists the names of three sisters, five nephews, four grand nephews and three grand nieces; and their places of residence. Combining these data with other records allows us to determine the family of Washington Calkins.

MARY EASTMAN, WIFE OF WASHINGTON CALKINS

Mary Eastman, the wife of Washington Calkins, was the daughter of Joseph Eastman (Joseph⁴, Peter³, Joseph², Roger¹) and his first wife, Hannah Warner (Nathan⁴, Robert³, John², John¹). *The History and Genealogy of the Eastman Family in America*² gives much data on Joseph and Hannah Eastman starting on page 200. Joseph was born in Connecticut in 1756 and died at Marshall, Oneida County, New York in March 1844. Hannah Warner was born in Connecticut and died about 1832. Their first child is listed as:

Polly, born _____; married a Caulkins

This is certainly the Mary (i.e. Polly) Eastman who married Washington Calkins, as they named one of their sons *Warner*, the maiden name of Polly's mother. Also Polly had two sisters named *Selina* and *Minerva*, the same names given to two of Mary's daughters.

EARLVILLE CEMETERY RECORDS

About 30 people, having the Calkins surname, are buried in this cemetery. The following headstones are located there: "*WASHINGTON CALKINS 1777-1856*", "*MARY WIFE OF WASHINGTON CALKINS DIED APRIL 17, 1840 AGE 58 YEARS*" and "*MEMORY OF JOHN CALKINS WHO DIED MAR 7TH 1804 AGED 57*". John Calkins, who was the father of Washington, has a Revolutionary War veteran medallion next to his headstone. Records are available from the Chenango County Historian. Most of the Calkins tombstones, some of which are difficult to read, have been photographed.

THE CHILDREN OF WASHINGTON AND MARY EASTMAN CALKINS

Censuses starting in 1810 show Washington Calkins living near Sherburne, so most of his children were likely born there.

1. **Joseph Calkins** An eroded headstone in the Earlville Cemetery may state *Joseph? Son of Washington and Mary*. Burial records list a Joseph Calkins, buried in 1803 at age 2. He probably was named after Mary's father, Joseph Eastman. If this record is correct, it indicates that Washington and Mary Calkins were living near Sherburne in 1803.

2. **Warner Calkins**, the only child of Washington and Mary listed in the *Calkins Family in America*¹, was born in 1803 in New York, and died January 29, 1877. He is buried in the Earlville Cemetery "*WARNER CALKINS DIED JAN 29, 1878 AGED 74 YEARS*" with "*MARY R. WIFE OF WARNER CALKINS DIED OCT 4, 1905 AGED 100 YEARS*". Warner and Mary had three children:

1. Reese Calkins was buried in the Earlville Cemetery in 1832, at age 2, according to cemetery records.
2. Livingston J. Calkins (1826-1873) and his wife Ellen M Dunton (1830-1911) are buried in the Earlville Cemetery. They had one child, William Warner Calkins, who is listed in Oscar Calkins' will, as a grand-nephew living in Earlville. William W. (1857-1901) and his first wife Nora Davis (1863-1891), are buried in the Earlville Cemetery.
3. Omar Calkins (1833-1893) and his wives Anna R Wilcox (1837-1878) and Addie D.

(1845-1914) are buried in the Earlville Cemetery. Omar and Addie had a son Gail Livingston Calkins, who is listed in Oscar Calkins' will as a grand-nephew, living in Utica, Oneida County, New York. Gail's World War I draft registration in 1918 states that he was born on November 6, 1885, and that he was living in Utica³.

3. Selina Calkins is estimated to have been born about 1806. On census records, she states her age as 38 in 1850, 56 in 1860 and 62 in 1870, and that she was born in New York. (The 1810 census for Washington Calkins states that he had two daughters under age 10. Selina was likely one of them.) She probably was named after her mother's sister Selina Eastman. Selina married the Reverend Rodolphus Wilson, a Baptist minister, who was born in New York about 1799. The 1850 census for Somerset, Niagara County, New York, lists R L Wilson (age 51), Selina (38), Mortimer (17), Lodema (16) and Lewis (4). The 1860 census lists Rodolphus L Wilson (age 61), Selina A (56), Lewis (15) and Jared B (8). Selina likely died before the 1880 census, as it shows Rodolphus living with their son Jared, in Somerset. Selina may have been the second wife of Rodolphus, because there are 12 years between the birth of Lodema and Lewis. Also Mortimer, who died in 1903, is not mentioned in Oscar Calkins' will, while Lewis living in Des Moines Iowa, and Jared living in Rome New York, are mentioned.

4. Julia Ann Calkins was born February 29, 1808 and died November 28, 1839 according to **The Otis Family in America**⁴, which contains much data on her descendents, starting on page 248. She married George Washington Otis on July 8, 1827 and they had six children: Alvin (1828-1900), William (1829-1904), George Edwin (1834-1892), Adoniram (1836-1837), Nathaniel (1838-1858) and Julia Ann Otis (1839-1892). Julia Ann Calkins Otis died about one month after her youngest child was born and she is buried in the Earlville Cemetery. There is a record of her burial, but no headstone could be found. On the 1880 census, her living children state that she was born in New York.

Alvin and William Otis are listed in Oscar Calkins' will as being his nephews, living in Hudson, Wisconsin. George Edwin Otis, who preceded Oscar in death, had three children who grew to adulthood; Hattie (who married William Grant), Millicent and Basle. These children are identified in Oscar's will as

being his grand-nieces and grand-nephew, living in Hudson.

The child Julia Ann Otis (1839-1892) was about one month old when her mother Julia Ann Calkins Otis died. She did not move with her family to Wisconsin, but remained in Chenango County to be raised by Joseph and Sally Ferris. Julia Ann Otis married Charles Tuttle (1834-1908), in about 1858, and they had two children; Clara (1859-1936) who married John Abbott, and Ziba (1861-1933). Clara and Ziba are identified in Oscar Calkins' will as being his grand-niece and grand-nephew, both living in Smyrna, Chenango County. These individuals are buried in the Sherburne Hill West Cemetery, except for Joseph and Sally Ferris who are buried in the Ferris Cemetery.

5. Cordelia Calkins was born about 1812 in New York, and probably died before 1893. Her ages given on the 1850 thru 1880 censuses are inconsistent. She married Dillis Sprague, likely before the 1830 census, which lists a female in his household, over age 14 and under age 20. The 1840 census states that they had three children, none of whom are listed on the 1850 census. Their only child listed on the 1850 thru 1880 censuses was Clayton W Sprague, born in 1846. Census records indicate that Cordelia and Dillis live their whole married life in the Sherburne area. Dillis Sprague was likely dead by the 1880 census, as Cordelia was living with their son Clayton. Dillis was the son of Hiram Sprague and Prudence Calkins⁶. Oscar Calkins' will listed Clayton W Sprague as his nephew, living in Earlville. Cordelia was not mentioned in the will, so she was likely dead.

6. Amelia M Calkins was born about 1816 in New York. Oscar Calkins' will referred to his sister Malosina Wilson living in Murphysboro, Jackson County, Illinois. Malosina was likely the middle name of Amelia who married Jared Willson/ Wilson in about 1837. Census records indicate that they were living in Madison County, New York in 1840; Cuyahoga County, Ohio in 1850; Knox County, Illinois in 1860; not found in 1870; and in Jackson County, Illinois in 1880. She could not be found on the 1900 census. Amelia and Jared Wilson had three children listed on the censuses: (1) Mary Ann, born about 1839 in New York, (2) Minerva J, born about 1840 in New York and married Marcus C White on January 13, 1863 in Knox County, Illinois⁷, and (3) Gertrude, born about 1843 in New York. A few, most notably those surnamed Cacking, Calklin, Carkin, Cockain, Corcis, Corkin or Cukins, may not be Hugh's direct descendants, but the remaining 100 almost certainly are. In the 150 years between 1640, when Hugh arrived in America, and the 1790 census, his descendants in the male line increased from just Hugh's two sons, John and David, to at least 100 families. CALKINS, William H., whose retentive memory carries him back to days when agricultural operations in the oldest settled sections were carried on with an expenditure of time and effort that would no be deemed entirely out of date, lives in considerable retirement at Milledgeville, Ill. He was born in Wayne Co., N. Y., July 1, 1843, and is a sone of John and Sally Ann (Van Valkerburgh) Calkins, natives of Vermont. The mother was a descendant of one of the early settlers of the Green Mountain State. John Calkins and wife moved with other relatives to Wayne Co., N. Y., and there La Follette Calkins, the grandfather, died in 1850. The grandmother married (second) James West and she died at Frog Point, N.Y. The parents of William H. Calkins were married in 1837, and the mother who was the first wife of John Calkins, died in Wayne Co. in 1850. His second marriage took place in 1854 to Nancy J. Frazeir and, in 1855 they moved to a farm six miles from Kalamazoo, Mich. In that same year they came to Whiteside county, Ill., settling within three miles of Milledgeville. At first John Calkins rented land, but in 1864, purchased forty acres. He made an excelent farm of that property and lived on it untill 1877, when he bought a house in Milledgeville, where his death occured March 20, 1905, having reached the age of ninety three years, respected and esteemed beyond the usual amount of regard shown to venerable age. In early life a Whig, he became prominent in the Republican party later on. In religious believe he was a Babtist. The four children of his first marriage were: William H., Stephen Q., who lives at Quincy, Ill., is a verteran of the Civil War and was wounded at the battle of Shiloh; Abraham, who died September 13, 1908; and Mary A., who married David Bushman, both of whom are deceased, being survived by one daughter, who is the wife of William Flemming. Three children were born to the second union, all of whom are now deceased. William H. Calkins accompanied his parents to Michigan and then to Illinois and started to school in April, 1856, attending until he was twelve years of age at which time he went to work on a farm, his duties continuing through th summer while in the winter time he had further school advantages. He well remembers tramping through deep snow and facing sharp winds, but in those days boys were not supposed to mind such exposure and in fact did develope sturdy frames and sound constitutions. He remained with his father for some years and then went to live with his brother Abraham and together they rented 200 acres of land and operated it jointly until October 1864, when he enlisted for service in the Civil War,

entering Company M, Eighth Illinois Cavalry for one year or during the war. His regiment wasa stationed at Farifax Courthouse, Va., but in the spring of 1865 it was ordered to Missouri for military work on the plains, but he was honerably discharged in July of that year. He returned home and resumed work on the farm and was married february2, 1870 to Miss Emma Scoville. She was born in Whiteside county, Ill., January 17, 1853, a daughter of James and Elizabeth Scoville, early settlers in that section, now both deceased.

After marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Calkins settled on a farm in Genesee township, Whiteside county, three and one half miles from Milledgeville. This farm Mr. Calkins developed into one of the best in the township and additionally has done some building and home painting, although he never served an apprenticeship to these trades. He has done well for a man that started out in life with a capital of \$50, owning at present some very valuable property, having educated his children, and at all times done his full duty as a citizen. In recalling early days he remembers the old shovel plow and equally primitive implements for farm use. On Aprill11, 1884, Mrs. Calkins died and was survived by three children, namely: John E., married Flora Blackman and they have four sons; Elvin E., who was born in 1876, married Pauline Haug and they have one son, Lawrence. Elvin who is now operating the home farm. Mr. Calkins was married (second) to Mrs. Carrie M.

(Hendrick) Bushman, who was born August 16, 1864, a daughter of Lewis C. and Catherine L. (Herald) Hendrick, natives of New York. By her first marriage, Mrs. Calkins had two

children: Lolla, now the wife of Herbert Page of Rockford, Ill.; and Dora E., who died in infancy. Mr. Bushman died July 27, 1886. One child has been born to Mr. and Mrs. Calkins, Zolla Iona, born March 13, 1896. Mr. Calkins belongs to a number of social and fraternal organizations, including: The Grand Army of the Republic, the Modern Woodmen of America, Mystic Workers, Patriotic Order Sons of America, while Mrs. Calkins of the Women's Relief Corps and Mystic Workers and for eight years was treasurer of the former body. They are worthy members of the Church of the Brethren. Politically, he has always been a Republican and for four years served as a member of the board of alderman of the town and during this time the cement walks were laid and other improvements completed.

Hi Ardella. My name is Judy Hopkins. I used to be Judy Priestly and I graduated from Federal Way H.S. in 1959. I am a Caulkins, nearly a Calkins. My GrGrGr Grandma was a Clarinda Caulkins of Worthington, OH., who married Ira Metcalf in Sept. of 1819. She died in 1943 in Worthington. That is all the info I've been able to find on her.

I'm gung-ho on genealogy as I got all my great aunt's papers and pictures when she died. Love it! There were lots of old photos with no names on them---made my hair stand on end. All those lovely relatives and no telling who they were. Then my mom suggested that I contact the Hobart family of Seattle. Perhaps they might have names to go with the photos as they were friends (and cousins, it turns out) of my Great grandparents, she said. I wrote to every Hobart family in the Seattle phone book (lots of them!) and one magical night I got a phone call. A man's voice said, "Is this Judy?" Yes I answered. "Well, if you want to identify photos, we'd better hurry up 'cuz I'm 96 years old!" I photocopied them all and sent them to him and now 85% of them have names. He and his son Dave, from Anchorage, AL., and I met that next year in Kansas to research the old homestead and find the graves of the Great grandfather we share. Wonderful! Now I've added those cousins to my extended family and my 96 year old one just turned 100 this past March 11th.

With a newly found cousin from another line I traveled to S. Dakota and Neb. Last Oct. In NE. we were allowed to go through the trunk of an elderly relative who died one week after we were there! We traveled with a copier so were able to photocopy all her material. We went clear to Iowa and saw the old homestead, visited the graves, and researched. This is a "hobby" that really grows on you! I stood on the grave of my GrGr Grandpa and introduced myself. We had a good talk.

I feel I know him now as I have so much information on his life from the archives there. One night I dreamed I was sitting in a chair and all my ancestors were dancing around me! I've brought them all to life again!

Notable Calkins Author

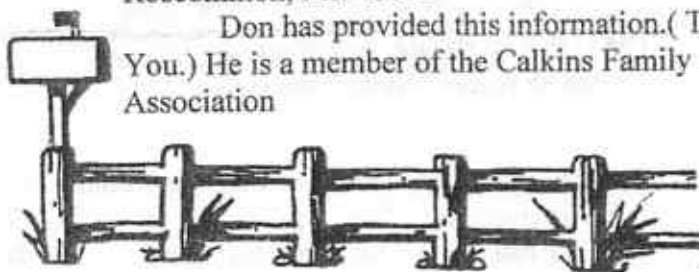
