Ludwig Kister (1688-1747)

With the recent additions of the Madge Hubbard files, Fay Fuller notes, research in Northampton and Westmoreland Counties, PA, and paid association research by Dave Marshall of Peoria, AZ on the Ohio connections, we have made giant strides in our information on Ludwig Kister's descendants. However, there are still a number of gaps to fill in and we hope that future research by our members will give us some more answers.

Ludwig Kister was born 29 November 1688 at Zinswiller near Oberbronn, son of Johannes and Maria Susanna Kister. He was baptized 3 December 1688 in Oberbronn. He was confirmed at age 14 years. He married 1717 Maria Susanna Schneider at Oberbronn. Maria Susanna Schneider was born 9 November 1695. Maria Susanna had been living at Asswiller before her marriage. Ludwig was a shoemaker, as was his father. They lived at Durstel (about 36 miles northwest of Strasbourg, and 6 miles east of the Sarre River), Alsace, France. The area is known as "Crooked Alsace." The people speak German, Lorraine dialect. Ludwig died 12 July 1747 and was buried the 15th. Maria Susanna, widow of Ludwig, died 12 August 1770 and was buried the following day in the churchyard. Ludwig and Maria Susanna had five sons and three daughters.

Their children:

1. A first son may have been baptized in Oberbronn (this record has not been searched).
2. Johann Jacob Kister baptized 16 February 1721; married 13 May 1751 Maria Christian Entzmenger in Durstel, Alsace, France.
3. Johann Ludwig Kister born 18 September 1723, baptized 19 September 1723; married 4 November 1748 Eva Christina Antoni at Bettwiller parish Durstel; married second Catharina _____; died between 11 December 1786 and 19 January 1787 in Lehigh Township, Northampton County, Pa.

Johann Ludwig Kister/Kuster was born 18 September 1723 in Durstel, Alsace, France, son of Ludwig and Maria Susanna (Schneider) Kister. Ludwig was baptized 19 September 1723. He was confirmed 29 May 1740. Ludwig married 4 November 1748 Eva Christina Antoni at Bettwiller parish, Durstel. Eva Christina was daughter of Casper Antoni, deceased, wheelwright from Bettwiller. They came to Philadelphia with brother, George Philip, aboard the ship Neptune, leaving Rotterdam and coming by way of Cowes, England, and arrived 4 October 1752. Ludwig and Eva Christina settled in Lehigh Township, Northampton County, Pa. They probably attended St Pauls (Indianlands) Church near Cherryville. Eva Christina died 1760-1768. Ludwig married second Catharina _____. Ludwig died sometime between 11 December 1786 and 19 January 1787, leaving a seven page Will (File 1188, Northampton County, Pa, dated 11 December 1786). An inventory of the Estate was made 19 January 1787. Sixteen children survived Ludwig. Catharina was still living in 1810 as evidenced by the federal census record.

George Philip Kister/Kuster was born 25 September 1733 at Durstel, Alsace, France, son of Ludwig and Maria Susanna (Schneider) Kister. George Philip was baptized 27 September 1733. He was confirmed 14 May 1747. George Philip came to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania with brother, Ludwig, aboard the ship Neptune and arrived 4 October 1752. George Philip was a servant for Rudolph Zerbe at Skippack, Pennsylvania. George Philip married 30 October 1755 Anna Maria Tetisman at the Old

Goshenhoppen Lutheran Church, Upper Salford Township of Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. Anna Maria was born about 1730, daughter of Philip Tetisman.

Johann Martzloff/Martzelloff/Martzell/Martin Kester was born 26 August 1737. He was baptized 28 August 1737 Durstell, Alsace, France (No. 196 on 2nd Register). He emigrated to America with his brothers Ludwig and Philip, and settled in Northampton County, Pennsylvania. He married Rachel Dieter about 1768. Rachel was the daughter of George Michael Dieter. The family lived in Lehigh Township, Northampton County, Pennsylvania. Martzell Küster sold 150 acres of land to his son, Philip, on 20 February 1816.

Agreement Lecha [Lehigh] Township, Northampton County, February Between 20, 1816. On this day Martzellus Kuster appeared as seller Martzell Kister and his son, Philip Küster, as buyer, and they made and and Philip Kister signed the following sales contract with each other. The agreement is as follows: the above mentioned seller, Martzellus Kuster, sells his farm in Lehigh Township, with the 150 acres of land belonging to it, adjoining the land of Friederich Eberhart, Jacob Anthony, wilhelm Dieter, and lastly Anton Solt and others, for the sum of 500 pounds, and if the seller should die, then his children shall draw this yearly according to age from the buyer's portion as joint- heirs. Furthermore the seller promises to give to the buyer a good, just and free deed when

the buyer shall have paid off the debt of the land, and the cost for the deed must be deducted from the above-mentioned 500 pounds or from the sum. Furthermore, the buyer promises to give his father, besides the above sales price, every year as long as he lives, 4 bushels of wheat, 21 bushels of corn, 13 bushels of Indian corn, 12 bushels of buckwheat, 15 lb. comed flax, 20 lb. tow, 1 barrel of cider, 1 barrel of ___ cider, and the seller is allowed to get as many apples as he needs for himself and his household. Every year the buyer must plow for the seller a quarter acre of land, dung it and put it in good order. The seller must see to the hoeing and sowing himself. The seller can keep two head of cattle on the place, and he can raise one cow, and this one can go with the buyer's cattle, and the necessary feed the buyer must supply for the seller. The buyer must bring the necessary firewood, cut, to the seller's house, but should he no longer be able to cut into smaller pieces himself, then the buyer must chop it smaller. Should the seller die before his wife, Rachel née Dieter, then she receives one half of the above and from the first amount shall my wife Rachel draw the interest as long as she lives. Since both parties are now agreed, they have signed with their own hand and have promised to fulfill this accord on the aforesaid day and year.

Rachel died sometime before 16 September 1834 when administrators, George Philip Kester, farmer, Jacob Vogel, carpenter, and Peter Kester, farmer all of Lehigh Township were named to administer her estate. The estate, listed as the amount of portion recieved from William Eichman, being from the estate of George Michael Dieter, the father of sd. Rachel Kester, was settled on 20 July 1837. On 19 November 1834 administrators, Henry Rockel, yeoman; John Bachman, cordwainer; and Henry Gress, farmer were named to administer Matzloff's estate.

Johann George Philip Kuster/Keister was born 8 February 1749 in Durstel, Alsace, France, son of Ludwig and Eva Christina (Antoni) Kuster. George Phillip married 15 November 1774 Ann Elizabeth Stamatz. Ann Elizabeth was born 2 December/15 February 1750 on board the "Strasburg" during a crossing of the Atlantic Ocean. George Philip and brother Ludwig left Northampton County, Pa to settle in Westmoreland County about 1778 and bought about 350 acres. George Philip settled near Harrison City, Westmoreland County, Pa. He served as a private in Capt Thos. Stokely's Company of Pennsylvania Rangers from Westmoreland County in 1781. He bought 462 acres of land from Alex Cobean of Gettysburg, Admas County and wife, Elizabeth in 1815. George Philip died 15 November 1834. Ann Elizabeth died 11 July 1838. They were buried at Denmark Manor Church Cemetery, Westmoreland County, Pa. A list of heirs was made in 1839 when Philip's land consisting of 189 acres, part of a survey of 1807 of 432 purchased by Philip Kiester from Alex Cobean, was quit claimed to Jacob Kister of Franklin Twp., Westmoreland Co. by the remaining heirs: Peter Kiester and wife, Susannah of Butler Co, Muddy Creek Twp.; John Kiester and wife, Margaret of Westmoreland Co., Franklin Twp.; Philip Kuster and wife, Margaret of Slippery Rock Twp., Butler Co.; Daniel Kiester and wife, Susannah of Franklin Twp., Westmoreland Co., Franklin Twp.; Catherine Kiester Franklin Twp.; Michael Kiester and wife, Martha, Salem Twp.; John McClelland and wife Elizabeth, Connesquenessing Twp., Butler Co.

7. Catherine Kiester born 3 January 1787 Denmark Manor, Westmoreland County, PA, baptized 22 April 1787 Zion Lutheran Church, Westmoreland County, PA, Johannes and Anna Silvius were sponsors; married James Dunford after 1839.

8. Michael Kiester born 5 April 1788 Denmark Manor, Westmoreland County, PA, baptized 21 January 1789 Zion Lutheran Church, Westmoreland County, PA; married Martha _____, lived Franklin Twp. Westmorland County, PA.

Ludwig/Lewis Kuster/Kester/Keister was born 18 January 1752 Alsace, France, the son of Johan Ludwig and Eva Christina (Antoni) Kuster. Lewis married Catharine Margaetha (surname unknown) about 1774 or earlier. Lewis left Northampton County, Pennsylvania about 1774 to settle near Scottdale in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. A warantee of land for 200 acres was issued to Lodowick Kerster -- survey dated 10 November 1773. Lewis rendered service in the Revolutionary War. Lewis bought 100 acres in Huntington Township, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania adjoining Walker, Vance, and Woodrow from Isaac Meason and wife, Catrine of Fayette County, which had been granted to Meason in 1787. In 1812 he sold this land to Conrad Stam. Ludwig Keister and wife, Cathrin, of Sugar Creek, Wayne County, Ohio sold 81 acres of land to Jacob Kiester of East Hempfield Township, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania adjoining Steisert, River, and other land of Ludwig on 24 August 1813. He bought more land from Meason and wife Cathrine of Fayette County in 1813, even though Ludwig was listed as living in Sugar Creek Township, Wane County, Ohio, at the time. This land was East Huntington Township adjoining Kerr, Tintsman and Stewert, part of a tract granted by Penns in 1796 to Ann Young, Niece of John Young. Ludwig Keister of Wayne County, Ohio

had granted "power of attorney" to "our trusty friend" Nicholas Swope of Westmoreland County to sell land, lately purchased from Meason, to Jacob Keister, and the land was sold to their son, Jacob. In 1814 more land was sold by Nicholas Swope, attorney for Ludwick Kester and wife Catherine. This time the land was sold to John Snider, and was located on Jacob's Creek adjoining Brenjoren, Furtz and land of Jacob Kester.

Lewis located in Baughman Township of Wayne County, Ohio around 1812. Catherine died after 1813, as she was listed on deeds selling land. She is not listed on the deed dated 21 August 1817 where Lewis sold land to Conrad Harman:

This Indenture made this twenty-first day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventeen between Lewis Keuster of the county of Wayne and State of Ohio of the one part and Coonrod Harman of said County and State aforesaid of the other part Witnesseth That the said Lewis Keuster for and in consideration of the sum of two hundred Dollars current money of the United States of America to him in hand paid the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged and forever quit and discharge the said Coonrod Harman heirs, executors and administrators have granted, bargained, sold, aliened and confirmed and by these presents doth grant, bargain, sell, alien and confirm unto the said Connrod Harman heirs and assigns forever all that tract or parcel of land lying and being in the County of Wayne and state of Ohio and more particularly described by being the North-east half quarter of section thirteen of township seventeen in Range eleven beginning at the North-east corner at a beech, thence south to a white-oak post, thence west to a ash post 1002 perches, thence north-east forty-six perches to a beech thence north to the line, together with all improvements, water courses, profits and appurtenances whatsoever to the said premises belonging or in anywise appertaining and the reversions, remainders and profits thereof and all the estate, right, title interest, property claim and demand of the said Lewis Keuster of in and to the same. To have and to hold the lands hereby conveyed with all and singular the premises and every part and parcel thereof with every of the appurtenances unto the said Coonrod Harman heirs and assigns forever to the only proper use and behoof of the said Coonrod Harman heirs and assigns forever. And the said Lewis Keuster for his heirs executors and administrators do covenant promise and agree to and with the said Coonrod Harman his heirs and assigns by these presents that the premises before mentioned now are and forever hereafter shall remain free of and from all judgements, executions, titles, troubles, charges and incumbrances whatsoever done or suffered to be done by the said Lewis Keuster. And the said Lewis Keuster and his heirs all and singular the premises hereby bargained and sold with the appurtenances unto the said Coonrod Harman heirs and assigns against the said Lewis Keuster and his heirs and all and every other person or persons whatsoever doth and will Warrant and forever defend by these presents. In witness whereof the said Lewis Keuster hereunto set his hand and seal the day and year first above written. Signed, sealed and delivered in the

presence of us.

Personally appeared before me the subscriber one of the acting Justice of the peace for said County the within named Lewis Keuster who acknowledged that he did voluntarily sign, seal and deliver the within deed of conveyance for the purposes therein expressed and desires that the same may be admitted to record. Lewis married Mary "Polly" Keyser 27 October 1825 in Wayne County, Ohio. Lewis' will was dated 2 March 1827, and probated 5 November 1827. Some records list Lewis' death as 20 November 1827 (more likely 20 October).

In the Name of God Amen, I Lewis Keister of township of Baughm, County of Wayne and state of Ohio, being weak in body, but of sound mind and understanding, do make this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all and every kind of Wills and Testaments heretofore by me made, or in anywise given.

I hereby resign my soul into the hands of Almighty God from whom it came, and my body to the ground to be interred at the discretion of my executors, in full confidence of a Joyfull Resurrection at the Consumation of all things.

And as to my Earthly Estate I Will and and dispose of it in manner following: After the payment of my just debts (if any there should be) which payment I allow to be made out of my Personal Estate, I Will and allow that my Son Jacob Keister shall have the sum of one dollar, my daughter Christiana Stouffer the sum of Fifty Dollars, my daughter Margaret Walters the sum of Fifty dollars, my daughter Elizabeth Herman the sum of Twenty dollars, and my daughter Eve Clapper the sum of Fifty dollars. After the payment of which sums as above mentioned, I Will and allow the remainder of my Estate to be equally divided between my children. That is, Cathraine Shoop, Christiana Stouffer, Margaret Walters, Matty Herman, Elizabeth Herman and Eve Clapper. I Will an allow that my son-in-law Conrad Herman shall have my Windmill, two sets of Horse Geers, one Harrow and two Pitch Forks. I Will and allow my daughter Matty one Churn, one Wire Riddle, and one pair of Sheep Sheers and one Heckle. All the above articles I Will and allow to be delivered before any division of any part of my Estate shall be made.

I Will and allow that whatever Property I got by my second Wife to go to her daughter Rebecca Johnston.

Peter Kuster/Kester was born about 1755, son of Ludwig and Eva Christina (Antoni) Kuster. Peter married Catherine Schneider. Catherine was born 1755-1774. Catherine died about 1807 or before. Peter married Eva Schneider, sister of Catherine.

They lived in Lehigh Township (now County) of Northampton County, Pennsylvania. Peter paid federal taxes in Northampton County in 1785, 1786, and 1788. By 1786, Peter owned 100 acres of land. Also, that year he was described as a tavern keeper.

Conrad Kister/Kiester was born 11 June 1779 (computed from tombstone age) in Northampton County, Pennsylvania, the son of Ludwig and Eva Christina (Antoni) Kister. He married Susanna (surname unknown). Susanna was born about 1774. The family lived in Mount Pleasant Township, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, where Conrad was a tailor. Conrad bought a tract of land called "Partnership" located at Market and S Streets in Mount Pleasant from Clements Burleigh in 1807. This land had been granted to Nathaniel and Joseph (wife Sarah) Marshall (patent recorded at Lancaster), who sold it to Burleigh. He sold this land to Wm. Cherry in 1809 when he bought a lot in Mount Pleasant Town from Wm. Nell/Neel. This land had been patented to Nell in 1788. Conrad was the executor for the estate of Clement Burleigh in 1833. Pennsylvania Villages

Kiester, PA - formerly Hickory Mills, is situated on Slippery Rock Creek southeast of Centreville in Butler County. The location is one of the most beautiful in the county, and the water power inexhaustible. The Kiester mill located here forms one of the most important industries of the township. Recently, the association hired Anita Sickmon of Cheney, Kansas to do additional research on this family, and while we still have not come up with parents for John, we have gained much valuable new information:

John Custer was born 3 March 1838 in Illinois. John apparently had a sister, Mary, who was born about 1836 in Indiana. IA is an early designation for Indiana and is only found on the 1850 census. IA was later used for Iowa, and Ind. for Indiana. John and Mary Custer are found on the 1850 Federal Census for Wells Township, Appanoos County, Iowa living with Jonas Purkepie. Mary Custer married 29 January 1855 John Williams in Putnam County, Missouri. John married 19 January 1858 Adaline Shawver in Putnam County, Missouri. Adaline was born May 1842 in Missouri. They lived in Putnam County, Missouri. Sometime after 1860 they moved to Nebraska, and then moved to Chautauqua County, Kansas by 1863. John was a farmer. Adaline died 13 December 1904 and is buried in Cloverdale Cemetery.

John Custer passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Amanda Dorset of Tonkawa, Okla, aged 83 years 11 months and 19 days. Mr. Custer was among the oldest sttlers of Cana Valley, taking the claim now owned by Tom Archer in the year 1870, and living there until the death of his wife several years ago. Since that time he has made his home among his children. Those now, living are Mrs. Amanda Dorsett of Tonkawa, Okla., John Custer of Tonkawa, Harvey Custer of Pauls Valley, Okla., Dora Pierce of Los Angeles, Cal., addie Downs of Burhl Idaho, Hiram Custer of [blank]line and Stella Snyder of Grenola. Three children died when young. Mr. Custer was known as a good law-abiding citizen and a good neighbor.

The remains were brought to Grenola Friday morning and the funeral services were held at the Christian Church, conducted by Mrs. Yates at 10:30, after which the body was laid to rest in the Cloverdale Cemetery by the side of his wife.

One theory as to the parents of John Custer is that Morgan County, Indiana Marriage Records, 1822-1835\ lists Thomas Hicklin & Sarah Custer married 3 Sep 1835 and Conrad Custer & Juliann Purkepile married 16 Dec 1835. This Sarah Custer was the daughter of Conrad Custer (1785- 1875), [P.1.1.2.1.6], and it is suspected that Conrad was also his son. A Conrad Custer appears in 1840 census in Fulton County, Ill (age 20-30) with some children.

Interesting Research!!

During our research on the above family, information was found on the family of Andrew Jackson Caster (Heini Gerster 5\3\1-4-4, who also lived in Grenola, Chautauqua County, KS at one time. He was known as Jack Caster, and we were researching John Custer (MISC John\Custer.II\0), who could be easily confused with him. In the Chautauqua County, KS history, information was found on descendants of Jasper Newton Custer (Paulus 1-1\5-2-6-8). The history of Elk County, KS (the next county over) yielded Sheridan and E. D. Custer, who absconded with county funds, while serving as treasurer of the county. They are brothers, who are supposed to be related to Gen. Custer, but we have not found the connection yet.



UPDATE ON LUDWIG KISTER (1688-1747)

We have had a number of updates, corrections and additions to the article on Ludwig Kister in the March 1995 issue of the News-Caster. First, after looking at the microfilm of the Durstel, France (listed as Bas-Rhin, Germany, in FHLC) church records [FHC film #0729715] at the Family History Center in Salt Lake City, it became quickly evident that the association needed someone who could read Old German Script and German in the Swiss dialect to work on these records. Our association is indeed fortunate to have as a member, Shirley Custer Kaiser, who agreed to work on this problem for us. Shirley descends from five lines of Swiss Kusters from the St. Galleon (sp) area of Switzerland, and is not related to Ludwig Kister. Shirley has sent us her first report:

Durstel 1718 13 November 22nd Trinity

Baptised Georg Christian, son of Johann Ludwig Kisters, the shoemaker of Durstel, and Susanna, born Schneiders of Assweiler, his wife (at midday)

Witnesses: Johann [unable to read], Zinsweiler (?Evangelical Minister), Georg Philip (?Junker) [rest unreadable]

Durstel Maria Catharina Sybilla Kister (Born at Durstel 13 July 1726 in the afternoon) Baptised 14 July 1726 Maria Catharina Sybilla Kister, daughter of Ludwig Kister, Shoemaker and his wife, Maria Susanna, born Schneider of Assweiler
Witnesses: Sybilla Hildebrand, widow of J. H. Hildebrand of Assweiler; Mathias Schneider, brother of the mother; Catharina --intereif, the wife of the cabinetmaker of Durstel [more that is unreadable]
Maria Catharina Sybilla died 18 February 1727 of an illness lasting from 11-18 February; buried 20 February 1727.

Death of Ludwig Kister
Buried 15 July 1747 at Durstel, Ludwig Kister, Shoemaker of Zinswieler and Oberbronn

Son of Johannes Kister and Maria Susanna. Married 1717 with Susanna Schneider of Assweiler, with whom he had five sons and three daughters living, one son and one daughter deceased.

Became ill on the 10th and died in the afternoon of the 12th of July, after 31 hours of illness. 59 years old.

So, we now know the name and baptism date of Ludwig's first child, Georg Christian. We also have learned that he had a daughter, Maria Catharina Sybilla, who died in infancy. There is also another son, who died before his father.

Shirley Custer Kaiser will be sending us more reports on these church records as she works to translate these records. Thank you Shirley for a great job.

George Custard has made a trip to Easton and Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania and has added some new information on Ludwig's children:

The name of the husband of Elizabeth Kister Eichhorn [Ludwig disk\3-13] is Benjamin.

Several items have come to light that indicate that William Custard 1766-1844, George Custard's great-great-great grandfather, is a son of Johann Ludwig Kister/Kuster [Ludwig Kister disk\3]. In some notes by Newton Keister recently submitted to the association by Richard Keister of Kettering, Ohio, it is claimed that "when the reunion is held at Funkhannock, Wyoming County, Pennsylvania, it is called the Kester family reunion, and when the reunion is held in Monroe County, Pennsylvania, it is called the Custard family reunion; same people attending." George Custard would like anyone with knowledge of these family reunions to contact him.

George also found a will for the husband of Susanna Margaretha, Peter Kuntz, in Northampton County, Pennsylvania [Will File No. 1986]. Susanna rendered the right to administer to William Kester, brother-in-law to the deceased, and Christian Hartman. From this George Custard is leaning toward being a descendant of Ludwig.

Sandra Napier of Baltimore, MD has alerted us to the fact that the second wife of Lewis Keister [Ludwig Kister disk\3-3] is not Polly Keyser. She

believes that the Lewis Keister who married Polly Keyser is the son of the Lewis Keister in the article. Although not mentioned in Lewis' will, there is a male child on 1810 and 1820 census in Lewis' home who is not accounted for. He would be the correct age to be the following Lewis Kester/Kiester. While Sandra is not a descendant of this family, she has gathered the following information to use in figuring out about her Lewis Kester.

Lewis Kester/Kiester was born about 1802 in Pennsylvania. He married Mary Keyser in Wayne County, Ohio 27 October 1825. The family was living in Paint Township, Wayne County, Ohio in 1830, but by 1840 had moved to Eagle Township, Hancock County, Indiana. In 1850 the family was living in Newville township, DeKalb County, Indiana. In 1860 Mary and the children were living at Greencastle, Powsheik Township, Jasper County, Iowa. According to Mary's application for her son, Samuel's pension, Lewis had left the family in May 1856. A later letter from a Joseph Harsh, written in 1874, stated that Lewis returned about two years ago (1872), and Mary refused to recognize him as her husband. Mary died 22 September 1885 in Story County, Iowa. Lewis died after 11 August 1892. On that date Lewis was living in Jasper County, Iowa.

TACKLING DIFFICULT GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH PROBLEMS

A Checklist for Overcoming Researcher Deadends

By Patricia St.Clair Ostwald

Member Pat Ostwald has kindly given us permission to reprint this article from the Boulder Genealogical Society Quarterly; Vol. 26 #1; February 1994; p. 32.

Genealogical research is a continuing exercise in problem solving! Each problem solved leads to two new problems - genealogists have to be people who enjoy solving problems.

Analyzing the specific problem:

- **Evaluate** material already gathered.
- Fill out **Ancestry Chart, Family Group Sheet, make a Time Line.**
- Find ancestor's location on a **Map** - be as specific as possible.
- Write a **Position Paper** - state problem, describe what has been done, note sources used.
- **Question** the family story or printed genealogy - you may be stuck because you are proceeding based on error.
- **Formulate a Supposition** - do research with aim to prove or disprove supposition - but don't get hooked into believing it is true without proof.

Some procedures for solving the problem:

- Check dates of **State, County and Township Formation** - be sure you are searching in the right place.
- Do not get hung up on **Boundary Lines** - many settled near current boundary lines - records may be "over the line" in a different county, state (example - reside in Ohio, attend church in PA), or even country (example - Vermont/Canada).
- Use **Census Records** - record each related ancestral family for every census year - study neighbors also.
- Check all possible **Surname Variations** - be imaginative!
- Research before and after the time period in

- Research others of the same surname.
- Research siblings and neighbors of your problem ancestor.
- Study general history of area of interest.
- Survey all possible records of a location. Wills are fine, but probate and court litigation may give much more info. Deeds of others of same name, and neighbors, may give needed clue. Ask for tax records, school records, church records, plat maps, etc. Remember, all courthouse records are not filmed.
- Do not depend on printed abstracts. Often more detail will be found in the original record - do your own interpretation.
- Contact other researchers - for every problem, somewhere in the world there may be someone who knows the answer! How? Read queries in major pubs; advertise your problem - through queries or newspaper ads; read exchange quarterlies and surname lists at libraries; use IGI and Family File of LDS libraries; register your surnames at County Historical or Genealogical societies in areas where ancestors lived - and join the society; write or phone people with your surname in the area of interest.
- Use our excellent resources close to home - BGS-Carnegie; University of Colorado Libraries; LDS - Louisville and Longmont; Federal Center; Denver Public Library.

KESTERS AND CUSTERS INVOLVED IN THE ISSUE OF SLAVERY

Bettie Hill Tolbert has recently submitted her family group sheets on the family and descendants of Robert and Nancy (Kester) MacMahon. This renewed my interest in this family and I began putting together the information I had gathered over the past fifteen years. I first found a copy of the application for Robert's pension in the Indiana State Library, which started my interest in researching this

family to see who Nancy was. When I moved to Wichita, Kansas, I found a genealogist friend who was researching the William Thompson who sold land to the McMahons. She helped me find some of the other sources of information on the family. This family settled in Illinois at a very early date, and there is a unique story to their lives and those of their neighbors.

Nancy Kester/Custer, probably the daughter of Isaac and Susan (Hepon) Custer/Castor, was born about 1778. Placing Nancy as a daughter of Isaac is based purely on the name of her first born son, Isaac Kester McMahan, and also the fact that neighbors of the McMahons came to Illinois from the Wheeling, West Virginia area where Isaac was known to be. The parents of Nancy are not a proven fact.

Nancy married Robert McMahan in St. Clair County, Northwest Territory (now Illinois) in June 1795. Robert was born about 1759 in Virginia, and was probably the son of John and Deborah (Stockton) McMahan. John had died in Augusta County, Virginia in 1784, and his will was proved 19 October of that year. The will named Robert McMahan as executor. John McMahan had served in the Revolutionary War from Augusta County, as did his son, Robert, who in 1780 marched to Guilford Court House in North Carolina, where he fought and was taken prisoner.

After the war Robert moved to Lexington, Kentucky. He then moved to Crab Orchard, Kentucky where he married his first wife, Margaret Clark, 29 June 1785 in Lincoln County, Kentucky. The family moved to New Design (located in present Monroe County, four miles south of Waterloo), Northwest Territory (now Illinois) in 1793. In the same year the Shiloh Methodist Church was organized at Robert McMahan's home. Because the family was apprehensive about Indian attacks, the family lived with the son of James Lemon during 1794. In the same vicinity Peter Casterline and Benjamin Ogle also resided. Thinking that the Indians would not attack during the winter, the McMahons moved back to their property, where on 26 January 1795 Potowatomi Indians attacked the home killing Margaret and four of the children. The Indians took Robert and his daughter, Sally, hostage. Robert escaped the next day, but Sally remained with the Indians until April 1796 when Sukkonok, an

Ottawa chief, returned her in accordance with the terms of the Treaty of Greenville and \$160 worth of trade goods as compensation.

Nancy Kester became Robert's second wife and lived for some years on Rall's Ridge, near Red Bud, Randolph County, Illinois. Robert entered 160 acres of land in Randolph County 6 January 1818. Robert served as Justice of the Peace and Judge of the common Pleas Court. On 3 December 1821 Robert and Nancy of Silver Creek Township, Madison County, Illinois bought 100 acres from William Thompson situate on Canteen Creek in the Township of Ogles. This land (presently located near the intersection of Interstates 70 and 55) is near Troy, Madison County, Illinois where Robert died in 1823. His will made 15 August 1822 lists his wife, Nancy, three youngest sons Nathaniel, Jesse W., and George W.; five daughters, Susanna, Nancy, Emaly, Caroline, and Avaline; sons Isaac, Robert and Thomas and Sally Gaskell and Rebecca Kelley. His executors were to be his friend, John Jarvis and son, Isaac K. McMahon. Witnesses to the will were Joshua Armstrong and Andrew Turner.

Nancy was living in Madison County, Illinois when she applied for a Revolutionary War Widow's Pension (R16357):

Declaration was made in Madison County Illinois January 20, 1858 Personally appeared Nancy McMahon a resident of said county and state age 80 who applied under the Act of July 29, 1848 & February 8, 1853 and states she is the widow of Robert McMahan, deceased, and who served in the Revolution that her husband in 1780 served and left service about 1781 that at time he entered the service he resided in Augusta County, Va and was marched from there to Guilford Court House in state of North Carolina, that he was engaged in battle best of her belief one year or over in the Revolutionary War. That she was married to Robert McMahan in St. Clair County Illinois June 1795; that her name before she married was Nancy Kester, that her said husband died in Madison County, Illinois in 1823.

Evidently, the pension was slow in coming as a letter was sent to Washington 20 March 1860 to the Commissioner of Pensions explaining that the widow was still living and that the application had

been mislaid, but was now being presented, and that affidavets of brothers named Lemon relating the service of her husband had been forwarded to his office some time ago.

What makes this family even more interesting is that it is claimed that James Lemen was supposed to have had a secret compact with Thomas Jefferson to work for the exclusion of slavery in Illinois. Jefferson had already been able to get slavery excluded from the Northwest Territory under the Ordinance of 1783, but wanted to keep slavery out when the area became a state. The idea was to keep several places on the territorial legislature filled with men of like feelings. Edward Coles, the second governor of Illinois, was also a neighbor of Thomas Jefferson. He freed all his slaves, moved to Illinois where he became very vocal on the issue.

Lemen founded the settlement of New Design with that purpose in mind, as he with others founded the New Design Baptist Church. This was the first Baptist Church in Illinois Territory. James Lemen soon became an ordained minister in the Baptist Church, and in 1809 brought the issue of the abolition of slavery to the Illinois Baptist Association. When no stand was taken, Lemen withdrew and formed an antislavery Baptist Church at Cantine Creek, known as Bethel Church. Nancy McMahon and her son, Isaac K., are listed as members of this church. In 1818 Lemen was a delegate to the Illinois Constitutional Convention, and voted for immediate emancipation of all slaves.

Mary Custer born 9 June 1776 in Rockingham County, Virginia, was the daughter of Paul Custer. Mary married 28 August 1794 James Beggs in Rockingham County. James was born 4 April 1768 in Rockingham County, son of Thomas and Sarah (Barnes) Beggs. James was a graduate of William and Mary College. He was a staunch Methodist. James and Mary became members of the Methodist church in 1791. They left Virginia in June 1803 to locate in Kentucky. Later they moved to Clark County, Indiana and bought a 500 acre tract in Clark's Grant. James served several times in the Indiana Territorial and State Legislature. In 1810, he was President of the Council and cast the deciding vote on the slavery issue to make Indiana a free state. He died 13 May 1835 in Clark County, Indiana. Mary died 7 July 1833.

Yes, another Conrad Kester, but this time he is no relation to Conrad of Brook's Gap, VA. He appears to be the grandson of Ludwig Kister of Northampton County, PA and son of Nicholas Kister. George Custard of Denver, CO sent us a group of letters sent to him by Marvin Kester, mostly the work of Barbara J. Midgley from the 1930's and 40's. To quote George Custard's letter, "I am fascinated by the fact that people were working on this genealogy nearly 65 years ago." Marvin Kester of Lehigh, PA also sent information to Charlie Schooler pertaining to these families. We have organized the material into family groups, and hope to be able to do future research on these families.

Conrad Kester, the son of Nicholas Kister, was born between 1780 and 1790 in Pennsylvania. He married Mary Mushelman/Musselman. Mary was born about 1796. Supposedly, she was part Indian. The traditon is that a young woman was taken captive by the Indians in Berks County, PA about 1740-1755. She had a daughter while in captivity, but later escaped back to her home. The name is given as Mary Wolf or Mary Wolf Smith. She is presumed to be buried at Wilkes Barre or Jim Thorpe, PA. Conrad died before 11 June 1838 as his estate is entered into court in Luzerne County at that time. Mary died after 1850.

For this reason they were found murdered on 17 October 1885. According to the newspaper, a posse of forty-five men were organized to catch a couple of itinerants suspected of the crime, but they never did. A \$500 reward goes unclaimed to this day.

Update on Daniel Custard - An English Family

Upon additional research in English records and some probate records, we have been able to add interesting information to our files on Daniel Custard. Of course, in the usual genealogical manner, additional questions about Daniel and his family have been raised. The will of Daniel Custard is a most interesting document and much understanding of family relationships can be inferred by reading who received what in the will.

Daniel Custard was born 1750-1760 in England. Daniel married Martha Saul 13 October 1777 at Gimingham, Norfolk, England. Martha died and was buried 2 October 1783 at Gimingham, Norfolk, England.

Did Daniel then marry Elizabeth Allison? The baptism for Daniel Curstead on 20 March 1785 in Gimingham, Norfolk, England lists "Daniel Curstead, son of Elizabeth Allison" with no father's name given. There are several entries on the same page for "bastard" children, so it does not appear that Daniel was born out of wedlock, although why is he listed under the mother's maiden name with no father's name given?

Daniel married Mary Ward 1 August 1786 in Aylsham, Norfolk, England. Mary was born about 1763. They emigrated to America after the Revolutionary War, settling near Harrisburg, Dauphine

County, Pennsylvania. The original name of the family was Curstead, with some members changing the spelling to Custard and Custead after arriving in America. About 1805 they moved to Mead Township of Crawford County, Pennsylvania. Daniel was a farmer. From 1826-1828, Daniel operated a distillery. Mary died 22 April 1830. She is not listed on the 1830 census. Daniel died 14 March 1839 in Crawford County, Pennsylvania. Daniel dated his Will 14 December 1836, and it was proved 15 January 1841 -- why was the Will probated so late?

In the name of God Amen I Daniel Custard of the Township of Mead in the County of Crawford and State of Pennsylvania being weak and infirm in body but of perfect Sound and discriminating mind memory and understanding blessed be God for the Same and being well conversed of the certainty of death and the uncertainty of the time of my Exit from this transitory abode I do make and declare this as my last will and Testament hereby revoking all former wills by me made & Ratifying and Confirming the following bequests and legacies viz--

In the first place my request is that after my death my body be buried in a decent Christian like manner and that the Expences thereof be paid out of the proceeds of my Estate by my executoer herein after Mentioned.

In the second place my will is that all my Just debts (of any such there should prove to be) shall be paid by my Executor

In the third place I will and bequeath unto my Eldest Son William Custard one dollar to paid him when demanded out of the proceeds of my Estate.

In the fourth place I will and bequeath unto my son Daniel Curstead and to my Daughter Susan -- all my Bank Stock which I hold in the Northwestern Bank of Pennsylvania be the amount of dividend what it may-more or less

In the fifth place I will and bequeath to my Daughter Mary one dollar to be paid to her by my Executor on demand

In the sixth place I will and bequeath unto my Son John Curstead My Still tubs and distilling aperatus which he has already received and disposed of to Richard and Henry Buckston

In the seventh place I will and bequeath to My Son Robert Curstead My Blacksmith tools and a two horse waggon which are in his possession

In the eighth place I will and bequeath unto my Grand son Joseph James Curstead son of James Curstead deceased One dollar to be paid him by my Executors on demand and

In the last place I will and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah intermarried with Richard Buckston my farm and homestead containing about thirty two acres of land together with the buildings and improvements unto thereon erected to her hiers or assigns forever also all the balance of My personal Estate whatsoever-- consisting of Farming utensils Cattle household Furniture Beds Bedding etc.

And I do hereby constitute and appoint My son in law Richard Buckston to be executor of this my last will and Testament In Testimony were of and in the fullfillment of this my last transaction in this busy world of trouble I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourteenth day of December in the year of our Lord AD Eighteen hundred and thirty six

Confirmed. No other records of this William Custard have been found in Washington County.

its name, and there is not the least evidence to indicated, either by record or tradition, that it got its name from any settler. If anyone knows anything different from the above, I would be very glad to learn of it."

While Mr. Turner's conclusion had considerable merit, your present writer has found additional information that may have some bearing on the matter. By a land patent dated March 15, 1744, John Michael Brock obtained 400 acres of land whose location was described as "being in that part of Orange County designed to be called Augusta, on the South Fork of the North River of Shanando above the gap in the mountain." [This 400 acres is just inside the Gap, on both sides of the Shoemaker River (the South Fork of the North River of the Shenandoah). In 1993 Franklin Zirkle, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Brock, and Pat Ritchie toured the area to see if they could determine where the 400 acres lay. This Brock family was probably the nearest landowner to the actual Gap.]

Augusta County was formed in 1745, and the area in question became Rockingham County in 1778. The tract has the shape of a parallelogram and lies on both sides of the river (the exact location was not ascertained by the writer but there is no question that it is in Brock's Gap)...

The 400 acres patented by John Michael Brock (by William Gooch, Royal Governor of the Colony of Virginia) were later sold, using the identical property survey; from Christian Funkhouser and wife, Christianah (Brock) and Henry Brock and wife, Mary, to Jacob Bare, by deed dated February 4th, 1752, recorded in Deed Book 4 at page 185. The deed states in part: "together with all singular the houses, edifices, buildings, orchards, gardens, pastures, commone woods, woodland, waters, watercourses, ..."; also: "said Christian Funkhouser and Henry Brock at ye time of ensiling and delivery of these presents is seized of and in ye premises by these presents granted, bargained and sold with their every rights members and appurtenances of a good pure, perfect and absolute estate of inheritance in fee simple..."; also: "lastly, that the said Christian Funkhouser and Christianah, his wife, and Henry Brock and Mary, his wife ye said land and premises against themselves and their heirs, and against John Pafsor Brock and his heirs...." By deed dated

December 2, 1752, Opaltis Brock conveys his interest in the same 400 acres to Jacob Bare. This deed is recorded in Deed Book 5 at page 192. Both of these deeds were recorded in Augusta County.

The writer was unable to find a will, list of heirs, or settlement of the John Michael Brock estate. His land patent stated that one shilling be paid as Lease Rent each year for three years, and that Brock must be cultivating at least three acres at end of three years or the property would revert back to the King of England.

The patent and deeds referred to above lead this writer to conclude that a Brock owned land and apparently lived in West Gap just prior to the name change; consequently, there is a good possibility that its name may not have been derived from Captain William Brock, but from a local settler.

Conrad, Grandson of Conrad

Karen Glasser of Indianapolis, IN has been working on this family. She is especially interested in Conrad's daughter, Elizabeth, who married a Mr. Miller. Elizabeth had five daughters, four of whom are named Miller, but the fifth used the surname of Custard, and Elizabeth was known in later years as Mrs. Custard/Custer. Did she remarry to a Mr. Custard, and if so to whom?

Conrad Custer/Custard was born in 1742, the son of Arnold and Bridget (Strauder) Custer. Conrad's father died 1759. On 19 November 1760, Conrad, aged 18, chose Abraham Bird as his guardian. Conrad bought 40 acres in Brock's Gap 19 February 1773.

Conrad conveyed the farm of his grandfather, Conrad Custard, to his uncle Paul Custard in the settlement of his grandfather's estate. Under Virginia law, at that time, the oldest son inherited everything. Since Conrad, Sr.'s oldest son, Arnold, was already



dead, Arnold's oldest son, Conrad, legally inherited the farm in Rockingham County, Virginia. However, Grandfather Conrad had given a noncupertive will asking that the land be sold and the money divided. The farm was sold to Paul Custard [Paulus 1-1-5] to settle the estate.

Conrad's younger brother, Arnold, was bound to him 16 August 1774. Conrad served as an Ensign in Company No. 1 of Augusta County, Virginia in 1775 in what is now Nelson County, Kentucky. Conrad married 10 February 1776 Elizabeth Lair. In 1789, Conrad was listed as owning 169 acres in Rockingham County, Virginia. 24 May 1779 on motion of Conrad Custard ordered that the church warden bind out Charity Humble, orphan of Martin Humble to Conrad Custard until she comes of age. Conrad was a Private in Captain Michael Humble's Company of the "Kentucky County" Virginia Militia (commanded by Colonel George Rogers Clark) from 15 July 1780 to 21 August 1780. He was in the expedition against the Shawnees. Conrod received L3.2.6 for killing five old wolves in the 29 November 1780 session of Rockingham County Court. Teter Coutts sold land to Conrod Kester 27 August 1781 in Rockingham County, Va -- also same day the Court ordained Conrod and Paul to appraise the estate of Adam Nelson. 27 March 1786 a deed of bargain & sale from Conrad Kester to John Runyan was acknowledged & ordered recorded in Rockingham County, Virginia. Conrad appeared on the 1787 Personal Property Tax List for Rockingham County, and served on the grand jury 27 March 1789 in Rockingham County, Virginia.

Conrad bought land from the John Hinkson estate in Bourbon County, Ky 14 May 1790 (Bourbon County Deed Book B, pp 34-35 and p 179). [For a discussion of Conrad Custer's home in Bourbon County, see The News-Caster Volume 9 #2, pages 26-27]. 15 June 1791 he was a witness to the will of James Thomas along with Arnold Custer & John Beggs. 12 March 1795 he was a witness to the will of John Wilson. Conrad died in early 1828. His will is dated 10 February 1826, probated March 1828:

In the name of God Amen I Coonrod Custer of the county of Bourbon being of sound mind and disposing memory usual do herby constitute make and ordain this my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all other will or wills by me made and First I wish and — and that all my just debts be paid and when life

is with me nor more I desire that my body be buried decently and without pomp.

Secondly To Jane Custer the daughter of my son William Custer deceased I give of my estate when sold twenty dollars

Thirdly To Arnold Custer Junr Robert Custer and Harriet Heirs of George Custer deceased I give each ten dollars

Fourthly To my daughter Clary Custer beside her equal share I give the following articles Viz my clock and case a cow and a Loom
Fifthly The Beds and bedding heretofore given to my Daughters by my will beloved wife I desire to remain as she appointed
Sixthly To Comfort Miller the Daughter of my daughter Elizabeth I give one bed and bedding and one cow

Seventh To my daughter Elizabeth I give my dining Table And to those who may nurse and take care of me now while in my helpless state i desire my Escecutors to pay some reasonable sum

Eighth I desire further that each of my Heirs hereafter named shall bear an equal proportion of any costs which may hereafter arise on my land and my Escecutors are hereby (ninth) directed to make the reduction equally

Tenth After proceeding bequests I desire and direct that all the remaining property of which I may die possessed shall be sold at a reasonalbe credit by my Escecutors to the highest bidder and all the proceeds thereof to be equally divided between my following named Children

Viz Arnold Custer, Coonrod Custer, Elizabeth Custer, Bridget Wilson, Sally Clark, Deborah Wilson, Clara Pugh, Margaret Sharp and to John Custer, Lavisa Custer, Joseph Custer and Salinda Custer the four children of my son Jacob Custer together I make one heir with the others that is that they the Heirs of Jacob Custer deceased shall receive together one equal share of my estate. And Lastly I appoint my son in Law William Wilson and Joseph Shawhan Senr Executors of this my last will and testament In witness whereof I have hereunto to set my hand and seal this tenth day of February 1826

Elizabeth Custer was born about 1788 in Rockingham County, Virginia, the daughter of Conrad and Elizabeth (Lair) Custer. She married a Mr. Miller. Did she then marry a Mr. Custard? She came from Harrison County, Kentucky to Perry Township, Marion County, Indiana in the fall of 1828 with her son-in-law, David Hinkston. They purchased in Section 16 from John Belger. Elizabeth died 7 March 1885 and is buried in the Fowler-Mundy Cemetery, Perry Township, Marion County, Indiana.

Dead at the age of 98

Mrs. Elizabeth Custer died at the age of 98 at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Myers, in Perry Township, on Friday, and was buried yesterday. She was born in Virginia in 1787, and moved to this county in 1828, and has since lived here. Her husband had been dead over sixty years and two widowed daughters - aged 74 and 72 survive her. Mrs. Custer lived just long enough to have been under the protection of every administration, including the present, but for only two days, since the republic was founded. Even in her advanced age she devoted much of her time to charitable purpose, and was particularly active in caring for the sick of her neighborhood.

I give and bequeath to George Clark one suit of ----- clothes I give and bequeath to Jacob Clark, one pair of portmanteau and surtout coat and after my burriel and funeral expenses is paid I give the balance if any of the monies of the Estate of father to Ephraim Clark my brother in law whom I hereby appoint sole executor of this my last Will and testament hereby revoking all other by me made in witness where of I have hereunto set my hand and seal this eighth day of November in the year of Our Lord One thousand and eight hundred and twenty nine

Conrad Custer Jr was born about 1780-1785 in Virginia, son of Conrad and Elizabeth (Lair) Custer. Conrad married 18 July 1806 Leanna Thomas at Lair, Kentucky. Leanna was born about 1793 in Virginia, daughter of William Thomas of Bourbon County, Kentucky. Conrad served in the Kentucky military War of 1812 as a Private in Ravenscratt's Company. He enlisted in early part of September 1813 for 90 days, and served for two to three weeks after which he paid a John Berry to substitute for him for the remainder of the service. They lived in Harrison County, Kentucky. They located in Fayette County, Indiana in the winter of 1827, where Leanna had inherited some land from her father, William Thomas:



Adam Keister was born 13 March 1782 in Virginia -- was he a son of Christopher Kester? He lived in Strasburg, Virginia and started the first pottery of that community. Adam married 10 March 1806 Margaret Bushong, daughter of John Bushong of Woodstock, Virginia. Margaret died 17 December 1808. Adam married 28 May 1809 Sarah Hite, daughter of Alexander Hite. Isaac Keister was born 24 December 1806 in Strasburg, Virginia, son of Adam and Margaret (Bushong) Keister. Isaac was christened 16 October 1807 by Reverend Christian Streit at St Paul's Lutheran Church -- his parents, Adam Kuster and Margaretha, were sponsors. Isaac learned the potter's trade in his father's potter shop. In 1827, Isaac left Strasburg to settle in Columbiana, Ohio, where he remained for the rest of his life. Isaac established a pottery shop in Columbiana. Isaac married 29 April

1828 Magdalena Altdoeffer. Magdalena was born 30 April 1804. Isaac was listed 1852 as a member of Jerusalem Lutheran Church in Columbiana. Magdalena died 4 July 1870, aged 66 years, 2 months and 5 days. Isaac died 28 October 1887 in Columbiana, Ohio. They were buried at the Columbiana Cemetery.

Abraham Custer/Custard was born 1750/60, probably the son of Johann George Kuster. Abraham married Mary (surname unknown). Abraham purchased 1794-1796 157 1/2 acres on Looney's Creek in Botetourt County, Virginia. Abraham sold this land to Johannes Custer in 1798 when he moved to Franklin County, Virginia. Abraham had bought 1797 a lot in Howrytown in Fincastle, Virginia. Abraham paid taxes for Johannes at one time. Abraham bought 71 3/4 acres on Blackwater Branch in Franklin County during 1805-1815. His will was dated 27 July 1819, and recorded 3 January 1820 in Franklin County, Virginia:

In the name of God Amen, I, Abraham Custard of the county of Franklin and State of Virginia, being low in health though of sound memory. I make this my last will and Testament, first I commit my Soul to God who gave it & my body to the dust from whence it came, hoping to be buried in a decent and chistianally manner, and as for my worldly Goods after paying my burial expence and all my Just debts. I give and bequeath my wife, Mary Custard the whole of my personal Estate which we now possess as long as she livith, I also give to my son Henry my gun and big coat. I leave and desire George Bowsman and My son Isaac Custard to act and be my Executors of my Estate and the sd Executors after my death is to sell the Land at the hiaist bidder and to pay my just debts and the remainder to remain in the est. hands as long as my wife Mary livith the Executors are bound to let my wife Mary have money at anytime she being in need of same, as long as there is any in their hands of the E. money, and if there is any remaining after her death to be divided among all my children, which is these, my son Isaac Custard and Hannah and Jacob and David, Elizabeth, Joseph, Abraham, Henry, In witness hereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty seventh day of July in the year of our Lord one Thousand eight hundred and nineteen.

Joseph Custer/Custerd/Custard was born about 1784 in Frederick County, Virginia, possible son of Abraham and Mary Custer. He married 15 January 1811 Martha Claig/Cleage in Botetourt County, Virginia at the home of Reverend Samuel Mitchell, a Methodist minister. Martha was born about 1786.

Joseph served in the War of 1812 as a private and a millwright in the 10th US Infantry under Colonel James Wellborn. He enlisted 18 August 1813 at Rocky Mount, Virginia under Captain Josiah Wood. He also served in Captain Robert Mitchell's Company. He was discharged 31 May 1815 at Buffalo (NY?). He stood five feet ten and a half inches tall, had a dark complexion, dark eyes and black hair.

About 1829 they moved to Henry County, Virginia. Joseph died 3 June 1839 in Henry County, Virginia. After Joseph's death, their former neighbors, David and Matilda Werts, went to Henry County and removed Martha and child back to Roanoke County. Peter Kefauver (b1799) and Catherine Nidy/Niely (b1791) were also near neighbors of Martha Custard. Catherine had loaned her shawl to Martha to wear at her wedding. Other people certifying the marriage of Joseph and Martha were Sarah Kefauver, Louisa Edington, Jane Walker, and Matilda Went. There is a bounty land certificate number 82-160-1812 for 160 acres issued 8 August 1815. This was later patented. In 1854, Martha is listed as living in Franklin County, Virginia and in 1871 in Big Lick, Roanoke County, Virginia. Martha was issued a pension for Joseph's service in the War of 1812. Sparrel F Simmons and Isaac Custer of Roanoke County, Virginia witnessed 29 March 1871 the Declaration for Pension. Martha died prior to 18 February 1885.

It would appear from DAR records that John served in the Artillery during the Revolutionary War. John Kester was taxed in 1778 in Kingwood Twp of Hunterdon County, New Jersey as owning 100 acres, 2 horses, 2 cows. In Jan/Feb 1780, he owned 1 horse and 4 pigs. In 1784, the family transferred from Hardwick MM in New Jersey to Deep River MM in Guilford County, North Carolina. According to DAR records, John died 1806 near

That the personal estate of the said intestate is insufficient for the payment of his debts as the account and statement herewith ----- appears. And that the said intestate died seized in his domain as of fee, of and in a certain tract of land situate in the township aforesaid, adjoining Penns Creek and land of Brooks, George Kister and land belonging to the heirs of John Williams deed containing one hundred and two acres and five eighths of an acre more or less-- And a certain other tract of unimproved land situate in the twonship & County aforesaid adjoining lands of Michael Gearhart, George Kister & heirs of John Williams containing forty six acres more or less -- And a certain other tract of Mountain land adjoining his other land containing one hundred and three acres and thirty two perches -- Your petitioner therefore humbly prays your honorus to grant him an order to make sale of the said ----- and tracts of land aforesaid with the spportunences, for the payment of debts and maintenance and education of minor children of the said intestate -- and he will pray etc. A statement exhibiting a true account of the Inventory and appraisal of the intestates personal ----- and also a Just and true account of all the intestates debts come to his knowledge

The land was sold to Daniel Shively and Smuel Kister for the sum of One thousand and five dollars. The final distribution was made at the May 1847 Court.

John Kister was born about 1765-1770. John located in Hartley Township of Union County, Pa about 1792. John bought land on the south side of Penn's Creek (Union County Deed Book E, p 323) 10 January 1792 from Jacob Graef. John married about 1792/3 Catherine Bub, daughter of George and Maria Margaret (Landberger) Bub. George Bub died 1825 and left a will (Book A, p 268, file #1826-1W) that shows Catherine to be his daughter:

[in part] In the name of God Amen I Georg Bupp of Hartley township, Union County of Pennsylvania being weak in body but of sound mind memory and understanding do make and publish this instrument of writing as my last will and Testament as follows viz

First I Commend my soul into the hands of Almyty God who gave it and my body to the earth is to buried in a Christian like manner at the direction of my Executor hereinafter named.

Secondly concerning my worldly estate which consists of Bonds & Notes & other amounts and personal property. It is my will and do order that all notes & bonds stay on interest till the death of my beloved wife Maria Margaret ... personal property shall remain in her possession so long as she lives and after her death shall be sold by my Executor and the money arising from such take and all other outstanding monies then as soon as convenient be collected and divided share alike among all my children Except my daughter Catherine intermarried with John Kister who shall have

thirty dollars less than either of my other children, and lastly I appoint my beloved son George Bupp, Jr to be the Executor of this my last will and testament giving and granting him all my powers and authority in and about the same. In Witness thereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the 12th day of October 1825, signed sealed published...

[will was proven 7 January 1826]

Catherine was born 12 January 1776. John Kister was an appraiser and heir of the estate. In the final report for the estate, John signs his name in German script as Johannes Kuster. John and Catherine lived in Hartley Township along Penn's Creek. John lived near the covered bridge which spanned Penn's Creek south of Glen Iron, an area that is now on the railroad line. John operated the Berlin Iron Works. "John Kieser erected the Berlin Iron Works at Glen Iron in Hartly Township. He added a furnace when the combined industry merited its business title. The furnace was in blast until 1832, but the forge continued and finally became the property of the late John T. Church, who operated it until his death in 1937. It was the last charcoal iron furnace in this part of Pennsylvania." Probably he was a blacksmith and sawmill operator as well. There are three additional land deeds: (1) William Green to John Kister 1826, patent 17740 for 120 acres; (2) Andrew Albright to John through Henry 22 Nov 1811 and 2 June 1818 for 55 acres; and (3) State of Pa to John Kister 21 May 1827 for 257 acres (patent issued after John's death an estate was paid the balance due). John died in October of 1826. His will was dated 10 October 1826, and was probated 25 October 1826:

In the Name of God amen, I John Kister of Hartley Township, Union County and State of Pennsylvania being weak in body but of Sound mind memory and understanding do make publish and declare this Instrument of Writing to be my last will and testament as follows viz -- first I Commend my Immortal Soul into the hands of Almighty God who Gave it & my body to the earth to be buried in a Christian like manner -- & what Concerns my worldly Estate of whatsoever kind or nature the Same may be I Give and bequeath it as follows --

first It is my will and do order that Immediately after my death or as Soon as Convenient thereafter all my Effects (Except what is hereinafter Excepted) Shall be Sold at public Sale by my Executor hereinafter named and the money thereof arising and all other money due to and Coming to me from Sundry person Shall be by my Executor Collected, and all my Just debts and funeral Expences paid, and the overplus of the money Shall be Equally divided into two Equal parts and the one half thereof to be paid over to my wife

Catherine which She is to have to use and do with to the best advantage for her Support, and the the Support of my Minor Children, while they are under age, and The Said Catherine to possess the Same during her Natural life. She is also at liberty to purchase Land for the Same If She Chooses and after her death the Same to be divided among my Children. She the Said Catherine Shall also have all the grain in Mow in the Barn, all Corn, Buckwheat potatoes and other Summer Crops of grain kind, also all the hogs now pent up for fattening or yet to pen up this Season also a beef now fattening. She Shall also have one Cow & one heifer, and fodder for the Same this winter. She Shall also have three beds and bedding, also three bedsteads and Cords also one stove & pipe now in the room, also the Bureau in the room also three Chairs also one looking glass, and her Choice of the books, also all the wool and as much of the unbroken flax as She wants, as much of the kitchen furniture as She Chooses to keep, also the Copper Kettle and one Iron pot, and all my Clothes, My Said Wife Catherine Shall have to use for my minor Children. She Shall also have the one third of all grain now Sown in my Name this Season --

Secondly, I give and bequeath unto my Son John in lieu of his Services done to me over his age one mare and one Colt (his Choice out of those now on the farm and fodder for the Same this winter.

Thirdly, It is my will and do order that the other half of money in the first Clause mentioned and not appropriated Shall be equally divided when Collected to and among Six of my Children in Equal Shares, to Jacob, Benjamin, John, Catherine, Sophia and Lydia, and no Interest to be paid by any of my Children for money which they Receive out of my Estate, and after my wifes death, the five minor Children to wit Levi, Daniel, Solomon, Julian & Moses Shall each receive the Same amount as one of the others before mentioned and the residue if any to be equally divided among the children above named, and to my Son in law Welsh Irwine I Give and bequeath all the receipts notes Bonds or other Obligations for which I went his bail and had to pay the Same.

And Lastly I nominate and appoint my trusty son John to be the Executor of this my last will and Testament, giving and granting him full power to execute a deed or deeds unto Davis Beaver for the farm which he purchased of me and also to Execute this will according to law. In Witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal the 10th day of October 1826.

John Kister, Jr was named executor. Five of the children were minors. One of the witnesses to the will was a Henry Keister who seems not to be a son of John. Catherine moved in 1844 to Tipton, Cedar County, Iowa to live with her son, Solomon, and died there 1 July 1844, buried at Mt Zion Cemetery in Rochester Township, Cedar County, Iowa.

Jacob Kister/Kester was born 15 October 1796 in Union County, Pa, son of John and Catherine (Bub) Kister. Jacob married Salome Wise/Weiss 1 August 1824 in the Womelesdorf Church, Womelesdorf, Berks County, Pennsylvania. Salome was born 8 February 1803 (computed from tombstone) in Union County, Pennsylvania, the sister of Henry Wise who married Sophia Kester. They lived in Pennsylvania for several years. Jacob participated in logging operations and rode the log booms down the Susquehanna River. Later, in a Conestoga wagon, they set out for Ohio. A daughter became ill and died on the move west, and they buried her in the wild country on the way. They settled in Crawford County, Ohio. Salome had \$300 left from her dowry, which they used to buy land at \$3 per acre. Their farm was called "Whetstone" and they built a log cabin. As other settlers arrived, Jacob and Henry Phillips were trustees for a log church which was begun in 1833 and dedicated in 1844. When a new church building was needed, Jacob and Lewis Heinlein and Henry Lowmiller were chosen trustees, and the new church building was dedicated Christmas Day 1859. One of the ministers of the church was George Weiss/Wise, brother of Salome. Jacob bought the first organ for the Whetstone Church. The organist was paid \$1 each Sunday. Jacob drove each Sunday to pick up the organist, and drove her home after the service, a distance of 16 miles. Salome died 5 October 1866, aged 63 years, 7 months and 27 days. Jacob died 3 August 1878. They were buried at Whetstone Church Cemetery, Crawford County, Ohio.

According to family tradition, the Keister family came to America from Switzerland, prior to the Revolutionary War. The father of Jacob (first name unknown) and possibly an uncle, fought under George Washington. The father of Jacob was supposed to have accompanied General Washington across the Delaware River that Christmas Eve when the Hessians were surprised and captured during a banquet. General Washington gave his poorly clad, cold and hungry soldiers permission to finish the banquet. The warmth, the hot food, and the relaxation made his soldiers so sleepy they couldn't stay awake to do sentry duty, so General Washington walked sentry duty, himself, the rest of the night.

Great-grandmother Saloma Weiss, apparently lived in or near Berks or ___?___ in Pennsylvania. She with several friends, came to Valley Forge to watch the soldiers drill, and there Jacob Kester was Drill Master. A romance blossomed, and later they were married in the Womelesdorf Church. A number

of years ago several of our relatives went to Womeledorf and nearby places to find records of the family, or at least the name of the father of Jacob, but fire had completely destroyed the old church records.

The Jacob Keister evidently lived in Pennsylvania for several years after their marriage. For some time Jacob was interested in logging operations, and would ride the log booms down the Susquahenna River. When they finally started for Ohio, in a Conestoga wagon, they had a child. My uncle told me, that his grandmother, Saloma, told him that it nearly broke her heart, when their child became ill on the trail, and died, and they had to bury the child beside this wild and lonely trail and go on.

On reaching the "Plains" in Crawford County, Ohio, they decided to settle here. The land was excellent and Great-grandmother Saloma, had \$300 of "hard money" left from her dowry. They bought land for \$3 and acres and built a loghouse. The deed for the land showing transfer from the Government was signed by President Jackson and is still in the family. "Hard Money" was very scarce at that time and this represented a large amount. This original farm is still in the hands of their descendants - Rollin Lowmiller and family. This section of land and some adjoining territory was called "Whetstone" and named from the creek flowing thru it.

As more settlers came into this region, they decided to build a log church. They chose Jacob Kester and Henry Phillips as Trustees. This church was commenced in 1833 and dedicated in 1844. Fifteen years later they found it necessary to enlarge and repair the building: instead it was decided to build a new building, and the Trustees chosen for this building were Jacob Kester, J Lewis Heinlen, and Henry Lowmiller. This building was finished and dedicated on Christmas Day of 1859. (I have in my possession the original memo of this transaction.) Today a modern, small country church stands on the same location, and across the road is a cemetery where many of our relatives are buried.

There was no regular minister in the early days and the church was served by a "circuit rider." The name describes the ministers. There were no bridges; no real roads; they rode horse-back; carried their Bibles in their saddlebags, and when they forded streams or swam them, they held their Bibles over their heads to keep them dry. They stopped

where-ever a few people gathered, to perform marriages, baptise babies and preach sermons.

Great-grandmother's brother, George Wise, was such a minister. He established several small congregations along the east coast of the US, and then part of the time made circuits thru Pennsylvania and Ohio. One time during a rainy spell, he arrived at his sister's house late on Saturday evening, completely soaked, only his Bible had he managed to keep dry. His sister, our Great-grandmother, Saloma, put him to bed and spent almost all night drying his clothes and pressing his suit, so that he could appear on Sunday morning at the Whetstone church. By the way, all our people were Reformed, Bible believing and God fearing people, who lived their beliefs - we come from generations of Christian people.

Jacob Kester bought the first organ the Whetstone Church had, and since none of the members could play it, every Sunday morning he hitched up a horse and buggy and drove into Bucyrus, which was a village 7 or 8 miles away, and brought out to Whetstone a woman who could play the hymns for the services. Of course he also drove her home, and paid her \$1 a Sunday out of his own pocket.

Jacob Kester was very active all his life and was especially known for his swordmanship and fencing. The speed of his running and his walking ability were well known. He used this method on his visits back east.

The spelling of the two names changed thru the years. The earliest records show Keister and Weiss, which became Kester and Wise.

Benjamin Kister/Keister was born 13 August 1799 in Hartley Township of Union County, Pennsylvania, son of John and Catherine (Bub) Kister. Benjamin married 1821 Catherine Caderman/Katherman. Catherine was born 1797, daughter of Jacob and Magdalena (Frederick)

Katherman, granddaughter of David Katherman, and great granddaughter of Jacob Katherman, very early settler of Tulpehoccen in Berks County, Pennsylvania. Benjamin worked in a sawmill and then learned the blacksmith trade.

In the spring of 1844 Benjamin and Catherine moved in covered wagons to Green County, Wisconsin where they spent the first winter at the home of French Lake. That winter Benjamin laid a claim to 160 acres in Sections 28, 29, 32, and 33 of Rock Grove Township in Stephenson County, Illinois, and entered part of the land on 20 February 1845 and part on 3 June 1846. He cut logs that winter which he sawed for lumber for his house and barn. He built his home and barn during the summer of 1845 in Section 32 which were still standing in 1949. Benjamin was a farmer. Benjamin was a member of the German Reformed Church and Catherine was a member of the Lutheran Church. Benjamin and Catherine had ten children. Catherine died 1850 and was buried at Beam Chapel Cemetery north of Rock Grove, Stephenson County, Illinois.

Benjamin married Sarah Gingrich around 1852, who died in several years. Benjamin married Hannah (Lawver) Sausman, widow of Joseph Sausman, 4 October 1859. His daughter-in-law Nancy (who married son Silas) was a daughter of Hannah. Benjamin and Hannah lived about two miles north of Kent on a farm inherited by Hannah. Later Hannah sold this farm and they lived in Rock Grove and then moved to Jonesboro, Illinois for several years in the late 1860s. Later they moved back to Lena, Illinois living at the northeast corner of Washington and Provost Streets across from the schoolhouse. Hannah's son Cy Sausman lived with them part of the time. Benjamin rented his farm to his son David, and sold the farm about 1868. Benjamin wore chin and side whiskers and was a tall and well-built man. Benjamin died 21 February 1872 in Lena, Stephenson County, Illinois, and was buried at the Yellow Creek Cemetery in Kent Township.

To all to whom these presents shall come: Juliann Long of the County of Muscatine, and State of Iowa, Guardian of Mary Long, Jacob Long, Eliza Long, Malvina Ellen Long, and Sarah Catherine Long, minors, and children of said Juliann Long by her husband William Long, late of said County, deceased, sends greetings: Whereas, by an order of the County Court, within and for the County of Muscatine, State of Iowa, duly made and entered at a regular term of said court holden at the City of Muscatine, in the County & State aforesaid, on the first Monday in the month of March in the year of eighteen hundred and fifty seven (the same being the second day of March AD 1857) the said Juliann Long, in her capacity of guardian as aforesaid, was empowered and licensed to sell at private sale (subject to the approval of the said Court) the whole of the said minors interest in the real estate hereinafter described, being an estate in fee simple in said real estate, subject only to the right of dower therein of the said Juliann Long, and whereas, the said Juliann Long having given bonds as required by law. Now, know ye, that I the said Juliann Long, in my capacity as guardian as aforesaid, by virtue of the license aforesaid, and in consideration of the sum of two thousand eight hundred and eighty dollars to me in hand paid by David Peck, the receipt where of is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained, and sold, and do by these presents, grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said David Peck, his heirs and assigns forever, the certain tract of parcel of land, lying and being situate in the County of Muscatine, and State of Iowa, and bounded and described as follows: the southeast quarter of the northwest quarter, and the east half of the southwest quarter, and the northwest quarter of the south east quarter, of section Twenty (20) in Township Seventy Six (76) Range Three (3) West, containing one hundred and sixty acres of land, be the same more or less, with the appurtenances thereunto belonging. To have and to hold the above granted premises unto the said David Peck, his heirs and assigns forever. And I, the said Juliann Long, for myself, my heirs, an executors, do covenant with the said David Peck, his heirs and assigns, that said premises are free and clear from all incumbrance; that in making the said sale, I have in all things observed the rules and directions of the law; and that I will, and my heirs shall, warrant and defend the above granted premises to the said David Peck, his

heirs and assigns, against the lawful claims of the said minors and their heirs, and all persons claiming the same, by, through, or under them, or either of them, and against the lawful claims of all persons whomsoever. And I the said Juliann Long, do hereby relinquish all my right of dower in and to the above described and granted premises. In testimony whereof the said Juliann Long hath hereunto set her hand and seal, this seventeenth day of March AD 1857.

George Kester, Sr. (1777-1838)

George Kester, Sr. appears to connect to some of the Union County, PA Keisters and Kisters. He had 14 children, but we have been able to find only 10 of them.

George Kester, Sr was born about 1777/8 in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, son of John George Kester. Computation based on tombstone information indicates birthdate of 8 May 1777. Several researchers have listed his birth date as 14 December 1778 based on a baptismal record at Trinity Lutheran Church, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. These records have been recently translated and published by Debra D. Smith and Frederick S. Weiser. The baptismal record has been translated thus: Georg [no surname given] born December 14, 1778, bapt. December 20, 1778; parent: Catharina Dodtin and Georg Kiesler, Hessian; sponsors: Michael Miller and wife Barbara. Further in the book is the following entry made in 1780 by G. H. E. Muhlenberg, pastor: "Transgressions against the sixth commandment" Cath. Dodtin and Georg K sler, woman impregnated. Is this the baptismal record of this George Kester?

George's father operated an inn in Pennsylvania (possibly Berks County). George had a brother, Peter. George married Julia Ann Wolfe about 1797. About 1800, he settled near Dayton in Montgomery County, Ohio. George bought 160 acres 27 March 1805 from the U S Government in German Township of Montgomery County, Ohio. He served in the War of 1812 for a period of six months in Capt Michael Gunkel's Company. George and Julia Ann had fourteen children. About 1815, Julia Ann died from a rose cancer on her face. George married second Elizabeth Hetzlar 25 May 1815 in Montgomery County, Ohio. In February 1837, George settled in German Township of Darke County, Ohio -- on the southwest quarter of section 14 on a part of which a portion of Palestine has since been built.

While on a fox hunt in March 1838, he was kicked by a horse which shattered the lower bone of his leg. George died from this injury on 10 May 1838, and was buried at Palestine Cemetery, Palestine (Liberty Township of Darke County), Ohio. His

tombstone gives his age as 61 years, 2 days, and commemorates his service in the War of 1812. There were 14 children. George's will names his wife, Elizabeth, and directs that after her death, his estate is to be equally divided among his sons and daughters, but they are not named. His son, George, and son-in-law, Michael Eby, are named as executors:

I, George Kester of the County of Dark in the State of Ohio do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to Say, first it is my will that my funeral expences and all my just Debts be fully paid, Second I give devise and bequeath to my beloved wife Elizabeth Kester the privilege of living on the plantation on which I now live being the Southwest quarter of Section fourteen Township eleven Range one east and to have the Rent or So much thereof as will Keep her well and Comfortable during her natural life, Third I do devise and will all the Residue of my Estate Real and personal to be sold by my executors and Equally divided amongst my Sons and Daughters Share and Share alike and also the aforementioned plantation that I now live on after the Decese of my wife to be Sold and divided in the aforesaid manner, and lastly I hereby constitute and appoint my Son George Kester and my Son-in-law Michael Eby to be the executors of this my last will and testament Revoking and annulling all former wills by me made and ratifying and confming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto Set my Seal this 11th day of April AD 1838.

in the pan which would block the hole to the barrel. The pin would have been used to keep the hole open and free of powder residue, then stored under the cheekrest with the two wire loops.

Mr. Bumbaugh explained that later model guns used cheaper regular run maple for the stocks, but the gunsmiths would stripe it to make it look like more expensive wood. Also in a later period there were factories for making the individual gun parts. For instance, there were barrel factories, stock factories, and lock factories. By that time guns were less expensive and were not the one of a kind piece that gunsmiths made in earlier times.

From this quick study of guns and gunsmiths in Rockingham County it appears that our ancestors were in step with the events and technology of the rest of the area. The handmade Custer gun was originally made in the style of the time with flintlock firing mechanism. When the percussion cap became available, the gun was modified to use the newer technology. From Wells Heavner's letter to sell his gunsmithing tools, it seems that the availability of mass manufactured weapons had affected his business about the same time that gunsmiths in the United States were phasing out their individualized operations.



Joshua Wells Custer (1796-1859)

Recently, Nadine Marie Wilcox Maerk of Longview, Texas sent us some material on Joshua Wells Custer and his descendants. Nadine did a lot of research to find the graves of Joshua and Olive (Dow) Custer. She found that Olive did not have a gravestone, and that Joshua's had been overturned. At her own expense, she had new gravestones erected to mark the graves of her great, great grandparents. The following association files have been updated to include Nadine's research and some interesting information from the association research files.

Joshua Wells Custer, Sr was born January 1796 in Rockingham County, Va, son of Jacob and Margaret (Lair) Custer. Joshua located at Bennet's Run, near Bergton, Rockingham County, Va where he courted Margaret "Peggy" Smith. Margaret was born 1794, daughter of Frederick and Christina (Sunafrank) Smith. Margaret was soon with child, but Joshua refused to marry her. Margaret named the child after Joshua. In Court 6 October 1823, Joshua admitted to being the father of her child, and the Court directed that he pay Margaret \$20 a year until \$140 was paid. Soon after, Joshua Sr left the area.

Joshua married Olive Smith Dow 23 October 1834 in Clark County, Indiana. Olive was born 22 November 1813 in Plainfield, Connecticut, the daughter of Elisha and Thankful (Davis) Dow. They settled in Scott County, Indiana and later in Oregon Township of Clark County, Indiana. Joshua died 8 August 1859 in Clark County, Indiana, and is buried in the cemetery at New Market. Olive died 19 February 1899, and is also buried in the cemetery at New Market, Indiana

Margaret Smith married Andrew May 18 July 1825. Andrew was a widower and had married Margaret's cousin, Polly Smith. Margaret and Andrew had Polly Ann May, Christina May (born about 1832) and Washington May (born about 1832). Margaret lived to be 102 years old.

Joshua "Josh" Wells Custer, Jr was born 15 May 1823 in Virginia, son of Johua Wells Custer, Sr and Margaret Smith. Joshua was raised by his mother, Margaret (Smith) May and her husband, Andrew May. Joshua courted about 1848 Sarah Freed, daughter of John Freed, who lived along the German River near Criders, Rockingham County, Virginia. Soon after, Joshua moved from Bennet's Run to Rader Camp Hollow. Joshua and Sarah were married 28 April 1856 by Reverend John Pope. Sarah "Sally" Freed was born 27 January 1830, daughter of John and Lucy (Billier/Beeler) Freed/Freet. Joshua bought 70 acres along German River 4 November 1856 from his father-in-law for \$25, and Joshua and family lived here until 1883. Joshua was a Private in Company I, 4th Regiment of the 7th Brigade of Virginia Militia in 1861-1862. Joshua was a farmer and a very good gunsmith. In 1882, Joshua bought land in Hopkins Gap. In 1883, he had sold his place on German River and moved to the new home near White Hall School, south of Fulks Run. In 1897, Joshua and Sarah purchased 120 acres near Tunis, Rockingham County, Virginia. In 1905, Joshua fell into the cold creek water and contracted pneumonia. Sarah was also sick at the time, and she died 14 October 1905. Joshua lingered and died 3 March 1906. Both were buried at the United Brethren Church Cemetery at Mt Carmel near Fulks Run, Rockingham County, Virginia.

Noble Victor Custer was born 26 December 1838 in Clark County, Indiana, son of Joshua W and Olive (Smith) Custer. Noble married Mary Elizabeth Ferguson 31 August 1859 in Scott County, Indiana. Mary was born 18 April 1840 in Indiana. They were living in Clark County, Indiana in 1860. Nobel served in the 144th Indiana Infantry during the Civil War. After the war the family spent two years in Indiana before moving to Carrol County, Missouri, where they lived for two years. Elisha Dow Custer was born 23 December 1840 in Indiana, the son of Joshua Wells and Olive (Dow) Custer. During the Civil War he served in the 23rd Indiana Infantry. He mustered in at New Albany, Indiana as a private 27 July 1861. After the Civil War Dow studied medicine at the University of Kentucky at Louisville. From 1866 to 1869 he was in the lumber business and "reading medicine" in Yazoo City, Mississippi and Charlestown, Indiana. He married Pauline Lutz 11 April 1871 in Clark County, Indiana. Pauline was born in January 1843 in Indiana. In 1871 he traveled in Kansas, trading at different points. He settled in Peru, Howard County (now Chautauqua County), Kansas, where he practiced medicine and pharmacy until 1874. He also owned a saw mill. In 1874 and 1875 he traveled extensively in Washington Territory, Colorado, Utah Territory, Wyoming, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Indiana. From 1875 to 1878 he lived in Hutsonville, Crawford County, Illinois. From 1878 to 1881 he lived in Marshall, Clark County, Illinois. In 1881 and 1882 he lived in Des Moines, Polk County, Iowa, Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana and Columbus, Bartholomew County, Indiana. By 1886 he was living near Peru, Chautauqua County, Kansas. Dow died in Indiana 29 March 1888 in Chautauqua County, Kansas. Pauline died 16 April 1918 at Columbus, Bartholomew County, Indiana.

If one wonders why Dow lived so many places during his life, the following from an Elk County, Kansas history may explain:

The Boston War was the most dramatic thing that happened in Howard County (Howard County was composed of what is now Elk and Chautauqua Counties). In 1874 the county seat was determined to be Elk Falls, which changed it from Peru. The people of Boston, Kansas claimed that they had won the fight for the county seat, and literally arrived and hauled off the records, furniture and county property to Boston. About this time, E. D. Custer, the County Treasurer, who was a Peru man, was building his own little private empire at the expense of the county tax-payer. He was using the money to finance his cattle herd. When the scandal broke, Custer maintained that he was not guilty and that it was the Bostonians who had taken \$25,000 from his office during the raid. However, his story was proven untrue and he was arrested. But some of his good county official friends helped him slip away.

Although \$2,000 was offered for his return, he was never brought back.

Jasper married Hester A. Murrah 10 September 1863 in Clark County, Indiana. Hester was born 5 July 1844 in Clark County, Indiana, the daughter of Robert and Matilda (Carrol) Murrah. Jasper was a farmer.

Alonzo Sharon Custer was born about 1849 in Clark County, Indiana, the son of Joshua Wells and Olive (Dow) Custer. Sharon was living in Elk Falls, Howard County, Kansas in 1874. He married Henrietta Johnson about 1875. Henrietta was born about 1858 in Indiana. They lived in Marysville, Clark County, Indiana, where Sharon was a merchant. Sharon died in 1896. According to the family, he was known as Sheridan Custer. Perhaps the census taker didn't hear the correct name when he was taking the 1880 census, or perhaps, he simply changed his name. Further proof that his name was Sheridan is found in the following from an Elk County, Kansas newspaper:

The Custer Incident

Sheridan Custer, 19 years old, was arrested and held for complicity after his brother E. D. Custer, the county treasurer, had "absconded" with the county funds. As there was no jail in Elk Falls, Sheridan was held in an upstairs room of the Sheriff's home. He was taken fresh water and books to read. "His imprisonment lasted forty days and the time hung

heavily on his hands. There was an extra bedstead stored in the room he occupied. It was the kind with slats. He must have been a boy of some education for he literally covered those slats with verses, quotations, sketches, and old songs; and sometimes wrote on the walls."

The historical significance of this incident is that E. D. and Sheridan Custer were both relatives of General George Armstrong Custer, the Indian fighter of Black Hills fame. Nothing was proven against Sheridan Custer, and the fate of E. D. Custer has not come to light, but his antics as county treasurer were mentioned in the January 29, 1914 issue of the Howard Courant.

Conrad Custer's Deed to His Grandson

The following is a copy of the deed outlining Conrad Custer's instructions for his farm upon his death. Remember that this is not the original deed as deeds were copied into books at the courthouse. Under Virginia law at that time (1772), upon death all property was left to the oldest son. This is the law of primogeniture, and was in force to keep land from being divided up into small pieces..

Mary was born about 1836 in Pennsylvania. They lived in Stephenson County, Illinois where he was a farmer. After his marriage he rented the "Shous" farm until he saved enough to buy a farm of 110 acres from Ezra B. Gillett in 1867. Uriah and Mary belonged to the United Brethren Church. Uriah was a member of the Whig party. Mary died in 1894. Uriah retired and sold the

farm in 1906. He moved in with his son, William. Uriah died 6 May 1910 in Fairbault County, Minnesota.

Conrad Castor of Hardin Co., KY

Gary Kester of New York City has sent us a copy of the will of Conrad Castor of Hardin County, KY. A copy of the will follows the write-up about Conrad and his family.

Conrad Castor/Kastor was born prior to 1765 in Pennsylvania, son of Isaac Custard/Castor. Conrad had a farm on a branch of Nolynn Creek known as Dutch Fork in Hardin County (now in LaRue County), Kentucky, southeast of Elizabethtown. Conrad was in this area prior to 1783. He and his family used nearby Phillips' Fort as protection against the Indians from time to time. Phillips' Fort was erected 1780 by Phillip Phillips, a surveyor. The fort was torn down 1786 as it was no longer needed by then. Conrad's name appears on tax lists as early as 1785.

A deed recorded by the Kentucky Court of Appeals on 6 August 1801 between Robert Johns and Jacob Larue recites, "...beginning southwest corner of Charles M Thurstons settlement, thence northwest and bounded by Conrad Custer's land..." There was an indenture between Philip Phillips and Susannah Phillips, his wife, and Conrad Kester recorded in Nelson County (Hardin County formed 1793 from Nelson), Kentucky.

Conrad served as ensign 13 June 1801 in the 3rd Regiment and was laid off 10 December 1804 from the 60th Regiment.

Conrad died between 9 November 1828 when he made his will and 2 February 1829 when it was proved in court. He is buried in Pioneer Phillips' Fort Cemetery (this cemetery is located about 1/4 mile north of site of Phillips' Fort). His widow, Sina, died between 1840-1850.

Publishing Tips

by Pat Ritchie

My genealogy friends often ask me what is involved in having a book printed. After publishing seven hardback books and about 25 soft-cover one for myself and for others, I've developed some guidelines for potential authors to consider. Here are some comparisons if you are thinking about publishing.

Self-Publish or Use a Publisher. Most genealogies appeal to a narrow audience, and publishers are reluctant to foot the bill for a small profit book. If you have a genealogy to print, you will probably self-publish, or pay for the printing yourself.

If your book is a general interest book, such as marriages, will abstracts, or census records for a county, a publisher may be interested. Publishers pay to have the book printed, retain the copyright, market and sell the book, and give you royalties for each copy sold. Usually the author will receive some free copies at publication time, a percentage of the book sales (royalties), and the ability to purchase more copies at a discount price. Some publishers specialize in a certain topic, such as Civil War-related books, and if your topic matches their interest, you have a better chance of having them publish your work. For the rest of this article, we will assume you are going to self-publish.

Hardback or Soft Cover. Up-front costs and storage are the considerations here. For a hardback book, you have to order and pay for a specific quantity such as 500 copies. This can run into thousands of dollars depending on how many pages and photos and the size of the page. Then you have to store those heavy books in a dry place until they are sold. The advantages of hardback are a durable, professional-looking product, good reproduction of photographs, and a smaller cost per book than the next option.

To have a much smaller outlay of money up-front, have books copied at the local copy center and bound with plastic spiral GBC binding. A heavier paper like cardstock can be used for the front and back covers, or to make the covers even more durable, clear plastic pages can be used to protect the paper covers. The spiral bindings come in many sizes. The largest book I have printed this way has 350 pages copied front and back which means 175 sheets of paper. The major advantages to this type of soft cover is that you can have a small quantity like 20 copied at a time for an outlay of two hundred dollars or less. When those are sold, you can use the sales money to finance the next batch. Storage of twenty books is not the problem of storing 500 hardbacks. Disadvantages are that each book costs more per copy than a hardback, photos which are photocopied are not as good (unless you pay extra for "half-tones"), and the final product is not as durable.

Printers. Not all printers will print small quantities of hardback books. There are good printers who specialize in "small runs" of books, such as the Mennonite Press who printed *The Descendants of Paulus and Gertrude Kusters*.

Photographs. Include as many as you can. Identify them well. The printer of a hardback book will turn them into "half-tones" during the printing process to make them look like regular photos in the book. In my last hardback book, each photo added about \$10 to the final cost of the project. The extra interest it adds to the book is well worth it.

In a soft-cover book that is photocopied, the photos will not be as sharp unless you pay extra to have them shot as half-tones. The half-tones will add cost to the initial batch of books you have copied, but then you keep them with your originals, and the next batches will not cost extra.

Selling Price. A rule of thumb is to sell the book for two times its cost. Some authors have told me they didn't want people to think they were "making money" off the book. Hogwash! Any genealogist knows book sales may cover the cost of the actual printing but will never come close to covering postage, gasoline, photo copying, and all the other research expenses. Make sure your book price is enough to get back the cost of the printing after half the books are sold.

Postage & Shipping. Before you advertise your book, find out how much padded envelopes cost and what book rate postage is for a book the size of yours. It will probably cost between \$4-5 for envelope & postage. Charge extra to cover this cost if you mail books.

Sales Tax. If your state charges sales tax, find out if you need to collect sales tax. If so, you will probably need a sales tax number and forms from your state sales tax office. My city insisted the first year that I was a business and needed a business license, too. The next year I was able to explain that it was just a genealogy book & not a for-profit one, and they didn't make me get a business license. Rules in your town may be different.

Advertising. As you gather information for your book, keep a list of everyone who expresses interest in having a copy. As soon as you determine your price & availability date, let those people know by phone, letter or postal post card (cheapest way - postcards from the Post Office are only 20 cents each, and that includes the stamp). Tell the Historical Societies in the areas your family lived. See if the local paper will do an article on the new book (smaller papers are usually interested in a feature article). Take out a small ad in the local paper. Ask your genealogy friends if they can tell their friends about the book. *The Genealogical Helper* will write a review about your book if you send them a complimentary copy. (Then be prepared for historical societies to ask you for free copies). There are other printing options available, but this summary may be enough to help a beginning author take the plunge into the printing business.



The Mystery of Will Castor

New member Iola Homan has sent us a photograph of "Will Castor," which was identified by her mother. The photo is believed to be that of William L. Castor, son of Sampson and Mary Elizabeth (Whitehead) Castor, who apparently died quite young. He is not listed as a child in his father's obituary [see a copy of the obituary sent by Jack K. Castor in *The News-Caster*, Vol. XIV, #2; June 1996]. Iola is trying to link her ancestors to the Castors, and find out why this photo was among the family photos. She knows that her grandparents were neighbors to the Sampson Castors, but are they related in some way? Her grandparents are Hugh Isaac McReynolds who married Amanda Roland in 1882; Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Castor were the witnesses. Let us know if you have any additional information.

Sampson L Castor was born 2 September 1846 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania., son of Lewis Henry and Ellen (Mauck) Castor. Sampson married Mary Elizabeth Whitehead 21 February 1870 Aledo, Mercer County, Illinois. Mary Elizabeth was born in September 1850 in Pennsylvania. The family lived in Marston, Illinois for three years and then moved to Oakland, Iowa. In 1891 they moved to Neola, Iowa. Sampson was a blacksmith in 1880. He kept a boardinghouse in 1900. Sampson died 21 February 1904 at Neola, Pottawattamie County, Iowa, and is probably buried in the Belknap Cemetery, as he was on the board of directors. Mary Elizabeth died after 1904.

Is this the same Hendrick Koster who had an estate filed on 30th June 1748 in Albany County, New York? Many of the persons listed on the early London lists ended up in New York.

Did this Hendrick Koster have any descendants? His descendants have not shown up in our files!

The pulpit is the finest piece of furniture within the church. Whereas all of the furniture and interior appointments were handcrafted by local cabinetmakers using native woods, the pulpit, made of European red walnut, was imported at the time of the dedication of the church. Also imported, and on display in the Brick Church, were two pewter Communion services (one dating to 1748), a pewter Baptismal laver, two pewter offering plates, and a German Bible published iii 1748.

The offering bags displayed on the east wall of the church were also used in the 18th century. Although Pastor Muhlenberg hoped to keep the Lutheran Church neutral in the Revolutionary War, some of the members enlisted in Washington's army. The pastor's eldest son, John Peter, also served, rising to high command and honor. During the 1777 campaign in Pennsylvania, Augustus Church became a barracks for Pennsylvania militia between the battles of Brandywine and Germantown. Veterans of the Revolutionary Army are buried in the cemetery, the most distinguished being General John Peter Muhlenberg.

The first half of the first century ended in sorrow with the death and burial of Pastor Henry Muhlenberg in 1787. The foundations he laid, however, bore a sturdy and thriving congregation. In 1814 the exterior of the church was covered with plaster to halt the deterioration of the exterior and interior walls. Some of the interior wood surfaces were then painted; and a stove, chimney, and wooden floor. were installed to give warmth for the winter months where only straw and heated stones had sufficed heretofore. A permanent parsonage was built in 1836, and, renovated and modernized, is still in use today.



Old Trappe The Church

Elizabeth J. Custer of Creston, Iowa recently visited The Old Trappe Church where Nicholas Kuster (Paulus 1-4) was baptized as an adult in 1745, and where he and his wife, Susannah are buried in unmarked graves. The family of Nicholas Kuster appear often in the journals of the Rev. Muhlenberg. Elizabeth sent us a brochure about the history of the church, which is reproduced in part here.

A small backwoods settlement developed near a tavern on the trail from the Perkiomen Creek on the frontier in 1717. As more and more families settled in clearings in the forest, the community adopted the name of Providence. Religious services were few and far between, especially for Lutherans, since the nearest congregation was that founded by the Falkner brothers at the Swamp, twelve miles west of Providence.

It was not until 1729, with the arrival of John Caspar Stoeber, Jr., that Lutheran religious services were held in the community. By 1730 Stoeber organized a congregation that was loaned a barn by one of its deacons for the worship services. Stoeber, not being a regularly ordained pastor, performed the act for himself in the presence of the Providence congregation about the year 1732. He remained in Providence for a few years and finally moved west to

the country about Lancaster there to organize other congregations under the Augsburg Confession.

The Providence Lutherans were left to the doubtful spiritual care of whatever self-styled pastor ventured onto the frontiers. A series of misfits fastened on to them for whatever fees could be collected for ministerial acts. Considerably discouraged, with congregational morale at low ebb, the deacons joined the Falkner Swamp and Philadelphia Lutherans in a call to Europe for a regularly ordained pastor. After a series of disappointing episodes, the call carried into the hands of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg during the summer of 1741. He had been preparing for the Bengal Mission in India, but was persuaded by his mentor at the Halle Institutions, Augustus Herman Francke, to accept the call from Pennsylvania. Fifteen months passed before Pastor Muhlenberg reached his congregations. He preached in the barn to the Providence congregation on December 12, 1742. Since the congregation was extremely anxious to build a church, early in January, 1743, they began hauling stones to the building site. Working with a will, the congregation erected the structure through the spring and summer months and held the first service in the unfurnished interior on September 12, 1743. The building was completed and dedicated on October 6, 1745, at which time the Dedication Stone was placed over the west portico. The congregation organized formally, adopting the name "Augustus Lutheran Church" in honor of Augustus Francke.

Pastor Muhlenberg moved to Providence with his bride, Anna Maria Weiser, in May, 1745, to a house he had built for her which still remains standing, greatly altered, a few hundred yards east of the church. Eight of their children were born in this house, all of whom were baptized in Augustus Church.

By 1752 the interior of the church building was completed as it appears today with the erection of the east gallery and the installation of a pipe organ. The organ was secured through the efforts of Gottlieb Mittelburger, who came to Providence in 1751 to be the schoolmaster. There was gradually added to his duties the responsibilities of organist, choirmaster, and sexton of the church. The school where he and his successors taught is commemorated by the stone model of the third schoolhouse, erected on the original site on the front lawn of the church.

Nicholas Custard/Kester was born 5 February 1827 in Pennsylvania, the son of Jacob and Elizabeth (Shook) Custard. Nicholas died 3 June 1900 and is buried in the Trucksville Cemetery, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania. Nicholas filed a will naming all his children except Millard. Catharina died after 1900 and is probably buried at the Trucksville Cemetery, also.

In the 1930's descendants of this family held family reunions in Stroudsburg and Tunkhannock, Pennsylvania area. Wilbur appears as president of the reunions and his brother, C. Norman, hosted the 1939 reunion.



New Connection to William Custard (1766-1844)

George Custard of Denver, CO has been working for years to discover the ancestors and descendants of his William Custard of Northampton County, PA. Some time ago some notes of Newton Keister came into the association archives. The notes say that William Custer came to Monroe County, PA prior to 1810, and the family has descendants who hold yearly reunions. The reunions alternate between Monroe County and is called the Custard Family Reunion, and Tunkhannock in Wyoming County and is called the Kester Family Reunion. This past spring George Custard went to Tunkhannock found several of the newspaper articles about the reunions held in the 1930's. As a result of this research he was able to tie Nicholas Custard/Kester (1827-1900) to his father Jacob Custard (1794-1845) and his grandfather, William Custard.

William Custard was born 22 November 1766. William married about 1791 Margaret Sterner. Margaret was the daughter of Nicholas Sterner. William married second Margaret (Hoenshield) Shook, widow of Abraham Shook. Margaret was born about 1779. Margaret's children were George Shook, and perhaps Elizabeth Shook, wife of Jacob Custard. Margaret was born 9 May 1777, daughter of J George Hoenshield. William conveyed land to his son, Adam Custard, 21 May 1838 in contemplation of his death, and directs Adam to make payments to William's other children, and then to Margaret's children. William died 13 September 1844. Margaret died 10 September 1858.



In the last issue we started to publish the latest information on Noah Castor and children. In this issue we continue with Noah's grandchildren, which will be concluded in the June issue.

John H Castor born 22 October 1810 in Armstrong County, Pennsylvania, son of Nathan and Freelove (Castor) Castor. He was raised in Armstrong County, Pennsylvania, and rode horseback to Hamilton County, Indiana, arriving there 1 February 1834 to buy government land which was then selling at \$1.25 per acre. He married 11 February 1834 Sarah Beatty, daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth (Cascadden) Beatty. The Beattys came from Ireland to Pennsylvania. Sarah was born 31 March 1814 in Butler County, Pennsylvania. The Beattys later moved to Holmes County, Ohio, where John met Sarah and became engaged. John bought the northeast quarter of section 27 in January 1837. John finally acquired 625 acres in Hamilton County, Indiana. Tradition is that John buried thousands of dollars about 1850, but this has never been found. John organized the Union Methodist Church which was 3 1/2 miles northeast of Noblesville, Indiana. At the time of John's death, he owned about 1500 acres of farmland which was distributed to his children. Wade received the 240 acre home farm. John died 1 January 1883. His will was proved in court 11 January 1883:

State of Indiana Hamilton County

In the name of the Benevolent Father of all Amen I John Castor of the age of seventy years. Being of sound mind and disposing memory do hereby make and publish this my last will and testament hereby making void all other wills or codicils by me at any time made

Item 1 I direct that after my decease that my funeral shall be conducted in manner according to my work and station in life

Item 2 I direct that all my just debts shall be paid out of my estate

Item 3 I give and bequeath all my estate both real and personal to my wife Sarah Caster

Item 4 I further devise that after the decease of my wife that all the money and property that may be on hands her decease shall be equally divided among all of my heirs to share and shall alike the following heirs W H Caster, S P Castor Margaret Simmermon, J M Castor Freelove Crull, Nancy Sylvester, Sarah McKinzey, W P Castor, all to be all to be equal as tenants in common

Item 5 I desire that after my decease that Earl Beatty may still have a home in my family. I hereby appoint Sarah Caster my wife and William H. Castor as my executors of this my last will and testament giving them full power to sue and be sued, to collect and pay out in accordance with this my last will and testament and I further direct that my executors shall not be required give or execute bond but that they have full, authority to administer on my estate without bond. Given under my hand and seal this 17th day of March 1881 Witness names his signature in own presence our signature in his presence

Update on Uriah Castor and Rachel Gwin Children of Noah Castor (1764-1829)

In the last issue of *The News-Caster*, the entries on the internet site of Michigan Death Records were published. Among the entries was one for Uriah Castor born in Ohio, who died in Branch County, Michigan on 10 December 1876. This entry set "the wheels a'rollin," so to say. It just so happened that Bernie Clark and I had been working on our mutual line of Ruth Castor (another daughter of Noah), who married Datus Ensign Studley. We had tracked the father of Datus Studley to Branch County, Michigan from Richland County, Ohio. Bernie had found a Studley descendant on the internet, and Merlene Black of Battle Creek, Michigan had helped us round out the Studley family.

Quickly checking the 1860 and 1870 census for Branch County, Michigan, I found the following entries:

on her next research trip. Sally did this and e-mailed me the information. In the mean time I mentioned to Merlene Black about my findings and she sent copies of the pages from the book on the Sherwood Cemetery in Branch County, Michigan. From this book the following is found:

You will note many discrepancies in the above information. While the death dates of Rachel (Castor) Gwin vary, it is proven that she is the daughter of Noah and Rebecca Castor of Richland County, Ohio. One must remember that reading grave stones is difficult at best, and that the old stones made of limestone have just washed clean with the acid rain problem. On the death entry from the state the date of death can not be in 1877, as entered, as the date of the record is before the date of death.

Figuring the birth date of Rachel from the two sources produces the following birth dates: from her gravestone, 19 February 1802 and from the state death record 4 August 1804. Using census records, it appear that the 1802 date is more accurate.

With the records of Uriah, the first problem is that his name was misread on the Sherwood Cemetery reading. This is understandable for the reasons listed above. His birth date is given as 6 June 1803. However, using census records he is much more likely born in 1797 or 1798, which is what the state death record figures out to. The records also point out that Uriah had a second wife, Fedelia or Fidilla, had first married a Mr. Davis.

My mother told me an interesting fact about Michigan vital records, as her birth date was entered incorrectly. In the country, a person came around once a year and asked if there had been any births or deaths, and then recorded what the informant remembered. Since this was done months after the event, the margin of error increased immensely and was only as reliable as the person giving the information remembered.

While more information needs to be found on these two families, just locating where they moved to and died is an important step in the research process.

Update on Isaac Kester of Arkansas

In the September 1998 issue of *The Newscaster*, there was an article about Isaac Kester and his descendants based on the information sent to us by Gary Kester of New York City. Since then Jean White has found two articles on this Kester family and has done some additional research. She also found two people on the internet working on this same family. We still have a lot of work to do, but at least we now know a lot of the names of the members of these families. Hopefully, some of our members can help us out with some of this research.

Isaac Kester born 1770-1780 in either Tennessee or Kentucky, according to his children on later census. He is first found on a petition in the St. Genevieve District 88, Louisiana Territory in 1806. He is found on the tax list of Lawrence County, AR in 1816. He served on a jury in 1817 in that county. (Another marriage was recorded on the same day by the same Justice of the Peace; Sally Kester married Joel Perryman 21 June

1833 Lawrence County, AR. Who is she?) He married second Nancy Gray 26 September 1833 in Lawrence County, Arkansas.

Isaac or Isaac, Jr. bought two parcels of land from the federal government in 1834 and 1835. This land combined was about 80 acres and lay in Sections 18 and 20, Township 19-N, Range 4-W, which is now in Sharp County, Arkansas. Isaac Kester, Sr. appears on the Lawrence County, Arkansas tax lists from 1828 to 1837. He died in 1843 in Lawrence County, Arkansas. On 16 December 1843 Lemuel Beasley was appointed administrator. Nancy died 4 October 1845 in Lawrence County. Ferguson Booth was appointed her administrator. Her heirs were listed as: Sarah Jan Winstead, William Gray, Riley Gray, Nelson Gray and (?) (should be Josiah) Kester; all residing on Spring River, Lawrence County, Arkansas.

Who is Emma Kester?

Another Kester came to light during the research on Isaac Kester. Emma Kester is listed in both the 1900 and 1910 census of Pawnee County, Oklahoma. She was born in 1893 in Oklahoma and is listed as a full blooded Pawnee Indian. Her Indian name was sou-re-ker. She is listed as a step-daughter on each census, but it does not appear that she is living with the same family on both enumerations. In 1900 she is living with Chief Spotted Horse and his wife, Marry. They had been married sixteen years and had a son born in 1893, the exact year of Emma Kester's birth. In 1910 Emma is living with Webster Fox and his wife, Nannie. They have a son Guy Fox born in 1905 living with them. Webster Fox says that he has been married five times and his wife three times. They have been married to each other for only three years. Nannie has had five children and three are still living. Mary Sherman age 60, listed as the step mother of Webster Fox, is living with them. Do any of our members have further information on this Emma Kester?



Tobias Loses; Paulus Wins

In the March 1997 [Vol. XV, Number 1] issue of *The News-Caster* appeared, "A Case for Removing Most of the Descendants of Tobias Custer (1710-1765)." More research has been done on this problem and the following conclusion was reached, that indeed Tobias Custer was not the father of John Custer of Somerset County, Pennsylvania. Instead this John Custer is son of Paul Custer (Paulus 1-5), and had been previously listed in the association notes as "having little or no evidence of his birth."

Several years ago I corresponded with a lady in Johnstown, Pennsylvania, who insisted that the John Custer, who we said was a son of Tobias Custer, was a son of Paul Custer of the Paulus line. I never could get her to send me any documentation on this, so I finally gave up in frustration trying to prove the issue.

But the problem kept bothering me; there was something wrong with the association records on this family. The biggest factor to me was the fact that John's descendants all belonged to the Church of the Brethren, while none of the other descendants of Tobias appeared to belong to this church. Meanwhile, George Custer (Paulus 1-5-4) who lived in the same area of Pennsylvania as John Custer, also belonged to the Church of the Brethren. George was an elder in this church. George's second wife, Catherine Leatherman, was the daughter of one of the leaders in this church.

The connection to the Brethren Church is also brought out by observing the estate of John Custer. An inquisition taken "at the house of John Custard" on 13 May 1813 was sworn to by six of his friends and neighbors, while being affirmed by six of his other friends and neighbors. When one finds affirmations to a legal document, one can assume that the person who made the affirmation is a member of the Mennonite, Quaker, Amish or Brethren Church. The members of these denominations do not swear to anything.

This was reconfirmed when I compared notes with John Post, who is retired from the Brethren Press in Elgin, Illinois. He has collected information on the Brethren families of the Johnstown, Pennsylvania area for years and has an immense collection of genealogical information on these families, including the Custers. However, he had no information on the parents of John Custer, only information on John and his descendants. [This collection is currently housed in the West Valley/Sun Cities Genealogical Society Library, Youngtown, AZ]

Integrating the information from John Post and the information from Chester Custer's, *Tobias Custer (ca 1710-1765)* into the association files gave me greater insight into the problem. It was at this time that I wrote the article for *The News-Caster*, "A Case for Removing Most of the Descendants of Tobias Custer (1710-1765)."

When Pat Caster was getting the association web site up and running, she asked me to look the various pages over and make suggestions. One of the web pages linked to our site is managed by Brian Cartwright. You can access this site by going to the association web page at: <http://users.cwnet.com/maverik/castor/index.htm>, and then clicking on "other links." I contacted Brian via his e-mail address at: blcart95@erols.com and asked what he knew about the parents of John Custer.

Brian has several references from old county histories, pertaining to the lineage of John Custer, posted on his web page. There are several references in the *History of Bedford and Somerset Counties* (1906) Lewis Pub. Co.; 3 vols. On page 508; "John Custer, Sr., who came to Somerset county from Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, and had been a Revolutionary soldier, having been present at the Battle of Bunker Hill. John Custer, Sr. was the son of Paul Custer..." On page 507 there is a sketch on John Custer, born 1867, son of William. "The family...was founded in this country by Paul Custer, who came from Holland about 1717 and took up his abode in New York. He was accompanied by his sister, Mary, and the two, after remaining in New York, moved to Philadelphia, where Mary Custer became the wife of Colonel Ball, of that city. Paul Custer subsequently settled in Lancaster county, where he died at an advanced age. His sister, Mrs. Ball, who had been for some years a widow, died before her brother." [author's note: this information has been garbled and the generations shoved together, but there is some truth to this; see below.]

In the *History of Cambria County* by Henry W. Storey; Vol. III (1907) Lewis Pub. Co. on page 353 is a write up on Jacob P. Custer. "Paul Custer, the direct ancestor of Jacob P. Custer, was an English gentleman, but it is not definitely know whether he was born in this country or in England [author's note: it was fashionable to be English in the late 19th century. However, this is pure fiction.] He resided in Pennsylvania about the beginning of the eighteenth century, and married Sarah Martha Ball, daughter of Colonel Ball, of Lancaster, Pennsylvania. [author's note: this is mostly true. For information on this Ball family see: *The Descendants of Paulus and Gertrude Kuster of*

Kaldekirchen and Germantown, Pennsylvania (1991) Jean M. White, editor or *Ball Cousins* (1981) by Margaret Kinsey] Mrs. Custer had a brother — Jonathan— and a sister — Mary --who became the second wife of Augustine Washington, and grandmother of the illustrious George Washington. [author's note: this is pure fiction. The closest George Washington ever got to this family was to order his fire backs for his fireplaces at Mt. Vernon from their iron works.] John Custer, son of Paul and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer, had a son, John.” [author's note: this is true]

Not one of these county histories mentions John Custer as being the son of Tobias. They all say he is the son of Paul and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer. The association file on this Paul Custer lists a son, John, but then goes on to say that there is little or no evidence of this birth. I say there is plenty of evidence. Besides the county histories mentioned above, Ernest Spofford in his *Encyclopedia of Pennsylvania Biography*, page 341, lists the children of Paul and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer as: John, Jonathan, Paul, George and William. *Reading and Berks County, Pennsylvania*, Vol. II (1925) by Cyrus T. Fox; Lewis Pub. Co. on page 17 lists the children of Paul and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer as: John, Jonathan, Paul, George and William. They all agree that there was a John who was the son of Paul and Martha (Ball) Custer.

It is interesting to note that the settlement of the estate of Joseph Ball (subject of two books - *A Pennsylvania Pioneer: Report of the Executive Committee Pt. 1 & 2 of the Ball Estate Association* (1900) by Emmett William Gans and *Ball Cousins* (1981) by Margaret Kinsey) does not mention John Custer as an heir to the estate. It does not mention his brothers Paul Custer or William Custer, either. However, it does mention an additional brother not mentioned in either of the lists above, Nicholas Custer. Perhaps the lawyers searching the missing heirs of Joseph Ball's widow, never found John and William. Having done missing heirs research myself, it would be an easy thing to miss finding a couple of the heirs, especially in the those days with no internet or telephones. The association has been able to build files on all the children of Paul and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer, except Paul.

Brian Cartwright sent one more bit of evidence that John Custer was the son of Paul, or at least not a son of Tobias Custer. He sent a copy of a message received from Judy Tucker of Albion, New York: “My interest in the Custer research was the family story on my dad's side of our connection with General George Armstrong Custer. I had heard that my great grandfather, Jacob Hershberger, used to joke with his family about his wife being related to the famous general. Several of the relatives went to Little Bighorn shortly after the battle to pick up some arrowheads and a minnie ball. These were kept in a clock Jacob gave to his daughter just before he died.

Brian's comments on Judy's message are well taken, “She mentions her great-grandfather talking about being related to General Custer, whose ancestors did live in an adjacent county (Garrett County, MD). Did they jokingly assume because the surname was the same, or were they in contact with the General's relatives who still lived in the area? And the trip to the Little Bighorn, this was no small venture for the late 1870's. I don't think they would have made the trip on a whim.”

A cousin of Judy's, Marji Worsham, wrote: my mother gave me the family lineage; she never did any genealogical research to learn this information. She grew up listening to the stories about her great-grandfather, John Custer (1825-1915 m. Polly Berkey), who had told his great - granddaughter stories about his great-grandfather, Paul Custer, and that the name was spelled Kuster and not Custer. Her lineage as given to her by her mother is: Bertha (Hersberger) Good (1885-1961); Mary “Polly” (Custer) Hershberger (1859-1928); John Custer (1825-1915); Frederick A. Custer (1775-1848); Jonathan Custer (1738-1823); Paul Custer (1720-1783) who married Sarah Martha Ball. She also quotes the book published on the Berkey family as listing Polly Berkey's husband as a cousin of General George Custer.

Marji's mother is absolutely correct with her lineage down to Frederick A. Custer being the son of Jonathan Custer. However, Frederick Custer was the son of John Custer, as clearly stated in the estate settlement of John. No Frederick Custer appears as a son of

Jonathan Custer. There has been some disbelief that there could be a John and a Jonathan in the same family. Having these two names is quite common, especially in Scotch-Irish families. It is a bit unusual for German families to use both John and Jonathan in naming their children. They are two distinct first names, and not a nickname or alternate one to the other. However, the end conclusion is the same, that this lineage stems from Paul Custer and his wife Sarah Martha Ball.

Brian Cartwright has pointed to some of the naming patterns in the family, as a way of sorting out the father of John Custer. Quoting him: "John Sr had sons John, Abraham, Jacob and Frederick. John Jr. has sons Henry, Jacob, Abraham, Philip, Frederick and John. Abraham had Jacob, Abraham, Henry and Emanuel. Jacob had John, Jacob and Samuel. Frederick had Jacob, Frederick, William, John and Michael." According to the naming patterns, John's father should be Jacob or John. The Paulus Küster family has never used the traditional German naming patterns for naming their children. I think this is probably because the Küsters are from the northern part of Germany almost to the Holland boarder. Most of the other German settlers to Pennsylvania came from southern Germany, along the Rhine River.

While no primary source states who the parents of John Custer are, there are numerous secondary sources and family traditions which build the case for his parents being Paul and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer. Here is the association file on John:

John Custer was born about 1731 in Pennsylvania, the son of Paul and Sarah Martha (Ball) Custer. John married Margaret. Is this Margaritha Bleistein who married John Philip Custer 28 November 1752 at Christ Church, Upper Tulpehocken Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania? He was enrolled sometime during 1780-1781 at Private Fifth Class in Captain John Moore's Second Battalion, Lancaster County Militia in which he served at a substitute for Abraham Sebolt. This tour of duty went to Bucks County according to the Muster Roll of the 5th, 6th and 7th Classes dated 1781. During

1780-1783, he enrolled in Captain Wendel Weaver's Seventh Company, Second Battalion, Lancaster County Militia. In 1790, they lived in Franklin County, Pennsylvania in that part of the county which was said to lie outside of the named townships of Fanett, Hamilton, Letterkenny, Montgomery and Peters. In 1790, there were eleven persons in his household. John died in 1812 at Quemahoning Township, Somerset County, Pennsylvania. His will was dated 13 July 1811, and was proved 24 August 1812:

[Will is written in German -- translation]

I, Johannes Kustert, of Strassbache, write this will for the benefit of my housewife, Margretta. Margretta is to have my house and stable as long as she wants it or lives there or can hold it, and any one cow that she wants. Ond bed, one large kettle, one small kettle, one spinning wheel, all kitchen utensils that she brought, one large chest and all that is in it, one dozen pewter spoons. Witness this, my hand an seal this day, July 13, 1811. If she leaves the farm she is to have \$300 in cash, with the above mentioned articles.

His estate papers (#1812) name his wife, Margaret, and the following children: Abraham, Jacob, John, Frederick, Barbara and Catherine:

Witness my hand and seal of office this 24th day of August 1812.

I, Margaret Custer, widow of John Custer, decd late of Quemahoning Township Somerset County, do herby renounce my right to the administration upon the Estate of my said husband & also I acknowledge I have recd from Frederick Custer the administrator with the will annexed & the several articles bequeathed to me by the will of my said husband which

Martha Anna Custer

Kimberly Ann Sanchez, a new member, sent us the following obituary and biographical sketch of her ancestor. Using the information in the articles and the loose files in the archives, a file was constructed on the parents and grandparents of Martha Anna.

Seattle Post Intelligencer - July 23, 1958

Mrs. Mattie Zobrist, 95, State Pioneer, Succumbs

Mrs. Mattie Custer Zobrist, 95, a Washington State pioneer of Acme, Whatcom County, died in the Sedro Woolley Memorial Hospital Monday.

Biography: Born in Indiana; related to General Custer and the pioneer Denny family; came to Park, Whatcom County, as a bride more than 70 years ago. She and husband Fred Zobrist, who died in 1944, established a trading post and pack train at the head of Lake Whatcom in 1886, furnished supplies and transportation to persons from the East who came out to take up timber claims. Later they opened a hotel and a general store at Acme.

Survivors: One daughter: Mrs. Ida Everts, Lake Whatcom four sons: Fred of Park; Herb, Seattle, Paul, Los Angeles; and Ralph Zobrist, San Diego; 17 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren.

Services: Jones Funeral Home, Bellingham, 1p.m. today; burial, Saxon Cemetery, Whatcom County.

Biographical Sketch of Martha Anna Custer written by a family member.

The Fred Zobrist family has to be described as a unique family for the times in which they lived and grew up. Most children didn't get through the eighth grade but went to work on the farm or apprenticed to the grocer, or in the mills, or the woods at an early age, which was hardly into the teens.

Martha Anna Custer was born in Napoleon, Indiana on the 16th day of February 1863. Napoleon was a Swiss settlement. She had a third grade education. Of course, those were the days of the Civil War and the country was in chaos. She told of wanting to go to school and of eventually being hired to work for a Jewish family when she was in her early teens.

Mattie had three brothers, Jacob, Henry and John as well as a cousin Albert, who became the first postmaster of Custer, Washington. Fred Zobrist preempted a timber claim at the head of Lake Whatcom while the Custer Brothers started a store at Blue Canyon. In 1886 Fred went back to Versailles, Indiana and married Martha Anna Custer. Her father gave her \$100.00 as a dowry or wedding present. She said that her new husband used it for their train fare out west. They came back to the south end of Lake Whatcom at Blue Canyon to prove up on his claim in 1891. They established a store, a way station (inn), and a pack train to pack goods and travelers into the south Fork of the Nooksack river valley. Mattie (she didn't like the name Martha) lost one baby due to an accident. She said that she fell in one of the rowboats causing the loss of the baby. Her first born daughter was Ida Magdalene born April 29, 1889. Ida was 15 months old when they were forced to move to Acme due to the fact that J. H. Bloedel was building a railroad from Bellingham to Wickersham to connect with the Northern Pacific Railroad there. The railroad would go through their home and yard disrupting their enterprise. So they packed and went to Acme to settle down in a well used log cabin. Two more daughters were born, Gertrude M. in 1890 and Esther in 1892. Then came the first born son Frederick Jacob, July 31, 1894. He was possibly the

last of the brood to be born in the log cabin as the next we heard of the family was that they were living in the hotel where Mattie, with some help, ran the boarding house and post office. Another son was born, Paul Henry, then Mildred Elizabeth, then two more sons, Herbert and Ralph.

All the children, from their stories, had a happy childhood, although the older girls complained that they had to care for the younger children and new babies as they came along. The family condition improved with the passage of time. A new home was built in 1901 or 2 before the last son, Ralph was born. Mother Zobrist now spent all her time taking care of her house and growing family.

Mattie believed in and wanted education for her children and she spurred them on in that direction. She instilled in them a sense to do better and a pride that they were someone and the Zobrist family was a notch above. All of the children had a better than average education for the times in which they lived. Two girls were teachers, one had a business schooling training. Two of the boys graduated from the University of Washington. Fred, because there was no high school in the area, went with Cousin Hugh Custer to Washington State University to complete his high school courses.

While the association has no file on Mattie's family, the following was put together from the loose notes in the Ripley County, Indiana file:

Casper Custer was born 11 April 1830 in Brienz, Switzerland, the son of John and Margaret Kuster. He emigrated to the United States in 1855 with his parents and settled in Napoleon, Ripley County, Indiana. He married Anna Flick about 1861. Anna was born 17 July 1828 in Brienz, Switzerland. They were members of the German Reformed Church. Casper died 19 February 1914. Anna died 2 May 1895 near Holton, Indiana. They are both buried at Holton, Indiana.

Proofs of the Wife's Maiden Name

Alexander J. Hall of Fairview Village, PA has sent us copies of two wills from Montgomery County, PA that prove the wife's maiden name of two of the descendants of Hermanus Custer. The first will is that of George Shutt, father-in-law of Peter Custer [Paulus 5-1-1-2]. The second will is that of Elizabeth Arp, mother-in-law of William Custer [Paulus 5-1-1-2-4]. Alex writes that there is some confusion as to the name of William's wife, as she is listed as Mary Ann on her tombstone and in this will, while her obituary and the cemetery record lists her as Mary Elizabeth.

Be it Remembered that ²⁰⁹ George Shutt of the township of Berkeomer and Skippack in the County of Montgomery in Pennsylvania German being Sick and Weak in Body but of Sound Disposing mind and Memory and calling to mind the Mortality of my Body and that it is appointed for all Men once to Die Do think fit this nineteenth Day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty Eight to make and Ordain this my last will and Testament the which I do in the following Manner and form that is to Say -

Death called James A Castor rather suddenly last Sunday Morning. While he had been in poor health for some time, nothing serious was anticipated, and he was around the house as usual on Saturday. The deceased was 69 years of age and leaves a wife and grown family to mourn his loss.

The subject of this sketch was one of the best known photographers in this section and his work compared favorably with that produced from the best studios of the larger cities.

Mr Castor came to Collingwood in 1855 as steward on one of the steamers then plying between this port and Chicago and was the first man to start a laundry in Collingwood. After the line was discontinued in 1857 he drifted into several occupations. Fishing occupied his attention for one or two seasons. He then took up plastering and completed several contracts, one of the last being that of the Manitoba House. Early in the seventies he entered the photography business associated with a Mr Davis and afterwards assumed the business himself, conducting it successfully until about a year ago, when he retired in favor of his sons.

The funeral took place on Tuesday, to the Methodist Cemetery.



Rediscovering Elizabeth Custer

George Davis, CAO A member and Trustee, through serendipitous circumstances and some hard work, has rediscovered the grave of Elizabeth Custer. Elizabeth Custer was born about 1788 in Rockingham County, Virginia, the daughter of Conrad and Elizabeth (Lair) Custer.

"An article in today's *Indianapolis Star* regarding cleaning up an old cemetery on the south side of Indy featured a photo of the headstone of Elizabeth Custer. Near the end of the article it mentions that she was born in 1788 and died in 1885 at age 97," wrote George Davis to the Castor-L mail list.

George's message sparked an exchange of emails by subscribers interested in finding out who Elizabeth was and who else might be buried in this old cemetery. This old graveyard is called "The Fowler-Mundy Cemetery". Researchers believe it contains about 15 graves with death dates ranging from 1841 to 1885.

Someone on the Castor-L list asked if anyone local could check the cemetery. George did just that. He reported in another email:

"Well, I went down to the Fowler-Mundy cemetery anticipating that I'd figure out who this Elizabeth Custer was. She died in 1885 at the age of 97 as I said previously. Her headstone reads: "Grandma at Rest - Sacred to the Memory of - Elizabeth Custer - Died March 7, 1885 in the 97th Year of her age." Her side of the stone faces more or less east. On the south side of the stone it reads: "Our Baby - Samuel W. - son of Hezekiah and Rebecca Hinkson - Born Nov. 6, 1850. Died May 18, 1851, aged 6 Mos. and 12 Dy's". From that, I figured that Elizabeth Custer was probably Rebecca's mother."

"I then went to the Indiana State Library on the way home. The 1860 Census for Marion County IN (Perry township) has



Hezekiah Hinkson, age 32, farmer; "Rebeca" Hinkson, age 32; Francis, female, age 7; Catharine, female, age 3; Camefort, female, age 1; and a Wm. Nash (or Nashe?), male, age 19 listed as a farm laborer. All the Hinksons are listed as being born in Indiana. Rebecca's mother would therefore have to have been in Indiana in 1828. So far I have not found Elizabeth Custer of the right age in Indiana. She does show up in the Marion County Indiana, Perry Township census of 1870, where it lists her as age 78, born in Virginia. I then looked for marriage records for Hezekiah Hinkson and a Rebecca Custer. What I found was Hezekiah Hinkson marrying a Rebecca Anne Woodfill in Marion County, IN on Jan 22, 1850, which seems to fit well with Samuel's date of birth, assuming he was their first child. So, now I don't know if Rebecca was previously married, and was Rebecca Custer or if Elizabeth Custer was previously married to a Woodfill."

"In the 1870 census, Elizabeth Custer shows up with a female named Jones, whose first name I am unable to read (starts with an M though) who is listed as 50 years old, housekeeper. She has a 27 year old son Hezekiah and a 24 year old son named John M. Jones. In the same dwelling and family are what I read as Chas. Smith and Susan Smith aged 28 and 19, another 10-year-old female whose name I can not read, but looks like Emma Tacey, and Elizabeth Custer, aged 78. The males are all listed as farm hands, and the women are listed as either housekeeper or "one of family" (Elizabeth and "Emma")."

"I can't remember if I looked in an index of the 1870 census for the Hinksons or not. I expected to find them with Elizabeth and when I didn't I was pretty surprised. The library was fixing to close, and I didn't get a chance to think that I should go back to the indexes. I also got distracted looking for Kisters in the out of state indexes. Next

time I guess. Hey, if it was easy, it wouldn't be so much fun, would it? Most of the other graves around seem to be Fowler's and Mundy's. The cemetery is undergoing restoration, and many of the headstones are damaged or missing. Hopefully we'll know more in the future. Somewhere there is supposed to be a survey of this cemetery done around 1940. I'll try to find a copy."

"Don't you think it is kind of strange that they would put her maiden name on her headstone?"

George then sent the photos to Patricia Caster for the CAO Archives, which are included in this article.

"This one is the infant, Samuel Hinkson's inscription which is on the left (South I think) side of the stone as you read Elizabeth's inscription. There is no "entrance" to the Cemetery but I figured I had driven that far and I was not going home empty-handed. The Cemetery was over-grown for years with brush and

trees, and was surrounded by farmland. It is now in the middle of one of the largest housing additions in Marion County I wonder if I can find out where the cemetery is in relation to the farm that her family operated? I'm wondering if it is on the property line, and two or more families decided to use the area, or if they are all related somehow."

He also sent the following news articles from the *Indianapolis News*, dated March 9, 1885.

"Grandmother Custer, as she was familiarly known, died Saturday, in Perry township,

where she had resided for fifty-six years. She was aged 90."

"Dead at the age of 98

Mrs. Elizabeth Custer died at the age of 98 at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Myers, in Perry Town-

ship, on Friday, and was buried yesterday. She was born in Virginia in 1787, and moved to this county in 1828, and has since lived here. Her husband had been dead over sixty years and two widowed daughters - aged 74 and 72 survive her. Mrs. Custer lived just long enough to have been under the protection of every administration, including the present, but for only two days, since the republic was founded. Even in her advanced age she devoted much of her time to charitable purpose, and was particularly active in caring for the sick of her neighborhood. (Indianapolis News March 9, 1895 (Morning Edition))”

Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, Will Book H.
Page 528: Will of Richard Adams, written Feb. 1,
1747, probated March 24, 1747 In the name of God,
Amen:

I, RICHARD ADAMS, of Providence in the County of Philadelphia, yeoman, being very sick and weak in the Body, but of a Sound Disposing mind and memory, Considering the uncertainty of this Transitory Life and the Certainty of Death, Do make and Ordain this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following (viz)

1. I give and Bequeath to my Eldest Daughters children, SUSANNAH Kistard, late wife of Conrad Kistard, DECEASED the sum of Ten Pounds Lawful Money of Pennsylvania, to be Equally Divided between them, Share and Share alike, to be paid within 12 months after my decease.

2. I give and Bequeath unto my daughter Catherine, Widow of John Morris, the sum of Ten Pounds of like lawful money to be paid by my Executors within Twelve months after my decease.

3. I give and Bequeath unto my Daughter Mary, Widow of Israel Morris, the sum of Ten Pounds of Like Money aforesaid to be paid within Twelve months after my decease.

4. I give and Bequeath unto my daughter Margaret, now Wife of Paul Casselberry, the Sum of Ten Pounds Lawful Money aforesaid to be paid within Twelve Months by my Executors.

5. I give and Bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth, now Wife of Thos. Bull, the sum of Ten Pounds Lawful Money aforesaid to be paid within Twelve Months after my decease by my Executors.

6. I give and Bequeath unto my daughter Ann, the sum of Ten Pounds Lawful Money aforesaid to be paid to her, or her husband Jacob Umstatt by my Executors within Twelve Months after my decease.

7. I give and Bequeath unto my Son Abrams Children the sum of Ten Pounds Lawful Money aforesaid to be paid them or the survivor of them, Equally Share and Share alike (viz) Ann and Abigail, to be paid within Twelve Months after my decease by my Executors.

8. Imprimise: I give and Bequeath and Devise unto my two sons, viz., William and Isaac, the moiety, or half-part, of all the Remainder of my estate after the above Legacies, Debts and funeral Charges is paid, to be equally Divided between them Share and Share alike. That is to say, each one is to have a quarter part to hold to them, their Heirs and Assigns forever.

9. Imprimise: I give, Bequeath and Devise unto my well beloved wife Else and youngest Daughter Hannah the other Moiety, or half-part, of my estate after the aforesaid Debts and Legacies is paid and Discharged as aforesaid to be equally Divided between my said Wife and Daughters Hannah Husband Owen Evans to hold them their Heirs and Assigns for ever, each one quarter part.

10. And Further: It is my will that if Either of my aforesaid two sons William and Isaac shall be able and have a mind to keep my Plantation and Lands situated in the Township aforesaid, containing one hundred and fifty acres, I give, Devise and Bequeath the same to one of them to hold to them, their Heirs and Assigns for Ever. Provided they pay the three parts in four of the value thereof to my other Son that shall not Chuse to keep the said Lands and to my wife and Daughter Hannah or her aforesaid Husband Owen Evans, to each of them a quarter part as aforesaid within two years after my decease, otherwise I order and Impower my Executors, or the survivor of them, to Sell and Convey my Plantation and Lands to the Highest Bidder or for the Best price that can be got for the same, and the Money arising therefrom to be Divided in four Equal parts after my debts and seven first Legacies are paid and discharged aforesaid (viz) one Quarter part to my said Wife, and one to my Daughter Hannah or her Husband Owen Evans, and one to my son William and the other Quarter part to my son Isaac.

11. Lastly, I do make and ordain my aforesaid two sons and my said son-in-law Owen Evans to be Executors of this my Last Will and Testament, Disallowing, Revoking and Disannulling all other former Wills, Legacies and Executors by me in any wise before this time named or bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my Hand and Seal this First Day of February Anno Domini one Thousand seven hundred and forty seven (eight).

Keisters Survive Fort Seybert Massacre

Frederick and Hannah Keister decided to join their friends on the trek down to the Shenandoah Valley to Brock's Gap on April 27, 1758. When they left the Dyer settlement around Fort Seybert, they had no reason to know that this 20 mile walk over the mountains would save their lives and spare them from one of the bloodiest massacres of the French and Indian Wars.

Hannah was the daughter of Roger Dyer, the patriarch of

the settlement in what is now Pendleton County, West Virginia. Roger Dyer, with seven other men and their families, entered the Potomac highland country when he purchased land on November 7, 1747. Frederick Keister married Roger and Hannah Dyer's daughter, Hannah, about 1755 and they made their home within the settlement located around Fort Seybert.

Jacob Seybert built Fort Seybert, on the South Fork of the South Branch of the Potomac, on land he had purchased from Roger Dyer. Fort Seybert, like most of the other small forts, was not an effective deterrent to the Indian attacks. It consisted of a

two story central blockhouse in the middle of a 90-foot diameter stockade. Hogg's Fort, near Brock's Gap, on the eastern side of the mountains, was a similar structure. This fort, along with Fort Upper Tract, and Hogg's Fort, were part of a string of small forts along the western frontier built to protect settlers from the random attacks of the Indians and French during the French and Indian Wars.

France and Britain had been engaged in a series of wars commencing in 1689 with King William's War. The struggle in North America involved control of the fur trade and access to trading routes. While the British had colonized the eastern seaboard, the French had moved inland via the St. Lawrence River.

By the time Britain officially declared war on France in 1756, the fighting had raged in America for two years. After the large French force moving out of Fort Duquesne forced Major George Washington to surrender his small band of less than one hundred men at Fort Necessity, the British sent General Braddock to command the British regulars. The Battle of the Wilderness took place in 1756. Braddock and over half his army of two thousand men were killed. Braddock believed that the French would fight like gentlemen, not engage in the guerilla tactics of frontier.

After Braddock's ignominious defeat, British colonial defenses on the western frontier completely collapsed. Settlers were left to fend for themselves. Washington had been trying to protect the western borders of Virginia with little success.

The House of Burgess', dominated by Tidewater planters, continually kept him shorthanded. They had large plantations with many slaves and feared that the fighting would spread east, encouraging a slave uprising. Thus, the largest numbers of Virginia militiamen were assigned to the eastern part of the colony.

The Linville Creek Baptist Church records for January 1758, near Brock's Gap, contain this desperate entry:

"After this Time, the Spring coming on, the Indian Troubles continued, and all Opportunités of Meetings were taken from us; and not only so, but the whole Neighbourhood forced either to go into Forts or over the Mountains, to escape their Rage, in the month of June following."

"During which time of Troubles, divine Providence seem entirely against us, and the whole Neighbourhood; and some Disorders happened in these troubles amongst our own Members..."¹

Brock's Gap was attacked in 1757 and Washington recorded "three Dutch people, one killed, two prisoners." The settlers were terrified and many fled back over the Blue Ridge, south into the Carolinas or back to Pennsylvania away from these attacks. Contemporaneous accounts tell of so many people fleeing eastward that it was nearly impossible to travel the roads westward into the Valley of Virginia.

The course of the war altered dramatically when William Pitt, King George II, and the Duke of Devonshire resolved the political stalemate that had paralyzed the British government for most of 1757. Pitt gained control of policy and determined that Britain would not engage France in Europe but would concentrate its efforts in the North America. To this end he set about making drastic changes to British policies to both strengthen the military effort and to gain the enthusiastic support of the Colonies. However, Pitt's new strategies did nothing to protect the settlers in the mountains and valleys of Virginia from Indian raids during 1758.

Killbuck, by all accounts a very intelligent and educated Shawnee² chief, led the attack on Fort Seybert in the early morning hours of April 28, 1758. Fog hung low in the river bottom around the fort. Oren Morton tells, in his *History of Pendleton County, West Virginia*, that about 40 people were "forting" at inside the walls. Through deviousness and treachery, he convinced Captain Seybert to open the gates. As soon as the gates were

opened, Killbuck rushed at Seybert, striking him in the mouth with the butt end of his tomahawk. Killbuck's warriors herded the settlers away from the burning fort and divided them into two groups. They proceeded to club and scalp those deemed too weak or otherwise undesirable in front of the chosen captives.

The number of settlers killed at Fort Seybert is uncertain, but usually is given as between 17 and 21. Killbuck or part of his war party, completely destroyed and killed everyone at Fort Upper Tract, a fort about 20 miles from Fort Seybert, on April 27. Washington estimated that the total number of persons lost in both raids to be around 60. Those not killed were taken prisoner and marched into the Ohio country. Hannah Keister's younger brother, James Dyer, escaped and eventually helped his sister Sarah Dyer Hawes escape the Shawnee as well. James' bravery is an integral part of the Fort Seybert tradition.

Frederick Keister and Hannah returned to the Dyer settlement, where she inherited, by will, 427 acres of land from her father. Frederick and Hannah sold this land in 1763 and moved to land Frederick had acquired by patent about 1757 near Brandywine, West Virginia. They made their home here for the rest of their lives. They are buried in the Keister Cemetery, near Brandywine. Part of the village stands on Keister land.


Custards from the Brock's Gap area also came into Pendleton County and Morton includes Arnold, his sons Paul, Conrad, and George and Arnold's daughter Susannah in his *History*.

The Fort Seybert Massacre is part of the lore of Pendleton County and visitors to the county can visit the sites, which are marked by historical markers. The Pendleton County forts are Fort Hinkle, Fort Seybert and Fort Upper Tract. If you can read only one book about the Seven Years War, make certain it is Professor Fred Anderson's *Crucible of War*. This must be close to being the definitive work for this time period, 1754-1766, in North America.

From the CAO Archives: FK.0 Frederick Keister

FK.0 Frederick Keister was born in 1730. It is believed he was born in the Palatinate, and arrived 1737 in Philadelphia with his father, Friederich Kiester, aboard the ship *Virginus Grace*. "Rupp's list of immigrants to the port of Philadelphia includes: 'September 24, 1737, Palatines imported on the ship *Virginus Grace*, *John Bull*, Master, first from Cowes. In all 225: Friederich Kiester' The Pennsylvania Archives records the same: 'List of foreigners imported in the ship *Virginus Grace*, *John Bull*, Master, from Rotterdam. Qualified September 24, 1737: Frederick Kiester.'

Boyd B Stutler and Roybird Cook, both descendants of Frederick Keister, and distinguished historians, authors, and collectors of West Virginia History, were of the opinion that the Friederich Kiester mentioned in both lists of immigrants to Philadelphia, was the father of our Pendleton County Frederick.

Friederich Kiester took the oath of allegiance to the King of England as a colonist, at Philadelphia on the same day he landed, and made a settlement in York County, Pennsylvania. Frederick of Pendleton was naturalized at Staunton, Augusta County, Virginia in 1762, as shown by court records. According to family records, and borne out by the period of his activity, this Frederick was born about 1730, which would make him seven years old at the time of his landing -- too young to be sworn in.

By 1753, he located on the South Branch of the Potomac in Rockingham County, Virginia (now Pendleton County, West Virginia). Court records show that in 1753, Frederick Keister made a survey in the Walnut Bottom of the North Fork. Frederick married 1755 Hannah Dyer. Hannah was born about 1735 in Pennsylvania, daughter of Roger and Hannah (Green) Dyer. Roger and Hannah Dyer migrated from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania to Augusta County, Virginia (now Pendleton County, West Virginia) where Roger purchased land 4 Novmeber 1747. Roger was killed at the Ft. Seybert Massacre 28 April 1758. Hannah received 427 acres of land in Hampshire County from her father's will dated 24 February 1757, which was proved 21 March 1759.

In 1761, Frederick bought 256 acres of land adjoining his holding for #213.33. Frederick bought 67 acres of land 14 April 1761 on a branch of the Potomack adjoining his own land. Frederick received his certificate of oath of allegiance 18 May 1762. Frederick sold 35 acres of Little Walnut Bottom on the mountain between South Forks and South Branch of the Potomack 17 August 1764 to George Fults.

He served as a soldier in the Colonial Wars in the Augusta Militia. He served in the Revolution and qualified as Lieutenant 28 September 1778. He is listed as furnishing supplies in an account dated 29 May 1782.

Pendleton County Records show him as a voter in 1791, 1794 and 1795 -- they also show him on the land tax rolls for the years 1789, 1791, 1792, 1793, 1794, 1795, 1798, 1799, 1800, 1802, 1803 and 1804. Frederick died 1814, and was buried on his homestead in Pendleton County, West Virginia.

"The will of Frederick Keister, dated August 10, 1806, and witnessed by John Davis, Robert Davis, and Henry Puffenberger, was probated at the March court of 1815. He willed that, '...all my just debts and funeral charges be paid...to my dearly beloved wife one Negro wench named Poll, two beds and bedding, two pair bedsteads, one-third of all my movable property...to my beloved sons, Frederick and George Keister all my lands on this side of the river...to my son James Keister all my lands on the side of the river he now lives on by paying 35 pounds...equally divided amongst all my daughters...appoint my wife, Hannah Keister and James Keister executors...'"

Today, the village of Brandywine stands on a part of the Keister farm. The tombstone of his wife, Hannah Dyer Keister, shows she died 181__, the last figure is chipped from the stone. Hannah was still living in 1815, so she died between 1815 and 1820.

1. **James Keister** born 1756; married Elizabeth Jane Davis; died 12 June 1834.
2. **Hannah Keister** born about 1757; married George Hull about 1786; died 1837.

5. **Mary Keister** married Gabriel Kile/Kyle 1797.

6. **Frederick Keister Jr** born 1774; married Anne E Propst 1791, married Malinda Grim or Green/Belinda Gum/Grim 3 June 1851 Highland County, VA; died 1857.

7. **George Keister** born 5 February 1776; married Susannah Peck 18 February 1800, married Mary Ann Jordan 12 October 1843; died 18 July 1854.

8. **Elizabeth Keister** married Henry Hull.

FK.0.01 James Keister

James Keister was born in 1756, son of Frederick and Hannah (Dyer) Keister. James married Elizabeth Jane Davis. James died 12 June 1834. James' will was dated 12 November 1827, and was probated 5 February 1834 (death and probate dates are not consistent). He left to James, Jr a section of the plantation adjoining George Keister's "wash place" on the South Branch, embracing the dwelling house. The balance was to be sold and divided among "my six children; Ruth Hevener, Hannah Hoover, Jane, Mary Findlay, Betsy Hetzel, and James Keister, Jr." James and his wife, Jane; James, Jr; and Henry (grandson) and his wife are buried on the farm of Laban Davis near Brandywine, West Virginia.

1. **James Keister Jr** born 1797; married 14 August 1828 Susan Swadley in Pendleton County, Virginia; died 1849.
2. **Ruth Keister** married 1807 John Hevener.
3. **Hannah Keister** married 1810 George Hoover.

Hannah Keister was born about 1757, daughter of Frederick and Hannah (Dyer) Keister. Hannah married about 1786 George Hull. George was born 15 October 1757 at Cub Run, Rockingham County, Virginia, son of Peter Thomas and Margaret (Deffenbach) Hull of Crab Bottom. George was a Revolutionary War soldier. Hannah died 1837. George died in the fall of 1849 at Anthony's Creek.

Researching in Cowley County, Kansas

So what do you do if you have a day or two to spend in Southern Kansas, Cowley County to be exact? Fortunately for you, there are several excellent collections of interest to the genealogist, and all of them are underutilized and staffed by friendly folk.

First stop, if you are in Winfield on a weekend afternoon, is the Cowley County Museum. This small museum, housed in an old elementary school, is staffed completely by volunteers. Its hours and general character reflect this relaxed, folksy approach. It houses not only treasures illustrative of the history of Cowley County but it has some books and other materials of interest to genealogists. If you are lucky, one of Cowley County's old timers may be working and give you first hand memories and assistance.

Your second stop, since you are in Winfield, should be the Winfield Public Library, located at the corner of Eighth and College. Although the Library's collection is small, it does have books of interest to genealogists, including some census and cemetery records as well as county histories.

If you are searching for a graveyard and perhaps know the name of the person you are looking for, stop at Dawson Company on South Main Street on your way to the Cherokee Strip Museum in Arkansas City. The helpful people at Dawson's will answer questions about cemetery locations and may even have a cemetery

map to help you locate the grave before you drive to the cemetery.

For me, the best collection in Cowley County is located in the Cherokee Strip Land Rush Museum located on Highway 77, just south of Arkansas City on the Kansas-Oklahoma border. Over 110,000 people raced for a piece of the 7 million acres in the Cherokee Strip and Arkansas City was the largest registration point, with over 75,000 eager land seekers and their families moving to southern Cowley County to participate in this extraordinary event. The Museum showcases the history of the Cherokee Strip Land Rush and also houses the collection of the Cowley County Genealogical Society. Although you will have to pay an entrance fee to the museum, you may decide that it is well worth your while.

The genealogical collection includes records of claims filed with the various land offices, tax records, records from the monument works (there are several others besides Dawson), newspapers clipping from many of the extinct small town newspapers, cemetery records, records from funeral homes and more. A good place to stop!



Library Spotlight — The Historical Society of Montgomery County Pennsylvania



Montgomery County was host to Washington's army for nine months during the Revolution and was the site of early lime, paper, iron and textile industries. Canal and railroad systems provided transportation for the industries products and residents. Montgomery County was a part of Philadelphia County until 10 September 1784. In 1881 on Washington's birthday a group of prominent citizens met to form a historical society and plan a centennial celebration. On 11 May 1883, the flourishing historical society was chartered "to preserve the civil, political and religious history of the county and to promote the study of history."

The library contains a treasure trove of more than thirty thousand books and pamphlets, many of them are rare or one of a kind. The resources are continually supplemented by family, church and cemetery records, newspapers, diaries, letters, ledgers, and other manuscript materials. Early deeds, tax records, wills, naturalization papers and other public documents. The Norristown newspapers are available in microfilm from 1800 to the present. Volunteers are available to do research. If you are a member (\$20/yr) there is no charge. Non-members pay a fee of \$4.00.

A large card catalogue is provided and contains an every-name, every-subject index to books, periodicals, genealogies and scrapbooks. A second card catalogue contains all published books while the third one indexes early documents of the Court of Common Pleas and the Court of Quarter Sessions.

Family files are maintained of the work done by other researchers. A files is kept listing researchers who are willing to exchange information with others working on the same family.

The Reading Room Collection contains Pennsylvania Archives, Montgomery County histories and biographies,

Census records 1790-1910, Passenger Lists, Immigration and Naturalization Papers, 1798 Window Pane Tax, Indices and abstracts of wills of Montgomery, Philadelphia and some neighboring counties, Sketches and Bulletins of the Historical Society of Montgomery County, Publications of the Pennsylvania German Society, Publications of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania and the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania Gazette 1729-1789, Maps and Atlases.

The Microfilm collection contains Marriage License Dockets 1885-1943, Birth Registrations 1893-1915, Death Registrations 1893-1915, Grantor/Grantee indices 1784-1919, Sheriff Dockets, Prothonotary Dockets, Will Books 1-10, Norristown Newspapers (Herald and Register), Veterans Affairs Burial Applications 1865-1943, Montgomery County Tax Books 1785-1846, Church and Cemetery Records, and Original Land Warrants.

The Special Collections contain Church and Cemetery Records, Naturalization Papers, Bible Records, Road Petitions, Tavern Licenses, Court of Quarter Sessions Records, Family, township and county histories, New Jersey, Maryland, and Delaware Archives, Scrapbooks of Edward Mathews, and Edward Hocker, Obituaries, Collections of Jones Detwiler, William Summers, and Charles Barker, Military Duty Enrollment Books 1887-1921, Civil War regimental Histories, Montgomery County Deed Books 1-299, Montgomery County Mortgage Books 1-31, Montgomery County Sheriff's Deed Poll Books A-S, Montgomery County Miscellaneous Deed Books 1-87, Montgomery County Delayed Birth Registrations, Montgomery County Marriages & Deaths published in the Herald, and City Directories for Norristown, Bridgeport, Conshohocken, Pottstown and Philadelphia.

The Society also sponsors a genealogy study group which meets six times a year.

Looking for updates on **WR.0 William Custer possible son of George Custer PK.0.01.03**

Thanks to Melvin and Eileen Myers we have some photographs for us to have faces to names

WR.0 William Custer was born 1729/1732 in Pennsylvania, possibly the son of George and Mary (Rhodes) Custer. Family tradition states that William was the son of George Custard. Whether these are the correct parents for William or not is not proven. It is known that George and Mary (Rhodes) Custer had nine children from a court petition found in Berks County, Pennsylvania Orphans Court records. Only eight of these children are known. If this William is the son of George and Mary (Rhodes) Custer, then he would have been their oldest child, born in 1732.

William married about 1753 -----. His wife was born about 1733. They lived in Virginia. Family tradition is that his wife was captured by Indians about 1766 when she was returning home from a neighbor's where she went to warp a piece of cloth. She is supposed to have had three sons and three daughters while in captivity. She was taken to Canada by the Indians where after a long period of time she was sold to a French doctor along with several other captives. The doctor gave the captives their freedom after twenty years of captivity. William learned of his wife's release and started out to find her. He had been gone only a few days when she returned home to find him gone. She began backtracking and soon met some men digging a grave. When she asked who the men were burying, they replied that it was William Custer from Virginia, a stranger. So William died about 1786. He was listed as a resident of Greenbrier County, Virginia (now West Virginia) in 1781. William was at Mathews Trading Post in Rockbridge County, Virginia along with Edmond and James Cain between 8 April 1771 and 26 January 1773.

After Williams death, his wife returned to the Shenandoah Valley where she lived for a short time, and then moved to Kentucky to live with her son, Arnold, where she died before 1791. This account was told by Ruel Custer, a grandson, and published in the Madison Courier, Bryantsburg, Indiana 15 April 1913. The account is also in Land of Our Fathers History of Clark County, Kentucky by A. Goff Bedford, although it is off by one generation (it relates that Elizabeth Scholl who married Arnold Custer was the one captured by the Indians). Ruel stated that his great-grandfather, William Custer, had six children, three sons and three daughters.

WR.0.01 Arnold Custer was born 29 April 1755 in the Shenandoah Valley, Virginia, the son of William and (/) Custer. Arnold bought 230 acres on Great Levels in Botetourt County (now Greenbrier County) in 1774 adjoining Daniel Murley, James Caine, James McClurgy & George Davison, on Warrior Road. Arnold was a Private in the Virginia Troops. Arnold served in the Greenbrier Militia in 1781 under Captain George Davidson and Major Thomas Quirks and marched into Kentucky that spring. Arnold Custer entered a claim for 1000 acres on the North Fork of the Elkhorn in Fayette County, Kentucky which was surveyed 21 March 1784. He had a 1400 acre farm near where the city of Lexington, Kentucky now stands. He lost this farm due an older claim to the land being brought into court. He went to Tennessee for the winter, and then came back to Barron County, Kentucky where he purchased a 600 acre tract. He also lost this land due to an older title to the land brought into court. Arnold and his family finally moved to Indiana Territory where he purchased land in Jefferson County.

Arnold also served under General George Rogers Clark and Colonel Benjamin Logan in the expedition against the Indians who harrassed the early settlers of Kentucky in the years immediately following the Revolution. Arnold was elected a Lieutenant of the 10th Kentucky Regiment 28 June 1792 according to Governor Isaac Shelby's Journal. The "Cornstalk" Militia of Kentucky 1792-1811 by G Glenn Clift, p 3, shows Arnold serving on 9 August 1792.

Arnold married Elizabeth Scholl/Shull 1788 in Kentucky. Elizabeth was born 1755 in Augusta County, Virginia, the daughter of William and Leah (Morgan) Scholl. William Scholl lived in Augusta County, Virginia and later in Rowan County, North Carolina, and

still later in Schollville, Clark County, Kentucky. William Scholl's wife, Leah, was a sister of Squire Boone's wife, Sarah Morgan. Squire and Sarah (Morgan) Boone were the parents of Daniel Boone. Elizabeth Scholl's brothers occupied the settlement (Schollville, Clark County, KY) and preemption of Daniel Boone, which he had assigned to their father, William Scholl. In an old notebook, written by the grandson of Peter Scholl, the Scholl family is documented:

Arnold and family settled in Jefferson County, Indiana in 1814 near Mud Lick. Elizabeth died 10 June 1825 at Madison, Jefferson County, Indiana. Arnold died 14 May 1840 at Madison, Jefferson County, Indiana. They were buried at the Hebron Cemetery near Belleview, Jefferson County, Indiana.
